Minutes of Meeting of Art Commission, Held in the Governor's Room, City Hall, on Tuesday, March 10, 1903, at 4 o'clock p. m.

Present—President Warner, presiding; Commissioners Healy, Rhinelander, Marshall and Proctor and Hon. Gustav Lindenthal, Commissioner of Bridges, in respect to designs for Eastchester Bay Bridge, Manhattan Bridge and Williamsburg Bridge decorations.

The Committee recommended that the request of Commissioner Lindenthal be granted, which, on motion, was allowed by the Commission and the substitution made.

Gustav Lindenthal, Commissioner of Bridges.

Gustav Lindenthal, Commissioner of Bridges.

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission No. 94.

The Committee upon Lorimer Street Public Comfort Station (Brooklyn) submitted a report, through Commissioner Healy, upon designs submitted by Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President of the Borough of Brooklyn (on request of the Mayor), which read as follows:

"It is proposed to abandon the proposed site at corner of Broadway and Division avenue and substitute the one shown in design, at Broadway and Lorimer street.

"The location is not objectionable, except that it will not be as useful as in the place originally selected.

"This report is confined to the location and not to design."

"Your Committee on Hall of Records Sculptures begs to recommend that the designs represented by Exhibits '25AD' and '25AE' be approved."

The Committee was thereupon discharged.

Submission No. 93.

The Committee on Rug for Mayor's Office submitted a report upon a design submitted by the Persian Rug Manufactory, which read as follows:

"Your Committee upon Rug for the Mayor's Office begs to report as follows:

"In the absence of information concerning the color scheme adopted for the room for which the rug is designed no opinion can be formed as to its fitness for the same as far as color is concerned, but independent of other considerations the color scheme of the rug is not considered worthy of approval.

"As to the design itself, namely, the forms used, your Committee does not find it in the best taste. The 'motifs' of the border—fascines with axes, wreaths and garlands—while they would be proper for a wall decoration, are entirely out of place on the floor. Moreover, the only view obtainable of this border and its members being from within the border, all these objects—fascines, wreaths, etc.—would be seen upside down and only so.

"Aside from the impropriety of placing the City's coat of arms on the floor to be tramped on, the enlargement of the rug design to a scale that would make the two human figures some three and a half feet in height, would result in an artistic horror unless, indeed, both in the design and execution the highest skill were employed."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Certificate No. 102.

Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the designs for a rug for the Mayor's office represented by Exhibits "64A" and "64B" of record in this matter; and that the action of the Commission be certified to the Persian Rug Manufactory.

Committee on Hall of Records Sculptures.

The Committee on Fine Arts Federation, Memorial, Hall of Records, reported back to the Commission on the communication received, with the query as to whether official action should be taken thereon.

The resolution from the Fine Arts Federation was as follows:

To the Art Commission for The City of New York:

In compliance with your communication to the Fine Arts Federation, under date of January 27, 1903, the following plan is submitted for the decoration of the Hall of Records:

With an expenditure of approximately six millions of dollars for a single public building the Fine Arts Federation feels that the City should obtain a lasting monument, fully equipped in every respect, and with an original scheme of sculpture and mural painting in keeping with its purpose and worthy of comparison with any building of equal importance in the world.

To secure these results in interior decoration the following recommendations are made:

First—That a consistent scheme of subjects be selected for the decoration of the building throughout.

Second—That a consistent scheme of ornamentation be suggested throughout the building.

Third—That the subjects selected be:

- (1) Historical.
- (2) Semi-Historical.
- (3) Allegorical.

Fourth—It is found that there are a certain number of lunettes in the entrance vestibule and corridors of the main building. It is recommended that these should be filled with mural decorations representing the trades of the city, as for example—masons, carpenters, weavers, jewelers, workers of iron, stone, mosaic, etc., etc., thus typifying at the entrance the men who have built up the city.

It is recommended that the ceiling of these corridors be treated with mosaic, as in the existing specifications, but that mosaic of better quality be used.

Fifth—It is recommended that the skylight of the main hall be treated with stained glass, as in the existing specifications, but that the glass used be of a quality appropriate for the general scheme adopted and of such transparency as to insure sufficient light in the building.

Sixth—It is recommended that the domes of the main hall should be treated in decoration with a design of figure and ornament similar to the Galleries Galland in Hotel de Ville, Paris.

It is also recommended that the main panels surrounding the main hall be framed with an ornamental border designed by the same artist, so that the scheme of subjects as suggested may be consistently and properly framed.

For the panels in the main hall it is recommended that:

- Four of these be treated with historical subjects.
- Seven of these be treated with semi-historical subjects.
- Six of these be treated with allegorical subjects,

—it being felt that by this distribution of subjects best results would be obtained.

The historical subjects used could be subjects such as, or similar to, those on list appended.

For the semi-historical panels, subjects pertaining to the purposes for which the building is created could be appropriately used. Thus, records of the courts, records of wills, finances, real estate, etc., might be properly emphasized.

For the allegorical panels, such subjects as finance, commerce, literature, etc., might be used.

Seventh—It is recommended that the large lunettes at the end of the main hall be treated in mural decorations with subjects:

- (1) New York of the past,
- (2) New York of the present,

—the artist to be given the privilege of a semi-historical interpretation of these subjects.

We shall, of course, be glad to give prompt consideration to such designs as, in accord with these or other suggestions, the Fine Arts Federation or your Board may see fit to submit for our approval.

In this connection we refer you to our communication of April 2, 1902 (on reference by you to us of the Memorial of the Municipal Art Society), containing a reference to the decoration of the building now in question.

Gentlemen—Various articles have recently appeared in the daily papers stating that there was considerable friction between Horgan & Slattery and the Art Commission, and that the Commission was greatly delaying the work on the Hall of Records Building.

We beg to state that these articles are without a particle of truth, and that neither Mr. Horgan nor Mr. Slattery, nor any one representing this office, has had any interviews with reporters, nor made any such statements as have been published.

The Art Commission has not delayed the work on the new Hall of Records Building in any way, and has always treated us with uniform courtesy.
