

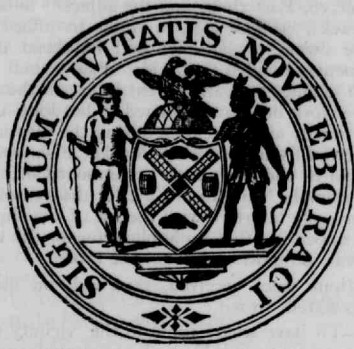

Street Cleaning.

On reading report of the Superintendent of Stables, relative to certain horses unfit for use, it was

Resolved, That the horses known as Nos. 6, 7, 10, 27, 29, 45, 48, 59, 61, 62, 68, 70, 82, and "wagon horse" be condemned, and that the Chief Clerk be directed to advertise their sale at public auction, at the Bureau of Street Cleaning Stables.

On reading report of Captain Williams, it was

Resolved, That scow No. 7 be condemned as unfit for use, and the Chief Clerk directed to advertise the sale of the same at public auction.

On reading and filing communication from the Department of Docks, dated June 9, 1880, requesting the removal of the Dumping Board from the foot of Lighthouse street, N. R., and the transfer of the business of Bureau of Street Cleaning, now transacted there, to some other point, without delay, it was

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk call the attention of the Department of Docks to the fact that the dock at the foot of Lighthouse street was, in pursuance of the mandatory language of Section 4, Chapter 677, of the Laws of 1872, by the Department of Docks, set apart for the use of the Department of Police, under which assignment the Board of Police will be under the necessity of retaining possession of the dock until furnished with another dock equally well located, and supplied with the needed structure required for dumping—the necessary funds requisite for the construction of which are not, at the present time, in the possession of this Department.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held April 21, 1880.

Present—Commissioners Dimock and Vanderpoel.

On motion, Commissioner Dimock took the chair.

The minutes of the meeting held 14th instant were read and approved.

An application was received from the New York Ferry Co. for permission to construct an additional ferry slip between Broome and Grand streets, East river, and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the New York Ferry Co. lessees and occupants of the west side of Pier 56, East river, and the adjacent bulkhead, to drive piles and construct in the slip thereat ferry racks, bridges, etc., in order to afford additional facilities for the ferry boats of said company, the owner of said pier and bulkhead having filed in this office his written consent to the improvement, provided that said company shall construct the ferry rack at the south side of Pier 56 in such manner as shall prevent injury to the pier by the ferry boats coming in collision therewith, all the work hereby authorized to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and to remain during the pleasure of this Board.

A communication was received from the Fulton Market Fishmongers' Association, protesting against a transfer of the lease held by the Morrisania Steamboat Co., of a portion of the east side of Pier 22, East river, to the Columbia Navigation Co., for the reason that the boats of the latter company being larger, would seriously interfere with the use of the slip by the boats of said Association, and, being read, and it appearing that no application for the transfer of said lease had been presented, the communication was, on motion, laid on the table.

The following communications were received, read and, on motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Police Department—To have wharf room in the vicinity of Pier (new) 1, North river, assigned for the use of police boats, or to provide such accommodation.

Secretary directed to advise in reply that this Department has no suitable wharf accommodations at its disposal at present, which can be assigned for such purpose, and further that it has no authority to provide similar accommodations at or near Pier (new) 1, North river, as requested in their communication.

From Edward Cooper, Mayor—As to a meeting to be held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in reference to plans for the construction of piers from Sixty-fifth to Seventy-second streets, North river.

From Old Dominion Steamship Company, stating that the berth at Pier (new) 1, North river, would be vacated by said company after the 20th instant, at which time they will remove therefrom their temporary shed.

Engineer-in-Chief directed to supervise the removal of said shed and report as to the condition of the pier thereafter.

From Thomas Shearman—In reference to patent pile-driver controlled by him.

Applicant requested to call on the Engineer-in-Chief in reference to the same.

From Compagnie Générale Transatlantique, agreeing to terms for dredging in slip between Piers (new) 41 and 42, North river, as contained in communication from this Department under date of April 14th.

From Michael Ryan, asking permission to occupy bulkhead at foot of Fiftieth street, North river, for the purpose of landing sand.

Applicant informed that he can occupy and use said bulkhead, provided that he shall pay to this Department for the privilege the sum of \$25 for every three months, in advance, the Department reserving the right to terminate this permit at any time it may elect so to do, and giving said Ryan the same privilege.

From Engineer-in-Chief the following reports:

1. As to work performed during week ending April 17, 1880.

2. In reference to dredging required at bulkhead at Thirty-second street, East river.

Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition for the necessary dredge scows and labor, to excavate and remove from the foot of said street, and for the space of 25 feet on either side, about 800 cubic yards of mud, in order to make a depth of 10 feet at mean low water.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare contract and specifications for furnishing 5,000 barrels Portland cement.

The application of the Knickerbocker Ice Co. for permission to widen pier at Forty-third street, North river, claimed to be owned by it, was

On motion, taken from the table and placed on file, and the said application denied, as in the opinion of this Board the permission, as granted by the Department in the year 1873, for the extension and widening of said pier upon land lying under water belonging to the city, was not warranted, and the Secretary directed to notify said company to stop all work of repairing or rebuilding the said pier, except it shall be within the lines of the present structure.

A communication was received from Louis de Bebian, agent for Compagnie Générale Transatlantique, lessee of pier (new) 42, North river, in reference to dredging required in slip between piers (new) 42 and 43 North river, and being read,

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans and specifications for dredging slip between piers new 42 and 43 North river, in conjunction with Compagnie Générale Transatlantique, by Louis de Bebian, agent.

The Secretary, stating that the right to collect and retain all wharfage accruing at the following-named piers and bulkheads had been sold to the highest bidders thereof, as named below at public sale, held by James M. Oakley & Co., Auctioneers, on the 13th instant, pursuant to the action of the Board on the 13th ultimo, and for the terms and prices as stated opposite each lot respectively, to wit:

On North River.

Lot 2. Pier at West Thirty-fifth street (except reservation on northerly side for berth for public bath during summer season), to Scott & Co. for one year from May 1, 1880, at \$3,500 per annum; upset bid, \$3,500.

Lot 4. Pier at West Fifty-fifth street (except reservation for telegraph cables and wires on northerly side and in the adjacent slip)—no dredging will be done by the Department in the slip adjacent to the southerly side of this pier—to Western Union Telegraph Co., for one year from May 1, 1880, at \$600 per annum; upset bid, \$600.

Lot 5. Pier at West Fifty-seventh street, to Frederick Schecker, for one year from May 1, 1880, at \$2,075; upset bid, \$1,675.

Lot 6. Pier 21 and bulkhead adjoining southerly side (the present lessee claims the right to remove the shed thereon, at any time prior to May 1, 1880), to William Coverly, for three years from May 1, 1880, at \$12,000 per annum; upset bid, \$12,000.

Lot 7. Southerly half of Pier 29, including the whole surface of said Pier (the present lessee claims the right to remove the shed thereon at any time prior to May 1, 1880), to Providence and Stonington Steamship Company, for three years from May 1, 1880, at \$25,100 per annum; upset bid, \$20,000.

On East River.

Lot 10. Bulkhead at East Twenty-ninth street, to Mark Goodwin, for one year from May 1, 1880, at \$200 per annum; upset bid, \$200.

Lot 11. Bulkhead at East Thirtieth street, to Oscar E. Hawhurst, for one year from May 1, 1880, at \$200 per annum; upset bid, \$200.

Lot 14. Bulkhead at East Thirty-fifth street, to Garret L. Schuyler, for one year from May 1, 1880, at \$200; upset bid, \$200.

Lot 15. Bulkhead at East Thirty-sixth street, to Popham & Co. for one year from May 1, 1880, at \$250 per annum; upset bid, \$250.

Lot 17. Pier or Bulkhead at East Eighty-sixth street (no dredging will be done at these premises by the Department), to John H. Baxter, for one year from May 1, 1880, at \$300 per annum; upset bid, \$300.

Lot 18. Bulkhead at and south of East Ninety-third street, to Thomas Patten, for one year from May 1, 1880, at \$500 per annum; upset bid, \$500.

Lot No. 19. Pier 37, about 44½ feet of bulkhead adjoining westerly side, and one-half of bulkhead adjoining easterly side (except reservation on westerly side of the pier for a Dumping Board), to Vermont Central Railroad Company, for three years from May 1, 1880, at \$4,000 per annum; upset bid, \$4,000.

Lot 20. About 188 feet of bulkhead on Tompkins street, adjacent to and north of the north side of Rivington street, to Jos. V. Brown, for three years from May 1, 1880, at \$500 per annum; upset bid, \$500.

Resolved, That the sale of the said right, at the said several lots of wharf property, upon the terms as reported by the Secretary, be and is hereby approved and confirmed, and the officers of the Board be and are hereby authorized and empowered to execute the necessary leases therefor, when prepared and approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation.

Oakley & Company, auctioneers, to offer at public sale, to be held on Thursday, May 27, 1880, for purchase to the highest bidder, the right to occupy the above named premises for ferry purposes only, and also the right to collect and retain all wharfage accruing at certain six lots of piers and bulkheads, at present not subject to leases, as designated by the Commissioners, subject to the terms and conditions as set forth in the advertisements prepared by the Secretary, and cause said sale to be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD and other newspapers designated by law for Corporation notices.

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—As to rent to be paid for lease to New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company for land under water between Sixty-fifth and Seventy-second streets, North river.

From C. W. Scofield—To have a berth assigned at Pier (new) 1, North river, for Steamer Plymouth Rock during the summer season.

Applicant requested to call on Commissioner Vanderpoel in reference thereto.

From S. L. Merchant—To have a test made of Portland Cement.

Application granted.

From John G. Dale, Agent—In reference to shed proposed to be erected on Pier (new) 36, North river leased by him.

From Engineer-in-Chief—As to work performed during week ending April 24, 1880.

From Compagnie Générale Transatlantique, agreeing to form of contract etc., for dredging slip between Piers (new) 42 and 43, North river.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to examine and report as to repairs required at end of pier at Twenty-third street, East river, and also as to repairs required to surface of pier at Forty-seventh street, North river, reported by the Dock Superintendent requiring immediate attention.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans and specifications for dredging slip between Piers (new) 42 and (new) 43, North river, in conjunction with Compagnie Générale Transatlantique.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to proceed with the construction of sufficient concrete base blocks for the bulkhead or river wall between the south end of Beach street section and a point about equally distant from Franklin and North Moore streets, and also that he be and is hereby directed to proceed with the construction of about 300 feet of said bulkhead wall, extending from the south end of the wall of the Beach street section now building between Beach and Hubert streets upon the same plan as that of the Beach street section of the bulkhead or river wall, and of a pier to be known as Pier (new) 25, North river, and that all of the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as required by subdivision 5 of section 6 of Chapter 574, Laws of 1871, and that it be done by the force of the department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the material and dredging necessary therefor, not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, be and are hereby respectfully requested, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 738, Laws of 1872, to consent to and approve of the width and location of the pier to be erected and known as Pier (new) 36, North river, being so altered and changed from the lines therefor, as laid down on the plans prepared by this Department, and approved by the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on April 27, 1871, as to make the width of the said pier 75 feet instead of 60 feet, and as to establish the northerly line of the said pier at the line for the new bulkhead wall, about 151 feet south of the southerly line of Pier (new) 37, North river, as approved and established by the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on September 25, 1877.

The Auditing Committee presented an audit of fourteen bills or claims, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$4,865.24, and, being read, was,

On motion, accepted and adopted, and the Secretary directed to forward the said bills, together with proper requisitions for the amount, to the Finance Department for payment.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk be and is hereby directed to credit the account of the Counsel to the Corporation with the following amounts, in conformity with the communication from the Law Department, dated March 12, 1880, to wit: For amounts for which judgment has been entered for the city, and the executions issued therefor to the Sheriff of the County have been returned unsatisfied: Claim against John D. Tracy, for rent of Pier 60, East river, \$991.19; claim against Dillon Ransom, for rent of steps at Third Avenue Bridge, Harlem river, \$1,300; claim against Patrick Grace, for rent of pier at One Hundred and Seventeenth street, Harlem river, \$251.25.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief recommending that certain old material belonging to the Department be disposed of at public sale, and, being read,

On motion, the Secretary was directed to arrange for the sale of said old material at public auction, and to cause proper notices of the same to be inserted in the several newspapers designated by law.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans and specifications for piers at foot of Thirty-first and Thirty-second streets, East river.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted, to wit:

Whereas, The New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company have made application to this Department for permission to lease, reclaim, and fill in certain lands under water in front of property claimed to be owned by said company, between Sixty-fifth and Seventy-second streets, North river, and to construct bulkheads and piers thereat for the purpose of making and erecting additional terminal improvement and facilities, and,

Whereas, The plan determined by this Department for improving the said territory or district between Sixty-fifth and Seventy-second streets, North river, was approved and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on April 27, 1880, therefore,

Resolved, That the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company be and is hereby notified, that this Department will set aside for the use of railroad traffic, and will grant to it a lease for the term of ten years from May 1, 1880, with the privilege of two renewals of ten years each of the land under water belonging to the Corporation, between the southerly line of Sixty-fifth street, and the southerly line of Seventy-second street, North river, and extending from the existing shore or bulkhead westerly to the established pier line of 1868, and with permission to fill in and reclaim the same easterly of the line of new bulkhead, as provided under the said plans, and to erect on said premises, free of cost and expense to the city, a suitable and proper bulkhead, and five piers of a width of 100 feet each, and two piers of a width of 60 feet each, all to be located in conformity with the lines established therefor upon the plans referred to above, approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on 27th instant, and to be constructed in accordance with plans to be approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and with permission to do such dredging and make such repairs upon said improvements at such times as the said company may deem necessary, provided that the said company shall first and within ten days after receipt of this notice file in this office its written agreement to pay rent for the said land under water in the sum of \$17,500 per annum, payable quarterly in advance, from and after May 1, 1880, and an additional sum of \$3,500 per annum during the first renewal term of ten years; and a further additional sum of \$3,500 per annum during the second renewal term of ten years, and at the termination of the said lease or renewal thereof by expiration or otherwise, to entirely remove all the said piers whenever required so to do by this Department or its successor, so as to allow piers to be located upon any other lines the interests of the city may demand; and provided further that the said company shall agree in writing to execute the lease when prepared and approved as to form by the Counsel to the Corporation, and that in addition to the usual covenants, the said lease shall contain a covenant to the effect that any and all streets or avenues laid out on the map of the city, and constructed under the above permission to fill in, will be opened as public highways whenever the proper city authorities shall so direct, free of all claim of any kind whatsoever against the Corporation, either for the cost of improvements thereon or damage thereto, or otherwise.

Resolved, That upon receipt of the agreement of said company to the above terms, the Secre-

tary be and is hereby directed to request the Counsel to the Corporation to prepare the necessary lease in proper form, and that the officers of the Board be and are hereby empowered to execute the same.

On motion, William Ryan, night-watchman, was discharged, and Hugh Buckley, night-watchman, suspended for one week, and the resignation of Chas. W. Hunt, as rodman, accepted.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1880.

CHAPTER 322.

AN ACT to establish a state board of health.

Passed May 18, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: Section 1. Within twenty days after the passage of this act, the governor shall appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, three state commissioners of health, two of whom shall be graduates of legally constituted medical colleges and of not less than seven years' practice of their profession. The said commissioners, together with the attorney-general, the superintendent of the state survey and the health officer of the port of New York, who shall be ex-officio members of the state board of health, and three other persons to be designated and appointed by the governor, one of whom shall be a commissioner of health of the board of health of the city of New York, and the others shall be members or commissioners of health of regularly constituted and organized boards of health of cities of the state, shall constitute the board of health of the state of New York. Nothing in chapter three hundred and thirty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-three of the state of New York or in the laws amending the same, or in the laws constituting boards of health in the various cities of the state, shall be read or construed to prevent the appointment of the said commissioners of board of health of cities also members of the board of health of the state of New York, and no appointment to an office or acceptance thereof under this law, shall be held to vacate the office previously held in any board of health of any city in this state.

Sec. 2. The said three commissioners so appointed shall take the oath of office prescribed by the constitution for state officers, and receive from the secretary of state certificates of their appointment. They shall hold office for three years, and whenever a vacancy occurs, the place shall be filled as in other cases provided by law, and the other commissioners shall, from time to time, be designated by the governor as occasion may require, or as their places may be vacated in the board by the expiration of the several terms of office.

Sec. 3. The state board of health shall meet at least once in every three months and as much oftener as they shall deem necessary, their first meeting being held in the city of Albany within two weeks after the appointment duly made of the members of the first board and after they shall have qualified as aforesaid, and each annual meeting shall be held within two weeks after the first of May each year after the first, as herein provided. No member of the board except the secretary shall receive any compensation, but the actual traveling and other expenses of the members and officers of said board while engaged in their duties shall be allowed and paid out of the appropriation made for its support. They shall elect annually one member of the board to be president; they shall also elect from among their own members or otherwise, a person of skill and experience in public health duties and sanitary science, to be the secretary and executive officer of said board, who shall have all the powers and privileges of said board except in regard to voting upon matters relating to his own office and duties as secretary, and he shall hold said office for the term of three years, but he may be removed for cause after a full hearing by the board, a majority of the members voting therefor.

Sec. 4. The state board of health may adopt by-laws regulating the transaction of its business, and provide therein for the appointment of committees* to whom it shall delegate authority and power for the work committed to them, and it may also adopt and use an official seal. Five members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Sec. 5. The secretary shall keep a record of the acts and proceedings of the board, perform and superintend the work prescribed in this act, and such other duties as the board may order, and shall receive an annual salary of three thousand dollars, which shall be paid him in the same manner as the salaries of other state officers are paid, and such necessary expenses shall be allowed him as the comptroller shall audit on the presentation of an itemized account having vouchers annexed, together with the certificate of the board.

Sec. 6. Said board shall take cognizance of the interests of health and life among the people of the state, they shall make inquiries in respect to the causes of disease, and especially of epidemics, and investigate the sources of mortality, and the effects of localities, employments and other conditions upon the public health. It shall be the duty of said board to obtain, collect and preserve such information relating to deaths, diseases and health as may be useful in the discharge of its duties, and contribute to the promotion of the health or the security of life in the state of New York. And it shall be the duty of all health officers and boards of health in the state to communicate to said state board of health copies of all their reports and publications; also such sanitary information as may be useful.

Sec. 7. It shall be the duty of the state board of health to have the general supervision of the state system of registration of births, marriages and deaths, and also the registration of prevalent diseases. Said board shall prepare the necessary methods and forms for obtaining and preserving such records, and to insure the faithful registration of the same in the several counties, and in the central bureau of vital statistics at the capitol of the state. The said board of health shall recommend such forms and amendments of law as shall be deemed to be necessary for the thorough organization and efficiency of the registration of vital statistics throughout the state. The secretary of said board of health shall be the superintendent of registration of vital statistics of the state. As supervised by the said board, the clerical duties and safe-keeping of the bureau of vital statistics thus created shall be provided for by the comptroller of the state, who shall also provide and furnish such apartments and stationery as said board shall require in the discharge of its duties. And the state board of health shall also prepare the necessary methods and forms and prescribe the rules regulating the issue and use of transfer permits, with the proper coupons attached thereto, to be issued by local organized boards of health, for the transportation of the dead bodies of persons which are to be carried for burial beyond the limits of the counties where the death occurs; and in all cases the said state board of health shall require coupons to be attached to such permits, to be detached and preserved by every common carrier, or the person in charge of any vessel, said railroad train or vehicle to whom such dead bodies shall be delivered for transportation. Any violation of such rules and regulations shall be a misdemeanor.

Sec. 8. At any time the governor of the state may require the state board of health to examine into nuisances, or questions affecting the security of life and health in any locality, and in such case the said board shall have all necessary powers to make such examinations, and it shall report the results thereof to the governor within the limits of time which he shall prescribe for such examination and report. The report of such examination, when approved by the governor, shall be filed in the office of the secretary of state, and the governor may, in relation to the matters or things found and certified by the state board of health to be nuisances, declare them to be public nuisances, and order them to be changed as he shall direct, or abated and removed. Any violation of such an order shall be held and punished as a misdemeanor, and thereafter the governor may by his order, in writing, certified under his official seal, directed to the officers of the county in which the said nuisance shall be situated, require the district attorney, the sheriff and the other officers of every such county, to take all necessary measures to execute and to have obeyed the order of the governor.

Sec. 9. At any time at the request of the state board of health, or whenever the governor shall as hereinbefore provided have directed an examination and report to be made by the state board of health into any alleged nuisance, any board of health of any city of the state may appoint and select any one of its officers as its representative during such examination of any nuisance, and such representative officer shall have a seat at, and be entitled to take part in, all the deliberations of the state board of health during such investigation, but without the right to vote.

Sec. 10. Said board may, from time to time, engage suitable persons to render sanitary service and to make or supervise practical and scientific investigations and examinations requiring expert skill, and to prepare plans and report relative thereto. And it is hereby made the duty of all officers and agents having the control, charge or custody of any public structure, work, ground or erection, or of any plan, description, outlines, drawings or charts thereof, or relating thereto, made, kept or controlled under any public authority, to permit and facilitate the examination and inspection, and the making of copies of the same by any officer or person by said board authorized; and the members of said board, or such other officer or person as may at any time be by said board authorized, may, without fee or hindrance, enter, examine and survey all grounds, erections, vehicles, structures, apartments, buildings and places. But no more than five thousand dollars in any one year shall be expended for such special sanitary service.

Sec. 11. It shall be the duty of said board, on or before the first Monday of December in each year, to make a report in writing to the governor of the state, upon the vital statistics and the sanitary condition and prospects of the state; and such report shall set forth the action of said board and of its officers and agents and the names thereof, for the past year, and may contain other useful information, and shall suggest any further legislative action or precautions deemed proper for the better protection of life and health. And the annual report of said board shall also contain a detailed statement of the manner of its expenditure, during the year last past, but its total expenditures shall not exceed the sum of fifteen thousand dollars in any one year.

Sec. 12. The sum of fifteen thousand dollars is hereby appropriated from the general fund for the purposes of this act, and the expenditures properly incurred by authority of said board and verified by affidavit, subject, however, to the limitations hereinbefore imposed, and shall be paid by the treasurer upon the warrant of the comptroller.

Sec. 13. This act shall take effect immediately.

The time of payment of taxes for the years 1877, 1878, and 1879, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, is extended to the first day of April, 1881, and if not paid before that date, interest will be payable at the rate of twelve per cent. per annum.

The Act, chapter 123, Laws of 1880, containing these provisions of law, is published below.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eight hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed

in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
