I also tranmit form of ordinance for adoption by the Board of Aldermen to indicate its concurrence therein.

Department of Public Charities, Foot of East Twenty-sixth street, April 2, 1907.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—To meet the most urgent and pressing needs of the Department of Public Charities, and to make provision for the immediate future in the way of "new buildings, and additions, alterations and extraordinary repairs to buildings and apparatus," I have the honor very respectfully to request an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$3,742,000, to be expended for the purposes hereinafter specifically

In making this request, I assume that it will continue to be the policy of the City to care for the more continued as well as the chronic and incurable class of public dependents in the island hospitals and related institutions of the Department of Public Charities where they are maintained at a minimum of expense. The land already belongs to the City, and it is proposed to erect buildings which, while good and substantial and necessarily commodious, will be of the most simple and economical form

of construction.

of construction.

So rapid is the increase in the growth of the population of the City, and particularly in the number of new comers having small and at times uncertain incomes, that it is my profound conviction that much want and suffering are likely to ensue unless there is prompt and adequate extension of the facilities of the hospitals and other institutions of this Department. The advent of bad times, from which, for various reasons, we periodically suffer, will greatly add to the seriousness of the situation. As a matter of fact, so pressing is the need for most of the items specified in this request, that the work of construction should long ago have been fully accomplished.

In order to carry out contemplated improvements at the island institutions on a definite and comprehensive plan, I have caused a survey to be made covering the grounds of all such institutions, together with a proposed layout of the grounds of the City Hospital district at the south end of Blackwell's Island, and also of the grounds of the Metropolitan Hospital district at the north end of Blackwell's Island. These layouts will show in detail the present buildings and the proposed improvements in the hospital districts named, and attention to them is respectfully invited.

The Metropolitan Hospital District, Blackwell's Island.

The Metropolitan Hospital District, Blackwell's Island.

The greatest need at this institution at the present time is a substantial increase in the facilities for the care of tuberculosis patients. The two infirmary buildings for this class of patients have a normal bed capacity for 362 patients, while the adjacent tents have bed capacity for 171 additional patients, making 533 in all. The census has, however, shown as many as 608 patients in these two buildings and the tents during a large part of the winter. The facilities of the other hospitals of the City having this class of patients have also been greatly overtaxed and relief to many needy persons has in consequence been greatly delayed, if not denied altogether. The construction of the proposed "Sea View Hospital" for tuberculosis patients at Staten Island is being obstructed by injunction proceedings, and it is possible that this institution may not be completed for some years. In view of these urgent conditions and the further fact that the more advanced cases of tuberculosis will not be sent to the "Sea View Hospital," but will continue to be cared for at the Infirmary at Blackwell's Island, it is proposed to construct simple hospital buildings for this class of patients at the Infirmary, at a cost not to exceed \$2,000 per capita. At the present time application is made for means to pay for the construction of a building, with accessories, for three hundred tuberculosis patients, at a total cost of \$600,000. This will relieve the pressure for admission and enable patients to be taken from the tents where advanced cases cannot be properly cared for during the inclement weather of winter.

Toward the north end of the Metropolitan Hospital district are a number of old.

weather of winter.

Toward the north end of the Metropolitan Hospital district are a number of old wooden buildings, erected for temporary use about the time of the Civil War. These buildings are used for shop, stable and dormitory purposes. They are not only unsightly structures but are unsanitary, and owing to their flimsy construction a dangerous fire risk for the other buildings of the hospital. It is proposed to remove these dilapidated structures and to erect in another location new shops and stables and an addition to the present inadequate power house and laundry at a cost of approximately \$400,000, with \$150,000 additional for equipment, making the total amount desired for these purposes \$550,000.

In order further to extend the facilities of this hospital, it is proposed to construct a series of buildings designed to allow more room for patients and the administrative force in the hospital proper. Such proposed buildings are as follows:

A staff house for the physicians resident at the hospital, such as has been granted for the City Hospital at the south end of Blackwell's Island. This will make provision for forty physicians and other employees and will cost approximately \$80,000.

Kitchen Service and Storage Building—The present kitchen building is an old and dilapidated structure inadequate and unsuitable for the purposes of this large and growing hospital as well as badly located. It is lacking in proper storage and refrigerating capacity and is without employees' dining rooms and other desirable accessories of a modern service building. It is proposed to erect in its place a new service building, with refrigerating plant and kitchen, dining room and storage capacity. Such a building must be constructed with a view to the future needs of this

service building, with refrigerating plant and kitchen, dining room and storage capacity. Such a building must be constructed with a view to the future needs of this hospital, and it is estimated will cost approximately \$350,000.

Reception Building—The Metropolitan Hospital has at the present time no adequate reception building, and one is greatly needed in order that proper provision may be made to receive, bathe and examine patients, to detain contagious cases or those suspected of having such diseases, and to fumigate and store personal effects for both male and female patients, with complete separation of the sexes. The cost of this proposed building is estimated to be approximately \$60,000.

Morgue and Pathological Building—This hospital has at the present time no proper morgue or pathological building, which is a great disadvantage. It is proposed to construct such a building, which, with its accessories, is estimated to cost approximately \$40,000.

The total estimated cost of the improvements desired at the Metropolitan Hos-

pital is \$1,680,000.

The City Hospital District, Blackwell's Island.

One of the greatest needs of this hospital at the present time is a new Maternity Hospital building to replace the present old wooden structure, which is not only inadequate, but is, because of its flimsy construction, a serious fire menace to the other buildings of the group. It is estimated that the cost of a new building and its accessories, with capacity for 25 patients at a time, will be approximately \$60,000.

A dormitory for convalescent patients is one of the pressing needs of this hospital, and it is estimated that one of suitable capacity can be constructed and equipped for \$50,000.

In order to provide more room in the hospital for the care of patients and to improve the operating room service, it is proposed to remove the operating rooms

to the upper floor now occupied by the kitchen, which is to be located in the new service building. The cost of such work is estimated to be \$20,000.

New elevators and machinery are needed in this hospital to improve the service.

The estimated cost is \$15,000.

The total estimated cost of the improvements needed at the City Hospital is

The City Home for the Aged and Infirm, Blackwell's Island.

The hospital and other facilities of this home are greatly overtaxed and their considerable increase is urgently needed.

A new hospital pavilion, at an estimated cost of \$40,000, is one of the pressing needs of this home, as the facilities of the present hospital buildings are inadequate to meet the requirements of the home.

An addition to the laundry facilities of this institution at an estimated cost of \$30,000 is another urgent need which should be met as the present facilities are entirely inadequate to meet the demands upon them.

A pavilion for an out-patient department, at an estimated cost of \$10,000, is a further need of this home.

The total estimated cost of the improvements needed at the City Home is

The Children's Hospitals and Schools, Randall's Island.

The Children's Hospitals and Schools, Randall's Island.

A Nurses' Home, with capacity for 150 nurses, is one of the greatest needs of this hospital at the present time. This would release a considerable part of the hospital itself for the use of the children. This proposed Nurses' Home should have a capacity for 100 nurses, and its estimated cost is \$200,000.

A kitchen, dining room and service building is greatly needed at this institution. The erection of such a building would release a large amount of room in several buildings for the use of inmates. The estimated cost of this building is \$125,000.

A new shop building is also required at this institution as the present one is inadequate and has to be shored to keep it from falling down. The estimated cost of the proposed new building is \$40,000.

A new ice house is also required at an estimated cost of \$10,000.

The total estimated cost of the improvements needed at the Children's Hospitals and Schools is \$375,000.

The Municipal Lodging House, Manhattan.

Owing to the discovery of quicksand in the part of the site selected for the location of the boiler pit the contractor who is erecting the Municipal Lodging House in East Twenty-fifth street was unable to proceed with the work along the original plans, and is required to sink a caisson in order to comply with the requirements of the amended plans that have been approved by the Department of Buildings. The Corporation Counsel advises that the contractor is not required to do this work, the estimated cost of which is \$500. of which is \$50,000.

The Steamboat Service, Manhattan.

A new boat is needed for the Hart's Island and Staten Island service to take the place of the small boat "Fidelity," which is about 35 years old, practically worn out and

in need of constant repairs.

The Department is now running a ferry eighteen hours a day at Randall's Island, making a trip every half hour, and another on a like schedule from Fifty-second street to Blackwell's Island. Passengers and supplies are carried three times daily from Twenty-sixth street to Blackwell's and Randall's Islands on the steamer "Brennan." and a fourth service is maintained between Twenty-sixth street and Staten and Hart's Islands by the "Fidelity." With one exception the boats of the Department are old and all of them are at times unfitted for service, with the result that boats have to be hired

for temporary service at large expense.

The cost of a new boat such as will be required is estimated to be about \$75,000.

The Kings County Hospital, Flatbush.

While the hospital system in Manhattan and The Bronx has been greatly improved during the past few years and further large improvements are contemplated, comparatively little has been done in the Borough of Brooklyn and nothing in the Boroughs of either Richmond or Queens. The rapid growth of the Borough of Brooklyn, which will be still further augmented when projected bridges and additional rapid transit facilities are completed, makes the extension of the public hospital facilities of the

will be still further augmented when projected bridges and additional rapid transit facilities are completed, makes the extension of the public hospital facilities of the borough an urgent need.

A new Nurses' Home and Training School is required at the Kings County Hospital, with provision for the care of 100 nurses. This will permit the present Nurses' Home to be used as a home, which is much needed, for the female employees of the hospital. The estimated cost of the proposed new Nurses' Home is \$250,000.

An addition to the present Children's Hospital is a further need of this institution as the present building is inadequate to meet the needs of the service. The estimated cost of such addition is \$100,000.

In order to provide additional space to meet the needs of the main hospital, it is proposed to reconstruct the annex building on the grounds of the hospital, which was recently vacated by the State hospital authorities. This will make provision for patients at an estimated cost of \$75,000.

A new maternity hospital should be constructed at the Kings County Hospital at approximate cost of \$60,000.

The facilities of the bakery at this hospital are inadequate to meet the needs of the growing service and an addition to cost \$25,000 is an urgent need. A new shop is also much needed, and will cost approximately \$20,000. A new fire alarm system is another important need which it will cost about \$2,500 to meet.

The hospital also requires much new flooring throughout, at an estimated cost of \$5,000. New sidewalks are also required on the grounds of the hospital at a cost of approximately \$5,000.

The total estimated cost of the improvements needed at the Kings County Hospital

is \$542,000.

The Cumberland Street Hospital, Brooklyn.

Additional ground is required for the purposes of this hospital at an estimated cost of \$100,000 upon which to construct a new Nurses' Home and other buildings.

A new Nurses' Home is much needed at this hospital, thereby releasing the present quarters for hospital cases. The cost of such a home to accommodate 75 nurses is estimated to be \$150,000.

The total cost of the improvements desired at the Cumberland Street Hospital is estimated to be \$250,000.

Bradford Street Hospital.

Means are needed to construct the proposed new Bradford Street Hospital on the plot of ground purchased by the City for that purpose. The estimated cost of this hospital, with facilities for the care of 100 patients, is \$250,000.

The City Farm Colony, Richmond.

In order to relieve the overcrowding at the Home for the Aged, male division, Brooklyn, and to provide greatly needed additional facilities for the care of aged and infirm persons dependent upon the City, it is proposed to erect additional dormitories at the Farm Colony at Staten Island to make provision for two hundred men and one hundred women. The cost of these additional dormitories is estimated to be \$250,000.

An adequate and suitable pavilion for the care of insane patients is also greatly needed at the Farm Colony at an estimated cost of \$20,000.

A bake shop and storehouse building is also needed and should cost approximately

Sir—Hon. Robert W. Hebberd. Commissioner, Department of Public Charities, in communication under date of April 2, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$3,742,000, for the purpose of providing means for the construction of new buildings, additions

and extraordinary repairs to buildings and apparatus, including a new steamboat and repairs to existing steamboat, as specified in said communication.

I would report that I have investigated in detail the statement of the Commissioner, and in a general way I consider all the improvements requested would add to the efficiency of the department. But I hardly consider them all necessary at this time.

If the financial condition of the City warrants the expenditure I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 400 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$1,300,000 for the purpose of erecting new buildings, additions, improvements and permanently bettering and equipping existing buildings and new steamboats under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Public Charities. This will provide means for the following, which I consider urgent and necessary, namely:

The lowest estimate of \$343,000 covers the complete erection of the main building, nurses' building, help's building, morgue building, stable building, power house and laundry building, a total of six buildings.

The total cubical contents of the six buildings is 1,084,196 cubic feet, and at a cost of \$360,150 (which includes architects' fees), equals 33½ cents per cubic foot.

The main building will contain four large wards with total accommodation for one hundred (100) beds. There are two isolation rooms off each ward, also incidental toilet rooms, wash rooms and diet kitchens. It will also contain operating room (with rooms incidental thereto), main kitchen, dining rooms, dispensary, laboratory, X-Ray rooms, general offices, office and sleeping quarters for superintendent, sleeping quarters for six doctors, and electric service elevators.

Nurses' building will provide 27 sleeping rooms and other requisite rooms for 27 nurses.

Help's building will provide 14 sleeping rooms and other requisite rooms for the accommodation of 24 general employees.

Morgue building will contain mortuary chamber and refrigerators, small chapel,

Morgue building will contain mortuary chamber and reirigerators, small chapel, laboratory and autopsy room.

Stable building will provide wagon room for two ambulances, four stalls and sleeping quarters for drivers and help.

Power house will contain two high pressure boilers, radial brick chimney and complete laundry, with laundry machinery. All of the buildings are connected by means of underground pipe tunnels.

The cost of 31¾c. per cubic foot, or 33¾c. per cubic foot, including Architect's fees, I consider reasonable for buildings used for this purpose.

The lowest bid received being, \$343,000, and as only \$200,000 has been appropriated for the purpose, there is a deficit of \$160,150, calculated as follows:

Sir—Since the first of September, 1906, this Department hired from Harry B. Mingle of No. 7 East Forty-second street, Manhattan, at the rate of \$50 per month, the steam launch "Velox" for the use of the Chief of the Nineteenth Battalion, in command of the fireboat fleet, in responding to alarms for fire along and contiguous to the water front of Greater New York, in making inspections and as a tender for the delivery of supplies for the fireboats.

The dimensions of the launch are as follows:

Length over all 75 feet; length on water line 70 feet; beam 11 feet; draught 5

The dimensions of the launch are as follows:

Length over all, 75 feet; length on water line, 70 feet; beam, 11 feet; draught, 5 feet 3 inches; designed and built by F. W. Edwards and launched in 1901. Hull constructed of wood, strongly built and in good condition; engines triple expansion, developing a power approximately of 250 horse power. The boilers which are tubular are in good condition, having been subjected to a hydraulic pressure of 400 pounds, at the time repairs ordered by the United States Local Inspectors of Steam Vessels were made, and the equipment of the boat is full and complete, and in accordance with the requirements of the United States laws on the subject.

It is now deemed desirable by this Department to purchase the launch, the Chief of Department recommending that such course be taken for the reason that a boat of this kind is indispensable to the Chief of the fireboat fleet in the performance of his official duties, and is well adapted for such purpose.

Commissioner O'Brien, Deputy Commissioner Goodwin and Assistant Engineer Bull appeared before the committee and urged the adoption of this resolution. The committee have had the application investigated by the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics of the Comptroller's office, and submit herewith a copy of the

At the time the Budget was approved it was recognized that there would be a shortage in this department, and that there would have to be some allowance made during the year to make up this deficiency. The committee have tried in every way to keep the appropriation down without crippling the department, but believe, after several months' investigation, that unless a substantial allowance is made for the purposes specified that the efficiency of the department, especially in its repairing branch, cannot be properly maintained. The Commissioner states that unless some relief is granted now that his department will be crippled for the summer, and for that reason, and upon the Comptroller's report, the Committee recommend the adoption of the annexed resolution.

Dear Sir—Certain appropriations made to this Department for this year by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment are insufficient in amount for the purposes intended. These appropriations were made specifically for salaries and wages of men employed on the work of maintaining and repairing the water system of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

The appropriation for Maintenance, Croton Water System, Salaries and Wages, is \$245,000. The payroll of March 1, 1907, shows an expenditure for the year of \$273,432.05, which is \$28,432.05 in excess of the appropriation. The men paid from this appropriation are engaged, under the direction of the Assistant Engineers and the Foremen, in caring for the whole Croton water system from Brewster to Central Park, and I do not see how it is possible to reduce the payroll without impairing the efficiency of the service.

The appropriation for Bronx River Works, Maintenance and Repairs, Salaries and Wages, would be deficient on the same calculation to an amount of \$3,080.95. The men paid from that appropriation are employed similarly to those aforementioned, in caring for and maintaining the Bronx river system.

The appropriation for Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stopcocks, etc., Salaries and wages, similarly calculated, shows an apparent deficiency for the year of \$44,842.23. The men paid from this appropriation are employed in caring for and repairing the distribution system throughout the entire area of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. Two years ago your Board recommended the adoption of a resolution by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the issue of Revenue Bonds to permit this Department to maintain emergency forces in addition to the regular force. Men were appointed for this purpose, and the different companies formed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the issue of Revenue Bonds to permit this Department to maintain emergency forces in addition to the regular force. Men were appointed for this purpose, and the different companies formed and have since been maintained, but to continue it this year a further amount, as above stated, will be required. The great advantage to the City in having these emergency forces, is shown by the promptness with which breaks in the large mains have been repaired ever since these new companies were formed.

I therefore recommend that your Honorable Board, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Revenue Bonds in an amount sufficient to maintain the present force, as indicated.

That the appropriation for Maintenance, Croton Water System, Salaries and Wages for 1907, was \$245,000, which is nearly \$10,000 less than the actual expenditures for the year 1906; that the Department asked for \$289,519.50; that the Department tried to keep as near as possible to the amount allowed, but finds that the payroll by March I, was at the rate of \$273,000. This year there has been more or less typhoid in the Croton system, making it necessary to increase the force and to increase the payrolls also by overtime of the men employed to patrol the district and to prevent nuisances, which caused the danger from typhoid.

Then as to Bronx River Works, that the actual expenditures for the year 1906 were \$1,500 more than the amount allowed for 1907, and that for the same reasons it is impossible to keep the payroll within the amount allowed.

As to Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stopcocks, etc., that the expenditures for 1906 were only slightly in excess of the amount allowed for 1907, but the increased length of mains and the larger number of hydrants, stopcocks, etc., and the several breaks of large mains which occurred earlier in the year necessitated more work for the men already employed and a larger force.

#### Croton Water System, Salaries and Wages

The departmental estimate for the account for 1907, submitted by former Commissioner William B. Ellison under date of August 1, 1906, showed that the payroll was then adjusted at the rate of \$248,364.50 per annum, and that \$289,519.50 would be required for the same purpose in 1907—an increase of \$41,155. The wage schedule for 1907 contemplated the appointment of 46 additional employees, or a total of 319 as against 273 at the time the estimate was submitted, an increase of 16 per cent., representing an increase of wages of nearly 17 per cent.

The estimate seems to have been predicated on two assumptions, viz.: That in many instances the employees would work every day in the year—Sundays and holidays—and that in every instance the same number of men and horses would be employed in summer as in winter, regardless of the condition of the weather.

It will be observed that the payroll for the first six months of 1906 exceeded that of the corresponding period of 1905 by over \$20,000. The department accounts for this by stating that the land acquired for sanitary purposes in the neighborhood of the Muscoot river and Cranberry creek had to be cleaned up; and owing to lack of funds this work was delayed until the early part of 1906. The weather conditions being favorable, a great deal was accomplished. Work of a similar character, it was said, had to be done later in the year around Lake Mahopac and Lake Kirk, the headwaters of the Muscoot river, which accounts for the increase of over \$17,000 in the payroll for the last six months of 1906 over the corresponding period in 1905.

The appropriation for 1906 for Maintenance of Croton Water System was \$396,-554.50, which covered salaries, wages, taxes, repairs, supplies, etc. No specific amount was appropriated for salaries and wages that year, and for that reason no comparison can be made between the budget allowance for that purpose in 1906 and the allowance for 1907; but the following figures show the extent to which the allowance for Maintenance Croton Water System (as a whole) in 1907 exceeded that for 1906:

The Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics recommended an appropriation of \$250,000 for Salaries and Wages 1907, which was \$39,519.50 less than the departmental estimate, and \$1,635.50 in excess of the annual payroll as adjusted at the time the estimate was submitted by the department; but the Board of Estimate and Apportionment saw fit to make a further reduction of \$5,000 by fixing the allowance at \$245,000.

Sir—In the matter of your application for the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$200,000, now before the Board of Aldermen and made the subject of report of May 24 to the Hon, Herman A. Metz, Comptroller, by the Acting Supervising Statistician and Examiner of the Finance Department. I beg to submit that the Examiner presents to the Comptroller statement made by the former Chief Engineer of Highways of the Borough of Brooklyn, called for by resolution which you presented on February 7, through which the Board of Estimate requested all the Borough Presidents to submit statistics as to the areas of the several classes of pavements under contract maintenance and the areas requiring direct renewals and repairs by the City. From these filed records the Examiner shows that Brooklyn had about 1,425,000 square yards of old sheet asphalt pavement to be directly maintained by the Bureau of Highways. For the current year the actual amount out of maintenance for sheet asphalt alone will be 1,750,517 square yards.

You have anticipated the unavoidable increase in cost of maintaining the pavements to be repaired and replaced under your Bureau of Highways by the request for \$200,000, not only on account of the increased area as named, but from the self-evident fact that after a certain period sheet asphalt goes to pieces rapidly under traffic and under weather conditions, through which it loses a large part of its adhesive wearing strength.

The Examiner presents for comparison the amounts expended for repairing asphalt pavements from 1903 to 1906, inclusive, with the percentages of such amounts, determined from the full amount of appropriation for labor, maintenance and supplies of the Budget appropriations for the Bureau of Highways. Although the Bureau of Highways expended but \$50,000 in repairing asphalt pavements in 1906,

Bureau of Highways expended but \$50,000 in repairing asphalt pavements in 1906, the fact is that the maintenance contracts were at a very much lower price for wearing surface, binder, concrete base and finished pavements than for the current year. This \$50,000 expended in 1906 would have actually covered about 40 per cent. more top surface than the same amount of money under the ruling contract price of 1907. The question of determining the proper amount of Special Revenue Bond issues for repairs is largely dependent upon the additional Corporate Stock for repaving which may be allowed Brooklyn during the current year. I have just joined in report with Chief Engineer Tillson of the Borough of Manhattan, in which it is urged that a substantial appropriation should be made by the Board of Estimate. It is hoped that some of the streets mentioned in the report which the Comptroller's Examiner quotes, showing where the \$200,000 issue of Special Revenue Bonds was is hoped that some of the streets mentioned in the report which the Comptroller's Examiner quotes, showing where the \$200,000 issue of Special Revenue Bonds was to be used for repairs, may be cut down by provision for renewals of these streets rather than patching over old pavements, which is not an economical practice in the end. This is notably the case in Bedford avenue, from Division avenue to Hewes street (pavement twenty years old), which is estimated to cost \$24,500 for patching alone, and on Sixth avenue, Berry street, Henry street, Flatbush avenue, Fifth to Seventh avenue (pavement nineteen years old), Jamaica avenue and others in the list referred to by the Examiner. The cost of patching was estimated by your Engineer of Highways at from \$10,000 to \$20,000 for each of the streets named.

If the Board of Estimate act favorably in allowing even 50 per cent. of the Corporate Stock issue which you asked for on February 18, the most urgent needs in repairing old asphalt pavements may, if the fund is carefully handled, be carried out during the current year, partly with the municipal asphalt plant now in operation, by an additional appropriation of Special Revenue Bonds of \$150,000.

I submit herewith my report of February 21, which the Comptroller's Examiner suggests be forwarded to Alderman Davies, chairman of the committee having this matter under consideration.

On February 7, 1907, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn presented a resolution which was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requesting the Presidents of the several boroughs to submit, for the information of this Board, statements of areas of paved streets of the various classes, giving areas under contract

maintenance, and areas requiring renewals and repairs,

In response to this resolution George W. Tillson, Chief Engineer, Bureau of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn, in a communication addressed to Desmond Dunne, Commissioner of Public Works of that Borough, furnished the following data relative to asphalt pavements in the Borough of Brooklyn;

No specific amount has been appropriated annually for repairing asphalt pavements; the allowance for that purpose has been included in the Budget appropriation account known as Labor, Maintenance and Supplies. Below will be found a statement showing the appropriations made for Labor, Maintenance and Supplies for the years

1903-1907, inclusive, and the amount thereof expended for repairing asphalt pavements for the years 1903-1906, inclusive:

These figures show that in 1903, 224-10 per cent. of the appropriation for Labor, Maintenance and Supplies was expended for repairing asphalt pavements, while in 1906 only 11 8-10 per cent. of the appropriation was expended for that purpose. As the appropriations were increased the expenditures for repairing asphalt pavements appear to have diminished.

The Departmental Estimate for 1907 for Labor, Maintenance and Supplies was \$639,650, of which \$85,000 was said to be required for maintenance of asphalt pavements. If in addition to the Budget allowance for 1907, Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$200,000 are now needed for repairing asphalt pavements, the estimate of \$85,000 which was submitted by the Borough President for 1907 was greatly below the actual requirements.

A communication of which the following is a copy, addressed to the Superintendent of Highways by the Chief Engineer of the Bureau, under recent date, shows the direction in which it is proposed to spend the \$200,000 for which the Borough President applies:

Sir—Replying to yours of February 11, 1907, transmitting the herewith returned communication No. 17755, from the Department of Health, complaining of drain passing through private property in Bronxwood Park from White Plains road, taking the water from said White Plains road, I have to report as follows:

In accordance with your suggestions I caused survey to be made, with the idea of diverting the drainage of White Plains road up White Plains road to Juliana street, and thence westerly through Juliana street to the Bronx river. The estimated cost of this line was found to be \$10,000, which seemed, in my judgment, to be too great an expenditure of money for the desired purpose. I therefore had further investigation and surveys made, one of which was for the continuing of the drain up White Plains avenue to Bartholdi street, and thence easterly through Bartholdi street and emptying into the open stone drain at Cedar street north of Bronxwood Park. The estimated cost of this work was found to be about \$9,000.

Another, and, as it turned out to be, the most economical route, is as follows: Construct a drain in White Plains road from a point 250 feet north of Locust street to Locust street, thence easterly through Locust street, North Oak drive, Pine street and Bartholdi street to existing stone drain in Cedar street, the total estimated cost of which is found to be \$8,000. This line is recommended, and the items of work involved are as follows:

Two thousand hye hundred dollars as retainer and payment on account of services as architect, when the appointment is made by resolution of the Armory Board.

The design selected by the jury of award, as well as the other designs, shall be submitted to the Armory Board for final decision.

The site upon which the armory is to be erected will be delivered to the architect to construct the building, free of surface rock, and excavated to the curb level.

Each competing architect will be furnished by the Armory Board with an architect's and engineer's survey of the site.

No drawings or documents other than those mentioned above shall be submitted.

Each set of drawings and description shall be neatly packed and addressed to the Secretary of the Armory Board, Suite 6, basement, Hall of Records, and shall be delivered at the office of the Board not later than September 3, 1907.

The plans in competition shall be accompanied by a sealed blank envelope, which shall contain the name of the competing architect. No name or sign shall show on any of the plans or drawings.

The Secretary of the Armory Board will number each set of plans, and its accompanying envelope, in the order of their reception. Under these numbers alone shall the plans be submitted to the jury of award.

The designs of unsuccessful bidders shall be returned to them immediately after the announcement of the award and no use shall be made of any part of such designs, except by agreement with the author.
