MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, APRIL 29, 1904.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

We have no employee who can act in the capacity of Inspector of Buildings, and at the present time two hospitals are in process of erection without their being watched by any direct representative of this Department. It would seem to be very unwise to allow this state of things to continue, and we beg, therefore, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment grant our request.

SIR—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals beg to request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the establishment of the position of General Inspector of Construction, Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, at a salary of \$2,000 a year.

We have already two new hospitals in process of construction, and hope soon to have two more. In each case we need a thoroughly competent man who shall be constantly on hand to inspect the work of construction and to protect the interests of the Department. We believe that \$2,000 a year, to be paid out of the appropriation for each building, would be proper recompense for such Inspector.

SIR—Hon. John McGaw Woodbury, Commissioner of Department of Street Cleaning, in communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of April 5, 1904, transmits form of contract in triplicate for the removal of snow and ice in the Borough of The Bronx, for the winter season of 1904-1905, for the approval by the Board of the terms and conditions thereof, pursuant to section 544 of the Greater New York Charter. I would report:

The contract proposed contains the following terms and conditions:

This contract shall be for the period beginning with the indorsement hereon of the Comptroller's certificate as hereinafter provided, and ending the fifteenth day of April, 1905.

The area maps of the Borough of The Bronx hereunto annexed, and the several schedules hereunto annexed, show the streets to be cleaned of snow and ice, and the order in which said cleaning is to be done.

The schedule referred to is as follows:

CONTRACT, SNOW REMOVAL SCHEDULE, SEASON 1904-1905.

Gang No. 1.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Madison avenue to Third avenue.
Third avenue, One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to Southern Boulevard.
Southern Boulevard, Third avenue to Lincoln avenue.
Lincoln avenue, from Third avenue to Harlem river.
Third avenue, One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to One Hundred and Forty-sixth street.

Morris avenue, One Hundred and Forty-sixth street to One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, Third avenue to Willis avenue.
Willis avenue, Southern Boulevard to One Hundred and Forty-ninth street.
One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Willis avenue to St. Ann's avenue.
One Hundred and Forty-third street, Brook avenue to Third avenue.

Gang No. 2.

One Hundred and Fifty-second street, Courtlandt avenue to Third avenue.
Third avenue, One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street.

Boston avenue, Third avenue to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street.
One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, Boston avenue to Union avenue.
Morris avenue, One Hundred and Sixty-first street to One Hundred and Forty-sixth street.

Courtlandt avenue, One Hundred and Forty-sixth street to One Hundred and Sixty-second street.

Gang No. 3.

One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, from Park avenue to Third avenue.
Third avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to Tremont avenue.
Tremont avenue, Third avenue to Park avenue.
Boston avenue, from McKinley Square to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, including McKinley Square.

The security required will be \$10,000.

The compensation will be at the rate per cubic yard of snow and ice for the actual fall of snow in the place or places where the work under the contract is carried on, as determined by the area maps. The depth of the snow-fall to be determined by the reports of United States Weather Bureau located in The City of New York, or by a bureau especially established by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning.

The contract and specifications are drawn with care, and the terms and conditions of same, in my opinion, may be properly approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in compliance with section 544 of the Greater New York Charter, as requested by the Commissioner.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

DEAR SIR—At the request of the President of the Borough, I beg to inform you that it is the intention to use any moneys that may be appropriated for the County Court-house for the purpose of installing an improved system of ventilation. This is the principal object in asking for the appropriation. The system now obtaining in the building will have to be thoroughly overhauled. The Judges of the Supreme Court and the President of the Borough are agreed that something must be done speedily, in order to correct the defects in ventilation and improve the sanitation of the building. The drainage system is antiquated, and considerable plumbing will be required in order to make the building sanitary. A new part of the Supreme Court is to be established, and in this connection a great deal of moving will be necessary; it will

also entail a large amount of carpentering, etc. All of the work is intended to be permanent in character, and can be performed during the summer recess. \$50,000 has already been appropriated by the Board of Aldermen and approved by the Mayor, of which you are aware; it remains for the Board of Estimate to sanction it in order to make it effective. This money will enable us to prepare plans and specifications and perform part of the work planned; an additional appropriation of \$50,000 will complete the work and place the building in a sanitary condition. All of the work can be done during the summer recess without discommoding the Justices in the performance of the Court business.

MY DEAR MR. GROUT—I have noticed that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has been making appropriations, from which I assume that the Legislature has passed the act increasing the "Emergency Fund" to two million dollars.

If this is so, may we not have another fifty thousand, so that all the necessary work can be done on this court-house this year, instead of making two bites of this cherry? You will recollect that we already have an appropriation for renovating the plumbing. If we could have enough to improve the ventilation as well, the chances for a prolonged life would be improved. As the Legislature omitted to pass our Court-house Bill, I suppose that project is postponed for a year.

Lantry, Commissioner, Department of Correction, in communication, under date of March 21, 1904, requests permission of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to install an electric passenger elevator in the City Prison, for the sum of \$2,400; the Commissioner states that "the amount necessary for this improvement being provided for in Building Fund, chapter 626, Laws of 1896, as amended by chapter 642, Laws of 1897, and sections 170, 43 and 169 of the Charter of Greater New York."

I would report that a Reedy passenger elevator was installed by the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company and American Bonding and Trust Company, sureties for the Armstrong & Bolton Company, Contract No. 1258, for steam heating, etc., at the City Prison. The contract was not finally completed and accepted until February, 1904, but the elevator has been in use for at least a year before that date. On examination of the elevator, I find the hoisting drum broken in two pieces. I have consulted the architects, Horgan & Slatery, and had them communicate with the Reedy Elevator Company, but from all of my investigation I have been unable to ascertain if the cause of the break-down was due to defects in the elevator apparatus or careless operating of same. Therefore I am of the opinion that it would be best to allow the Commissioner to install a new electric passenger elevator, as he requests, for the sum of \$2,400.

The proposed improvement being necessary, and there being a sufficient unexpended balance, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can properly authorize the expenditure and application of \$2,400 for the installation of an electric passenger elevator at the City Prison out of the proceeds of bonds, to the amount of \$175,000, authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 11, 1901, for the following work at the new City Prison (the Tombs):

"Wall, to extend around City Prison, flagging yard, grading sidewalk all around Prison, and stairway to Criminal Court Building."

It is therefore proposed to increase the compensation of the Chief Accountant \$500 on account of these additional duties. This change is a practical saving of \$7,000 per annum.

In regard to fixing the salary of the position of Clerk at \$2,650, I beg to state that no grade at this salary has been established in this Department, and I accordingly desire to have such grade created.

The Secretary presented communications from the Misses Charlotte V. Eaton and Theresa Stern, Stenographers and Typewriters in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting promotion from the second to the third grade.

Referred to the Secretary.

The Secretary presented the following opinion of the Corporation Counsel relative to the lighting of public buildings under the control of the Board of Education, which was ordered on file, and the Secretary directed to send copies to the members of the Board.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I have received a letter from your Secretary, Deputy Comptroller Stevenson, dated April 4, 1904, forwarding a communication from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, relative to an insufficiency in the appropriation for lighting public buildings under the control of the Board of Education for the year 1904. This letter, dated March 15, 1904, was presented to you at the meeting held March 31, 1904, and referred to me for my consideration and advice.

My attention is also called to the fact that the major part of the expense for lighting school buildings for the year 1903 has not been paid, and that my predecessor advised that the cost of lighting school buildings should be paid out of the appropriation made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. It is stated, however, that the Board of Education declined to transfer from its own account to the account of the other Department the amount which had been appropriated for lighting school buildings for the year 1903, on the ground that the Board of Education had exclusive jurisdiction in this matter.

You also refer to a recent decision which, I presume, is in the case of Gunnison vs. the Board of Education, 176 N. Y., 11, and request my opinion as to which Department should be provided with the funds to pay for the lighting of school buildings.

With the letter from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated March 15, 1904, are forwarded certain other papers, the principal ones of which are reports to him from the Engineer of Surface Construction, dated January 25, 1904, and March 1, 1904. There is also a report to the Comptroller from Duncan MacInnes, Expert Accountant, dated March 4, 1904.

There are thus presented three subjects, each of which is nearly independent of the other.

The first and most important one relates to what shall be done as to the lighting of school buildings during the year 1904.

The situation, as I understand it from the papers forwarded, may be stated as follows, without going into the matter in great detail:

No money was appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the lighting of school buildings for the year 1904, except a small sum (\$15,542.73), which is only enough to light the school buildings for a few days; that is to say, no money has been appropriated either to the Department of Education or to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the specific purpose of lighting school buildings during the year 1904, except the small amount just referred to.

Just how or why this happened is not entirely clear from the papers, but it was doubtless due to some oversight or mistake, the occurrence of which it seems unnecessary to try to explain now.

It was apparently intended that an appropriation should be made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for this purpose.

It is sufficient to state that an appropriation has been made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of only enough to pay its usual expected bills for other purposes, exclusive of any expense for lighting school buildings. It is true that an appropriation of \$1,675,563.50 for "lamps and lighting" in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx has been made to this Department, and further appropriations for the same purpose in the other boroughs, which the Commissioner would have power to apply to the lighting of school buildings.

If the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity should use a substantial part of this appropriation for lighting school buildings there would be a deficiency at the end of the year, or else it would be necessary to cease lighting a part of the streets of the City.

One of two alternatives is thus presented, and it is, I think, a question of good judgment and discretion on the part of the Commissioner as to which one shall be adopted, unless, indeed, some other course of financial supply can be found, the most obvious of which is an issue of Special Revenue Bonds under subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter.

The second subject presented in the communication from your Secretary relates to the expense of lighting school buildings for the year 1903.

The difficulty on this subject has arisen, no doubt, in part from the dispute with the lighting companies as to their alleged contracts with the City for public lighting during the year 1903. This question is still in litigation, and it is hardly possible to answer it fully at the present time, nor is it advisable to attempt to do so, and fortunately it is not necessary to do so. A part of the difficulty also arose from the doubt as to whether the appropriation for lighting school buildings should be made to the Department of Education or to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

My predecessor held distinctly in several opinions that the appropriation for the lighting of such buildings should be made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity; that this Department has full and exclusive charge of the contracts for lighting of public buildings and that all bills for such expenditure should be certified by the Commissioner thereof. Two of his principal opinions on this subject were dated June 16, 1902, and November 6, 1902, respectively, and were forwarded to the Comptroller.

The appropriation, however, was made for the year 1903, to the Department of Education, and no money for that year for the lighting of school buildings was appropriated to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

I do not see, however, that this is a matter of very much practical importance. The school buildings have been lighted and the City should, of course, pay the proper charges therefor. The fact that money has been appropriated through the wrong Department is a matter of no great consequence. The Board of Education certainly could not use it for purposes to which it was not appropriated, and hence it would seem that either the bills should be paid directly out of this money or a transfer thereof made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and that the two Departments should co-operate in order to overcome any technicality that may stand in the way.

The third subject relates to the decision of the Court of Appeals in Gunnison vs. the Board of Education, 176 N. Y., 11. I am informed that my predecessor had this decision before him subsequent to the opinions referred to above, but thought that it furnished no ground for changing the advice which he had previously given. I know of no reason to question the correctness of his views, but have made no original re-examination of the subject. I think that the decision in the Gunnison case has no practical bearing upon the advice which has been given in this opinion.

If, when the estimates for the year 1905 are to be made, a review of the question is thought desirable, I shall take pleasure in making it when requested to do so.

DEAR SIR—Referring to the last Budget, I find an error was made in connection with the appropriation for "Public Buildings." As you probably know, last year the appropriation for the lighting of the Board of Education, comprising all the schools in the City, was made, so far as the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx are concerned, to the Board direct. They never transferred any funds to this Department during the year, and consequently this Department refused to order these schools lighted until they received the money to pay the same. The bills for the Board of Education for last year have been held in consequence, although they have been kept in proper form, meters read and in general have been checked properly.

Referring to page 264 of the Budget for 1904, you will note that the table is given of the "Public Buildings" in Manhattan and The Bronx, showing the charges according to the unadjusted bills for 1903, and an estimate of the expense in 1904, with the increases requested.

In the other boroughs the table is given in same form. The appropriation made was the same as last year for "Lamps and Lighting" in each borough, except in Manhattan, where it was increased by \$35,000, for "Street Signs," and \$39,169.89 for "Public Buildings." It was apparently assumed that the amount for 1903 in the Borough of Manhattan included the Board of Education—\$155,427.34. It did not. Consequently the only appropriation made for the Board of Education was the increase of \$15,542.73. In the other boroughs it was evidently assumed that this Department received for the Board of Education the amount set opposite the Board of Education in the tables giving the expense of "Public Buildings" in the other boroughs. The increases asked for in this table, however, were not granted, the appropriation being made in each case for "Lamps and Lighting" for the same amount as last year. In consequence there is no appropriation outside of the \$15,542.73, above referred to, for lighting the schools in the City of Greater New York, for, as you will note by turning to page 772, no appropriation for lighting was asked for by the Board of Education. The item "11, Lighting (discontinued)" is entered as shown. As the month of January alone will exceed the amount appropriated, it would seem that this matter should be taken up immediately and settled.

DEAR SIR—In the departmental estimate submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 11, 1903, by my predecessor, \$211,857.07 was asked for for the lighting of the public buildings under the control of the Board of Education, for the year 1904. According to the bills rendered by the gas and electric light companies for the year 1903, the cost of lighting chargeable against the Board of Education was \$194,933.82. In consequence of a complete rearrangement of the lighting system in a great number of the school buildings and the lights required for the new school houses, \$16,923.25 additional was asked to be appropriated.

For the year 1903 the money required for the lighting of the school buildings was appropriated to the Board of Education. The records of this Department show that during this year many letters were written and conferences held with the representatives of the Board of Education concerning the transfer to this Department of the money for public lighting which was appropriated to the Board of Education. No doubt you are aware that Mr. George L. Rives advised my predecessor that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity should pay for the lighting of all public buildings.

The inclosed is a copy of the statement submitted to your Board last year relating to the estimates for the lighting of street signs and public buildings. From this statement it would appear that this Department had received the amounts for the year 1903 opposite the account "Board of Education," and your Board appropriated for the year 1904 the amounts in the column marked "Increase." As this Department had not received any money, either by direct appropriation or transfer, for the lighting of the public schools for the year 1903, you will see that by the final action of your Board the only amounts appropriated for this account were those in the increase column, which amounted to \$16,923.25.

The Engineer in charge of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas reports that the lighting of the public school buildings in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the month of January, 1904, will cost \$23,416.28, an excess of \$6,493.03 over the entire amount appropriated for this purpose for the year 1904.

In the general appropriations for public lighting, which included the cost of lighting of all public buildings, your Board appropriated \$18,230.11 for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx in excess of the amount expended for the year 1903, and for the Borough of Brooklyn, \$2,654.77. These amounts I have deducted from my estimate. In consequence of this error, I am obliged to ask that your Board appropriate the following sums of money to be chargeable against the appropriations for the different boroughs as follows:

Hon. JOHN T. OAKLEY, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

SIR—I have received your letter, dated February 1, 1904, inclosing a copy of a report of C. F. Lacombe, Engineer of Surface Construction, to you, dated January 25, 1904, relative to the appropriation for the lighting of public buildings, and particularly of the buildings of the Board of Education.

It appears, in effect, that there is no appropriation outside of \$15,542.73 for lighting the schools in the City, and that apparently by an oversight the sum of \$15,542.73, which is estimated will be needed for the purpose, was not included in the Budget. In fact, the expenses of lighting for the month of January alone will exceed the amount appropriated.

In this situation you ask my advice.

I think that you should bring the matter at once to the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

It seems better that I should defer answering any questions of law that might be thought to arise, until that Board has considered the matter. When that has been done I shall be glad to advise you upon any questions of law that may arise, either upon your request or upon the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

SIR—In the matter of the communication to the Mayor from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in relation to an alleged error in the departmental estimates of and appropriation to said Department for "Lamps and Lighting" for the year 1904, which has been referred to the Department of Finance for investigation, I would respectfully state that from an examination of said Department's estimates and appropriation it would appear that the 1904 appropriation for lighting the schools—e. g., public building, Board of Education—was in the following sums:

In the foregoing illustration the 1903 appropriation for "Lamps and Lighting" has been compared with the total estimates for such purpose, amounting to \$1,629,164.50, and thus showing a difference less in appropriation as compared with the total estimates of \$46,001. If, however, the estimate of \$85,980 for lighting schools—i. e., Board of Education—is eliminated from the total estimates and the resultant total thus obtained is compared with the appropriation granted, it will be noted that the difference is an excess of \$39,979.50 in appropriation, viz.:

Inasmuch as the total estimate submitted by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for "Lamps and Lighting"—Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, was reduced by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the sum of \$46,001, as shown above, and as the Board of Education had included in its estimate the following sums for lighting the schools, which sums were appropriated by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the Special School Fund, to wit:

—the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has held that it received no appropriations for the year 1903 to provide for lighting the schools in either of the boroughs composing the Greater City. It appears that subsequent to the adoption of the Budget for 1903 the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested and importuned the Board of Education to allow the transfer of the separate sums included in the 1903 Budget of the latter for lighting schools, as stated above, but the Board of Education refused to comply with said request and the bills actually incurred for lighting schools in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, amounting to \$136,268.44, are still unpaid, together with bills amounting to upwards of \$34,500 for lighting the schools in Brooklyn; \$2,217 for lighting the schools in Queens; and upwards of \$2,500 for lighting the schools in Richmond.

For the year 1903 the estimates by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for "Lamps and Lighting" in the several other boroughs of the City were as follows:

In submitting its estimate of "Lamps and Lighting" for the year 1904, under the subhead of "Public Buildings," the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity used as a basis on which to predicate the same the ascertained or approximated actual expenses incurred in lighting the schools during the year 1903, plus an estimated amount for new schools to be opened in 1904, and presented said estimates without explanation of this fact or that said Department had not been provided with the appropriations to meet the expenses of 1903 thereon stated; consequently, the appropriation made for the year 1904 on the estimates submitted for lighting public buildings carried with it only the estimated increase of the year 1904 for lighting schools over the actual requirements for such purposes of the year 1903.

The situation may be summarized in the following table:

—or \$18,230.11 in excess of the total estimates, which excess the Department considers as being applicable to the general purposes of the appropriation for "Lamps and Lighting."

It might here be stated that the sum total incurred in 1903 for lighting the public buildings in Manhattan and The Bronx, not including the school buildings, was upwards of \$10,000 in excess of the estimates submitted for said year by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and it is clearly apparent, from the manner in which its estimates for 1904 were made, that said Department cannot provide for the lighting of the school buildings from its appropriations for this year. It further appears that this lack of appropriation for lighting the school buildings is due, first, to the fact that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity presented its estimates in a manner to indicate that, if the amounts stated were granted, the sum total of \$211,857.07 for lighting the schools in all boroughs, as previously stated herein, would be provided, instead of which only \$16,923.25 plus any part of the excess of \$18,230.11 in the total appropriation has actually been provided; and second, to the fact that the Board of Education did not include in its Special School Fund any estimates for lighting the public schools for 1904.

It might also be stated that the Board of Education is still in possession of the \$122,430 included in its Special School Fund appropriation for the year 1903, and it would further appear that the unpaid bills of said year of the several gas and electric lighting companies should be transmitted to the Board of Education for payment. Furthermore, the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity is apparently not in possession of funds to pay these 1903 bills, as it permitted transfers from its 1903 appropriation for "Lamps and Lighting" to other departments, amounting to \$84,000.

The present complicated situation relative to this lighting matter, in which one Department cannot pay the bills, and another Department or Board will not pay the bills, is largely due to former Corporation Counsel Rives' opinion and insistence that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity shall exercise supervision over the lighting of the public schools, which opinion the Board of Education would not recognize, and has insisted that it alone has supervision of such lighting. The contention of the Board of Education in this respect has seemingly been strengthened by the decision of the Court of Appeals of October 6, 1903, to the effect that the said Board is an independent municipal corporation.

In the light of said decision, and in the event of a reopening of the Budget for 1904 for the consideration of additional Board of Education appropriations, it might be well to consider the advisability of then providing such Board with a sum sufficient to meet the requirements for lighting the schools during the year 1904, less the \$16,923.25 included for said purpose in the appropriation of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, which latter sum should then be transferred from said Department funds to those of the Board of Education. The \$18,230.11 excess in appropriation, as shown, might also be considered as available for the same purpose.

The Care of the schools in the matter of lighting, as in all other respects, would thus be restored to the original jurisdiction which obtained up to December, 1902, and the matter of necessary appropriations for such purpose would thus be adjusted.

DEAR SIR—On November 16, 1903, application was made by this Department to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the necessary authority and funds to advertise for bids and award a contract for rebuilding a retaining wall on the easterly side of Edgecombe avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Forty-eighth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, which had been destroyed by heavy rain storms on October 8, 9 and 10, 1903.

On November 20, 1903, pursuant to the above request, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution authorizing this Department to advertise for bids and award a contract for the above work:

"Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Manhattan be and hereby is authorized to advertise for bids and award the contract for rebuilding a retaining wall on the easterly side of Edgecombe avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Forty-eighth streets, Borough of Manhattan."

After public advertising, bids were received on April 23 for the above work, of which the lowest is twenty-three thousand five hundred and twenty dollars (\$23,520).

As the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the above work did not state how the expense was to be met, request is again made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the necessary funds in order that the above bid may be accepted and a contract entered into for rebuilding this wall.

Hon. GEORGE LIVINGSTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

DEAR SIR—During the heavy rainstorm which prevailed in this section on October 8, 9 and 10, the retaining wall on the easterly side of Edgecombe avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Forty-eighth streets, was broken down and destroyed for a length of, approximately, 200 feet, and a portion of the filling recently placed on said avenue and back of said wall was also carried out and destroyed with said wall.

I have had a survey made for the purpose of determining the amount of new wall to be constructed and new filling to be replaced. The wall and fill destroyed were carried upon park property, and will have to be removed. The approximate amount of materials to be removed and new masonry wall to be constructed, with the cost thereof, is as follows:

10,000 cubic yards of excavation (earth and stone), at \$1.....	\$10,000 00
3,000 cubic yards new cement masonry wall, at \$4.25.....	12,750 00
7,000 cubic yards of filling to be furnished, at \$0.50.....	3,500 00
200 cubic yards concrete for foundation to wall, at \$6.....	1,200 00

Total estimated cost..... \$27,450 00

A portion of the wall destroyed was new wall, recently constructed by Cincetti Marrone, the contractor, for reregulating, etc., Edgecombe avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-seventh street to One Hundred and Fifty-third street, and the balance of wall destroyed was the original retaining wall, constructed at the time the avenue was regulated and graded by G. F. Dawson, under contract with the City, dated October 8, 1886. In constructing the new wall a portion of the old wall was removed for an average depth of 8 feet, and from a careful examination made at that time the remaining portion of the wall indicated a substantial construction on rock foundation.

From the test pits, which were excavated along the bottom of the wall, it was impossible to determine whether such rock foundation had been properly leveled and prepared for the superstructure, and as the original wall was supposed to have been constructed under the supervision of a City Inspector and City Surveyor, I did not consider it necessary to break down a greater portion of the wall to examine the interior construction of the same; that portion which was removed appeared to be properly constructed.

Upon that portion of the wall remaining a new wall was constructed by Contractor Marrone, under the supervision of a City Inspector and a City Surveyor, appointed for that purpose. This wall was of cement masonry, as provided for in the specifications for such work, and was well and properly constructed, and was duly examined and accepted by the Engineers of the Department of Finance before the monthly payments for such work were made, and I consider it unreasonable to charge the Contractor with any blame by reason of the breaking down or "collapse" of said wall, and I would recommend that the matter be brought to the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and such Board be requested to authorize the rebuilding of said wall and appropriate an amount equal to the foregoing estimate of cost, and also authorize the letting of a contract therefor.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on December 10, 1901, a delegation of citizens from the upper part of the Twelfth Ward, and that part of the Twenty-fourth Ward in and around Kingsbridge and Spuyten Duyvil, representing various improvement associations, appeared before the Board and presented a petition and requested the Board to take action, in pursuance of chapter 516 of the Laws of 1901. This bill was entitled "An act to authorize the abolition of certain grade crossings in The City of New York."

Nothing was done by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the railroad companies empowered to carry out the provisions of this act, and it was repealed by the Legislature in 1903, by chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903, passed May 7, 1903, entitled, "An act to provide for the abolition, discontinuance and avoidance of certain grade crossings in The City of New York." The act read as follows:

Section 1. "The grade crossings of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad at Kingsbridge road, East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, Broadway, Corlear street, Tibbett avenue, West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and West Two Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, and the grade crossings of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad, and of the New York and Putnam Railroad at Depot place, Fordham road and East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, all in The City of New York, whether such grade crossings have been heretofore actually constructed or appear upon the maps, plans and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of The City of New York, in the Borough of The Bronx, shall be abolished, discontinued or avoided in accordance with the provisions of this act.

Sec. 2. "In case the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company shall, in the manner provided in the Railroad Law, alter and change the route of that part of its railroad extending from a point at or near East One Hundred and Ninety-first street to a point at or near Spuyten Duyvil road, from the present route to a route which shall follow, as nearly as may be practicable the northerly line of the Harlem ship canal, both of said routes lying wholly within the County of New York, then and in that event, The City of New York, acting by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, is hereby authorized and empowered in its discretion either to discontinue and close that part of Teunisson place, lying southerly of the southerly line of Leyden street, that part of Exterior street lying southerly of the southerly line of East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and adjoining the present roadway, of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company and that part of East One Hundred and Ninety-second street lying westerly of the easterly line of the lands of the New York and Putnam Railroad Company; or to carry the said Teunisson place, Exterior street and East One Hundred and Ninety-second street or any one or more of them over the tracks of the said Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad by bridges with suitable approaches. If the said streets or any of them shall be discontinued and closed, The City of New York, acting by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, shall grant to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, its successors and assigns, by a proper instrument or instruments in writing, for the term of its or their corporate existence, all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to the said discontinued portions of the said streets, subject to the right of the City to construct and maintain all necessary sewers therein; and if the said portions of the said streets, or of any of them, shall not be discontinued and closed, The City of New York, acting by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, shall grant to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, its successors and assigns, by a proper instrument or instruments in writing, for the term of its or their corporate existence, all such right, title and interest in and to such streets, or any of them, as shall be necessary or reasonably required for the construction, operation and maintenance of the altered or changed roadway and route of the said railroad company and for such connections as may be necessary or reasonably required. The survey, map and certificate of such alteration or change shall be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York for its approval, and upon being approved by that Board shall be effective, and shall be filed in the office of the Clerk of the County of New York, without the approval of any other officer or board of the said City. The said Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company shall thereupon abandon that portion of its present route and tracks, between the southerly line of East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and the said point of junction at or near Spuyten Duyvil road.

Sec. 3. "The grade crossings at Depot place, Fordham road and East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street shall be abolished and discontinued by carrying the said Depot place, Fordham road and East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street over the railroad tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company and the New York and Putnam Railroad Company, or by discontinuing and closing those portions of the said streets or any of them between the easterly line of the lands of the New York and Putnam Railroad Company and the westerly line of the lands of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, and by carrying a new street or streets over the tracks of the said railroad companies by bridges with suitable approaches as may be hereafter agreed upon by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sec. 4. "The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, the lessee of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad and of the New York and Putnam Railroad shall submit plans and profiles in duplicate for abolishing, discontinuing and avoiding all of the grade crossings hereinbefore specified, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York for its approval. If such plans and profiles are approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, such approval to be evidenced by resolution adopted by a majority of the votes in said Board, a copy of such resolution, duly certified by the Mayor and Comptroller of The City of New York, shall be indorsed upon or annexed to each copy of such plans and profiles; and one copy of such plans and profiles, so approved, shall be filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York and the other copy shall be delivered to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company. Upon such plans and profiles being approved and filed as aforesaid, any and all alterations or changes in streets, avenues or public places, or in the grade or grades, width or widths thereof, and any and all modifications in or of the use of any existing street, avenue, highway or public place, or any part thereof, shown upon said plans and profiles, shall be deemed to have been duly authorized, and the map or plan of The City of New York shall be deemed to be changed accordingly, without any further act or proceeding by or on the part of The City of New York, or of any other board or public body thereof; the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall thereupon cause four copies of such plans and profiles to be made and filed, one in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, one in the office of the Corporation Counsel of said City, one in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan of said City and one in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx of said City.

Sec. 5. "Upon the adoption of such plans and profiles, the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company is hereby authorized to acquire by purchase or condemnation all lands or interest in lands, rights of way or easements, which may be necessary or required for its roadway and route altered or changed as hereinbefore provided, and to grant and convey to The City of New York by deed, in which the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Com-

pany shall join, all the right, title and interest of the said railroad companies or either of them, in and to any of the lands forming any part of the present route or roadway to be abandoned, as hereinbefore provided, and in consideration thereof and of the abolition, discontinuance and avoidance of the said grade crossings at Kingsbridge road, East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, Broadway, Corlear street, Tibbett avenue, West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, and West Two Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, The City of New York shall bear and pay to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railway Company, as acquired by it, the cost and expense of acquiring all such lands or interest in lands, rights of way or easements, as may be necessary or required for the roadway and route altered and changed as hereinbefore provided.

Sec. 6. "The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company shall, at its own expense, construct the necessary bridges and abutments required to abolish and discontinue said existing grade crossings at Depot place, Fordham road and East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, and to avoid grade crossings at Teunisson place, Exterior street and East One Hundred and Ninety-second street (if carried over the said tracks) and to avoid grade crossings at any other streets which may hereafter be lawfully opened and carried over the said tracks between Depot place and East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, and shall do all the work within its said leased lines at its own expense; The City of New York shall, at its own expense, make all necessary changes in streets, avenues or public places, and shall, at its own expense, acquire and construct all approaches to bridges, and pay all damages to buildings fronting on that portion of the street or avenue whose grades shall be changed in consequence of the provisions of this act, which damages shall be ascertained and awarded by the Board of Assessors of The City of New York. The said railroad company shall indemnify and save harmless the City from any rights, claims or liabilities which may arise by reason of, or be created by, contract between either the said railroad company or its lessors and any property-owner.

Sec. 7. "Nothing in this act contained shall have the effect of limiting or impairing, in any manner or to any extent, the existing rights, privileges or franchises of the railroad corporations, or either of them, mentioned in this act, or of depriving in any manner or to any extent such railroad corporations, or either of them, of the use and benefit of such rights, privileges and franchises, except in so far only as such rights, privileges or franchises shall be expressly limited or modified by this act. Upon the approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of any plans and profiles provided for in this act, The City of New York shall afford to such railroad corporations all such reasonable facilities as may be required to carry into effect the provisions of this act and any such plans and profiles, and the provisions of any instrument provided for in this act, and the proper officers and authorities of such City are hereby authorized, and it shall be the duty of such officers and authorities to take such appropriate action as may be necessary or reasonably required to carry out and into effect the provisions of this act, and any plans and profiles, and the provisions of any instrument provided for in this act. All sewers, water pipes, gas pipes, electric lines, wires, ducts or conduits, in or under the streets and avenues described in this act, or which may be in, under or over any streets or avenues shown on any such plans and profiles, shall be changed or relocated, in such manner and to such an extent as may be necessary or reasonably required to carry the provisions of this act, and any such plans and profiles, and the provisions of any such instrument into effect; but all such changes and relocations shall be made in a manner approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sec. 8. "The Comptroller of The City of New York shall, from time to time, when authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, without the concurrence or approval of any other board or public body, prepare and issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York for the purpose of bearing and paying the cost and expense of acquiring such lands or interest in lands, rights of way or easements as may be necessary or required for the new roadway and route of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, altered and changed as hereinbefore provided, and for the purpose of bearing and paying the cost and expense of making all necessary changes in streets, avenues or public places, and of acquiring and constructing all approaches to bridges, and for such damages to buildings by reason of change of grade as may be awarded by the Board of Assessors.

Sec. 9. "The said plans and profiles for abolishing, discontinuing and avoiding the grade crossings at Kingsbridge road, East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, Broadway, Corlear street, Tibbett avenue, West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and West Two Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, shall show the grade or elevation of the new route of the altered or changed portion of the roadway of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad, and of the bridge or bridges by which the same shall cross the Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil creek; and the construction and maintenance of such bridge or bridges by the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, or by its lessee, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, is hereby authorized. Such bridges, or either thereof, may be either a fixed bridge or a drawbridge, and if a drawbridge, shall not be required to be opened except within or during such hours and for such purposes as may be prescribed by lawful authority of the United States.

Sec. 10. "Chapter five hundred and sixteen of the Laws of nineteen hundred and one is hereby repealed; and the provisions of any acts and parts of acts, including the Greater New York Charter, which are inconsistent with this act, and in so far only as they are inconsistent with this act, shall have no application to the rights, powers and obligations conferred or created by or under authority of this act, or to any proceedings taken thereunder.

Sec. 11. "This act shall take effect immediately."

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held on the 4th day of December, 1903, approved of the plans and profiles submitted by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, the lessee of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, and of the New York and Putnam Railroad Company, and adopted the following resolution by a majority of the votes in said Board:

"Resolved, That the plans and profiles for abolishing, discontinuing and avoiding the grade crossings at Kingsbridge road, East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street, Broadway, Corlear street, Tibbett avenue, West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and West Two Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, of the tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, submitted in duplicate to this Board by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, lessee, on the 21st day of October, 1903, pursuant to chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903, which took effect on the 7th day of May, 1903, be and the same are hereby approved."

A copy of the resolution, duly certified by the Mayor and Comptroller of The City of New York, was indorsed upon or annexed to each copy of such plans and profiles, and one copy of such plans and profiles so approved is now on file in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, and the other copy was delivered to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, as provided by section 4 of the act.

The change of route of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad will be of inestimable benefit, both to the railroad company and to The City of New York.

To the railroad company for the following reasons:

- 1st. It will shorten the route by two-thirds of a mile, making a saving in running time and in the cost of operation.
- 2d. The cost of maintaining gates at grade crossings will be saved.
- 3d. The heavy curves will be eliminated, with a saving of cost of wear and tear on rolling stock.
- 4th. The damage resulting from accidents at grade crossings will be avoided.
- 5th. The cost of constructing overhead crossings, of which, under the Railroad Law, the railroad is compelled to pay 50 per cent., will be saved.

To The City of New York for the following reasons:

- 1st. The expenses under the Railroad Law which the City would incur by the seven overhead crossings will be avoided.
- 2d. The consequential damages to property-owners in the change of grade arising by reason of the overhead crossings will not be incurred.
- 3d. The abolishing of the grade crossings will develop and enhance the value of property in the vicinity, and improvements of more or less extensive character will be made.
- 4th. The rearranging of the sewerage system of this section by the change of roadbed and the expense thereof will not be required.

The first estimate of the cost to the City, made in 1902 under the first act of the Legislature (chapter 516 of the Laws of 1901), was the sum of \$437,850 for the real estate necessary to be acquired to make the change of roadway, as follows:

A subsequent estimate of the cost to the City was given in a letter from Ira A. Place, Esq., General Attorney for the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, to the Hon. Seth Low, Mayor of The City of New York, under date of January 21, 1903, as follows:

These calculations, however, were based upon the plan of a drawbridge instead of a solid bridge across Spuyten Duyvil creek by the railroad company and for the consents of the other property-owners to the construction of the drawbridge which might be termed easements. The Hon. John Whalen, former Corporation Counsel, in an opinion to the Department of Docks, dated March 15, 1899, states:

"The private parties holding grants from the State and the City are entitled to access to their property upon such creek (meaning Spuyten Duyvil creek), and are also entitled to use and improve the same for commercial purposes, in accordance with the law. Any improvement which contemplates the closing of this portion of said creek would necessitate the payment of damages to private owners for destruction of their property rights. In carrying into effect (meaning the closing of the Spuyten Duyvil creek) that portion of the creek northerly of such plan would be entirely shut off from access to the Harlem ship canal and closed, and any property-owners whose property rights would be destroyed thereby would be entitled to compensation therefor. If the Board of Docks should adopt a plan for the improvement of the water front, with drawbridges across the Spuyten Duyvil creek to the bulkhead line, adopted by the Secretary of War, no damages would result to property-owners along such portions of said creek."

The first proposition required the City to purchase and turn over to the railroad company about 228 city lots. Under section 9 of the Act the railroad company insists upon a solid bridge, which destroys the value of the water privileges on both sides of the Spuyten Duyvil creek, from the Harlem river ship canal around to the old King's bridge at Kingsbridge avenue.

Under this proposition the closing of the creek for commercial purposes meant the payment of damages to property-owners for the destruction of their property rights. In other words, it practically necessitated the acquisition of all the property abutting upon the west branch of the Spuyten Duyvil creek north of the Harlem river ship canal, since it is cheaper to buy such land than to pay the damages caused by the solid bridge, and the number of lots necessary to be acquired was increased to 595, and the estimated cost was increased to \$959,650, as follows:

I understand that the railroad company has acquired all of the properties above mentioned, and have been informed by Mr. Place that the figures paid, including carrying charges and examination of title, amount to \$984,380.61. In addition, they will have to obtain a release of the riparian rights of both the State and City of New York in Spuyten Duyvil creek north of the United States bulkhead line, as last established by the United States Government, and also a release of such rights from the Government by an Act of Congress.

The difference in the valuations as made by this office and the amounts paid by the railroad company were discussed at a meeting between the representative of the railroad company and the Finance Department, and it was thought advisable to obtain an opinion from an outside expert. The report returned showed that we were low in the value of the properties in question, the total value of the real estate being appraised at \$934,650, an increase over our figures of \$42,150, but less than the railroad company's price by \$25,000, or about 2½ per cent. on the cost of land, exclusive of carrying charges.

After another meeting, held in the Finance Department, the report of the expert having been presented, the figures presented by the representative of the railroad company were as follows:

The representative of the company then agreed to split the difference, and we are able to report that the City is in a position to purchase all such lands, rights of way and easements as may be necessary and required for the roadway and route altered (excepting so much of the roadway as is owned by the City, either land under water or streets to be discontinued) for \$600,000, provided that the railroad company itself enter into certain obligations with the property-owners, which it is willing to do, on the understanding that authority shall be obtained from the Legislature to perfect the title of the City to the lands under the waters of the Harlem river and Spuyten Duyvil creek, forming a part of the roadway, and between the roadway and Farmer's Bridge on the Harlem river and Kingsbridge on the Spuyten Duyvil creek, and that upon such title being perfected the City convey all such lands under water, above specified, for which the company agrees to pay or cause to be paid the sum of \$50,000, and in addition thereto, as requested by the act, it is stipulated that the railroad company shall deed to the City, free of cost, the present railroad property roadbed between the southerly side of East Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and extending around to a point near the intersection of the said Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad, with the proposed extension along the ship canal, covering approximately an area of 93 full city lots and worth upon a liberal allowance \$100,000.

I am informed that the railroad company does not intend to give a warranty deed of this property. It will therefore be necessary to have the title examined, in order to establish the fact as to whether the railroad company owns this roadbed in fee, or whether, when the route is discontinued, the fee title would vest in The City of New York or in the adjacent property-owners. This examination should be made before the City expends any money for the purchase of the new right of way for the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, and the cost and expenses of the examination of the same should be paid by the railroad company if it is found that the railroad company has not a good and marketable title to the property in question.

Section 2 of the act herein recited requires the discontinuance and closing of part of Teunisson place and part of Exterior street and part of East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, and the conveying to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company by the City of all right, title and interest of the City in and to said discontinued portions of said streets, subject to the right of the City to construct and maintain all necessary sewers therein.

The survey, map and certificate of the alteration or change of the route of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad were approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 19th day of June, 1903, and the plans and profiles for abolishing the grade crossings at Kingsbridge road, East One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Broadway, Corlear street, Tibbett avenue, West Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and West Two Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, were approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 4th day of December, 1903.

The saving to the City in the cost of construction of seven overhead street crossings above mentioned has been roughly estimated at \$350,000, but this item, I am informed by Chief Engineer Josiah A. Briggs, of the Borough of The Bronx, should be reduced to at least \$330,000. Another item of saving to the City would be for consequential damages to property-owners, because of bridges and overhead crossings, which also has been roughly estimated at \$170,000.

Section 5 of the act provides that, upon the adoption of such plans and profiles, "The City of New York shall bear and pay to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company as acquired by it, the cost and expense of acquiring all such lands or interests in lands, rights of way or easements as may be necessary or required for the roadway and route altered and changed, as hereinbefore provided."

In considering all of these properties, I think they should be considered in the final estimate as a whole proposition, as if they were owned by one individual and not by individuals, and the amount named as the amount of money that the City should pay for the property to be acquired for the railroad company for railroad purposes and for the easements, is reasonable and just, and I respectfully recommend the payment by the City, to reimburse the railroad company for the amount of money for the new right of way, the sum of \$600,000 upon the delivery of a deed, properly acknowledged ready for recording, of all the property belonging to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, in the present roadbed abandoned by said road for the new right of way, in accordance with the provisions of the act.

I would further respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution approving this transaction, and authorize the Comptroller to enter into an agreement with the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, for the carrying out of the provisions of the act, and that authority be given to the Comptroller, under section 8 of the act, to prepare and issue Corporate Stock of the City for this purpose.

Whereas, The said changes and improvements involve important interests of The City of New York and of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, and of its lessee, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, which have been the subject of negotiations between their several officers, agents and representatives; and

Whereas, It has been agreed, that under chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903, the sum of six hundred thousand dollars is the cost and expense of acquiring all such lands or interests in lands, rights of way or easements as are necessary or required for the roadway and route altered and changed as in said act provided, to be paid therefor by The City of New York to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, and that under chapter 615 of the Laws of 1904, fifty thousand dollars is the proper sum to be paid by the said railroad company or by such persons as it may designate, to The City of New York, for all of the property, right, title and interest which it, The City of New York, now has and all that it may hereafter acquire under authority of chapter 615 of the Laws of 1904, of, in and to any of the lands now or originally under the waters of the Spuyten Duyvil Creek, between the northerly Harlem river pier and bulkhead-line as now established, and Kings Bridge, and also of, in and to any of the lands under the waters of the Harlem river, between the northerly Harlem river pier and bulkhead-line as now established, and Farmers' Bridge; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the acquisition by the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company of all such lands or interests in lands, rights of way or easements as may be necessary or required for the roadway and route of the said railroad company as altered or changed, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903, for the sum of six hundred thousand dollars be and the same is hereby approved, upon condition, however, that the said Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company shall accept

the said sum of six hundred thousand dollars in full payment and satisfaction of all and every obligation on the part of The City of New York, and of the provisions of the said act or otherwise to hear and pay to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, as acquired by it, the cost and expense of acquiring all such lands or interests in lands, rights of way or easements as may be necessary or required for the roadway and route, altered and changed as in said act provided, and upon payment of the said sum of six hundred thousand dollars that the said railroad company shall by proper instrument in writing give to the City a receipt in full and release The City of New York from all and every obligation to make any further payment therefor; and upon the further condition that upon a grant and conveyance being made by The City of New York to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, or to such person or corporation as it shall designate, of all of the property, right, title and interest which it, The City of New York, now has and all that it may hereafter acquire under authority of chapter 615 of the Laws of 1904 of, in and to any of the lands now or originally under the waters of the Spuyten Duyvil Creek, between the northerly Harlem river pier and bulkhead-line, as now established, and Kings Bridge, and also of, in and to any of the lands now or originally under the waters of the Harlem river, between the northerly Harlem river pier and bulkhead-line, as now established, and Farmers' Bridge, the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company shall pay or cause to be paid to The City of New York the sum of fifty thousand dollars; and be it further

Resolved, That the said sum of six hundred thousand (\$600,000) dollars be paid to the said Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company as follows: Five hundred and fifty thousand (\$550,000) dollars thereof in cash, and fifty thousand (\$50,000) dollars thereof by the grant or grants of the said property, right, title and interest of The City of New York of, in and to the lands now or originally under the waters of the Spuyten Duyvil Creek and of the Harlem river above specified to the said Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, or to such corporation as it may designate, under the provisions of chapter 615 of the Laws of 1904; and be it further

Resolved, That the Comptroller of The City of New York be and he is hereby authorized to prepare and issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of five hundred and fifty thousand (\$550,000) dollars for the purpose of bearing and paying that amount of the cost and expense of acquiring said lands and interest in lands, rights of way or easements, the same being necessary or required for the new roadway and route of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, altered and changed, as provided in chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903, and the Comptroller is authorized to pay the said sum of five hundred and fifty thousand (\$550,000) dollars to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, under the terms and conditions of this resolution, and of the statutes therein referred to; and be it further

Resolved, That before the said amount shall be paid by The City of New York a sufficient agreement shall be executed on the part of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, in form satisfactory to the Corporation Counsel, to grant and convey all its right, title and interest in and to any of the lands forming any part of its present route or roadway to be abandoned as provided in chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903; and be it further

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is requested to take such steps as may be proper to secure, under chapter 615 of the Laws of 1904, a grant, conveyance or patent from the State of New York of the lands under water, therein authorized and directed to be so granted or conveyed, and to prepare and approve as to form proper conveyances of the land under water authorized by the resolutions and the statutes therein referred to to be conveyed to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company, or such person or corporation as it may designate; and be it further

Resolved, That this resolution be and the same hereby is declared to be without prejudice to any action that may hereafter be taken under the provisions of section 2 of chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903.

Hon. GEORGE CROMWELL:

HONORABLE AND DEAR SIR—At our last meeting you asked me when I thought the appropriation of \$25,000 would be needed. I promised to write to you. I will now advise you to get it as quickly as possible, as the portion of building we are now erecting has the roof blocks in position, main corner set, and tiling of roof will be started just as soon as we can get the copper gutters in. Three cars of the cell work have been shipped from St. Louis, one on April 1, one on April 5 and one on April 12. The fireproof filling of the first tier will be put in this week, and then the erecting of cells can be started as soon as they arrive. As the cells have all been erected and fitted at the mill before being shipped, they can be erected very quickly. The wall of the entire easterly side of jail is built the entire length about three feet high, and the footings are in the entire length of the opposite side; so it will be a very short time after we get the old jail down before we will be ready for the window guards, and I do not think a satisfactory job can be done by putting the guards in afterwards, as they should be built in at least nine inches in the walls at either end. Taking the time required for advertisement, making contracts, etc., I do not think we have any time to waste.

Hon. GEORGE CROMWELL:

HONORABLE AND DEAR SIR—I submit herewith a statement showing in detail the actual difference between the jail building for the Borough of Richmond, as shown by the sketches, on which the appropriation was made and on which original price was based, and the finished working plans. A great many of these changes were demanded by the State Commission, for whom the plans were altered before being finally approved by them.

A few changes were added to bring the building up to the requirements of the Building Law and to complete details impossible to work out on sketches. Increasing the size of cells meant increasing the size of the building, and the double steel partition across each story to form the requisite classifications, together with the kalamined windows and the additions to the locking device, entailed a heavy expense.

The Board gave a public hearing on suggestions for Rapid Transit extensions submitted to the Board at the previous meeting by the Committee on Plans.

James L. Wells, W. W. Niles, A. C. Hottenroth, N. A. Gumbleton, representing President Haffen of The Bronx, and Samuel Marks spoke for the North Side Board of Trade and the Taxpayers' Alliance urging various extensions in The Bronx.

W. M. K. Olcott, representing the West Side Rapid Transit Association, thought the proposed offer of the Metropolitan interests ought to be favored by the Board in case a contract should be awarded, because of the extensive system of transfers offered.

John E. Eustis, W. D. Peck and Fordham Morris spoke on behalf of the Bronx West Side Association, advocating proposed Jerome avenue extension.

Alderman Peter A. Shields advocated an extension to the City line.
Frederick Uhlmann and David Steckler, representing the East Side Rapid Transit Association of Manhattan and The Bronx, approved the routes laid out by the Committee on Plans.

F. Kingsbury Curtis, representing Schmidt & Gallatin, owners of the proposed continuous train system, made the following statement:

PROPOSITION OF MESSRS. SCHMIDT & GALLATIN OFFERING TO BID FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND OPERATION OF A SUBWAY EQUIPPED WITH MOVING PLATFORMS UNDER THIRTY-FOURTH STREET, EXTENDING FROM SECOND AVENUE TO NINTH AVENUE, AS PRESENTED ORALLY BY THEIR COUNSEL, F. KINGSBURY CURTIS, OF CURTIS, MALLETT-PREVOST & COLT, MAY 12, 1904.

Mr. President and Members of the Board:

Messrs. Schmidt & Gallatin wish to have your attention formally called to two routes which have heretofore been suggested in letters addressed by them to this Board.

The first route which they suggested for moving platforms, to wit, from the Brooklyn terminus of the Williamsburgh Bridge, across said bridge to the Manhattan terminus, and thence to the Battery, is still under consideration by the Commission, and we renew our request that the Commission consider and locate such a route, in addition to those already reported by your Committee on Plans.

Your Chief Engineer has already favorably reported on this route, and we understand it has been referred to the Committee on Plans for its action, and we are urging before that Committee the definite recommendation of the route applied for.

To-day we invite the attention of the Commission only to the second route suggested for moving platforms, namely, the route as described in the letter of Messrs. Schmidt & Gallatin, dated May 4, 1904, addressed to your Commission, applying for the location of a subway for moving platforms under Thirty-fourth street, from Ninth avenue to Second avenue.

Conditions on Thirty-fourth Street and Route Proposed by the Committee on Plans.
The large increase of street travel at the junction of Thirty-fourth street, Sixth avenue and Broadway, is at present chiefly due to the department stores which have located at this point.

After the completion of the Pennsylvania Railroad Station and the new Post Office, Thirty-fourth street will become one of the most congested thoroughfares in the world.

It is estimated by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company that more than six hundred passengers per minute, during certain portions of the day, will arrive at, or depart from, this station. Special provision must be made to handle such vast crowds.

A main entrance of the railroad station for foot passengers is located on Thirty-fourth street, near Eighth avenue, on purchased property. Nevertheless, no direct connection between this entrance and the Rapid Transit routes has been thus provided.

When a subway on Broadway, from Forty-second street south, was recently under consideration, a short independent tunnel under Thirty-fourth street, from Broadway to Eighth avenue, was proposed, to connect this subway with the Pennsylvania station. Such a tunnel was to accommodate exclusively the enormous traffic which this railroad station would create.

The tunnel, as designed, was to be equipped with moving platforms. The engineers considered the ordinary methods of train service entirely inadequate to handle such extraordinary traffic.

How can it be expected that this same traffic can be cared for, not by a special tunnel equipped with a continuous train, but by the intermittent trains of one north and south line. Such trains, on reaching the railroad station, will, during rush hours, be burdened already to their full capacity with local City traffic. If such trains attempt to take on the additional railroad passengers coming from across the Hudson river and from Long Island, it is certain that the plan must result in failure and in great public inconvenience.

Proposition of Messrs. Schmidt & Gallatin.

As a solution of this difficulty, we have proposed a plan which is broad and comprehensive, and we invite the fullest examination of it by the traffic experts of your Board.

We propose that the subway at Thirty-fourth street, as suggested by the Committee, shall be extended west to Ninth avenue and east to Second avenue, and that it shall be equipped with the moving platforms or continuous train. In other words, we propose to establish under this important street what may be termed a moving terminal for the continuous collection and distribution of passengers from and to all the intersecting north and south lines.

Following your plan to invite bids for the new rapid transit routes in sections, we will cause a bid to be made for the construction and operation of a subway on Thirty-fourth street equipped with a continuous train, and we will agree as follows:

For a single fare of five cents, we will transport passengers, or cause them to be transported, from any point on the moving platform route to any point in Manhattan or Brooklyn reached by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, whether by its elevated or its subway lines. We will also carry over our route, without additional fare, passengers in transit from any one to any other of the Interborough Company's lines, provided only that the journey of such passengers shall be continued in the original direction. This will enable a passenger, for a fare of five cents, to ride from the Pennsylvania station and all points on Thirty-fourth street, via our platform and the Interborough lines, to all points on said lines in Manhattan and Brooklyn and The Bronx, and vice versa.

Details of Location.

We understand that it is the intention of the Commission to lay out, at some future time, an additional north and south rapid transit route under Broadway, and still another under Eighth avenue. We also understand that where a crosstown line, such as we propose, will intersect these projected routes, a space of twenty feet in depth immediately below the street surface must be kept clear for such future subway construction.

We have been guided by this ruling in laying out the preliminary profile of the Thirty-fourth street line, which profile we submit to the Commission for its consideration. By introducing ten-per-cent. grades (which are perfectly feasible in our system), we shall be able to comply with this ruling and still be next the surface at all other points.

Owing to local conditions, we nevertheless suggest that at Broadway, the Thirty-fourth street crosstown line be laid next to the surface, for the reason that it could be made to afford to the general public a safe means of walking in a subway from one side of the avenue to the other. An under-ground crossing at the junction of Broadway, Sixth avenue and Thirty-fourth street, has become a public necessity. By adding about eight feet in width to each side of the crosstown station which we would build at this point, such an under-ground passageway could be obtained and the use thereof be made free to the public at all times.

If necessary or desirable, Fifty-ninth street, or any other suitable street, could be used to connect the west side route proposed by the Committee, with the east side route. This would leave Thirty-fourth street available for a separate link and avoid the

many engineering and practical difficulties of a railroad junction at Lexington avenue and Thirty-fourth street.

The necessity of crosstown transit is so great that, in our opinion, it will be a matter of only a short time when subways under Fourteenth street, Twenty-third and Fifty-ninth streets will be required for this purpose, and when, also, such a connecting subway will be demanded under Grand street and connecting that thoroughfare with the East river bridges.

Then the Board heard one representative from each of the following Brooklyn associations:

Citizens' Association of Bay Ridge and Fort Hamilton,
South Brooklyn Board of Trade,
West End Board of Trade,
Dyker Heights Citizens' Association,
Improvement League of the Thirtieth Ward,
—all approving the proposed South Brooklyn line out Fourth avenue.

Alexander Hadden, M. D., and D. J. MacDonald, M. D., representing the Citizens' East Side Improvement Association; George B. Christman and Henry G. Wynn, representing the United Real Estate Owners' Association; August Wiggers, of the House and Real Estate Owners' Association of the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards; Walter M. Messerole, of the Taxpayers' Association of the Tenth, Eleventh and Seventeenth Wards; and Charles J. F. Bohlen spoke in favor of a First Avenue Line, as opposed to one on Lexington avenue. S. Feust, South Bronx Property Owners' Association, also favored a First Avenue Line.

Jefferson M. Levy spoke in favor of Seventh avenue. John O'Donnell asked for rapid transit for Queens Borough.

Mr. Schreiber, Twenty-eighth Ward Board of Trade, Brooklyn; Albert Firmin, of the same organization; C. M. Sheehan, George M. Schinzel, E. S. Piper and D. J. O'Connell, representing the Allied Board of Trade of Brooklyn, composed of the Broadway Board of Trade, the Twenty-eighth Ward Board of Trade, the Twenty-sixth Ward Board of Trade, the Ridgewood Board of Trade, and the Twenty-eighth Ward Taxpayers' Association, urged an extension out Broadway, Brooklyn, to East New York.

M. Alexander Husson spoke in favor of an extension of Westchester Village and Clason Point.

Joseph L. O'Brien, of the Harlem Property Owners' Association, thought First avenue impracticable for subway on account of proximity to water level.

Michael J. Carter advocated the Broadway, Brooklyn, extension.

The minutes of the preceding meeting, that of the 28th of April, 1904, were read and it was moved that they be approved.

MY DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 29th ult., informing this company that the Commission would authorize the extension of the section of the Rapid Transit Road, from Kingsbridge to Van Cortlandt Park, lying between Two Hundred and Thirtieth street and Broadway and a point about 288 feet north of Two Hundred and Forty-second street and Broadway, provided the Interborough Rapid Transit Company would build the same, substantially at its own expense.

The matter has been laid before our Board, and I was authorized to forward to you a copy of Mr. John B. McDonald's letter of July 21, 1902, to your Board, written at the time the Subway Construction Company bid for the contract for extending the Subway from City Hall to Flatbush avenue, Brooklyn. I have been requested to call your attention to the sole and only reason therein given for the offer on the part of the Subway Construction Company to build the extension practically with its own means, and to state that the company does not feel justified, under the circumstances, in making a similar offer in this instance.

The location of an extension up Bailey avenue was not, from the outset, considered to be conclusive, inasmuch as the advantages of this route were more or less dependent upon a connection with the Putnam Road. This connection we have been unable to effect, although negotiations to this end were conducted with the New York Central Company for a long time, and everything possible done to bring it about. On the other hand, in asking for an extension up Broadway, we have in view a logical objective point, which we believe to be greatly in the interest of the traveling public as well as the unification of the system in general, and we do not think, therefore, that the law under which the present Subway is being built should be departed from in constructing what is virtually a substitute for the Bailey avenue extension.

I have requested Mr. McDonald to take the matter up with the Commission as a part of his original contract.

Letter of Schmidt & Gallatin, of the 4th of May, as to proposed continuous train on Thirty-fourth street, was presented, as follows, and referred to the Committee on Plans:

Rapid Transit Railroad Commission, No. 320 Broadway, New York:

GENTLEMEN—With reference to the proposed new Rapid Transit Subway routes which your Committee on Plans reported at your meeting of April 28, we understand that it is your intention to let out the contracts in sections and that one of such sections will be the proposed subway on Thirty-fourth street, between Seventh and Lexington avenues.

We offer the following suggestions with regard to the proposed routes:

First—That the subway on Thirty-fourth street be extended west to Ninth avenue and East to second avenue.

Second—That the specifications be so drawn as not to debar the moving platforms or continuous trains from operating in said subway or other similar routes.

We make these suggestions for the following reasons:

1. After the completion of the Pennsylvania Railroad Station, Thirty-fourth street will become one of the most congested thoroughfares in the City.

2. We are informed that the main entrance of the station will be on Thirty-fourth street west of Seventh avenue, which point is not reached by either of the routes proposed by your Committee.

3. The ordinary train service in one north and south subway will be entirely inadequate to handle the enormous traffic which must be expected at this point. It will be still more inadequate, if such traffic is added at a way-station of a through north and south line, which apparently will be the actual situation.

4. A subway passing the main entrance of the Pennsylvania Railroad Station on Thirty-fourth street and equipped with the continuous train, would become the general distributor of the passengers arriving at said station and would deliver them continuously to every intersecting north and south line.

5. On account of gradients it does not seem practicable to lay out a route which will permit a crossing below and under the Rapid Transit Subway at the intersection of Thirty-fourth street and Park avenue by a railroad equipped with ordinary passenger trains.

6. If equipped with the continuous train or moving platforms, owing to their ability to operate steep gradients which other railroads cannot, the proposed crossing becomes practicable.

7. If the equipment of moving platforms is included in the specifications as suggested, we shall be prepared to enter a bid for said route, and offer traffic arrangements to the other transportation companies at points of intersection.

The President reported on behalf of the Committee on Contracts that it had had a meeting, as authorized by the Board, on the above further application of Mr. McAduo, and that he desired to report progress.

Communication of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated the 2d of May, presenting three bills for expenses incurred by that Department in repairing break in 36-inch water-main, Broadway and Ninety-first street, was presented, together with report of the Corporation Counsel on the same, and a report of the Acting Chief Engineer, as follows:

GENTLEMEN—At the suggestion of the Hon. John J. DEAR SIR—I have your letter of May 9, enclosing letter from Commissioner John T. Oakley of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, also copy of a letter from the Corporation Counsel and three bills, all in reference to the break in the water-main which occurred last February at the corner of Ninety-first street and Broadway. I have sent a copy of the letter and bills to Mr. John B. McDonald, and would state that an examination was made by the Division Engineer on the day of the break, and in regard to which he states that this pipe was laid by Sub-Contractor William Bradley on December 16, 1901, and backfilled on that day; that it was connected with the old main and put in service on January 26, 1902; since that time it has been undisturbed. He also states that he has noticed the report made by Mr. Bull, and that the break was found and examined by him on the afternoon of the day on which the break occurred; he further states that he believes it was impossible to tell whether there was a block under the pipe or not, and as it was a short piece of pipe only 8½ feet long, it is more than probable that there was blocking at least under the next joint only a short distance away from where this pipe rested on the sewer.

This pipe was laid under the direction of an Inspector who was one of the most careful men on the work, who was very familiar with pipe laying and was very exacting with the contractors. The Division Engineer states that he was led to believe that every precaution was taken in laying this main.

Hon. JOHN T. OAKLEY, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

SIR—I am in due receipt of your communication bearing date 21st March, as follows:

"On February 19, 1904, a telephone call was received at one of the Department Repair Company's Stations, advising that there was a leak at Broadway, near Ninety-first street. A force of men was sent immediately to make an examination and to shut off the water-mains at that point. After excavating for a few days the break in the pipe was finally located, and the following is a copy of report by Assistant Engineer, Charles H. Bull, of the conditions found.

"When this broken water-main was uncovered it was found that the Rapid Transit contractor, William Bradley, in relaying this main had placed no bed blocks and wedges under the main on each side of the broken piece, and under the broken piece there was only the thin edge of the wedge which lay hard upon the brick sewer. It was necessary to cut away the top of the sewer to relay the 36-inch broken piece. Two joints on the 36-inch main at the north of the broken piece on the straight pipe were drawn out and had to be recaulked. This indicated serious settlement in the main.

There were no bed blocks, wedges or braces of any kind under the 20-inch high service main, which is adjacent to the 36-inch main on the east. The joints were found started on this line, also, and were recaulked, although this line did not break."

"The water from this break caused considerable damage to property near this location. A new piece of pipe was inserted by the employees of this Department. The question now before the Department is whether William Bradley, a sub-contractor in charge on the construction of the Rapid Transit at that location, is responsible for the damage done, and whether this Department can properly render a bill to him for the cost of the new pipe that was set and charge for labor and other materials that were furnished.

"The Engineer quotes in another report the following clauses which are contained in the contract for the construction and operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad:

"On page 150 of the contract for the construction and operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad I find the following: "The contractor shall at all times, by suitable bridging or other supports, maintain and support, in entirely safe condition for their usual service and to the reasonable satisfaction of the owners, all elevated railroad structures, street tramways of whatever character, water and gas mains, steam pipes, etc." Also on page 159: "Any inefficient or imperfect work which may be discovered before the final acceptance of the work shall be corrected immediately, upon the requirement of the Engineer, notwithstanding that it may have been overlooked by the proper Inspector." Also, on page 160: "In all the work of whatever kind, which during its progress and before its final acceptance shall become damaged from any cause, so much of it as may be objectionable shall be broken up or removed and be replaced by good, sound work."

Accompanying the communication is a copy of a letter from Mr. Nicholas S. Hill, Chief Engineer of your Department, to Mr. William Barclay Parsons, Chief Engineer of the Rapid Transit Commission, stating that the sub-contractor, William Bradley, disclaims the responsibility in the matter, for the reason that the pipe work at that location had been accepted by the City.

Mr. Hill states that this is untrue, and asks Mr. Parsons whether he has accepted the mains at the place in question, to which query Mr. Parsons replies in the negative.

Before proceeding further in the matter and to avoid litigation, I advise that you present a claim for the work in question, together with the facts which you have stated to me in your communication, to the Rapid Transit Commission for their action.

This course has been found several times to be productive of good results.

If the Rapid Transit Commission neglects or refuses to act, then I ask you to communicate with me further.

Report of the Acting Chief Engineer on the matter of vaults of Luyties Brothers at the Brooklyn Bridge was presented, as follows:

DEAR SIR—In accordance with the resolution of the Board, adopted April 14, 1904, I beg to report that arrangements were made to-day with Mr. Henry E. G. Luyties, of Luyties Brothers, for the occupation of their vault at the Brooklyn Bridge station.

Messrs. Luyties Brothers will charge the sum of \$500 in consideration of the interruption to their business, and the Commission agrees that there will be a brick partition wall built in the vaults at a sufficient distance from the work of the Rapid Transit Railroad so as to allow this work to proceed without any interference to the business of Luyties Brothers in any other part of the cellar, and there is also to be a temporary partition wall built in the arch openings connecting the side arches of that portion of the vaults to be used for Rapid Transit purposes. They have also requested that a ventilating louvre be placed in the partition wall each side of the stairway leading from the Rapid Transit station to the Brooklyn Bridge promenade. It is also understood that on the beams carrying the floor of the bridge, as shown on the drawing, vault lights are to be constructed. It is also agreed that the work of making these changes is to be completed within six months after it shall have been begun, and that Luyties Brothers will remove their property from the vault when requested to do so, and that the temporary partition walls are to be removed after work has been completed by the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission. It is also understood that Luyties Brothers do not relinquish any claim that they may have for injuries or damage resulting from the construction of the work.

This arrangement I think is a satisfactory one, and I beg to request your approval of the same.

The report of the Acting Chief Engineer on condition of the work in Joralemon street was presented as follows:

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

DEAR SIR—The work of constructing the tunnel on Joralemon street has been in progress for several months, and the contractor, in the pushing of the shield under the surface of the street has appreciably settled the buildings on the main line of the work as far as he has gone. It is noticeable, however, that after the passage of the shield in front of a house the settlement on the surface stops entirely. The work now is progressing only on the north shield, which is at the present time in the centre of Hicks street on Joralemon street. The south shield has stopped work on account of the serious trouble with water, and is directly in front of Borough President Littleton's house on Joralemon street. The only houses which have shown an appreciable movement within the last two months are those at the intersection of Hicks street and Joralemon street. Of the four houses at the intersection of these two streets, No. 80 is in the worst condition. This is a flat apartment house which was ordered shored by the Building Department on March 24, 1904, and the shoring was done by the owner on April 6. Since then the north shield has resumed its advance and some additional movement was noticed in the house. Nothing serious has occurred there, however, and in a few days, if the same rate of advance is kept up, the north shield will have reached a point beyond which its influence will not be felt by this building. The south shield has already passed this point.

We have heard that the Building Department's Inspector was to send notices to the tenants to vacate these premises, as the house was not considered to be safe, but we have no official knowledge that this was done. I do not think, however, that as long as the shoring is carefully watched there is any danger to this building.

The house at the northeast corner of Hicks street has moved very little, and the cracks so far shown in the house are of little or no structural importance.

The house at the southwest corner of Hicks street belongs to the Packard Estate, and was lately occupied by Mr. Martin W. Littleton, the Borough President. The operation of the south shield affected this house, causing some vertical cracks in the east face. The south shield has been idle since May 3, and no further movement of the

house may be expected until it resumes work or until the north shield is further advanced. Some shores have been placed against this house, under direction, I believe, of the owners. I do not think that this precaution was necessary, as the house is not in an unsafe condition, but they surely will do no harm.

The house on the northwest corner of Hicks and Joralemon streets shows no movement.

The settlement of this street is caused by the contractors being unable to hold the ground above the tunnel on account of the very loose material encountered in the construction of the work, being now at a level where water is encountered. They have had serious trouble with the south shield, but they are, so far, not having the same trouble as they did with the north shield. Should the shield settle as it did in the south tunnel I think the work should be stopped, as it would prove that the present method is not the proper one to follow.

Sir—Pursuant to the requirements of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments submit the following report of the operations and actions of the Department for the quarter ending March 31, 1904.

Under chapter 454 of the Laws of 1903, section 889 of the Charter was amended to read as follows:

Section 889. "It shall be the duty of the Deputy Tax Commissioners, under the direction of the Board of Taxes and Assessments, to assess all the taxable property in the several districts that may be assigned to them for that purpose by said Board, and they shall furnish to the said Board, under oath, a detailed statement of all such property, showing that said Deputies have personally examined each and every house, building, lot, pier or other assessable property, giving the street, lot, ward, town and map number of such real estate embraced within said districts, together with the name of the owner or occupant, if known; also the sum for which, in their judgment, each separately assessed parcel of real estate under ordinary circumstances would sell if it were wholly unimproved; and separately stated the sum for which, under ordinary circumstances, the same parcel of real estate would sell with the improvements, if any, thereon; with such other information in detail relative to personal property or otherwise, as the Board may, from time to time, require. Such Deputies shall commence to assess real and personal estate on the first Tuesday in September in each and every year."

The amended portion of the section is underscored.

The new requirements have imposed additional labor on the Deputies and the results, with few exceptions, show faithful compliance with the law.

It is too early to form any conclusion as to the practical value of the new system of assessing real estate, based on the value of the land, if wholly unimproved, and its value with the improvements, if any, thereon. The hearings on applications filed for reduction of assessments may afford sufficient data to enable the Board, in the July report, to speak advisedly on the general operation of the law.

The books of annual record, as provided in section 892 of the Charter, were opened in the several boroughs on the second Monday of January, and remained open for public inspection, examination and correction until April 1, on which day they were closed, to enable the Board of Taxes and Assessments to prepare assessment rolls of the several boroughs for delivery to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July, as required by law.

REAL ESTATE BUREAU.

The following statements show the assessed valuation of real estate by sections or wards in the several boroughs at the opening of the books of annual record on the second Monday of January, 1904, as compared with the assessed valuation shown on the same day in 1903.

The valuations given, with the exception of those relating to special franchises, are subject to such corrections as may be legally made on applications filed prior to April 1. The assessed valuations of special franchises being fixed by the State Board of Tax Commissioners, are entered as of March 31, 1904, and are not subject to any corrections by the local authorities.

SURVEYOR'S OFFICE.

The following summary shows the character of the work done in the Surveyor's office during the quarter ending March 31, 1904:

Lot Alterations.

Borough of Manhattan—Alterations were made affecting 240 lots in the 37 volumes of the Block Tax Assessment Maps.

Borough of The Bronx—Alterations were made affecting 650 lots in the 31 volumes of the Block Tax Assessment Maps and in the 6 volumes of Tentative Maps.

Borough of Brooklyn—Alterations were made affecting 457 lots in the 48 volumes of Block Tax Assessment Maps and in the 35 volumes of Tentative Maps.

Borough of Queens—Alterations were made affecting 502 lots in the 31 volumes of Tentative Maps.

Borough of Richmond—Alterations were made affecting 164 lots in the 13 volumes of Tentative Maps.

The duplicate copies of the Tax Maps used by the Deputy Tax Commissioners in all the boroughs, the copies of the Block Tax Assessment Maps in the offices of the Bureau of Arrears and Water Registrar in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, the copies of sections 1 to 4 in the Bureau of Arrears and sections 7 to 12 in the office of the Water Registrar in the Borough of Brooklyn were corrected to correspond with the alterations made on the original maps.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
