The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7376, submitting the necessary plans for the changing of lines of Pier, new 36, East river, in accordance with the resolution passed 29th December, 1887, was received, read and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was:

On motion, adopted:

Resolved, That this Board deems it advisable to change the width and location of the new Pier, near the foot of Jefferson street, East river, to be known as Pier, new 36, East river, from the width and location thereof as laid down on the plans determined by this Board April 13, 1871, and adopted and certified to by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 27, 1871, as follows:

The width of the pier to be forty feet, instead of eighty feet as shown on the plans aforesaid; the easterly side-line of the pier to spring from the bulkhead-line at the intersection of the bulkhead-

line with the easterly line of Jefferson street, extended, instead of at a point about eighty feet westerly thereof, as shown on the plans aforesaid; the lines of the pier to be parallel to the lines as shown on the plans aforesaid; all as shown on a plan submitted in duplicate by the Engineer-in-Chief, and hereby approved by the Board.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief under Secretary's Order No. 7346, upon application of L. & J. Brandt, for permission to rip-rap the slope of embankment recently made at the foot of Eighty-third street, East river, was received and read, and

On motion, it was Resolved, That the application of Messrs. L. & J. Brandt for permission to rip-rap the slope of embankment recently made at the foot of Eighty-third street, East river, be and hereby is denied, and that the said Messrs. L. & J. Brandt be and hereby are required and directed to remove so much of said embankment as is within a line ten feet westerly of original high-water mark, and so much of said embankment as is above a slope beginning at a line ten feet westerly of original high-water mark, and rising westerly at the rate of one foot of vertical height to two feet of horizontal distance, and that the said Messrs. L. & J. Brandt be informed that if the exterior street planned by the Department of Docks and submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to chapter 697 of the Laws of 1887, and now under consideration by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, is approved by that body, that all of this embankment within one hundred feet of the East river, will have to be removed.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, January 4, 1888, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish; also Chief Engineer Church, Deputy Chief Engineer Rice and Consulting Engineer Fteley.

In the absence of J. C. Sheehan, the Secretary, J. C. Lulley, the Auditor, was elected Secretary pro tem., and until the Secretary appears.

The minutes of the special meeting of December 30 were read and approved. The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 3221 to 3251, inclusive; and on motion of Commissioner Ridgway, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

Also submitted the following report:

The Committee of Finance and Audit, to whom was referred the subject matter of accepting the work done for the Commission by Messrs. Coldwell, Wilcox & Company, report that the work called for in the contract with said Coldwell, Wilcox & Company on the third day of August, 1887, consisted of ironwork for lining, delivered ready to be put in place, for Shafts 22 and 23 on Section A of the New Croton Aqueduct; and that said work was to be paid for when so delivered and accepted by the Chief Engineer.

That the said ironwork has been furnished and delivered in accordance with said contract, and accepted by the Chief Engineer, and inasmuch as the said Coldwell, Wilcox & Co. have furnished satisfactory evidence that the claims of all persons who have done work or furnished materials under said agreement have been paid or satisfactorily secured, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done and materials furnished by Coldwell, Wilcox & Co. under their agreement made with this Commission on the 3d day of August, 1887, for furnishing the ironwork for lining, delivered ready to be put in place, for Shafts Nos. 22 and 23 on Section A of the New Croton Aqueduct, and that a proper voucher for the final payment for work done and material furnished under said agreement be approved by the Commissioners and certified to the Comptroller for payment.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the report was approved and the resolution adopted. The Committee on Construction recommended the adoption of the following resolution, and the same was adopted:
