

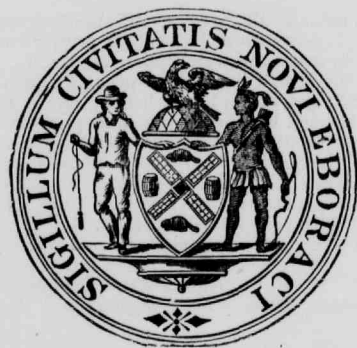

Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the Week ending November 15, 1879.

Resolved, That the sidewalks on east side of Fourth avenue, between Sixty-second and Sixty-fifth streets, be flagged full width where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

The Board of Health met this day.

Conditions—First. The hours of driving shall be between 8 o'clock in the evening and 6 o'clock in the morning.

Second. That at least one of the drivers in charge of each lot of sheep shall wear, exposed upon his breast while driving such sheep, a suitable metallic badge with the number of his permit in large figures, and shall carry a lighted lantern bearing the number of his permit in black figures, not less than two inches long.

Third. No noise shall be made by any of the drivers while on duty, and no sheep shall at any time be allowed to go upon the sidewalks of the streets in and along the route.

Fourth. Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 1, 1879:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,906, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 960 tenement-houses, 135 private dwellings, 60 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 46 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 3 fat rendering establishments, 1 fertilizing boat, 1 lime kiln, 1 packing house, 1 garbage dump, 13 manure dumps, 1 public sewer, 32 sunken and vacant lots, 1 lodging-house, 1 bone house, 1 gas works, 60 yards, courts, and areas, 61 cellars and basements, 112 waste-pipes and drains, 210 privies and water-closets, 54 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 12 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 2 cisterns, 39 other nuisances, and 61 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 1,123.

During the past week 69 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 79 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 51 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 48 houses, 48 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The following is a comparative statement of cases of contagious disease reported at this Bureau for the two weeks ending November 1, 1879:

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 8, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,773, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 781 tenement-houses, 110 private dwellings, 105 other dwellings, 5 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 52 stables, 15 slaughter-houses, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 2 manure dumps, 1 fertilizing works, 2 fat rendering establishments, 8 lodging-houses, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 69 yards, courts, and areas, 65 cellars and basements, 114 waste-pipes and drains, 307 privies and water-closets, 19 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 12 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 13 other nuisances, together with 60 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 1,022.

During the past week 70 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 53 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

113 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 40 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 39 houses, 39 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of scarlet fever was removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 433 births, 44 still-births, 186 marriages, and 494 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 1, 1879. This shows a decrease of 94 births, 54 marriages, and 15 deaths, and an increase of 8 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 82 births, and 6 marriages, and an increase of 11 still-births and 44 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from whooping cough decreased 3; erysipelas, 1; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 1; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 25; pneumonia, 15; heart diseases, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 9; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 6; premature and preterm births, 8; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 2; drowning, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 4; scarlatina, 6; diphtheria, 1; croup, 13; rheumatism and gout, 6; bronchitis, 1; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 13; convulsions, 8; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 3. The number of deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, inanition, alcoholism, and cirrhosis and hepatitis, was the same as that reported for the past week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 89 were in institutions, 269 in tenement-houses, 30 in houses containing 3 families or less, 1 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 4 were on the basement floor, 99 on the first, 125 on the second, 101 on the third, 54 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 491 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents. 41 were stated to be single, 122 married, 47 widowed, and the condition of 284 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 494; still-births, 44; bodies in transit, 18. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 48 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 433 births, 186 marriages, 44 still-births, 494 deaths, 18 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 39 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 31 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 1, 1879, was 46.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.915, the mean humidity was 74, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,299, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.26 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The number of deaths from erysipelas, inanition, and aneurism was the same as that reported for the past week.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 83 were in institutions, 255 in tenement-houses, 143 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 131 on the second, 86 on the third, 55 on the fourth, 14 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 491 were stated to be residents of New York city, and 1 non-resident, 63 were stated to be single, 132 married, 55 widowed, and the condition of 242 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 492; still births, 35; bodies in transitu, 22; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 62 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 519 births, 196 marriages, 35 still-births, 492 deaths, 22 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 22 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 11 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 8, 1879, was 36.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.123, the mean humidity was 88, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 665, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.46 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 466 deaths and still-births, or 88.42 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 13; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 199; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 59; Greenwood (undenominational), 45; Lutheran (undenominational), 64; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 14; Evergreen (undenominational), 35; Woodlawn (undenominational), 8; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 6; Washington (undenominational), 4.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending November 1, 1879, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 1; Third, 6; Fourth, 15; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 13; Seventh, 24; Eighth, 21; Ninth, 15; Tenth, 21; Eleventh, 26; Twelfth, 39; Thirteenth, 17; Fourteenth, 9; Fifteenth, 8; Sixteenth, 17; Seventeenth, 38; Eighteenth, 26; Nineteenth, 86; Twentieth, 39; Twenty-first, 38; Twenty-second, 37; Twenty-third, 12; Twenty-fourth, 6.

The actual mortality for the week ending November 1, 1879, was 533, this is 81 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 74.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.14 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,102,395.

Report on the Fourth Avenue Tunnel under Park Avenue.

SANITARY BUREAU, NEW YORK, November 4, 1879.

To the Board of Health of the Health Department:

EMMONS CLARK, Secretary—I beg leave to submit the following report upon the sanitary condition of the "Tunnel" under Park avenue, between Thirty-fourth and Fortieth streets, New York City. On the 11th instant, in company with T. J. Nealis, Sanitary Engineer to this Bureau, and Mr. Bonny, Superintendent of the Fourth avenue street car line, I inspected the above-named premises and found the facts to be as follows:

There is an eight-inch earthenware drain running through the centre of the road, about two feet below the surface, and extending through the whole tunnel. Along the course of this drain are six large manholes, whose wooden covers are perforated with small openings. There are also several smaller manholes with perforated iron covers. Here and there along the sides of the road are also small iron-covered manholes, which communicate with the main drain. The walls of the tunnel present numerous openings common to such structures and which are intended to prevent them from being subjected to too great moisture from surface water. The six large manholes and many of the smaller ones were uncovered and carefully examined. They were found to contain water which was apparently spring water, clear, sometimes flowing and always inoffensive, the flow being southward towards Thirty-fourth street. At no time was any unpleasant odor perceived from this drain. By the courtesy of Stevenson Towle, Engineer in Charge of Sewers, and consulting Sanitary Engineer to the Board of Health, I am enabled to say that this eight-inch drain pipe enters the bulkhead of the Thirty-second street brick sewer at a point one hundred and twenty-eight feet east of the east curb line of Fourth avenue, and that it has no connection with the Forty-second street sewer.

Notwithstanding the constant attention given to cleaning the tunnel and the use of disinfectants, it is always more or less offensive, sometimes very much so. This bad smell is due to moist earth mixed with horse manure, and it can only be removed by concreting the floor with asphalt or some similar substance, so as to prevent the exhalation from a soil saturate with water and ammonia. Such a floor could be readily swept, and if two hydrants were provided, could be flushed when necessary and kept sweet and clean. There should also be a trap in the main drain somewhere between the south end of the tunnel and the brick sewer in Thirty-second street.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the meeting held October 31, 1879.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Nicholas Haughton, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

On motion of the Mayor, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

The Mayor stated that the special business for which the meeting was called was to consider what certificate, if any, it was the duty of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to make to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under the following provisions of section 7 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, viz.:

"And whenever as often as the Commissioners of said Sinking Fund shall certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said city, that the accumulations in said Sinking Fund shall not be sufficient to meet the payment of any bonds or stocks falling due in the next following calendar year, it shall be the duty of said Board, and it is hereby required to include in the annual estimate for such year, to be raised by tax on the estates, real and personal, in said city, subject to taxation, such an amount to be applied to the payment of said bonds or stocks as shall be certified by said Commissioners, and the amount so included in said estimate shall be paid into said Sinking Fund, and applied as in this section specified; provided, however, that the amount so to be raised by tax and paid into the Sinking Fund, as in this section provided, shall not in any one year be less than the sum of one million dollars, or more than two million dollars."

The following statement by the Comptroller was submitted, viz.:

The Mayor also submitted an opinion, which the Counsel to the Corporation had prepared at the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be submitted to that Board at their meeting of this date, in relation to the construction of the said section.

After a discussion in respect to the meaning of the act and the duty of the Commissioners in the premises, in which Mr. Andrews, Assistant Counsel to the Corporation, took part, it was determined to report the facts to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment without any expression of opinion as to the construction of the law; whereupon the Mayor submitted the following preamble and resolution, which were unanimously adopted, viz.:

Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the amount of the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the city debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks for which that fund is primarily pledged, and that the total amount of bonds and stocks falling due in the year 1880 is—
