Report of Work Done in the Construction Bureau of the Department of Sciners, Borough of The Bronx, during the Quarter ending September 30, 1900.

The total length of sewers constructed in the Borough of The Bronx at the close of the quarter ending September 30, 1900, is 856,754.09 linear feet, or 162.264 miles, being divided as follows:

811,005,72 linear feet, or 153,787 miles, in the regular "combined system," according to filed District Drainage Maps for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, west of the Bronx river, and 44,758.37 linear feet, or 8.477 miles, in the "separate system," specially designed for the district enst of the Bronx river (or Williamsbridge) previous to annexation.

22,105.69 linear feet, or 4.204 miles, of sewers were constructed during the quarter (exclusive of district east of Bronx river) lefts divided into 5,021.04 linear feet, or 1.122 miles, of brick sewer and 16,274.65 linear feet, or 1.082 miles, of pipe sewers.

The total number of receiving-basins (west of Bronx river) is 1,957, thirty-eight [38] having been constructed during the quarter.

DEPARTMENT OF SEWERS-BORGUGH OF BROOKLYN, I October 9, 1900.

Hon. James Kane, Commissioner of Scuera:

Dear Sir—I betweith submit the operations of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter ending September 30, 1900.

The third quarter of the year 1900 has been an exceedingly progressive period in the construction of sewers in the Borough of Brooklyn, not so much in respect to an extraordinary increase in the mileage of sewers in the streets of the Borough, but in regard to the importance of the work, as in the building of large main sewers, the completion of which will be beneficial to the entire community. It will be readily understood that progress in mileage is reduced necessarily when large sewers are constructed, yet it will be found that the lengths constructed during the quarter are very close to normal construction.

The mains of which I speak are in Sixtieth street, between Fort Hamilton avenue and Foottomila avenue (162 inches diameter); in Foorth avenue, between Sixtieth street and Forty-first street (78 inches, 72 inches and 60 inches diameter); in Greene avenue, between Fatchen avenue and Bushwick avenue, Bushwick avenue, etc. (78 inches and 66 inches diameter); in Hump street, between Johnson avenue and Benton street (78 inches and 66 inches diameter); in Hump street, between Last river and Provost street, etc. (84 inches, 78 inches, 72 inches and 66 inches dameter), etc., The progress, etc., will be fully dealt with in the annual report of the year, hence mete mention of these sewers in deemed sufficient at this time.

The length of the sewerage system in this Borough at the end of the quarter is found to be \$46 and 371 thousandths miles.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Communicators of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office, at 12 o'clock M. on Wednesday, November 14, 1900.

Present-Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain, and Robert Muh, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermon.

The minutes of the meeting held October 26, 1900, were approved as printed.

Hon. Asa Bird Gardner, District Atturney, and Hon. Joseph E. Newburger, one of the Judges of the Court of General Sessions, appeared before the Board, and were both heard at

length in connection with the proposed reassignment of space in the Criminal Court Building.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance in regard thereto, and offered the following resolution:

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller

NOVEMBER 10, 1900.

How, Bird S. Coler, Compitality:

Six—Hom. As Bird Gardiner, District Attorney, in communication to the Mayor, October 5, 1900, relative to the assignment of space in the Criminal Coart Building for his officer says:

"It is indispensable that every one of the professional staff, Coursel for the People, shall three a room to bimself, where he can prepare his cases for trial and receive and examine his witnesses in a confidential and private way, the same as in any lawyer's office in the country.

"Frequently a winness will be unwilling to speak in the prosence of a third person, and very great inconvenience to the public service is now experienced, as before remarked, by reason of the staff not having proper accommodations.

"It is found, after the most painstaking and excell deliberation and inspection, that the upper floor of itself will not accommodate all of the District Attorney's office, and that several rooms now in use on the third floor will have to be retained. The accompanying plans and excelled, and list of the professional and administrative staff, with their respective designations, will show that the greatest economy has been exhibited in the arrangement of necessary space, without making allowances for any further increase, due to future increase in the population of the City, which brings with it unfortunately added responsibilities to the office."

I submit herewith diagrams showing the space asked for by the District Attorney. In these diagrams I only give the main division of the building, omitting the partitions which have been put in by the Departments which have berefore occupied them.

Diagram No. 1 shows the fourth floor, all of which the District Attorney desires shall be assigned for the me of his office. This floor contains 17,039 square feet of room area.

Diagram No. 2 shows the space asked for in the refer of Attorney is shared with doned flow.

The total amount of room sees asked for in therefore 22, pay square feet.

The District Attorney salmaits "plans and schedule and list of

the reasons therefor. The space asked for is very large, but in such an office it is better to have too much than too little room. The space is available without interfering with any other office in the building, now that the Health Department and the Civil Service Commission have been assigned other quarters. It would not be well to reduce the space asked for by assigning any part of it for other purposes, as such assignment would inevitably interfere with the business of this great office to a certain

as such assignment would inevitably interfere with the business of this great office to a certain extent.

It is may opinion, therefore, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly assign the whole of the fourth floor and the partion of the third floor shaded with dotted fines on Diagram No. 2, to the purposes and uses of the District Attorney's office, excepting the small rooms adjoining the Grand Jury room on the west, on the White street side. The assignment of these rooms I rounded should be held in abeyance pending the question of a new assignment for Judges' chambers on this floor hereinafter mentioned.

The space now accupied on the third floor by the District Attorney, viz., the large room on the northwest corner of the building, will be vacated. The partial and informal use of the library will also be given up. The space occupied on the second measurance story will be vacated.

This will leave for future assignment the large train on the northwest corner of the third story, the small rooms adjoining on the White street side, and the whole of the second measurance story, except the space occupied by the junitor.

I have had as interview with Recorder Goff and Judges Newberger and Foster, and had hoped to present with this report some written application for changes which they desire, but can now, in absence of such application, only give my understanding of what they wish.


They will, I am informed, request that the Coroners' Court, now located on the third story of the building, and shaded with straight lines on Diagram No. 2, he moved to the hasement story, and that the whole of the space now occupied by the Coroners, together with the large room on the northwest corner, and the rooms adjoining it on the east, extending to the Grand Jury room, be assigned for Judges' chambers; the rooms on the second story, now occupied by the Judges, to be used for various purposes, such as extra jury rooms, onsolutation rooms, witness rooms, etc., being necessary, as they consider, as adjoiners to the Co

Until action is taken on this question of the removal of the Coroners' Court, I can only say that there is ample room in the basement for the court and its appartenances.


This being an interior court, it appears to me, should give way to any arrangements considered necessary for the transaction of business in the other courts.

The following communication was received from the Justices of the Court of Special Sessions relative to the assignment of space in the Crimical Court Building :

NEW YORK, Navember 12, 1900.

Hon. Bind S. Count, Commissioner of the Sinking Fund

Hon. Han S. Coler, Commissions of the Sinking Fund:

Siz.—On February 21, 1950, we had the bonor to address you upon the subject of the accommodations assigned for the use of the Clerk's office of this court and beg to invite your attention to the before mentioned communication, which fully explains the situation and condition of the present offices. In that communication we suggested that certain rooms upon the top floor of this building be assigned for the Clerk's offices, but we afterwards learned that said rooms were to be occupied by the Municipal Civil Service Commission or other departments.

Mr. Eugens E. McLean, Engineer, reported in a communication to the Comptroller, dated March 13, 1900, that larger space is necessary than that now occupied by our Clerk's offices and recommended the assignment of a room on the second merzanine floor. This room so assigned was then occupied by the Board of Health and was occupied by them up to within a few months ago. The work of the Clerk's office is of such a character that to separate the offices would cause great inconvenience not only to the Clerk but to ourselves and the public, and is not advisable.

The Civil Service Commission and the Board of Health, who converted much at the control of the clerk but to ourselves and the public, and is not advisable.

advisable.

The Civil Service Commission and the Board of Health, who occupied much of the space in this building, were no doubt assigned other quarters because your Board realized that the different courts required the room occupied by those departments.

We are advised that the District Attorney will soon vacate certain offices on the second marzanine floor now occupied by the Chief Clerk, and it is these offices we now ask to have assigned for the use of the Clerk's office of this court. The offices in question consist of one long office, divided by several partitions, and is on the Centre street side of the building. At present this office is the only one in the building to be vacated which would be adaptable for our use. We have looked it over, and considering the number of employees and the amount of business transacted and the accumulation of papers, are satisfied that there is no more space than is absolutely required.

We respectfully ask that this office, as partitioned, be assigned for the use of the Clerk's office of this court and the present offices be retained for a record ruom, unless other rooms can be set uside for such purpose on the second mercanine floor. We beg also to urge the necessity, in view of such assignment, that instructions be given to place said office in proper condition for the transaction of public business.

Under date of March 13, 1900, I made a report on a previous application by the Judges of the Court of Special Sessions, wherein they called attention to the fact that the Clerk's office, attached to their court, was inadequate, but no action was taken by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund pending the removal of the Health Board and the Civil Service Commission.





Sir-I have received your communication of October 20, 1900, which reads as follows:

"I beg to inclose for your consideration and advice petition of Martin Amador, through his "attorney, Edward M. Perry of No. 175 Remsen street, Brooklyn, in which application is made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a release from The City of New York of the "City's interest in and to that part of the old Wallabout road where the same lies within the "boundary line of Lot No. 15 in Block 3 of Ward 20 of the Borough of Brooklyn.

"I request that you advise me, first, as to the City's interest in and to the property described, and whether it be material or nominal; second, as to any releases made by the "former City of Brooklyn upon the property located within the boundaries of the Wallabout road in this vicinity, and as to the terms on which such releases were granted.

"I also inclose two tracings, one being that of a part of Map No. 23t, in the Kings County "Register's Office, entitled 'Property of Robert E. Manley,' and to which reference is made in "the petition, and the second a copy of the Assessment Map of Block 3 in the Twentieth Ward.

"I request that the papers inclosed be returned."
