Resolution Amending a Corporate Stock Issue \$445,000, for required Improvements to the Brooklyn Terminal of the Manhattan Bridge.

Resolved, That, subject to the concurrence herewith by the Board of Aldermen, the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on June 25, 1915, and concurred in by the Board of Aldermen on July 6, 1915:

"Resolved, That, subject to the concurrence herewith by the Board of Aldermen, the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 3, 1910, and concurred in by the Board of Aldermen on June 28, 1910:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to the amount of four hundred and forty-five thousand dollars (\$445,000) to provide means for required improvements in connection with the Brooklyn Terminal of the Manhattan Bridge, namely, the construction of subways in terminal and track work therein, upper deck structures from bridge abutment to Nassau Street, and track work thereon; subway loop on bridge property; and roadway paving and curbs, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding four hundred and forty-five thousand dollars (\$445,000); the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Resolution to Permit Political Associations to Hold Public Meetings, to Erect Banners, Etc., Under Certain Restriction Conditions.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the various political organizations and associations of The City of New York to erect stands for the purpose of holding political meetings on the sidewalks or carriageways of The City of New York, providing said stands shall be removed within twenty-four hours after having been used; and be it further

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to all political organizations and associations to erect, place and keep transparencies, erect poles and swing banners therefrom, the Presidents of the Boroughs consenting thereto, and where banners are swung from houses the property owners consenting thereto, the work to be done and materials supplied at their own expense;

Resolved, further, That permission be and the same is also hereby given to all political organizations and associations to parade through the streets, avenues and thoroughfares of The City of New York with vehicles containing bells or bands of music, the last privilege to be under the direction of Police Department, and the first two privileges to be under the direction of the Presidents of the Boroughs, respectively; the several permissions hereby given to continue only until November 6, 1915, any resolution or ordinance heretofore passed to the contrary notwithstanding.

Provided, however, that when a permit is issued and there is likelihood of any loss or damage to The City of New York through the exercise thereof such permit shall take effect only upon the filing of a bond, in form and amount to be approved by the Corporation Counsel, indemnifying The City of New York against any loss or damage sustained thereby.

Honorable mention (or roll of merit, Classes A, B and C) or Classes I, II, or III., add 2 per cent. Commendation (or roll of merit Class, D), add 1 per cent.

Deducted Points: For each day's fine between January 1, 1910, and December 31, 1912, deduct $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1 per cent. For each day's fine after January 1, 1913, deduct $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1 per cent. Reprimands or censures count as $\frac{1}{2}$ of one day's fine. Fines previous to January 1, 1910, not to be considered.

The recommendations were adopted.

Candidates may offer any two of the following foreign languages, in addition to Lithuanian: Bohemian, French, German, Greek, Hungarian, Italian, Yiddish, Polish, Russian, Spanish, Turkish.

Each candidate must offer at least two of the above foreign languages in addition to Lithuanian, and no candidate will be permitted to offer more than two of these languages. The languages offered by the candidate must be specified on his application blank, and candidates will not be examined in any language other than those specified by them on their applications.

On the first day of the examination, candidates will be given a written test in Lithuanian, and will be required to write a letter in English on an assigned subject.

Only those candidates who receive 70% on their written test in Lithuanian, and 70% on their letter will be summoned for the subsequent tests of the examination.

The oral and the written tests in each of the other languages will be held the same day, but the examination in all of the languages may not be held on the same day.

An eligible list will be prepared for each borough. Applicants must be residents of the Borough for which application is made, at the time it is made, and their names will not be transferred to any other borough list.

For the purpose of certification to the City Court, the eligible lists for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx will be merged.

For the purpose of certification to the Court of Special Sessions and the Magistrates' Court, the eligible lists for the five boroughs will be merged.

For the purpose of certification to the Municipal Courts, the eligible list for the borough in which the vacancy exists will be certified.

The minimum age is 21 years. A physical examination will be held. Those who fail to pass the physical examination will not be summoned for the mental examination. Candidates who receive less than 70% in any test of the examination will not be summoned for the subsequent tests.

A report dated August 24th was presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board recommending that an examination be ordered for the position of Social Investigator, Female, and submitting a form of advertisement for the examination. On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Social Investigator (Female).

The form of advertisement, reading substantially as follows, was approved:

"Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of the State of New York.

The subjects and weights of the examination are: General paper, 4; training and experience, 4; oral, 2. 70% required on each subject.

Applications for the examination must be filed on a special blank, Form C, with insert. Experience blanks will be issued with the applications and must be forwarded to the Commission with the applications. The experience paper will then be rated. Candidates receiving less than 70% on experience will not be summoned for the remainder of the examination.

A physical qualifying examination will be held. The age limits are 21 to 50 years.

Candidates should be familiar with the laws affecting the care and relief of indigent persons and needy children in New York City; with the methods and agencies for the care and assistance of needy children, the sick and the poor, and with the present work and historical growth of both public and private agencies and institutions for the care and relief of such persons. Experience or special training in connection with charitable institutions, hospital social service, societies for the relief of the poor in their homes, or for aiding or protecting children, or training along similar lines is desirable and will be given weight.

After consideration of a report dated August 20th from the Examiner in charge of the Bureau of Investigation, the Secretary was instructed to mark the name of Percy W. Roberts "Qualified" on the eligible list of Orthopedic Surgeon, and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list of Orthopedic Surgeon be and the same hereby is promulgated.

After consideration of a report dated August 25th from the Application Clerk relative to the certification of names from the eligible list of Stenographer and Typewriter for temporary service, it was

Resolved, That Mrs. Jennie V. Monohan, 307 East 70th Street, New York City, be and she hereby is appointed to the position of Stenographer and Typewriter in the office of the Municipal Civil Service Commission with compensation at the rate of \$3 per day for a period of two weeks from August 26th, under the provisions of Clause 4 of Rule XII.

A report (K-817) dated August 24th was presented from Leonard Felix Fuld, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to the inappropriate assignments of Thomas J. Norris, Chairman, to perform the duties of a clerk; of W. V. Gould, Inspector of Pipes and Hydrants, to perform the duties of an Examiner of Supplies, and of Robert J. Keogh, Inspector of Light and Power, to act as Assistant to the General Inspector in charge of the Division of Street Lighting of the Bureau of Gas and Electricity, Borough of Queens, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the department in the matter.

Two communications dated August 24th were presented from the Chief Clerk of the Police Department, stating that William N. Lauterbach and Michael H. Abt, candidates for the position of Patrolman, had been certified under the names of Nicholas W. Lauterbach and Henry M. Abt, respectively. The Secretary was in-

structed to record the names on the eligible list as William N. Lauterbach and Michael H. Abt.

A communication dated August 12th was presented from the Police Commissioner stating that Frank H. Brown, who had been appointed on August 6th as Chauffeur from the eligible list of Automobile Enginemen, had advised the department that he wished instead to accept appointment in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens. The candidate's appointment in the Police Department was canceled and the Secretary was instructed to certify his payroll for services rendered in that department for a period of four days from August 6th under the provisions of Clause 4 of Rule XII.

The Commission then adjourned to meet Wednesday, September 1st, 1915, at 10:30 o'clock a. m.

Construction Work by Department Force.

The work of extending the North River piers out to the recently modified pier-head line has been in progress at Pier 29, foot of Vestry Street, N. R., and rip-rap deposited over the site of the extension. At West 23rd Street Section, South, N. R., the Department force has been engaged in regulating, grading and laying 605 square yards of pavement, and 15 pieces of granite were set. At 31st Street, N. R., the Department force has constructed a ramp at the inshore end of the pier. At West 57th Street, the Department force has been engaged in installing a fender system on the pier. At 209th Street, H. R., the work of constructing a new pier with bulkheads adjacent has been in progress. On the East River, work has been in progress in building the bulkhead wall and Marginal Street at Jefferson Section, where 131 linear feet of new wharfage was made; Corlears Section (suspended May 22, 1915); East 16th Street Section, where 71 linear feet of new wharfage was made; Yorkville Section, where 64 linear feet of new wharfage was made; East 90th Street Section, East 120th Street Section, at 209th Street, H. R., in connection with construction of pier.

The Construction of Pier New 21, in the vicinity of Dover Street, East River, has been in progress. Work suspended May 4, 1915. The construction of a new pier at 47th Street, East River, was originally begun July 26, 1912; suspended June 28, 1913; resumed December 16, 1914; suspended March 8, 1915; resumed and suspended May 26, 1915. In the Borough of Brooklyn, a platform is being constructed at the foot of Main Street.

In addition to the above, plans, specifications and forms of contracts have been prepared for the following work: a two-story shed on the West 46th Street Pier; a one-story shed on the West 23rd Street Pier; new piers at 30th and 35th Streets, South Brooklyn; sheds on the 30th Street and 35th Street Piers, South Brooklyn; widening Pier 29, North River.

Construction Work by Contract.

Pier New 43, North River, near the foot of Barrow Street, has been extended out to the new pierhead line under Contract No. 1321, with the General Contracting & Engineering Co.; work was finished April 27, 1915. Work in connection with the West 46th Street Improvement has been in progress under Contract No. 1401, Class 2, and the supplementary contract recently awarded to Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation. The immense cofferdam for this work has been completed and successfully unwatered. An extensive and comprehensive plant for the removal of the rock has been erected by the Contractor, and the work of clearing and drilling is now in progress. Work was also begun under Class 1 of Contract No. 1401, on the 1st of April, 1915, on the construction of the pile and timber portion of the pier at West 46th Street. The dumping board between 77th and 78th Streets, North River, has been in course of construction for the Department of Street Cleaning under Contract No. 1424. This work was suspended under an injunction February 17, 1915, resumed June 9th, 1915, and is still in progress. At the foot of 72nd Street, East River, a covered dumping board has been constructed under Contract No. 1426, with Henry R.

Asserson for the Street Cleaning Department; this work was finished May 4, 1915. A contract, No. 1454, has been awarded to Henry Steers, Inc., for the construction of a new pier at the foot of 29th Street, South Brooklyn; work was begun on the 28th of June and is now in progress.

General Repairs by Department Labor.

On the North River, general repairs have been made to unleased piers and bulkheads by Departmental labor, and on the East River and in the Borough of Brooklyn similar repairs have been made. Included in this work has been extensive repairs to pier at West 52nd Street, piers at 3rd Street and 24th Street, East River; 62nd Street, East River, and at Shermans Creek, Harlem River.

Repairs Under Contract or Open Orders.

The work of repairing the asphalt pavement on the Marginal Street along the North, East and Harlem Rivers has been in progress under Contract No. 1448; 5,450 square yards of pavement have been repaired during the quarter. The shed on Pier New 1, North River, has been extensively repaired, and the metal covering painted under an Open Market Order issued therefor. A portion of the cost of this work has been borne by the Iron Steamboat Co. Alterations have been made to the inside of the ferry structures at St George, Borough of Richmond, by Frank Heitzner, under Contract No. 1442; work was finished May 13th, 1915.

Supervision of Permit Work.

Work done by private parties, lessees and others during the quarter under permit from the Commissioner of Docks, has been supervised as follows: 47 permits on the North River, Borough of Manhattan; 66 permits on the East and Harlem Rivers, Manhattan and The Bronx; 32 permits in the Borough of Brooklyn; 36 permits in the Borough of Queens; 44 permits in the Borough of Richmond, making a total of 225 permits in all boroughs.

The occupancy of lots in Jamaica Bay has been supervised. Included in the above permits for work are the following: Construction of ferry rack at Pier 43, N. R., by the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western R. R. Co.; construction of extension to Pier 13, E. R., and construction of pier between Piers 12 and 13, E. R., by the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Co.; erection of shed at Pier 51, E. R., by the Department of Street Cleaning; construction of extension to pier at 4th Street, Brooklyn, by Havemeyer & Elder.

Pavement on North River.

On the North River the work of regulating, grading and paving and laying crosswalks has been carried on at various places.

Pavement on East River

On the East River pavement has been relaid at various places by the force of the Department. In the Borough of Brooklyn pavement has been relaid at various places by the force of the Department. In the Borough of Richmond pavement has been relaid at St. George by the force of the Department.

The area of pavement laid by the force of the Department is as follows: New pavement, sq. yds.: North River, 605; East River, 1,200; total, 1,805. Pavement relaid: North River, 9,087; East River, 4,435; Brooklyn, 4,631; Richmond, 210; total, 18,363; and 918 linear feet of crosswalk laid.

New Wharfage Room.

New wharfage room made by the City and by private parties during the quarter, involving the destruction of old wharfage room, is as follows: Made by the City, 260 linear feet; destroyed by work done by City, 230 linear feet; net wharfage room made by the City, 36 linear feet. The superficial area of the City's piers has been increased during the quarter, by work done by lessees, 10,300 square feet.

Floating Plant.

The Floating Plant of the Department, comprising tugs, launches, pile drivers, scows, etc., has been maintained by the force of the Department.

Department Yards.

At the East 24th Street Yard, in addition to the maintenance of the yard by Department labor, the routine work of repairing tools, loading concrete material on scows, rafting timber, sharpening tools, unloading and storing sand, cement and broken stone, handling of granite, the filing and storing of Department records from Pier "A" has been carried on. At the Nott Avenue Timber Basin, rafts of old lumber and piles have been secured and cared for.

Recreation Structures.

During the quarter the recreation structures on the North, East and Harlem Rivers and in the Borough of Brooklyn have been repaired where found necessary.

Dredging and Surveying.

Dredging at various places has been in progress during the quarter, and all dredging, whether done by the Department or by private parties, has been supervised. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, having concluded its work of establishing permanent bench marks in the Borough of Manhattan, the elevations of these benches were obtained, and the work of running between said benches, fixing new ones along the waterfront and establishing elevations thereof has been begun. In compliance with the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, accurate and extensive surveys of the waterfront of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond are in progress with the intention of having a complete survey and map of the entire waterfront. 7,127 linear feet of waterfront have been surveyed in the various boroughs. In addition to this, 6,985 linear feet of base lines have been established and 5,661 linear feet of secondary base lines have been run. During the quarter 4,631 rod soundings and 43,225 disc soundings were taken. Contract drawings are being made, detailed surveys made, elevations obtained, and the information plotted in connection with the work relating to the South Brooklyn Marginal Railroad Extension. Surveys, plans and estimates have been made for the reconstruction of the New York Central Railroad and improvement of the waterfront under various plans between West 30th Street and Spuyten Duyvil Creek.

BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED JUNE 30, 1915.

The most important advance made during the past quarter has been the opening of the Neponsit Beach Hospital for Children affected with bone tuberculosis, which occurred on April 16th, when the patients formerly at Sea Breeze Hospital, Coney Island, were transferred to the new building. This hospital is the gift to the City of the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, the site having been provided by the City itself upon the ocean front at the easterly end of the new Rockaway Park territory.

The hospital was opened with forty-one (41) children and will have a capacity of one hundred and twenty (120) when all arrangements have been completed. The form of treatment consists largely of exposure to the sun's rays and the ocean breezes, and has been demonstrated a success by the work at Sea Breeze, which was imitated from the great institutions abroad that are successfully combating this disease.

By arrangements with the Board of Education, a school annex will be established in the hospital for the benefit of these crippled children.

One of the old ambulances has been changed to make it available for use in connection with the hospital.

A Dental Interner will be appointed to reside in the hospital.

The bedside tables placed throughout the hospital were the gift of Mrs. Raymond D. Van Name, whose generosity is much appreciated by the Board of Trustees.

The solitary cloud upon the horizon of the City's new venture in the care of its unfortunates is the proximity of Barren Island, from which, when the wind blows from that direction, sickening odors, together with clouds of smoke and swarms of flies assail the new hospital and its inmates. A report made by Mr. Irwin Osborn, Sanitary Engineer, under the direction of the Committee on Street Cleaning of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, demonstrates that the evils at present connected with the Barren Island plants can be eliminated by the installation of modern equipment and closer attention to the methods of operation. On the basis of this report, the Trustees have made an earnest appeal to the Board of Estimate to take steps for the removal of this nuisance and the co-operation of the Board of Health has been promised to this end.

The Department as a Whole.

The matter of the administration of the Workmen's Compensation Law, in so far as it related to doctors and public hospitals, has awaited the opinion of the Law Department, which has now been received and forwarded to the Medical Board of each hospital in the Department for their information and guidance.

Each hospital in the Department has reported to the Trustees upon its method of conducting examinations for appointment to its house staff. A Conference Committee of Medical gentlemen, representing each of the hospitals, has been formed, with a view to securing uniformity throughout the Department in this important matter.

The Trustees have been looking very closely into the matter of attendance on the part of the visiting physicians and surgeons to the various hospitals and to the Out-Patient Departments of the several hospitals. Physicians and Surgeons in the latter have been notified that they are expected to attend their clinics three times a week for a period of two hours, and a written explanation will be required when this rule is violated. Attending physicians in the hospital are allowed five absences in the month.

The Trustees have been requested by the Board of Inebriety to make arrangements for the certification of persons in Manhattan and The Bronx for commitment under the Inebriety Law. To make this possible, the Board of Aldermen has been requested for an issue of special revenue bonds to pay the salary of an additional Resident Alienist for the current year.

A request for an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$157,095.18 to meet the deficit in the appropriations has been made.

The Department of Docks and Ferries has been requested to provide boats to replace the "Southfield" and "Westfield" as day camps for tuberculosis patients at Bellevue and Gouverneur, respectively.

The Trustees have accepted an arrangement proposed by the City Chamberlain to consolidate with several other City Departments in the matter of preparing the payroll in one central office.

Bellevue Hospital.

The new surgical pavilions I, K, L and M are completed, as far as all structural matters are concerned, but await the installation of lighting fixtures, general telephone system, painting, and installation of equipment before they will be available for occupancy. Bids for the lighting fixtures in I and K were opened on April 2nd. The lowest bidder was the International Gas and Electric Fixture Company for \$6,823.50. The lowest bidder was asked to present a sample fixture, which, meeting with the approval of the architects and the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, was accepted and the contract awarded to this concern.

The Wahle-Phillips Company, contractor for the lighting fixtures in Pavilions L and M, was granted an extension of time on their contract until May 1st, on account of the delays by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Wahle-Phillips Company reported on April 27th, that as their fixtures had not yet been approved by the Department of Water Supply, they would be unable to complete their contract at the date set.

A claim by the John H. Parker Company in the amount of \$8,062.58 for flooring in Pavilions I and K, has been the subject of correspondence between the architects and the Trustees. The position of the Trustees is that the work alleged to have been done had never been authorized by them, and if there were omissions in the plans and specifications that fact had never been called to their attention, either by the contractors or the architects. In view of this fact, the claim was not allowed by the Trustees.

Advertisement has been authorized for painting all four of the new pavilions, the estimated cost of which is approximately \$12,000.

In preparing the specifications for the installation of an interior telephone system, the Trustees have been advised that those should be so drawn as to allow competition between the several kinds of telephone systems.

The plans and specifications for the layout of the grounds to the northeast of Pavilions L and M, are being prepared by the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White.

Other building matters include the acceptance of a bid for fireproof flooring of the roof wards of Pavilions A and B; the construction of a fence adjacent to the undertakers' elevator in the Pathological Building for the purpose of screening from view the transfer of bodies, and the construction of a receiving room on the pier at the foot of East 29th Street, the estimated cost of which is \$2,800.

The legislation asked for by the Trustees in common with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which would have rendered possible a reorganization of the Medical Board, was finally defeated after having passed both houses of the Legislature. A resolution recalling it from the Mayor was then passed and further progress brought to a standstill. The principal object of this measure was to render possible the payment of certain medical chiefs who were to have seats in the Medical Board, and the Trustees hope that it may be favorably considered by another Legislature.

Other matters of legislation in which the Trustees were interested were the amendment to the Nursing Act, which received their support, and an amendment to the Insanity Law, whereby additional work will be placed upon the psychopathic wards of the hospital. To do this properly an increase in the staff will be required.

The three months just closed have been characterized by an unusually high census. The number in the hospital on April 21st was 1,532.

A better method of admitting in the Out Patient Department has been arranged and is working out satisfactorily. The success achieved justifies the employment of an additional Hospital Helper here.

The piers at the foot of East 28th and East 29th Street are in need of repairs, and in view of the high cost of this work and the limited funds available, the Trustees have decided to make such repairs as can be made out of the current appropriation, deferring a permanent settlement to next year's estimate.

The installation of a refrigerating system in the Nurses' Home had become an urgent necessity, and the contract for its construction was awarded to the Shipley Construction Supply Company at a cost of \$7,350. It is estimated that a saving of about \$2,000 a year can be made on the item of purchasing ice for this building.

Funds have been asked with which to pay the salaries of two additional social service Nurses for the purpose of following up drug cases after their discharge from the hospital.

The Trustees have renewed their request to the Street Cleaning Commissioner to have the dump at the foot of East 30th Street removed, and have received assurance from him that such action will be taken by September 1st.

Gouverneur Hospital.

The amended plans and specifications for the construction of the new Out Patient building at Gouverneur have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Request has been made that the roof of the new building be used for an Out Patient Department for the Tuberculosis Clinic in place of the boat "Westfield." Action upon this request has been deferred pending investigation.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have been requested to lease the top floor of No. 203 Monroe Street, to be used as an addition to the houses now occupied as a Nurses' Residence. This will add four sleeping rooms, toilet, etc., at a rental of \$300 a year, and will do something to relieve the overcrowding.

At the suggestion of the Medical Board, a Genito-Urinary Clinic has been opened in the Out Patient Department on the afternoons of Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, from 4 to 6 p. m.

On the same recommendation, the position of Resident Obstetrician for a service of six months without salary has been approved.

Harlem Hospital.

A formal opening of the Nurses' new residence was held on April 15th, from 4 to 6 in the afternoon.

The new ward wing, certified as ready by J. H. Freedlander, the architect, was formally accepted on behalf of the City by the Trustees at their meeting on April 6th. This building is finished with unusual care and reflects great credit upon the work of the contractors, P. J. Brennan & Son.

Bids for the installation of the gas and electric fixtures in the main building and the extension were received on May 19th, and the contract awarded to the lowest bidder, the Simes Company. Later it was resolved to authorize the changing of fixtures in another contract so that all might be of the same design.

Bids were received on May 17th for the completion of the abandoned contract for the construction of the power house and ambulance station, and that of the lowest bidder, William Werner, in the sum of \$45,626, was accepted.

Bids for the alterations to the machine room, coal vault and storage room were presented on April 19th, and this contract was awarded to the lowest bidder, the Andrews Building Company.

The lowest bid for the plumbing work in these buildings received on the same date, was informal, having been submitted on the general contract form of the Board of Health, and the contract was accordingly awarded to the lowest formal bidder, P. F. Kenny Company, in the sum of \$11,186.

When the bids for the equipment of the hospital extension were received, it was found that the lowest bid for all items was in excess of the appropriation allowed, and it was therefore necessary to reject all bids and readvertise in such form as to indicate clearly that awards would be made on separate line items. In this connection the Trustees renewed their request to the Board of Estimate for an issue of corporate stock in the sum of \$25,000, for the furnishings required in the new wing.

A formal request by the Medical Board of the hospital for the increase of the staff room to its former size has been received and approved by the Board of Trustees.

A Dental Intern has been appointed to this hospital.

Fordham Hospital.

It has been determined to create at Fordham Hospital four places of Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeons and four places of Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physicians.

It has been found difficult to obtain Physicians who will attend faithfully the Out Patient classes to this hospital, and the Trustees have requested the Medical Board to make every effort they deem proper to obtain the additional men needed for this service. In this connection the decision of the Medical Board to employ the services of undergraduates as assistants in the Out Patient Department, has received the approval of the Trustees and has been recommended to the Medical Boards of the other Hospitals in the Department.

A Dental Intern has been appointed for service in this hospital.

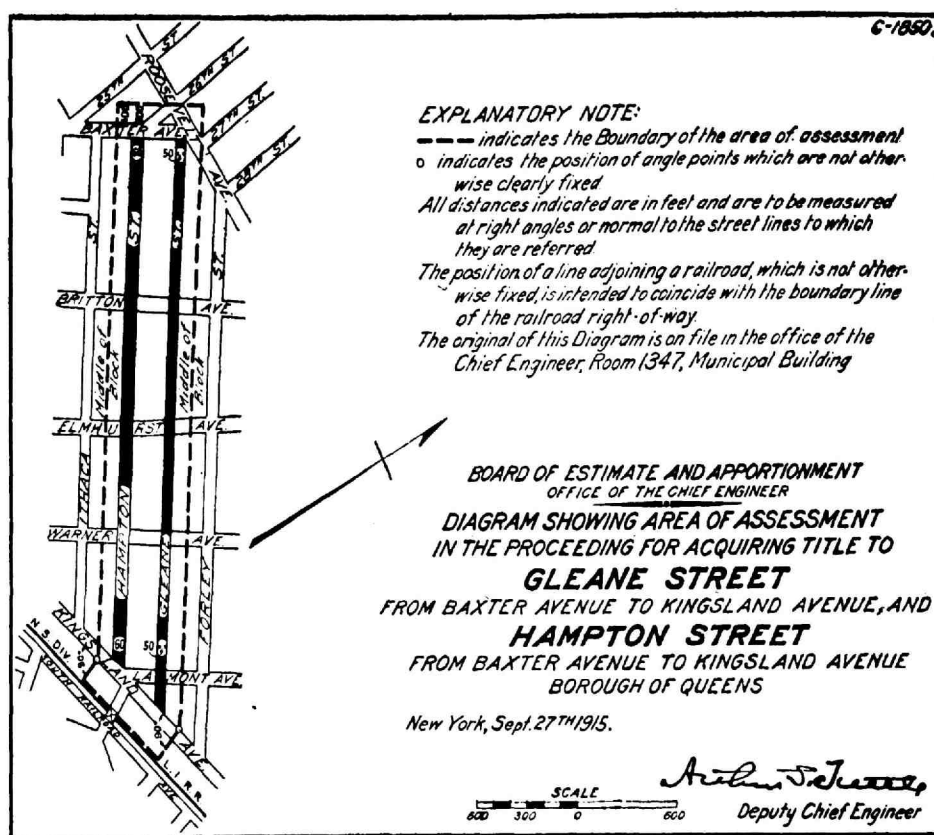

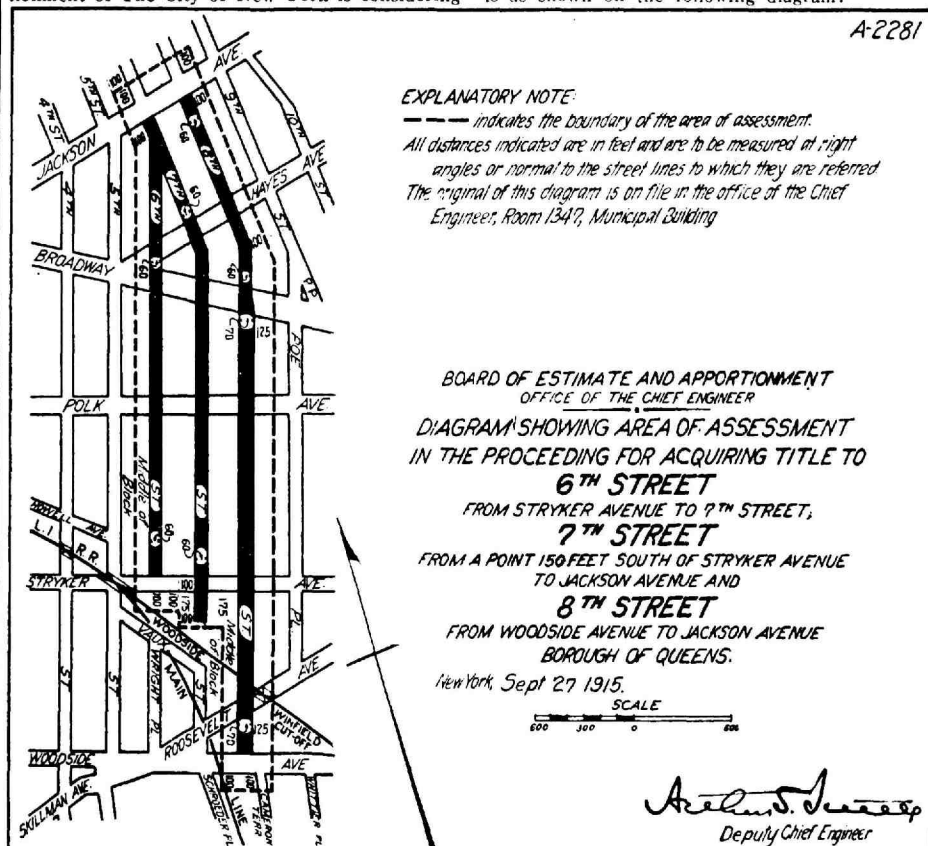

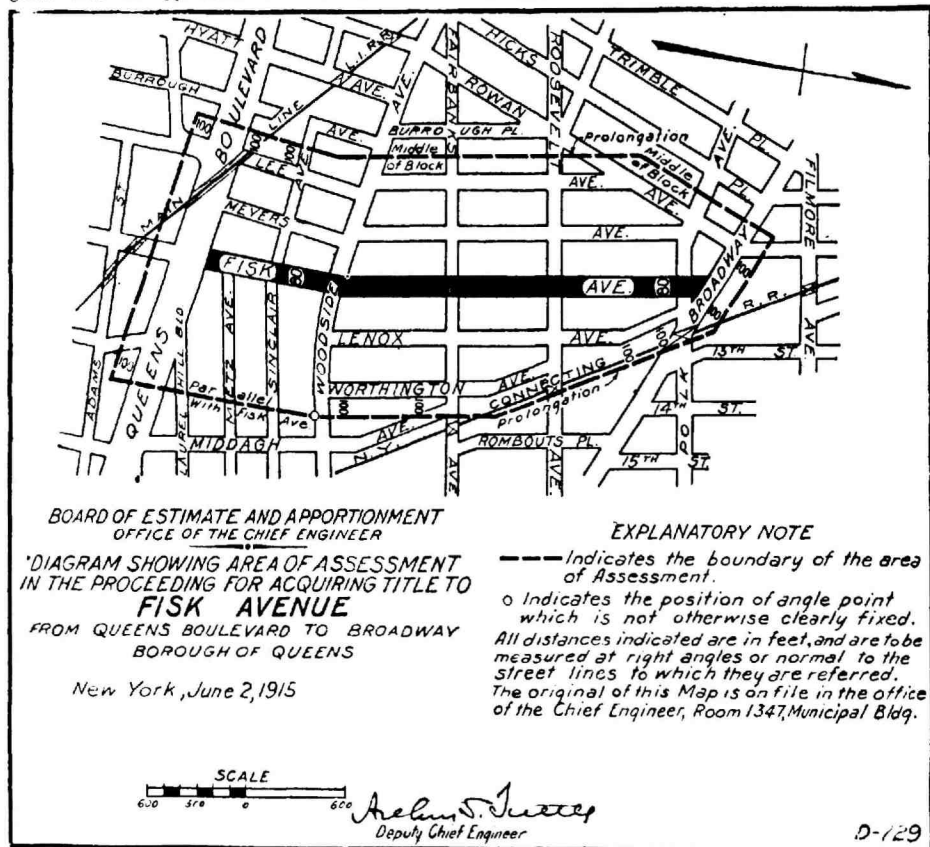
