BROOKLYN DISCIPLINARY TRAINING SCHOOL FOR BOYS.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING OCTOBER 31, 1912.

Borough of Brooklyn, December 10, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor of the City of New York:

Sir—Pursuant to the statutes governing the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys, its Board of Managers herewith present to your Honor their report on the school for the year ending October 31, 1912. The report of the Superintendent to the Board of Managers for the same period is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Attendance.

Attendance and Maintenance as Compared with Last Year.
The per capita cost of maintenance for this year exceeded that of last year by \$15.10. This increase is due principally to the increased cost of food. The following comparison of the expenditures for subsistence for the years 1912 and 1911 will show this:

Per capita cost for subsistence in the year 1912 over that of 1911, \$14.457.
Then, too, the average daily attendance has been slightly less this year than it was last (201.23 in 1912, as compared with 207.67 in 1911), and that increases always the per capita cost of maintenance.

We cannot curtail the food given to the children, for we realize that plenty of wholesome food is a great factor in reformatory work.

Personnel of the Board of Managers.
Death has claimed one of the Board members this year. In the loss of Mrs. Ludwig Nicolovius, who died during the summer, your Board mourns one of its faithful and conscientious associates. Our sympathy is extended through you to the family of the deceased and to the boys of the school, whose welfare and improvement were her constant consideration. She has been replaced by Mrs. Gustave A. Jahn, who is taking hold of the work.

Character of Management.
In the report of the Board of Managers to your Honor one year ago we were able to advise you that the State Board of Charities had advanced the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys in respect to its management, from Grade 3 to Grade 2. Our school has been retained in Grade 2 by the State Board of Charities report for this year. The suggestions which were given the Board of Managers by the State Board for improving the conduct of the School have been carried out. Other improvements not referred to by the State Board of Charities in their report were made during the current year.

Superintendent Roscoe V. Wolfe, who was in charge of the school for the past two years, resigned on August 15, 1912, and was succeeded by Dr. Constantine F. McGuire. Dr. McGuire has made a special study of children and has written a small booklet on the subject of their management. He is also a physician, and has been practicing his profession in the Borough of Brooklyn for some years. Since his incumbency several changes have been made in the building, with a view of improving the sanitary conditions there. He has improved the ventilation in one of the dormitories and is looking after the physical welfare of the boys with careful scrutiny. In view of the fact that your Board is obliged to conduct the School in buildings which are very unsatisfactory from every point of view, the advice and assistance of a practical physician is greatly welcomed by your Board.

Character of Plant.
The State Board of Charities has constantly classed the plant in which we are conducting the school in Grade 3. Nor do we expect, while we remain in the present buildings to raise this grade. The Department of Fire Prevention of The City of New York felt it necessary to take drastic action with regard to our buildings during the past year, and required changes of some magnitude to be made in the building, for the purpose of preventing fire. An outlay of several thousand dollars was necessarily spent on the part of the Buildings Department of the Borough of Brooklyn in complying with these requirements of the Department of Fire Prevention. We now feel somewhat safer in our occupancy of the building so far as fire is concerned, but the buildings at their best do not furnish a proper place for the conduct of a school of this character. As in the past, the Grand Juries from Kings County have commended our management and condemned our buildings.

The New Site.
In our report of last year we were pleased to state that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had set aside \$75,000 for the purchase of a new site for the school, and we also stated that a Special Committee of the Board was then considering various farms located from thirty to fifty minutes from the city, with a view to recommending the purchase of one of them for our school. There were submitted for the consideration of this committee about 120 different parcels of land on Long Island and in Westchester. That committee painstakingly considered these parcels, and made personal inspection of the most desirable of them, and finally in the spring of 1912, recommended to the Comptroller and to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the purchase of two farms on Long Island, known as the Smith and Porter farms, which together consisted of approximately 223 acres of land, at the price of \$325 per acre. On July 15, 1912, a resolution was passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approving the purchase of this site at the price stated.

On August 15, 1912, a report was sent to your Honor from the office of the Commissioner of Accounts, approved by Mr. Harry Rice, then Acting Commissioner of Accounts, which report ends with the following statement:

"From the best information that could be secured by interview with residents of the neighborhood, it would appear that a short time before The City of New York came into the market as a purchaser, property was being offered in this section at \$50 per acre, without a taker. Real estate agents have secured options on all the available land in this territory and prices have been forced up to the figures asked for these two parcels. In consequence of this inflation of value, the City is asked anywhere from \$225 to \$275 per acre more than the land would appear to be worth."

On the day following the date of this communication to you there appeared in the Brooklyn papers an article containing long extracts from this report, and the article itself was headed in capitals "City Paid \$325 for \$50-an-Acre Land."

Knowing the absolute falsity of these statements, the Board of Managers could scarcely believe that any Commissioner of Accounts had made them. The President of our Board called up the Commissioner's office and asked him for a copy of the report, and sent his stenographer down to the Commissioner's office, and had a copy of the

same made, and informed your Board of Managers that the newspaper articles were a substantially accurate account of the report itself.

In the routine required by law for the purchase of this property the site selected must be confirmed by the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen, and on Monday, October 21, 1912, that committee had a public hearing upon the question of this site. Mr. Harry Rice appeared before that Committee, at the request of the President of our Board, and was asked for the evidence upon which he based the statement quoted above from his report. Instead of furnishing the information sought he objected to being "heckled," as he put it, by the President of our Board, and when finally pressed for information he admitted that he could not furnish the name of a single "resident of the neighborhood" who would stand sponsor for the statement contained in his report. He stated in substance that he had sent a young man from his office down to a hotel on Long Island, somewhere, and that the young man had reported back that he had talked with some people around the hotel whose names he did not know, and from them he got the information which he put in his report. He further admitted that he procured no real estate appraiser to ascertain for him the value of the land, and the whole basis for the statement quoted above consisted simply of the idle gossip which fell from the lips of idlers hanging around a country hotel.

Other parts of the report of the Commissioner of Accounts above referred to are false. Of course, your Board of Managers would not mind a report so apparently worthless, were it not for the fact that even such a report as this causes delay in the much-needed transfer of our school from its present quarters to new and better ones. Your Board is still awaiting the approval of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen.

We have gone painstakingly and patiently about the work of submitting to the Finance Committee evidence which absolutely disproves the truth of the report referred to above, together with the appraisal of three distinct real estate experts on Long Island real estate value, each one of which justifies the price asked for the land. We hope that the Finance Committee will soon approve of the site selected.

We have also submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the current year a petition for an appropriation for the erection of buildings for our new school. No action has been had upon it up to the present time.

Corporal Punishment.

There has long been upon the files of your Board of Managers a resolution that corporal punishment shall not be permitted to be used except in extreme cases, and then to be administered only by the Superintendent, in person. It is, however, easier to pass the resolution than it is to enforce it. Many institutions of the character of our school have in their records similar resolutions to the one above referred to and yet, in the actual administration of these institutions, it will be found that corporal punishment is common, and is administered not by the Superintendent merely, but by the caretakers who have charge of the boys. Of course, the Superintendent should know, and in most cases does know, just what is going on in this respect, but he does not always report it to the Board of Managers, and thus it is possible that corporal punishment may exist irrespective of the resolution of the management.

It is natural for a Superintendent to report the best side of the institution which he has in charge, and to neglect to report even to the Board of Managers the things which do not make a good showing for the school. Not only the vigilance of the Superintendent is necessary to cause all corporal punishment to be abolished, but his honesty in reporting actual infractions of the rule to the Board of Managers is an equally necessary characteristic, if this practice is to be stopped. Your Board of Managers is and has been insistent upon knowing the truth in regard to the question of corporal punishment at your school, and they feel safe in saying at the present time that in this respect the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys stands second to no institution of a similar character in the State.

Short Term Commitments.

There is a manifest tendency on the part of our courts to increase the number of boys sent to us on Short Term Commitments. In the report of last year there were forty-one cases of this kind, while in this report there are eighty-three such cases. The courts undoubtedly have their own policy with reference to the reformation of juvenile delinquents, and it may be that these short term commitments seem to the judges a more efficacious way of bringing about the desired results, than commitments for indefinite terms. Your Board has wondered, however, whether the courts fully realize the difficulties which these short term commitments present to our school and to the boys so committed. The average short term commitment is about thirty days. When a boy is received in our school he is quarantined by order of the Board of Health for fourteen days. During this period he attends no classes. Afterward, if no disease develops in the meantime, the boy is graded and sent to our regular classes. It takes him a week or more to adjust himself to new teachers and new surroundings, so that practically three weeks of the thirty day period is consumed before actual school work can be taken up by the boy. Then in another week he is discharged and goes back to the school from which he came. This is a great disadvantage to the boy. It also makes it difficult for the school to preserve the high educational standard which the Board seeks to maintain. With an indefinite commitment, school work goes on more smoothly and uniformly, and the loss in a boy's time, due to quarantine, can be made up by our summer-time classes.

Conclusion.

Our school is now in a healthy and good condition. Our appeal is for haste in transferring it to the cottage plan. We hope that before another year transpires we shall have the site acquired, which was recommended, and the work of constructing the new buildings well under way. Respectfully submitted,

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR.

Ladies and Gentlemen—In accordance with custom I submit the following report to your honorable body:

Upon assuming the duties of Superintendent of this institution, which event took place on the 15th of last August, I found the discipline good, with the exception of a few refractory boys. These boys, however, responded quickly to a stricter mode of treatment, and are now among the most docile in the institution.

It may be remarked that no one is allowed to exercise punishment but myself. Any one taking upon himself this authority is dismissed immediately. The general tone of discipline is as follows: Morning talks of about five minutes' duration upon some moral topic. An effort is made to inculcate principles of honesty, truthfulness and obedience. I may state that the non-compliance of these virtues is generally the cause of the boy's downfall. When a boy comes up for punishment he is first placed in a so-called squad, which consists of merely standing quietly for a certain length of time and behaving himself. Failing in this he is next punished by depriving him of his regular food and substituting bread and water. If he still persists in remaining stubborn, the strap is called into requisition. I may add that this strap is part of my own clothing and not one made for this special purpose.

I have made many necessary repairs since my advent, a few of which I will enumerate.

The lower dormitory was found unhygienic on account of poor ventilation. To remedy this defect I had a large window opened which connects the dormitory with the chapel below, and at the other end of the room I had an electric fan installed which keeps the air in constant circulation. The air in this dormitory, which before was unbearable, especially in warm weather, is now quite wholesome and pure. Many improvements have been made in the kitchen, especially from a sanitary point of view. In like manner the laundry and engine room have been repaired, together with a number of other improvements.

I wish to extend my sincere thanks to the Rev. Dr. Nathan Krass, the Rev. Father John P. Rohleder, and the various Protestant ministers who have attended the boys as regards their spiritual duties since my advent. They have all been attentive to their duties and have kindly responded whenever their services were needed.

To Mr. Howard L. Woody, Superintendent of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, much praise is due for the efficient manner in which he performed his work when called upon, and it may be added that he has served the institution at times when it was of great inconvenience to himself and his department.

Education.

I may say that our school is modeled upon that of the public schools, and an effort is made to keep the boys up to this high standard. We have difficulties, however, to overcome, such as the lower mental calibre of the boys and the bad environment from which the majority of them come. Our mode of procedure is as follows: When a boy leaves the quarantine, which consists of two weeks' isolation, he is examined by two of our teachers and then assigned to that class which his examination discloses.

The classes of the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh year attend schools one-half day. All those in the lower grades (and these comprise the backward and over-age children) attend school for the full day. It may be added that this extended time gives them all the individual attention they need, and the results and general improvement are marked. The school day is divided into two sessions—three hours in the morning and two and one-half hours in the afternoon. The classes are reversed weekly, giving a boy a week in class during the morning and a week during the afternoon, alternating. The change is found to be very beneficial. Beautiful work is accomplished in the lower grades in raffia weaving and basketry. The boys, by careful training, are able to weave many of the intricate designs found in ancient basketry. The work of drawing and music is excellent. Freehand and map drawing is the work of the fifth, sixth and seventh years, while the colored crayon and object drawing is the work of the lower grades. The music consists of chorus singing by the entire school of simple school songs and a number of patriotic songs.

As an encouragement to proficiency there has been introduced into the school a Lincoln Improvement System Medal, kindly donated by Mr. Ephraim Byk, of the Educational Committee. It may be remarked that this medal has proved a great incentive, and has worked wonders in the way of making the boys more studious in their habits and more careful of their deportment. The medals are awarded monthly for general excellence, manliness, cleanliness, studies, self-control, military and deportment.

Another feature of the Education Department is the library, which is under the direct charge of one of the teachers, who personally gives out the books in the evening. The library consists of 600 volumes, made up of stories for boys, historical and descriptive books, together with other interesting tales that are of interest to children. The library is used daily and is so directed that it is an aid to the boy in his school lessons. It may be added that by placing good reading in the hands of the boys, much good is derived in the way of training their minds in the proper direction. It is found by experience that boys who continue to use the library are more docile and conform more readily to the rules of the institution.

Trades.

Every effort is made to have the trades taught on a practical working basis. No boy is assigned to a trade shop unless he expresses a liking and shows an aptitude for that particular trade. After a reasonable time has elapsed, a boy may change to another shop if there seems to be good reason for doing so.

Only a limited number of boys can be accommodated in the trades. Preference is given to the boys in the higher grades. The younger boys in the lower grades have manual training as part of their class work. The trades taught at present are music, printing, house painting, shoemaking, tailoring, carpentry, steam laundry and steam engineering.

Band.

We have reason to be proud of our band. This is due, in a great measure, to the teaching of Mr. Frank Marfin, and his able assistant, Mr. John Nash. It must be understood that they labor under many difficulties in teaching these boys. In the first place, the boys do not remain any longer on the average than the other boys. In the second place, they start without any knowledge of music, but simply a desire to acquire that knowledge. The short term and parole system has made it necessary to bring the band boys to a certain standard of efficiency in a much shorter time than was available when the long term and discharge system was in effect. It may be added that with

the improved mental and physical condition of the boys it is found possible to produce excellent results in a comparatively short time.

The first band numbers 33 pieces and receives 14 hours of practice each week. Of this time 10 hours are under the direction of the resident bandmaster and 4 hours under the direction of the visiting bandmaster, who calls twice each week. The second band numbers 14 boys, and receives 8 hours instruction each week under the direction of the resident bandmaster. It may be remarked the second band provides members for vacancies in the first band. We may also say that when the boys are paroled, they procure instruments similar to those used in the school, and thus are able to keep up their studies. Several of them at present have places in regimental bands in this City.

Printing.

The boys in the printing shop have done a great deal of work during the past year in typesetting and press work. This has been of much benefit to the school. The records for the year show an average of 8 boys in the morning and the same number in the afternoon session. The amount of type set by the boys during the past year was 120,135 lines. There were 60,000 sheets printed, which consisted in a large measure of material used in the school. Part of this work, it may be added, consisted of printing the annual report.

House Painting.

The boys in the house painting class have ample opportunity to carry out practical work on a large scale, and to put theory into practice. The cleaning off of old surfaces is progressing rapidly and brighter and more cheerful appearance attained by pleasing color tones. As an example of their work we may cite the pleasing appearance of the chapel and sacristy.

Shoemaking.

In the shoe shop practical and theoretical work are combined advantageously. There are 20 boys employed during the day, 10 during the morning and 10 during the afternoon session. They are employed at the following processes: Making shoes, cutting, operating, stock cutting, lasting and finishing. During the year several pairs of physical culture shoes were made by the boys, and much improvement gained by those for whom the shoes were made. The number of shoes made from October 1, 1911, to September 30, 1912, was 983 pairs. The number of shoes repaired during the same period was 3,269 pairs.

Tailoring.

In the tailor shop the boys are instructed in the use of power machines, also in measuring and cutting. The following work has been done by the boys in this department:

Winter uniform coats made, 240; winter uniform pants made, 355; winter uniform caps made, 250; winter uniform coats repaired, 600; winter uniform pants repaired, 900; uniform khaki suits made, 500; uniform khaki caps made, 500; uniform khaki suits repaired, 400; uniform khaki leggings made, 2,500 pair; summer pants made, 300; summer pants repaired, 600; overalls made, 100; blouses made, 25; waiters' suits made, 25.

In this department there are 9 boys employed during the morning and 9 during the afternoon session, alternating weekly.

In the seamstress' department, which can be classed as a part of the tailoring department, there are 7 boys employed in the morning and 6 in the afternoon. The following is the work accomplished in this department during the past year:

Handkerchiefs made, 393; blouses made, 360; sheets made, 118; night shirts made, 59; napkins made, 108; table cloths made, 57; bureau covers made, 50; laundry bags made, 4; aprons made, 8; towels for dormitories, 471; towels for dining room, 59; towels for dining room (pantry), 68; towels for kitchen, 54; roller towels, 37; curtains made, 178; handkerchiefs repaired, 1,040; blouses repaired, 4,250; sheets repaired, 1,375; night shirts repaired, 3,500; napkins repaired, 780; table cloths repaired, 208; shirts repaired, 3,100; drawers repaired, 3,500; stockings repaired, 2,500; aprons repaired, 350; towels repaired, 624; pillow cases repaired, 520; spreads repaired, 260.

It may be remarked that the blouses, which were made for the boys during the summer, was of a very inferior grade of gingham, and it is to be hoped that next year a light form of flannel will be substituted.

Carpentry.

The carpenter's report shows that there have been many improvements made in the building during the past year. The large shed, which was erected by the boys last year, is now completed, with the exception of having electricity installed for lighting purposes. As the buildings are old and in constant need of repairs, it can readily be seen that the boys have ample opportunity to exercise their art. A few of these improvements may be mentioned:

A new medicine closet for the hospital. A portion of the quarantine room was partitioned off and now occupied by our Housemother. A large closet was made for the office in which to store books. A new portable altar was made for the chapel. A new closet and shelves were placed in the icebox, besides many other improvements.

This winter, if the other work permits, regular classes in manual training will be conducted, and the boys taught bench work, wood carving, scrolling and wood turning.

Engineer's Report.

The Engineer reports many improvements. Fire escapes have been erected on both buildings. Electric lights have been installed, and it may be added that this improvement is highly beneficial. The use of gas is discontinued and now used in extraordinary cases. The fire apparatus has been improved by the addition of 200 feet of fire hose. In the trade shops, laundry and engine room a new fire sprinkling system has been installed with automatic sprinklers attached. In connection with this automatic sprinkling system there is an automatic alarm attachment in the form of two gongs, one in the engine room and one on the front of the main building. These gongs give the alarm automatically in case of fire. The boys' water closet in the yard has been connected with the sewer by means of 300 feet of water main. The floor of this toilet has also been repaired and the side walls relined with galvanized iron. New flush tanks have also been installed and the seats repaired. Two new drinking fountains have been placed in the rear yard for the boys. Heretofore these fountains were a source of annoyance, owing to the fact that there was no outlet for the waste water. This has been obviated by connecting it with the sewer.

Four boys are assigned to assist the Engineers, of which two are employed in the morning and two in the afternoon. These boys are taught and instructed as to the care and management of steam boilers. They are also taught steamfitting and gasfitting, together with electrical engineering. We may add that the boys are willing and quick to learn and they are a great help to the Engineers in the performance of their duties. There is no doubt that the training they receive in this department will be of great help to them when they leave the school.

Physical and Military Training.

It is generally agreed among educators that physical culture is as important as that of intellectual training. It was therefore somewhat of a surprise to me to find so excellent a system of physical training in use in this institution. It may be remarked that I have had considerable experience in this line of work, and for that reason can speak from practical experience. The method is as follows:

Fifteen minutes is devoted to calisthenics every morning immediately after rising from bed. This exercise is accompanied by music furnished by our excellent band. In the afternoon we have a regular military drill and parade, which not only affords amusement to the boys but an unsurpassed exercise. With this morning and evening exercise, together with training the boys how to walk, to sit and stand properly, I find entirely sufficient for all practical purposes.

We receive many boys in broken health, due to vicious habits or improper food, or both, and it is surprising what a change takes place after a few weeks' residence in this institution.

Fire Drill.

This important part of the schedule has been carefully carried out. Three night drills and four day drills have been held each month. The average time required to assemble the boys in the yard during the day has been fifty seconds. The average time to empty the dormitories at night has been two minutes and fifteen seconds. The day alarms are rung at various intervals between nine o'clock and three o'clock. The night alarms are rung between nine o'clock and ten o'clock.

At the day alarms the boys assemble in the yard in assigned places in groups of fifteen in regular formation. Each group immediately reports any absentees, so that any missing boys may be detected. At night alarm the boys assemble in the chapel in nightgowns and shoes, carrying clothing in a bundle. In case of actual fire they would assemble in the yard as at day drills.

There are four or five squads, each consisting of six reliable boys and a caretaker. One of these squads reports with a hose reel at the fire hydrant in the front yard and one reports with the other hose reel at the fire hydrant in the rear of the yard. The other two squads handle the standpipe fire lines inside the buildings.

All of the fire lines are regularly tested with water pressure to insure their proper operations.

There are five exits from each dormitory in the main building, i. e., an interior stairway in each of the three corners and two outside fire escapes. There are two standpipes through the building with two 50-foot lengths of hose on each floor.

There are four exits from the frame building, i. e., two interior stairways, one interior iron fire escape and one exit on second floor communicating with the other building. There is one standpipe in the building with 50 feet of hose on each floor.

Pails, axes, fire hooks, electric and hand gongs are all provided where needed.

All dormitories are open throughout the night, with access to the yard. Two night men are awake all night, one in the dormitories and one patrolling the buildings.

With these conditions efficiently established the main consideration in case a fire should occur is possible panic. This is provided for as far as it is possible to do so by making the boys feel a sense of responsibility and by numerous fire drills.

In the night drills there is no adult in the dormitories. There is one caretaker stationed at the head and one at the foot of each stairway to guard against panic. In case of an actual fire the man at the head of the stairway would go into the dormitory and the man below would go to the top of the stairway. No boy is allowed to go from the dormitories till the boy on each side of him is out of bed. When all of the boys are assembled the dormitories are searched. If any boy has been left behind his companions on either side are then held responsible. To their credit it must be said that it is many months since any boy has been left behind. The following improvements have been carried out or authorized, to further safeguard the boys against fire:

1. An additional exit has been provided in the small dormitory.
2. The attic in the frame building, where some of the employees sleep, has been opened up so that it now has access to two stairways and an outside iron fire escape.
3. Two hose reels of 600 feet capacity have been provided for the outside fire hydrants.
4. Revolving hose boxes have been provided for most of the interior hose lines, for preventing the hose from becoming entangled while being drawn out.
5. Additional ladders have been authorized for the iron fire escapes.
6. Electric fire gongs have been established throughout the institution.

The following outline is a sample of instructions for each caretaker:

Located at Head of Stairway in Top Dormitory, Post 1—Stairway A.

1. Make two boys responsible for turning up the lights in top dormitory at the exits A and B immediately on the sounding of alarm.
2. See that boys go down (a) quickly, (b) quietly, (c) in double line, (d) keep the centre of stairway open.
3. Any boy acting in any way in a disorderly manner is to be taken out of line and brought to the Superintendent when the caretaker reports to the chapel at end of drill.
4. Report immediately after the drill any boy who seems to be helplessly sleepy and unable to take proper care of himself, and report the names of all boys left in bed.
5. Take charge of the fire squad in centre of chapel.
6. Report any trouble or irregularity in the drill to the Superintendent immediately.
7. Return to posts and see that the boys return to bed quietly.
8. Turn lights out or down.
9. See that the boys in section of dormitory at post 1 have all their clothing and that it is properly placed on bed.
10. In case of actual fire notify watchman, enter dormitory and see that all boys are out. Look under the beds, in toilet and in every corner. Then report to where the boys are assembled.

Parole.

Excellent results have ensued since the establishment of the short-term and parole system. This, of course, is in line with the advance thought of penologists. The rule is that each parole boy must report to the school once a month, either in person or by letter. By this means, together with the report of the Investigator, the Superintendent is kept well informed as to the exact status of the boy. It may be remarked that for very good reasons the period of parole is extended to two years, instead of one as formerly. There are a few boys in the school who are detained longer than they should, owing to the fact that they have no parents or guardians. In these cases a strong effort is made to place them with respectable people, and I may add great difficulty is met in this regard. It is gratifying to say that seventeen boys, without parents or guardians, have been placed with responsible parties during the past year. Only 7 per cent. of the paroled boys have been returned to the school. The following is the report of the Investigator for the year ending September 30, 1912:

Medical Report.

The Physician reports no grave diseases in the institution during the past year, with the exception of an outbreak of scarlet fever. This epidemic, although it dragged on for a period of many weeks, was not at all serious. The school is particularly free from diseases of the nose, throat and eyes. There were four cases of hernia, but as far as the attending Physician has learned, were not contracted in the institution. Great credit is due Miss Siegel, who is Nurse and Housemother, for her competency and skill and especially for the sacrifice she made during the epidemic of scarlet fever. The following is a list of the ailments treated during the year:

Report of the Dentist.

During a boy's stay in quarantine the Dentist makes a thorough examination of his teeth. Useless roots are extracted and all teeth that can possibly be saved are treated and filled. At the expiration of six months his mouth is again examined and any further necessary work is performed. The Dentist pays two visits to the school weekly, at which times any boy needing his services is attended. The work of the Dentist is carefully supplemented by that of the Caretakers, who see that the boys use their tooth brushes every morning and night. It may be added that the Teachers take pains to instruct the boys while in class as to the care of their teeth. The following is a list of the work for the year:

Number of boys examined, 219; number of boys re-examined, 43; number of extractions, 165; number of fillings, 481; number of cleanings, 209.

Quarantine.

When a boy comes to the school he is first weighed and his height taken. He is next assigned to a certain portion of the building with other boys who, like himself, are new arrivals. He remains in these quarters for a period of two weeks, before he is allowed to mingle with the other boys. The special aim of this procedure is to prevent the propagation of contagious diseases. The Doctor is notified of the new arrival, and the boy is subjected to a thorough medical examination. If his eyes or ears need treatment he is sent to the Eye and Ear Hospital. If he requires a surgical operation he is sent to the hospital, providing his parents give consent. It may be remarked the Nurse is on constant guard caring for minor ailments and bring to the notice of the Physician those of a serious nature. The Investigator is notified as soon as a new boy is admitted. He immediately visits his home, to see if there is an illness of a serious nature or whether there is a contagious disease in any other family of the same house. Until this is determined the new boy is kept apart from the other quarantine boys.

At the end of the quarantine period each boy is assigned to his class, trade shop and working squad. An additional safeguard is thrown around the boys by having the Investigator visit their homes in order to acquaint himself with the general surroundings.

Inspections.

The Grand Jury has visited and inspected the school each month and found conditions satisfactory. As far as can be learned, no criticism has been made by them with the exception of the dilapidated condition of the buildings.

The Visiting Committee of the Board of Managers each month made its regular visits and found everything satisfactory.

The accounts are audited each month by the Department of Finance of The City of New York and found accurate.

The Examiner of the State Board of Charities spent two days, October 17 and 18, 1912, and thoroughly examined every department of the institution. It is to be hoped that his report will be favorable.



having any objection thereto, do file their said objections in writing, duly verified, with him at his office, in the Municipal Building, Court House square, Long Island City, in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, on or before the 23d day of December, 1912, and that the said Commissioner will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at his said office on the 27th day of December, 1912, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Third—That the Commissioner of Assessment has assessed any or all such lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises as are within the area of assessment fixed and prescribed as the area of assessment for benefit by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 20th day of December, 1907, and that the said area of assessment includes all those lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate and being in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows, viz.:

Sixth—In case, however, objections are filed to the foregoing abstracts of estimate and assessment or to either of them the motion to confirm the reports as to awards and as to assessments shall stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified in the notice provided in such cases to be given in relation to filing the final reports, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in

the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beams, holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
