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## DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1906.

Department of Correction,  
No. 148 East Twentieth Street,

To the Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of New York City:

Dear Sir—The following report of the Department of Correction of The City of New York for the year ending December 31, 1906, is respectfully submitted for your consideration:

### City Prison.

The principal structure of the group of buildings constituting the First District Prison (better known as the City Prison or the "Tombs"), being of new and modern construction, has required no extensive repairs during the past year. Attention has, however, been given to the boilers, engines, dynamos, and in fact to all the steam and electrical equipment, and all necessary repairs and improvements made to the plant, which is now in excellent condition.

The annex and women's prisons at the First District Prison, which were built many years ago, were found to be in need of new window sash and frames, and these have been put in. As new plumbing, new wire cots and electric lights had been installed during 1905, and other minor improvements had been made, these old buildings have been brought up to a standard of excellence which makes them compare favorably with the newer portions of the prison.

### District Prisons.

At the Second District Prison (Jefferson Market), electric lights have been installed in the cells and throughout the building. The whole interior has been painted and the plumbing and steam-heating apparatus have been kept in good order.

Third District Prison (Essex Market). A new entrance to the prison from the street has been cut. The entire interior of the building has been painted and the kitchen remodeled and furnished with the necessary modern culinary equipment.

The Fourth District Prison (Yorkville) has had new plumbing in all its cells, new sanitary floors, kitchen renovated and remodeled, new swinging cots with wire springs put in and also new electric lights.

In addition to repairs, renewal of plumbing, painting, etc., at the Fifth District Prison (Harlem), a large new water tank has been placed on the roof and new shower baths installed.

At the Seventh District Prison (West Fifty-third street), the building has been thoroughly cleaned; new plumbing has been installed, new floors laid and cots with wire springs put in cells; a number of minor repairs have also been made.

### Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island.

At this large institution all necessary repairs to boiler plant, engines, dynamos and electric equipment have been made, and all have been maintained in first class running order. A new fire pump of one thousand gallons capacity, with connections for both fresh and salt water, has been put in.

The Keepers' quarters at the Penitentiary have been equipped with new fire lines and stand pipes, and the danger from fire thus greatly lessened.

### Workhouse, Blackwell's Island.

The age and condition of the Workhouse cause it to need more in the way of repairs than are required in the more modern structures of the Department. In order to take every precaution to prevent the ravages of fire, new and approved appliances

have been placed in the buildings, including five thousand feet of new hose, hose carriages, stand pipes, etc.

At both the Penitentiary and the Workhouse, considerable work was done during the latter part of 1906, in making ready to receive the large number of prisoners coming to these institutions from the Kings County Penitentiary.

### Branch Workhouse, Hart's Island.

A new brick subway has been built on Hart's Island and new heating lines installed. New fire lines, with stand pipes, have been placed in the several institutions, and all are connected with the fire pump, which has been arranged so that either fresh or salt water may be used.

New underground electric light cables have been connected with all the buildings and all overhead wires and poles have been removed.

A new electric engine and generator have been installed, of the latest and most approved type.

The installation of a new ice plant, which will supply ice for all the correctional institutions on the several islands of this Department, is nearing completion, and will be working early in January, 1907. This plant will have a capacity of 40 tons of ice per day, and has a storage room of 900 tons capacity.

### New York City Reformatory, Hart's Island.

All the buildings of the Reformatory have been put in as good condition as was possible, considering their age and the purposes for which they were built. New plumbing has been installed, new shower baths put in and all the buildings painted and thoroughly renovated.

Pavilion No. 3 has been fitted up as a shoeshop, with electrically-driven machinery, the plant having a capacity for 100 pairs of finished shoes per day.

The boys are being taught daily in school, and they are also learning cement block making, tailoring, shoemaking, etc.

### Branch Workhouse, Riker's Island.

As it has been the hope of the Department for some time past, that a new penitentiary would be built on this island, no permanent structures have been heretofore placed there. The frame buildings erected about ten years ago have been kept in good repair, and have been made comfortable quarters for the Workhouse prisoners engaged in work of various kinds on this island. Roads are being made and improved, and much labor expended in leveling the ashes brought by the scows of the Street Cleaning Department from the City.

The aid given by the Department of Street Cleaning in enlarging the area of Riker's Island is a source of what must prove, in the future, an item of great value to the City, while it is even now of mutual benefit to these two departments, enabling the Department of Street Cleaning to readily dispose of its vast accumulation of ashes and at the same time supplying work for the unskilled workhouse labor of the Department of Correction.

The general health of the inmates of the several institutions has been good. A careful study of the deaths which have occurred in the penal institutions of the City will show that the large majority of cases were those of the very old and infirm, or those whose diseases were contracted and had progressed too far for recovery before their entrance into the Department.

The reports of the Wardens of the various institutions, accompanied by statistical tables containing all necessary information in regard to number of inmates, nationalities, per capita cost, supplies, labor, etc., are transmitted herewith.

In conclusion, permit me to state that for the greater part of the year just passed, the Department of Correction was under the charge of the Hon. Francis J. Lantry, my duties as Commissioner beginning on October 10, 1906.

Hon. JOHN V. COGGEY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

Dear Sir—I respectfully submit herewith the annual report of the City Prison for the year 1906, as follows: Number of prisoners received and disposition of same, statement of moneys collected by me for fines, together with the workings and sanitary condition of the prison.

A total of 14,397 prisoners were received at the City Prison during the year 1906, of which number there were 5,426 convicted and sentenced to various institutions, discharged 9,141, now awaiting trial 225, died 4, and 1 was pardoned.

The annexed tables will show in detail the disposition of the prisoners, the amount of money collected by me for fines imposed by the Courts of General Sessions, Special Sessions and City Magistrates, and which were paid to the City Chamberlain, Departments of Excise and Health.

There has been a large amount of painting, plumbing, carpentering and miscellaneous work done by paid and unpaid labor, detailed reports of which were forwarded to you weekly and quarterly through the year, and I am pleased to state that the general appearance of the prison is good.

The sanitary condition of the prison is excellent and the health of the prisoners is very good. In the accomplishment of this condition, I have made the following improvements to attain same, namely: I have had all the floors scrubbed regularly, the walls and ceilings of the New, Annex and Female Prisons have been cleaned and painted throughout, and all the bathrooms, utility rooms and iron railings have been cleaned and repainted. The male and female dormitories have been cleaned and painted and all the ventilators have been repaired and painted. The sewer pipes are thoroughly flushed once in every twenty-four hours.

The classification of prisoners has been very carefully attended to; boys under twenty-one years of age have been kept apart from the older prisoners; likewise, in the female prison the younger prisoners have been separated from those older, and the officers on duty always have the younger prisoners under their constant observation. The female prison is officered by Matrons only.

The meats, vegetables, fruits and bread received during the year were good, of first-class quality and in accordance with contracts and specifications. A plentiful supply of poultry, pies, eating apples, etc., was received for the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners, which were very much appreciated by the officers and inmates.

The religious wants of the prisoners, regardless of sect, have been faithfully attended to by the Chaplains at the prison.

The cot bottoms have been removed from the frames, scrubbed, cleaned and new ones substituted, where needed.

The discipline and good order now prevailing at the City Prison is excellent, and I desire to report that the courteous and gentlemanly conduct of all the officers is worthy of mention, as well as the strict attention paid to the performance of their duties at all times. The manner in which they enforce the rules and regulations of the institution is highly commendable.

In the prison yard grass plots have been laid out, flower beds have been placed along the walls and creeping vines trained to the walls, to improve the appearance of the place and the change has given the prison yard a very pleasant aspect.

I am pleased to state that no complaints have been received regarding the conduct of the force of employees in the discharge of their duties, and also to mention that the services rendered were very satisfactory and a credit to the Department.

In conclusion I want to express many thanks for the assistance rendered by you and your predecessor in office, Hon. Francis J. Lantry.

Hon. JOHN V. COGGEY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith the annual report of the District Prisons for the year ending December 31, 1906, and in doing so beg leave to point out the number of improvements which have been executed during the past year and have proven beneficial to all connected with the institutions.

The installing of new plumbing systems and additional water supplies in the various District Prisons was most necessary and resulted in placing the institutions in a first class sanitary condition; regarding same, I can state that they are free from all obnoxious odors, and to attain these results the following improvements were made, viz.:

At Jefferson Market Prison (Second District), installing of new additional water supply and construction of a new house tank. The prison was equipped with an entire new electric lighting plant.

At Essex Market Prison, (Third District), reconstruction of plumbing fixtures and additional water supply, making temporary water connections to house tank to supply closets in cells.

At Yorkville Prison (Fourth District), installing of a new plumbing system and additional water supply, laying of new sanitary floor in main corridors, old beds and cots removed and replaced by new wire spring cots.

At Harlem Prison (Fifth District Prison), installing of a new plumbing system and additional water supply, all cells in the male and female prison equipped with flushometers, toilets, wash basins and new shower baths, and the laying of new sanitary floors in cells and main corridors of male and female prison.

At Morrisania Prison (Sixth District), the Department supplied same with the necessary paraphernalia to transact the business of a temporary prison, and made additional constructions for the temporary detention of prisoners.

At the West Side Prison (Seventh District), reconstruction and installing of a new plumbing system and additional water supply, laying new sanitary floors in corridors and cells of the male and female prison, old canvas cots removed and replaced with new wire spring cots.

All this work now completed has proven very successful, and the work unfinished, when completed, will make the several District Prisons model institutions.

The classification of prisoners has been strictly adhered to; boys of tender years and those a little over sixteen have been kept in cells by themselves. The female prisoners have been officered by Matrons only; young girls have been kept in separate cells apart from those of older ages, and under the constant observation of the Matron in charge.

The requisitions for food and supplies were regularly received. A plentiful supply of poultry, pies and eating apples was received for the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners and the prisoners appreciated the extra diet.

Since the last annual report a large amount of plastering, painting, carpentering and miscellaneous work has been done, detailed reports of which I have transmitted to you quarterly.

I am pleased to state that the prisons in general present a very cheerful appearance on account of the light colored paints, which are now substituted in lieu of the darker colors which formerly gave the prisons such gloomy appearances; the exteriors of some of the prisons have been pointed with cement and painted.

The Keepers, Matrons and other employees have performed their duties satisfactorily. Notwithstanding the fact, that an assault had been committed upon a Keeper by a trusty prisoner in his attempt to make his escape during the night time and on the timely arrival of assistance to subdue the culprit, the discipline of the institution was well maintained. The trusty prisoner was indicted and convicted for his crime and sentenced to a term of ten years in State Prison.

Department Physicians Jackson R. Campbell and Frank A. McGuire have been prompt and attentive to the wants of the prisoners and in making visits to employees.

The religious requirements have been fully attended to by the Reverend Clergymen and Lay-Missionaries of the different religious denominations.

In conclusion, I respectfully beg leave to tender you my sincere thanks for your kind attention and assistance given me in the discharge of the duties imposed.

Hon. JOHN V. COGGEY, Commissioner of Correction:

Sir—I have the honor to forward, herewith, a report of the principal work in the way of improvements, repairs and general routine duties carried on at this institution during the year 1906, with statistics showing the number of inmates employed, number of interments and disinterments at the City cemetery, products of the farm, etc.

Early in the year, the second floor of pavilion No. 4, 165 feet by 30 feet, was painted and decorated; new toilets and shower baths were installed on first and second floors, and on the first floor of same building new flooring and beams were laid.

The interior of pavilion No. 2, 173 feet by 30 feet, was painted and decorated throughout; the foundation wall of this building was entirely rebuilt in order that it could be used as a workshop and industrial school for the inmates of the New York City Reformatory.

The circular road of broken stone, extending 1,200 feet around pavilion No. 5, was completed.

An 8-inch sewer pipe, 360 feet long, has been laid from pavilion No. 4 to the western shore of the island.

The upper and lower floors of pavilion No. 5 were thoroughly repaired and the interior repainted. The first floor of pavilion No. 4 was relaid.

Iron bars have been placed on the basement windows of pavilion No. 3, and iron grill doors have been placed throughout pavilion No. 4.

The construction of a new building, 175 feet long, 75 feet wide and 22 feet high, to be used as an artificial ice plant is nearing completion and it is expected that the entire plant will soon be in first-class running order; the excavating for the foundation of this building, as well as the laying and concreting of same, was all done by prisoners. The earth dug up, while this work progressed, was utilized for filling-in purposes at the narrowest part of the island.

Engineers were engaged in repairs to plumbing, steam plant and sewer work; tinsmiths in repairs to roofs, leaders and kitchen utensils; blacksmiths in repairs to carts, alterations to ironwork and in shoeing horses, and plasterers in repairs to walls and ceilings.

A great deal of work has been done during the past year in the way of repairing tin roof on the various buildings, including the female prison and stable, also in repairing and keeping in order of all gutters and leaders.

The painters have been busily employed in repainting the various dormitories and other buildings on the island, and in doing incidental painting work where required.

A new fire protection system was introduced during last year by installing stand pipes in the different buildings so that, in case of fire, a supply of water may always be available at any of the principal points on the island. A salt water fire pump, two feed pumps for boiler and a new dynamo engine, 13 feet by 12 feet, will soon be ready for operation. The new electric fire alarm system, which has been installed



recently, is another improvement that deserves mention; this system connects all buildings with the Warden's and Overseer's houses and will show the building from which an alarm is sent.

A new brick subway, 4 feet by 4 feet, and 2,000 feet long, has been completed during the past year, and the steam pipes, electric light wires and fire lines have been placed in same; a new horizontal tubular boiler, 6½ feet by 18 feet, has also been placed in position and connected with the steam lines in subway.

The carpenters have been engaged in making new shutters for all cellar windows, 30 new window frames, 6 new partitions in the different buildings, 8 doors, 1 new flight of stairs, 1 clothes closet, new stalls have been fitted up at the stable, 4 new gang planks for steamer "Thomas F. Gilroy," and a new waiting room, 12 feet by 18 feet, has been built at the City Island dock. The carpenters have also been employed in laying floors and beams in dormitories and other rooms of the following dimensions: 36 feet by 110 feet, 7 feet by 150 feet, 20 feet by 90 feet, 30 feet by 100 feet, 8 feet by 40 feet, 20 feet by 90 feet, 30 feet by 100 feet, 20 feet by 200 feet, 20 feet by 90 feet, 38 feet by 150 feet, 32 feet by 35 feet, 35 feet by 35 feet.

Twelve new trenches have been filled at the City cemetery and six extra ones have been dug in readiness for interments during the winter months, dimensions of each: 45 feet long, 15 feet wide and 7 feet deep. Reports of interments, disinterments, etc., at the City cemetery will be found in annexed tables.

The farm reports show that the usual operations of planting, harvesting, digging and storing of vegetables, according to the season, has been carried on successfully; the amount of vegetables harvested is given in the supplementary tables.

The different roads connecting the principal points on the island have been kept in good repair and are in a serviceable condition.

The less capable of the inmates have been kept employed at the stone shed, where about 5,000 cubic feet of stone has been broken; also in trimming the grounds and in other work suited to their ability.

The female prisoners have been employed at laundry work for employees and prisoners; also in cleaning the different buildings.

The boys of the Reform School have been employed at farm work and in hauling material, etc., when not at school, which they have attended regularly.

At the docks, 180,000 bricks and 1,700 barrels of cement have been unloaded by the prisoners and carted to different points of the island, and the prisoners have also unloaded the following: 5 barges of coal, 4 of ice, 2 of lumber, 1 of cement and 1 of manure.

#### BRANCH WORKHOUSE, RIKER'S ISLAND.

January 31, 1907.

Hon. JOHN V. COGGEY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith the annual report of this institution for the year ending December 31, 1906.

There was at the beginning of the year a population of 164 male prisoners.

During the year 726 prisoners were received from the Workhouse; 762 were returned, leaving on December 31, 1906, a census of 128 prisoners.

The prisoners have been constantly employed during the year, and their general health has been good.

By prisoners employed at out door labor, the following work was performed: 50 cubic yards of sea wall was built; 800 cubic yards of ground graded, and the dirt removed from bank was used for backing sea wall; also repaired 20 feet of sea wall, 8 feet deep and 7 feet high; 572 tons of coal, 700 tons of manure and 3 barges of ashes were unloaded; 3 barges were loaded with sand taken from the beach and sent to Blackwell's Island to be used for building purposes. The roads have been kept in proper repair.

During the summer months a gang of 9 men, in charge of an officer, was daily employed sprinkling chloride of lime on the filled in ground for the Street Cleaning Department.

The daily average number of prisoners during the year 1906 was 129.

#### Carpenter's Report.

Built, at Head Keeper's residence, an extension to the balcony, 24 feet long, 12 feet wide, with railing 12 feet long and 4 feet high, with stoop of 2 steps; also made 1 door, 1 curtain stretcher, 1 book case, 9 sash frames, 2 door frames, 1 chicken coop, 2 closets, 1 meat box, 235 feet of fence built, 1 gang plank, 1 wooden horse, 110 feet of cornice moulding, 1 ice box, 2 flight of stairs, each 3 feet; 1 stoop at office, and new flooring put in 4 stalls at stable, also made all the necessary repairs to windows, doors and wagons; all the buildings situated on the island have been painted with 2 coats of paint.

#### Tinsmith's Report.

Made 18 dippers, 3 cake pans, 5 clothes boxes for laundry, 9 pudding pans, 16 saucepans, 4 milk cans, 4 spittoons, 134 feet of gutter pipe, 3 racks for holding axes, 1 bread box, 1 funnel, 5 covers for cans, 1 galvanized iron pan for range, 4 feet by 1½ feet; lined ice box, besides making all the necessary repairs to the utensils, and roofs of buildings.

All the plumbing work which was necessary was done by prisoners.

#### Shoemaker's and Harness Maker's Report.

Repaired 735 pair men's shoes and 15 sets of harness.

Religious services have been held regularly by the Protestant, Catholic and Hebrew Chaplains.

The medical wants of the inmates have been attended to by the Resident Physician. I also transmit herewith the usual tables showing the crimes, terms, etc., of the prisoners received during the year 1906.

In conclusion, I beg to tender my thanks to your Honor for the kind assistance you have given me.

Hon. JOHN V. COGGEY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit, herewith, the first annual report of this institution for the initial year of its existence, ending December 31, 1906. As the first and only one exclusively for misdemeanants thus far established in the United States, it has, to an unusual extent, been critically watched by philanthropists and those interested in modern methods of penology. For this reason, and because the system under which we are working is unfamiliar to a large body of citizens, it is, perhaps, incumbent upon me to include a few explanatory words. In this connection, I beg to say that I had the honor to represent the Department of Correction at the annual congress of the National Prison Association, held in Albany, N. Y., from the 15th to the 20th of September, 1906. I addressed the congress on our reformatory, and as it is my duty to report to you what I said on that occasion, and as I then covered the ground just mentioned, a double purpose will be accomplished by incorporating the address herein.

Recently we have heard much from and of a class of writers whom President Roosevelt has termed the men with the "Muck-Rake." Now, whether or not we believe that these men of the "Muck-Rake" are doing commendable work, I think we will all agree that, if they would bring about permanent reform in both high and low places, they should start at the bottom and not at the top. If we are really going, some day, to put a stop to dishonesty and crime, we must direct our efforts toward the guidance of the young. That, of course, is now a generally accepted truth, but I repeat it because there never was a time when the necessity for concerted and herculean work in this direction was so apparent; never a time of much if any greater increase in the number of our juvenile criminals.

The man with the "Muck-Rake" has his rake fixed in high places. He has chosen wisely if he seeks merely the sensational. It attracts more attention to expose a President than to denounce the Office Boy. But, there is the rub—the boy. It is of what we are trying to do with and for the boy of New York City, for the thousands of our "Apprentices in Crime," that I have been asked to speak to you to-day as the representative of our Commissioner of Correction. While I cannot hope fully to take his place, I at least have the advantage of being able to testify to the constant aid and warmest sympathy he has given the founding and early growth of our "New York City Reformatory of Misdemeanants."

That institution, in its system, differs but little from others with which you are familiar, but it may interest you as being the only one in the United States solely for misdemeanants. More than that, it has a certain unique character from the fact that, while the indeterminate sentence elsewhere has been in successful operation for more than a quarter of a century, The City of New York is now for the first time testing it.

In my opinion the Charter of the Greater City gave New York the most magnificent opportunity in its history to solve a problem so vital to every citizen. Unfortunately—and in this, no doubt, our experience is but a repetition of that of many in this body—there has been nothing like the financial appropriation needed to make the institution effective. The wisdom of the Charter's makers, the zeal of the Commissioner of Correction, and the hearty co-operation of the entire Department have been able to accomplish but a small part of what should be done if the future City is to have any perceptible freedom from crime.

For its initial test of the indeterminate sentence the City has chosen a class midway between children and criminals of advanced years, namely, misdemeanants between the ages of sixteen and thirty. Among those whom I address are doubtless both supporters and opponents of graduate penalties, but I think we all agree in the wisdom of applying the indeterminate sentence to those between the ages named. I presume we must not look upon it as the final and perfect solving of all penological problems, but certainly for the class with which I am brought in contact it is the best method of dealing with crime thus far given a practical test. Certainly in New York City we need the nearest possible approach to a perfect system; it being the metropolis, it has the greatest criminal population, and the boys of its poor, ignorant and dangerous classes are subject to the greatest temptations to a criminal life. It must be noted, however, that New York City is not really representative of the United States in its record of crime, for the reason that in the neighborhood of one-half of its criminals are of foreign birth or parentage. It is needless to say, too, that the boys at our reformatory form an almost infinitesimal per cent. of the total number of misdemeanants known or unknown to the Police of the Greater City. Last year about 3,000 children were brought before the Brooklyn Children's Court alone, and it has been estimated that damage in one form or another to the extent of \$30,000,000 is annually committed in the Greater City by those within and under the age limit of our reformatory. It will thus be seen that the problem with which we are wrestling is one having astounding financial dimensions.

As I have said, our first real reformatory, the City's first experience with the indeterminate sentence, and the country's first institution exclusively for misdemeanants, is the child of the Greater New York Charter. By that Charter it became the duty of the Commissioner of Correction "to cause all criminals and misdemeanants under his charge to be classified as far as practicable, so that youthful and less hardened offenders shall not be rendered more depraved by association with and the example of the older and more hardened," and "to set apart one or more of the penal institutions in his Department for the custody of such youthful offenders." Such an institution was established on Hart's Island, in The City of New York, and known as the Reform School. By an act of the Legislature, passed in 1904, the Charter was amended and this institution was continued and known after January 1, 1905, as the "New York City Reformatory of Misdemeanants." Any male person between the ages of sixteen and thirty, after conviction by a Magistrate or Court in The City of New York of any charge, offense, misdemeanor or crime, other than a felony may be committed for reform treatment. The time of such imprisonment is terminated by the Board of Parole. It must not exceed three years, but must continue at least three months.

The Board of Parole consists of nine Commissioners who serve without compensation for a term of one year. Constituting it are the Commissioner of Correction of The City of New York, a Justice of the Court of Special Sessions of the First Division, a Justice of the Court of Special Sessions of the Second Division, a City Magistrate of the First Division, a City Magistrate of the Second Division, and four



persons appointed by the Mayor of The City of New York. The Board has adopted a uniform system by means of which an inmate may work out his release on parole, which is determined by merit marks based on demeanor, labor and study. This system is best explained by quoting the first three rules adopted by the Board:

Rule 1. All inmates enter the New York City Reformatory of Misdemeanants in the second grade.

Rule 2. If such inmate shall obtain nine hundred (900) merit marks he shall thereafter enter the first or highest grade.

Rule 3. If such inmate shall violate any rules of the reformatory, or shall in any way be disobedient or ungovernable, he shall be reduced to the third or lowest grade, and no such inmate shall re-enter the second grade unless he shall have obtained three hundred (300) merit marks.

When an inmate is eligible for release on parole and is so recommended by me to the Board, he is placed on parole in charge of a Parole Officer for a period of at least six (6) months, provided he has a home to go to or employment whereby he can become self-sustaining. Should he violate his parole at any time, the Board of Parole has power to revoke the same and cause his rearrest and reimprisonment as if said parole had not been ordered. To carry out the system as prescribed by the Board of Parole, the Commissioner has made the following provisions: The spiritual welfare of the inmates is faithfully cared for by the Catholic, Hebrew and Protestant Chaplains of the Department of Correction. Their scholastic education is provided for by a teacher from the Board of Education, who has formed two classes, thus enabling one-half of the inmates to attend school in the morning and the other half in the afternoon. Their industrial education is provided for in six (6) different trade schools, viz.: Knitting of socks and stockings, shoemaking, telegraphy, tailoring, painting and laying of cosmocrete walks. Their military education consists of instruction in the school of the soldier, company and battalion drills, setting up and calisthenic exercises. Guns have also been ordered, and when delivered instruction in the manual of arms will be given.

The buildings now in use were once occupied, years ago, by the State insane and had to be reconstructed from foundation to roof. The dormitory has been wired for electric lighting and newly furnished; the messhalls have been installed with new utensils, tables, dishes, etc., and bathrooms, toilets and washrooms are provided with sanitary floors and the most approved sanitary plumbing. Our workshop has been equipped with improved machinery and stocked with material for manufacturing purposes. The workshop and dormitories are admirably light and perfect in sanitation. Our admirable location on one of the most picturesque islands in Long Island Sound permits of certain inexpensive aids to reformation, such as baseball and open air bathing.

I have said that our system differs but little from that of others with which you are familiar, and perhaps the only difference is in the fact that we have no cellular system whatever. To a certain extent we have found it necessary to modify this. We have three grades, but treatment of all is practically the same, the distinction being evident only in the number of their credit marks. Now while we have supposedly an institution solely for misdemeanants, among our boys are always a few who have been confined in the Penitentiary, and whose most recent offence was doubtless in many cases a felony, although, by legal means probably known to you all, changed by name to a misdemeanor. It will be evident that this class should not be admitted to constant freedom of association with the others and that there are times when the cellular system becomes imperative. Therefore in a new building about to be constructed provision will be made for a reasonable number of cells. But it must be noted that they are to be occupied only by third grade inmates. In other words, no boy will be punished with the cell because of his record previous to his arrest. It will thus be seen that we have no intention to return in the slightest to prison discipline as part of that of the reformatory. In fact our experiment has already convinced us that the modern ideas on this subject are purely scientific and not sentimental, and that many sent to prison should first be placed in some reformatory where the class of institution in which they should justly be detained could safely be determined. We also feel it may become necessary to extend the minimum term of three months to a longer period. A sentence is really not reformatory if the minimum is three months; at least the reformation is but temporary. Permanent reformation requires the teaching of a trade, and a trade cannot be learned in that time, although we have accomplished surprising results in that period. To secure the greatest good to the boy, the trades taught should be those that are best paid, namely, the building trades, including carpenters, bricklayers, plumbers, stonecutters, etc.; and to this end the Commissioner of Correction is establishing trade schools for instructions in these branches. Arrangements are also being made to install a plant for the manufacturing of cement hollow building blocks and cement brick and the erection of buildings by the inmates with this material. Appertaining to the subject of trade instruction, I desire to submit for your individual consideration a matter that may aid in the good work of all that are associated with reformatories; namely, an opening of relationship between the reformatory workshop and the outside employers of skilled labor and the trades unions, by which the institution should give to each outgoing boy a certificate indicating the quality, character and duration of his work, that work to count as an equivalent to an equal amount in his apprenticeship, three months or three years as the case may be being taken from the four years of apprenticeship required by the unions. It seems consistent to believe that the unions would not object to issuing him an apprentice card, nor to admitting him as a journeyman (the time in the reformatory being recognized) when he had passed the required examination. It is not our business to enter into the rights or wrongs of the labor problems, but to do what we can to give those placed in our care the opportunity to enter labor's best paid fields. If this mutually helpful understanding with employers and trades unions can be brought about, I feel that the future is full of promise for our Reformatory of Misdemeanants.

Considering our youth, I think our Commissioner of Correction may justly pride himself upon the work thus far accomplished. The aptitude shown by the boys in all the trades thus far taught and the rapidity with which they have advanced in their scholastic education and our school in telegraphy, has convinced us that we are on the right road in this great problem of what to do with our Juvenile Misdemeanants.

#### Health of Inmates.

It is gratifying to state that the health of the inmates has been very good. There have been no epidemics.

Many minor conditions requiring treatment, but not of such a nature as to require admission to the hospital have occurred.

#### Spiritual Welfare.

Their spiritual welfare has been faithfully cared for by the Catholic, Protestant and Hebrew Chaplains of the Department of Correction, and attendance at religious services has been usually large, though not compulsory.

#### Scholastic Education.

The school connected with this reformatory has two sessions each day, and is conducted by a Teacher nominated by the Board of Education of New York City. The inmates who attend school in the morning are employed in the workshops, etc., in the afternoon, and those who attend school in the afternoon, work in the morning.

The average attendance at each session is about 40 inmates; 80 daily. Every effort is made to give the inmates a practical knowledge of reading, spelling, writing and arithmetic. These subjects are considered fundamental, yet, in addition to this course, an attempt is made to give them some knowledge of grammar, composition, history, geography and drawing. It is a matter of some difficulty to classify or to grade the pupils. Many of them have been through the grammar grades of the public schools, and there are others who cannot speak English, or who have never attended any school, and, in consequence, are almost illiterate. Quite a number of these backward inmates, I am glad to state, succeed in learning to read, write, etc., before they leave the Reformatory. The progress of the school, on the whole, has been satisfactory.

#### Industrial Education—Knitting.

Our principal industry for the first few months of the year was instruction in knitting of socks and stockings. We had twenty-eight (28) machines, and we found this industry more useful in keeping their hands and minds employed than that of production or of usefulness to the inmates after their release from the Reformatory in seeking employment on the outside. This industry has therefore been abandoned, and the machines packed for shipment to the Workhouse on Blackwell's Island. Still, in the matter of production we made as follows:

#### Telegraphy.

I regret to report that for some time the School in Telegraphy has also been abandoned, owing to the lack of funds by which the instruction could be continued. I trust this is but temporary, as the results attained in a brief time were most gratifying. Forty-two (42) inmates were taught, twenty (20) of whom could receive and send messages when released on parole.

#### Shoemaking.

The abandonment of the knitting industry has permitted the enlargement of the more useful shoemaking industry, so that when our motor power is fully established we will be able to employ about seventy-five (75) inmates, and manufacture about fifty (50) pairs of shoes daily. During the past few months we have been handicapped for the want of motor power, owing to the fact of repairs and improvements going on in the boiler and engine rooms, so that all told we have not had more than one month's use of motor power for our machinery. During the year about two hundred (200) inmates have been instructed in manufacturing shoes, and we have obtained the following results:

#### Painting.

An average of ten (10) inmates have been daily instructed and engaged in the practical work of painting under the tuition of a foreman painter from the Department of Correction, and of the number taught I can say that forty (40) could earn good wages by employment in that trade on the outside. During the past nine months they have painted inside and outside of our dormitory, workshop and many other buildings on the island, details of which work have been given in my quarterly reports.

#### Tailoring.

This industry has been established a trifle more than three months, and operated solely by the inmates without the aid of instructors, except from among themselves. Three or four had some previous knowledge of the trade, and they in turn have taught others, so that now from ten (10) to twelve (12) inmates are daily engaged in this work. They have made:

#### Cement and Concrete.

The manufacture of cement hollow building blocks and cement bricks, to which reference is made, has now been established, and probably by the time this reaches you sufficient product will have been turned out for the construction of a building. With one double cement stone machine we are turning out an average of 170 blocks daily, size 8 inches by 8 inches by 16 inches, and 8 inches by 10 inches by 20 inches, and with a single brick machine an average of 750 bricks daily.

Since May 1, 1906, fifty-eight (58) inmates, a daily average of eighteen (18), have been instructed and engaged in the work of laying cosmocrete sidewalks and concrete floors, with following results:

Other inmates have been engaged in excavating for sidewalks and flooring, hauling of sand and stone, dormitory and messhall work, etc., so that all have been employed in work of various kinds during the year.

Following this will be found statistics and tables of their biographical and other records, which were carefully and systematically compiled by the Secretary of the Board of Parole, and who has kindly allowed me the use of same. It remains for me, therefore, only to submit to you such suggestions as the first year's existence of the institution has seemed to make advisable.



I would suggest the extension of the minimum term of sentence to a much longer period, for the reasons heretofore mentioned in my address.

I would strongly recommend the adoption of a cellular system to the extent and for the reasons also previously mentioned.

To make this institution more efficient we should have strict military discipline, which would require a military instructor, parade grounds and a hall or shed sufficiently large for battalion and regimental drill with uniforms and guns.

I most earnestly advise a complete separation of this institution from other institutions on the island, as experience has taught us that the unavoidable intermingling of our inmates with those of the Branch Workhouse and Reform School and mechanics constantly employed here is a menace to the work of reformation. The northern portion of Hart's Island, comprising many acres of ground, affords a most admirable site for buildings such as we require, and one that can be readily isolated from other interests on the island. With the stock we will have on hand in the early spring and with the addition of a couple more machines we could manufacture enough cement stone blocks to erect a building sufficiently large for dormitories, cells and other purposes, ready for occupancy in the early fall. Construction of other buildings could quickly follow, and in a short time we would have an institution creditable to The City of New York.

The matter of organizing and systematizing the work of the Reformatory has been one of no small moment, and in bringing about results obtained, I desire to thank the officers under my charge for their diligence and faithfulness in the performance of a duty that was new to all concerned.

In conclusion, I desire to express my appreciation of the kindly co-operation and interest your Honor and other officials of the Department have shown, and assisted in making possible the best results obtained.

##### Project A.

Extending Sixth avenue and Seventh avenue southwardly to Varick street and widening Varick street on its easterly side, between Carmine street and Franklin street.

No. 1. Sixth Avenue—The street as laid out north of Carmine street is to be prolonged southwardly in a straight line to the intersection with the easterly side of Varick street, widened as hereinafter described.

No. 2. Seventh Avenue—The westerly line of Seventh avenue is to be extended in a straight line from the intersection of the northerly line of Greenwich avenue with the westerly line of Seventh avenue, to the intersection of the southerly line of Varick street with the westerly line of Varick street. #### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
