

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau during the week ending December 4, 1875: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,554, as follows: 2 public buildings, 714 tenement houses, 50 private dwellings, 15 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 49 stables, 85 slaughter-houses, 5 fax-rendering establishments, 1 pier and dock, 1 dangerous building, 1 rag house, 1 smoke house, 14 sunken and vacant lots, 34 yards, courts, and areas, 81 cellars and basements, 76 waste-pipes and drains, 108 privies lots, 34 yards, courts, and areas, 81 cellars and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 1 violation of Code, and water-closets, 48 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 1 violation of Code, 5 piggeries, 2 dangerous chimneys, 13 other nuisances, 1 oil works, together with 122 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious and infectious diseases.

74 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 46 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and furnigated 42 houses, 42 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

24 cases of small-pox were removed to Hospital and one dead body to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending December 4, 1875: Typhoid fever, 33; scarlet fever, 36; cerebro-spinal meningitis I; measles, 29; diphtheria, 127, and small-pox, 39.

1,284 cans and 10 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending December 4, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending December 4, 1875: Cattle, I carcass; calves (bob), 5 carcasses; sheep, 7 carcasses; beef, 254 pounds; poultry, 61 pounds; and fish, 1,700 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending December 4, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 484 burial permits for city deaths, 20 for bodies in transitu, and 53 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 484 deaths, 184 marriages, 435 births, 53 still-births, 20 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from Coroners. There were 33 secrebes of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage and 27 of death were issued from this Bureau. A PPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

When possible and legal, serving jurors will be allowed to select a convenient season—if application be made in

time.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called
or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or

unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of

The Commissioner will receive applications for relief from those jurors who have served continuously and promptly for several years, or have done excessive jury service in the State Courts.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting rames for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted. No fees of any kind exist or are allowed in regard to jury notices, and any one asking, receiving, or giving any such "fee" or "present" will be arrested, and, I possible, punished to the full extent of the law.

Section 100. That section 100 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

Section 100. That every owner, lessee, tenant, and occupant of any stall, stable, or apartment in which any horse, cattle, or swine, or any other animal shall be kept, or of any place in which manure or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, within the built-up portion of said city, shall cause said liquid and manure to be at once removed to some proper place, and shall at all times keep, or cause to be kept, such stalls stables, and apartments, and the drainage, lyard, and appurtenances thereof, in a cleanly and wholesome condition, so that no offensive smell detrimental to health shall be allowed to escape therefrom; and when within three hundred feet of any occupied dwelling-house, or of any manufactory where more than five persons are employed, the removals from the stables shall not be made, nor shall the manure or refuse from the stable be allowed to remain on any street or place near such stable, any time between to o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. M., without a permit from this Bord. Every such stall, stable, or apartment, where horses or cattle are kept, shall have an underground and properly covered manure vault of not less than sixty-four cubic feet capacity. But the Sanitary Superintendent is authorized to issue permits to be regularly reported to this Board regulating such removal within said hours.
