Report for Quarter ending June 30, 1904.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

July 1, 1904.

Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith quarterly report of the designs for improvement, work accomplished and finances of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, for the three months ending June 30, 1904.

Bronx Park.

On the bridge over the Bronx river, at the crossing of the Bronx and Pelham parkway, the concrete abutments, up to the height of the coping, have been finished. The lower ring of the arch on both sides is completed, and the centre is nearly ready for the iron ribs.

The bridle path, 16 feet wide, leading from the Bronx and Pelham parkway to a point near the old mansion, has been completed, and is now in use.

The following general work has been performed: Cleaning and storing winter machinery and removing it from mansion to new barn, filling in washouts, repairing roads, edging and grading paths, raking and mowing lawns, raking leaves in woods, cutting down dead trees, cultivating shrubbery, cleaning and repairing gutters, building wall around lily pond, digging ditches, sodding and making blind ditches, building wall and stopping leaks in big lake, marking and repairing tennis courts, cutting wood, hauling and loading trees for greenhouses and nursery, planting flowers and shrubs, pruning shrubs and trees, and keeping the roads and lawns clean.

Bronx Park Shops.

Work was done in and for the various parks as follows:

Constructing of shed, boat-house, stalls, fences and back-stops for base ball, preparing of posts for rifle range, completing of mason work at Tremper House, and forging of all iron-work. Erecting of emergency tents, rustic easels for signs, gates, stairways, temporary grand stands, and a new fountain on the parade ground in Pelham Bay Park; painting of Tremper House, bath-houses, music stands, sprinklers, surgeons' tables and cupboards, signs and benches; repairing of music stands, surgeons' tables, stables, comfort stations, fountains, sprinklers, carriages and wagons, and laying of pipe-lines.

Botanical Garden.

At the entrance to the Botanical Garden from Moshulu parkway the abutments are under construction, three abutments having been completed, and the work is progressing satisfactorily.

The work on the two large and four small flights of steps, and two concrete-steel tanks, in the Botanical Garden, is progressing satisfactorily, and will be finished in a short time.

Work on the bridge over the Bronx river, near Newell avenue, has been completed, and final payment has been rendered.

Two comfort stations and tool house near the elevated station entrance to the Botanical Garden have been completed.

Work on the five-arch stone bridge, just north of the Blue Bridge, is progressing satisfactorily. With one exception, the abutments have been completed.

Work on the plant house is rapidly approaching completion.

Zoological Park.

On the ostrich and small mammal house, most of the plumbing and heating pipes are in place, and a large part of the plastering has been finished.

The bird house has been completed up to the height of the roof; the iron trusses are in place; the concrete floors are completed, and the rough plumbing work is finished.

Work on the iron fence around the seal pool is progressing satisfactorily.

Bronx and Pelham Parkway.

The bridge over the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad has been completed, and final payment rendered.

The parkway has been covered with trap-rock screenings from White Plains road to Eastern Boulevard—a distance of two miles.

Pelham Bay Park.

The athletic grounds are nearly completed.

A fine boat-house has been erected, and is nearly completed.

A music pavilion, a shed connected with the Hunter House and a new summer house have been built in the park, and are now in use.

In connection with the laying out of the new athletic grounds, a quarter-mile running track was constructed; abutments 15 feet high for rifle range were built, and 175 cedar posts prepared and placed in position.

Trenches have been dug and water-pipe laid for fountains; roads repaired; lawns repaired and leveled; fields near Morris place plowed, harrowed and planted; ponds drained, cleaned and repaired; parade ground rolled, and grass and weeds cut on 60 acres; also ground prepared for addition to golf links.

Melrose Park.

The iron fence along three sides of this park has been completed, and final payment has been rendered.

Crotona Parkway.

The work of grading, paving and regulating this parkway is progressing favorably. Much of the curb has been laid; also most of the telford, and many of the road basins.

Moshulu Parkway.

On the bridges over the railroad tracks and Webster avenue, one of the abutments at the railroad, and one at Webster avenue, have been completed; and one abutment at the north side of Webster avenue has been started. The work is progressing satisfactorily. Work on the remainder of the improvement of this parkway is also progressing favorably.

McComb's Dam Park.

The filling in of the lowlands in this park is progressing very slowly, owing to a lack of money with which to complete the work. The regular work of marking and repairing tennis and baseball grounds, cultivating trees and shrubs, mowing grass, cleaning walks and paths, sodding and seeding banks, etc., has been carried on. 150 feet of wire fence and 100 feet of drain have been built.

Van Cortlandt Park.

The building of the road connecting with Yonkers has been delayed on account of the lack of available funds.

The work of constructing the alterations to the Tremper House is progressing satisfactorily, and will be completed within a very short time.

The new boat house is also under course of construction. Three-fourths of the foundation walls have been laid and the wall plates have been put on. About one-half the number of canoes on contract have been delivered and are now in use; they are proving immensely popular.

Golf house and comfort stations have been cared for; golf links kept in repair; gutters and roads repaired and kept in good condition; about 3,000 feet of trench for water pipe opened and filled in; sewers on polo field and at skate house repaired; baseball diamonds marked out; 3,600 feet of sod cut and laid on parade ground; 10,000 feet of lawn graded and sown with grass seed, and new tennis court laid out; also hospital tent cared for.

Clarendon Park.

Roads, gutters, tennis courts and baseball grounds have been repaired and lawns kept in good condition.

Horses, carriages and harness have been cared for.

Franz Sigel Park.

The work done in this park and in the small parks and squares in the immediate vicinity consisted of mowing and watering grass, spreading ashes, sand and gravel where necessary, and cleaning walks and gutters.

Washington Bridge Park and Small Park at Jerome Avenue and One Hundred and Seventieth Street.

Trees and shrubs cultivated, grass cut, paths and walks edged, and steps, walks and comfort station cared for.

St. Mary's Park.

Walks repaired and sprinkled; 5,000 feet of sod laid; old road graded and seeded; 18 acres of lawns cleaned and cut; 22,000 feet of gutters cleaned; 45 yards of broken stone hauled from crusher.

Crotona Park.

All roads and washouts repaired; manure removed from the lawns; 500 feet of sewer pipe laid; wall at lily pond rebuilt and embankment of same graded; 200 feet of stone drain repaired; tennis and ball grounds marked; three new tennis courts laid out; path from Prospect to Crotona avenues rebuilt; all gutters and sewers repaired and cleaned; roads, paths and walks sprinkled and rolled, and 100 loads of ashes hauled and spread on paths and walks where needed.

St. James Park.

A basin and culvert has been constructed, and the surrounding section of the park graded; 300 yards of fill carried to the north side of the park; manure removed from lawns; shrubbery cultivated, and paths and roads kept in proper condition.

A wire fence with cedar posts has been erected on the south side of the park. Two grass tennis courts have been rolled, mowed and marked.

Poe Park.

Shrubs and trees have been cultivated; manure removed from the lawns; sections of the park rolled and seeded; 1,500 feet of sod laid; tennis courts marked and kept in repair, and dead trees removed.

University Park.

A wire fence has been built on the north and south sides of the park; shrubs and trees have been cultivated, and manure has been removed from the lawns.

The following small parks and unnamed plots were kept in good condition, manure removed from the lawns, bare spots sodded and a neat appearance maintained:

St. Augustine Park—One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street and Franklin avenue.

Horseshoe Park—Hall place and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street.

Fulton Park—One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and Fulton avenue.

Franklin Square—One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and Franklin avenue.

McKinley Square—Boston road and One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street.

Rosehill Park—Webster and Pelham avenues.

Small park at One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street and Fulton avenue.

In addition to the above, the usual gardening and maintenance work has been carried on in all the parks.

Twenty thousand trees and shrubs were planted in Nursery in Van Cortlandt Park, twelve acres of ground having been cleared, plowed and cultivated for same.

Briers, stumps, etc., were cleared from seventy-five acres, and oats were sown.

Thirty acres of lawn were graded and seeded in Pelham Bay, Crotona and Bronx Parks.

Two thousand five hundred shrubs were planted in the various parks; and the pruning of shrubs and trees in the various parks was finished.

Eighty-one thousand five hundred pansies, geraniums, canna, etc., were planted in the parks and squares.

Twenty-five thousand herbaceous plants were started for fall planting. Water-lilies were set out in the lake in Bronx Park and in the small pool in Crotona Park. Twenty-five tons of rye straw were cut and stacked for bedding. Flower-beds were planted in the various parks and squares, and kept in good condition; trees and shrubs pruned and cultivated; dead trees and shrubs removed, and new ones planted.

OF THE

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES DURING THE WEEK ENDING SEPTEMBER 1, 1904.

The following permits were granted:

August 26. The New York Steam Company—

To construct in accordance with plans submitted, as amended, an addition to boiler house between Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, East river, upon condition that any portion of the structure erected within the lines of the proposed marginal street area will be removed within ten days after receipt of notice.

August 26. Estate of William Beard—

To make general repairs to their water front property in the Borough of Brooklyn, from time to time as may be found necessary, work to be kept within existing lines, and the permit to continue until December 31, 1904, unless sooner revoked.

August 26. Weber-Bunke-Lange Coal Company—

To erect a one-story addition to the southerly end of the existing coal pocket, between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, North river, in accordance with plans submitted, the structure to remain only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

August 26. Weber-Bunke-Lange Coal Company—

To construct an office building on the land in rear of the bulkhead between Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh streets, North river, in accordance with plans submitted, as amended, the structure to revert to and become the property of the City upon the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of the premises.

August 27. Aetna Fishing Club—

To occupy a plot of ground and to maintain house thereon, at Broad Channel, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, until April 30, 1905, unless sooner revoked; rental to be at the rate of \$50 per annum, payable in advance to the Cashier.

August 29. Empire City Subway Company, Limited—

To open asphalt pavement at the approach to Pier 13, North river, for the purpose of laying a telephone connection, the pavement to be properly restored after the completion of the work.

August 29. Old Dominion Steamship Company—

To construct a roof loft in the shed on Pier 26, North river, in accordance with plans submitted, as amended.

August 29. Astoria Veneer Mills—

To construct a sheet pile bulkhead between Blackwell and Kowenoven streets, Bowery Bay, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, in accordance with plans submitted.

August 30. Ferdinand J. Sperling—

To occupy plot of ground and to maintain house thereon, at Shad creek, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, until April 30, 1905, unless sooner revoked; rental to be at the rate of \$30 per annum for the period from May 1, 1904, to April 30, 1905, and at the rate of \$10 per annum for the period from May 1, 1903, to May 1, 1904, payable in advance to the Cashier.

August 30. Cornelius C. Eddy—

To drive spring piles within existing lines alongside the pier at the foot of Thompson street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond.

August 30. New York Telephone Company—

To maintain telephone signs at the Battery landings, to remain only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

August 31. The Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company—

To drive sheet piling fender piles within existing lines for the protection of the existing crib bulkhead at Corlears and Water streets, East river.

August 31. Canarsie Yacht Club—

To move its club-house and to place same on a pile foundation at a point about 102 feet offshore of its present location, at Sands Point, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens, upon condition that the rights of the City as to ownership in the property shall not be affected or impaired by reason of the granting of this permit.

September 1. Jeremiah Skidmore's Sons, Incorporated—

To repair the crib bulkhead between Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth streets, East river, within existing lines.

September 1. Peter Brennan—

To occupy plot of ground and to maintain house thereon, at Broad channel

the rate of \$20 per annum for the period from May 1, 1904, to April 30, 1905, and at the rate of \$7.50 per annum for the period from May 1, 1903, to April 30, 1904.

September 1. Old Dominion Steamship Company—

To maintain platform and canvas awning on the land in rear of bulkhead between Piers 24 and 25, North river, during the pleasure of the Commissioner, at the same rental as heretofore paid—viz.: six cents per square foot per annum.

The permit granted to Joseph May for the maintenance of two floats on the north side of the West Thirty-fifth Street Pier, North river, was revoked August 30, to take effect as of August 31, 1904, in accordance with the recommendation of the Superintendent of Docks, the premises being required for wharfage purposes.

The following claims were ordered collected in accordance with reports of the Engineer-in-Chief on Bureau Orders:

August 26, No. 2562, the sum of \$50 38, cost of repairing leased portion of the East Fifth Street Pier, to be collected from the Hazelwood Ice Company.

August 26, No. 2508, the sum of \$291.76, cost of driving two clusters of piles at floating dump at the southerly end of the Wallabout basin, near the Clinton Avenue Extension, Borough of Brooklyn, to be collected from the Department of Street Cleaning.

August 29, No. 2362, the sum of \$8 82, cost of supervising the taking up and relaying the granite pavement and repairs to water pipe at the foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river, to be collected from the United Electric Light and Power Company.

September 1. No. 2455, the sum of \$756.31, cost of dredging at private property in the vicinity of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets, Harlem river, to be collected from the Bernheimer Estate.

On August 26, 1904, bids were opened for preparing for and building a new deck scow and a new coal scow, under Contract No. 863, but inasmuch as only one bid was received—viz.: from John F. Walsh, Jr., at \$9,700 for deck scow and \$6,900 for coal scow, the bid was rejected and the contract ordered readvertised.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted:

1st. Approving sureties on the estimate of George B. Spearin for widening and extending the West Forty-fourth Street Pier, North river, under Contract No. 865. Contract ordered executed August 26.

2d. Stating that the claim of the Hamburg-American Line for \$3,693.75, covering the cost of dredging in the slips adjoining the West Twenty-fifth Street Pier, North river, has been examined, that the Corporation Counsel advises a settlement, and asking that voucher for the amount be drawn in favor of the claimant. Voucher ordered drawn August 31.

3d. Submitting substitution of the Aetna Indemnity Company, as surety in the place of J. McAllister and T. F. Dooley on the estimate of the Matthew Baird Contracting Company for paving between East One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, Harlem river, under Class I. of Contract No. 866. Substitution approved September 1.

4th. Stating that certificates have been attached to Contract No. 861, for rope, and to Contract No. 865, for extending and widening the West Forty-fourth Street Pier, North river. Filed September 1.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving blank form of Contract No. 867, for Portland cement. Contract ordered advertised August 27.

2d. Approving blank forms of Contract No. 864, for coal; Contract No. 868, for building a third story addition to Pier "A," North river, and to Contract No. 870, for dredging on the North, East and Harlem rivers. Contracts ordered advertised September 1.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, October 15, 1904.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Saturday, October 15, 1904, at 2:30 P. M.

All the Commissioners were present.

The minutes of the meeting held October 12 were approved as read.

A letter was presented from the Chief Examiner, requesting that a new examination be called for eight candidates for the position of Stenographer and Typewriter, whose speed marks in the last examination had been lost.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President to be reported upon at the next meeting.

A letter was presented from the Chief Examiner, requesting that a Shannon filing case be purchased for use in his department.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President.

A letter was presented from the Corporation Counsel, requesting that the examination for promotion from Office Boy to Junior Clerk at a salary of \$480 per annum, held March 26, 1903, be construed to have qualified the candidates for the next higher grade, viz., \$600 per annum; also a letter from the Chief Examiner recommending that the request be allowed.

On motion, the same was granted.

A letter was presented from the Law Department, requesting that the title of Mr. William E. Fay be changed from Clerk to Law Clerk.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Corporation Counsel and inform him that, inasmuch as Mr. Fay had never qualified in an examination for the position of Law Clerk, his request could not be granted.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, October 19, 1904.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Wednesday, October 19, 1904, at 4 P. M.

All the Commissioners were present.

On motion, the minutes of the meeting held October 15 were approved as amended.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Miss Margaret V. O'Neill, residing at No. 150 Guernsey street, Brooklyn, be and hereby is appointed to the position of Telephone Switchboard Operator in the office of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, with compensation at the rate of \$600 per annum, such appointment taking effect October 24, 1904.

The President presented a report from the Chief Examiner with reference to the sheet containing the speed marks of thirteen candidates for the position of Stenographer and Typewriter that was lost in his department.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to request the Chief Examiner and Examiners Upshaw and Oppenheim to appear before the Commission in order that it may have a full explanation of the matter.

A letter was presented from Examiner Conway, with reference to the way in which "efficiency records" of employees were kept in the Bridge Department. The letter stated that he had found upon investigation that such records were being kept strictly in accordance with the provisions of Civil Service Rule 15, paragraphs 7 and 8.

On motion, the letter was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from Examiner Conway, with reference to the way in which the "efficiency records" of employees were being kept in the Department of Street Cleaning. The report stated that he had found upon investigation that the new system had not yet been put into operation in that department for the reason that it was a practical impossibility to apply the same to the uniformed force, which includes all Drivers and Street Sweepers; that the department now has a very good system of keeping records for the uniformed force, somewhat on the plan of that followed in the Police and Fire Departments. Examiner Conway further stated that the new system is to be put in operation at once for the clerical force, but recommended that so far as it applies to the uniformed force, the system used at present be continued, and that the Examining Board prepare a rating schedule for such force on the lines followed in regard to the Police and Fire Departments.

On motion, the recommendation of Examiner Conway was approved.

A report was presented from Mr. J. P. Conway, Acting Chief Examiner, showing the number of examinations held during the month of September, also the number of candidates examined.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Chief Examiner and request that in future such reports set forth the titles of the positions for which examinations are held as well as the number of applicants.

The Secretary presented a report of the Board of Examiners for Non-competitive positions in the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys, dated October 14, together with the recommendation of the Chief Examiner that the same be approved.

If a Laborer has been removed for cause and the dismissal has been reviewed by the same appointing officer, within what period of time shall the appointing officer be allowed to rescind his action where a preferred eligible list exists for the position of Laborer?

On motion, the matter was laid over.

The Secretary presented a report from Clerk Woodward, stating that the application of Miss Emily M. Stein, candidate for Stenographer and Typewriter, had been mislaid or lost after its receipt by him that the candidate had been regularly notified for the examination and had succeeded in passing the same; that when the compiling of the eligible list was begun the loss was discovered; and requesting that he be authorized to receive and file a duplicate of the said application.

The Committee on Procedure and Charter Amendments presented the following report:

"Your Committee, to which was referred proposed amendment (a) of the Charter provisions under which the Commission acts, and (b) of law or procedure so as to establish by rule the actual practice of successive Mayors in referring to the Commission matters left to the Mayor's discretion, submits this its report:

"As to amendment of the Charter, your Committee has considered not merely Commissioner Marshall's suggestion, specially referred to it, but the whole subject; and though noting respects in which the act might probably have been originally bettered, and others which the Commission's experience suggests, recommends:

"That the subject of Charter amendment be not now taken up by the Commission, but postponed at least until after the new year.

"As to the other branch of the reference to it, your Committee finds: As suggested by Mayor Low, approved by his successor, Mayor McClellan, and in accord with the practice of both, it has been assumed that the Commission would be regularly called upon to act upon the more important classes of matters, as to which the Mayor was given discretion by the act. As they approached the stage at which reference would be most naturally had, the Mayor has been advised of the pendency of such public works as from former references it might be expected would be submitted to the Commission, until the Mayor's action has so far settled precedent that (except to some minimum of importance below which such reference may ordinarily not be expected) the class of those to be submitted is fairly well defined.

"In practice, however, conditions are such that only good fortune, the vigilance of our Assistant Secretary and the constant tact of the Mayor have avoided serious complications and inconsistency—which would be ruinous to the usefulness of the Commission and proper respect for its function by officials, designers and contractors.

"A working routine should obviously be devised as soon as practicable. Your Committee believes that sufficient precedent has already been established to form a basis for such a routine, and that it would facilitate the Commission's work and usefulness if a comparatively simple one were now adopted—to be later developed, as experience may suggest.

"The importance of the subject may be suggested by the last list transmitted to the Mayor:

—every item of which has been since referred to us by the Mayor.

"The Commission being familiar with most of the conditions involved, your Committee, without further explanation, recommends that it be suggested to His Honor the Mayor, to adopt and file with the Commission, regulations somewhat as follows:

"Sec. (1). The Art Commission is hereby requested to consider and act in approval or disapproval upon the design, including the proposed location, of each Municipal building, gate, bridge, fence, lamp or other structure, to be erected upon land belonging to the City, and hereafter to be erected or contracted for, of cost to exceed \$5,000.

"Sec. (2). As to other matters which by section 637 of the Charter, the Mayor might refer to the Commission—including those of classes referred to in (1) foregoing, but costing less than \$5,000 each—the Commission will be expected to act only in response to the Mayor's request, made either upon his own initiative or by his approval of such suggestions as the Commission may at any time make.

"Sec. (3). As to any matter as to which, under the Charter, the Mayor is empowered to request the Art Commission to act; any party interested may submit such matter to the Art Commission, with a statement of any special need for prompt action thereon; in which case the work in question may be proceeded with unless the Commission shall act thereon within sixty days from the date of such submission—or within such shorter time as, in view of urgency, the Mayor may prescribe.

"Should the Mayor make such regulations, on a copy thereof being filed in the Comptroller's office, the working of the system would become automatic; since no payment would then be authorized for any such work unless the regulations had been complied with; and no contractor would proceed until this had been done. All embarrassment, however, would be avoided by thus leaving any contractor, head of department, or other party interested, free—by simply filing with the Commission any matter as to which reference to the Commission was likely to be made by the Mayor—hereafter to proceed with the work in case such reference and action thereon was not had within sixty days or any shorter time prescribed by the Mayor.

"Sections (1) and (2) would define and simplify routine as to matters now likely to be submitted, but in other cases would add nothing to present requirements. Section (3) above simply provides a means by which any one, who wishes to be relieved of the uncertainties of present practice, may do so.

"While the Committee is unanimous upon the principle involved above, the figure \$5,000 has been inserted in (1) as a 'for-example' suggested by a majority of the Committee.

"Your Committee has appreciated that it might well confer with the Mayor in this regard, but has thought it best, before so doing, to report to the Commission for its suggestion or instruction.

"All of which is respectfully submitted."

The report was received and ordered placed on file.

Pending discussion, the Committee withdrew any recommendation as to minimum amount in Sections (1) and (2) of its report.

On motion the part relating to subject (b) thereof—amendment of law or procedure so as to establish by rule the actual practice of successive Mayors in referring to the Art Commission matters left to the Mayor's discretion—was referred back to the Committee with approval of the principles stated in Sections (1), (2) and (3) and for further report after conference with the Mayor.

Mr. Michael J. Rickard, Acting Superintendent, reported as follows:
