BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Sewer in Third Avenue.

The assessment list for sewer in Third avenue, between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, and objections of John T. Nagle et al., filed by Walter H. Martin, attorney; Albert E. Smith, filed by Abraham J. BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

Report for the Quarter Ending June 30, 1909.

New York, July 1, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

SIR—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to present the following report for the past three months:

THE DEPARTMENT AS A WHOLE.

Reference was made in last quarter's report to the Trustee's request for the creation of the position of Hospital Clerk in the Department. This received the approval of the State Civil Service Commission and went into effect after the necessary action by the Board of Estimate and the Board of Aldermen, the various grades being fixed at \$900, \$720, \$600, \$540 and \$480 per annum with maintenance and the position being placed in the competitive class. At the same time the Municipal Civil Service Commission changed the position of Hospital Helper, making the maximum compensation \$480 per year, with maintenance, instead of \$720 as formerly. A special clerk was appointed to have supervision of the pay-roll, the adjustment of the various grades of positions to the budget allowance presenting many cases of difficulty.

Among the new positions asked for by the Board of Trustees the following have been favorably reported upon and recommended by the Board of Estimate:—X-Ray photographer at \$1,800 per annum instead of \$1,200, as granted at first; Plumber; Automobile Engineer; \$1,200; Head Bookkeeper at \$3,000; Hospital Helper (Mechanic), \$480, \$540, \$600, \$750 and \$900 and Housekeeper (for training school). The Trustees' request for an Architectural Draftsman and for a stenographer (man) to take the minutes of the Board's meetings was denied.

The Board took action recommending the inclusion of the following in the coming budget:

New places—Chief Bookkeeper, \$3,000; Assistant Superintendent (Medical), \$3,300; Assistant Superintendent (Medical), \$2,500; Anaesthetists, 7 at \$750; Fire Expert, \$600; X-Ray Photographer, \$1,200; X-Ray Photographers, 2 at \$1,800; Oilers, 12 (3 for each hospital) at \$3 a day; Physicians, 20 at \$300 (for Gouverneur Hospital Dispensary); Automobile Engineer, 4 at \$1,200; Architectural Draughtsman, \$1,500.

Increased—Bookkeeper, \$1,500; Pathologists, 2 at \$2,100; Stenographer, \$1,050; Stenographer, \$900; Hospital helpers, for increases at the end of one and two years' service, \$10,000. Besides this it was decided to ask for a sufficient sum to meet the extra allowance to those employees living outside the hospital, and an additional sum of \$10,000 with which to pay the salaries of the temporary or additional appointees certain to be required by reason of the inflexibility of the regular salary schedules.

West Side Ambulance Relief.

In the matter of providing relief for the West Side, which has suffered through the discontinuance of Roosevelt Hospital of its ambulance service, the Board took action on May 4, by requesting a special bond issue in a sum not to exceed \$32,300 for the establishment of a relief station with emergency wards for accident cases. A house in West Fifth street, which is well adapted by situation and otherwise to meet the requirements, is at present under consideration, and the expenses connected with adapting it to its proposed new uses are estimated as follows: Alterations, \$12,000; rental per year, \$5,500; tow automobile ambulances, \$7,000; furnishings, \$5,000; salaries, \$7,497; and supplies \$7,503.

The Medical Service.

Upon the advice of Dr. H. M. Biggs of the Board of Health, the practice of vaccinating all patients well enough to undergo the operation has been ordered continued. It has been decided to purchase operating rooms suits for the surgeons.

The President has been authorized to take up with the Police Commissioner the enforced attendance of policemen in the wards where sick prisoners are confined. It would conduce to greater economy to assign one or more officers to permanent duty at each institution.

In co-operation with the Department of Public Charities it has been decided to embrace the ambulance service attendance upon such charity patients as are unable to travel from the charities pier, on returning from the city institutions on the Island, to their homes. Wherever possible the Board will also co-operate with private philanthropic societies in this regard.

Permission to purchase two more automobile ambulances at a cost not to exceed \$4,000 each has been asked of the Board of Aldermen.

Supplies.

During the Month of April it has been found necessary to reject 109 pounds of pork, 40 pounds of lamb loin, 10 pounds of liver, 124 pounds of beef, 99 pounds of steak, 8 of turkey and 1,418 pounds of chicken. Recourse has been had to the Corporation Counsel for advice concerning the best means available for relieving Conron Brothers, the poultry contractors, of their contract, and he has been asked by the Trustees to serve notice upon the firm of this action.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced with the contractor for white duck suits, the Seigel Cooper Co. Out of 120 suits ordered on March 12, only 3 had been delivered by May 6, and these were ill-fitting. The Board allowed the firm to complete the orders already given them only on their guarantee that in future every order shall have a time limit of two weeks placed upon it. Many of the uniforms when completed have been bad fits and the Board has authorized their rejection and the purchase of others in the open market, such purchases being charged to the contract of Seigel Cooper.

In the course of their investigation undertaken at the request of the Trustees, the Commissioner of Accounts hearing that the excellent coal specifications of the department were not being lived up to in respect to payment on the basis of the heating value. Contrary to their usual custom the Commissioners informed the Trustees of this fact. This led to a proposal on the part of the Fuel Engineering Company to make the necessary analyses and render reports enabling this department to pay for the coal strictly in accordance with the contract specifications. After a careful investigation of the company, the Board decided to accept this proposal for the rest of the year, the company's references showing a record of money saved to its employers.

In the matter of the fire hose the bid of the Peerless Rubber Manufacturing Company for \$1,700, being the lowest of several bids received, was accepted by the Board and the Department of Finance was requested to make the usual test of the hose and report upon it.

A communication from the Department of Finance, dated May 17, called attention to some items of groceries, etc., appearing on the bills for fresh fruits and vegetables. Investigation showed that a loose method had prevailed for some years past in this matter, the articles substituted being of the same price as those called for under the order and the substitution being made apparently for the purpose of obtaining things more quickly than was possible by the usual routine method. Peremptory orders were given to stop the practice, the Auditors being directed under no circumstances to pass such a bill. Another complaint from the Department of Finance under date of June 14, has since been received and is now under investigation by the Committee on Finance.

Miscellaneous.

The Board expressed its opposition to a bill in the Legislature conferring upon the Board of Health power to send a contagious disease case at its discretion to any hospital, whether intended for the receipt of such cases or not. A feature of the bill was modified in conference with members of the Board. This substantial agreement reached between all the parties concerned.

The Board's previous indorsement of the movement to obtain for the poor and sick of the City a seaside park at Rockaway was reiterated by the President in a letter to the officials concerned with voting the money for purchase of the land.

The setting aside of special class rooms in the public schools where lessons may be given in the open air to pupils suffering from tuberculosis was urged upon the Board of Education in a letter from the Trustees. Similar action has been taken in other cities with satisfactory results.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

Pathological Laboratory and Mens' Dormitory.

All work on this building was stopped on June 8, 1909, on account of the failure of the general contractor, L. Cokerill & Son. The firm's affairs are in hands of a receiver and it is hoped that a settlement with the creditors will soon be arranged and the work proceeded with. The operations on the building during the quarter are described by the architect as follows:

During the last three months the progress of the work has been slow due to non-payment to sub-contractors. The work done was as follows:

All partitions have been built in Pathological Department and concrete floors completed. The mason work is practically completed throughout building, except in cellar.

Throughout building all sleepers, underflooring, grounds and steel bases are finished.

All structural steel and ornamental iron practically finished.

No work has been done on elevators and dumbwaiters.

No work done on refrigerators.

The work of tiling has been started in dormitory. The marble work in toilets is completed, except the caps on partitions.

The plastering is completed in dormitory and work has started in Pathological Department.

The work of plumber is completed and ready for fixtures. Work of plumber is delayed on account of failure of general contractor.

All conduit work completed and ready for pulling wires.

Two temporary boilers have been erected for heating building temporarily.

The Trustees were surprised to learn of certain changes in the plans made without their authorization, and directed that all such changes, as well as allowances to be granted should first be submitted to themselves. One of these changes left an exposed surface of rough brick on the south wall of the building where it is expected that a passageway to connect with the adjoining building will be joined. The contractors offer to face this with Harvard brick for an additional sum of \$590 was rejected by the Trustees as exorbitant, and the matter referred to the President and Dr. Goldwater for consultation with the architects. Two other extras, one for \$825 and the other for \$100, were rejected, and the other extras and credits on the contract of L. Cokerill & Son were approved upon the formal request of the architects, it appearing that the sums involved were fair and reasonable, and the changes themselves either necessary or an improvement upon the original plans.

Specifications for the electric light and gas fixtures were submitted by the architects on May 25 and were ordered printed and referred to Dr. Goldwater for his opinion. His approval was given them a week or two later.

A plan for the organization of a Department of Pathological Chemistry in the new laboratory has been submitted by Dr. Charles Norris, the Director, and meets with the approval of the Trustees.

Boiler House and Power Station.

The architect's report on this building for June 30 is as follows:

The work done on foundation for boiler house consists of driving piles. Of the 1,600 piles shown on piling plan about 1,400 have been driven. The piles to be driven are those for the 40-foot bulkhead wall to be built by the general contractor.

Beginning has been made with the cutting of piles to the required levels.

The work of filling in inside the new bulkhead wall done by the City should be stopped temporarily. This filling is now interfering greatly with the foundation work for boiler house and the pressure of earth against the piles will bring those out of present place and may be the cause of breaking same.

Caissons are being built. One for the chimney foundation and one for sump pit are completed.

New Laundry Building.

The plans and specifications for the new building, including those for the refrigerating plant and plumbing system were referred to the Comptroller for his approval early in April. His report was favorable, and the Board of Estimate approved them on May 23, besides authorizing an issue of \$500,000 corporate stock to provide means for the construction of the laundry building.

New Surgical Pavilions.

The Trustees called upon the architects by resolution on April 20 to do all in their power to hasten the plans for the new surgical pavilions. These were handed in complete during the first week in June and were approved by the Board on the 9th, steps being taken at the same time to ask for the necessary appropriation before the summer adjournment of the Aldermen and Board of Estimate.

Training School for Women Nurses.

The new building of the Training School for Women Nurses was formally opened on the evening of April 28, where exercises were held, including an address of dedication by the Mayor. Numerous invitations were issued for this occasion, the Board of Managers and the Trustees acting jointly as hosts, and a supper was served to the Nurses and their guests.

Accommodations are provided in the new building for three hundred Nurses, together with the necessary helpers. The new building has separate rooms. The furniture of the bedrooms is plain, but substantial. The rooms are bright and cheerful, and of home-like appearance.

The offices, linen rooms, store rooms, machinery and laundry are all situated on the ground floor.

On the first floor are the assembly rooms, reception room, dining rooms, kitchen and pantry.

The building is well lighted throughout. With the completion of the lay out of the grounds will be provided two tennis courts, and ornamental gardens.

With the approval of the Board of Trustees the contractor for the lighting fixtures was granted an extension of five days upon his time allowance.

Much difficulty has been experienced in securing some of the furnishings and supplies advertised for. In particular the specifications for blankets contained a requirement for a higher percentage of wool than the contractors were willing to supply, and the advice of the Comptroller was sought in effecting an adjustment.

The property on the water-front adjoining the new Training School on the east belongs to the City, but is leased for five years to come. The Trustees have asked the Board of Estimate to assign this land to this Department upon the expiration of the lease, or before any opportunity of terminating the lease should arise.

Bids on the labor and material for a fence about the grounds of the new building were received on April 5 and were rejected by the Board at its meeting held on the 13th. They ranged from \$11,796 to \$20,574. New bids were immediately received and the contract awarded on April 27 to Cooper & Evans for \$10,950, this being the lowest of eight bids received.

Hospital Fence and Grounds.

The William Horne Company, contractors for the new fence about the grounds of Bellevue Hospital, were informed that the Trustees would insist upon the terms of their contract and require a payment of \$20 per day for each day in excess of the number named in their contract. A proposed alteration of the plan was rejected by the Trustees, and the architect notified to hold to the original plans.

The progress of this contract is described by the architect as follows:

Foundation for fence on Twenty-sixth street completed and all granite set with exception of granite blocks which receive braces for iron work.

The foundation for fence on Pathological Building is practically completed. The change for fresh air inlets on Twenty-ninth street, which is now being done, has caused a delay for nearly two weeks on work of foundation.

The first course of granite is being set on First avenue between Twenty-ninth and Twenty-eighth streets. Work on fence was also delayed by proposed changes. Work is now going ahead.

Specifications and plans for a lay out of the grounds have been received from Mr. Barta and referred to the General Manager Superintendent for report.

The Street Cleaning Department has been asked to remove the dump at the foot of Twenty-ninth street to a site farther removed from the hospital.

Isolating Ward, Doctors' Rooms, Reception Office.

Bids on the work of transforming three of the old wards into rooms for the house staff and an isolation ward for suspicious cases were received on May 3, when it was found that the lowest was in excess of the money allowed for this purpose. The bids were accordingly rejected and an additional appropriation of \$5,000 was asked for this work. Pending approval of this request it was decided later to call for bids upon the doctors' room alone, using the money already voted unless advised that such a course would be illegal.

The Board of Estimate's approval of the \$4,700 issue of special revenue bonds for the erection of a temporary reception office at the gate and of a transfer room within the grounds was received on June 2, and steps taken to have the necessary plans and specifications prepared. Advertisement for bids upon these plans was authorized at the meeting of June 28.

Fire Protection.

The matter of a thorough reorganization of the fire force was referred to the Superintendent with instructions to report to the Trustees any employee refusing to serve upon it. The force so selected includes many of the higher grade employees and receives the benefit of frequent drilling by Mr. Ross, the fire expert of the Department.

The estimate of the cost of the Gamewell Fire Alarm System for Bellevue is \$6,000 and an issue of \$7,000 corporate stock for its installation at Bellevue and Harlem has been asked for.

On recommendation of Mr. Ross, the General Medical Superintendent has been instructed to place 75 fire extinguishers, 24 sets of fire axes, and 24 8-foot hooks in the new Training School Building, as well as red lights at all the exits.

The Medical Service.

The Committee appointed to devise a plan for the improvement of the alcoholic service has held numerous meetings and submitted a plan for the division of the service between the medical and mental attendants, which has not yet received the approval of the Medical Board.

The \$10,000 bond issue requested for the better equipment of the ferry-boat day camps for tuberculosis patients at Bellevue and Gouverneur has been authorized, and it has been decided to ask for the inclusion of the charge for maintenance of these camps, together with the salaries and the rent of a relief station, in the new budget. Salaries for the physicians attending these clinics, at the rate of \$25 and \$50 per month, will also be asked for, as it is becoming increasingly difficult, on account of the risk involved and the small scientific interest of the work, to find practitioners willing to attend these classes. A comprehensive letter from Dr. Jas. Alex. Miller explaining the needs of this service has been referred to the General Medical Superintendent for recommendation. A children's farm-garden has been established in connection with the day-camp on the boat. This is used daily by these child patients as a part of their cure and serves the purpose of medical treatment, diversion, and education.

A rule has been adopted forbidding any Attending Physician or Surgeon hereafter appointed to the Fourth Division (non-collegiate) to affiliate himself with any of the colleges represented on the other three divisions for the purpose of teaching. This will tend to keep this division an open one for the medical profession at large, irrespective of connection with the teaching institutions already represented at Bellevue.

A room has been set aside for the accommodation of the children of sick mothers who are patients in the hospital.

Rooms outside the hospital have been provided temporarily for the new pathological internes.

The Nursing Service.

Information that Mr. D. O. Mills, the founder of the Mills Training School for Male Nurses, was willing to supply a new site for the Training School Building, provided that the city would undertake the erection of the building, was received by the Trustees in May. Mr. Mills' proposal was to donate four lots on Twenty-sixth street, adjoining the women's school upon the understanding that the City should purchase two more. A resolution appropriating \$37,000 corporate stock for this purpose was introduced in the Board of Estimate upon recommendation of the Trustees, and has been adopted. The old Training School building will necessarily be destroyed as the new hospital is built, so that the new home, due like the first to the generosity of Mr. Mills, will become urgently needed if the school is to be continued.

Upon the recommendation of the General Superintendent of Training Schools, the Trustees have approved of admitting a certain number of Nurses to the Training School for a period of two years, only on condition of their having attended previously a course at the Teachers' College, Columbia University. In addition it was decided to allow maintenance and board to a small number of students of this college desiring practical hospital experience in return for services rendered.

Requests for special nurses on the part of attending physicians having increased very greatly of late, the Trustees have called the attention of the Medical Board to the impossibility of complying with too frequent requests of this character.

Miscellaneous.

The Social Service Bureau of the hospital has been regularly organized with an Executive Committee at its head, and this organization has received the approval of the Trustees. An additional Clerk to take charge of the records in the office of the Nurses in charge of convalescent relief work has been allowed.

The doctors' tennis court has been put in good condition for the summer. The sum of \$3,000 in revenue bonds has been requested for the proposed covered passageway to Pavilions A and B.

Estimates have been asked for on a disinfecting plant for use in the reception department, both of the new building and of the old.

A good use has been found for the old Emergency Hospital Building in East Twenty-sixth street, and is now occupied as a dormitory for the men of the night force, whose rest is no longer broken by the noise incidental to the day-time operation of a large institution.

Medical Appointments, Resignations, etc.

On April 13 Dr. C. C. Coryell, Assistant Physician to out-patients on the Fourth Division, resigned.

On April 20 Dr. Curtenius Gillette, Adjunct Assistant Attending Physician to the Tuberculosis Service, Fourth Division, resigned, and Dr. E. W. Bowman was appointed Attending Dentist.

On June 9 Dr. Frank S. Meara, Assistant Attending Physician, First Division, resigned; Dr. John Rogers was appointed Attending Surgeon to the Second Division, Dr. John Howland was appointed Assistant Attending Physician to the First Division and Dr. Herbert Wilcox was appointed Physician to Out-patients and Adjunct Assistant Attending Physician on the children's service of the First Division. The following internes were appointed on the First Division: Dr. Victor M. Stork, July 1, 1909, Medical; Dr. William Bradshaw, July 1, 1909, Medical; Dr. Phineas H. Adams, January 1, 1910, Medical; Dr. George D. Lyman, January 1, 1910, Medical; Dr. T. F. Donovan, July 1, 1909, Surgical; Dr. W. H. Goodwin, July 1, 1909, Surgical, and Dr. Harry Moses, January 1, 1910, Surgical. The following internes were appointed to the Fourth Division: Dr. Joseph P. Brennan, January 1, 1910, Surgical; Dr. William H. Curley, July 1, 1910, Surgical; Dr. A. F. Wade, July 1, 1909, Medical; Dr. Edward Dowdle, July 1, 1909, Gynaecological; Dr. Richard T. Hopkins, January 1, 1910, Medical; Dr. Louis A. Van Kleeck, January 1, 1910, Medical; Dr. William P. Gallivan, July 1, 1909, eighteen months, Pathological, and Dr. D. F. MacDonnell, July 1, 1909, Surgical and Medical.

Census.

The average daily census for the quarter has been 1,028, as compared with 960 for the same quarter of 1908. There have been 9,107 admissions during the quarter, as compared with 8,248 during the corresponding quarter of last year. The total number treated has been 10,175, as compared with 9,295 during the corresponding quarter of 1908.

Twenty-four thousand seven hundred and twenty-nine visits were made to the Out-patient Department, as compared with 26,479 during the same quarter of last year.

GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

The work of repair, made necessary by the delay and neglect of the original repainting of the hospital have been ordered prepared, and bids have been asked for on the work of supplying the balcony railings with guards, it being understood that this shall be paid for out of the maintenance account.

Nothing further has been accomplished in the direction of renting new quarters for the Out-patient Department, but favorable action has been taken by the Board of Estimate upon the request of the Trustees to be allowed to pay twenty of the Medical Attendants a salary of \$300 a year each. When this has gone into effect, regular attendance can be exacted of the Physicians, and in this way the tendency to overcrowding can better be regulated.

To relieve the work of the Firemen in the badly constructed coal chutes, the Trustees requested the establishment of the grade of Coal Passer in the Department at the salary of \$2 per day and at the same time asked permission of the Civil Service Commission to employ three Hospital Helpers at \$30 per month and maintenance to act as Coal Passers temporarily pending establishment of the grade. Favorable action upon this request has now been taken by the Board of Estimate.

Twenty-eight Nurses were supplied the hospital from the City Training School for the first four months of the year and 33 from that time on. This leaves a credit of \$240 to this Department, the money asked for having been intended to cover the cost of 33 from the first of the year.

With the money appropriated by the City, the ferryboat "Westfield" has been made ready for the reception of patients suffering from tuberculosis, and is now in use as a day camp. With the kind assistance of the local auxiliary, who undertook to defray the differences in cost, kosher meat has been purchased for these patients, most of whom are orthodox Hebrews in belief. A Kindergartner, appointed by the Board of Education, is in daily attendance on week days.

Medical Appointments, Resignations, etc.

On April 13, Dr. H. E. Cohen was appointed Clinical Assistant. On June 9, Dr. John F. Casey, Dr. Thomas A. Cheatham, Dr. Ralph H. Hewitt, Dr. Benjamin Kramer and Dr. Frank S. Child were appointed Internes.

Census.

The average daily census for the quarter has been 139, as compared with 124 for the same quarter of 1908. There have been 1,007 admissions during the quarter, as compared with 891 during the corresponding quarter of last year. The total number treated has been 1,142, as compared with 1,035 during the corresponding quarter of 1908.

Twenty-nine thousand nine hundred and fifty-seven visits were made to the Out-patient Department, as compared with 29,202 during the same quarter of last year.

HARLEM HOSPITAL.

In spite of the fact that Siebrecht, the contractor for the trees and shrubs planted on the hospital grounds gave a guarantee against loss to the City in case of any of the plants not living, the Trustees, acting upon the recommendation of the Finance Department, deferred payment until the dead trees and shrubs had been replaced.

It has been decided to install the Gamewell Fire Alarm System here as at Bellevue.

A plan for screening the lights in the wards from the eyes of the patients is now under consideration by the General Medical Superintendent.

The proposal of the Bramhall-Deane Company to remove the large refrigerator from the kitchen to an adjoining room has been accepted.

The cutting of the words "Harlem Hospital" in stone over the two principal entrances has been authorized by the Trustees.

Awnings for the balconies and for five sitting room windows have been ordered. These were treated as an emergency order, the health and comfort of the patients in summer depending so much upon the possibility of using the balconies without interference from sun or rain. The awnings have been designed to drop from one balcony to the floor of the one below, the top one having a heavy iron framework affording both roof and sides. The cost will be \$477.

Anonymous complaint has been received of the large number of persons, baby carriages, etc., congregating on the sidewalk in front of the hospital in summer. Upon investigation the matter did not appear to the Trustees to call for interference upon their part.

The claim of the architect for payment for the plans furnished by him for a nurses' home has been rejected by the Trustees, the record showing clearly that he agreed to await payment until the actual undertaking of the work by the City.

Medical Appointments, Resignations, etc.

On April 13, Dr. Joseph E. Lumbard was reappointed Anaesthetist and Dr. Edward N. Roeser, Assistant Physician to Out Patients, resigned.

On May 4, Dr. John S. Blackmar and Dr. Isidor Platto, Assistant Physicians to Out Patients, were dismissed for non-attendance.

On May 11, the following were appointed Clinical Assistants in the Out Patient Departments: Dr. A. S. Unger, orthopedic; Dr. N. B. Martin, surgical (children); Dr. Trevor C. Yates, medical; Dr. F. H. Rosenberg, surgical; Dr. Dean Miltimore, genito-urinary; Dr. G. A. Merrill, medical; Dr. S. Rothman, medical; Dr. W. Lamberson, medical; Dr. E. Pisko, medical; Dr. C. Rosenheck, medical; Dr. F. W. Allison, surgical; Dr. A. H. Harrigan, surgical; Dr. M. L. Owen, surgical; Dr. Louis B. Sachs, medical; Dr. Albert F. Barry, surgical; Dr. B. F. Ochs, dermatological; Dr. Max Huhner, genito-urinary; Dr. F. S. Williams, dermatological, and Dr. Lesser B. Groeschel, surgical.

On June 9, Dr. C. E. McCombs, Dr. E. D. Elliot, Dr. C. H. Fulton, Dr. C. H. Richardson, Dr. H. L. Balamuth and Dr. E. G. Langrock were appointed Internes.

Census.

The total number of admissions and the average daily census for the quarter were 1,519 and 158, respectively, as compared with 1,436 and 124 during the corresponding quarter of 1908. The total number of visits made to the out patient department was 26,029 as compared with 21,826 during the same quarter of last year.

FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

The provision of awnings for the balconies at Fordham Hospital was of even greater importance than at Harlem Hospital, by reason of the exposed position of the hospital and the greater extent of the balconies. The same kind of awnings has been ordered and the same contractor employed. The cost at this hospital will be \$744.

The Radiographer to the hospital has complained that it will be impossible for him to do his work without more space at his command. There is a room adjoining the X-ray room and forming part of the operating suite which may be available for the purpose and the matter has been referred to a committee of the Trustees for investigation.

A report has been received from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity calling attention to defective sockets, switches and fixtures and forbidding the use of the electric sterilizers. They also recommend the employment of an electrician to oversee the plant. The matter has been referred to the General Medical Superintendent for further investigation and report.

The purchase of 1,500 feet of cotton rubber-lined fire hose has been authorized. On a recent test a corresponding amount of the old hose was condemned.

Estimates are being obtained upon the construction of a tennis court for the house staff.

Medical Appointments, Resignations, etc.

On May 4, Dr. William H. Meyer was appointed Radiographer to Fordham Hospital.

Census.

The total number of admissions and the average daily census for the quarter were 714 and 164 respectively, as compared with 591 and 106 during the corresponding quarter of 1908. The total number of patients treated was 852, as compared with 705. The number of visits made to the out patient department was 4,842, as compared with 4,070 during the same quarter of last year.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting Held Thursday, March 24, 1910.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Offices of the Commission, No. 299 Broadway, on Thursday, March 24, 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present—President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

On motion, the minutes of the meeting held March 21 were approved.

Charles J. Knoepfel, of No. 331 West Fifty-eighth street, Manhattan, having failed to appear as directed to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Police Doorman and Prison Keeper by reason of his record in the Police and Fire Departments, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the name of Charles J. Knoepfel be removed from the eligible list of Police Doorman and Prison Keeper, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfers were approved:

William M. Sullivan, from the position of Clerk at a salary of \$600 per annum, in the Law Department, to that of Clerk at \$900 per annum, in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Borough of The Bronx.

B. W. Homans, from the position of Assistant Engineer at a salary of \$2,100 per annum, in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, to a similar position in the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx.

William F. Mullarkey, from the position of Clerk at \$750 per annum, in the Department of Finance, to that of Clerk at \$900 per annum, in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Borough of The Bronx.

Edward Drennan, from the position of Foreman in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Appeals, the appeals of the following named candidates were denied, no errors of marking or rating having been shown:

Police Doorman and Prison Keeper—

Kasper Huber, No. 342 Melrose street, Brooklyn.

Promotion to Sergeant, Police Department—

William H. Meyers, No. 351 Seventh avenue.

Thomas Logan, No. 113 East Eighty-eighth street.

Laboratory Assistant—

Samuel Rosenthal, No. 301 Hopkinson avenue, Brooklyn.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Appeals, the Commission granted the appeal of Daniel F. Burke, of No. 256 East Twenty-eighth street, Manhattan, a candidate for promotion to Battalion Chief, Fire Department, that the sheet of his examination papers found on his desk by a Monitor, after he had left the room, be rated.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Appeals, the appeal of Armand Spenser, of No. 154 Nassau street, New York City, for a rerating of his French paper in the examination for Interpreter was granted, it appearing from a report of the Examiner who rated the said paper that the appeal was justified and that the candidate's mark should be slightly raised.

The Commission again considered the appeal of Jacob Salzman for a special examination for promotion to third grade Clerk in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Brooklyn. It appeared that Mr. Salzman had finished the first two papers in the examination for promotion to third grade Clerk held on January 26, 1910, and that when he returned from luncheon he had been informed that he was disqualified from the rest of the examination, owing to the fact that he had placed his examination number on his papers. The Secretary stated that eighteen persons competed in the examination, five of whom were employed in the Bureau of Buildings. The appeal was denied for lack of power.

The appeal of Byron C. Darling, of No. 622 West One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, New York City, for a rerating of his technical and experience papers in the examination for X-Ray Photographer, was denied for lack of power.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That hereafter all candidates in promotion examinations, except in the Police and Fire Departments, shall be given the benefit of the automatic appeal, so that those getting over 69 per cent. in either the mental test or the total average may be placed upon the eligible list; examinations for promotion in the Police and Fire Departments to be subject to special consideration and ruling by the Commission at the time of the holding of the same.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Miss Mary L. Sherrick, of No. 173 West One Hundred and Forty-first street, New York City, be and she hereby is appointed a Stenographer and Typewriter in the office of the Municipal Civil Service Commission for a temporary period, with salary at the rate of nine hundred dollars per annum.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 21, relative to the appeal of Joseph Crawley, a candidate in the examination for promotion to Deputy Chief, Fire Department, held on December 8, 1909, for a rerating of his record, and his report paper. The Examiner stated that no error had been made in the rating of the paper on report and that the place on the roll of merit claimed by Chief Crawley did not appear on the official transcript of his record as furnished by the Fire Department. The appeal was denied for lack of power, and the Secretary was directed to advise the candidate that if an error had been made in his efficiency record as submitted by the Fire Department an amended record should be furnished.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 24, relative to the request of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries for an examination for change of title from Collector to Clerk, and stating that in his (the Examiner's) opinion it would be proper to grant the change of title without examination, in accordance with Rule VI., paragraph 5, the former title being no longer in the classification. The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries and suggest that he furnish the names of the Collectors whose titles he desired to change to Clerk, after which the matter would be given final consideration.

A report was presented from Examiner Fuld, dated March 21, calling the attention of the Commission to answer No. 4 on the Experience paper of Robert A. Grant, a candidate for the position of Disinfecter. After considering the report, the Secretary was instructed to direct the candidate to appear before the Commission at the meeting to be held on Monday, March 28, to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Disinfecter for a false statement as to experience.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the case of Charles O. Speckenbach, of No. 456 East One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, a candidate for Patrolman, who stated in his application and in his declaration sheet that he had been born on October 20, 1884, while in the preliminary sheet of his examination and in the paper filled out at the time of his medical examination he had given the date of birth as October 20, 1885. It appeared that the candidate had produced a family record of births which gave the date as October 20, 1884, and requested permission to amend his incorrect statements to conform thereto. The request was granted.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the case of Florence T. Murray, of No. 370 Union street, Brooklyn, who had been appointed to the position of Stenographer and Typewriter in the Department of Public Charities on March 1, 1910, and stated that in her application she had given October 10, 1888, as the date of birth and in the declaration sheet filled out at the time of appointment, October 10, 1889; that she had presented a birth certificate showing October 10, 1888, to be the correct date, and asked permission to amend the declaration sheet to conform with the certificate. The request was granted.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the case of George W. Beal, of No. 3254 Third avenue, Borough of The Bronx, who had been appointed to the position of Attendant in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx on March 15, 1910, and whose statements as to the date of birth in his various papers did not agree. It appearing from a birth certificate presented by the candidate that he had been born on July 19, 1878, the Secretary was authorized to permit him to correct the date given in error to conform with the certificate.

The Secretary presented the duplicate application of Daniel A. Buckley, of No. 3048 Third avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for the position of Patrolman, and stated that the birth certificate furnished substantiated the date of birth in the application, viz., March 28, 1884, but that the date of birth given in the sheet filled out at the time of appointment was March 29, 1885, which date the candidate desired to correct, to conform with the certificate. The request was granted.

A report was presented from Examiner Fuld, dated March 21, relative to James P. Gill, a candidate for the position of Police Doorman and Prison Keeper. On motion, the Secretary was instructed to direct the candidate to appear before the Commission at the meeting to be held on March 28, to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII., for a false statement in his Experience paper.

Reports were presented from Examiner Fuld, dated March 18 and 21, respectively, relative to John F. Ryan and Peter Kelly, candidates for Police Doorman and Prison Keeper. On motion, the Secretary was instructed to summon the candidates to appear at the next meeting and show cause why their names should not be removed from the eligible list in accordance with paragraph 14 of Rule VII., for false statements as to their previous experience.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, in accordance with the recommendation of Dr. James P. Warbasse, Chief of the Bureau of Physical Examinations, the finger-print system of identification be used in examinations for admission to the Police and Fire Departments.

A letter was presented from the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, dated March 22, requesting approval of the emergency appointment of Edwin G. Ostrander as Stenographer and Typewriter, from March 16 to 26, with salary at the rate of three dollars a day, and setting forth the nature of the emergency in which Mr. Ostrander had been employed. The appointment was approved, under the provisions of paragraph 4 of Rule XII.

A letter was presented from the Department of Public Charities, dated March 24, submitting vouchers for typewriting done in connection with the meetings of the Medical Board of the Metropolitan Training School, Blackwells Island, during the months of January and March, 1910, amounting to two dollars. A letter was presented from the Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions, dated March 22, submitting vouchers in favor of Joseph Rinaldi, Michael Tandlich and James D. Patterson, Interpreters, for services rendered in February, 1910, amounting to \$5, \$65 and \$3, respectively. Minutes of Meetings of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held at the Offices of the Commission, No. 299 Broadway, on Friday, March 25, 1910, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present—President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

On motion, the minutes of the meeting held March 24 were approved.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 23, relative to the request of the Secretary of the Department of Health that a particular kind of examination be set for Mr. Saiki, a candidate for provisional appointment as Chemist. The report stated:

1. That the original request from the Department of Health had been simply for an examination for "Chemist."

2. That Mr. Saiki had appeared for examination and after answering the questions as to his experience, etc., withdrew without making any attempt to answer the technical questions, on the ground that the examination was not such as had been "promised by the Department of Health"; that he was a "physiological chemist," and expected the examination to have reference to that fact.

3. That in order to be a competent "physiological chemist" a man should have a sound foundation in general chemistry and that there had been no questions put in the paper submitted to Mr. Saiki that a reasonably good chemist ought not easily to be able to answer, with the possible exception of the last, which was directly in the line in which Mr. Saiki professed to be an expert.

4. That Mr. Saiki was an alien and could not compete in the competitive examination for Chemist.

The report was ordered filed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, subject to the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, Mr. John F. Mead, of No. 292 Halsey street, Brooklyn, be and he hereby is excepted from examination, under the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII., to supervise the change of method in handling maintenance and repairs to the distribution system, in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for a period of one year, at a compensation of three hundred dollars per month.

Henry J. Walsh, Esq., Deputy Chamberlain, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. Albert de Roode, Esq., Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, opposed the exemption of the positions.

After the Commission had gone into regular session, the minutes of the meeting held March 25, were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by striking from the exempt class under the heading "Finance Department," the line "Four Warrant Clerks in the office of the Chamberlain," and inserting in lieu thereof, "Six Warrant Clerks in the office of the Chamberlain."

John M. Hart, No. 436 East Eighty-fourth street, Manhattan, having failed to appear as directed, to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Police Doorman and Prison Keeper, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the name of John M. Hart be and the same hereby is removed from the eligible list of Police Doorman and Prison Keeper, for unsatisfactory character, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII.

The hearing of James J. Martin, No. 110 East Eighty-fourth street, Manhattan, as to why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Police Doorman and Prison Keeper under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII, was adjourned at the request of the applicant, that he might procure a birth certificate.

The hearing of James P. Gill, No. 710 Leonard street, Brooklyn, as to why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Police Doorman and Prison Keeper, was adjourned for one week.

"The Labor Clerk, subject to the direction of the Secretary, shall have charge of all matters relating to the registration of applicants for employment in positions in the Labor Class, and, subject to the direction of the Chief Examiner, of all examinations or other preliminary tests required therefor.

"He shall have charge of all applications for positions in the non-competitive class, after they have been passed upon and transmitted to the Commission by the Departments having jurisdiction, and shall verify the findings of the Departmental Board of Examiners relative to the qualifications of applicants."

A report was presented from Examiner Fuld, dated March 26, stating that Harry Theiss, whose name appeared on the eligible list of Police Doorman and Prison Keeper, had satisfactorily explained certain discrepancies between the statements in his experience paper in the examination for that position, and those in the experience paper in his examination for Court Attendant, and recommending that the dis-

qualification appearing against his name on the eligible list be removed. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in charge of promotions, dated March 25, relative to a communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, who requested that an examination be held for promotion from the position of Inspector of Sewers and Basins to that of Foreman of Repair Yard, in the Bureau of Sewers, and recommending that the examination should be open to all persons holding the lower but corresponding positions of Inspector of Sewers and Basins, Inspector of Sewer Construction, and Foreman of Laborers, employed in the Bureau of Sewers, who had served at least one year in these positions; also that a physical examination should precede the mental, in accordance with Regulation VIII. Van Buren, William McM. Speer, John F. Halstead, Arthur S. Barnes, Louis C. White, Frederick Hughes and Peter A. Anderson, attorneys and counsellors-at-law, to be employed by the Corporation Counsel in representing The City of New York in condemnation proceedings in Ulster, Orange, Putnam or Westchester Counties carried on under authority of chapters 724 and 725 of the Laws of 1905, and the acts amendatory thereof.

A letter was presented from the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, dated March 28, stating that the following named persons had been designated as Boards of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class at the various institutions under the jurisdiction of the Department:

Cramp and Dr. Morris Stark, amounting to \$24 and \$30, respectively, for services rendered in delivering a course of lectures in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals; also vouchers covering the services of Special Nurses in an emergency, and a voucher in favor of the Minto Hospital for scarlet fever and diphtheria. The letter stated that it was the custom, in the case of contagious disease contracted by one of the house staff of Doctors or Nurses, to send the patient to the Minto Hospital for treatment, in order to remove the source of contagion from the hospital, and as a means of affording proper treatment at the minimum cost. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to certify the vouchers in favor of Drs. Cramp and Stark, and for the services rendered by the Nurses, in accordance with paragraph 6 of Rule XII., and the voucher, in payment of Minto Hospital as exempt from the provisions of the Civil Service rules.

Present—President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification, by including in the exempt class, under the heading "Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity," the following title:

Assistant Chief Engineer of Light and Power.

Mr. Charles F. Lacombe, Chief Engineer of Light and Power, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. The exemption of the position was opposed by Mr. Albert De Roode, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association. There being no other appearances, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of Clause 6 of Rule XII, by suspending the limitation of compensation (seven hundred and fifty dollars), so far as the same related to the Department of Finance. On motion, the proposed amendments to the Rules and Classification were ordered continued on the calendar.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfers were approved:

Paul Woods, from the position of Attendant, at a salary of \$900 per annum, in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, to that of Bridge Tender, at a salary of \$900 per annum, in the Department of Bridges.

Bernard J. Loomam, from the position of Clerk-Searcher, at \$1,050 per annum, in the Department of Finance, to a similar position at a salary of \$1,800 per annum in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Borough of Manhattan.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfer was disapproved:

John Walker, from Hospital Helper (non-competitive class) to Hospital Clerk (competitive class), in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 23, relative to the appeal of Edward J. Worth, a candidate in the examination for promotion to Deputy Chief, Fire Department, that he be given credit in his examination for the Stephenson Medal, awarded him on May 14, 1904. The report stated that the Stephenson Medal was not awarded for meritorious acts performed at personal risk, and that in accordance with the conditions of the examination, therefore, the award of the Stephenson Medal did not give a candidate an additional weight of three points on record, since that additional weight was given only to medals awarded for meritorious acts performed with personal risk; that the award of the Stephenson Medal might be considered, however, as equivalent to a place on the roll of merit, without personal risk, and, therefore, worth an additional point on record. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the record of Edward J. Worth in the examination for promotion to Deputy Chief, Fire Department, be rated and an additional one point be given him for the award of May 14, 1904, such award appearing on the official transcript furnished by the Fire Department.

The appeal of Frank Dwyer, a candidate in the examination for Disinfecter, for a re-rating of his special and experience papers was denied, it appearing from the reports of the Examiners who rated the papers that no errors of marking or rating had been shown.

The Secretary stated that John S. MacLean, William H. Walker and Michael Dugan, candidates for promotion to the position of Head Keeper in the Department of Correction, had successfully passed a medical re-examination on March 25, 1910, at which time they were permitted to use eye-glasses in accordance with the instructions of the Commission. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary proceed with a special mental examination for promotion to the grade of Head Keeper in the Department of Correction for the above named candidates, it appearing that an error was made in their rejection in the general medical examination for that position.

The letter was ordered continued on the calendar.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 28, calling the attention of the Commission to his correspondence with the New York Milk Committee and suggesting that before setting a date for the examination for Inspector of Foods (Milk) and before suggesting subjects and weights for that examination he be authorized to confer more directly with the Milk Committee to ascertain their views in detail. The suggestion was approved.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated March 21, recommending that Frank Powers, of No. 233 Bergen street, Brooklyn, an applicant for Police Doorman and Prison Keeper, be marked qualified on the eligible list. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated March 21, stating that Michael N. Salmore, of No. 145 East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, an applicant for the position of Inspector of Licenses, had been appointed an Inspector in the Tenement House Department on October 14, 1907, and resigned June 2, 1908, without fault or delinquency. The Secretary was directed to mark the candidate qualified on the eligible list.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board, as to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
