The Board of Health met this day.

Orders.

348 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 41 cases, and for a violation of the Sanitary Code in 1 case.

Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter-houses; on work performed by Disinfecting Corps.

From Riverside Hospital: On applications for permits; on certain street pavements; on suspension of certain orders; on burying ground at northeast corner of Franklin avenue and Jefferson street.

From Attorney and Counsel: In favor of allowing certain marriages to be entered on the Marriage Register; weekly report of orders presented for entry, etc.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 11, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,796, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 933 tenement houses, 83 private dwellings, 153 other dwellings, 4 manufactories and workshops, 9 stores and warehouses, 47 stables, 53 slaughter-houses, 6 fat-rendering establishments, 2 manure-dumps, 13 sunken and vacant lots, 37 yards, courts, and areas, 61 cellars and basements, 226 waste-pipes and drains, 65 privies and water-closets, 5 streets and gutters, 7 dangerous stairways, 4 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 12 piggeries, 3 violations of the Sanitary Code, 7 other nuisances, 65 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 549. During the past week 51 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report. 7 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port. 68 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 50 houses where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 43 dwellings, 43 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 28 persons sick with small-pox were removed to Hospital, and — dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

697 cans and 38 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending March 11, 1876.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers during the week ending March 11, 1876: Calves (bob), 109 carcasses; calves (case), 2 carcasses; sheep, 7 carcasses; beef, 33 pounds; and veal, 111 pounds.

During the week ending Saturday, March 11, 1876, there were issued from this bureau 679 burial permits for city deaths, 26 for bodies *in transitu*, and 56 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 679 deaths, 145 marriages, 471 births, 56 still-births, 26 applications for transit permits, and 56 returns from Coroners. There were 42 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 7 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage, and 33 of death were issued from this bureau. 2 cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.

To W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 679 deaths reported in this city during the week ending Saturday, the 11th inst., against 651 reported the previous week. The actual mortality for the week ending March 4 was 628, or 25 less than occurred during the corresponding week of last year, showing an annual death-rate of 30.90 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,056,492. The increase in the number of deaths last week was in diphtheria, 4; typhoid fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 2; phthisis

pulmonalis, 12; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 19; marasmus and scrofula, 1; diseases of the nervous system, 14; Bright's disease, 9; deaths of persons 70 years of age and over, 7. And the decrease was in small pox, 6; measles, 8; scarlatina, 3; membranous croup, 5; whooping cough, 2; cancer, 9; disease of the heart, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; children under 5 years of age, 35; and deaths in institutions, 9.

The fatality of the following four diseases which furnished the highest mortality during the past two weeks was greatly influenced by the variable temperature, which ranged 40 degrees last week and 23 the week previous:

The mean temperature during the past week (as reported by Daniel Draper, Director Meteorological Observatory, Central Park), was 40.4, or 13.2 degrees higher than the week previous, and the mean humidity was 72.100 of total saturation, or 3 degrees less than the week previous.

The minutes of the meetings held February 29 and March 7, 1876, were read and approved.

The Chairman presented a communication from the Department of Public Works, asking for the issue of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, "Croton Water-main Stock of the City of New York."

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

The Chairman presented a resolution from the Common Council, asking for a transfer from any unexpended balance to William Walsh, County Clerk, for expenses incurred in connection with taking the census of this county in the year 1875.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller presented a communication from the Health Department, asking for an appropriation to meet the expense of printing the Annual Report of said Department for the year 1874.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of five hundred and fifty-five dollars and forty-one cents (\$555.41) be and is hereby transferred from the appropriation for the "Institution for Improved Instruction of Deaf Mutes," for 1875, which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to an appropriation for "St. Joseph's Institute for the Improved Instruction of Deaf Mutes," for 1876, for which it is required.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments moved that the rule adopted at

meeting of June 23, 1874, relating to calls of meetings, be suspended in order to act upon the issue of "City Parks Improvement Fund Stock" and "New York County Court-house Stock No. 5."

Which was agreed to.

Whereupon the Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "City Parks Improvement Fund Stock," as authorized by chapter 608, Laws of 1875, as per requisition of the Department of Public Parks, dated February 1, 1876, fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000).

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Chairman offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation "Salaries of the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes and his Clerks," 1876, to the appropriation "Salaries of Assistants, Clerks, and Messengers, office of the Counsel to the Corporation," 1876, to be used for the payment of the expense of doing the business formerly done by the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, and his subordinates, and for that purpose only.

The Comptroller called up and offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "New York County Court-house Stock No. 5," as authorized by section 7, chapter 583, Laws of 1871, and in pursuance of a requisition of the Court-house Commissioners, dated August 12, 1874.

This authority is given with the special view of enabling the Court-house Commissioners to procure proper plans and estimates to show the manner and cost of completing said Court-house.
