

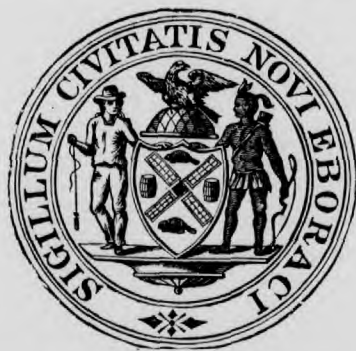

MUNICIPAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Resolved, That the heads of the different departments be and they hereby are authorized and directed to make no deduction from the pay of employees in their respective departments by reason of the observance of any legal holidays.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen August 16, 1898, a majority of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Adopted by the Council August 16, 1898, a majority of all the members elected voting in avor thereof.

 twelve hours from the time garbage is first deliv-
 ered to or placed thereon. Every boat, scow or
 other means of transporting garbage from said city shall
 be so constructed as to be capable of being tightly
 closed, and all air outlets sealed by water seal; and all
 garbage placed on any such boat, scow or receptacle for
 removal shall be deodorized in a manner to be approved
 by the Board of Health.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect, and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, each in the penal amount of fifty (50) per cent. of the bid for each article.

Each bid or estimate shall contain and state the name and place of residence of each of the persons making the same, the names of all persons interested with him or them therein, and if no other person be so interested it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Municipal Assembly, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
