Application has been made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by J. V. and H. V. D. Black, in which communication they desire to purchase the property, and offer \$2,500 for the same. Examination has shown that the property is worth at least \$4,000, and J. V. and H. V. D. Black have agreed to bid that sum therefor.

SIR—On September 9, 1904, the Police Commissioner

"new Police Headquarters on the site of Centre Market be respectfully transmitted to

"the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval."

I would report that upon request of the Police Commissioner, in communication
under date of July 29, 1903, at meeting of August 10, 1903, the Commissioners of the
Sinking Fund approved plans for the Headquarters Building; upon these plans bids
were received by the Police Department, but the lowest bid received was more than
the appropriation, the Board of Aldermen having refused to grant an additional appropriation to do the work according to the original plans. The Police Commissioner
directed the architects to amend their plans so the building could be built for the appropriation. The plans and specifications now submitted for approval are such amended propriation. The plans and specifications now submitted for approval are such amended

plans.

The following description furnished me by the architects shows the changes made in reducing the cost of the building to the amount appropriated for the work:

In general the design is retained intact, and the reduction in cost is effected, in the company of less expensive material than that originally consome instances, by a substitution of less expensive material than that originally considered, and in others by eliminating certain material entirely decoratve in character, but in no way altering any essential feature of the design. In no case is the construction or plan at all changed.

Exterior. Centre Street Facade—Substitute cast-iron newels for area railings instead of heavy granite posts and a consequent reduction in the granite coping for the areas on this front.

Substituting terra cotta of the same color as the stone for the lower base of the dome and which was originally stone, also using the same material instead of stone for the balustrade on the fourth story of the two sections between the central and end bays.

North Facade—Eliminating pilaster treatment of the inside of the walls of the port cochere, using plain ashlar instead. Substituting terra cotta (of the same color as the limestone) for stone on the fifth story, also using this material for facing the gable walls showing over and behind the roof of the end hay or pavilion.

South Facade—Substituting terra cotta for stone on the fifth story and in the fac-

ing of the gable wall of the drill room.

East Facade—Substituting terra cotta for stone above the second floor level and between the two end bays or pavilions, also using same material for the lower base of the central dome.

Miscellaneous—Substituting vault light construction for granite steps, platforms, etc., at all basement entrances, simplifying the ornamental wrought iron work in the lamps or marquise or canopy on the main facades.

Substituting plain pipe railing for ornamental iron work around areas on east

Substituting copper for flat roofing tile on the sloping parts of roofs over the armory and drill room, etc.

Making stone ashlar six and twelve inches thick for granite, and six and ten inches and 5-inch and 8-inch thick for cut stone.

# Interior.

Cellar—Omitting in rifle range passages top finish of cement, omitting plastering on cellar walls except in hall, lavatory, pistol range and storage.

Basement—Substituting cement for terrazza floors in prison entrance, lobbies,

male and female prisons.

First Story—Substituting white terra cotta for marble on walls of main entrance vestibule, substituting cast iron risers for marble on stairs to first floor and base-

ment, simplifying ornamental plastering.

Main Hall—Substituting terrazza and marble for all marble tile floors. Simplifying ornamental plastering north and south public corridors. Substituting terrazza

for all marble tile floors.

North Entrance Vestibule—Substituting terrazza or marble for all marble floors,

using plain white marble slabs for walls instead of caen stone.

Second Story—Main hall and north and south public corridors; floors same as above. Moulded pilaster cornices only in main halls, corridors, and Commissioners'

Third Story—Main hall, etc., floors same as above. Large trial room ceiling to

Fourth and Fifth Stories-In main halls and corridors substitute wood for ter-

razza floors. Moulded plaster cornices only in halls and corridors.

Structural Iron and Steel Work—The rearrangement of the supporting columns in the exterior walls requiring less than the number originally planned. Floor beams reduced in weight and size where permissible.

All stair work now to be cast iron strings and risers instead of where marble

before; rails simpler and all runs straight instead of curved in plan as occurred in several instances as originally planned.

Elevator doors of less elaborate design.

Area railings less ornamental than originally.

Roofing—Copper substituted for tile on pitched or sloping parts of armory and

Carpenter Work—Omitting all portable or screen partitions.

Painting—All the decorative painting of walls and ceilings omitted, except the painting of the plastered surface in the private corridors off the Commissioner's and Deputy Commissioners' rooms.

Plumbing—Substituting galvanized iron pipe for turned brass for hot water and circulation pipes.

Omitting two water filters.

A reduction of house tank to 10,600 gallon capacity. Omitting escutcheons on lines and covering on exposed pipes. Reducing marble partition inclosures to

Omitting single wash basins in office, but refaining all pipes which would permit of their installation if deemed a necessity. Using "Class B" slop sinks. Substituting sewage ejector for pump.

Electric Work—Substituting marbleized slate for marble for main switchboard.

Omitting ornamental switch on generator panels, each ammeter simply recording current on its respective dynamo.

Substituting a three-pole single knife switch for circuit breakers for panels I to I2 and tower feeder. Installing three-pole circuit breaker, with independent operating arm of type similar to others specified, the rating of which to be 800 amperes. Omitting rubber mat. Reducing booster generator feed as the storage battery is reduced; the power feeds for elevators and fans and also the leads to the storage battery are reduced

slightly.

Main switch omitted for regular light section on each board. As most of the locations for calls and push buttons are covered by the telephone system, this permits omit-

ting the bell calls.

Time clock system omitted. Telephone conduit omitted. The cost of elevator cars reduced and position indicators omitted, the elevator for prison to be operated by

The capacity of the storage battery is reduced about one half.

Heating and Ventilating—Eliminate "potter" separator in boilers, also steam gauges on board in engine room and steam drum in engine room, omitting the non-conducting covering and air space on all vertical flue riser flues, omitting air space on horizontal ducts, covering same with magnesia blocks only, omitting automatic tem-

horizontal ducts, covering same with magnesia blocks only, omitting automatic temperature regulation.

The architect's estimate for these alterations, substitutions and omissions is \$85,000, which is about \$20,000 more than the difference between the lowest bid received and the appropriation; hence I am led to believe that the cost of the building, if erected according to the amended plans, will be well within the appropriation.

Therefore, in my opinion, the amended plans (submitted by the Police Commissioner on September 9, 1904) may receive the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as required by chapter 350 of the Laws of 1892, as amended by chapter 350 of the Laws of 1805. 495 of the Laws of 1895.
