## MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 756.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor.

December 12, 1906.

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, with my disapproval, a resolution adopted by your honorable Board, December 4, 1906, entitled:

"Ordinance providing for distinguishing marks for City automobiles."

The enactment of this ordinance would seriously interfere with the use of Departmental cars for the purposes of inspection. The existence of a conspicuous sign on a machine would only serve as a warning of the presence of some municipal official, and would obviously frustrate one of the very objects for which the cars are employed. For example, I am informed by the Police Commissioner that its passage would put a stop to the use of the Police Department automobiles for the purposes of detecting violations of the speed law, and the arrest of the offenders. The Health Commissioner has also protested against its enactment on the ground that it would seriously interfere with the efficiency of his tours of inspection.

I heartily agree with your recommendation that the official cars of the City Departments should be used solely and exclusively for the City's business, but I believe that the good taste of the departmental heads can be trusted to prevent the unlawful employment of public machines for private purposes.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, which was requested on May 15, 1906 (Minutes, page 453), to draft an ordinance to require heads of various City Departments to have Department initials on automobiles under their jurisdiction, respectfully

## REPORTS:

Your Committee has given this matter careful consideration, and is sensible of the necessity which requires the enactment of an ordinance governing the subject.

The use by any person of an automobile belonging to the City for any purpose other than in the transaction of City business, is an unlawful use of City property, and should be absolutely prohibited.

As a means towards correcting this abuse, such motor cars should be so marked with the names of the respective City Departments by which they are used as to be readily recognized and distinguished.

Your Committee is of opinion that the character of such cars required for official use, and the price to be paid therefor may properly be left to the Committees of the Board to which the matter of their purchase may be presented.

Your Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following ordinance:

Whereas, This Board has expressed itself in favor of all Department automobiles bearing the initials of their respective Departments; that such automobiles be of American make and not to cost more than four thousand dollars (\$4,000); therefore be it

Resolved, That the Committee on Laws and Legislation of this Board be directed to draw up the necessary ordinance covering this matter.

AN ORDINANCE providing for the marking of automobiles, motor cars and motor trucks belonging to the City with the names of the Departments by which they are used.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Every automobile, motor car and motor truck belonging to the City shall have painted on the outside of the body thereof in conspicuous lettering, the name of the City Department by which the same is used; and such name shall at all times be openly displayed so as to be readily distinguished.

Sec. 2. Any person using an automobile, motor car or motor truck belonging to the City upon which the name of the City Department shall not be displayed as provided in the foregoing section, shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars for each occasion upon which the same shall be so used.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Dear Sir—I enclose to you herewith a resolution for adoption by the Board of Aldermen at its next meeting. Such action by the Board becomes necessary for the following reasons:

Pursuant to the terms of chapter 541 of the Laws of 1897, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Richmond designated a room in the First National Bank Building at St. George as a place for the holding of special terms of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, as well as of terms of the County Court and Surrogate's Court of the County of Richmond. Such terms of court have been held in the First National Bank Building up to the present time, but, owing to the completion of Richmond Borough Hall, within a little more than 100 feet from said First National Bank Building, in which a court room, with much more perfect accommodations has been provided, the lease of the court rooms in the First National Bank Building has not been renewed and expires on the 1st day of January next. It becomes necessary, therefore, that the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as successor to the Board of Supervisors of the County of Richmond, under section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter, take action before January 1 next, to designate a place where these terms of court can be held. The court room in Richmond Borough Hall was specially designed for these purposes, and is approved by the Judges interested.

The Appellate Division, in making assignments for the ensuing year, say: "These terms will be held at such place in the County of Richmond as the Board of Supervisors of such County may designate under the provisions of chapter 541 of the Laws of 1897."

All that remains, therefore, is the action by the Board of Aldermen indicated by the resolution which I enclose herewith.

It will be observed that the effect of the resolution will be simply to accomplish a change from rented quarters at St. George, not thoroughly suitable for the purpose, to commodious quarters in a building owned by the City, also at St. George. No substantial removal, therefore, is made from a place which experience has proved to be most convenient to all having relations with these courts.

#### REPORTS:

That in conformity with the resolution adopted by this Board a public hearing was held, at which Alderman Goodman, Mr. Frederick B. De Berard, representing the

Merchants' Association of New York; Mr. F. D. Green, representing the New York Board of Trade and Transportation; Mr. W. Van Valkenburgh, representing the American Express Company, and Mr. Charles De Hart Brower addressed the Committee in support of the proposed measure.

No one appeared in opposition.

Your Committee is impressed with the force of the claim that serious delay and loss are occasioned through the defective and obscure manner in which many of the buildings in this City are marked with the street numbers.

The purpose for which it is required that street numbers be placed on buildings is not served if the numbers cannot be readily distinguished, which is very frequently the case.

It is for the interest of the householder that this unsatisfactory condition be remedied; and no reasonable objection can be made, as no restriction is placed upon the style of numbering except the requirement that it shall be readily distinguishable.

A somewhat similar ordinance now exists in the Borough of Brooklyn, and your Committee can find no good reason why the measure should not extend throughout the entire City.

Your Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following substitute ordinance:

#### (SUBSTITUTE ORDINANCE.)

AN ORDINANCE providing for the conspicuous numbering of buildings in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The owner of every building in The City of New York shall cause the street number of the same to be plainly and legibly displayed in such manner that the same may be seen and read from the sidewalk in front thereof at all times during the day and night.

Sec. 2. Any person violating this ordinance shall be liable to a penalty of \$25, to be recovered in an action to be brought by the Corporation Counsel after giving thirty days' notice to the owner of the building to comply with this ordinance. Such notice shall be given by depositing the same, together with a copy of this ordinance, in a post paid wrapper in the New York Post Office, addressed to the owner of the building, at the building.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Police Department to report to the Corporation Counsel all violations of this ordinance forthwith.

The Corporation Counsel shall furnish the Police Department with duplicates of all notices sent to the owners of buildings, and it shall be the duty of the Police Department, immediately after the expiration of thirty days from the date of said notice, to report to the Corporation Counsel each instance of non-compliance with the ordinance.

Sec. 4. Section 73 of chapter 6 of Part III. of the ordinances of The City of New York, adopted October 30, 1906, and approved November 8, 1906, is hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### VETO.

Alderman Davis called up Veto Message of his Honor the Mayor (No. 20), Introductory No. 1239, being a report and resolution of the Committee on Finance in connection with the Budget for 1907, as follows:

No. 1239.

City of New York—Office of the Mayor, }  
December 6, 1906. }

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, with my disapproval, a resolution adopted by your Honorable Board on November 27, 1906, amending the Budget for 1907 as submitted to the Board of Aldermen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.



The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, after a careful and exhaustive consideration of the departmental estimates, cut down every allowance to the smallest possible amount requisite for the absolute needs of the various departments.

After making these reductions, they then fixed and adopted the Budget by a unanimous vote, in which action I fully concurred.

I therefore see no reason for approving the recommendations of your Honorable Board. The decreases which you have adopted are not of any great amount, and would have no appreciable effect in reducing the tax rate; while, on the other hand, these petty reductions might seriously embarrass the good work of the several departments involved.

I have carefully considered the report of your Committee advocating these reductions, but the reasons on which they base their action are not, in my opinion, of sufficient weight to justify disturbing the final judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on November 9, 1906 (Minutes, page 1031), the annexed Budget for 1907, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That your Committee has given great consideration to this matter and has held continuous sessions since the proposed Budget was referred to it on November 10. According to instructions, it has held over half a dozen public hearings, to which the heads of departments and bureaus, together with the general public, were invited and attended. Owing to the fact that, although careful consideration of the Budget items by the Board of Aldermen is prescribed by the Charter, the Committee were unable to find any precedent established by any preceding Board which it could use as a guide for its method of procedure. Your Committee therefore based its plan of action simply upon the proposition that the Board of Aldermen is the direct representative of the people of the City, with the duty to carefully inquire, on behalf of the people, into the propriety and reasonableness of the allowances of the amounts of the people's money proposed to be made.

At the hearings the questions asked were not so much for the purpose of learning (as at the earlier Board of Estimate and Apportionment hearings) what the money was wanted for, but of ascertaining the specific purpose to which the department heads intended to put the allowance made. The department and bureau heads attended before the Committee and explained their purposes, and in most cases thoroughly cooperated with the Committee, and upon request in many cases submitted itemized statements which will be kept on file.

Of the \$13,500,000 increase of this Budget over the 1906 Budget, \$9,000,000 is made mandatory by statute (\$6,000,000 being advances in the salaries of certain Policemen, Firemen and School Teachers, Courts, etc., \$3,000,000 for tax deficiencies), and the remaining \$4,500,000 being deemed necessary by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the proper administration of the City's business.

In going over the Budget as proposed, the Committee is more than ever convinced that the suggestion made by it to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with reference to a segregation of items, showing which are granted and which are denied, is absolutely necessary, not only for a proper and economical administration of departments, but also for any adequate consideration by this Board or any inquiring taxpayer. The Committee believe that with this improvement, as provided for the 1908 Budget, a great step towards a readable Budget may be made.

After going over the proposed Budget in its present form, your Committee feels that in most cases no reduction should be recommended by it, because intelligent cuts cannot be made as the Budget is at present, and your Committee does not wish to hamper departmental workings, but it feels that all of the departments should get along on the appropriations allowed, and only apply for Special Revenue Bonds in cases of emergency. Your Committee's policy has been to get a full and intelligent understanding of the proposed expenditures, rather than for arbitrary Budget paring purposes, and it feels greatly encouraged by the result of its investigations, and expects to put the information so gathered to good future use in the City's behalf.

As a general recommendation, the Committee believes that the time has come for large salaries to be sparingly raised, and then only after very careful consideration of the facts, and most of the following reductions are recommended for the reason that your Committee does not believe that the salary raises proposed to be made are justified. As a general proposition, the Committee unanimously believe that if the City's financial condition warrants salary raises, that the \$600 a year Clerks' and the \$2 a day Laborers' claims be first inquired into and adjusted.

The Committee's further recommendations are made in detail in the following:

#### THE MAYORALTY.

The Mayor proposes to increase the salaries of his two Secretaries to \$6,000 each, one from \$4,000 and the other from \$5,000. He has written the following explanatory letter, and in view of this and because he, as Mayor, assumes the responsibility for the increases, your Committee believes same should be allowed as he desires:

City of New York—Office of the Mayor,  
November 26, 1906.

Hon. JOHN R. DAVIES, Chairman, Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Mr. Davies—In connection with the resolution now pending before the Board of Aldermen, increasing the salaries in the Executive Department, it seems to me proper that you and your colleagues should know something of the duties of those affected.

The functions of the Secretary and the Executive Secretary to the Mayor are interchangeable, their duties being almost exactly similar. These duties are necessarily of a confidential nature, and it is impossible to give an entirely adequate idea of them. The relation of these Secretaries to me is much the same as that of the assistants to the head of a railroad, or other large corporation. I have asked that their compensation be fixed at \$6,000 a year because of my conviction that any less amount would be out of proportion to the work performed.

The Chief Clerk of the Executive Department combines the duties of Chief Clerk and Bond and Warrant Clerk. Under earlier administrations the Executive Department had one Chief Clerk at \$3,200, and one Bond and Warrant Clerk at \$2,200, making a total for the two places of \$5,400. The consolidation of these places at a salary of \$3,000 has been a great saving to the City, and the business of the office has increased to such an extent that this additional salary should in fairness be granted.

I have asked for an increase of \$700 in the salary of my Stenographer, because during many years of service in the Executive Department he has become so familiar with the routine of the Mayor's office as to be invaluable. At my earnest solicitation he has repeatedly turned aside advancement to more lucrative places and remained in this office.

This provision of \$409,752.89 is for rent for property leased to the City for public offices, etc., for which no provision is made in the separate departmental estimates. The complete list has been submitted to the Committee, and it includes, among others, offices in the

#### LAW DEPARTMENT.

This Department receives \$685,000, as requested, which represents practically no increase over 1906. The titles, however, are changed, as the Corporation Counsel plans a reorganization on better business lines. The Committee approves of this.

#### BOROUGH PRESIDENTS.

As the Borough Presidents apportioned their own allowances, the Committee feels, after careful investigation into their Budgets, that, barring emergencies, they should be able, with their increased allowances, to get through 1907 without Special Revenue Bonds. Owing to the present unitemized accounts, intelligent reductions could not be made, with the exception of the Queens Budget, which was partially itemized, but the Committee feels that as this is a growing borough of great needs, the allowances should be permitted to stand. Each President furnished further itemized estimates to the Committee.

The Bureaus of Incumbrances for Manhattan and Brooklyn cost about \$55,000 per year, and as the Street Cleaning Department claims parallel jurisdiction, the Committee believes that proper investigation and provision in the future should be made, so that the City will not pay twice for the same work.

#### DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY.

This is another Department which, owing to unitemized allowances totalling \$5,409,549.25, intelligent reductions cannot be made, and, although the Committee does not feel satisfied with the allowances, it does not wish to risk hampering the lighting and water supply maintenance. Two items, however—those of salaries and maintenance of high pressure fire service, Manhattan, \$10,000 and \$5,700—should be stricken from the Budget, as the Commissioner does not expect these to be ready until about August 1, 1907, and some believe not until 1908. If they are ready for maintenance in 1907, Special Revenue Bonds should then be supplied.

#### PARKS.

Appropriations for all boroughs, \$2,657,863.93. The Commissioners all claim that these allowances are less than for 1906, but your Committee trust that the amounts will be sufficient, as the Board of Estimate and Apportionment evidently intended they should be.

#### CHARITIES AND HOSPITALS DEPARTMENT.

The small increases in these Departments will be used for providing a better class of Helper, and for maintenance of the new hospitals of Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham.

#### CORRECTION.

Practically no increases.

#### HEALTH.

The appropriation of \$1,847,819.66 granted to this Department represents no increase, but proposes to do away with the heretofore large Revenue Bond allowance, which move the Committee commends. Owing to the improved style of estimate used, intelligent criticism could be made, but the Committee would recommend no reductions.

#### POLICE.

Your Committee has given very careful consideration to the Police allowances and feel compelled to recommend the following reductions:

Under heading, "Police Fund, Salaries of Commissioners, etc.," \$28,500 is proposed to be allowed, with which the Commissioner intends to raise the salaries of three Deputies from \$4,000 to \$6,000 each; to pay the Chaplains at \$1,000 each.

Your Committee believes that inasmuch as several administrations have gone along well upon the present salaries, that a change should be carefully made. None of these three Deputies have been engaged in police work for a year, and the Third Deputy only since April of this year, and a raise of 33 1/3 per cent. is excessive. The Committee believes, however, that, owing to the onerous work and responsibility resting upon the Deputy for Brooklyn and Queens, there should be some raise, and it therefore recommends that \$5,000 be allowed to the First and Second Deputies, and \$4,000 to the Third, and would recommend that the First Deputy be designated for Brooklyn and Queens, and when this is done the Committee would recommend a salary of \$6,000 for the First Deputy.

With reference to the proposed allowance of \$1,000 for each of the four Chaplains (no salary now), your Committee does not feel that it has been shown the necessity for paid Chaplains to this Department, and would therefore recommend a reduction for that. This fund should therefore read:

#### Police Fund, Salaries of Inspectors, Surgeons and Uniformed Force.

"Inspectors"—The Budget allows for seventeen Inspectors at \$3,500 each, an increase of three Inspectors over 1906.

Provision was made by the Board last May for these three, only upon the Commissioner's statement that the demand for them was urgent. Since there has been no appointment to these offices, and it seems to do as well without them, your Committee therefore recommends a reduction to fourteen, the same as last year; reduction, \$10,500.

"Surgeons"—Allowance for twenty-five Surgeons at \$3,500, instead of twenty-three for 1906. This position is reckoned to be a good place, and the Commissioner has not shown good reason for the increase, and the Committee recommends the same as last year; reduction, \$7,000.

"Uniformed Force"—Budget allows for about 800 additional Patrolmen, and as the Commissioner claims to have restored over 1,000 more detailed men to sidewalk duty, he will now have nearly 2,000 more than his predecessors had, and with which increased force the City should be well policed, and which also will probably allow for an improved system, with hours more satisfactory to the men.

"Detective Sergeants"—Budget allows 350 at \$2,000, instead of 251 for 1906. The Commissioner wishes these additional because he cannot get satisfactory service out of the present lot. As Police Commissioner he should get proper service from the City's paid detectives or get rid of them, and your Committee cannot see how a mere increase is going to do anything else than increase the City's expenses. It agrees that the force may not be satisfactory, but does not see how an increase will better matters, and therefore recommends reduction of 99 Detective Sergeants at \$2,000, \$198,000 off.

#### "Police Department, Salaries for Clerical Force and Employees."

The Budget allows for one Private Secretary to the Police Commissioner, \$5,000, a raise of \$2,000 over 1906. This gentleman has only been in the Department since January 1, 1906, and the Committee has not been shown why such a large increase should be made. It recommends that \$3,500, a raise of \$500, be allowed.

The Budget allows for one Executive Clerk to the Commissioner at \$3,000, a raise of \$900 over 1906. This gentleman has also only been in the Department since January 1, 1906, and for the same reason as above, the Committee recommends that it be fixed at \$2,500 instead. This should therefore read:

The Committee feels that so long as the Commissioner felt so generous toward the high salaried men, he might have given some little consideration to the nine Laborers at \$2 per day, for whom no request for an increase was made.

## STREET CLEANING.

## General Administrations.

Allowance for two Deputies, one for Brooklyn at \$5,000, and one for The Bronx at \$5,000; two positions.

The Committee has no objection to the Brooklyn allowance, but feels that a reasonable allowance for The Bronx Deputy would be \$4,000. Queens pays \$3,000 and Richmond \$2,500, and although The Bronx is a live, growing borough, it is not yet as large or as difficult as Brooklyn.

## Uniformed Force.

Budget allowance for twenty District Superintendents, at \$2,100 each, a raise from \$1,800 each in 1906. Twenty Stable Foremen, at \$1,500 each, a raise from \$1,300 each in 1906.

The Committee has not been satisfactorily shown why these substantial raises should be made to the high salaried men in preference to the low paid and hard worked Drivers and Sweepers, etc., for whom no raise was requested or allowed, and they therefore recommend that no increase be allowed. It should therefore read:

As long as scows will probably be used for many years to come, it seems to the Committee that it might be good business to consider buying them instead of a large rental, about \$50,000 annually.

With reference to hire of harbor scows, costing the City about \$15,000 annually, it seems that the City should not have to pay for this removal of ashes, etc., from vessels in the harbor, as the scow owners not only receive payment from the City, but also are able to sell the cinders collected at a good price. The Commissioner should look into this.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT.

## Bureau of Chief of Department Payroll.

Budget allows for eight Chaplains at \$1,000, an increase of four Chaplains over 1906. The Commissioner explained that these Chaplains attended large fires and administered to the injured. The Committee commends the attendance and services of the clergy at such, but believes, as the Commissioner agreed, that at all serious fires the neighboring clergy and priests are always available and agreeable, and cheerfully volunteer. This is as it should be, and therefore the Committee feels that there is no necessity for a paid Chaplain service in the Department. The two gentlemen who started it did so as volunteers, and because of their great interest in this fine department, and it would seem to encourage an expensive and needless innovation, and one which we do not believe neither the general clergy nor the men desire. The Committee would therefore recommend the reduction in this account of eight Chaplains at \$1,000 each to its present amount. Four Chaplains at \$1,000, \$4,000.

This contemplates an increase in the number of Firemen, which is necessary for the proper and increased fire protection. The Committee approves of this full allowance and take this occasion of refuting one erroneous newspaper statement that the Committee or its Chairman is opposed to the Firemen's time off allowance. This allowance should be sufficient answer to this.

## BOARD OF ASSESSORS.

Budget allows:

Salaries of three Assessors, at \$5,000 each, \$15,000, an increase of \$2,000 over 1906.

The Committee has made investigation, but has not been shown why this increase should be made, as the three incumbents are able to attend to their outside business affairs, and a \$5,000 Secretary is allowed to take care of the management. The Committee therefore recommends that the allowance be the same as 1906.

## COUNTY OFFICES.

The County offices, including courts, national guard, etc., increases are mainly statutory and mandatory.

## COMPTROLLER.

The allowance of \$1,135,450 to this office represents an increase which the Comptroller intends to use for reorganizing and rearranging his staff, and the Committee feels that he should be allowed this leeway.

## DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION.

This Department was allowed..... \$24,915,928 16  
Of which general fund for Teachers, etc..... 19,845,870 58

And balance of..... \$5,070,057 58

—for administrative and office purposes.

The Committee have endeavored to inquire into the details of this allowance, but were not as successful (perhaps through misunderstanding) as they would wish. The Board does not meet to apportion until December, and until then official information cannot be obtained. Most of the allowance is mandatory, but the Committee believes that with reference to its office force, etc., the Department should act the same as other City Departments, receiving City money. Under present circumstances the Committee cannot make intelligent reduction.

The Committee feel that with more time allowed them better results could have been obtained.

They recommend the adoption of the annexed resolution.

Resolved, That the Budget for 1907, as submitted to the Board of Aldermen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

By striking out under heading "Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity" the words and figures "\$10,000, High Pressure Fire Service," making total for salaries, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, \$403,233.

## FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."

8. Where the City is paying 50 per cent. and upwards of the cost of maintenance of an institution, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requires representation in the board meetings of that institution, with the right of taking part in all business transactions. This representation shall be through the Comptroller, who may attend any meeting, either in person or through a representative appointed by him, of which appointment the Comptroller will give written notice to the board of the institution.

9. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment will not pay for the maintenance of dependent and delinquent children in the same institution.

10. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.....	\$0 45
For dependent children, from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week.....	2 25
For delinquent children, per annum.....	135 00
For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the Courts, per annum.....	135 00



For inmates in homes for unfortunate and friendless women, per annum.....	\$110 00

For services of Custodian, first year, \$900; second year \$1,050; thereafter \$1,200 per annum.

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1254.

It is the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that all children should be fully surrendered by their parents or guardians to the institutions to which they may be committed and the Commissioner of Charities is requested to secure such surrenders as far as possible.

Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the Courts where no crime is proven against the child to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a Court commitment.

The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of emigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

In connection with the foregoing veto, the Committee on Finance presented the following supplemental report:

No. 1391.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on December 11, 1906 (Minutes, page 1544), the subject matter of veto No. 20, the same being a message of his Honor the Mayor disapproving the resolution amending the Budget for 1907, adopted by the Board of Aldermen November 27, 1906, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, out of respect to the Mayor's veto it has again carefully considered the reductions proposed by this Board in the Budget, but this only serves to make the Committee more positive in urging the readoption of the recommendations.

It is this Board's duty, under the Charter, carefully to consider the items of the proposed Budget and make proper reduction, and in complying with this legal obligation your Committee believed it was also aiding both the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and his Honor the Mayor in saving the taxpayers' money.

That the Committee was careful to take no chances of hampering the proper workings of the departments was the reason for the comparatively small reductions recommended by it. Under the present unitemized form of Budget, in most cases, the bad could not be cut without also cutting the good, and the items cut were what the Committee considered entirely improper expenditures.

The Budget of 1907 as it came to the Committee contained increases over that of 1906, in items of expenditure which are not mandatory, aggregating \$4,000,000.

The Committee feels that the \$265,000 reduction, or any amount, is not too "petty," as his Honor the Mayor terms it, to save to the people, especially when examination shows the allowance so reduced to be wholly improper. Besides the recommendation to prevent the growth of an expensive chaplain service and the cutting of many proposed large and unnecessary salary increases, the largest cut recommended was against an increase of \$200,000 per year for 100 additional detective sergeants in the Police Department at \$2,000 each, allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The Committee went over this matter carefully with the Police Commissioner at its hearing, and reported these to be unnecessary as fully explained in the previous report. In addition, however, it feels that any New Yorker, as well as his Honor the Mayor, must recollect that it is only within the past year or so that the Police Commissioner was unable to find sufficient detective duties for all of the present detective force of 250 men, and he sent many of them to do desk and patrol duty in the precinct stations. In view of that the Committee fails to see the propriety of this large expenditure. The Committee feels therefore that the City's interests demand that these reductions be made and therefore recommend a reconsideration of the resolution amending the Budget, and the readoption of the said resolution notwithstanding the veto of his Honor the Mayor.

No. 1393.

Whereas, The street car service of this city is universally condemned as antiquated, inadequate, inefficient, injurious to morals, and dangerous to life and health; and

Whereas, It has been charged that the railway companies, though enjoying franchises of great value, are disregardful of the rights of the public and of the obligations imposed by law and charter; and that only such number of cars are operated as to keep them crowded at all hours of the day; and that in the Borough of Manhattan one-third of the mileage is still operated by horse cars; and that in the Bronx, as well as in other Boroughs, a disgracefully inefficient trolley service is rendered; and that in Brooklyn, on an average, a person is killed every forty hours by street cars; and that the subway is operated in violation of law and contract under conditions of extreme peril; and that there are other just causes of complaint; and

Whereas, The street railway companies owe the city enormous sums of money for taxes, of which over \$19,000,000 is due for special franchise taxes alone; and

Whereas, It has been charged that these intolerable conditions are the result of consolidations and mergers and of stock watering, and of other acts injurious to public policy and morals, including the thefts of money provided for changing motive power; now therefore be it

Resolved, That a Special Committee of five members of this Board be and they are hereby appointed with power to make such investigations and recommendations in the premises as they shall deem proper, and are hereby directed to report to this Board as soon as possible the results of their investigations with recommendations; and be it further

Resolved, That the City Clerk shall furnish the Committee with a Stenographer and such other assistants as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the investigations herein directed; and the committee shall have power to compel the production before it of any books, records, letters or documentary evidence of any character which, in the judgment of the Committee, pertains to any matter or thing under investigation, and wherever found, and also to compel the attendance of any witness; and the Committee may hold meetings in any and all boroughs of the City. Any member of the Committee, or Clerks so authorized by the Committee, shall have access at all times during the life of the Committee, to all books, records, papers and other documents on file in the offices of the various Departments of the City and boroughs, and the various subdivisions thereof throughout the City and boroughs; and the Committee shall exercise and enjoy all the powers, privileges and authority of a Legislative Committee, with full power to enforce its directions and mandates; and be it further

Resolved, That the Sergeant-at-Arms of this Board shall attend the Committee and shall serve or cause to be served all subpoenas issued by the Committee and perform all duties as Sergeant-at-Arms required by the Committee.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. For the purpose of minimizing danger and in order that passengers may more conveniently board and alight from the railroad cars operated on Broadway, between Fifty-ninth and Manhattan streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, the railroad company or companies operating cars on said thoroughfare shall require the conductor to open the gate on the rear end of each and every car on the side nearest the parkways or small parks in the centre of said Broadway.

Sec. 2. A failure on the part of the company or companies operating cars on said Broadway, or on the part of any employee or employees thereof, to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, shall subject the company, companies or other persons so offending, to a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each and every failure so to do.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Section 96. The owners, lessees, tenants, occupants and managers of every building, vessel or place in or upon which a locomotive or stationary engine, furnace or boilers are used shall cause all ashes, cinders, rubbish, dirt and refuse to be removed to some proper place so that the same shall not accumulate, nor shall any person cause, suffer or allow cinders, dust, gas, steam or offensive or noxious odors to escape or be discharged from any such building, vessel or place, to the detriment or annoyance of any person or persons not being therein or thereupon engaged.

Resolved, That the following sanitary ordinance be and the same is hereby adopted and added to the Sanitary Code, to be known as section 181:

Section 181. No person shall cause, suffer or allow dense smoke to be discharged from any building, vessel, stationary or locomotive engine, place or premises within the City of New York, or upon the waters adjacent thereto, within the jurisdiction of said City. All persons participating in any violation of this provision, either as proprietors, owners, tenants, managers, superintendents, captains, engineers, firemen or otherwise, shall be severally liable therefor.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
