Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

DEAR SIR—I herewith respectfully transmit a labor report of work done by paid and unpaid labor for the quarter ending September 30, 1901, to wit:

CARPENTER'S WORK.

At Second District Prison—by unpaid labor: adjusting and putting in sash-cord in six windows, Male Prison, material used: three strands of sash-cord.

At Fourth District Prison—by unpaid labor: adjusting and putting in sash-cord in four windows, Prison Kitchen, material used: 40 feet sash cord.

At Fifth District Prison—by unpaid labor: repairing and putting in good order top frame for stationary wash tubs, material used: 12 feet wooden dolls, 1 pound tenpenny finishing nails, also putting in new section on Ten-day House bunks, material used 30 feet white pine boards, 1 pound tenpenny wrought iron nails, and putting in four lights of glass on windows in Ten-day House, size of glass 16-inches by 15½-inches.

PLUMBING AND TINSMITHING.

At Second District Prison—work done by staff. Repairing and overhauling steam plant, material used: two manhole gaskets 11 x 14½-inches, 2½ dozen ¾-inch black unions, three ¾-inch elbows, five sheets XXX tin, two ½-inch elbows, repairing fire-box, material used: fifty fire-bricks, half-barrel fire-clay, one-fourth barrel Portland cement; putting in on "Duparquet range 6-feet," one set of rings and covers, one set of fire-bricks, one set of grates and one right and one left top centre-plate.

At Third District Prison—By paid labor: Repairing hopper valves in Cells Nos. 1, 5, 6, 7, 9, 20 and 21, on male side of Prison, and refitting water-faucets of same with new washers. Repairing leak of hot water-pipe back of tubs in Laundry; material used: 6 pounds of lead pipe, 3 pounds of solder, 1 fuel of charcoal and compression washers. Furnishing labor and material to set up a 40-gallon "Mott's" galvanized-iron boiler, also furnishing the necessary spouts, coupling, etc.

Cleaning and repairing Prison kitchen range, furnishing a new front door and slide, also new fire bricks and grate.

Cleaning and repairing (2) two "Mott's" heating furnaces in cellar of Prison, supplying new grate, 3 lengths of exhaust-pipe and shaker, and readjusting the smoke and exhaust pipe in a satisfactory and workmanlike manner; material used: 8 pounds of galvanized-iron, 6 pounds solder, 4 fuels of charcoal, acid, etc.

At Fourth District Prison—By unpaid labor: The trap in sink in hall was cut out, the sewer-pipe cleaned and trap reset; putting in 3 new ¾-inch brass faucets in cells on second tier, 5 new rubber washers put on Cells Nos. 1, 2, 5, 6 and 8; 1 three-quarter-inch brass faucet put on sink in Female Prison, 1 new "Mott's" valve put on water-closet in Female Prison, by paid labor, adjusting on Prison kitchen window, 1 heavy iron screen.

At Fifth District Prison—By paid labor: Furnishing material and labor in putting in two new faucets in water-basin, Matron's room, also removing obstruction in Cells Nos. 10, 15 and 16, Female Prison; repairing leak on hot water supply-pipe, laundry; repairing and re-applying lock on Cell No. 22, Male Prison; putting in new set of bricks, grates and bottoms on Mott's Defiance Range No. 9.

At Seventh District Prison—Putting in on Boynton & Richardson's range "Perfect No. 14," a new set of grates, covers and rings.

PAINTERS' WORK.

At Twenty-second District Prison—By Prison help: Whitewashing engine room, 1 barrel whitewash lime, 5 pounds U. M. blue and 2 whitewash brushes; painting and retouching hall and corridors in male and female department, material used, 5 gallons turpentine, 5 gallons boiled oil, 1 gallon japan driers, 5 gallons asphaltum, 50 pounds white lead, 2 sash brushes, 2 pound brushes and 5 pounds chromo green.

At Fourth District Prison—Painting of roof on Vegetable House, giving same two coats of paint; painting the iron screen, Prison Kitchen, giving same three coats of white paint; painting stationary wash-tubs, giving same two coats of paint, material used, 30 pounds white lead, 1 gallon raw oil, ½ gallon turpentine and ¼ gallon driers.

At Fifth District Prison—Painting and retouching the entire male and female departments, staircases, corridors and iron gates and railings, material used, 400 pounds white lead, 25 gallons raw oil, 15 gallons turpentine, 25 pounds princess metallic, 30 pounds yellow ochre, 5 pounds raw sienna, 10 pounds umber, 1½ gallon Valentine's outside varnish, 3 gallons liquid driers, 4 flat wall brushes, 2 pound brushes and 5 sash tools.

At Seventh District Prison—Painting kitchen, material used, 10 pounds white lead, 2 gallons japan driers, 2 gallons turpentine, 2 gallons boiled oil, 3 pounds chrome green, 2 pounds yellow ochre; whitewashing corridor, ½ barrel whitewash lime and 3 pounds U. M. blue.

The prisons were entirely cleansed of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered by the P. M. Frank Exterminating Company.

The usual amount of cleaning, laundering, cooking and other general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.

REPORT OF WORKHOUSE, BLACKWELL'S ISLAND, QUARTER ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 1901.

DEAR SIR—I inclose herewith a copy of a communication from the Secretary of the President of the Borough, dated September 23, 1901, who desires information in relation to the construction of a sewer—

1st. Narrows avenue, between Bay Ridge avenue and Seventy-first street;

2d. Narrows avenue, between Seventy-first street and Shore road.

I beg to report that the estimated cost for the construction of the first above mentioned is \$5,000, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$325,800.

In regard to outlet sewers, information of which is desired by the President of the Borough, I beg to state that all necessary outlet sewers have been constructed.

In regard to information desired by the President of the Borough as to the legal opening of this street, I beg to state that Narrows avenue, between Bay Ridge avenue and Seventy-first street, is legally open.

In reporting upon the second above mentioned, I beg to state that the estimated cost is \$18,500, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$641,434.

In regard to outlet sewers necessary, information of which is desired by the President of the Borough, I beg to state that such will be required in

Eighty-third street, between Narrows avenue and the Shore road; in

Eighty-eighth street, between Narrows avenue and the Shore road; and in

Shore road, between Eighty-eighth and Eighty-sixth streets;

—the estimated cost of which is \$4,700, and the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment, \$192,867.

In regard to the legal opening of the streets, information of which is desired by the President of the Borough, I beg to state that application was made before the Supreme Court, October 30, 1900, for the appointment of Commissioners for opening Narrows avenue, between Seventy-first street and the Shore road (see CITY RECORD, page 6419, for the year 1900). A resolution to open Eighty-third street, between the Shore road and Fourth avenue, was passed by the Board of Public Improvements on September 5, 1900 (see CITY RECORD, page 5424, for the year 1900).

Eighty-eighth street, between Narrows avenue and the Shore road, is open.

Shore road, between Eighty-eighth and Eighty-sixth streets, is open.

You will notice that the Local Board has passed a resolution, containing the entire length of Narrows avenue, between Bay Ridge avenue and the Shore road, but it is the present desire to separate this matter into two parts, in order that the first part herein mentioned, viz.: Narrows avenue, from Bay Ridge avenue to Seventy-first street, may be hastened in construction.
