## FIRE DEPARTMENT.

## REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED JUNE 30, 1917.

## Financial.

The budget appropriations made to this Department in the several boroughs for the year 1917, aggregated \$9,440,421.70. Of this amount there was expended during the third quarter of the current year the sum of \$2,312,626.42 which, added to the outlay for the first and second quarters (\$4,692,673.82), made a total of \$7,005,300.26, leaving a balance of \$2,435,121.44 for use during the remainder of the year.

## Uniformed Force.

On Sept. 30, 1917, the membership of the uniformed force in all boroughs was 5,126. Included in this number are 74 Chief Officers, ten of whom are Medical Officers. There are also four Chaplains. At the close of the quarter there were in service 303 companies assigned to 44 battalions.

During the quarter 3,318 alarms for fire were received, of which 385 were false or unnecessary. For actual fires 2,933 were received. Of this number, 2,162 were confined to the point of starting and 245 to the buildings in which they originated; 54 extended to other buildings; 419 occurred in places other than buildings or vessels, and 53 on vessels in the harbor. The estimated quantity of water used for fire extinguishing purposes was 6,704,409 gallons; 1,558,003 gallon being salt water.

During the quarter 155 ununiformed firemen, having satisfactorily completed the prescribed probationary period of three months, were appointed fourth grade firemen, and three appointments as ununiformed firemen on probation were made. No promotions in the uniformed force were made.

The number of retirements, on application, was 9 on half pay. For disability there were three retirements on half pay and three on one-third pay. The aggregate number of retirements was 15, with a total pension allowance of \$11,700, as against 33 for the corresponding period of 1916, with a total pension allowance of \$25,950.

There were ten resignation, two dismissals, three reinstatements and two probationary firemen were dropped from the rolls. The number of deaths was eight.

There were 402 cases of illness and 98 of injury treated by the Medical Officers, and the time lost from each cause was 7,548 and 1,886 days respectively, a total of 9,434 days. The aggregate of these cases for the third quarter of 1916 was 599, and the time lost therefrom 9,460 days.

The number of men examined as to their fitness for probationary appointment was 3; number rejected, none; number of members of uniformed force examined as to fitness to continue in service, 14; number of former firemen examined as to fitness for reinstatement, 3.

## Civilian Force.

The civilian force on September 30th, 1917, numbered 804.

## Fire Alarm Telegraph.

At the close of the quarter the fire alarm telegraph system in the various boroughs consisted in mileage of cable and conductors in subways and of aerial conductor and circuit mileage (the latter both underground and aerial), as follows:

## Fire Prevention.

During the quarter, 35,194 inspections were made by the various divisions of the Bureau of Fire Prevention as against 30,761 for the corresponding period of 1916, an increase of 4,433. Orders served or mailed totalled 5,893 as against 2,646 for the third quarter of last year, an increase of 3,247. These orders covered 9,581 items as against 6,561 for the like period of 1916, an increase of 3,020. Orders complied with during the quarter amounted to 3,855 as against 3,551 for the third quarter of 1916, an increase of 304. The number of items of orders complied with was 7,533 as against 7,940 for the third quarter of 1916, a decrease of 407.

## Fire Appliances.

During the quarter in this Division 19,457 inspections were made; 3,145 orders were served or mailed embracing 4,025 items, and 1,825 orders were complied with, covering 4,025 items. Plans, 68 in all, for the installation of standpipes, sprinklers, fire escapes, etc., were filed with this Division.

## Factories.

In the Factory Division during the quarter the total number of orders served or mailed was 1,473, of which 24 were issued by the State Labor Department, and 1,449 by the Bureau of Fire Prevention. The total number of orders complied with was 636, of which 249 were issued by the State Labor Department, and 387 by the Bureau of Fire Prevention.

The items of orders served or mailed by this Division totaled 2,475, of which 37 pertained to orders issued by the State Labor Department and 2,438 by the Bureau of Fire Prevention. Items of orders complied with numbered 999, of which 449 related to orders issued by the State Labor Department and 555 by the Bureau of Fire Prevention.

## Places of Public Assembly.

The inspection force of the Division of Places of Public Assembly, during the quarter made 661 original inspections. Reinspections during the same period numbered 4,985, of which 3,854 were motion picture shows.

The number of standee violations reported during the quarter was 5, all of which were forwarded to the Corporation Counsel for the recovery of the prescribed penalty. The number of orders served or mailed during the quarter was 62, embracing 260 items. Orders to the number of 66 were complied with, covering 247 items.

## Combustibles and Explosives.

In the Division of Combustibles, all Boroughs, the amount of receipts for licenses and permits was \$46,014, as against \$55,618 for the third quarter of 1916. 4,626 blasting operations were supervised by civilian Inspectors of Blasting attached to the Division, and in 6,301 instances by members of the uniformed force, an aggregate of 10,927. 1,213 orders were served or mailed, embracing 2,821 items. 1,328 orders were complied with, containing 3,501 items. 10,752 inspections were made. 5,231 permits were issued.

## Bureau of Fire Investigation.

In the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, during the quarter, there were 1,829 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$1,069,120, representing an average loss per fire of \$584.54. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens there were 1,104 fires, with a total estimated loss of \$1,096,065, an average loss per fire of \$992.81.

The total estimated loss by fire during the quarter was \$2,165,185. During the corresponding period of 1916, the total estimated loss was \$1,605,037, an increase of \$560,148.

The total number of fires for the quarter was 2,933, as against 2,976 for the corresponding period of 1916, a decrease of 43.

The average loss per fire for the quarter was \$738.21, as against \$539.33 for the like period of 1916.

## Arson.

During the quarter, in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, there were 2 arrests for arson which, with 8 pending from the previous quarter, made 10 cases to be disposed of. Of this number in one case the Grand Jury failed to find an indictment, leaving 9 cases pending and awaiting trial at the end of the quarter.

In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, there were 3 arrests for arson which, with 1 pending from the previous quarter, made 4 cases to be disposed of. Of this number there were 2 convictions, leaving 2 cases pending at the close of the quarter.

There were in all boroughs 5 arrests during the quarter, as against 11 for the corresponding period of 1916, a decrease of 6. The number of convictions during the quarter was 2, as against 4 for the corresponding period of 1916, a decrease of 2.

## Apparatus.

During the quarter 31 pieces of motor apparatus were delivered under contract, consisting of 19 gasoline propelled and pumping engines, 1 motor-driven wrecking truck, 10 front drive tractors and 1 motor-driven combination chemical and hose wagon.

## Hose.

During the quarter 4,000 feet of 1½-inch canvas fire hose and 2,500 feet of 3-inch rubber fire hose were delivered under contract.

## Buildings, Etc.

During the quarter 5 contracts were awarded, at an aggregate cost of \$9,852, for additions to quarters of Engine Co. 265, for new electric lighting systems at quarters of Engine Companies 5, 10, 14 and 24, and for installation of wiring for electric light and power, electric and gas fixtures and gas work at Headquarters, 365 Jay Street, Brooklyn.

Minor repair jobs, 172 in all, were done to buildings by Department mechanics, entailing an expenditure of \$6,873.26, and 35 by open market orders at an expense of \$2,725.19.

## Horses.

There were 605 horses in service at the close of the quarter, as against 749 at the corresponding period of 1916, a decrease of 144, due to the progressive motorization of fire apparatus.

## Requisitions.

The number of requisitions received was 4,898 and the number completed and filed 4,647.

## Stores.

During the quarter 17 requisitions for furniture, linoleum, bedding, rugs, window shades, office cabinets, etc., calling for an expenditure of \$424.30, were turned over to the Division of Stores for investigation, with a resulting saving of \$92.25. There were likewise investigated, preliminary to distribution to companies of supplies, 310 requisitions, on which a saving was effected of \$4,384.83. The total saving for the quarter was \$4,477.08.

Contracts executed for furnishing motor-driven aerial hook and ladder trucks, alterations and repairs to apparatus houses and to Repair Shops, for installing electric wiring in Brooklyn Headquarters building, for work in connection with the new fire alarm telegraph system and for miscellaneous supplies, amounted during the quarter to \$199,537.72.

Joint contracts executed during the same period for furnishing and delivering forage and fuel amounted in the aggregate to \$63,301.52.

184 contract orders were issued in the gross sum of \$182,187.70. 424 open market orders were issued, representing an expenditure of \$30,799.50.

street and 11th avenue; thence northeastwardly along the said line midway between Theodore street and 11th avenue and along the prolongations of the said line to the intersection with the center line of Riker avenue; thence northwardly along the center line of Riker avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Steinway avenue and Theodore street; thence northeastwardly along the said line midway between Steinway avenue and Theodore street, to the point or place of beginning.

*Fourth.*—That the abstracts of said estimate of damage and of said assessment for benefit, together with the damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by the Commissioners of Estimate and by the Commissioner of Assessment in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, in the Municipal Building, Court House Square, in the Borough of Queens, in said City, there to remain until the 14th day of January, 1918.

*Fifth.*—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, the reports as to awards and as to assessments for benefit herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 5th day of March, 1918, at the opening of the Court on that day.

*Sixth.*—In case, however, objections are filed to the foregoing abstracts of estimate and assessment, or to either of them, the motion to confirm the reports as to awards and as to assessments shall stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified in the notice provided in such cases to be given in relation to filing the final reports, pursuant to the provisions of the Greater New York Charter as amended.

## NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, exceeding the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, to be sold with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
