## FEMALE HELPERS.

Adjusting and cleaning female wards, doing the necessary work in female bath and toilet rooms, in nurses' dormitories, helping in female hospitals and blind asylum, waiting on tables in nurses' and main female dining-room, washing dishes in nurses' kitchen and female dish cellar, helping in tea house, female clothes room and shoe store, doing the necessary work in Superintendent's and Steward's houses, in Catholic and Episcopal chapels, also in north and south pavilion.

## LABORERS.

Average employed daily—192.

Building, repairing and rolling roads, hauling stones, ashes, sand, gravel and loam for road builders and masons, hauling and spreading manure and digging vegetable garden, breaking stones for roads, delivering bread, sweeping and keeping roads clean, picking up paper and rubbish and doing all the necessary work on the grounds of the institution.

### BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Forty-four (44) orders for supplies and repairs, the most important of which called for furnishing and delivering to the Kings County Jail 50 gross tons of the best grade Lehigh egg coal, for which four firms competed and in connection with which the prices ranged from \$5.05 to \$5.40 per ton, the lowest bidder being successful; for furnishing and delivering to the Borough Hall 15 gross tons of best grade Lehigh egg coal, for which five estimates ranging from \$5.10 to \$5.31 were received, the order being awarded to the lowest bidder; for furnishing and delivering various janitor's supplies, including feather dusters, furniture polish, soap, etc., to the Borough Hall and to the Eighth District City Magistrate's Court, for which five firms competed, the prices ranging from \$17.98 to \$23.50, the orders being awarded to the lowest bidders.

Appeal No. 21, Matter of Iron Shutters for premises Nos. 69 and 71 East Eighth street, John Daniell & Son, owners and appellants; appeal for exemption from iron-shutter requirements on the ground "that there is wire glass and iron frames on all windows on the rear. The windows on the east wall are fully sixty feet away from the adjoining buildings, and the windows on the west on the upper stories have a clear open space. There is a two and one-half story building adjoining which extends back a distance of about forty-five feet."

On motion, duly seconded, exemption granted and approved, but only for such windows as are now provided with wire glass in metal frames, all other windows must be provided with outside iron shutters.
