### APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending November 11, 1876.*

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Levie Shields to erect two ornamental lamp-posts and lamps in front of No. 114 West Twenty-sixth street, the said posts to be of the usual dimensions, and the gas to be supplied from his own meter, and the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, November 2, 1876.

Approved by the Mayor, November 6, 1876.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to the Trustees of St. Patrick's Cathedral to connect the cathedral building and other buildings in use for church or asylum purposes, in Fifty-first street, with the sewer about to be built at the expense of said trustees, by authority of the Common Council, in said Fifty-first street, between Fourth and Fifth avenues, also with sewer in Fiftieth street, without the payment of the fees usually charged for making connections with sewers.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 21, 1876.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, October 27, 1876, with his objections thereto.

In Board of Aldermen, November 9, 1876, taken up and considered, as provided in section 13, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Resolved, That the curb and gutter stones be set, and the sidewalks on both sides of Sixty-third street, from First avenue to the East river, be flagged full width, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 21, 1876.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, October 27, 1876, with his objections thereto.

In Board of Aldermen, November 9, 1876, taken up and considered, as provided in section 13, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to have the sidewalk on the south side of Little Twelfth street, from Washington street to Tenth avenue, flagged full width, and the curb and gutter stones set, under his direction and supervision, and charge the amount to the appropriation for "Flagging Sidewalks, etc., in Front of City Property," as the land fronting the proposed improvement is owned by the Corporation of the City of New York.

### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

*Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending November 4, 1876.*

MEETING, FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 3, 1876.

The following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the contract for grading Boston Road, from Third avenue to the northern side of One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, be and hereby is awarded to Mr. Green Wright, at the sum of \$837.50; that the specifications for the work submitted by the Engineer of Construction be approved; and that the President be and hereby is authorized to execute the contract for and on behalf of this Department.

Mr. C. R. Schott, Division Engineer, absent, on account of sickness, from September 24 to October 30, was allowed full pay.

Twenty-four additional iron rods for the gallery sky-lights of the Museum of Art Building was ordered, at \$3 each.

The following preambles and resolutions in relation to the contract for the Brook avenue sewer were adopted, viz.:

Whereas, The Comptroller of the city did not approve the sureties of the contract for the construction of the Brook avenue sewer until the 17th day of October, although the proposal of the contractors was sent to him for that purpose on the 30th day of August last, so that no progress could be made this year in the mason works of the sewer, because, by the terms of the contract, that work could not be carried on in the winter or after the 1st of November; and

Whereas, The subject of a modification of the contract in that respect, so as to expedite the work, has been under consideration by the President, with the contractors and the engineer;

Resolved, That the time for the prosecution of the work, limited by the contract with Messrs. Jones & McQuade, be adhered to, and that they be directed to proceed with the work immediately, in accordance with the terms of the contract.

The President presented a statement showing the balances on the books of the Department, to the credit of the appropriations for maintenance of parks and places and salaries.

He stated that he had written to the Finance Department, on the 5th of October last, for a statement of the account of salaries, as charged on the books of the Finance Department; but that the Comptroller refused to furnish the Department with such a statement. That he had, however, ascertained that the Comptroller had charged various sums to maintenance and salaries which were properly chargeable to other appropriations, and were so charged on the books of this Department. That, therefore, the books of the Finance Department, and of this Department, cannot agree. He further stated that he had addressed two communications to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated respectively, September 29th and October 29th, 1876, requesting that transfers be made from appropriations of this department, on which there were surpluses, to those on which there were deficiencies; but that that Board had, as yet, taken no action in the matter.

The following preamble and resolution in relation to Mott avenue were adopted, viz.:

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, or a majority of them, deem the changes specified on the map or plan hereinafter mentioned, in the streets, roads, and avenues, as laid down and established by the commissioners appointed under chap-

ter 841 of the Laws of 1868, on a map of the same, filed in the office of the Register of the County of Westchester, on the 23d day of February, 1871, to be required; therefore

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the powers conferred on the said Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, by chapters 329 and 604 of the Laws of 1874, they do hereby lay out, alter, amend, and establish the location, width, course, and direction of the streets, roads, and avenues within that part of the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York which formerly constituted the town of Morrisania, and which lies north and east of a line commencing at the termination of the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, at or in the Hudson river; running thence easterly along said southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and a prolongation of said line to the middle of Harlem river; and running thence southerly along the middle of said Harlem river to the Sound, north of Randall's Island, shown on a map or plan entitled: A "Map or Plan of Mott Avenue from One Hundred and Fifty-second to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, in the Twenty-third Ward," dated "New York, October 24, 1876," and signed "J. J. R. Croes, Civil and Topographical Engineer, Department of Public Parks," of the width, extent, and direction that said streets, roads, and avenues are designated on said map or plan by red lines, figures, and color, and do discontinue and close such portions of streets, roads, and avenues as are indicated on said map or plan by india ink shading, and that the location, width, course, and direction of the streets so laid out and established, and the closing and discontinuing of streets and avenues so discontinued and closed, are such as to the said Commissioners, or a majority of them, seem most conducive to the public good; and that the President of the Department cause to be prepared and submitted to this Board three similar plans and profiles of the same, to be filed in pursuance of said laws above mentioned.

The purchase of Norway spruce trees for East River Park, at a price not exceeding \$100, was ordered.

The Superintendent was directed to have the statue of Daniel Webster, which is now delivered on Central park, placed in proper position.

The following resolution in relation to the flagging of the sidewalk on Marrion avenue was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the contract for flagging the sidewalk on the west side of Marrion avenue, from Kingsbridge road to Ridge street, where not already done, be and hereby is awarded to Mr. William Coogan, at the price of 27½ cents per square foot, and that the President be and hereby is authorized to execute the same for and on behalf of this Department.

For the construction of a sewer, etc., in Brook avenue, from tide water to a point in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, in the Twenty-third Ward, dated October 23, 1876. Principals—Charles Jones, 343 East Eighty-fifth street, New York; Thos. P. McQuade, Lexington avenue and Eighty-ninth street, New York. Sureties—John McQuade, Lexington avenue and Eighty-ninth street, New York; Lawrence R. Kerr, 149 East Fortieth street, New York.
