Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of April, May and June, 1905.

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

I.—To make the topographical surveys, computations, maps or plans and profiles and reports in connection with the following three (3) divisions of work:

A. The preparation of a design for the street system in those parts of the borough where a design is not adopted as yet, and the making of surveys, maps, etc., showing changes of adopted street systems and grades; also the preparation of three copies for filing of all matters which have been adopted by the Local Boards or approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

B. The actual demarcation on the ground by monument stones and copper bolts of the lines of adopted avenues, streets, public squares, places, etc., and the protection of the same when improvements are being made.

C. The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions, profiles, etc., for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in the matter of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets and other public property.

II.—To keep in custody the records and maps of all matters pertaining to work under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also keeping in custody all maps filed in relation to the Borough of The Bronx, under the Department of Public Parks, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

III.—To make examinations, maps and reports of miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

I.—A—Preparation of the Design of a Street System, Maps Showing Changes of Adopted Street Systems, etc.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, approved a tentative plan of the street system east of the Bronx river, which amended previously filed plans and laid out streets over such areas which had not been taken up.

A resolution was passed as follows:

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx cause to be prepared for submission to this Board in suitable sections and drawn to a larger scale, three similar copies of the adopted general plan of the street system for certification, and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible in a general way, the nature and extent of the proposed changes and amendments, laying out and extending of streets, roads, avenues, squares or places.

Sections 29 and 30, which were adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 3, 1905, and approved by the Mayor March 16, 1905, were filed in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx on June 20, 1905, and June 19, 1905, respectively.

Section 31 was forwarded for adoption to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 29, 1905, and a hearing is fixed for September 22, 1905, before said Board.

Section 32, which was forwarded for adoption to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 24, 1905, was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 28, 1905, and approved by the Mayor May 11, 1905; three copies for filing of this section are under preparation.

Section 33, which was forwarded for adoption to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 12, 1905, will be given a public hearing by said Board on September 22, 1905.

These maps give the side lines of blocks, grades and all necessary information required for the legal opening of such streets.

Computations for the amendments on sections 31, 36, 40, 41 and 45, caused by the changes requested on the Astor estate and the Van Nest Land and Improvement Company (Morris Park Race Track Association), were continued and are nearly completed.

Computations and maps, in relation to sections 35, 36, 39, 40, 41, 44, 47, 48, 49, 50 and 51, were progressed.

The fixture sheets for sections 29, 30, 31 and 32, which show the relation between the new street system and existing street lines and property lines by dimensions and co-ordinates, were prepared during the quarter and are now being examined.

Computations were also made for all the changes or establishing of new street lines, grades, etc., which had been before the Local Boards and for which maps were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for adoption and filing.

## Triangulation.

Chapter 406 of the Laws of 1903 gave authority to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to complete the triangulation of The City of New York and to obtain the co-operation of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey.

This work is under the superintendence of Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and Mr. A. T. Mosman was assigned by the Superintendent of the Coast and Geodetic Survey to take charge of the work.

In accordance with the directions of Mr. A. T. Mosman and in accordance to plans and specifications furnished the following work was done during this quarter: The following triangulation signal stations have been erected at the respective heights indicated:

1. "Baychester"—Bronx and Pelham parkway, nearing crossing of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, 84 feet high.
2. "Maguire"—Boston road and Hutchinson river, 84 feet high.
3. "Nereid"—East of White Plains road, north of Becker avenue, 84 feet high.
4. "City Line, West"—Northern boundary of the city at Mile Square road, 84 feet high.
5. "City Line, East"—Northern boundary of the city at Jefferson avenue and Mundy's lane, 68 feet high.

A tripod and pole have been placed at "Copper Bolt," northern boundary of the city, west of Webster avenue, replacing the temporary pole, which was not high enough; the height of this tripod is 40 feet, with 12-foot pole.

The cupola on the new police station, White Plains road and Fifteenth street, was prepared for occupancy of the observing party.

This work finishes that called for by Mr. A. T. Mosman, Director of Triangulation of Greater New York.

The monuments fixing the positions of the triangulation stations have been set in concrete, as per direction of Mr. Mosman, and the copper marking plugs are being set.

III.—To Make Examinations, Maps and Reports on Miscellaneous Matters Referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

During the quarter 293 communications were referred for report to the Topographical Bureau by the Chief Engineer and the Secretary of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and 253 reports and letters were written on these subjects.

#### Miscellaneous.

During this quarter the correcting and bringing up to date the lithographed maps, west of the Bronx river, in the office of the President of the Borough, Chief Engineer, Topographical Bureau, Bureau of Highways and Bureau of Sewers, was kept up.

The reduction of the topographical survey on a map drawn to a scale of 150 feet to the inch was continued.

The card index of street improvements in the Borough for the President of the Borough and the Chief Engineer was kept up.

Plotting and draughting of record maps, fixture sheets, maps for adoption, office sets and black prints of the sections east of the Bronx river, was continued.

Tracings of sections 29 and 30 were prepared for photo-lithographing.

The map of the whole Borough of The Bronx on a scale of 300 feet to the inch, in ten sheets, has been revised and was lithographed and printed on one sheet on a scale of 1,200 feet to the inch.

Black prints of thirty-eight (38) maps or plans, which were filed, were prepared for the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The final sections of the street system, west of the Bronx river, on a scale of 150 feet to the inch, in the office of the President, of the Chief Engineer and of the three Bureaus, were kept up to date, showing the different amendments adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Many maps, sketches, tracings, black prints and blue prints were made auxiliary to preparing maps for adoption and in connection with various other works under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also a considerable amount of copying and searching of records in the different City departments and the Register's office of New York City and Westchester County at White Plains.

JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Esq., Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor of presenting the following report of the transactions of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices during the quarter ending June 30, 1905:



The buildings, courts and offices in charge of the Bureau have been kept clean and in repair during the term, and necessary supplies furnished.

The following are the principal buildings in care of the Bureau:

The Municipal Building, Third avenue and Tremont avenue.

The Coroners' Office, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

The First District Court-house, Westchester.

The Second District Court-house, Third avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street.

The Sixth District Court-house, Third avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street.

The office of the Board of Health, No. 1237 Franklin avenue.

The repair shops and stables, and the yards at One Hundred and Forty-third street and College avenue, and One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street and Anthony avenue.

The office and stable at Tremont avenue and Mount Hope place.

The offices and stables at Williamsbridge.

The branch office of Highways in bank building, Tremont avenue.

The branch office of regulating, grading and paving on Kingsbridge road.

The free floating bath at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street and East river.

#### The Municipal Building.

The work of dressing down the rock-faced stonework of the cellar walls and plastering over the same with Portland cement jointed to represent cut stone ashlar has been resumed and is progressing as rapidly as the nature of the work will permit. The work on the west and north fronts of the building has been completed, and the east front will be finished in a few days.

The window sashes on the south and east sides of the east wing of the building have been repaired, the glazing reputtied, new glass put in where needed, and work painted with two coats of lead and oil paint.

A draughting table, fitted with closets underneath for keeping plans and documents, was built in the draughting room.

The storm doors and vestibule on the west front of the building was taken down and stored away.

Repairs were made to the furniture, and new hardware supplied where needed in several offices in the building.

The toilet rooms have been kept in order and repairs made to the plumbing where needed. One case of toilet paper has been supplied.

Two new United States flags, 9 feet by 14 feet each, have been furnished for use on the building.

Twenty-four brush brooms and 12 handles, and 24 mops and 12 mopsticks and 24 scrubbrushes and other material supplies furnished for use of the Cleaners.

The boiler furnaces have been repaired and one set of grate bars put in.

5 discs for 8-inch valves.

4 rubber gaskets, 10½ inches by 15½ inches, for manholes.

2 rubber gaskets, 10½ inches by 14½ inches, for tanks.

2 rubber gaskets, 10½ inches by 16 inches, for tanks.

15 discs for 1-inch globe valves.

15 discs for ¾-inch globe valves.

5 air valves, ½-inch connections.

15 brass ½-inch unions.

3 4-inch valves to shut off steam from each wing of the building have been placed in position.

The parapet walls are being repaired and pointed up preparatory to the painting of the exterior of the building, which will commence in a short time.

The Incumbrance Yard, Tremont Avenue and Southern Boulevard.

The roof of the shed has been repaired in several places. The material used in the work was two rolls of tarred roofing paper and five pounds of tinned roofing nails and tin buttons.

#### The Public Bath.

The free floating bath has been thoroughly overhauled and put in good condition for the bathing season of 1905.

The carpenter work has been repaired; new hackmatack knees put under the platform; damaged timbers replaced with new ones; the pontoons taken out, beached, cleaned, scraped, recaulked and tarred and set back in place under the bath.

A new tin roof put on and painted with metallic paint, and the bath painted inside and outside with the best lead and oil paint.

100 rubber treads, 6 inch by 18 inch, furnished.

1 9-foot by 14-foot United States flag, with halyards supplied; also 800 feet of one-half inch manila rope.

1 pair of 8-foot oars and 1 pair of rowlocks.

2 hawsers, each 87 feet long, of 6-inch manila.

2 barrels of pitch.

2 3-knot brushes.

1 dozen S hooks of ¾-inch iron.

2 lag screws of ¾-inch iron.

600 pounds of white lead.

2 4-inch flat paint brushes.

1 pair No. 7 rubber boots.

2 No. 3 roof brushes.

1½ gallons kerosene oil and 1 dozen lamp wicks.

6 pieces 2-inch by 10-inch by 14-foot spruce timber.

2 pounds of copper tacks and 1 package of 10-ounce tacks have been furnished and used in renovating the bath for the coming season. The bath is in excellent condition and ready for opening at its summer station at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street and East river.

## BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

MINUTES OF BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, HELD IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, DECEMBER 8, 1905.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Charles V. Fornes, President of the Board of Aldermen; William Dalton, Commissioner of Public Works and Acting President of the Borough of Manhattan; John C. Brackenridge, Commissioner of Public Works and Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx; Joseph Cassidy, President of the Borough of Queens.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, presided.

The minutes of meeting held October 20, 1905, were approved as printed.

Hon. D. Cady Herrick appeared on behalf of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, and asked that he be notified of the time when the Board would further consider the application of said railroad company for a franchise. Mr. Herrick was advised that the application was now pending and that due notice would be given him of the date on which it would appear on the calendar for consideration by the Board.

Hon. John Henry McCarthy appeared and made a request that the salaries of the Court Officers in the City Court be fixed the same as the Court Officers in the Supreme Court and Court of General Sessions, that is at \$1,500 per annum.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in relation to the proposed Hendrick Hudson Memorial Viaduct:

REPORT NO. 3421.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,

Hon. GEORGE B. MCCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on November 24, 1905, the Commissioner of Bridges submitted with the accompanying communication, dated November 13, 1905, general plans for the proposed Hudson Memorial Bridge over the Harlem river at Spuyten Duyvil Heights.

The project of building such a bridge was brought to the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 13, 1904, when a communication was submitted from the Hudson Tri-Centennial Association, through Mr. T. P. Fowler, its president, urging that the three hundredth anniversary of the discovery of the Hudson river, which will occur on September 12, 1909, be properly commemorated, and suggesting as a proper means of doing so the dedication on that date of a monumental bridge across Spuyten Duyvil creek, connecting Inwood Heights, in the Borough of Manhattan, with Spuyten Duyvil Heights, in the Borough of The Bronx. The communication was referred to the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Engineer of the Board, and a report was submitted by them under date of June 24, 1904. As a result of the recommendations contained in this report, the Board authorized an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of ten thousand dollars to provide for preliminary surveys, borings and plans. The Department of Bridges was subsequently authorized to retain the services of Messrs. Boller & Hodge, consulting engineers, to prepare plans for such a structure, and these plans the Commissioner of Bridges has submitted with his communication now under consideration.

The plans are accompanied by a diagram showing the proposed location of the bridge, this location having been determined upon as the most feasible one after careful surveys and borings to determine the character of the foundation. Its axis will be nearly parallel with the shore line of the Hudson river, and it will admirably fit the topography of the hills on either side of the Harlem river. The plans provide for a steel arch, with a span of eight hundred feet, this length of span being deemed advisable to secure solid rock foundations and avoid the difficulties and uncertainties of deep foundations constructed by the use of pneumatic caissons. The approaches to the main arch are by a series of masonry arches of dignified and imposing design. The plans provide for a bridge 100 feet in width, while the present Washington Bridge has a width of but 80 feet. The estimate of cost is as follows:

If built with granite facings, parapet walls and coping..... \$2,925,000 00  
If built of concrete, with granite coping and parapet walls..... 2,450,000 00

I have requested of the Engineers who prepared the designs an estimate of the saving which would be effected in reducing the width of the bridge from 100 to 80 feet, and they advise me that the estimated difference is \$236,000, of which the

Saving in steel would be..... \$99,000 00  
In masonry ..... 80,700 00  
In roadway paving..... 27,000 00

The difference is relatively slight, as the expensive work will all be retained, and only the filling between the faces will be diminished.

I cannot but believe that a width of 80 feet would be sufficient for this structure, allowing a roadway of 50 feet and two sidewalks of 15 feet each. This roadway would be greater than that of either the proposed Manhattan Bridge or the Blackwell's Island Bridge. It has been said that the contraction of the roadway on a structure of this size and importance would create an unpleasant impression, but a glance at the diagram accompanying the communication will make it apparent that these approaches are all curved roadways with an open space at each end of the bridge, so that no contraction of the driveways need be apparent.

The consideration which should be given due weight in determining whether or not this structure should be built are sentiment, the present need of such a connection, the needs of the immediate future, and the desirability of carrying the Riverside drive to the northerly limits of the City.

Centenaries, bi-centenaries and tri-centenaries of important events in the history of this City are occurring with increasing frequency, and it has been thought proper to observe them with appropriate ceremonies. Such an observance of the three hundredth anniversary of the discovery of the Hudson river might certainly be desirable if it took the form of some improvement essential to the proper development of the City.

As to the present need of such a bridge—the Inwood Heights are now practically inaccessible, one narrow and steep road known as the Bolton road, winding from Dyckman street up to the summit occupied by the Episcopal House of Mercy. It is probable that few of the residents of New York City have ever visited these heights, but the situation is a commanding one and the view probably surpasses that from any other point in New York City. The nearest high-level crossing between the two boroughs is that at Washington Bridge on the line of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street, between two and a half and three miles distant, measured along the Harlem river. The opening of the Rapid Transit Railroad has resulted in a phenomenal development of the northerly end of Manhattan Island and of the adjacent sections of The Bronx, and I believe it safe to predict that by the time this bridge would be completed it would be extensively used.

This structure should also be considered in connection with the probable, if not inevitable, extension of the Riverside drive. An extension of this drive from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street to the Boulevard Lafayette is now being constructed.

The Boulevard Lafayette, the name of which has recently been changed to Riverside drive, furnishes a further extension to Dyckman street, from which the only means of reaching Spuyten Duyvil parkway or the extensive park system of the Borough of The Bronx is by way of Broadway and the bridge across the Harlem River Ship Canal on the line of that street, which bridge is a low-level bridge to be occupied by surface railroad tracks, with a second story accommodating the Rapid Transit Railroad. Broadway will doubtless be taxed to its full capacity by trucking and heavy teaming of all kinds, so that within a short time the demand for an extension of the Riverside drive along or over the Inwood Heights and across the Harlem river to Spuyten Duyvil will be irresistible.

It seems clear, therefore, that this proposed viaduct is one which must be built to build a proper road along the Inwood hill from the end of the bridge to Dyckman can be completed in time for the Three Hundredth Anniversary of the event which it is designed to commemorate.

The bridge itself will be of no use without proper connections. These are practically already established in the Borough of The Bronx, but in Manhattan it will be necessary to build a proper road along the Inwood Hill from the end of the bridge to Dyckman street, a distance of about 340 feet. It is proposed to place the roadway of this bridge at an elevation of 175 feet above mean high water, which would be about 30 feet higher than that of the Washington Bridge, but it will be possible to reach this elevation by a road the grade of which will not exceed 5 per cent.

The Inwood hill is at present occupied by a few houses which are almost inaccessible. Owing to the precipitous sides of this hill it does not seem possible to lay out a street system which will permit of the utilization of the property for residences or for any purposes unless it be divided into large plots to be occupied by public or semi-public institutions. The value of the land is not, therefore, great at the present time, and it is in my judgment to be regretted that this entire hill was not purchased by the City at the time when the large parks in the Borough of The Bronx were secured and set aside for park purposes. The City will probably secure it and devote it to such purposes at some future time, if not at present, and I would suggest that serious consideration be given to the idea of buying it before its values are seriously affected by the building up of the adjacent territory, a substantial increase of these values being inevitable.

If the Board decides to authorize the construction of this viaduct, it will be necessary to provide a certain sum of money at once in order that a beginning may be made. The engineers who prepared the design estimate the cost of the steel structure at \$800,000, the remainder being for foundations and masonry. Foundations for the abutments could be put in at once, and I believe that if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment were to authorize an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$1,000,000 it would provide all the funds which would be needed for the coming year.

As to the use of granite facing, I believe that while concrete would doubtless answer the purpose, this structure would be so monumental in character, forming as it will a conspicuous feature of what will doubtless be the greatest driveway in the world, that it would be wise to use granite facings in accordance with the first estimate of the engineers.

I believe, however, that there is no necessity of making the bridge more than eighty feet in width, and would recommend the approval of the plans on this basis.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—Complying with the directions contained in the resolutions passed by your Honorable Board on June 30, 1905, I submit herewith the general plans for the proposed Henry Hudson Memorial Bridge over the Harlem river at Spuyten Duyvil Heights. These plans are as follows:

- A general map showing the location of the bridge with roadway connections.
- A general elevation and plan of the bridge.
- A perspective view of the proposed structure.

The plans and location of the bridge are approved by the Chief Engineer of this Department, and I respectfully submit them with the recommendation that your Honorable Board approve them and authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$3,000,000 for the cost of land and construction.

In submitting the plans for the structure I beg leave to quote from the report of Mr. Alfred P. Boller, Consulting Engineer, respecting this important work, as follows:

"A good deal of time has been spent during the past summer, spring and winter surveying the district covered by any suggested crossing, and sufficient borings have been made to determine all foundation questions, from which we have constructed the profile on which we have made our plan and estimate.

"As to Location.—Of all the locations suggested for this crossing, the one selected seems to fit best into the topography of the crossing, squaring as it does with the contours of the hills on either side, and connects up the existing group of roads on the Bronx side, besides fitting in with all the projected extensions of the roads and avenues on either side, all of which are clearly shown on the map accompanying this report. It will be noticed that the proposed location is nearly parallel with the existing railroad bridge at the mouth of the Harlem river, and about 800 feet therefrom, but in full view from the Hudson river or the Harlem Valley.

"A favorite line of crossing has been within about 400 feet from the railroad bridge, as that seemed the natural line for the most direct extension of Riverside drive, but the railroad situation at that point, involving a right of way crossing of some 300 feet coupled with the impossibility of securing a practicable foundation south of the above railroad property, makes such a crossing prohibitory."

"As to Elevation of Crossing.—We have adopted for the elevation of the river crossing 175 feet above city datum, that elevation working in to the elevations of existing and proposed roads and parkways, and at the same time yielding 135 feet clear headroom over mean high water of the ship canal, which would be required by the United States Government.

"As to the General Project.—Having in view not only the sentiment that has crystallized to such a large extent the best public opinion into the thought of a great Hudson Memorial Bridge over the Harlem river at Spuyten Duyvil, as a most fitting tribute to the daring navigator who disclosed Manhattan Island to civilization and the commercial world, but also the acknowledged destiny of The City of New York to become the greatest centre of municipal growth and development the world has ever known, we believe that any worthy structure should be planned not only on broad lines, but of such artistic merit as the nature of the problem and good taste permits, so that the utilitarian and the aesthetic may be united in one grand, harmonious whole. While we have kept in view all rational economy, we have not lost sight of the outlook for the future, and what another generation will naturally require in the northern march of the city to the Yonkers line.

"With these thoughts, we submit for your approval a structure of dignified design, with shapely lines and masses, one hundred feet in width, consisting of a great three-hinged arch of steel flanked by a series of masonry constructions, artistically treated. This great centre span of 800 feet was compelled by the width of the chasm of the Harlem, which involved prohibitory foundation difficulties. We therefore spanned from rock to rock, eliminating all foundation problems other than those of the most simple character.

"It will be noticed that the width of the structure on which we have estimated is the widest of any of the recent structures crossing the Harlem, the widest of which being the Washington Bridge, with a width of 80 feet, and while it is perfectly feasible economy to narrow our proposed Hudson Bridge, still it must be remembered that the finest drive in all the world will pass over it, in its extension to the city line, and the temporary economy gained would be out of keeping with the perfect development of this drive.

"As shown on the plan, it is proposed to end the bridge at broad plazas in either side, into which gather the avenues and parkways focussing at these points. These plazas will be appropriate places for emblematic sculpture, and our selection of the site for a statue of Henry Hudson is noted upon the map herewith, and which it is expected would be provided by the Memorial Association.

"As to the Cost.—We have made a careful computation of the cost of such a memorial bridge as we recommend, having developed sufficient detail for enabling us to



determine the amounts of the several classes of work and material with reasonable accuracy, and submit herewith what we believe to be a fair estimate of cost:

"First—A structure 100 feet wide, with granite facing, parapet walls, and coping, two million nine hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars.

"Second—If built of concrete, with coping and parapet walls of granite, two million four hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

"As to Time of Construction—As the celebration now being planned occurs September 9, 1909, if this memorial bridge is to form part of it, no time should be lost in getting the work under way. Large as it is, it can be accomplished.

"Much preliminary preparation is required before contracts can possibly be let, and I request as prompt action as possible in order that the work may be speedily advanced.

Hon. William M. K. Olcott, representing the Committee, appeared in favor of the proposition.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for the purpose of providing means for the acquisition of land and construction of a monumental bridge or viaduct, to be erected across the Spuyten Duyvil creek, connecting Inwood Heights, in the Borough of Manhattan, with Spuyten Duyvil Heights, in the Borough of The Bronx, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding one million dollars (\$1,000,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx and Queens and the Acting Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn—12.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the plan of building a bridge connecting Inwood Heights, in the Borough of Manhattan, with Spuyten Duyvil Heights, in the Borough of The Bronx, as outlined in a communication submitted by the Commissioner of Bridges in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated November 13, 1905, be and it hereby is approved, except that the bridge, or viaduct, shall have a width of eighty feet, instead of one hundred feet, as shown and described in the plans and communication referred to.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Queens—12.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer of the Board be directed to consult with the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and report, as soon as possible, such map changes as are necessary to give a proper approach to the bridge.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Queens—12.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Flatbush Taxpayers' Association requesting a public hearing relative to the terminal station at the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn Bridge.

The Secretary was directed to call the attention of the association to a communication sent to the Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Brooklyn Transportation Reform League, under date of October 2, 1905, relative to this subject, and to suggest that if said association desires also to submit a detailed statement of any proposition for the Brooklyn Bridge which it suggests as an alternative or substitute for the plans already adopted, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will be pleased to give it consideration.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Secretary of the Fire Department of the Town of Newtown, requesting an appropriation of \$5,000 for maintenance for the year 1906, pursuant to section 15, chapter 450 of the Laws of 1905.

Referred to the Fire Department.

The President of the Board of Aldermen appeared and took his place in the Board.

The Secretary presented a communication from Mr. Sanford G. Gowdey, representing the Citizens of Little Neck, Borough of Queens, objecting to the acquisition of a site for school purposes located at Alley road and Broadway, and protesting against the acquisition of the same for the reason that it will incur a waste of the City's money, is a bad situation, is not central, is opposed by the Local Board, that the selection was made in violation of the Charter, and for various other reasons, and requesting a hearing.

Referred to the Board of Education with the statement that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment agrees with the protestants.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Subway Committee, Thirty-second Ward Taxpayers' Association, protesting against the extension of the Subway in Flatbush, and setting forth in detail its reasons for such protest.

Referred to the Rapid Transit Commission.

NEW YORK, December 1, 1905. }

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

DEAR SIR—The appropriation to this Department for Supplies and Contingencies, including Deficiencies, 1905, is about exhausted, and an additional sum of about \$25,000 will be needed to pay the bills which are now being presented.

I have succeeded in keeping down the bills to outside counsel, so that in the appropriation for Contingent Counsel Fees, including Deficiencies, 1905, there will be a balance, as nearly as I can estimate at present, of about \$10,000. The other appropriations to the Department for the current year are just about sufficient to meet the demands upon them, and it will therefore be necessary to obtain \$15,000 of the \$25,000 that I have asked for from some other department.

In the appropriations for 1906 your Board has been kind enough to allow me in the salary appropriation an amount to pay for most of the extra typewriting and process-serving work which at present is paid for from the appropriation for Supplies and Contingencies, and you have also made provision for paying the fees of expert witnesses in tax cases out of a special appropriation, but during the current year I have been obliged to pay all of these bills out of my appropriation for Supplies and Contingencies, and there have been other bills to pay which were entirely unexpected; for instance, at the close of the year 1904 the amendment to the law in regard to the collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes took effect, and in thousands of claims actions had to be commenced before December 31, 1904, to prevent the statute of limitations from running against the City. The office force was entirely unable to cope with this extraordinary situation, and on December 31, 1904, there were turned over to the Sheriffs of New York and Kings Counties several thousands of summonses and complaints. By doing this the time to commence the actions was extended, under the Code of Civil Procedure, for sixty days, which is the time allowed to a Sheriff to serve a summons. The Sheriff of New York County served 8,791 of these summonses and complaints, and the Sheriff of Kings County 9,861, and in this manner 18,652 actions were commenced which otherwise would have been outlawed. For the services rendered by the Sheriffs I was obliged to pay out of my appropriation for Supplies and Contingencies \$5,846.32, but the amount of Arrears of Personal Taxes which will be collected in these actions will greatly enlarge the collections by this office for the current year.

I therefore ask that your Board make the following transfers:

(1) From the appropriation to the Law Department for Contingent Counsel Fees, including Deficiencies, 1905, to the appropriation to the Law Department for Supplies and Contingencies, including Deficiencies, 1905, the sum of.....	\$10,000 00

The additional amount allowed in the Budget to this Department for 1906 will, I believe, be entirely sufficient to meet all of the ordinary expenses during that year, and I think that the transfer which is now asked will be the only one that will be needed to pay all the bills which have been contracted during the current year.

Commissioner Lantry stated to a representative of the Department of Finance that he desired to comply with the prevailing rate of wages law, and that he had been assured the rate for pilots on passenger steamers was \$135 a month; that the salary of \$1,620 a year was intended for Captain and Pilot on the large steamboats of the Department; that the salary of \$1,400 was to be paid to Captain and Pilot of small boats and Assistant to Captain and Pilot of the large boats.

In view of the fact that the creation of a position of Pilot at \$1,400 in the Department of Charities was not recommended in a report of the Investigations Division, under date of December 6, 1905, because of the existence of a grade of Pilot at \$1,350 in said Department, and in view of the fact that the work of Pilots in both the Charities and Correction Departments is similar in character, I would suggest that the position in the Correction Department be fixed at \$1,350 instead of \$1,400, as requested by the Commissioner.

A representative of the Department of Finance learned at the Department of Public Charities that the pilots' organization has cited a number of private corporations which pay pilots \$135 a month; that it is proposed to fix the salary of Pilots in charge of the two large boats of the Charities Department, the "Brennan" and the "Fidelity," at \$1,620 a year, the prevailing rate for pilots for passenger steamers; that the Assistant Pilot on the "Brennan" be paid under the present grading \$1,200 or \$1,350, according to experience and length of service; that the Commissioner does not ask for an Assistant Pilot on the "Fidelity"; that the Department asks \$1,400 a year for salary for Pilots in charge of the smaller boats, to which rate Pilots may be gradually advanced from lower present grades when their experience and length of service justify it.

In view of the fact that a grade of Pilot at \$1,350 is already established in the Department it would seem unnecessary to establish another grade at \$1,400, only \$50 per annum more, and that the Pilots on the smaller boats would seem to be adequately compensated at \$1,350 per annum.

It is therefore recommended that the request of the Commissioner of Public Charities be granted, so far as it applies to the grade of Pilot at \$1,620 per annum, for the compensation of the Pilots for the large boats.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Acting Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn—15.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Board of Aldermen relative to the fixing of the salary of the position of Stenographer to the Board of Aldermen at the rate of \$2,550 per annum.

Laid on the table.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning requesting the fixing of the salary of the position of Driver at \$800 per annum; and also requesting an allowance of 25 cents per hour to be paid to Sweepers for Sunday work.

Referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion whether the Commissioner has the right to allow the extra pay for Sunday work or whether the same must first be authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Your Board under date of April 28, 1905, adopted a resolution recommending to the Board of Aldermen the fixing of salaries of certain members of the clerical and uniformed forces of this Department at increased rates. This recommendation has not up to the time of the adoption of the Budget for 1906 been concurred in by the Board of Aldermen. The same increases submitted to your Board and approved by it by said resolution of April 28, 1905, were provided for in the estimate of this Department for that Budget and that Budget having been adopted by the Board of Aldermen and approved by the Mayor the question arises whether this is not substantially a compliance with section 56 of the Charter so as to fix the salaries at the amounts recommended by your Board without further action of your Board and the Board of Aldermen? But as this question involves a point of law I submit it to your Board for such action as it may deem advisable.

The said estimate provides also for increases in the salaries of the Drivers of this Department, as follows:

Under the appropriation "Carting," 1,575 Drivers at \$800 per annum each, with extra pay for Sundays, at \$2 per Sunday (estimated).

Under the appropriation "Sweeping," for extra pay for Sundays for 3,050 Sweepers at \$2 per Sunday each (estimated).

The recommendation for an increase in the pay of Drivers was made because of the very laborious work of the men engaged in carting refuse for this Department and it was intended to apply to such Drivers only as are actually engaged in driving carts.



I submit herewith a form of resolution to be adopted by your Board authorizing this increase in the pay of Drivers and the allowance of extra pay for Sunday work for Sweepers and Drivers.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the establishment of an additional grade of the position of Driver in the Department of Street Cleaning, and recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, that the salary of said additional grade be fixed at the rate of eight hundred dollars (\$800) per annum.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of The Bronx, Queens and Acting Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn—15.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Expert Accountant, Investigations Division, Department of Finance, relative to taking a school census:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,  
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,  
November 23, 1905.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—In regard to the matter of taking a school census, concerning the desirability of which numerous letters have been recently addressed to the Comptroller by representatives of different societies interested in the education and welfare of the young, referred to this Division for investigation, I beg to report as follows:

A more or less frequent taking of the school census would seem necessary to compliance with the requirements of the Compulsory Education Law enacted in 1894, being chapter 671 of the Laws of that year, and providing as follows:

"Section 3. Every child between eight and sixteen years of age, in proper physical and mental condition to attend school, shall regularly attend upon instruction at a school in which at least the common school branches of reading, spelling, writing, arithmetic, English grammar and geography are taught, or upon equivalent instruction by a competent teacher elsewhere than at a school."

The importance of such a census was recognized by the Legislature by the enactment in 1895 of chapter 550 of the Laws of that year, which provides as follows:

"Section 1. It shall be the duty of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to take or cause to be taken in the next ensuing October after the enactment of this law, and thereafter in every second year in the month of October, a school census in all towns and cities of the State having a population of ten thousand or upwards, which shall ascertain the following facts, and he shall embody a summary of the same in his annual report, for the year in which said census is taken, viz., the names and ages of all persons between the ages of four and sixteen; the number of persons in each town or city coming within the application of this law between the ages of twelve and twenty-one that are unable to read or write; the number of persons over four and under sixteen years of age who do not attend school because they are obliged to work within school hours; the number of persons between four and sixteen who are attending other than public schools, and such other facts as in his judgment may be of importance in securing the information needed to carry out the requirements of article nine, section one of the State Constitution or for the improvement of the common school system."

"Section 2. In taking this school census the Superintendent of Public Instruction is authorized to determine the work to be done by all of the common school authorities and employees under his superintendency, and it shall be the duty of all such authorities and public officers having any civil authority in connection with the common school administration of the State or of said city or town to aid said Superintendent in all proper ways in the discharge of his duties under this act."

"Section 4. The money required for the purpose of carrying this act into effect shall be paid by the towns and cities respectively included in the provisions of the act, and shall be paid for the service rendered in taking the school census on the certificate of the State Superintendent that such census has been satisfactorily taken."

The census was taken under this law in October, 1895, and again in October, 1897. In a circular addressed to the city and village superintendents in regard to taking the census of 1895 the State Superintendent recommended "That the boards of education, wherever practicable and advisable, employ the most efficient teachers connected with their public schools to act as enumerators."

In his report regarding that census he stated:

"In only two or three places was it found practicable to make use of teachers as enumerators, and appointments were generally made upon the recommendation of the board of education or school superintendents of the cities. In New York and Brooklyn the census was taken by the police."

"The taking of the census was attended with no unpleasant features in any city, and the complete success of the initial trial of the law speaks well for the energy and executive ability of the city and village superintendents who had special supervision over it."

In his report in regard to the census of 1897 the Superintendent says:

"The method of taking the census was practically that adopted for the first biennial school census (that of 1895). Enumerators were appointed by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the census was taken in accordance with the rules and regulations prescribed by that department. The routine and technical details of the work were intrusted to the city and village superintendents where the census was taken, with the exception of New York City, where, by special request, a superintendent of the census was appointed. The experiment tried in some of the smaller cities and villages in 1895 of permitting teachers to take the census during afternoons and half-holidays was abandoned, as the results did not seem to warrant a continuance or extension of this plan. In the City of Brooklyn the census was taken by the police in the same manner as in 1895, for the reason that the chaotic condition of the financial affairs of that city, owing to its approaching incorporation in The City of Greater New York, rendered it impossible for any other plan to be followed. We still object to this plan of taking the census, inasmuch as the work is apt to be done in a perfunctory manner and the results less likely to be correct and reliable than those obtained where careful supervision of the work is exercised by men appointed especially for the purpose and when enumerators trained in work of this nature are appointed."

"To take the biennial school census every two years as required by law seems to force upon municipalities an unnecessary expense, and I have recommended in an earlier part of this report that the Legislature amend the law so that the census be taken every four years. If once carefully taken the records can be revised by the attendance officers of the city or village yearly and kept in good working order for a period of at least four years."

The census for 1897 seems to have been the last taken. In his annual report for the year 1899 the State Superintendent says:

"It was decided not to take the biennial school census in October, 1899, for the reason that no appropriation had been made to this Department to defray the necessary expenses of preparation. It cannot be said that the failure to take the census has resulted in any serious disadvantage. The census taken in 1895 and 1897 did not prove as useful as anticipated. Much of the work done was valueless so far as concerns aiding this Department in the administration of the compulsory attendance law. A complete national census will be taken during the year 1900, and it is believed that all facts and information desired may be gained from this source. The law providing for a biennial school census should be repealed, or amended in many particulars, especially in the direction of requiring a census not oftener than once in four years."

The duty of carrying the act into effect has since devolved upon the Commissioner of Education by virtue of chapter 40 of the Laws of 1904, which provides as follows:

"Section 4. The office of Superintendent of Public Instruction and the office of Secretary of the Board of Regents shall be abolished from and after April 1, 1904, and the powers and duties of said offices shall be exercised and performed by the Commissioner of Education."

In answer to a letter addressed to the Commissioner of Education in regard to the matter under consideration, Mr. Thomas E. Finigan, Chief of the Law Division of the State Educational Department, writes, under date of November 15, 1905, in substance, that chapter 550 of the Laws of 1895 has not been repealed, but that the census is not taken for the reason that the Legislature has not made an appropriation to enable the Department "to make the necessary tabulation, report, etc."

It would seem at least doubtful whether any legislative appropriation is contemplated by the act under consideration. It provides (section 4) that the money required to carry it into effect shall be paid by the towns and cities included in its provisions. It also requires (section 1) that a summary of the facts ascertained by the census shall be embodied in the next annual report of the Commissioner of Education. The tabulation necessary to the summary, as well as the summary report required to be made, would seem to be both necessary to carrying the act into effect and the work of preparing them a part of the service to be paid for by the several towns and cities in which the census is taken.

In the circulars sent out by the State Superintendent preparatory to taking the census in 1895 and in 1897, it was announced that the blank books for taking the census would be furnished by his Department at so much per book, to be paid for by the towns and cities receiving them, and in his report in regard to the taking of the first census he states that—

"The expense of taking the census was a charge upon the cities and villages, and in all cases was paid on the certificate of the State Superintendent that such census was satisfactorily taken."

A reading of the act leads to the conclusion that no legislative appropriation is needed for the carrying out of its provisions, but rather that the proper authorities of towns and cities included in its provisions, acting on the assumption that the Commissioner of Education will perform his duty in the premises, should, every alternate year, provide the revenues enabling him to do so.

However, as the law has been now for some eight years practically a dead letter, and in view of the unsatisfactory results of the census as already taken, it might be well before reviving the act to consider the advisability of amending it. This might be done in time for the taking of a census in 1906.

It would seem that action, if any, to be taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would be at the most but advisory, possibly in the form of a resolution looking to co-operation with the Departments of Education, State and City, in an endeavor to secure appropriate legislation for the taking of an efficient and satisfactory school census as often as may be deemed necessary to compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements in regard to maintenance of the public school system.

SIR—The Commissioner of the Department of Parks in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, has selected property located on Prospect, Tenth and Eleventh avenues, in said Borough of Brooklyn, for the purpose of erecting workshops and stables, now located in the park, which workshops and stables have been a source of complaint from the property owners living on the westerly side of Prospect Park, West.

The property selected by the Commissioner is property upon which the City holds tax sale certificates, acquired under and by virtue of chapter 114 of the Laws of 1883, and the amount of taxes due the City in principal and interest is, in my opinion, more than the value of the property. I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the selection of this site and authorize the acquisition of the same by condemnation proceedings, for the use of the Commissioner of the Department of Parks.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—In regard to the request of the District Attorney of the County of New York, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen the fixing of additional grades in the position of Clerk, Stenographer, Process Server, Messenger, etc., in his office, referred to this Division for examination, I beg to report as follows:

The District Attorney states that in many instances the designations at present applied to positions in the administrative force of his office are entirely misleading, as they do not indicate the duties performed by the persons holding the respective positions; that he has long had it in mind to apply for correction of this anomalous and confusing situation, but that other matters of importance have prevented his doing so.

He further states that he now finds it necessary, owing to a number of resignations therefrom, to reorganize his office force, and desires to have positions graded upon rate of annual compensation and as contemplated by the State Civil Service rules; that it is not his intention now to fill the additional grades asked for, but that he would like to have them fixed so that if, at any time in the future, he should wish to make any promotion warranted by his appropriation, he may be able to do so without frequent applications to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, each one trifling in itself. For instance, if he should desire to promote an Office Boy to the position of Junior Clerk, a fixing of the grades as requested would afford an opportunity for doing so that does not exist now.

As an instance of inappropriate and misleading designation, the District Attorney cites that of a Clerk in the Bail Bureau having the pay-roll designation of "Assistant Docket Clerk, Court of General Sessions, Part I." He states that his pay-roll is filled with designations no less absurd.

The additional grades which are asked to be provided contemplate certain increases of salary, among which are the following:

It is proposed to raise the salary of Deputy Chief Clerk Andrew Fay from \$2,700 to \$3,000 per annum. As Mr. Fay has been employed in the office for twenty years, it would seem that an increase of \$300 in his salary might be only deserved recognition of long and meritorious service.

The same may be said in the case of Mr. John J. Buckley, now designated as "Deputy Chief Clerk and Auditor" at a salary of \$2,700. It is asked that his position

be designated as that of "Auditor" and that the salary be fixed at \$3,000. Mr. Buckley has been in service sixteen years and is doubtless entitled to the recognition of merit sought to be given him.

It is also proposed that the salary of the Chief Stenographer, Mr. Charles W. Gould, an attorney-at-law, be increased from \$1,600 to \$2,500. The District Attorney states that, in addition to performing the duties of Chief Stenographer, Mr. Gould has charge of the Complaint Bureau created by the District Attorney for the purpose of receiving and investigating the complaints of people claiming to have been defrauded by individuals and concerns engaged in swindling the public, especially the poor and ignorant, who are unable to employ counsel to protect their interests; that the Bureau is open day and night, Sundays and holidays excepted, and that the work it devolves upon the Chief Stenographer requires a high degree of intelligence and a thorough knowledge of civil and criminal law. It would, therefore, seem that the salary proposed might not be unreasonable.

In the positions of Indictment Clerk and Grand Jury Clerk, each filled by an attorney-at-law at a salary of \$1,400, it is asked that an additional grade be fixed at a salary of \$1,500, making promotion possible.

An additional grade is proposed for the position of Information Clerk at a salary of \$1,800, the only grade at present being at a salary of \$1,500. The new grade is desired in order to afford an opportunity for promotion when deemed advisable.

The same statement is made with regard to additional grades proposed in the positions of Stenographer and Messenger. In the former position the highest grade at present is \$1,500. The proposed grade of \$1,800 is asked for purposes of possible promotion. The present highest grade in the position of Messenger is \$720, the salary of the Chief Messenger being \$1,500. A grade of \$1,200 is asked for purposes of promotion.

It is also proposed to substitute in place of "County Detectives," receiving \$1,000 and \$1,200 a year, different grades of a new position to be designated as that of Process Server, at salaries of \$1,000, \$1,200, \$1,400, \$1,500 and \$1,800, respectively.

The position of Chief Clerk was included in the list of proposed new or additional grades through mistake, the salary at present being \$5,000.

The object of the District Attorney, as already stated, is not at once or in the near future to make any considerable number of the increases in salary that would be made possible by fixing the additional grades asked for, but to be himself in a position to make promotions, in accordance with the letter and spirit of the Civil Service rules at such times as the best interests of his office may seem to warrant his doing so. The salaries suggested do not seem to be out of proportion with those paid for similar service in other departments.

I would therefore respectfully recommend the creation of the following positions in the office of the District Attorney of New York County:

GENTLEMEN—In looking over the County farm on Staten Island to determine the best location for the New York City Tuberculosis Hospital, for which you have appropriated \$200,000, I have become deeply impressed with the necessity of acquiring the adjoining land, known as the Schmidt farm, situated on Manor road, Ward 2, Borough of Richmond, and comprising about twenty-five acres of field, garden and orchard land. The elevation is about 400 feet above tide water, overlooking the bay and ocean, thus insuring perfect drainage. The acquirement of this land will give ample room and obviate any necessity of placing the tuberculosis patients in the vicinity of our cottage or other Department buildings. If taken at once, I understand it can be obtained for \$500 an acre, plus a reasonable allowance for the buildings thereon. This seems to be a reasonable price and is in about the same ratio to that paid by the City in 1903 for the land adjoining.

SIR—Honorable James H. Tully, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, in a communication under date of September 30, 1905, addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, states that in looking over the County farm on Staten Island to determine the best location for the New York City Tuberculosis Hospital, for which \$200,000 had been appropriated, that he has become deeply impressed with the necessity of acquiring the adjoining land, known as the Schmidt farm, on Manor road, Ward 2, Borough of Richmond, and comprising about twenty-five acres of field, orchard and garden land, with an elevation of about 400 feet above tide water, overlooking the bay and ocean, thus insuring perfect drainage.

The Schmidt farm of twenty-five acres is known on the tax assessment books as Lot No. 325, in Plot 37, Volume 2, Ward 2, Borough of Richmond, and adjoins the Mary G. White farm of 38.238 acres, which was taken by the City in condemnation proceedings at a cost of \$19,381.56, or about \$507 an acre. The White farm had no buildings whatever.

The Schmidt farm, known as "Ocean Hill View," has on it a two-story, mansard and cellar frame dwelling, 32 by 36 feet. This building is at least forty years old, but was substantially built and is in fair repair, except where a former purchaser started to make alterations and improvements which were never finished. The house has fifteen rooms and has been vacant for about three years.

The farm has on it also a caretaker's 1½-story barn, 32 by 48 feet, built within recent years; a 1-story wash house, 15 by 18 feet; a 1-story ice house, 12 by 12 feet; another smaller ice house, about 10 by 12 feet, together with a hay shed, corn crib, chicken houses, wood shed and other small structures. About half the land is cultivated, the other half being fairly well wooded, mostly black and white oak. The cultivated land includes an orchard and garden of about eight acres. The main house is located on top of a knoll and a fine view is obtained in every direction.

The owner, Charles F. Schmidt, has agreed to sell the farm of twenty-five acres, with improvements thereon, to the City for \$15,000, or at the rate of \$500 an acre, and \$2,500 for improvements. I am informed that this was the price at which the property was sold about five years ago, and it is also the price at which the owner offered the property for sale a year ago to private purchasers.

The price asked, while full value, is not excessive. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the selection of the site by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities and authorize the acquisition of the land at a price not exceeding \$500 an acre, together with the improvements thereon, at a price not exceeding \$2,500, at private sale, the acreage to be determined by a survey, the whole price not to exceed \$15,000.

Palmer, Special Receiver, by deed dated the 15th day of April, 1847,

—and the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to enter into contracts for the acquisition of the above-described property at private sale, at a price not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) per acre, together with the improvements situated thereon, at a price not exceeding twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500)—said contracts to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form, but that such purchase price shall in no event exceed in total the sum of \$15,000.

DEAR SIR—Under recent date, a sewerage district plan amending District No. 33 L-4, was forwarded to you for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This amendment was suggested for the reason that the sewers in this district have proven to be inadequate to properly provide for the drainage at the present time, and will be much less able to do this when the territory is fully built up. In order to avoid claims for damages on account of the overflows which have already occurred and which will probably continue to occur, I would recommend that a sewer be constructed across the New York and Harlem Railroad property, from Brook avenue south of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to Courtlandt avenue; and in Courtlandt avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-third street; and in East One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Courtlandt avenue and Melrose avenue; and in Melrose avenue, between East One Hundred and Sixty-third street and East One Hundred and Sixty-second street.

The estimated quantities for this work are:

SIR—In relation to request of Hon. Louis F. Haffen in communication hereto attached that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment provide the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000), for the purpose of constructing certain relief sewers in District No. 33 L-4, Borough of The Bronx, I respectfully report:

An Engineer of this Bureau under my direction has examined into the matter and it is found that the sewers proposed to be built, viz.: Across the New York and Harlem Railroad property, from Brook avenue south of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to Courtlandt avenue; in Courtlandt avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-third street; in East One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Courtlandt avenue and Melrose avenue; and in Melrose avenue, between East One Hundred and Sixty-third street and One Hundred and Sixty-second street, are intended to furnish additional drainage to a section which has for a number of years been subject to overflows and back-water in cellars and basements, caused by an inadequate drainage system.

The present sewers when built were considered to be of sufficient size, but as the neighborhood developed and the houses that were constructed were much larger and closer together than was anticipated, it was seen that some extra relief must be furnished.

The sewers now in all of these streets were built at the expense of the owners, the cost of the sewers having been assessed against the adjacent properties, and any relief that is now afforded will have to be paid for from funds appropriated for the purpose and borne by the City at large.

The work proposed, and which I believe is necessary, aggregates some 1,142 linear feet of pipe and brick or concrete sewer, and I do not consider the amount asked for (\$30,000) excessive.

In view of the facts, I am of the opinion that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 176 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$30,000 for the purpose of improving the Sewerage District No. 33 L-4, Borough of The Bronx.

DEAR SIR—In explaining the conditions of the drainage of Sewer District 33 K-4, we find that the provisions in the filed sewerage district plan are not sufficient to adequately take care of the drainage at the present time, and surely the system will be entirely inadequate when it is fully built up.

It will therefore be necessary in order to provide against further overflows, which have been complained about in this locality, to construct a relief sewer from Brook avenue sewer across the freight yards of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, and across the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, from Brook avenue to German place, at Rae street; in German place, between Rae street and Carr street; in Rae street, from German place to St. Ann's avenue; in St. Ann's avenue, between Rae street and Westchester avenue; in Westchester avenue, between St. Ann's avenue and Trinity avenue, and in Trinity avenue, between Westchester avenue and a point 550 feet northerly therefrom.

The amount of work required for this relief sewer is as follows:

- 308 linear feet of concrete sewer, 4 feet 3 inches by 2 feet 11 inches.
- 25 linear feet of brick sewer, 3 feet 6 inches in diameter.
- 475 linear feet of brick sewer, 3 feet 3 inches in diameter.
- 255 linear feet of 24-inch pipe sewer.
- 352 linear feet of 18-inch pipe sewer.
- 765 linear feet of 15-inch pipe sewer.
- 575 linear feet of 12-inch pipe sewer.
- 1,000 linear feet of 6-inch pipe as risers for house connections.
- 270 spurs.
- 30 manholes.
- 2,650 cubic yards of rock.
- 10 cubic yards of concrete.
- 50 cubic yards of broken stone.
- 12,000 feet (B. M.) timber.

The estimated cost of this work is \$35,000, and I would recommend that the Board of Estimate be requested to authorize the necessary funds for this work.

I have caused an examination of the matter to be made by an Engineer of this Bureau, and it is found that the proposed improvement consists of the construction of concrete, brick and pipe sewers, aggregating in length some 2,755 linear feet, the same to furnish increased drainage to the section lying in and about the following named streets, viz.:

In German place, between Rae street and Carr street; in Rae street, from German place to St. Ann's avenue; in St. Ann's avenue, between Rae street and Westchester avenue; in Westchester avenue, between St. Ann's avenue and Trinity avenue, and in Trinity avenue, between Westchester avenue and a point 550 feet northerly; these to be connected with the main outlet in Brook avenue by a sewer to be built across the freight yards of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad and the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad and emptying into the said outlet sewer at a point opposite German place and Rae street.

SIR—In reference to the accompanying communication of Hon. Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx, addressed to the Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to appropriate \$115,000, to defray the expenses of constructing a bridge to carry Jerome avenue over Mosholu parkway drive and approaches, I beg to submit the following report:

The proposed improvement is to be located at the intersection of Jerome avenue with Mosholu parkway, in the Borough of The Bronx, and is for the purpose of avoiding a grade crossing at this point, the idea being to carry the traffic on Jerome avenue, including the surface railroads, by means of a bridge over the parkway.

Accompanying the Borough President's letter is a communication from Mr. Josiah A. Briggs, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx, giving the quantities of work to be done, in order to carry out the proposed plan, and an estimate of the cost of the same based upon prevailing prices, including engineering, inspection and contingencies. Accompanying this communication is a plan showing the general scheme, but no detailed design for the bridge has, as yet, been prepared.

It undoubtedly is desirable to avoid grade crossings of this character, as the driveway and avenue cross at right angles, and the crossing at grade would be attended with both danger and inconvenience, and the more so as commercial and other traffic increases at this point.

I am of the opinion that the general scheme is a desirable one, and the amount requested for the purpose of carrying it out not excessive. I would therefore recommend that, if the financial condition of the City permits, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of one hundred and fifteen thousand dollars (\$115,000), for the construction of a bridge to carry Jerome avenue over the Mosholu parkway drive and approaches, in the Borough of The Bronx.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—William E. Melody, as former Sheriff of Kings County, asked for the sum of \$2,250, the amount of a bill presented to him by Edward Riegelmann, attorney and counselor at law, for services rendered and to be rendered in prosecuting and defending actions and proceedings brought by or against the said Melody for alleged acts of omission or misconduct in his official capacity by virtue or color of his office as said Sheriff.

Upon his examination before the Comptroller the said Edward Riegelmann testified that the charges made by him were based upon the theory that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment could not audit bills for services after the end of the year 1905; that if the Corporation Counsel should hold that the said construction was wrong and that the services after that period could be paid for he desired to avail himself of such privilege, endeavoring to be paid the reasonable value for all of the services rendered.

Under date of the 31st of August, 1905, a report was made upon this claim by the Division of Law and Adjustment of this Department, in which it was stated that "it would appear desirable to defer an adjustment of this claim until the opinion of the Corporation Counsel is had, first, as to whether or not the right to recover for reasonable costs and counsel fees incurred after the expiration of the Sheriff's term of office in prosecuting or defending any actions brought by or against him in his official capacity, is limited to the period of two years after the termination of his office, and secondly, as to whether or not payment may be made at this time for costs and counsel fees for services hereafter to be rendered."

In said report it was recommended that the same be transmitted to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion regarding the legal liability of the City in the premises.

Said report having been transmitted to the Corporation Counsel with a request for such opinion, a communication has been received from him, dated November 15, 1905, which is transmitted herewith. It is therein stated that he was of the opinion that the theory upon which the said claim was made, namely, that the law limits the appropriations thereon for the purposes indicated to the period of two years after the retirement of the Sheriff from office, was a mistaken construction of the law; that "the right of the Sheriff to be reimbursed for charges paid or incurred for prosecuting or defending actions or proceedings as stated by the statute as amended, is not limited to those accruing within two years after the expiration of his term of office, but may be continued until the final determination of such actions or proceedings, the only proviso being that the amount allowed shall not exceed \$5,000 in any one year," and that "this being so, any claim made in the present application for charges which may be anticipated in any such action or proceeding should be disallowed."

It would appear from this opinion of the Corporation Counsel that the adjustment of this claim should be made upon the basis of a reasonable allowance to the claimant for charges paid or incurred in prosecuting or defending be left to future adjustment any prior to the filing of such claim, and that there should be left to future adjustment any claim which may be presented for services hereafter to be rendered.

In view of the communication by Charles H. Hyde, dated the 12th of June, 1905, addressed to the claimant, and of the testimony of Luke D. Stapleton before the Comptroller, it would appear that the sum of \$1,500 would be a reasonable allowance for the services alleged to have been rendered by the said Riegelmann and for which claim is made by the said Melody, former Sheriff of the County of Kings, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which is charged by law with the function of auditing and allowing said charges, would be justified in making an appropriation of that amount for the year 1905.

It is respectfully recommended that this report and the other papers in the case be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its information and for such action as it may deem advisable.

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL,  
NEW YORK, November 15, 1905.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—I have received under date September 7, 1905, a communication signed H. L. Smith, Assistant Deputy Comptroller, transmitting the report of Joseph L. Hance, Auditor of Accounts, Division of Law and Adjustment of the Department of Finance, in the matter of Claim No. 43,548, filed in said Department by William E. Melody, for \$2,250 alleged to be due for professional services rendered and to be rendered in prosecuting and defending actions and proceedings brought against him as former Sheriff of Kings County for alleged acts of omission or misconduct.

It appears by the papers submitted that the items going to make up this claim are for services in two actions brought against the late Sheriff. In both cases the charges include payment for services which have not yet been rendered, but which it is supposed may be incurred before the final determination by Appellate tribunals of the questions involved. The claim is thus made upon the theory that the law limits the appropriations authorized for the purposes indicated to the period of two years after the retirement of the Sheriff from office. I am of opinion that this is a mistaken construction of the law.

Prior to the 1st day of January, 1902, the compensation of the Sheriff of the County of Kings consisted of certain fees, perquisites, percentages or other allowances fixed by law. By chapter 705 of the Laws of 1901 the office of Sheriff of the County of Kings was made a salaried office, the cost of the maintenance of which, including the salaries of the Sheriff and his assistants, clerks, employees and subordinates, was made a charge against The City of New York, and all fees and other commissions received by the Sheriff in pursuance of any provision of law were directed to be paid into the treasury of said City. By section 2 of said act, it was provided that "after the expiration of the term of office of each Sheriff in the County of Kings, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York is hereby authorized to audit and allow as charges against said City the reasonable costs and counsel fees paid or incurred by said Sheriff after the expiration of his term of office in prosecuting or defending any actions or proceedings brought by or against him for any alleged act or omission or misconduct in his official capacity by virtue or color of his office, but said sum so audited and allowed shall not exceed five thousand dollars for any one year or be audited and allowed for a longer period than two years after the expiration of his term of office."

This provision was amended by chapter 464 of the Laws of 1903 so as to read as follows:

"After the expiration of the term of office of each Sheriff of the County of Kings the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York is hereby authorized to audit and allow as charges against said City the reasonable costs and counsel fees paid or incurred by said Sheriff after the expiration of his term of office in prosecuting or defending any actions or proceedings brought by or against him for any alleged act or omission or misconduct in his official capacity, by virtue or color of his office, and in proceeding with and completing the execution of each mandate he began to execute before the expiration of his said term of office, and the execution of which he is required by law to complete, but said sum so audited and allowed shall not exceed five thousand dollars for any one year. Nor of the said five thousand dollars shall the amount so audited and allowed for reasonable costs and counsel fees for proceeding

with and completing the execution of such mandates exceed one thousand dollars in any one year, or be audited and allowed for a longer period than two years after the expiration of his term of office."

It will be noticed that the statute as originally enacted provided only for the audit and allowance of charges covering the reasonable costs and counsel fees paid or incurred by the Sheriff after the expiration of his term of office in prosecuting or defending any actions or proceedings brought by or against him, and that the sum so audited and allowed should not exceed five thousand dollars for any one year, or be audited and allowed for a longer period than two years after the expiration of the term of office. The amended statute, on the other hand, provides for the payment not only of costs and counsel fees paid or incurred for prosecuting or defending actions or proceedings brought by or against the Sheriff, but also for proceeding with and completing the execution of each mandate he began to execute before the expiration of his term of office, the execution of which he is required by law to complete. The total amount to be allowed for both purposes in each year remains limited to \$5,000, and out of this amount only \$1,000 may be allowed for the completion of the execution of mandates in each year for two years. There is no limitation of time relating to the amount to be allowed for the prosecution or defense of actions or proceedings brought by or against the Sheriff.

It cannot be doubted that the amendment was intended to cure the defect in the original statute, which would seem to have required the Sheriff to pay personally the expenses of any such action or proceeding the prosecution or defense of which extended beyond the period of two years after the expiration of his term of office, which in view of the well-known delays of the law would almost inevitably happen in each of such cases. This view is emphasized by the fact that an action against the Sheriff upon a liability incurred by him by doing an act in his official capacity, or by the omission of an official duty, except the non-payment of money collected upon an execution, need not be brought until one year after the cause of action has accrued (Code of Civil Procedure, section 385), and that an action against such officer for the non-payment of money collected upon an execution need not be brought until three years after the cause of action has accrued (ibid., section 383).

I advise you, therefore, that the right of the Sheriff to be reimbursed for charges paid or incurred for prosecuting or defending actions or proceedings as stated by the statute as amended, is not limited to those accruing within two years after the expiration of his term of office, but may be continued until the final determination of such actions or proceedings, the only proviso being that the amount allowed shall not exceed \$5,000 in any one year. This being so, any claim made in the present application for charges for services which may be anticipated in any such action or proceeding should be disallowed.

SIR—A petition addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, W. H. Newman, President, under date of September 29, 1905, reads in part as follows:

"That your petitioner has prepared and herewith submits to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval a map showing the location, area and dimensions of certain strips or parcels of land not exceeding twenty-five feet in width, which are situate within The City of New York and are contiguous to the right of way leased to your petitioner.

"Wherefore your petitioner prays that said plans be approved and said approval evidenced by the adoption of a resolution in the form indorsed upon such map, and duly certified by the Mayor and Secretary of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the said Board will inform your petitioner of the terms and conditions upon which the said lands, so described in Schedule A, may be granted and conveyed in fee to your petitioner."

The City is authorized to transfer the above mentioned parcels of land by chapter 584, Laws of 1905, entitled:

"An Act to authorize the grant by The City of New York to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company and to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, or either of them, of lands and lands under water lying between the southerly line of the land of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company at East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and the northerly boundary line of The City of New York for railroad purposes."

—of which the following is an extract:

Section 1. "The City of New York, acting by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment \* \* \* is hereby authorized and empowered to grant and convey to the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad Company and to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company or to either of them \* \* \* such strips or parcels of land or land under water, for whatsoever purpose such land or land under water may now be held by The City of New York \* \* \* as may be necessary or reasonably required for the corporate purposes of the said companies or either of them \* \* \* etc."

Sec. 2. "The railroad company making application for the grant and conveyance hereby authorized shall prepare a map or plan showing the location, area and dimensions of such lands and shall submit the same to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval. If any such lands are held or owned by The City of New York for park purposes such map or plan shall be approved by an indorsement thereon by the Commissioner of Parks of The City of New York having administrative jurisdiction of the public parks and parkways in the Borough of The Bronx of said City, subject to the further approval of the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

The map prepared by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, which accompanies its petition and which is hereto attached, shows seven parcels numbered 4, 5, 7a, 9, 11-12, 14 and 35a. Schedule A accompanying the petition contains a description of these parcels, but refers to them by the numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6. For convenience, I will adopt the numbering used on the map.

Parcels 4 and 5 are strips 15 feet in width on either side of the railroad right of way, extending from a line south of Central Bridge to the northerly limit of Macomb's Dam Park and crossing land acquired for Central Bridge, Jerome avenue and Macomb's Dam Park. Parcel 4 contains 18,088 square feet and Parcel 5 contains 17,244 square feet more or less.

Parcel 7a is about 18 feet in width, lies within the lines of East One Hundred and Seventy-first street and contains 1,080 square feet more or less.

Parcel 9, about 16 feet wide, takes part of the land acquired for the new Croton Aqueduct, and contains 1,062 square feet more or less.

Parcel (11 and 12), about 11 feet wide, extends through the land acquired for Washington Bridge Park, and for the approach to Washington Bridge, and contains 4,369 square feet more or less.

Parcel 14, about 4 feet wide, is taken from land acquired for Washington Bridge Park and contains 622 square feet more or less.

Parcel 35a, about 22 feet wide, lies within the lines of Fordham road and contains 1,848 square feet more or less.

I would call your attention to the fact that the land proposed to be conveyed is now used for the following specific purposes, parks, highways, bridges and aqueduct, and notwithstanding that section 2 of the empowering Act provides for the approval of the transfer only by the Commissioner of Parks and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in my opinion the proposition should be referred for approval to the President of the Borough of The Bronx as to Parcels 4, 5, 7a and 35a; to the Commissioner of Bridges as to Parcels 4, 5 and (11 and 12), and to the Aqueduct Commissioners as to Parcel 39.

I also recommend that the Borough President and department heads be requested to verify the dimensions of the plots under their jurisdiction shown on the map prepared by the railroad company.

Acting under authority of chapter 301 of the Laws of 1903, the Commissioner of Parks executed the following leases of land and land under water, abutting on the railroad right of way in Macomb's Dam Park, which are represented on a map hereto attached, entitled "Bulkhead line at Macomb's Dam Park, scale one inch equals fifty feet." As Parcel 4 encroaches upon these leases, any conveyance of that parcel must be subject to them.

Atalanta Boat Club; date, November 24, 1903; lease begins December 1, 1903; lease expires December 1, 1928; rent per annum, \$50.

Nassau Boat Club; date, September 28, 1903; lease begins October 1, 1903; lease expires October 1; rent per annum, \$50.

Harlem Rowing Club; date, October 30, 1903; lease begins November 1, 1903; lease expires November 1; rent per annum, \$50.

Metropolitan Rowing Club; date, October 23, 1903; lease begins November 1, 1903; lease expires November 1; rent per annum, \$37.50.

Wyanoke Boat Club; date, October 26, 1903; lease begins November 1, 1903; lease expires November 1; rent per annum, \$37.50.

Crescent Rowing Club; date, October 31, 1903; lease begins November 1, 1903; lease expires November 1; rent per annum, \$25.

First Bohemian Boat Club; date, December 1, 1903; lease begins December 1, 1903; lease expires December 1, 1928; rent per annum, \$50.

As the parcels proposed to be conveyed are not affected by any improvements contemplated by the City, upon the consents of the Borough President and Department officers above mentioned being given, I think, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly express their approval of the map submitted in the form of the resolution thereon inscribed.

I would suggest that the question of the amount of compensation be deferred until all the necessary approvals have been affixed, except that of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

GENTLEMEN—The Committee on Buildings begs to report that the weekly financial statement submitted by the Auditor shows that there is a balance available for the erection of buildings and the equipment thereof, amounting to \$2,533,249.53, and plans and specifications are in such a condition that contracts can be let by January 1, 1906, which will completely exhaust this fund.

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on November 24, 1905, there was referred to the Engineer of the Board a communication from the Board of Water Supply requesting an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$2,062,000, to defray the expenses of the Administration and Engineering Departments of the Board for the ensuing twelve months.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized on that date an issue of \$500,000 and instructed your Engineer to report as to what additional amount would be required for the needs of the Board.

The estimate submitted is divided into two main items, one for administration and the other for engineering and construction. The first item, amounting to \$150,000, covers the salaries of the Commissioners and those of their subordinates, office rent, stationery, traveling and other expenses. The salaries of the Commissioners are fixed by law, and those of their office staff are apparently based upon the complete organization which will doubtless be effected within a few months, and I doubt if it would be proper to materially, if at all, reduce the amount of their estimate. The estimate also includes an item for expenditures for work incidental to the acquisition of real estate or the damages appraised to persons interested therein amounting to \$60,000, and while it is impossible to predict what expenses of this kind may arise, I think it would be wise to place this sum at the disposal of the Board.

The estimates for engineering and construction work are classified in three divisions, the Headquarters, Aqueduct and Reservoir Departments. The Headquarters Department asks for \$135,000 for salaries. The present pay roll of this office amounts to \$4,800 per month, or at the rate of \$57,600 a year, while the sum asked for is equivalent to an average monthly roll of \$11,250. I doubt if it would be possible to organize a force the pay rolls of which would require for the twelve months more than \$100,000. For equipment, supplies and investigations the sum of \$112,000 is asked. This includes \$25,000 for instruments and the same amount for furniture; \$20,000 for supplies, printing, etc.; \$10,000 for special investigations and experiments; and a similar sum for a laboratory for testing cement and other materials. I believe that it would be perfectly safe to reduce this sum to \$100,000.

Fifteen thousand dollars is asked for rent, while the present office rent amounts to \$615 per month, or \$7,380 per year. More room is needed, but it is doubtful if more than \$12,000 will be needed for this purpose, so that the total for the expense of the engineering headquarters could, in my judgment, safely be reduced to \$212,000, or \$50,000 less than the estimate.

In the Aqueduct Division provision is made for a complete organization comprising a corps of 219 Engineers and subordinates, with a total salary roll of \$281,000, while the Engineer in charge of that division admits that it is probable that such a force will not be required until much later than January 1, 1906, if at all. I think that this item can safely be reduced to \$180,000.

For surveys and investigations the amount of \$304,000 is asked. This is supposed to include the wash borings along the Hudson river and inland, with diamond drill borings under the river and in the inland valleys, together with test pits, monumenting the aqueduct line, and the expenditure of \$50,000 for purchasing right of way. While liberal provision should be made for the most complete investigations, I doubt if more than \$250,000 could be used for this purpose.

The estimate also includes \$83,000 for land and offices, which, in my judgment, could safely be reduced to \$60,000.

This makes a total for the Aqueduct Department of \$490,000, or \$178,000 less than the estimate.

The estimate of the Reservoir Department is \$157,000 for salaries, \$37,000 for surveys and investigations, and \$6,000 for office expenses. The amount for salaries seems out of proportion to the other expenses, but I find that the labor and supplies for the extensive borings needed at the site of the proposed Ashokan Reservoir are included in the item of salaries, the detailed estimate for the engineering force being \$95,000. I think that the total asked for this Department can safely be reduced to \$150,000.

Five hundred thousand dollars is for the purchase of land and is added to the other estimates. Two other items aggregating \$143,000 have been inserted for land, offices and damages. Twenty-five per cent. is also added for unforeseen items and contingencies, although it would appear that the estimates above referred to amply provide for such unforeseen items and contingencies, and, in my judgment, this item could be safely omitted.

The total reductions above suggested are \$560,000, and after allowing for the \$500,000 already authorized, there would remain \$1,002,000 to be provided for the coming twelve months, and it is recommended that provision be made for this amount.

SIR—There are one or two vacancies on the staff of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to fill which several attempts have been made, but there has been great difficulty in securing men to accept appointment for the precise grades already established. The greatest difficulty has been found in securing Topographical Draughtsmen, of which there are two grades at present, namely, one at \$1,350 and one at \$1,500, and I believe that more satisfactory results would be obtained by the creation of the grade of Assistant Engineer at \$1,800 per annum.

An undue amount of time has been devoted by the Engineers of the office to work which could readily be done by a competent Clerk, especially one familiar with the routine of street opening and condemnation proceedings, and in order to permit the appointment of such a Clerk, I think it would be wise to establish several grades, so that when a man eligible for appointment is found there will be a grade to fit him.

There is one Assistant Engineer on the staff at a salary of \$5,000 per annum, which salary is admittedly higher than that usually paid to men of such title, and as he is in every respect qualified to assume the duties of the Chief Engineer, I think it would be wise to change his title to that of Principal Assistant Engineer.

I beg, therefore, for the reasons above given, to recommend the creation of the following additional grades on the staff of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, namely:

It also appears to be absolutely necessary to use this lead-lined pipe in order to operate the elaborate reservoir recently installed at the aquarium.

These contracts were duly advertised and bids opened on August 31, 1905, and a protest was made against awarding the contract to the lowest bidder on the ground that the said patent article was included in said specifications.

Under these circumstances it becomes necessary to ask the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to pass a special resolution authorizing the use of this lead-lined pipe, which I am informed can only be purchased from the Lead-lined Pipe Company, of Wakefield, Mass.

Mr. Townsend, who will hand you this letter, is the Director of the Aquarium, and will explain to you the urgent need of this particular lead-lined pipe, and the New York Zoological Society will esteem it a great courtesy on your part if you will procure for us the necessary resolution in due legal form for the use of this pipe.

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, Borough of Manhattan, this 19th day of December, 1905, hereby initiates proceedings to acquire title to the land lying on the easterly side of Riverside drive, between West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth streets, as widened and shown on a map adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 23, 1905, and acquire title to West One Hundred and Sixtieth street, between Broadway and Riverside drive; acquire title to West One Hundred and Sixty-first street, between Broadway and Riverside drive; acquire title to West One Hundred and Sixty-second street, between Broadway and Riverside drive; acquire title to West One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Fort Washington avenue and Riverside drive, as shown on a map adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 23, 1905; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of the resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

REPORT No. 3457.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER,  
December 20, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, Borough of Manhattan, at a meeting held on December 19, 1905, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to the land lying on the easterly side of Riverside drive, between West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth streets, as widened by the plan adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 23, 1905, and also for the acquisition of West One Hundred and Sixtieth street, between Broadway and Riverside drive; West One Hundred and Sixty-first street, between Broadway and Riverside drive; West One Hundred and Sixty-second street, between Broadway and Riverside drive, and West One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Fort Washington avenue and Riverside drive, all four of which streets were laid out on the map referred to as having been adopted on June 23, 1905.

This resolution of December 19 has been substituted for a resolution previously adopted which provided for acquiring title to all of that area added to Riverside drive by the plan of June 23, 1905, the present resolution providing only for acquiring title to the land added to the easterly side, this change having been made at the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in view of the fact that certain further changes, affecting the westerly side of the Riverside drive at this point are now under consideration by the Local Board. When the former resolution was received in this office the question was raised by your Engineer as to whether or not the City Charter permitted the grouping together of five streets not continuous or extensions of each other in one opening proceeding. To meet this point the President of the Borough has secured an opinion from the Corporation Counsel, dated December 12, 1905, in which he is advised that there is no legal obstacle to this grouping of several streets in one opening proceeding.

When this plan was adopted in June last the owners of property fronting on these proposed streets expressed their intention of immediately developing it, and the acquisition of title is necessary in the carrying out of their plan. I see no reason, therefore, why the resolution should not be approved and the proceedings initiated.

Accompanying the resolution is a copy of a proposition adopted by the Local Board of the Washington Heights District on November 21, 1905, recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the entire expense of acquiring title to the additional land needed for the widening of Riverside drive be borne by The City of New York. This resolution is said to have been adopted, two of the members of the Local Board voting in favor of the proposition, and two being excused from voting. Under the rule of the Board, this being the widening of an existing street, which is already more than 60 feet in width, one-half the cost of acquiring the land would be borne by the City at large and the remaining half would be assessed upon the property benefited. In the case of the other four streets covered by this resolution, they all being 60 feet in width, the entire expense would be assessed.

The grouping of these five streets makes it exceedingly difficult, if not impossible, to determine the proper percentage of the cost of the entire proceeding which should be borne by the City at large, nor does your Engineer feel satisfied that under a resolution of this kind the Board can determine that all or any part of the expense of widening one street should be borne by the City at large, while none of the cost of acquiring the other four streets should be so assumed. Even if the area of the land to be taken for the widening of Riverside drive were to be computed and its relation to the total area to be acquired determined, that probably would not give the proper percentage of the total cost to be assumed by the City for the reason that the value of the land fronting upon the present Riverside drive is doubtless very much greater than that lying within the limits of the four new streets; but if the proper ratio of the value of the land to be taken for the widening of Riverside drive to the total value of the land to be taken for the five streets could be determined, there is much doubt as to whether the Board of Estimate and Apportionment could do more than simply recommend to the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in this matter that the benefit of that part of the expense to be borne by the City should be applied to those who would only be assessed for acquiring the addition to Riverside drive, instead of distributing it over the entire area which would be assessed for the other streets. The relative areas to be acquired for these streets are approximately as follows:

Riverside drive.....	82,400

West One Hundred and Sixty-second street.....	51,200
West One Hundred and Sixty-third street.....	30,300

This makes a total of..... 285,800

—of which total area that to be taken for the Riverside drive forms about 28 per cent., one-half of which percentage, or 14 per cent., might be a proper proportion of the total cost for the City to assume. In view, however, of the much greater value of the land fronting on Riverside drive, it might be fair to double this area in comparison with the others, in which event the value of the land to be taken for the

Riverside drive would represent about 45 per cent. of the total value, and if the City were to treat this street as a widening, it would assume 22½ per cent. of the entire cost.

I know of no other way in which the principle of the rule under which the Board has been working could be applied to this particular case, where five public streets are grouped in one proceeding, and I would recommend that the percentage last named be the part of the cost to be assumed by the City in this proceeding, and that the Corporation Counsel be requested to urge the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to apply this relief to what would be the area of assessment for the widening of Riverside drive.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court, for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the widening of Riverside Drive, on its easterly side, from West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street to West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, and for the opening and extending of West One Hundred and Sixtieth street, from Broadway to Riverside Drive; West One Hundred and Sixty-first street, from Broadway to Riverside Drive; West One Hundred and Sixty-second street, from Broadway to Riverside Drive, and West One Hundred and Sixty-third street, from Fort Washington avenue to Riverside Drive, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, as shown on a map adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 23, 1905.

Resolved, That 50 per cent. of the cost and expense of acquiring the lands and premises required for the widening of Riverside Drive, on its easterly side, between West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street and West One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and that the remainder thereof shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, and that the entire cost and expense of acquiring the lands and premises required for the opening of West One Hundred and Sixtieth, West One Hundred and Sixty-first and West One Hundred and Sixty-second streets, between Broadway and Riverside Drive, and West One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Fort Washington avenue and Riverside Drive, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

Whereas, New York and Port Chester Railroad Company has made application to this Board for a grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate its railroad across certain streets in the Borough of The Bronx; and

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, The Mayor has, in pursuance of such laws, designated "New York Times" and "New York Daily News" as the two daily newspapers published in said City in which the publications hereinafter provided for are to be made, other than those required to be made in the City Record; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to New York and Port Chester Railroad Company and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor, and the results of such inquiry and notice of a public hearing to be had thereon before this Board have been published at least ten days in the City Record, and at least twice in "The New York Times" and "The New York Daily News," two daily newspapers published in the City of New York, and a public hearing has been had thereon by this Board;

Now, therefore, it is Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to wit:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to New York and Port Chester Railroad Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York as follows, to wit:

## PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this day of 190 , by and between The City of New York, party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, and New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, a domestic railroad corporation of the State of New York, hereinafter called the Railroad Company, party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City of New York hereby grants to the Railroad Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right to cross certain streets and highways hereinafter described, and the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a railroad, with all connections, turnouts, switches and cross-overs necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railroad, by means of electricity, or by any other mechanical motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, except steam locomotive power, in, upon and across the following-named streets, avenues, parkways, highways and public places, and upon the following route, all situate in the Borough of The Bronx, City, County and State of New York, namely:

Main Line—Beginning at a point at or near the intersection of Southern Boulevard and Willis avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, and running thence easterly between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and Southern Boulevard, crossing Brown place to Brook avenue; thence crossing Brook avenue and thence crossing the

Southern Boulevard, between St. Ann's avenue and Brown place; thence crossing St. Ann's avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Southern Boulevard; thence easterly and northeasterly, between Southern Boulevard and One Hundred and Thirty-second street to Cypress avenue; thence crossing Cypress avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Southern Boulevard; thence between Cypress avenue and Willow avenue to One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence crossing One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street; thence between Willow avenue and Southern Boulevard, crossing One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street to Willow avenue; thence crossing Willow avenue and crossing One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, at or near its intersection with Willow avenue, to One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street; thence crossing One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street and One Hundred and Fortieth street, between Southern Boulevard and the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad to One Hundred and Forty-first street; thence crossing One Hundred and Forty-first street, and thence crossing and along Southern Boulevard and Whitlock avenue, at or near their junction between One Hundred and Forty-first street and One Hundred and Forty-second street; thence crossing St. Joseph's street, between Whitlock avenue and Austin place; thence crossing One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Austin place and Whitlock avenue to Austin place; thence crossing Austin place, between Whitlock avenue and Timpon place to Timpon place; thence between Whitlock avenue and Southern Boulevard, and crossing Timpon place, Leggett avenue, East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Craven street, Longwood avenue, Lafayette avenue, Tiffany street, Barretto street, Hunt's Point road, Hoe street, Faile street, Bryant street, Longfellow street, Aldus street, Whittier street, to Guttenberg street; thence between Whitlock avenue and Longfellow street, crossing Guttenberg street and Westchester avenue to and crossing Home street; thence crossing Freeman street, Boone street, Edgewater road, West Farms road and Jennings street; thence crossing East One Hundred and Seventy-second street, East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, between West Farms road and Boone street; thence along and across Boone street to One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street; thence between West Farms road and Longfellow street, crossing One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street and Rodman place to West Farms road; thence along and across West Farms road to and across East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street to Tremont avenue; thence to and across Bronx street to the Bronx river; thence crossing East One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street and Lebanon street, between Bronx Park avenue and Bronx river; thence along and across East One Hundred and Eightieth street and Bronx Park avenue at or near their intersection; thence to and across the northerly branch of West Farms road or Adams street, between Morris Park avenue and the easterly line of Bronx Park; thence to and across Unionport road, an unnamed street, or another branch of Unionport road, Victor street, Washington street, or White Plains road, Louise street, Lincoln street, Jefferson street, Madison street and Bear Swamp road or Bronxdale avenue to Williamsbridge road; thence crossing Williamsbridge road approximately 2,400 feet southeast of Bronx and Pelham parkway to Bronx and Pelham parkway; thence crossing Bronx and Pelham parkway, approximately 2,100 feet east of its intersection with Williamsbridge road, and running thence northerly between Williamsbridge road and Eastchester road to Saw Mill lane; thence crossing Saw Mill lane near its intersection with Eastchester road; thence crossing Eastchester road or Corsa lane, between Boston Post road and Saw Mill lane to Boston Post road; thence crossing Boston Post road near its intersection with Schieffelin's lane to Schieffelin's lane; thence crossing Schieffelin's lane near its easterly intersection with Boston Post road; thence northerly to the City line, being the route shown on maps entitled "Survey Maps and Profiles of the line or route of the railroad of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, in the County of New York, State of New York," adopted by the Board of Directors of said Company on the 8th day of February, 1904, and signed by W. C. Gotshall, President, W. C. Gotshall, Chief Engineer, and Francis Blanchard, Secretary, under seal and which maps and profiles were filed in the office of the County Clerk of the City and County of New York on the 6th day of May, 1904, or any lawful amendment thereof, which may be consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority.

Branch Line—Beginning at a point at or near the southeast corner of Bronx Park, in the Borough of The Bronx; thence across or along Bronx Park avenue, East One Hundred and Eightieth street, East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, Lebanon street, Morris Park avenue, at or near its intersection with West Farms road; thence across or along West Farms road, at or near its intersection with Morris Park avenue; thence across the Southern turnpike, or Westchester avenue, at or near its intersection with Clason's Point road; thence across Clason's Point road, near its intersection with the Southern turnpike, or Westchester avenue, being the route shown on a map entitled "Map and profile of branch line extending from main line (Bronx Park) to Clason's Point, New York City," forming part of the maps filed with the County Clerk of the City and County of New York, referred to in the preceding paragraph, or any lawful amendment thereof, which may be consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or their successors in authority. The "Survey Map and Profiles" are hereinafter referred to solely for the purpose of indicating the route of the railroad and not the profile thereof.

General—And such other streets, avenues, highways, public places, etc. (named and unnamed), as may be hereafter opened or encountered, in such routes or amended routes; and also such other streets, avenues, highways, public places, etc. (named and unnamed), now open or in use, or as may be hereafter opened or put in use, which it may be necessary for said railroad to cross, in order to make connections with any other railway within two thousand (2,000) feet of said routes; provided that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall first have given permission for such connection or connections; and provided, further, that such connections shall be limited to two (2) in number.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

1. The provisions of section 6 of the Railroad Law shall be fully complied with, and in addition to the maps required to be filed with the Railroad Commissioners, it shall be incumbent upon the Railroad Company to file with the Comptroller of The City of New York a map or maps showing the number of tracks and length of same, including crossovers, switches, turnouts, sidings and stands within the present limits of The City of New York, such lengths to be accurately determined by measurements to be taken after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad within the present limits of The City of New York.

2. The said right to cross the streets and the privilege to construct and operate said railroad shall be held and enjoyed by said Railroad Company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this con-

tract is signed by the parties hereto, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege. In the determination of the said revaluation may be considered and included the extension of the provisions of this agreement contained in the paragraphs numbered 7 and 8 herein, and the payment of the costs and expenses therein provided for by the Railroad Company, or otherwise.

If the Railroad Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal, it shall make application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the said Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this grant. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient, if agreed to in writing by the Railroad Company and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or such other authority in its place. If the Railroad Company and the Board, or such other authority in its place for the City, shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this grant, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five years shall be reasonable; and either the City (by the Board, or such other authority in its place) or the Railroad Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with such other authority fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable; and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Railroad Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the contract, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority, within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the Railroad Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last year of this original grant. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this grant, then the Railroad Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate.

3. Upon the termination of this grant, if it be not renewed, or, in case of a renewal thereof, upon the termination of such renewal, all rights and privileges hereby granted to cross the said streets shall cease and determine, unless the said Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, shall have previously procured a new grant for the same from The City of New York.

4. The Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay to The City of New York, for the rights and privileges hereby granted, the following sums of money:

During the first five years commencing from the day when this contract is signed, an annual sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000), and during the next succeeding five years an annual sum of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000), and during the next succeeding fifteen years an annual sum of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000).

From the date of the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad until the end of the first five years of this grant, an additional sum of five and four-tenths cents per linear foot per annum of single track, including all crossovers, switches, turnouts, sidings and stands, within the present boundaries of The City of New York, and for the next succeeding five years an additional sum of seven and seven-tenths cents per linear foot per annum of single track, as aforesaid, in lieu of said sum of five and four-tenths cents, and for the next succeeding fifteen years an additional sum of twenty cents per linear foot per annum, as aforesaid, in lieu of said sum of seven and seven-tenths cents.

All such payments shall be made to the Comptroller of the City, in equal payments at the end of each quarter year, on the first day of January, April, July and October of each year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to The City of New York by the Railroad Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of The City of New York or by any law of the State of New York.

5. The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the privilege hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railroad company providing for payments for railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant. Nothing herein contained shall apply to any mortgage or mere lienor, but shall apply to any purchaser upon foreclosure or under or by virtue of any provision of a mortgage or lien.

6. The rights and privileges granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evi-



denced by an instrument under seal, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents. This provision, however, shall not apply to the making of a mortgage nor to a sale under foreclosure, provided that no sale under foreclosure shall be made to any person or corporation owning, operating or controlling any other railroad in The City of New York.

7. The grade of the railroad has not yet been established. Profile maps definitely showing such grade within the present limits of The City of New York shall be filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Railroad Company before beginning the construction of its railroad within the present limits of The City of New York. A duplicate thereof shall at the same time be filed with the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, after a public hearing, of which ten days' notice shall be given by publication, shall then approve or disapprove the said profile map and grades, and upon the Board approving the same the Railroad Company may thereupon proceed with the construction of its railroad within the present limits of The City of New York.

If said Board disapproves the same it shall within 30 days after said hearing prescribe such changes in said map as it may deem necessary.

Within the present limits of The City of New York no street or railroad shall be crossed by the railroad at grade, and no existing park or parkway shall be crossed by the railroad at or above the grade of said park or parkway. All streets now open or in use and streets hereafter opened within the present limits of The City of New York, crossing the line of the railroad, shall be carried over or under the said railroad by the Railroad Company, at the sole cost and expense of the Railroad Company. The cost of all changes in grades of all approaches to such crossings within the present limits of The City of New York shall likewise be borne and paid by the Railroad Company, and The City of New York assumes no liability for any damages to property injured thereby, or by said railroad crossings, or any damages to property along the line of said railroad or contiguous thereto, caused by reason of the construction or operation of the said railroad, and the Railroad Company hereby agrees to indemnify and save harmless The City of New York of and from all such liability.

The City shall have the right at any time it so desires to open across the route of the Railroad Company within the present limits of The City of New York any new streets other than those now open or in use, and the Railroad Company hereby gives its consent to said opening.

8. Within the present limits of The City of New York all viaducts over streets and all tunnels under streets and all bridges necessary to carry the streets over an open cut, shall be constructed and maintained at the expense of the Railroad Company. All viaducts over streets within the present limits of The City of New York shall have a height of at least sixteen feet in the clear throughout, and in the case of arch construction not less than sixteen feet in the clear at the centre and ten feet in the clear on the building or side line of said street, and in the case of tunnel construction under a street there shall be at least four feet between the grade of the street and the exterior surface of the arch of said tunnel.

9. Within the present limits of The City of New York any superstructure of the railroad crossing a street and having a length of seventy-five (75) feet or less, shall be constructed in a single span. If more than seventy-five (75) feet in length, intermediate columns to support the structure may be placed in the street in such manner as may be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The width of such superstructure of the railroad shall not exceed sixty (60) feet when measured over all.

10. The plans for all structures over or under any street within the present limits of The City of New York must first be submitted to and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and all such structures shall be constructed of steel, concrete or masonry, or a combination of these materials. Such structures over streets shall be floored and shall be water-tight.

11. The railroad shall be constructed in the most modern and approved manner of railroad construction. Unless otherwise authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the roadbed shall be ballasted throughout its entire length within the present limits of The City of New York, with a sufficient quantity of either blast furnace slag or broken trap rock of a hard and durable quality, and no dirt, sand, gravel or cinders shall be used in such ballast. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment may, however, at any time require a portion of the road not theretofore ballasted to be ballasted.

12. The roadbed within the limits of The City of New York as now fixed or hereafter extended shall be watered daily whenever the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit. Should, however, watering the roadbed in any way injure electric line equipment which has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, then other means of preventing dust shall be used, which shall be first approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. For any failure to comply with the foregoing, the Railroad Company shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day.

13. The entire right of way of the company within the present limits of The City of New York, except at stations, shall be fenced throughout.

14. Within the present limits of The City of New York, all abutments or foundations for bridges, viaducts and stations and the stations proper, except intermediate supports for viaducts, as hereinbefore provided, shall be placed on the land of the company.

15. There shall be constructed along the line of the route of the main line of the railroad as proposed for the accommodation of local passenger traffic, at least six stations between the Harlem river and the Bronx river, at least six stations between the Bronx river and the northern line of The City of New York, as now fixed. On the branch line there shall be constructed at least three stations east of Morris Park avenue, unless otherwise authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

16. Said railroad may be operated by electric power or by any other mechanical motive power, which may be lawfully employed upon the same, except locomotive steam power. If electrical power is used, the Railroad Company shall, before the commencement of any of the construction of the electrical line equipment, within the present limits of The City of New York, file with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment plans showing such proposed construction, within the present limits of The City of New York, including all methods of insulation, position of contact conductor and all feed wires, conductors or cables, with method of carrying the same, and said plans must be approved by the said Board before construction thereof shall begin. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby retains the right to make such conditions relative to construction of such line equipment within the present limits of The City of New York as it may see fit at the time of the approval of such plan.

17. No wires for the transmission of power shall be permitted within the present limits of The City of New York unless they be placed in

conduits or carried in a manner which shall have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The City may use the structure of the Railroad Company for carrying wires or cables for the use of the City within the present limits of The City of New York not exceeding such a quantity as might be carried in two conduits each of not more than three inches in diameter, without charge to the City. If the Railroad Company shall place its wires for the transmission of power in conduits, then the Railroad Company shall construct and permit the City to use without charge two conduits each of not more than three inches in diameter for carrying wires or cables for the use of the City.

18. The Railroad Company shall not carry wires or conduct power on its structures or along its right of way within the present limits of The City of New York for any purpose except for the operation of its railroad and except, as provided above, for the use of the City.

19. The Railroad Company shall maintain throughout the term of this grant or any renewal thereof a train schedule on the main line within the limits of The City of New York of at least sixty (60) trains in either direction daily, stopping at all of the stations within the City limits, and at no time, either day or night, shall there be greater headway within the City limits between such trains than thirty (30) minutes; provided, however, that said Railroad Company shall not be required to operate its trains within the City limits between the hours of 1 o'clock and 5 o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall determine, after a hearing had thereon, that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during such hours.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment may require, from time to time, as it may see fit, such number of trains to be run on the branch line—not exceeding 60 trains a day.

20. All cars on said railroad shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and any failure to keep the temperature of any of the cars of the company above 50 degrees Fahrenheit, shall make the company liable for a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each offense.

21. All cars operated by the company shall be vestibuled and the system of lighting same shall be adequate and be made satisfactory to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. For any failure to comply herewith the Railroad Company shall be liable to a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each violation.

22. The Railroad Company shall light the space beneath any superstructure which it shall erect across streets and the approaches to stations, within the limits of The City of New York, in a manner which shall be satisfactory to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

23. During the term of this grant the rate of fare upon said railroad within the limits of The City of New York, as now fixed, shall not exceed five cents for any passenger. The said company shall not charge any passenger more than such sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railroad, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, and controlled by it, to any point thereof or of any such connecting line, or branch thereof, within the present limits of The City of New York during such term. The New York and Port Chester Railroad Company shall operate cars over the route hereby authorized, and shall not operate cars over the route of any other railroad company within the present limits of The City of New York until it shall have received authority for such operation from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it shall not, without like authority, permit any other company within the present limits of The City of New York to run cars over the railroad hereby authorized. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment reserves the right to fix the compensation to be paid for such privilege to The City of New York by such other company as shall be authorized to run cars over the route hereby authorized, and said Board further reserves the right to fix the compensation to be paid to The City of New York by the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company for the privilege of operating cars over the route of any other railroad company within the present limits of The City of New York.

Whenever the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company shall have entered into a contract with another railroad company within the limits of The City of New York permitting the cars of such other company to run over the route hereby authorized, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may prescribe the maximum fare which may be charged by either company within the limits of The City of New York during the continuance of such contract to a passenger desiring to make a continuous trip in either direction between any point on the railroad of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company and any point on the railroad of such other railroad company within the present limits of The City of New York. For their refusal to comply with the requirements of this section, the corporation so refusing shall forfeit fifty dollars (\$50) to the aggrieved party. Two or more penalties may be recovered in one action.

The rates for carrying of property upon the routes of the Railroad Company within the present limits of The City of New York shall, in all cases, be reasonable in amount, and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the Railroad Company, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon the Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by said Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

24. The said Railroad Company shall carry free within the present limits of The City of New York during the existence of this grant members of the Police and Fire Departments of The City of New York, when such employees are in full uniform.

25. The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters, under the Charter of the City.

26. In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by The City of New York by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, provided that in case of any such violation, breach or failure to comply with any of said provisions the said City shall cause notice in writing thereof to be served upon said company, and said company shall remedy such violation, breach or failure within ten (10) days thereafter, and in default thereof, then, and not otherwise, said right of forfeiture shall accrue and may be enforced by the said City; provided, further, that if the said Railroad Company, grantee hereunder, shall within said ten (10) days commence to remedy said violation, breach or failure, and shall prosecute the work of completing such remedy with diligence and with the utmost practicable dispatch until the same shall be completed, then no right of

forfeiture shall accrue. The right of action as herein provided shall not affect or limit any other rights of the City.

27. The grant of this privilege shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions to any other person or corporation.

28. The Railroad Company shall commence actual construction within one year from the date of the signing of this contract, and shall complete and have in operation a four-track railroad upon the main line, from the northerly line of the City to a point at or near the intersection of One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street with the Bronx river, and a railroad of at least two tracks from a point at or near the intersection of One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street with the Bronx river to the southerly terminus as aforesaid at or near the intersection of Southern Boulevard with Willis avenue, and a railroad on the branch line of at least two tracks, all within five years from the date of the signing of this contract, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment may require the construction of two additional tracks on that portion of the route between One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and the southerly terminus, as aforesaid, at or near the intersection of Southern Boulevard and Willis avenue so as to make a railroad of four tracks on such portion of the route, whenever public convenience and necessity shall require the construction thereof; and in case the construction of such two additional tracks is so required by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Railroad Company shall complete the construction thereof within five (5) years after such requirement, otherwise this grant may be forfeited; and the Railroad Company is hereby authorized to construct a railroad of four tracks on the entire route authorized by this contract, if, in its judgment, public convenience and necessity shall require the construction thereof.

The Railroad Company shall actually expend or cause to be so expended the sum of at least eight hundred thousand dollars (\$800,000) within two years after the date of the signing of this contract, upon the actual construction of said railroad between the northerly line of The City of New York and Westchester avenue, at or near One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, and shall also actually expend or cause to be so expended an additional sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) within three years after the date of the signing of this contract, upon the actual construction of the railroad between Westchester avenue as above and Willis avenue at or near the Southern Boulevard, which sums shall be exclusive of any moneys expended for land acquired for the right of way. The reason why The City of New York assents to the difference in the times and amounts for the portions of the railroad north and south of Westchester avenue is that the Railroad Company represents that it is or will be able to procure by private purchase most of its right of way north of such avenue, and will have to resort to condemnation proceedings for its right of way south thereof.

Verified statements of moneys so expended for construction shall be submitted, on demand, to the Comptroller of The City of New York, who shall, after investigation, report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment his opinion as to whether such sums have been actually expended, and if in the opinion of the said Board an expenditure of the said sum within the time given is not proven, then said Board may declare that this grant has ceased and determined, and the said action of said Board shall be prima facie evidence of said forfeiture.

Any portion of the route covered by this grant which shall not be completed and in full operation within said five years from the date of the signing of this contract shall be deemed to have been abandoned, and all rights hereby granted in and to such portions of said railroad shall cease and determine, and, in such case, all structures erected by the Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, upon any portion of the route so forfeited within the lines of any street within said City, shall become the property of The City of New York.

A majority vote of the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be prima facie evidence in regard to the forfeiture of any or all the rights under this grant, as provided for in this section. Before action is taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under the provisions of this section, the Railroad Company shall have at least thirty (30) days' notice of the intention of said Board to take action, and at such time as is appointed shall be allowed a hearing.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall extend the time provided for in this section for the completion of the railroad and for the work to be performed and expenditures to be made, as above, for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate two years if the reasons given by the Railroad Company for non-fulfillment are for causes over which the Railroad Company had no control and was in nowise responsible.

29. The Railroad Company shall assume all liability by reason of the construction and operation of the railroad, and the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property by reason of said construction, maintenance or operation, and the Railroad Company hereby agrees to indemnify and save harmless the said City from all liability whatsoever by reason of the construction, maintenance and operation of said railroad.

As a condition of this grant, the Railroad Company, its successor or assigns, hereby agrees to repay to the City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Railroad Company, its successor or assigns.

30. Any portion of the right of way of the said Railroad Company falling within the lines of a street now shown on the map of The City of New York, which it may be necessary for the City to subsequently acquire, shall be ceded to the City, without cost to it, subject to the company's easement therein.

31. The Railroad Company shall not operate cars over any extension of any length whatsoever within the present limits of The City of New York not specifically hereby authorized, and shall not make any connection within the present limits of The City of New York with any other railroad, either by means of extensions or branches or by means of a platform building, unless it shall have received authority therefor from said Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority, and upon such terms as shall be fixed by the Board. In the event that the provisions of this section cause a conflict because of the lawful right of any other railroad to compel a connection with the Railroad Company, the City agrees that it may be made a party to any legal proceedings between the said companies and its rights and duties therein determined.

32. In case any of the streets as now shown on the map of The City of New York and crossed by the said railroad above grade are altered or widened after the Railroad Company has completed its railroad, and such widening requires the alteration of the superstructure of the railroad, the Railroad Company and The City of New York shall each pay one-half of the cost of such alteration as may be necessary.

33. In case the route as laid out shall make it necessary, in the opinion of the Board of Esti-

mate and Apportionment, to change the map of The City of New York in order to avoid impracticable, unnecessary or undesirable crossings, purely on account of the location of the railroad, and by reason of such change additional or substitute streets crossing the railroad are determined upon, then the Railroad Company shall pay to the City the additional cost thus made necessary, or may, at its own expense, acquire the lands necessary and cede them to the City without cost, provided, however, that the lands so to be acquired or paid for shall not extend more than 400 feet upon each side of said railroad.

34. Any alterations which may be required to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any sub-surface structures, pipes, etc., laid in the streets, on account of the construction or operation of the railroad, shall be made at the sole cost of the Railroad Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

35. In case the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall, in order to avoid impracticable, unnecessary and undesirable crossings purely on account of the location of the railroad, within one year from the date of the signing of this contract, adopt a map or a change in the map laying out a street or streets bounding or adjoining the right of way of the Railroad Company, on either or both sides thereof, from the easterly line of the White Plains road to the northerly line of the City, or any part thereof, then the Railroad Company shall acquire the lands necessary for such streets and cede them to the City without cost, or will pay to the City the cost of acquiring such lands, provided that it shall not be required to acquire and cede or pay for an amount of land which in the aggregate will exceed a strip fifty feet in width and in length the distance between the easterly side of White Plains road and the northerly line of the City. The Railroad Company, at its own expense, shall regulate and grade said strips of land to such grade as shall be hereafter fixed by the City authorities, such regulating and grading to be done, from time to time, as directed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. On notice to the City by the Railroad Company that said Railroad Company cannot acquire such lands, the City covenants to use all possible diligence in acquiring the actual possession of the lands necessary for such streets to the end that the Railroad Company may regulate and grade the same while it is grading its railroad within the present limits of The City of New York.

36. All construction of railroad crossings shall be done in such manner as shall not substantially interfere with the ordinary use of any street as a public highway, and all streets in any way disturbed by such construction shall be restored to their original condition. In case of failure on the part of the Railroad Company to restore such streets within a reasonable length of time, The City of New York shall have the right, under resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished after due notice and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the fund hereinafter provided.

37. The company's property and structures within the present limits of The City of New York shall not be used for advertising purposes in any way, under a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each offense. Such restriction shall not apply to stations or cars nor to the interior of fences or walls.

38. The City, the Board and all duly authorized representatives of the City shall have the right at all reasonable times, as well during construction as afterwards, to inspect the railroad and any part thereof, and to enter thereon when necessary for the examination, supervision or care of any property of the City or of abutting property owners or for any proper purpose. Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to diminish or affect the sanitary or police jurisdiction which the public authorities shall lawfully have over property in the City.

39. The Railroad Company shall deposit with the Comptroller, within six months after the date of signing this contract, the sum of \$100,000, either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the construction of the road authorized hereby and which the Railroad Company is under obligation to construct, and said fund shall be repaid to the Railroad Company only as hereby specified. If the City exercises its option to require the construction of the additional two tracks south of One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, the Railroad Company shall, within three months after notification thereof, make a like deposit of \$25,000 as security for such construction. Whenever and as often as the Railroad Company shall have actually constructed one mile of single track, a certificate showing the construction of such track shall be prepared by the engineer of the Railroad Company, and such certificate shall be delivered to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The said Board shall, as soon as practicable thereafter, verify the correctness of such certificate and either accept such certificate as correct, or if it finds it to be incorrect, return said certificate to the Railroad Company, specifying in writing the respects in which it finds such certificate to be incorrect. Upon the verification of the correctness of any such certificate, or if any such certificate shall be found to be incorrect, upon its being corrected, and subsequently verified, the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall thereupon prepare and certify a voucher in due form for payment to said company of the sum of \$2,500, and the amount so certified by said Board shall be forthwith paid by said Comptroller from said fund to the Railroad Company, upon the construction of the said mile of single track. This procedure shall be followed by the Railroad Company and by said Comptroller as often as the Railroad Company shall construct an additional mile of single track.

Upon the completion of the construction of the entire track authorized hereby, which the Railroad Company shall remain under obligation to construct, a final certificate shall be prepared by the engineer of said company and approved by the president thereof, showing the fact of such completion and the fact that the road is ready for operation. Such final certificate shall be delivered to the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, and shall be subject to a like verification as the certificate hereinbefore mentioned. Upon the verification of the correctness of such final certificate, or if such final certificate shall be found to be incorrect, upon being corrected the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall thereupon prepare and certify a voucher in due form for the payment by the Comptroller to the said company of the balance of said funds remaining in his hands.

If such final certificate, certifying to the completion of the entire construction of the road, which the Railroad Company shall be under obligation to construct, shall not be delivered to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on or before the expiration of the time at which the Railroad Company shall be under obligation to complete the road, under and in pursuance of the terms and conditions of this contract, and if the construction of the entire road authorized hereby, which the Railroad Company shall be under obligation to construct, shall not have been completed by said time, the balance of said fund shall be forthwith delivered by the Comptroller of The City of New York and thereafter said company shall have no claim or cause of action therefor.

The word construction as used herein shall include the grading of the bed of the railroad,



laying of tracks thereon, ballasting of the same and the construction of all bridges or viaducts necessary for the support of the railroad.

The word completion, as used herein, shall include the laying of tracks, electrical conductors and all structures necessary to the operation of trains over the route authorized hereby, and which the Railroad Company shall be under obligation to construct and shall include also such street bridges or other structures as the company is required hereby to make, and such final certificate shall include proof that all of the antecedent acts required by this contract have been performed by said company, in so far as their completion is required hereby.

40. This grant is upon the express condition that within thirty days after the date of the signing of this contract and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, the Railroad Company shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), either in money or in securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Railroad Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise granted, in default of which payment of the annual charge, the Comptroller, acting in behalf of the City, shall collect same with interest from such fund after five days' notice in writing to the president of said company. In case of failure of the said company to comply with any of the terms of this contract, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or other municipal officials, and pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, if no other money penalty is provided therefor, the said company shall pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a penalty of \$50 for each violation; and in case of any violation of the provisions of this contract for which money penalties are provided, the said company shall pay to the Comptroller of said City the penalties so provided.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of penalties provided in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of The City of New York, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify said company through its president to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If said company fail to make an appearance or, after a hearing, appear in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the said company shall, upon ten days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of \$25,000 and in default thereof the said company shall pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of one hundred dollars for each day of such default in addition to the amount necessary to restore said fund to the original amount of \$25,000. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

The right of the City to collect any penalties imposed for non-compliance with the terms of this contract, or with any law or ordinance now in force or hereafter adopted, shall not be limited to the said sum of \$25,000, and the enumeration or reservation of any rights by the City herein shall not operate to the exclusion of any other rights belonging to the City, either in law or at equity. Nor shall the imposition of any penalty by the terms of this contract interfere with or diminish the right of the City specifically to enforce any of the terms or conditions of this contract.

41. If the Railroad Company, its successors and assigns, shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and all street crossings within the present limits of The City of New York in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of said streets, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City may give written notice to said Company specifying any default on the part of said Company, and requiring the said Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of the said Company to remedy its said fault within a reasonable time said Company shall for each day thereafter during which said fault or defect remains pay to The City of New York the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed and liquidated damages, or the said City in case said structures over or under streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the said Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon; all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinbefore provided.

42. The Railroad Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed, and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
