COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Superintendent of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn.

Office of Commissioner of Public Works, Bureau of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, Superintendent of Sewers' Office, January 17, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—On July 5, 1901, during an unprecedented rain-fall, a portion of the main sewer in Hegeman Avenue, said sewer being in sectional area equivalent to a circle 96 inches in diameter, burst, the invert of same sinking, and the arch destroyed for a distance of 180 linear feet. This break extends from the east curb-line of Hinsdale Street 180 linear feet easterly.

Request was made from the Department of Sewers in July, 1901, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation sufficient to repair this sewer at that time. No money being allowed for same, it has been impossible to repair the sewer up to this date.

In the examination of this break, on July 10, and recently on January 15, it was ascertained that the sewer, for a distance of about 20 feet, was founded on unstable ground, or the bed of an old creek; therefore, it is recommended that when the sewer is rebuilt, the same be founded on piles for a reasonable part of this length.

It is estimated that the cost of this repair will be about \$5,000; therefore, pursuant to section 419 of the Charter, authority must be given the President of the Borough to enter into contract for same.

I enclose herewith an appropriate resolution, recommending that the same, or one drawn to the effect of the substance contained therein, be presented to the Board of Aldermen, requesting their immediate action.

I respectfully suggest the advisability of having this matter presented to the Board of Aldermen by Alderman Alt, of the district. Yours respectfully,

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith a copy of a report made by Frederick Sprenger, a Sanitary Inspector in this department, in respect to the running of the cars in the Borough of The Bronx with snow plows, in which the inspector states they are set at a slight angle several inches below the tracks, and any object struck by the snowplows would have to be beneath the cars and close to the rail, and in his judgment these snow plows add somewhat to the danger to persons who are in any manner struck by the cars. To the Acting Chief Sanitary Inspector.

Sir—I have the honor to report having inspected a number of cars run by the Union Railway Co., in the boroughs of The Bronx and Manhattan in relation to attached complaint of George E. Tytler, M. D., and found the facts as follows:

The cars are partially provided with snow plows as stated. No fenders are provided in front of the cars and the snow plows complained of are located beneath the cars, back of the steps and directly in front of the wheels. Across the front of the truck and wheels a timber guard is provided. The snow plows consist of pieces of iron about 7 or 8 inches wide and 2 feet long, placed above the rail on each side in front of the truck above mentioned. They are set at a slight angle, several inches above the tracks so as to readily remove all snow from the tracks only. Any

object struck by the snow plow would have to be beneath the cars and close to the rail. In my judgment these snow plows add somewhat to the danger of persons who in any manner are struck by the cars.

This matter it seems to me would come under the jurisdiction of the Board of Aldermen. Respectfully submitted.

Gentlemen—I have your circular letter dated January 15, 1902, and your printed circular, dated January 6, 1902. In compliance with the request of the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment, I sent the necessary number of copies of departmental estimate for the District Attorney's Office of Richmond County, in which estimate I stated that the sum necessary to defray the contingent expenses and witness fees would be the sum of \$1,500. This sum is barely adequate. The appropriation made last year for witness fees and contingencies for this office was the sum of \$1,500. I am unable to say whether it has all been expended, since some claims are held up in the Comptroller's Office; but if these claims are paid there will be a deficiency, unless a transfer is made from the County Contingent Fund.

During the first year of my term a deficiency existed at the end of the year, my appropriation then being \$500, and a transfer was made from the County Contingent Fund. This state of facts existed the following year, and a like transfer was made.

My statement of the amount necessary to transact the business of this office for the year 1902 required an appropriation of \$2,000; the sum allowed was \$1,500. Two thousand dollars would be a very small estimate, and any reduction from the \$1,500 appropriation would be sure to result in a deficiency and perhaps result in suits being brought against the city to recover for services performed for this office, thus requiring the payment of the money by the city, with the additional costs.

I trust that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may not reduce the amount of the appropriation for this office, and I would be glad to attend personally before the Board to further explain the matter.

Sec. 4. No person or persons, firm, partnership company or corporation shall violate any provision of this ordinance under a penalty of one hundred dollars for each car so owned or operated by him, them or it.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect May 1, 1902.
