Brooklyn, N. Y.: Dear Sir-In reference to the proposed elevators in the center of the roadway of Queensboro Bridge to connect with Blackwell's Island, we beg to state that this matter has been carefully investigated by the Chamber of Commerce of the Borough of Queens, and we are absolutely opposed to the construction of said elevators, as they will be detrimental both to the commercial and residential development not only of the Borough of Queens but of all of Long Island.

We are informed by Chief Engineer Craven of the Public Service Commission that the subway trains of the Broadway-59th street-Woodside-Astoria line will be operated on the inside set of tracks as there is insufficient clearance on the outside set of tracks. These subway cars will be 10 feet wide, and will require at least 1 foot outside clearance for a guard rail between them and the roadway. This means 121/2 feet to be deducted from the roadway width on each side of the bridge, leaving the roadway for vehicles only 28 feet wide. If an elevator shaft is placed in the center of this roadway it would take 12 to 14 feet, and will only leave two roadways of 7 feet each. It is unnecessary to state that this would be a barrier to a great deal of traffic, such as 5 and 10 ton trucks whose widest dimension is greater than 7 feet.

We enclose herewith the following:

1. Blue print of sketch showing dimensions and clearances when subway trains are being operated across this bridge and if the proposed elevator were constructed.

2. Copy of letter of Arthur J. O'Keeffe, Commissioner of Bridges, and a copy of

traffic count taken by that department on October 23 and 24, 1912.

We have endeavored to determine the sentiment of manufacturers and business men throughout the borough, and find they are unanimously opposed to the construction of these elevators.

To the Chamber of Commerce of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, N. Y.: My Dear Sir-Familiar as I am with the Queensboro Bridge and its occupation, and learning that there is a project on foot to erect an elevator in the center of the roadway for the purpose of communication with Blackwell's Island, I strongly urge the Chamber of Commerce of the Borough of Queens to protest against any such encroachment. I have looked over the situation and considered how it would be affected by the installation of the proposed elevator. The traffic on the bridge to-day, we may say, is in its infancy. With the additional occupation of the roadway by the operation of the cars of the 59th street subway, the already narrow traffic space will be lessened. With the operation of these rapid transit cars, it will be necessary to place a guard rail to prevent traffic from passing in and out from the surface tracks. No other obstruction should be permitted to be placed on the bridge. I do not believe for a moment that when this matter is deliberately considered by the City authorities they will permit such an obstruction as would be created by the installation

of the suggested elevator. It is entirely unworthy of serious consideration.

The fixed purpose in the erection of the Queensboro Bridge was to facilitate intercommunication between Long Island and the Island of Manhattan, not for the convenience of or to facilitate the people who frequent Blackwell's Island. It is preposterous to give a moment's consideration to such a plan. Even now vehicles are not permitted to stand on the bridge; they are kept moving. We see the bicycle policeman moving about and directing traffic during the crowded hours. We may picture to ourselves the long line of vehicles waiting to use this elevator—if it were installed and occupying the two narrow spaces now reserved for traffic. I do not know whether approaches could be provided for this elevator outside the bridge. Possibly not in consequence of the rapid transit line. That would be the only possible solution for line ordinances were then in effect. the Blackwell's Island people. If they propose to encroach even in the slightest degree on the space now set aside for traffic on the bridge, their proposal should be denied. First and last the bridge is for intercommunication between Long Island and the Island of Manhattan. I think it is only necessary for the Chamber of Commerce of the Borough of Queens to make this plain to the Bridge Department and the Board of Estimate in order to prevent this unwarranted attempt to encroach upon the bridge

Dear Sir-We would call your attention to the matter now pending before the Committee on Bridges and Tunnels of the Board of Aldermen of this City, providing for the installation of passenger and freight elevators from Queensboro Bridge to Blackwells Island.

It is proposed to place in the centre of the existing roadway a permanent elevator structure, not less than 10 x 25 feet; this, we believe, would curtail the roadway width at least one-third, and with the growth and development of the Borough of Queens and the traffic which would have to be carried by this bridge, would be a most dangerous menace to the traveling public. The existing roadway is about 52 feet wide; on this roadway there are two lines of trolley tracks for which must be allowed a space of at least 17 feet for the width of the tracks and clearance on either side. At present these tracks are not fenced in, but it is proposed to utilize these tracks for the high speed rapid transit road which is planned to cross the Queensboro Bridge, and when these tracks are used for that purpose, they would have to be fenced in and guarded. This would leave an available roadway of about 35 feet, and if the elevator structure is installed as planned it would leave a lane on either side of about 101/2 or 11 feet wide, which would permit of a single line of vehicles only.

It is evident that this would reduce the carrying capacity of the bridge at least one-third, as, with slow moving vehicles passing along at this point, every vehicle would have to fall in line and go through in single file; it would cause congestion at this point, and we fear that numerous accidents would occur and that claims for personal injuries and injuries to property would be made against the City and others.

We understand that this freight or vehicle elevator would be used by automobiles, ambulances and delivery wagons and, possibly, by fire engines; if used by the latter

be necessary to unhitch horses from long delivery wagons and fire engines, and they would have to be cared for somewhere on the bridge, further interfering with traffic. From time to time engineers of standing have given expression to the view that this bridge was unsafe, and when it has been suggested in the past that elevators be installed, the project was not given serious consideration and was never pressed vigor-

ously until the present time. While recognizing that the installment of this elevator would be of some convenience to doctors who might travel by auto from their homes to the island, it would

not, we believe, be of particular service to others; it can be demonstrated that no saving would be effected by the installation of these elevators over the existing means furnished for the transportation of pedestrians and freight.

We enclose herewith a blue print giving an outline of the bridge roadway, the space now occupied by the trolley tracks and the space to be occupied by the proposed structure.

We have, at the hearings heretofore had, opposed this project, as we deem it unwise, unsafe and dangerous, not only to the bridge but to the thousands now using it, and to the many thousands more who will, in years to come, depend on this bridge as the main thoroughfare for the transportation of vehicles from Manhattan to Queens and the outlying parts of Long Island.

We trust that you will give this matter your careful consideration, and that you will see your way clear to oppose the project. Respectfully yours,

President JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—Under date of August 7, 1912, I asked that your Board take such action as would restore to property owners, especially in Manhattan and The Bronx, the privileges as to entrances and exits, light and ventilation of buildings, to which they are entitled under corporation ordinances, and of which they have been deprived as I believe without warrant of law, by several of the Borough Presidents.

Your Secretary advised me that my communication would be presented to your Board at its next meeting, the date of which was not given. Will you please advise me what action has been taken thereon?

The matter seems to me to be one well worthy of your serious consideration, and I am enclosing a statement submitted to the Committee of the Board of Estimate, of which you were a member, at the public hearing on April 3, 1911.

Public sentiment at that crowded meeting was overwhelmingly against the proposition abrogating these privileges, yet the matter seems to have slumbered in committee ever since. Yours truly, ALBERT E. DAVIS.

On Projections Beyond the Building Line, Read at a Hearing April 3, 1911. Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, Hon. Alfred E. Steers, Hon. Cyrus C. Miller, Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen-No. 8 on the calendar of your Board for March 16, 1911, upon

which this hearing is given, reads: Communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx submitting

the following resolution: Resolved, That on and after May 1, 1911, no projections, whether a part of a building or affixed thereto shall be erected beyond the building line so as to encroach upon the public street in any of the Boroughs of the City of New York and no official, bureau or department shall approve plans permitting the erection of such

encroachments. What is meant by "projections" may, perhaps, be judged by an order issued by the Superintendent of Buildings under the direction of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, as follows:

To Architects and Builders:

In the matter of Projections Beyond the Building Line. After November 15, 1910, no plans will be approved by the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of The Bronx, which show projections of any kind or character whatever beyond the building line.

This applies to stoops, areas, fences, awnings, store fronts, storm doors, porticos, pilasters, footings, piers, etc., but does not include small projections which are 10 feet or over above the sidewalk.

The resolution pending before you terms these projections "encroachments." Webster says "encroachment," in law, means "The unlawful gaining upon the rights or possessions of another; the taking of more than is one's right or due."

If stoops, areas, etc., are "the unlawful gaining upon the rights of another" they have been permitted by the legally constituted authorities ever since New York began to build up as a city.

The code of ordinances heretofore regarded as authority for such projections authorizes stoops or steps to extend one-tenth of the width of a street but in no case more than 7 feet; cellar doors one-twelfth of the width of a street, but never more than 5 feet; areas to be one-fifteenth of the width of a street, but in no case wider than 5 feet and bay windows to extend one foot from the house line.

These ordinances have been adopted by the Board of Aldermen in pursuance of authority vested in that body by the City Charter, granted by the State Legislature. The resolution before you presumably disputes this authority.

Section 14 of the Montgomerie Charter, adopted January 15, 1730, gave the Common Council "power, authority and license to frame, etc. . . . laws, rights, ordinances, etc. . . . which shall seem to be good, useful or necessary This power, it appears has been continued in all subsequent charters, and the Montgomerie Charter was made a part of the law of the State of New York by article 1, section 16 of the State Constitution.

Section 41 of the present City Charter continues in force all City ordinances in effect December 31, 1897, not inconsistent with the Act, and the stoop and area

Section 43 of the present City Charter empowers the Board of Aldermen to establish, etc., all ordinances, etc., "and building regulations, not contrary to the laws of the State or of the United States."

Neither the United States* nor the State Constitution prohibits the present City ordinances, either in spirit or substance. The courts have decided that the power of the Legislature is absolute and un-

limited, except as restrained by the Constitution, Bank of Chenango v. Brown, 26 N. Y., 467; People v. Flagg, 46 idem, 401.

But they may delegate powers to pass ordinances to municipal corporations, Turner v. Trustees of Albion, 5 Hill, 121.

And the municipal authorities of New York, exercising the power vested in them by the Legislature, through the Charter, have continuously adopted these ordinances for generations. And the Legislature has sanctioned these ordinances by continuing them in force when a new charter was granted.

The courts have decided that "the long continued and undisputed practical construction of a constitutional provision by the Legislature has almost the force of judicial exposition in its interpretation." People ex rel. Williams vs. Dayton, 55 N. Y.,

Section 50 of the City Charter authorizes the Common Council to regulate the use of the streets and specifically recognizes that "stoop lines" may exist upon the public streets; and authorizes the aldermen to permit "the erection of booths and stands within the stoop lines, with the consent of the owner of the premises."

By separate legislation outside of the Charter the Legislature also specifically ecognizes a portion of the sidewalk as being set apart for stoops. The Legislature makes the laws; the courts interpret them. In the case of Jor-

gensen vs. Squires, 144 N. Y., 280, concerning the right to have outside cellar steps to a building on 3d avenue, in this city, the decision was: "It is competent for the legislature to authorize a limited use of sidewalks in front of buildings in cities and villages for stoops or cellar openings or underground vaults for the more convenient and beneficial enjoyment of the adjacent premises. While such uses may restrict somewhat the free and unembarrassed use of the

the greatest extent valuable property, incleasing business facilities, giving encouragement to improvements, and adding to taxable values."

And in the case of Linton vs. Counce, 138 App. Div., 518, it was decided by the Appellate Division, Second Department, that "the City may allow owners of land abutting on streets in residential districts to use five feet of the land for courtyards, without diverting such street from the public use, to which it was dedicated."

In the face of this constitutional, legislative and judicial authority, backed by generations of undisputed enjoyment of stoop and area rights and privileges, it may be asked what ground exists for the resolution pow before you. The author of it in defence of his Bronx order, has cited seven court decisions, of which the first was an open areaway with stone steps extending, 14 feet beyond the building line, the second a building extending into the street 4 feet beyond the building line, the third a platform extending into the street 15 feet 7½ inches, the fourth related to the City's right to remove an open areaway, the fifth was confirmatory of the right of the City to permit courtyards, the sixth was a building 3 feet 6 inches beyond the line of a street and the seventh was a masonry wall beyond the house line.

Only one of these court decisions is applicable to the resolution now before you, in so far as it affects projections now permitted by general city ordinances and that one is against it. Two confirm the City's right to remove steps and areas, which we concede, for were it otherwise, they would certainly constitute permanent encroachments; and the other four relate to buildings, areas, steps, etc., which project beyond the stoop and area lines established by general city ordinances.

President Miller says, "It is difficult to see, as a matter of principle, why such encroachments as bay windows, terraces, walls, areas and stairways and coping, area and stoop should be declared by the Court of Appeals to be nuisances, and other encroachments on the streets, such as stoops, areas, pillars, etc., be declared by City officials not to be nuisances."

It is respectfully submitted that the difficulty disappears in the light of the clear difference between buildings which do and those which do not extend into the public highway; and areas, steps, etc., which extend beyond the limits allowed by general city ordinances, and those which are within the allowable lines established for such purposes by the Board of Aldermen.

As between validity and invalidity, there is also a distinct difference between general ordinances, granting privileges to all property owners, and special ordinances. or privileges to individuals granted by a Park Commissioner. See Charter, section 50; also revised ordinances.

And that the Borough President has since been convinced that areas, at least, are not nuisances, is evidenced by the fact that he now allows them, although an area is not as much a public use of a portion of the street as is a stoop which the public may use to enter the buildings thereon.

Section 71 of the City Charter is also quoted as prohibiting projections. This section comes under the heading of "Title 1, Franchises," and says, "The rights of the City in and to its water-front, ferries, wharf property, land under water, public landings, wharfs, docks, streets, avenues, parks and all other public places are hereby declared to be inalienable."

But the general ordinances adopted by the Board of Aldermen, granting stoop area, show window and other privileges do not alienate, transfer, convey or give away any property or right of the City.

For instance, the form of application for the erection of bay window heretofore in use by the Bureau of Buildings is as follows:

'Application is hereby made to the Superintendent of Buildings, for the Borough of The Bronx, for a permit to erect bay windows projecting beyond the building line in accordance with the specifications and plans herewith submitted.

"All provisions of the general ordinance of The City of New York providing for the granting of permits for the erection of bay windows beyond the building line, approved by the Mayor of said city, January 30, 1903, shall be complied with in the erection of said bay windows, whether specified herein or not.

"It is further understood and such permit, if granted, is accepted upon the following conditions, viz.: 'This permit is issued subject to revocation thereof at any time hereafter by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, upon the recommendation of the officer having jurisdiction when the space occupied by said bay, or any portion thereof may be required for any public improvement, or upon any violation of any of the terms or conditions upon which this permit is issued."

It is therefore respectfully submitted that section 71 of the City Charter does

Stress is also laid by President Miller on section 50 of the Charter relating to

the Board of Aldermen, this portion of which is quoted: "They shall have no power to authorize the placing or continuing of any en-

croachment or any obstruction upon any street or sidewalk except a temporary occupation thereof during the erection of a building on a lot opposite the same." Read with reference to the context or to other sections of the Charter, this might seem to sustain his view of the matter, but that very section authorizes "signs,

signposts, awnings (the Bronx order prohibits awnings), posts for telegraph or other electric wires, and other purposes," and this expression "and other purposes" as used in the first Greater New York Charter makes it still clearer that it gave a wider scope to the authority of the Board of Aldermen. And the conclusion of the paragraph quoted, separated only by a comma, recognizes "stoop lines", thus suggesting that the framers of the Charter did not regard stoops as encroachments, for if they were required to be on private property, they would not be under the jurisdiction of the Board of Aldermen for the purpose mentioned.

The reasonable interpretation of the prohibition in section 50, based upon established custom and usage in New York City, would seem to be that it was intended to prevent obstructions from the roadway of the street or upon the space between the stoop line and the curb, commonly called the sidewalk, as distinguished from the space within the stoop line, thus keeping a passageway clear for pedestrians upon and throughout the space established and ordained for and used by pedestrians.

In the legal decisions quoted by President Miller the term "permanent encroachments" is used. I respectfully submit that stoops, areas, cellarways and other projections permitted by general city ordinances are not "permanent", the right being specifically reserved to the City to revoke them when the space they occupy may be required for any public improvement. Neither can revocable privileges be fairly construed as "encroachments".

If the City owns the land in fee and has no right to permit "projections of any kind or character whatever beyond the building line" that title extends from the centre of the earth to the sky and would be equally prohibitory of projections 10 feet or over above the sidewalk, which the Bronx Superintendent's notice proposes to permit. If no areas are to be permitted, cellars cannot be properly lighted, which will prove unsanitary, unless the owner voluntarily sacrifices valuable street frontage of his lot. The drop platforms which the Tenement House Department requires where the lower ladders from fire escapes are over 16 feet and which usually come a few feet above the sidewalk, are placed under the ban by this notice, although the Tenement House Act, which is an act of the Legislature, specifically authorizes these to "project into the public highway." This Act also says "there shall be an entrance to the cellar from the outside of the building." It also requires areas for the lighting and ventilating of cellars. Furthermore, the Tenement House Law, section 8, specifically states that "no ordinance, regulation or ruling of any municipal authority shall modify or dispense with any provision of this Act."

It is thus evident that the Legislature conceded the right to use sidewalks for purposes of ingress, egress, light and ventilation. If the Legislature through the Charter, had intended so radical a departure as the taking away of a right or privilege so general and long established in New York City, it is fair to assume that its framers would have made such intent clear and specific.

Until declared unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction the law which governs city officers is the City Charter. There is no provision in this Charter empowering a borough president or a superintendent of buildings to annul existing ordinances or to establish new ones; that power is vested in the Board of Aldermen.

The resolution pending before you would nullify the City Ordinances and the Building Code sections 26, 55, 56, 73, 74, 76, 91 and 109, all of which recognize and some of which require the projections beyond the building line proposed to be prohibited. The Tenement House Act, Building Code and other ordinances relating to the sub-

ject are predicated upon the right to have stoops, areas, etc. Where dwellings have given way to business development, creating congestion, the City has, and has always exercised the right to widen the sidewalk and even to widen the roadway and change the curb lines.

City surveyors have continuously given on their surveys the stoop and area lines

as well as the curb lines.

In defense of the prohibition of projections beyond the building line stress is laid upon the use of the streets by the public; but the streets are devoted to various public uses, and those who planned the street system of this City took these into consideration. Between the curbs for instance, is restricted to vehicle traffic and by special franchise, street railways are permitted in the roadway; the sidewalks are for pedestrians, and the entrances, areas, and cellar steps for the benefit of the tenants and trades people. and the public generally who have dealings with them, as well as for postmen, inspectors and other officials.

It would be as reasonable to say that the street was not being devoted to public uses unless the entire width of it, from house line to house line was left free for all, instead of a curb being permitted as an obstruction to vehicle traffic encroaching upon

pedestrian traffic. A street which is laid out and improved at the expense of the abutting property owners is not serving the whole public if used only in the narrow sense of a mere passageway connecting two other streets for the advantage of those who desire to pass through it to some other locality.

One of the main uses of a street in a city is to give access to the buildings erected along it, and it is for this portion of the public that stoops, areas, porticos, show windows and cellar steps are provided.

The implication that the chance pedestrian on the street, the alien, the peddler, organ grinder, tramp and beggar, possess greater rights to the use of the street than the property owner who has paid for it and for all the improvements on it, and the tenant who must use it, is not founded on justice or equity.

Furthermore, the owner of abutting property is required by law to pave the sidewalk, keep it in good repair, sweep it and remove the snow from it under penalty of arrest and fine for failure so to do; yet the City performs this service for the space from curb to curb. Is it reasonable to suppose that the law intended to impose this burden of jurisdiction over the maintenance of the sidewalk upon the owner without allowing him the reasonable use thereof for access and exit, light and ventilation of his building?

Why disturb conditions long established and which have given general satisfaction? Six feet is not too much space for an entrance stoop to an apartment house, nor is 4 feet too much space for the light and ventilation of basements.

What the effect of the passage of the resolution pending before you would be may be partially judged by the effect of the order of its author upon buildings in The Bronx. To obtain the fire exits which the Tenement House Act requires and which formerly ran from the cellar out onto the sidewalk, it is necessary to build an unsightly bulkhead in the parlor or store, as the case may be, and keep these steps wholly within the building. And to obtain the steps necessary to reach the first floor where the latter is set the requisite distance above the sidewalk required to use the basement it is necessary to place them inside the vestibule or hall. In case of a fire, with the tenants rushing out in a panic, which do you think would be the safest place for the steps—out on the front of the building in the open air and light or in an unexpected place in the passageway where if one were to fall all might tumble in a heap and block the passage? And the same dangerous condition would apply in a factory where the first floor is above the level of the street.

The logical line of demarcation between the public street and the buildings erected along it is the face of the walls of the buildings and not the outer edge of moldings, steps or ornamental projections. The legal description of the dimensions of a building is taken to the solid of the building, that is, the face of the walls and not to the outside of stoops, areas and other projections; and so the term "building line" has heretofore always been used to denote the outer face of the wall of the building.

No public demand has been made for the adoption of the resolution before you. No public necessity for it exists. And, broad as are the powers vested in your Board by section 242 of the Charter, it may be questioned whether, without specific legislative action, it has authority to adopt such a resolution; but, even if it had, its exercise would be a harsh restriction of long enjoyed rights and privileges and an injustice to the taxpayer, rentpayer and the public at large.

In the corporate stock estimate for the Department, \$380,000 has been requested for furnishing and laying distribution mains in Manhattan and The Bronx. The Commissioner proposes that the \$42,000 be a part allowance on this item. He states the following in support of his present request:

"In this upper section of Manhattan, a large number of apartment houses has recently been built, and also a large plant for the Third Avenue Railway system. In addition, there are now in the course of construction several very large plants where the consumption of water will be very heavy. At present, this territory is dependent for its supply upon a 36-inch main which is laid in the bed of the Harlem River at 212th street. Recent investigation has shown that this submarine main is buried under very heavy fill, and that if any damage or break should occur to any section of the main beneath the fill, it would take considerable time to make repairs. Before undertaking any repair work, the supply of water to this main would have to be shut off, and during the period of repairs the entire Dyckman tract would be without water. These conditions would naturally result in the closing down of the power plants and affecting the dwellings and apartment houses. It is to guard against any such occurrence that this 20-inch main should be installed at the earliest posible moment."

We are of the opinion that the matter is of sufficient urgency to justify the appropriation at this time.

Dear Sir-At the meeting of the Board of Aldermen on October 29, 1912, a esolution was adopted recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment

the issue of revenue bonds in the sum of \$32,500, to provide for the purchase of water in the Borough of Queens.

In my communication to you, dated October 8, 1912, which was later forwarded to the Board of Aldermen, I explained that \$65,000 would be necessary to pay for the water to be served to the City by two of the private water companies for the remainder of the year. Attached to my communication was a schedule showing the actual quantity of water delivered during the previous months and the estimated quantity required for the remainder of the year. The two private water companies which are now delivering the water for use in the Borough of Queens are under contract authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 471 of the Charter, and each of these companies is required to deliver a specified minimum or maximum supply of water daily. The \$32,500 additional funds will only be sufficient for the payment of the bills for water furnished during the months of September and October.

The City cannot escape its responsibilities under the agreements entered into with the two private water companies nor, under these agreements, can it compel the companies to deliver water when there is an uncertainty as to whether they will receive payment for the water delivered within the time specified in their contract. The department has no balances or unencumbered funds which could be transferred to make up this deficit. It will be seen, therefore, that the department will require the full amount originally requested.

This viaduct extends over the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, connecting Melrose ave. from E. 163d st. to the junction of Webster ave. and Brook ave., at E. 165th st., in this Borough, a distance of 350 feet, and was completed August 13, 1901. It has not been repainted since that time.

It is badly in need of painting at the present time and I urge the Board to grant authority for this issue of bonds without delay so that the work can be completed before the winter sets in. Respectfully,

In reply you are advised that the request for this money was inadvertently omitted from the 1912 Budget and we find upon examination of the structure that it would not be advisable to postpone these repairs further. The condition of the railings became so dangerous that in the spring of the year we spent about one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in repairing the same. In

making these repairs it became necessary to make certain openings in the superstructure of the bridge proper, and upon examination it was found that the main sections of the bridge were badly rusted and in a dangerous condition. I am of the opinion that if the work of painting the bridge is left until next spring many parts of the bridge will be practically beyond repair. AN ORDINANCE to amend section 362 of article 4 of chapter 7 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York relating to "Stands Within the Stoop Lines and Under Elevated Railroad Stations."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 362 of article 4 of chapter 7 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to "Stands Within the Stoop Lines and ilroad Stations," is hereby amended so as to read

Sec. 362. All licenses for bootblacks and stands within stoop lines or under the stairs of the elevated railroad stations in The City of New York shall be granted by authority of the Mayor, and issued by the Bureau of Licenses, to continue in force until the first day of May next ensuing the grant thereof (for a term of one year from the date thereof), unless sooner suspended or revoked by the Mayor or the Chief of said Bureau, with the approval of the Mayor; and no person shall be licensed except a citizen of the United States or one who has regularly declared intention to become such citizen, and the time to obtain such full citizenship has not yet elapsed (.); licenses issued for a term of less than a year shall be charged for by months, in proportion with the annual fee, no fraction of a month to be considered, but to be charged for as a whole.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Com-missioner of Water Supply, Gas and Elec-

Eleventh-Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, upon giving to the Company one (1) year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of its route here-in authorized to be constructed by underground electric power substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or upon the whole or any portion of said route by any other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets and avenues of the City upon said route. Twelfth-Upon six (6) months' notice by the

Board to the Company, all wires for the trans-mission of power, except trolley wires for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two (2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railroad tracks shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until October 28, 1934, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of

twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege. If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be au-thorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Fourth-The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise without the consolidation of the statute of the consolidation or described to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise without the consolidation of the statutes retions or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or con-

Fifth-Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to the Company or any other company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth-The Company shall commence and com plete the construction of the tracks and appur-tenances herein authorized within three (3) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, otherwise the rights herein granted shall cease and determine. Provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion of construction may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in

the aggregate one (1) year.

Seventh—The Company shall pay the entire cost of the construction and maintenance of the tracks herein authorized to be constructed, and in addition shall pay the following:

(a) The cost of the protection of all surface

and subsurface structures which shall be in any way disturbed by the construction of such tracks (b) All changes in sewer or other subsurface structures made necessary by the construction of the said tracks, including the laying or relaying of pipes, conduits, sewers or other structures. (c) The replacing or restoring the pavement in said streets which may be disturbed during the construction of the tracks.

(d) The inspection of all work during the

construction or removal of the tracks, as herein provided, which may be required by the President of the Borough of Richmond and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity Eighth-Before the construction shall be be gun, the Company shall obtain permits to do the work from the President of the Borough of Richmond and from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The Company shall perform all the duties which may be imposed upon it by these officials, as conditions of such permits, provided such conditions are not inconsistent with the provisions of this conworking plans, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said railroad tracks, and the mode of protection or changes in all subsurface structures required by the construction of such tracks.

Ninth-The said railroad crossings shall, for their entire length between the lines of the streets where they are laid on the surface, be paved between the rails and for a width of two (2) feet outside thereof with asphalt blocks or vitri fied brick, laid upon a concrete foundation, o such other material as may be prescribed by the President of the Borough of Richmond, and in a manner acceptable to him. The said crossings shall be constructed, maintained and operated at the expense of the Company, subject to the supervision, control and inspection of the proper authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York.

Tenth-The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the con-struction or operation of the railroad tracks authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Eleventh-Free and uninterrupted access to and passage over the streets shall be maintained at all times, both during construction and there-after, unless otherwise directed by the President of the Borough of Richmond, and no cars shall be allowed to stand upon said railroad tracks within the limits of said streets.

Twelfth-This consent is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force or which may hereafter be adopted,

shall be strictly complied with.

Thirteenth—Should the Company be allowed to operate at the same grade as the streets and avenues it shall at all times keep the streets upon which the rails authorized by this contract are laid, between the said rails and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the said rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow. Fourteenth—The Company shall, upon being ordered by the Board so to do, remove the tracks hereby authorized to be constructed on and across the said streets and avenues from the surface of said streets, and construct the same over or under the said streets, as directed by the Board, and in such manner as the Board may prescribe, under the supervision of the local authorities of the Borough, at its own expense, And it further agrees, that if at any time during the continuance of this contract or any renewal thereof, proceedings shall be taken under the Railroad Law or any law of the State, looking to the removal of the tracks laid by it on the surface of any street, under authority of this contract, then and in that event the Company shall remove the tracks herein authorized and construct the same across said streets, either over or under the same as directed, at its own cost and expense. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed to affect the rights or liabilities of the Company as to the tracks already laid

Fifteenth—Should the Company be allowed to operate at the same grade as the streets and avenues, it shall station flagmen at such points as shall be necessary to exclude pedestrians and vehicles from the tracks hereby authorized at all times when cars or trains shall be operated thereon. Should gates be erected, maintained and operated across any of the streets or avenues for the purpose of excluding pedestrians or vehicles from the tracks hereby authorized, the Company shall locate and erect the posts for such gates at such points as may be directed by the President of the Borough of Richmond.

Sixteenth-In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railroad tracks and other structures constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forth-

Seventeenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein re-served, especially those which relate to the pay-ment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the repairs of the street pavement, and the removal of the tracks at its own expense as herein provided, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders of either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the other terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder relating to the obstruction of traffic and the maintenance of flagmen, the Company shall pay a penalty of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each day of vio-lation, all of which sums may be deducted from

The procedure for the imposition and collec-tion of the penalties in this contract shall be

The Board, on complaint made, shall give no tice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose prescribed penalty or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice. pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said se-curity fund to the original amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the city. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Eighteenth-The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal no-tice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Nineteenth—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used herein, shall be deemed to mean such streets, ave nues, highways, driveways, concourses, vards or public places across and over which the Company is hereby granted the right to construct its tracks.

Twentieth-If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New

Section 4. Nothing in this contract contained shall be deemed to limit in any way the police power now vested or hereafter to be delegated or granted to the City by the State of New York.

Section 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements

in this contract fixed and contained. Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to The American District Telegraph Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, in-cluding the provisions as to rates and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and de-liver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.
This contract, made this day of 91, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pur-suance of the authority of the Board of Esti-mate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and The American District Telegraph Company, a domestic corpora-tion of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors in conduits under the streets, avenues and highways within the territory comprised in the Borough of Manhattan, for the purpose of connecting, by means of such wires, call hoxes, or other signalling apparatus, to be placed upon the premises of the subscribers, with offices of the Company, and thereby maintaining and operating an electrical signal system for the calling of messengers, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions: First-The said right and privilege to lav. construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits for the pur-

pose aforesaid shall be held and enjoyed by Company, its successors or assigns, for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determina-tion of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the percentage required to be paid during the year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the ex-piration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the percentage required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable. then the parties shall enter into a written agreement, fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested free-holders, selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company. These two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall

make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascer-tained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual percentage shall in any event be less than the percentage required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore pre-vailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. Tenth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or owning premises in the territory in which the Company is operating, not personally in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish a messenger call box to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any other premises in which the Company has its apparatus installed at the time such request is made.

Eleventh-The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of November in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which were in use by the Company on September 30 preceding, and the streets in or over which the same were located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on or before the tenth day of each month a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Twelfth—The rates to be charged by the

Company shall not be in excess of the following and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board as hereinafter provided:

For messenger service by the hour, the sum of thirty cents (30c.) per hour or fraction thereof.

For other messenger service, the rates at present charged by the Company as set forth on the map and chart marked "Exhibit A" attached to this contract and made a part hereof.

The Company agrees, upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City government to install messenger call-boxes and to furnish messenger service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau at rates not to exceed seventy-Company to any other individual or corporation for similar service.

Thirteenth-During the term of this contract or any renewal thereof the Board shall have the power by resolution to regulate and fix the maximum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reason-

able and fair.
Fourteenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit of advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service. Fifteenth-The wires of the Company shall be

employed for no other purpose than those explicitly set forth herein, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places. Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all lia-

bility to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Seventeenth—Nothing in this contract shall be

City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

Eighteenth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable pany to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the said City, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board aforesaid. shall time after notice by the Board aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the said Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person of the part of the state of corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by the operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise nothwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

utes, both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company, during the first five (5) years of this contract, shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the

operation of cars during said hours.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter mto an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Thirtieth-This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public ser-vice, at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice, the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of the contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after de payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board hereunder, relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders and wheelguards, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, light-ed or supplied with fenders or wheelguards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

Thirty-second—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, con-courses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement" encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is here by given to the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-third-If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be trans-ferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities,

officer or officers. Section 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., pur-chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occu-pancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of

the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the pur-chaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of processing the structure of their tenants. stance of vacating the structures of their tenants

will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurte-nances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the prem-ises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the sur-rounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the sur-rounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old and remove an available water tags and the inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply Gas and Electricity partment of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in

the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Pepartment of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurte-Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against

the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders the machinery.

buildings purchased by different bidders, the ma-terials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate pur-chasers.

chasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according

to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as con-tracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true,

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned

below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three below. tisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five 1 ir centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be in-closed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the

work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the all bids or estimates in it is declared to interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
