Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen

Sir—When the Annual Budget for the year 1907 was finally completed and approved it was found that in the revision of the figures this Department was granted \$170,027.38 less than the actual amount needed for the year as indicated by the January payroll. Thus the Department was left that amount short of its absolute necessities for salaries, including all Bureaus. Of this \$170,027.38 the deficiency \$115,000 is manulatory under the law for advancements in grade and the remaining \$55,027.38 is manulatory in fact if the Department is to be continued on the basis provided for in the Budget with its present inadequate force. Securing this \$170,027.38 alone would simply mean that if the amount is obtained we can get along as at present, but that no progress can be made, no appointments or promotions can be made and nothing can be done to add to the efficiency of the service, and the demands now being made upon it are enormous. If relief is not obtained it will necessitate the immediate cutting down of the present force, and to meet the emergency it will be necessary to lay off down of the present force, and to meet the emergency it will be necessary to lay off many of the clerical force and many of the mechanical force, thus severely crippling and utterly disabling the administrative work of the Department.

I therefore have the honor to request that the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds not only to meet this plain deficiency in the Budget, but also in addition to that amount \$146,316.68 to supply funds for the extension of the paid system in the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond, the salaries of uniformed men whose appointments will be made necessary by this extension, and for new positions in the various Bureaus which have become absolutely necessary owing to the vast growth of the business of this Department, making a total of Special Revenue Bonds necessary of \$316,344.06.

A carefully itemized statement, showing why this money is needed, is forwarded herewith, together with an explanatory memorandum of new positions required.

I cannot emphasize too strongly the importance to this Department of securing this money at the earliest possible date, and earnestly request your co-operation and the co-operation of every member of the Board of Aldermen to this end. Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter as amended, and for the purpose of meeting the estimated deficiencies in the appropriations made to various bureaus and branches of the Fire Department for salaries for the year 1907, including the amount necessary to meet the expense of advancements in pay and grade of members of the uniformed force by operation of law; also to provide means for necessary increases in the clerical and mechanical forces of the Department, and to pay the salaries of additional officers and members of the uniformed force for said year, in connection with the proposed further extension of the paid system of fire protection into that part of the Borough of Richmond not already covered thereby, and into Flushing, Jamaica, College Point and Whitestone, Borough of Queens, as set forth in the communication of the Commissioner of said Department, dated February 13, 1907, and the detailed statement accompanying same, the Board of Aldermen hereby requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate three hundred and sixteen thousand three hundred and fifty dollars (\$316,350).

Dear Sir—Application is hereby made for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$10,000, to provide for the expense to be incurred by this Department in removing and altering water mains when they are found to be in the line of sewers being constructed under the direction and supervision of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

of The Bronx.

In the preparation of the contracts by the Borough President, which were approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel, it was provided that: "Whenever it is found that a water main or valve is in the line of sewer construction, the same shall be removed at the expense of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity."

This Department had no notice of this contract provision, and, therefore, no appropriation has ever been requested to meet this expense.

The question as to who was responsible for the relocating of the water mains was considered by the Corporation Counsel, and it was finally decided that no change could be made in the contract provisions at this time; that the City was bound by its contracts, and as the care and maintenance of the pipes were under the control of this Department, the expense of removing same should be borne by it.

Pending the settlement of this question, I believe the work of building several sewers has been delayed, and in order that the City shall not sustain any damages that might be claimed for delay in the completion of the work, it is respectfully requested that your Board recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue Special Revenue Bonds in this amount.

Hon. GEORGE B, McCLELLAN, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held January 18, 1907, the reports of the Comptroller upon the request of the President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, for an appropriation of \$990.444.81, for the erection of a Pathological Department and Male Dormitory of the New Bellevue Hospital, and upon the request of the Board of Trustees, for the approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, of the specifications prepared for the erection of this building, they were referred to a Select Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

We have looked into both matters with some care and have taken up in detail with Mr. Withington, the Chief Engineer, and Mr. Reed, Assistant Engineer, of the Department of Finance, such questions as have arisen in connection therewith.

The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals asked for an appropriation of \$990.444.81, and the Department of Finance, after a careful examination of the estimate and cost, recommended that \$850,000 be allowed for this work.

Due examination leads to the opinion that the amount recommended in the Comptroller's report is adequate for the erection of the building in question, and may properly meet the approval of the Board.

The Engineers of the Department of Finance took exception to certain features of the Specifications, and required that modifications be made therein before giving their approval. Hon, GEORGE B, McCLELLAN, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Under date of December 13, 1906, Mr. J. K. Paulding, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, submits to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a report of the Bellevue Trustees for an appropriation of \$990,444.81, to provide for the erection of the Pathological Department and Male Dormitory of the new Bellevue Hospital.

It will be recalled that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on March 16, 1905, formally adopted the scheme of a new Bellevue Hospital to cover the blocks between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-ninth streets, First avenue and the East river, and appropriated \$50,000 for the erection of Pavilions "A" and "B."

It is now proposed to erect a building to house the Pathological Department, that branch of hospital work being in greatest need of new quarters, and to provide in the

It is now proposed to erect a building to house the Pathological Department, that branch of hospital work being in greatest need of new quarters, and to provide in the upper stories a dormitory for male help.

I have examined the plans and estimates submitted, and I find that the proposed building is to be of the same type exteriorly as the pavilions now under contract and designed as a part of the architectural scheme adopted March, 1905.

Pavilions "A" and "B," now under contract, will cost something over \$700,000, leaving a balance of more than \$100,000 out of the original appropriation.

This estimate is considerably higher than that for Pavilions "A" and "B," owing to the increased size of the building and to the quite different requirements of its interior to fit it for pathological purposes. Complete systems of ventilation and refrigeration must be provided, which alone will add \$100,000 to the cost.

But I still think that the estimate is rather high, however special the interior of the building may be.

building may be.

Allowing for the \$100,000 available from the former appropriation, I think that \$850,000 additional should be sufficient to cover the cost, and I therefore recommend that, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter

and of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$850,000 to provide means for the construction of new Bellevue Hospital.

In this connection I beg to call attention to the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted March 16, 1905, that the contract and specifications for the construction of new Bellevue Hospital or any part thereof be first submitted to this Board for approval before they are let. Sir—In a letter dated January 28, 1907, the Hun. John V. Coggey, Commissioner, Department of Correction, asks the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation of \$100,000, to provide funds for the construction of a steamhoat to meet the increasing needs of the Department.

I find that the recent establishment of new industries for the employment of prisoners upon Hart's Island, and the transfer to Blackwell's Island of the manufacturing industries formerly carried on in the Kings County Penitentiary, has largely increased the needs of the Department for steamboat service.

In the near future, the proposed penitentiary and workshops on Riker's Island

creased the needs of the Department for steamboat service.

In the near future, the proposed penitentiary and workshops on Riker's Island will also make necessary an increase in the transportation service of the Department. It is proposed to use this money to build a boat somewhat larger and considerably more powerful than the "Massasoit," now in the service of the Department. The new boat will also have facilities and room for handling freight expeditiously.

Dear Sir—I respectfully beg to submit a report upon the present inadequate steamboat service of this department and the urgent necessity of an additional steamboat for the transportation of passengers, prisoners and freight to and from the several islands of the department.

At present we have four (4) steamboats, the "Massasoit," the "Minnahanonek," "The Bronx" and the "Thomas F. Gilroy," which are in service as follows:

The "Massasoit," a twin-screw propeller, 475 tonnage, carrying passengers, prisoners and freight from East Twenty-sixth street dock to Blackwell's, Riker's and Hart's Islands daily, a sixteen-mile trip each way.

The "Minnahanonek," a side-wheel, double-end boat, 475 tonnage, making two trips daily from East Twenty-sixth street dock, carrying passengers, prisoners and freight to the islands as far as Riker's Island, and bringing down the Harlem prisoners daily, each round trip covering twenty (20) miles.

"The Bronx," a single-screw propeller, 50 tonnage, used as a ferryboat between Blackwell's Island and East Seventieth street dock, New York, transporting visitors, doctors and employees to and from these points, and is in service for eighteen (18) hours daily.

doctors and employees to and from these points, and is in service for eighteen (18) hours daily.

The "Thomas F. Gilroy," a single-screw propeller, 25 tounage, a small launch used as a ferryboat between Hart's island and City Island for visitors and department employees, especially intended and mostly for the purpose of conveying Firemen and their apparatus to the island in case of fire, but for which purpose it is totally inadequate. The condition of this boat is far from being the best, and the cost to put it in good shape would far exceed her value.

The quantity of freight and the number of passengers and prisoners now carried by the "Minnahanonck" and the "Massassoit" are very great, and are constantly increasing. The "Minnahanonck" has been in almost constant use for the past thirty years, and she is not fit to continue much longer in the hard work she is now doing.

The reasons for the increase above alluded to are:

First—The establishment of the City Reformatory on Hart's Island and the needs of the manufacturing industries located there will double the freight requirements.

Second—The ice-making plant recently completed on Hart's Island, the produce of which is to be transported to the different islands of the department.

Third—The transfer of the Brooklyn manufacturing industries to Blackwell's Island Penitentiary, which require provision for transporting raw and manufactured materials to and from the islands.

Fourth—The proposed penitentiary and workshops to be erected on Riker's Island, which will increase the transportation of passengers, prisoners and freight to that point.

that point.

The conditions confronting the department demand that this important matter should be taken up at once. I therefore recommend that an appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars be asked for, for the purpose of building a new twin-screw propeller of proper size and tonnage.

Under the most favorable circumstances it will take at least a year to build this steamboat, and I trust you will deem the matter one of sufficient importance to bring it to an early issue.

Dear Sir—Section 475 of the revised Greater New York Charter provides that the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall, in his discretion, cause water meters to be placed in several classes of buildings where water is furnished for business consumption, the pattern and price of merer to be used in measuring the water to be approved by the Board of Aldermen.

The Neptune Meter Company have made application to this Department for the approval of their Trident-Crest meter. A 3-inch meter of this style has been tested by the Consulting Engineer of this Department as to accuracy and durability, and the result of the test is shown on the accompanying report, which has received my approval. On 1-inch outlet, 10 pounds pressure, 1 foot fast on the passing of 100 cubic feet.

On 1/-inch outlet, 10 pounds pressure, 5 feet short on the passing of 50 cubic feet.

These tests show that under the usual uses for which large meters are placed, the meter is equal to any now in the market.

No. 1270-(S. O. No. 115).

The Committee on Finance, which was instructed by resolution adopted on November 13, 1906 (Minutes, page 1240), to hold public hearings in the matter of encouraging aquatic sports, respectfully

REPORTS:

REPORTS:

That the Committee held an advertised public hearing at which a large representation of boating men and citizens appeared and urged that the City in the interests of public health and good citizenship make an appropriation for the encouragement of rowing. The Harlem Regatta Association is an association composed of 18 rowing clubs, scattered over all of the boroughs of the City, and with an active membership of over six thousand men. These men are all hard working young men of our city who are in love with the sport. It holds and has held for many years a regatta on the Harlem river along the speedway wall on Memorial Day of each year. These regattas are a regularly recognized event and are viewed by from 25,000 to 50,000 people, mostly standing along the speedway. In order to carry on the regattas, it is necessary to offer prizes in the form of medals and banners, and it is generally necessary, in order to obtain good rowing talent, to pay the travelling expenses of some prominent out of town crews. These generally entail an expense of over \$5,000 and it all comes out of the pockets of the individual rowing men. The City, in the interests of public health and good citizenship, has spent, and spends hundreds of thousands of dollars for base hall, tennis, golf, skating, polo, speeding and all other sports for its citizens, and it would seem that it would be entirely proper and just that at least a small sum should be spent for the encouragement of such a manly and honest sport as rowing, especially as in addition so many people of the City, without expense, enjoy the pleasure of watching the regattas.

Other large cities, especially Philadelphia and Boston, have made such an appropria-

Other large cities, especially Philadelphia and boston, have made such an appropriation for years.

Your Committee feels that this sport should be encouraged by a reasonable and legal appropriation, which will be handled by one of the City's Commissioners, and authorizing its use for the erection of a grand stand, hiring a band of music, and with any balance pay toward the expense of medals and other prizes, etc., and for such purposes, after consulting with the Comptroller's Office, your Committee recommends that the annexed resolution be adopted

Resolved. Dear Sir-In the matter of constructing office building at Williamsbridge, this Dear Sir—In the matter of constructing office building at Williamsbridge, this borough, which is now before your Committee for an additional appropriation of twenty-five thousand dollars, I beg to state that there are now leased by the City for the use of the engineering force of the Highway and Sewer Bureaus of this Department two Buildings in Williamsbridge at a rental of \$920 per annum, and one-half of offices on Tremont avenue at \$600 per annum, all of which will be vacated as soon as new building is completed. It will also be necessary to provide a building this spring for the use of the Topographical Bureau, at a probable rental of \$500 per annum; this force would also be transferred to the new building. With the amount of improvements projected for this section, the engineering force will be largely increased, and more office room required, in case this building is not erected.

The Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen December 31, 1906 (Minutes, page 1871), requesting that a public hearing be held "on the condition of the streets in the Borough of Brooklyn," respectfully

That the public hearing asked for was duly held in the Borough Hall, Brooklyn,

That the public hearing asked for was duly held in the borough that, Brooklyn, on Thursday, January 24, 1907, at which representatives of the following civic societies attended and addressed the Committee on the subject before it:

The Brooklyn League; Prospect Heights Board of Trade; Kings County Medical Society; Women's Health Protective Association; Long Island Automobile Association; Retail Grocers Association; Twenty-fourth Ward Board of Trade; Letters were also received and read from the Wallabout Market Merchants' Association and the Clinton August Association

were also received and read from the Wallabout Market Merchants' Association and the Clinton Avenue Association.

In addition Alderman Downing, who acted as Chairman at the hearing, and Alderman Everson, Gunther, Hann, Borough President Coler, and other representative citizens appeared and addressed the Committee.

Many citizens, male and female, were in attendance and from what was said and the general interest manifested in the condition of the streets of the borough there seems to be no small ground for the miversal complaint heard.

Deductions made by the Committee make it difficult on whom to fix the blame, but the general consensus of opinion seems to have been that insufficient appropriations have heretofore been made for the preservation and repairing of the streets of Brooklyn, and that hereafter the City should be more generous in its allotment of money for these purposes.

Brooklyn, and that hereafter the City should be more generous in its allotment of money for these purposes.

Various causes were assigned for the poor condition of the streets, the principal one being the division of authority over them, under which many departments issue permits for openings. It is believed that this situation can and would be obviated were the common sense plan of the Chief Engineer of the Borough, George W. Tillson, put into practice, a plan which places authority in one head, forbids the granting of conflicting permits for openings, regulates the relaying of pavements and in general would bring about a systematic and consistent jurisdiction over such matters.

The Committee recommends the adoption of this plan.

The Committee recommends further that two men, instead of one, be assigned to carts for the removal of ashes and garbage, and that additional sweepers and drivers be provided, the present force being inadequate for the performance of this work.

drivers be provided, the present force being inadequate for the performance of this work.

That all complaints in relation to the condition of the streets should be filed with the Borough President, in whom authority over them should be lodged, so that responsibility may be definitely fixed.

That ample funds should be allotted for repaving and maintenance.

That there shall be established a "Fund for the Repairing of Sidewalks" and sufficient money set aside for such work, a work very much needed and one of the causes of the general complaint leading up to this hearing and investigation.

The work of repairing openings in asphalt pavements, other than those guaranteed, will be expedited upon the completion of the municipal asphalt plant, work on which is rapidly progressing, as the Committee is informed, and which will, when completed, obviate the delay in the making of such repairs occasioned by the inability of the Borough President to make contract for such work or to compel asphalt companies to make repairs within reasonable time.

The findings of the Committee and the general complaint which caused the hearing from which they were deduced, seem to have justification, for subsequent thereto, and in a presentment handed down under date of February 15, 1907, the Grand Jury of Kings County supplements all that is herein reported.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which were referred on November 13, 1906, and December 11, 1906 (Minutes, pages 1248 and 1620), the annexed resolutions, in favor of permitting August V. Muller and Herman Bach to erect an ornamental clock in front of their premises, respectfully REPORTS:

That section 50 of the Charter in terms authorizes the Board of Aldermen to regulate the use of the streets for privileges such as are covered by the proposed resolu-tions. The section, however, requires that such regulation shall be by general ordi-nance, and expressly forbids the enactment of special ordinances affecting such mat-

With respect to similar resolutions providing for watering troughs and retaining walls, as to which many special ordinances had theretofore been enacted, the Corporation Connsel, in an opinion under date of June 22, 1906, declared positively that this Board had no power to pass any such ordinances.

In July following, Acting Mayor McGowan, in his veto of a resolution permitting the erection of an ornamental sign post, said:

"The passage of a resolution of this character is clearly forbidden by the Charter and I cannot therefore approve the same."

Your Committee is sensible that the provision of the Charter referred to has been repeatedly disregarded by this Board and by former Boards. Your Committee, however, is not willing to recommend the further adoption of such resolutions in direct conflict with the provisions of law.

Your Committee is also of opinion that in matters of this nature the action of this Board should be consistent, and that such special ordinances should in no instance he adopted, whether presented as original propositions or upon the reports of Committees.

Such privileges, if obtainable at all, must rest upon general ordinances; as to the force and effect of which, however, your Committee does not at this time feel that it is called upon to express any views.

Your Committee therefore requests that it be discharged from further consideration of the resolutions in question and that they be placed on file.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to August V. The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on January 7, 1907 (Minutes, page 22), the annexed communication from the Board of Supervisors of Monroe County, in relation to road building, respectfully REPORTS:

That the construction and maintenance of good roads are of the utmost importance to the welfare of the State, although for a long period the subject has not received the attention to which it has been justly entitled. It is, however, now fully recognized that communication between the different sections of this State by means of improved highways is deserving of encouragement and support, as an easy and economical means of transportation and travel.

This is evidenced by the laws upon the statute books providing for the building and care of such highways, and by the liberal appropriations made each year by the Legislature for such purposes.

The report of the Committee on Good Roads of the Board of Supervisors of Monroe County, referred to in the communication under consideration, is interesting and instructive, giving in detail the character and cost of road improvement in this State, and the system under which the work is conducted, as compared with similar work in other States, to the alleged disadvantage of the former method.

As a result of the investigation of said Good Roads Committee, it is asserted without qualification, that the best results have been obtained under the system adopted in Massachusetts, with regard to the character and economy of construction, which past experience has shown do not obtain in this State.

It is declared by said Committee that the difference in results arises from the lact that in this State the subject is under the jurisdiction and supervision of the State Engineer and Surveyor, whose duties with regard to other work are so important and engrossing as to prevent him giving the proper and necessary care and attention to the whichest of read reads.

In Massachusetts the matter is intrusted to a commission, whose sole duty relates to the highways in question, and who are thus enabled by constant personal supervision to produce most satisfactory results.

Your Committee recognizes the importance of the subject, and that it is worthy of serious consideration, and recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby respectfully requests that the Legislature of this State, represented in Senate and Assembly, carefully examine the subject of good roads and the systems under which they are constructed and maintained, with the view to the early determination and adoption of such system as may secure the highest efficiency consistent with proper economy.

Alderman Schloss and ex-Borough President Cantor addressed the committee at length in support of the resolution, and other speakers were also heard upon the same side of the question.

length in support of the resolution, and the side of the question, it was evident that the complaining parties were sincere in their convictions that they had been wrongfully treated by the Live Poultry Protective Association, and in violation of law; and that they were entitled to the assistance of this Board in obtain-

violation of law; and that they were entitled to the assistance of this Board in obtaining relief.

Your committee submits that it is a serious matter for this Board, by its action, to declare its belief that any merchant or association of merchants of this city has been guilty of a crime; and that such declaration should not be made lightly, but only upon the most substantial grounds established to the satisfaction of the Board.

In the opinion of your committee the statements made at the hearing do not furnish sufficient reason for this Board to declare that the association in question, with respect to the matters complained of, has been guilty of the commission of a crime requiring investigation by the District Attorney of the county.

Your committee, however, recognizes that the case of the complainants may not have been presented in its entirety at the hearing, and realizes that upon a full presentation of the facts directly to the District Attorney, that official may reach a different conclusion, and determine that there are sufficient grounds to warrant his taking action.

Your committee therefore requests that it be discharged from further consideration of the resolution and that it be placed on file,

Whereas, The law restricts the slaughter of poultry in the Borough of Manhatan to places to which permits therefor have been issued by the Department of Health;

Whereas, Certain persons and firms engaged in business as live poultry commission merchants have formed an association styled "The New York Live Poultry Commission Merchants' Protective Association;" and

Your Committee therefore requests that it be discharged from further consideration of the matter, and that the proposed ordinance be placed on file.

That the power to hear and determine all charges against public hackmen in The City of New York be vested in a Committee of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, to consist of five members, any three of which will constitute a quorum, said Committee to be appointed or elected, subject to the rules of said Board of Aldermen, and to have absolute power in trying, hearing and deciding any charges brought for the purpose of vacating, suspending or restraining a license to any public hackman, under section 51 of the Charter of The City of New York.

Said Committee shall be empowered to appoint a Clerk, at the salary of \$20 per year, to take charge of the calendar papers and cases pending before said Committee.

Said Committee shall meet for the purpose of trying cases which may be brought to its attention at least once a month, or more often, in the discretion of said Committee.

On a hearing before said Committee, the complainant and the defendant shall be entitled to be represented by counsel.

All power heretofore given to the Mayor of The City of New York or to any appointee of said Mayor to hear and determine such cases as before described be and is

hereby vacated.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
