157 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 106 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 100 houses, 100 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding,

14 persons sick with contagious diseases were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps. The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 615 yards, courts and areas, 642 cellars and basements, 4836 privies and water-closets, 22 garbage boxes, and 302 2-5 miles of street gutters.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Bureau of Vital Statistics. The certificates of 525 births, 36 still-births, 140 marriages, and 838 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 6, 1881; this shows a decrease of 33 births, 12 still-births, 2 marriages and 44 deaths, when com-pared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the cor-responding week of the year 1880, there was an increase of 15 births, 1 marriage, and 184 deaths, and a decrease of 1 still-birth. Compared with the mortality reported during the pre-ceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 1; diphtheria, 12; whooping cough, 2; typhus fever, 8; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 23; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 13; heart diseases, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; convulsions, 4; apoplexy, 4; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 12; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; sucide, 1, and drowning, 4; while the deaths from small-pox increased 4; measles, 2; croup, 15; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; diar-rheeal diseases, 2; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancers, 11; marsmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; premature and pretematural births, 8. The number of deaths from aneurism was the same in the two successive weeks. two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 157 were in institutions, 478 in tenement-houses, 197 in houses containing three families or less, I in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc. ; 7 were on the basement floor, 163 on the first, 241 on the second, 149 on the third, 86 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 4 on the sixth. 830 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 8 non-residents ; 68 were stated to be single, 157 married, 56 widowed, and the condition of 557 was not stated ; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 838; still-births, 36; bodies in transitu, 36. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 60 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 525 births, 140 marriages, 36 still-births, 838 deaths. 36 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 53 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 1 of marriage and 23 of death were issued during the week. of marriage, and 32 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending Aug. 6, 1881, was 77.2 degrees Fahr., the mean read-ing of the barometer was 29.986, the mean humidity was 78, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 745, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.10 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 764 deaths and still-births, or 87.41 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 15; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 314; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 80; Greenwood (undenominational), 54; Lutheran, (undenominational), 149; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 47; Woodlawn (undenominational), 24; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 17; Union (Methodist Protestant), 9; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 9; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 11; Washington (undenominational), 8.



An Act relating to the right of benevolent, charitable, religious, scientific and missionary societies to take and hold real and personal estate. Passed July 13, 1881.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: Section I. All corporations already formed or which hereafter may be formed under and in pur-suance of chapter three hundred and nneteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and forty-eight, being "An act for the incorporation of benevolent, charitable, scientific and missionary societies," and the several acts amendatory thereof, and their successors, by their corporate name, shall in law be capable of taking, receiving, purchasing, and holding real estate for the purposes of their corporation to an amount not exceeding the sum of two hundred thousand dollars in value, and personal estate for like purposes to an amount not exceeding the sum of two hundred thousand dollars in value, but the clear annual income of such real and personal estate shall not exceed the sum of fifty thousand dol-lars, subject, however, to the restrictions upon devises and bequests contained in an act entitled "An act relating to wills," passed April thirteen, eighteen hundred and sixty. Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 648.

AN ACT in relation to a certain local improvement in the city of New York. Passed July 16, 1881 ; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: Section 1. The commissioner of public works of the city of New York, the counsel to the corporation and the chief engineer of the Croton aqueduct are hereby authorized and directed, within four months after the date of the passage of this act, to ascertain and determine the work heretofore performed in or in connection with the regulating and grading of First avenue, from Ninety-second to One Hundred and Ninth streets, in said city, the proportion thereof performed by the city, and the proportion thereof otherwise performed, together with the fair, just and reasonable value of the work so otherwise found by them to have been performed, with whatever amount of interest they consider in fairness and equity should be paid thereon ; and it shall be the duty of the said commissioners to certify their proceedings to the comptroller of the city, who shall, on such certification, pay to Charles G. Waterbury, his executors or administrators, on obtaining his or their release in favor of the city as assignee and as surety of all claims arising on or in relation to the contract for the execution or performance of said work, the amount certified to him by the commissioners as aforesaid, in the same manner as other works of local improvement in said city are paid. Sec. 2. After the said commissioners shall certify their proceedings, as in the preceding section provided by law, and complete the regulating, grading, curbing, guttering and flagging of said First avenue, from Ninety-second street to One Hundred and Ninth street. Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 706.

AN ACT to provide for the publication of the registry of voters in the city and county of New York.

Passed August 22, 1881 ; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the inspectors of election in each election district in the city and county of New York, on each day of general registration or revision of registration, and before adjourning, to copy from the registers the names and residences of all persons registered upon that day, so that the names of those persons having the same residence shall appear together in the form and means following, namely. and manner following, namely election district, of the

And they shall append thereto a certificate, signed by each of them, in the words and figures following, namely: "We, the undersigned inspectors of election, in the election district, of the assembly district, of the city and county of New York, do jointly and severally certify that the list hereunto annexed is a true and correct copy of the names and residences, upon the registers, of all persons who have been registered by us as qualified voters in the said election district, this day of , in the year

And it shall be the duty of the chairman of the board of inspectors of election, in each election district of the city and county of New York, to deliver such list, copy and certificate, prepared in the manner herein prescribed, immediately upon the completion thereof, to the captain of the police precinct in which the election district is situated; and it shall be the duty of such captain to deliver the same without delay, and within twelve hours after the close of each day of general registration or revision of registration, to the supervisor of the CITY RECORD in said city. Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the supervisor of the CITY RECORD to cause the lists of registered voters, made and delivered as directed in the first section of this act, to be arranged by assembly districts, and by election districts of assembly districts, commencing with the first, and in such man-ner that the names of all registered voters residing at any given number of any street shall appear together, and those of each street in each election district shall appear arranged by house num-bers, in consecutive order, each street separately. And as soon as the entire registry of voters shall be completed, and the copies thereof made and delivered as herein provided, the said super-visor shall forthwith cause the same to be printed and published in the CITY RECORD as herein-alter provided, and in the form and manner herein prescribed ; and such publication shall be made within eighty-four hours after the close of each annual registration. The registry of each assembly district shall be printed separately as a supplement to the CITY RECORD, and each said supplement containing the registry of one assembly district shall be sold separately to persons wishing to pur-chase the same at not less than five cents per copy. And all money received therefor shall be paid into the city treasury and applied toward the payment of the cost of such publication; and the board of estimate and apportionment of said city and county shall make such appro herein directed. Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the chief of the bureau of elections to prepare and furnish to the inspectors of elections in each election district in the city of New York the necessary blanks and forms as prescribed in the first section of this act. Sec. 4. Any inspectro of this act. Sec. 4. Any inspector of election in the city and county of New York, who shall neglect or refuse to comply with the requirements of this act, shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars, recoverable by the board of police by civil action, in any court of record, in the name of the treasurer of the board, and for the use and benefit of the police fund. Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 636.

As Acr supplementary to chapter eight hundred and thirty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-two, relating to the Metropolitan Transit Company.

Passed July 13, 1881 ; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

A majority of the members of the board of engineers created by section four of chapter eight hundred and thirty-three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-two, entitled "An act to authorize the Metropolitan Transit Company to construct and operate certain railroads in the city of New York, and to construct and use for railroad purposes two bridges across the Harlem river," passed May twenty-second, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, shall constitute a quorum, and be competent for the transaction of its business. And they are hereby authorized and empowered to file in the office of the state engineer and surveyor in the city of Albany, surveys and maps of the routes, together with the best approved plans of construction which said company are hereby authorized to adopt and to build said roads upon, as therein provided for, and as finally adopted and completed by
