

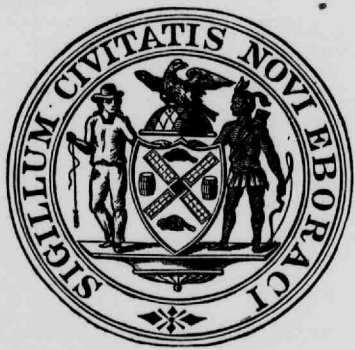

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HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF THE NEW YORK,
BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, December 26, 1877.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., *Sanitary Superintendent and Register*:

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, December 22, 402 deaths were reported to this Bureau, which is a decrease of 53 as compared with the preceding week, and 30 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876, and the lowest weekly mortality reported since the fifty-second week of the year 1868. The actual mortality for the week ending December 15, was 424; which is 66.4 below the average of the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.33 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,084,538.

The eight most prominent causes of death for the week were the following, viz.: Phthisis pulmonalis, 57; pneumonia, 41; diphtheria, 32; diseases of the nervous system, 28; bronchitis, 26; Bright's disease and nephritis, 19; scarlatina, 15; and diseases of the heart, 15; which caused 233 deaths, or 57.96 per cent. of the entire weekly mortality. Compared with the week preceding, the deaths from croup were 8 less; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; cancer, 4; phthisis-pulmonalis, 18; bronchitis, 4; pneumonia, 8; diseases of the heart, 2; aneurism, 1; diseases of the nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; and suicide, 4; while measles increased 1; scarlatina, 1; diphtheria, 6; whooping-cough, 2; erysipelas 1; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 3; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 5; marasmus and scrofula, 2; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; premature and preterm births, 2; and drowning, 1. Of the deaths reported from diphtheria during the week, 5 were in the Seventeenth Ward, 4 each in the Ninth and Twentieth, 3 each in the Eighth and Twenty-second, 2 each in the Eighteenth, Nineteenth, and Twenty-third, and 1 each in the Seventh, Eleventh, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, and Twenty-first; of scarlatina, 3 were in the Twenty-second Ward, 2 each in the Nineteenth and Twentieth, and 1 each in the Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Twelfth, Fourteenth and Eighteenth.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 67 were in institutions, 195 in tenement houses, 125 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc., 9 were on the basement floor, 67 on the first, 134 on the second, 62 on the third, 38 on the fourth, 16 on the fifth; 399 were stated to be residents of New York City and 3 non-residents, 58 were stated to be single, 86 married, 44 widowed, and the condition of 214 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 414 deaths and still-births, or 91.79 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 7; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 171; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 52; Greenwood (undenominational), 42; Lutheran (undenominational), 53; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 19; Evergreen (undenominational), 23; Woodlawn (undenominational), 21; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist, Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 2; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 3; Washington (undenominational), 8.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending December 15, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 5; Second, 1; Third, 3; Fourth, 5; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 10; Seventh, 22; Eighth, 10; Ninth, 19; Tenth, 20; Eleventh, 22; Twelfth, 34; Thirteenth, 16; Fourteenth, 10; Fifteenth, 3; Sixteenth, 17; Seventeenth, 34; Eighteenth, 20; Nineteenth, 76; Twentieth, 23; Twenty-first, 30; Twenty-second, 28; Twenty-third, 5; Twenty-fourth, 4.

The mean temperature for the week ending December 22, was 41.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.253, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,008, and there was no rain-fall during the week, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

SIR—There were 402 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 22, 1877, which is a decrease of 53, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 30 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending December 15, 1877, was 424, which is 66.4 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.33 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,084,528.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held 7th September, 1877.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held 29th August, 1877, read and approved.

An application was received from the Knickerbocker Ice Co. to have pier at Twentieth street, North river, extended westerly to the new pier line, and offering to pay additional rent equal to ten per cent. of the cost of such extension per annum; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the application of the Knickerbocker Ice Co. to have the pier at Twentieth street, North river, now leased by said Company, extended westerly to the new pier line, be and hereby is denied; the plans adopted by the Department and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for the permanent improvement of the water-front not admitting of any change being made in the existing lines of said pier.

An application was received from Josiah G. Macy for permission to drive piles and repair Pier 45, East river; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to Josiah G. Macy, for the owners, to drive piles and make the necessary repairs to Pier 45, East river, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

A communication was received from the Captain of the Port, stating that Pier 41, East river, was used by vessels having a draft of over 18 feet, and engaged in foreign commerce prior to the passage of chapter 249, Laws of 1875, and requesting that no permit for the erection of a shed thereon be granted by the Department, as the said pier has sufficient water for vessels of the deepest draft and there not being now enough uncovered piers on the East river to accommodate sailing vessels requiring berths in that location; and, being read,

On motion, the Secretary was directed to advise the Inland & Seaboard Coasting Company, applicants for permission to erect a shed on said pier, of the statement of the Captain of the Port, and that the Board will be pleased to consider any statements in relation thereto the company desire to submit.

The President reporting that an examination of the premises at foot of Forty-third street, East river, showed that there could be no objection to the placing of a temporary dump for stone on the bulkhead.

On motion, the application of John Ahsbabs, for permission to erect such a dumping-board, was taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolution adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted, to John Ahsbabs to erect and maintain, during the pleasure of this Board, a dumping-board on the bulkhead at the southerly half of Forty-third street, East river, for the purpose of dumping therefrom stone removed from his premises in the vicinity; provided the construction be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department, and the sum of \$50 be paid to this Department for the use of said bulkhead for one year from 1st September, 1877, payable in advance.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table, to await action as stated opposite each respectively, to wit:

From Finance Department—Applying for experts to examine work done at West Washington market. Engineer-in-Chief directed to cause examination to be made and an estimate of the cost of the work in detail prepared.

From Police Department—Applying for slips at Market, Stanton and Twenty-second street, East river, to be dredged. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make survey of said slips and report quantity of material to be dredged to obtain 15 feet depth at low water.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated opposite each respectively, to wit:

From Department of Public Charities and Correction—Relative to repairs needed at wharf at Hart's Island. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make necessary repairs.

From Finance Department—

1. Returning proposal of I. Eugene White for building new Pier 38, North river, with approval of Comptroller to the sureties.

2. Returning three lowest bids for building Pier (new number) 38, North river.

From Union Ferry Company—Relating to repairs to Pier 2, East river, ordered by Board on 29th ultimo.

From S. F. Shortland and Brother—Relating to payment of wharfage on pier at Eleventh street, North river.

From Treasurer—Report of receipts and disbursements for week ending 4th September, 1877.

The small cobble and rip-rap properly for the bulkhead and river wall is to be delivered and stone deposited around and between the piles, and in front and rear of the work, at such points on the North river, south of Fourteenth street, as may be designated by the Engineer. The small cobble only is to be placed between the piles, and the rip-

rap is to be placed in front and rear of the foundation, and is to be properly mixed with small cobble.

The broken stone and sand are to be delivered and unloaded upon the scows of the Department or upon piers or bulkheads, at such point or points along the North river water-front, south of Fourteenth street, as shall be designated, from time to time by the Engineer.

All material will be measured in bulk, on board the vessels of the contractor, at the place of delivery.

The foregoing are the quantities which have been estimated approximately for the construction of that part of the bulkhead or river wall proposed to be completed during the next calendar year. They form, however, no part of the contract, and persons bidding are cautioned that the Department of Docks do not hold themselves responsible that any of them shall strictly obtain in the construction of any work, and reserve the right to terminate the contract at any time after the delivery of the following quantities, to wit:

Class 1.—A—5,000 cubic yards.
B—5,000 cubic yards.
Class 2.—1,000 cubic yards.
Class 3.—500 cubic yards.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and shall give security for the faithful performance of his contract, in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance, in the sum of ten thousand dollars, in case the whole contract shall be awarded to him; or in the sum of eight thousand dollars for the contract for small cobble and rip-rap stone only; or in the sum of two thousand dollars for the contract for broken stone only; or in the sum of five hundred dollars for the contract for sand only.

This contract is to cease and terminate on the 27th day of December, 1878, and a penalty of fifty dollars per day, as liquidated damages, will be exacted for each day that the delivery of any part of the said materials has been delayed through neglect to furnish the same within ten days after the receipt of the necessary order therefor, Sundays and holidays not to be excepted.

Bidders will state in their proposals the price per cubic yard, for either or all of the above three classes of materials, respectively, by which the bids will be tested. The price is to cover the expenses of freight, loading and unloading, towing, tools, run-ways, and all other expenses necessary for the complete fulfillment of the contract.

Bidders will write out the price bid, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 27th day of November, 1877, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following amendments of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same are hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 190 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 190. All sinks, basins, and stationary tubs in every hotel, lodging, tenement, boarding-house, or other dwelling in the City of New York, shall be provided with proper stretch traps directly under each sink, basin or stationary tub, so connected with the waste or soil-pipe, and so constructed as directed or approved by the Board of Health, and with the traps so adjusted as to prevent the escape therefrom of foul odors and gases.

Resolved, That section 193 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 193. The waste or soil pipe in every tenement, lodging house or other dwelling in the City of New York shall be ventilated by extending the same by means of a pipe of the same size to a height of not less than two feet above the roof of the building, or pursuant to the terms of a permit in writing from the Board of Health.
