The Board of Health met this day.

Orders.

242 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Suits for Penalties.

Resolutions.

That the following orders be and are hereby suspended, as follows: Order No. 11157, on premises No. 43 Whitehall street, until May 1, 1876; order No. 4210, on premises No. 438 West Thirty-sixth street, until April 1, 1876.

That a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Post upon the condition of street pavement on West Fifty-seventh street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, be forwarded to the Department of Public Works for the necessary action.

That a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Bryant, upon the dangerous condition of premises 232 West Twenty-ninth street, be forwarded to the Department of Buildings for the necessary action.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby directed to issue permits to empty privy vaults, cesspools, etc., to those only who are provided with suction apparatus connected with air-tight tanks.

That order No. 3939, on premises north side of One Hundred and Seventy-third street, between Kingsbridge road and Tenth avenue, be and is hereby suspended until further investigation.

That the application for permission to deposit ashes and street-dirt, as collected by Street Cleaning Bureau, upon sunken lots One Hundred and Thirty-seventh to One Hundred and Fortieth streets, near Fifth avenue, be and is hereby denied, for the reason that such material is not considered proper filling for lots which are to be used for buildings to be occupied by human inhabitants.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau during the week ending December 4, 1875: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,554, as follows: 2 public buildings, 714 tenement houses, 50 private dwellings, 15 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 49 stables, 85 slaughter-houses, 5 fat-rendering establishments, 1 pier and dock, 1 dangerous building, 1 rag house, 1 smoke house, 14 sunken and vacant lots, 34 yards, courts, and areas, 81 cellars and basements, 76 waste-pipes and drains, 108 privies, and water-closets, 48 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 1 violation of Code, 5 piggeries, 2 dangerous chimneys, 13 other nuisances, 1 oil works, together with 122 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious and infectious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 571. During the past week 39 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

26 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

74 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 46 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 42 houses, 42 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

24 cases of small-pox were removed to Hospital and one dead body to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending December 4, 1875: Typhoid fever, 33; scarlet fever, 36; cerebro-spinal meningitis 1; measles, 29; diphtheria, 127, and small-pox, 39.

1,284 cans and 10 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending December 4, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending December 4, 1875: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 5 carcasses; sheep, 7 carcasses; beef, 254 pounds; poultry, 61 pounds; and fish, 1,700 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending December 4, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 484 burial permits for city deaths, 20 for bodies in transitu, and 53 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 484 deaths, 184 marriages, 435 births, 53 still-births, 20 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from Coroners. There were 33 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage and 27 of death were issued from this Bureau. Three cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.

In pursuance of the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, being an act entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873; and section 1 of chapter 779, being an act entitled "An act in relation to raising money by taxation in the County of New York, for county purposes," passed June 14, 1873; and chapter 304, being an act entitled "An act to consolidate the government of the City and County of New York, and further to regulate the same," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 303, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the Estimates and Apportionment for the support of the government of the County of New York," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 308, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the Estimates and Apportionment for the support of the government of the City of New York," passed May 1, 1874—a meeting is hereby called of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, constituting a Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be held at the office of the Mayor, on Tuesday, December 7, 1875, at 2 o'clock P. The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) is hereby transferred from the appropriation for "Contingencies—Comptroller's Office," 1875, the same being in excess of the amount required for the objects and purposes thereof, to the appropriation for "Printing, Stationery, and Blank Books," 1875, the same being insufficient.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President of the Board of Aldermen (Chairman), the Comptroller, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Mr. W. S. Wolf appeared before the Board in behalf of the "New York Adult Blind Association," and called upon the Board to make an appropriation of \$20,000; also, one for \$10,000 from unexpended balances, in pursuance of chapter 404, Laws of 1875, for the above Association.
Upon which the Board took no action.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments moved to suspend the Rule adopted at meeting of June 23, 1874, relating to calls of meetings, in order to act upon the resolutions now to be proposed by the Comptroller for the issue of "Assessment Bonds of the City of New York," "City Parks Improvement Fund Stock," and "New York City Bonds for the Liquidation of Claims and Judgments."
Which was agreed to.

Whereupon, the Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the provisions of section 112, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent per annum, Assessment Bonds of the City of New York, as authorized by chapter 397, Laws of 1852, and chapter 580, Laws of 1872. Sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000).

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President of the Board of Aldermen (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rate of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent per annum, "City Parks Improvement Fund Stock," authorized by chapter 608 of the Laws of 1875, as per requisition of the Department of Public Parks, dated October 11, 1875, twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000).

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President of the Board of Aldermen (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution accompanied with memorandum of unpaid judgments:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue bonds of the City of New York, as provided in chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, for the purpose of providing moneys for the payment of judgments which have been or may be obtained against the said city, the amount of said bonds not to exceed the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), said bonds to be designated "New York City Bonds for Liquidation of Claims and Judgments," and bear interest not exceeding seven per cent per annum, and payable at such time, within three years from the date thereof, as the Comptroller may determine.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held December 1, 1875 (present—all the Commissioners), the following action was had:

Organization, Appointments, etc.

December 1.—Salary of John K. Murphy, copyist, increased from \$6.00 to \$10.00 per week, to take effect December 1st.

Applications for Leases, etc.

December 1.—Treasurer of the Department authorized to deduct the sum of \$731 from the rent due November 1st from Alexander Mason and Robert Foster, lessees, consequent upon the Department having occupied the premises leased to them, subsequent to May 1st, last, at which time said leases commenced.

December 1.—Action of the Commissioners in informing David Tracy, Edward L. Donnelly, Herman Gelpike and E. W. Youmans to take possession December 1st, for the purpose of collecting wharfage of the premises leased by them at public auction November 5th, but such possession not to prejudice the right of the Department to reenter said premises in the event of the failure of said lessees to execute the lease or provide satisfactory sureties. Approved.

December 1.—Counsel to the Corporation requested to prepare, as suggested by him, an entirely new bond, to be attached to the lease of the Oceanic Steam Navigation Company, in order to permit the substitution of Mr. Broadway as surety thereon, in place of Mr. Walsh.

December 1.—Counsel to the Corporation requested to render his opinion as to the meaning and construction put upon the following clause contained in leases of wharf property prepared by the Law Department and issued by this Board, that the "Lessee shall and will, at all times, and at his own expense, keep the slip hereby granted dredged, and will keep, put, and maintain all the premises hereby granted and demised, in good and sufficient repair and condition."

December 1.—A. C. Cheney and C. A. Miller requested to call on the President in reference to using hoisting horses on piers without laying down temporary platforms for their use.

December 1.—Secretary directed to advise the Common Council in reply to their resolutions, adopted November 8th and 23d, relative to restoring laborers' wages to their former standard, that this Board is advised and believes that the duty of fixing the compensation to all persons in its employ is devolved by law solely on itself, and that in fixing such compensation it is governed solely by the market value of such services, and that whenever the market value of such services shall advance beyond the sum now paid by this Department, the rate to be paid for such services will be correspondingly increased.

December 1.—One report and seventeen communications were received and read and four communications were taken from the table, of which 19 were placed on file, no further action thereon being required; one was referred to the Executive Committee and two to the Auditing Committee for consideration and report.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, on the 30th day of November, 1875, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 100 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

Section 100. That every owner, lessee, tenant, and occupant of any stall, stable, or apartment in which any horse, cattle, or swine, or any other animal shall be kept, or of any place in which manure or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, within the built-up portion of said city, shall cause said liquid and manure to be at once removed to some proper place, and shall at all times keep, or cause to be kept, such stalls, stables, and apartments, and the drainage, yard, and appurtenances thereof, in a cleanly and wholesome condition, so that no offensive smell detrimental to health shall be allowed to escape therefrom; and when within three hundred feet of any occupied dwelling-house, or of any manufactory where more than five persons are employed, the removals from the stalls shall be allowed, nor shall the manure or refuse from such stable be allowed to remain on any street or place near such stable, any time between 10 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. M., without a permit from this Board. Every such stall, stable, or apartment, where horses or cattle are kept, shall have an underground and properly covered manure vault of not less than sixty-four cubic feet capacity. But the Sanitary Superintendent is authorized to issue permits to be regularly reported to this Board regulating such removal within said hours.
