Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending March 31, 1907.

Battery Wall, North River.

The existing platforms at this locality and the steamboat landing have been maintained during the quarter.

Boat Landing Pier "A," North River.

The boat landing has been maintained during the quarter and the float inside the landing has been repaired from time to time as needed.

Rector Street Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under authorization of the Commissioner of Docks of the 16th of December, 1903, and is at the cost and expense of the owners of the property to be improved. The bulkhead wall proper was completed during a prior quarter, earth filling being deposited in rear of the wall between Piers 6 and 7. A contract has been awarded, No. 1026, for laying a temporary granite pavement upon a sand foundation on a portion of the newly made land easterly of the bulkhead wall at this section. Work was started on the contract, but was suspended on account of the weather, and it is expected that work will shortly be resumed.

Liberty Street, North River.

The Central Railroad of New Jersey is erecting extensive bulkhead sheds in the vicinity of Liberty street and is making preparations for the building of a new ferry house in that location under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Pier (New) 21, North River.

The work of extending this pier out to the new pierhead line by the force of the department for the Erie Railroad Company has been completed during the quarter, and 424 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done.

Chelsea Section, North River.

On the 28th of December, 1900, the Board of Docks authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets, North River. Large property interests in this vicinity have in the past been acquired and extensive work done in the construction of the wall. The wall is now practically completed for the entire length of the section. The piers along this section from Pier 54 to the pier foot of Twenty-second street have all been built, and a contract is in course of preparation for the erection of freight sheds over some of these piers. A contract has also been prepared for paving the marginal street area along the bulkhead wall at this section.

Pier at Fortieth Street, North River.

The approach along the northerly side of this pier has been widened by the construction of a platform by the force of the department.

West Forty-second Street Section, North River.

By an order from the Engineer-in-Chief, dated 14th of November, 1905, the sections originally known as "West Forty-second Street Section," "West Forty-second Street Section Extended" and "West Forty-third Street Section" were consolidated, and now known as the "West Forty-second Street Section." The wall was practically completed, with the exception of the coping for all the portion except that extending across the foot of West Forty-second street, during a previous quarter. During the present quarter earth filling has been deposited in rear of the wall between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, and at West Forty-third street the deck of the temporary approach was torn up and a temporary extension to the approach and a temporary approach to the pier were constructed.

West Fifty-fifth Street, North River.

An extension is being constructed to the pier at this street by the force of the department.

Forty-seventh Street, North River.

In this locality a new incinerator was constructed and installed by the Department of Street Cleaning under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries. The work was finished on the 29th of January, 1907.

Fifty-seventh Street, North River.

The work of building department storehouse and offices at this locality is in progress under Contract No. 987.

Between Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eighth Streets, North River.

It having been provided by the Board of Armory Commissioners that a pier should be constructed in this vicinity, the force of the department has been engaged in building a pier 325 by 25 feet between these two streets.

Claremont Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under resolution of the Board of Docks, passed November 16, 1900. During the present quarter work on the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress, and cobble and rip-rap have been deposited on the wall area and in rear of same.

Between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirty-second Streets, North River.

The marginal street area at this locality is being graded and prepared for laying granite pavement.

Between Spuyten Duyvil and Mount St. Vincent.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company is widening the present railroad embankment between these two points, and rip-rap is being deposited along the line of the widening under permit from this department.

Marginal Street, North River.

A Contract No. 993 was awarded during a prior quarter for repairing the asphalt pavement on the North and East rivers, and work has been in progress during the past quarter. Repairs have also been made where necessary to the asphalt pavement already laid by the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company under their bonds to maintain the pavement in good condition.

Whitehall Terminal, East River.

The work of constructing a new ferry terminal at this point for a municipal ferry to Staten Island is in progress. Also the work of removing old piers and ferry structures between Whitehall and Broad streets.

Broad Street Section, East River.

Work at this section, which was done under resolution of the Board of Docks, passed December 22, 1899, was completed a few years ago as far as could be done until possession of the inner end of Pier (new) 7 was obtained. During a previous quarter work was resumed at this portion of the section and the wall proper has been built across the inner end of Pier (new) 7 and to the northerly thereof. Granite has been set in the wall, and earth filling deposited in rear of that portion of the wall built. A granite block pavement has been placed in rear of Pier 7 and between Piers 6 and 7.

Pier (New) 7, East River.

The work of widening and extending this pier by the force of the department has been in progress during the quarter.

Old Slip Section, East River.

The Commissioner of Docks, on the 7th of December, 1904, issued the necessary authorization for the construction of the bulkhead wall from the northerly side of Pier (new) 7, where it joins the Broad Street Section, to the northerly side of Burling Slip, East river. This stretch of wall is divided into two sections—the Old Slip Section and the Maiden Lane Section.

The Old Slip Section extends from the northerly or upper end of the Broad Street Section and runs along the established bulkhead line to a point opposite the southerly line of Wall street. During the past quarter the work of constructing the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress, and 343.74 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made. The wall is practically completed between Piers (new) 7 and 8, 9 and 10, and in rear of Piers 8, 9, 10 and 11. This section embraces Piers 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12. Piers 8, 10 and 11 were completed during a prior quarter. Pier 12 was built in 1901 and Pier 9 was finished during the present quarter.

Pier 8, East River.

A freight and passenger shed was constructed on this pier by the Compagnia Transatlantica, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Pier (New) 9, East River.

The construction of this pier was done under Contract No. 968 and was completed on the 16th of March, 1907. The work of erecting a steel freight and passenger shed on this pier has been in progress during the quarter by the Munson Steamship Company, under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Maiden Lane Section, East River.

By authorization of the Commissioner of Docks, dated 7th of December, 1904, the construction of the bulkhead wall along this street of the waterfront has been ordered. The work extends from the southerly line of Wall street, where it joins the Old Slip Section, to about the southerly line of Burling Slip, East river. Work on the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress from time to time until the entire section has been completed. Earth filling has been placed in rear of a portion of the wall built, and granite block pavement laid between Piers 15 and 16. This section embraces Piers 13, 14 and 15. Piers 14 and 15 were built in 1905, and Pier 13 in 1906.

Between Pier (New) 13 and Wall Street Ferry, East River.

A platform on piles was constructed and a steel frame shed erected thereon by the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Fulton Section, East River.

This section of the bulkhead wall was authorized by the Board of Docks on the 26th of April, 1901. This resolution was amended by action of the Commissioner of Docks of the 7th of December, 1904. No work has been done on the bulkhead wall proper during the quarter, but a granite block pavement has been laid between Piers 15 and 16. This section embraces Piers 16, 17 and 18. Pier (new) 16 was built in 1901, Pier (new) 17 was built in 1905 and Pier (new) 18 in 1906.

Pier (New) 17, East River.

An extension for a boiler and engine house has been erected along the easterly side of this pier by the Fulton Market Fish Mongers' Association under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries, and a boiler house erected thereon.

Between Piers 17 and 18, East River.

A steel building has been constructed on bulkhead platform between these piers and partly on said piers by the Fulton Market Fishmongers' Association under permit from this Department.

Catharine Section, East River.

This section of the bulkhead wall is being constructed under resolution of the Board of Docks of the 24th of February, 1899. Earth filling has been placed in rear of the wall during the quarter.

Market Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is the resolution of the Board of Docks passed February 23, 1900. No work has been done on the bulkhead wall proper during the quarter, the wall being finished practically for the entire length of the section. Earth filling has been placed in rear of the wall built.

Pier 28, East River.

A shed is being constructed on this pier by the Joy Steamship Company, and the work is still in progress.

Nineteenth Street, East River.

The construction of a new pier, under the new plan, at the foot of this street has been in progress during the quarter under Bureau Order 3562.

Twenty-first Street, East River.

A dumping board with appurtenances which occupied a portion of the pier at this street was removed from the inner southerly side by the New York Contracting and Trucking Company under order from this Department.

Twenty-second Street, East River.

The construction of a freight shed on the pier at this street is in progress by the New England Navigation Company under permit from this Department.

Twenty-sixth Street, East River.

A permit having been granted to the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals to construct a refrigerating plant to be used in connection with the Morgue, the work has been finished during the quarter.

*New Bellevue Section, East River.

The officials of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals being desirous of extending the grounds of the Bellevue Hospital, between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth streets, East river, by reason of the extensive improvements proposed to the hospital buildings in that locality, the bulkhead wall is being built along the new bulkhead line as modified by the Secretary of War September 16, 1903, with the further modification extending the bulkhead line across the foot of Twenty-ninth street and back to the established line of 1890 at the northerly side of Twenty-ninth street. Work on this section of the bulkhead wall has been in progress during the quarter under Bureau Order 5981, action of Commissioner February 6, 1907, which supersedes Bureau Order 1859.

Between Forty-fifth and Forty-sixth Streets, East River.

A pile platform has been constructed between these streets by the Schwarzschild & Sulzberger Company under permit from this Department.

Fifty-ninth Street, East River.

A trestle and derrick have been erected in this locality for use in the construction of the Blackwell's Island Bridge by the Pennsylvania Steel Company, under permit from this Department.

Yorkville Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is action of the Commissioner of Docks of October 10, 1904, Bureau Order 2757. During the quarter no work has been done on the

bulkhead wall proper. A contract, No. 1046, has been awarded for the excavation and removal of rock over the site of a proposed bulkhead wall and outshore from same between East Sixty-fifth and East Seventy-fourth streets, East river.

Blackwell Section, East River.

By action of the Commissioner of October 10, 1904, Bureau Order 2756, the work of improving the water-front, which was being done under resolution of the Board of Docks for the East Seventy-fourth, East Seventy-fifth and East Seventy-seventh Street Sections, was consolidated in a new section, established as Blackwell Section, beginning at the southerly line of East Seventy-fourth street and extending to the northerly line of East Eighty-first street, a distance of 1,958.03 feet. A portion of the section in the neighborhood of East Seventy-fourth street and East Seventy-fifth street was practically completed for quite a strip of wall during a previous quarter, and work was suspended until the work in the other sections made a joint with it. During the past quarter work on the section has been in progress.

Seventieth Street, East River.

An extension to the landing at the foot of this street was built for the Department of Public Charities.

Between Nintieth and Ninety-first Streets, East River.

A timber basin has been established at this locality and during the quarter old material has been rafted and cared for.

Streets, Harlem River.

The work of constructing a crib bulkhead along the bulkhead line at this locality by the H. Herman Lumber Company has been in progress during the quarter.

Riker's Island, East River.

The work of building a dry stone wall on top of the existing stone embankment on the easterly side of Riker's Island has been in progress during the quarter under Contract No. 963, a total of 7,069 linear feet of wall having been built to date.

North Brother Island, East River.

A contract, No. 1036, has been awarded for building a concrete sea wall and platform on piles at the easterly side of North Brother Island and work has been in progress during the quarter. A total of 4,255 cubic yards of stone has been deposited under this contract.

Academy Street, Sherman's Creek, Harlem River.

Intake and discharge pipes are being laid and a bulkhead wall and foundation built at this locality by Henry J. Hammonds, under permit from this Department. Work was begun January 8, 1907, and is in progress.

North of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth Street, Harlem River.

Bulkheads, etc., are being built at this locality by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun September 1, 1905, and is in progress.

Between One Hundred and Fiftieth and One Hundred and Fifty-first Streets, Harlem River.

The dock at this locality has been repaired, the old tower removed and a new mast and hoisting apparatus has been installed by M. D. Williamson Company under permit from this Department. Begun October 15, 1906, and finished January 8, 1907.

Between One Hundred and Eighty-ninth and One Hundred and Ninety-second Streets, Harlem River.

The Kingsbridge Real Estate Company are building a crib bulkhead at this locality under permit from this Department. Work was begun January 29, 1905, and is now suspended.

Morris Heights, Harlem River.

A rubble wall has been built and sheathed with piles and filling deposited behind the same by the Gas Engine and Power Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun in January, 1902, and finished January 15, 1907.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, Mott Haven Canal.

A coal pocket is being erected at this locality by H. W. Tinsley under permit from this Department. Work was begun August 15, 1906, and is in progress.

North of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street.

A coal pocket is being erected at this locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun March 15, 1907, and is in progress.

One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-ninth Streets, East River. A power house has been built and a concrete bulkhead wall is being constructed at this locality by the New York Central Railroad Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun June 1, 1904, and is in progress.

One Hundred and Fiftieth Street, Oak Point, East River.

A crib bulkhead has been built and filling placed in rear of same at this locality by the Rock Plaster Company of New Jersey under permit from this Department. Work was begun August 15, 1905, and finished March 1, 1907.

Between Dupont and Tiffany Streets, Long Island Sound.

Four piers and bulkheads are being built at this locality by the Oak Point Land and Dock Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun May 17, 1906, and is in progress.

Eastchester Creek.

Filling has been deposited 800 feet each side of the centre draw at this locality under permit from this Department by the Harlem and Portchester Railroad Company. Begun May 23, 1904, and finished about February 15, 1907.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, South Brooklyn.

On the 1st of November, 1906, the City secured possession of the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry to South Brooklyn, and has been operating that ferry as a municipal ferry since that date. The old boats are still being used on the ferry until the completion of the contract awarded to the Harlan & Hollingsworth Corporation of Wilmington, Del., on August 27, 1906, for the construction of three new steel screw propelling ferryboats, each with two 2-cylinder compound engines. Work on these ferryboats is being pushed, and one of the boats is about ready to be launched. Further description of this ferry will be found under the heading of the New Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, Brooklyn, later in the report.

Whale Creek, Brooklyn.

In that section of the Borough of Brooklyn adjacent to Newtown creek, near Greenpoint avenue, proceedings have been instituted to acquire the necessary property to secure pier room which existed only on Whale creek, an arm of Newtown creek. Near the mouth of Whale creek the property to be acquired will not only enable the City to build over 1,000 feet of bulkhead, but also two piers. Plans and specifications for this concrete sea wall and one pier with an improved modern concrete reinforced deck, were prepared during a prior quarter, but as yet nothing has been done towards the improvement of this part of the waterfront.

Between Twenty-eighth and Sixty-fourth Streets, South Brooklyn.

A plan has been submitted and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, establishing new lines for bulkheads and piers, with marginal street, wharf or place, extending from Twenty-eighth to Sixty-fourth street, South Brooklyn. Plans and studies are in progress for the dock improvement of this waterfront in the future.

Between Sixty-third and Sixty-fourth Streets, South Brooklyn.

The Long Island Railroad Company is constructing piers and bulkheads at this locality, in accordance with permit from this Department. Work was begun June 11, 1906, and is in progress.

Between Forty-third and Fifty-first Streets, Brooklyn.

Five piers and sheds thereon are being constructed at this locality by the Bush Terminal Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun April 5, 1902, and is in progress.

Jay Street, Brooklyn.

Pier (new) 3 has been constructed at this locality by the Jay Street Terminal Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun November 1, 1906, and finished March 28, 1907.

Bay Forty-sixth-Bay Forty-seventh Streets, Gravesend Bay.

Two small piers and a pile bulkhead are being built at this locality by Eugene J. & Sidney Grant, under permit from this Department. Work was begun August 1, 1906, and is in progress.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Brooklyn has been supervised, and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Powell's Cove, Whitestone Landing.

A small dock and approach are being built at the east side of the Nostrand property at this locality by the Malba Land Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun December 3, 1906, and is in progress.

Lawrence Point.

The Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company are constructing crib piers, bulkheads, slips and coal handling tower at this locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun October 1, 1903, and is in progress.

Hunter's Point and Anable Avenue, Newtown Creek.

A crib bulkhead is being constructed at this locality by the Degnon Realty and Terminal Improvement Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun December 16, 1906, and is in progress.

Hunter's Point Avenue and Nott Avenue, Newtown Creek.

A crib bulkhead is being constructed at this locality by the Degnon Realty and Terminal Improvement Company, under permit from this Department. Work was begun March 20, 1906, and is in progress.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Queens has been supervised, and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Canal Street, Stapleton.

The work of constructing a new pier at the foot of this street, to be used in connection with the Stapleton terminal of the Staten Island Ferry, has been in progress during the quarter, under Contract No. 1002.

The work of removing the old structures between Water and Canal streets, Stapleton, and building new ferry house for the Stapleton terminal, has been in progress during the quarter under Contract No. 1023.

A number of pieces of work have been done in the Borough of Richmond by private parties, and supervised by the Department of Docks and Ferries. A five-story reinforced concrete building is being erected on the easterly side of Franklin avenue, on the Kill von Kull side, Borough of Richmond, by J. B. King & Co. A pier and extension thereof out to the pierhead line are being constructed by Henry DuBois Sons Company at Mariner's Harbor. A pier has been constructed about 65 feet easterly of the foot of Henry street, Tottenville, or Arthur Kills, by Harry Cossey. Two piers and a slip are being built at the foot of Western avenue, Howland's Hook, by Procter & Gamble.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Richmond has been supervised, and a general supervision of the waterfront made.

Pavement on Marginal Street, North and East Rivers.

The asphalt pavement has been repaired at various places along the North and East rivers, where necessary to repair pavement already laid, and the work under Contract No. 993 for the repairing of the wearing surface and binder and concrete foundations for the asphalt pavement along the North and East rivers has been in progress.

Pavement on East River.

Pavement has been repaired along the East river waterfront as required.

Pile Basin, Sherman's Creek.

The pile basin at Sherman's creek, on the Harlem river, has been maintained and cared for.

Timber Basin, Seventy-fifth Street, North River.

At the timber basin, timber has been received under department orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required. The timber basin has been maintained and cared for.

Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh and East Twenty-fourth Streets.

At the Department yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition. The work of constructing Department storehouse and offices at West Fifty-seventh street yard has been in progress during the quarter under Contract No. 987 and same will shortly be completed.

Floating Property.

All the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and repaired where necessary. Work under Class 4 of Contract No. 907 for building derrick has been in progress.

Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised whether done by the Department or by private parties.

Surveying Party.

All the necessary lines, levels, soundings, surveys, grades and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to, and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anemometer and weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the water fronts of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress.

New Staten Island Ferry.

The operation of this ferry by the City was begun on the 25th of October, 1905. Contracts were awarded during a previous quarter for the construction of the necessary ferry terminals at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, and at St. George, Staten Island, and the work has been in progress during the quarter. A contract having been awarded for constructing a new ferry terminal for the Staten Island ferry at Stapleton, Staten Island, work has been in progress during the quarter. A contract having been awarded for constructing a new pier at Canal street, Stapleton, Staten Island, to be used in connection with the new ferry terminal at Stapleton, work under the contract has been in progress during the quarter.

New Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, South Brooklyn.

On the 1st of November, 1906, the City secured possession of the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry to South Brooklyn, and has been operating that ferry as a Municipal ferry since that date. A contract has been awarded for removing the old piers and ferry structures between Whitehall and Broad streets, Borough of Manhattan, and for building new ferry structures for the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry Terminal, and work has been in progress during the quarter. A contract has been awarded for removing the old structures between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, and for building new ferry structures for the new Thirty-ninth Street Ferry Terminal and work has been in progress. Plans for the improvement of the water front in the vicinity of South Brooklyn have been prepared and are under consideration.

New Ferryboats for the New Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, South Brooklyn.

A contract having been prepared during a prior quarter for constructing three steel screw propelling ferryboats with two 2-cylinder compound engines each for use on the new Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, South Brooklyn, which was municipalized on the 1st of November, 1906, work under contract has been in progress during the quarter.

Draughtsmen.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water front,

plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounts to 1,736.74 linear feet, wharfage room destroyed by the City in making way for new improvements amounted to 150 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 45,183 square feet.

The total increase in wharfage room made by private parties under permit from this Department is 1,916 linear feet.

That on the 2d day of April, 1907, this petitioner, by a vote of two-thirds of its directors, at a meeting of the Board of Directors, regularly held pursuant to due notice, changed and altered the route of that part of its main line situate, lying and being between the Harlem river and the northern boundary line of The City of New York, and changed its southern terminus from a point at or near the intersection of Southern Boulevard and Willis avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, to a point at or near the intersection of One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Willis avenue, to a point on the Harlem river at or near the point where Alexander avenue extended intersects the north bank of the Harlem river; and also changed and altered the route of its branch line from its connection with its main line near Adams street and Morris Park avenue to Clason's Point, in said County; and also adopted a map and profile of the whole of its route as thus amended, and authorized its President to file said map and profile of said route, duly certified by the President, Secretary, Chief Engineer and at least two-thirds of the directors, which map and profile are entitled "Survey, map and profile of the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company for New York County, New York, Sections I., II. and III., respectively;" and thereafter, on the 4th day of April, 1907, the said map and profile of the said route as amended and adopted for the entire route of your petitioner in the County of New York was by your petitioner filed in the office of the County Clerk of the County of New York, and thereupon the route of your petitioner's road became and was lawfully amended in conformity with the said map and profile as filed. That said amended route became and now is the lawful route of this petitioner located in all respects in conformity with law.

That the description of said route as thus amended and of the streets in The City of New York and in the Borough of The Bronx which will be crossed or intersected by said railroad is as follows:

Beginning at a point on the Harlem river near the point where Alexander avenue, extended, intersects the north bank of the Harlem river, in the Borough of The Bronx, and running thence northerly and easterly, crossing One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Southern Boulevard, between Alexander avenue and Willis avenue; thence between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and Southern Boulevard, crossing Willis avenue and Brown place to Brook avenue; thence crossing Brook avenue, and thence crossing the Southern Boulevard, between St. Ann's avenue and Brown place; thence crossing St. Ann's avenue, between Southern Boulevard and East One Hundred and Thirty-second street; thence easterly and northeasterly, between Southern Boulevard and One Hundred and Thirty-second street to Cypress avenue; thence crossing Cypress avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Southern Boulevard; thence between Cypress avenue and Willow avenue to One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence crossing Willow avenue and Southern Boulevard, crossing One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, to Willow avenue; thence crossing Willow avenue and crossing One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street at or near its intersection with Willow avenue, to One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street; thence crossing One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street and One Hundred and Fortieth street, between Southern Boulevard and the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, to One Hundred and Forty-first street; thence crossing One Hundred and Forty-first street, and thence crossing and along Southern Boulevard and Whitlock avenue, at or near their junction between One Hundred and Forty-first street and One Hundred and Forty-second street; thence crossing St. Joseph's street, between Whitlock avenue and Austin place; thence crossing One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Austin place and Whitlock avenue, to Timpon place; thence between Whitlock avenue and Southern Boulevard, and crossing Timpon place, Leggett avenue, East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Craven street, Longwood avenue, Lafayette avenue, Tiffany street, Barretto street, Hunt's Point road, Hoe street, Faile street, Bryan street, Longfellow street, Aldus street, Whittier street, to Guttenberg street; thence between Whitlock avenue and Longfellow street, crossing Guttenberg street and Westchester avenue to and crossing Home street; thence crossing Freeman street, Boone street, Edgewater road, West Farms road and Jennings street; thence crossing East One Hundred and Seventy-second street, East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, between West Farms road and Boone

street; thence along and across Boone street to One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street; thence, between West Farms road and Longfellow street, crossing One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street and Rodman place to West Farms road; thence along and across West Farms road to and across East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, or Tremont avenue; thence to and across Bronx street to the Bronx river; thence crossing East One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street and Lebanon street, between Bronx Park avenue and Bronx river; thence along and across East One Hundred and Eightieth street and Bronx Park avenue, at or near their intersection; thence to and across the northerly branch of West Farms road, or Adams street, between Morris Park avenue and the easterly line of Bronx Park; thence to and across Unionport road, between Mianna street and Burchall avenue; thence crossing Oakley street, between Mianna and Sagamore streets; thence crossing White Plains road, at or near the intersection of Sagamore street; thence crossing Brown avenue and Sagamore street, at or near their intersection; thence crossing Hunt avenue and Bear Swamp road, at or near their intersection; thence crossing Lincoln street, Jefferson street, Madison street and Bear Swamp road—Bronxdale avenue—or any extension thereof, and crossing Bronx and Pelham parkway and Williamsbridge road, at or near their intersection; thence crossing Saw Mill lane, between Williamsbridge road and Eastchester road; thence crossing Eastchester road near its intersection with Syracuse avenue; thence crossing Cedar street, Oak street and Walnut street, between Kingston avenue and Syracuse avenue; thence crossing Chestnut street, at or near its intersection with Kingston avenue; thence crossing Kingston avenue, at or near its intersection with Chestnut street; thence crossing Ash street; thence Boston road, and running approximately parallel with Boston road and crossing Schieffelin's lane, Fifth avenue, or Dyer avenue, and continuing to a point in the northerly line of The City of New York near Dyer avenue and between the road to White Plains and Fifth avenue.

Branch Line.

Beginning at a point on the main line near Adams street and Morris Park avenue; thence running substantially parallel with Morris Park avenue and crossing Adams street, East One Hundred and Eightieth street, Lebanon street and West Farms road, One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street and Wyatt street, between Berrian avenue and Morris Park avenue; thence crossing One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, near Berrian avenue, crossing Apley avenue, the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad; thence crossing Bronx River avenue at or near its intersection with Craighill avenue; thence substantially parallel with Craighill avenue and between Craighill and Chanute avenues, as proposed in City layout of streets, crossing Westchester avenue and proposed streets to a point at or near the intersection of Craighill avenue and Lafayette avenue, as proposed in City layout of streets; thence crossing proposed streets to a point at the intersection of Leland avenue and O'Brien avenue, as shown on City layout; thence parallel to proposed Leland avenue to proposed Gildersleeve avenue; thence on a curve crossing Clason's Point road and proposed streets to a point near intersection of proposed Gildersleeve avenue and Hudson avenue; thence parallel to said proposed Hudson avenue to Barrett's creek, being the route shown on map entitled "Survey, Map and Profile of the New York and Port Chester Railroad for New York County, New York, Sections I., II. and III.," adopted by the Board of Directors of said company on the 2d day of April, 1907, and signed by Marsden J. Perry, President, and Mace Moulton, Chief Engineer, and Carleton Bunce, Secretary, under seal, and adopted by two-thirds of all the directors of the company, and which map and profiles were filed in the office of the County Clerk of the City and County of New York on the 4th day of April, 1907, or any lawful amendment thereof which may be consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority.

The following descriptions show in parallel columns the original route and the amended route, the portions of the route which are coincident being common to both columns:

Brown place to Brook avenue; thence crossing Brook avenue, and thence crossing the Southern Boulevard, between St. Ann's avenue and Brown's place; thence crossing St. Ann's avenue, between Southern Boulevard and East One Hundred and Thirty-second street; thence easterly and northeasterly between Southern Boulevard and One Hundred and Thirty-second street, to Cypress avenue; thence crossing Cypress avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-second street and Southern Boulevard; thence between Cypress avenue and Willow avenue to One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street; thence crossing One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street to One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street; thence between Willow avenue and Southern Boulevard, crossing One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street to Willow avenue; thence crossing Willow avenue and crossing One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, at or near its intersection with Willow avenue, to One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street; thence crossing One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street and One Hundred and Fortieth street, between Southern Boulevard and the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad to One Hundred and Forty-first street; thence crossing One Hundred and Forty-first street, and thence crossing and along Southern Boulevard and Whitlock avenue at or near their junction between One Hundred and Forty-first street and One Hundred and Forty-second street; thence crossing St. Joseph's street, between Whitlock avenue and Austin place; thence crossing One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Austin place and Whitlock avenue, to Austin place; thence crossing Austin place and Whitlock avenue and Timpon place to Timpon place; thence between Whitlock avenue and Southern Boulevard, and crossing Timpon place, Leggett avenue, East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Craven street, Longwood avenue, Lafayette avenue, Tiffany street, Barretto street, Hunt's Point road, Hoe street, Faile street, Bryan street, Longfellow street, Aldus street, Whittier street to Guttenberg street; thence between Whitlock avenue and Longfellow street, crossing Guttenberg street and Westchester avenue to and crossing Home street; thence crossing Freeman street, Bone street, Edgewater road, West Farms road and Jennings street; thence crossing East One Hundred and Seventy-second street, East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, between West Farms road and Boone street; thence along and across Boone street to One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street; thence between West Farms road and Longfellow street, crossing One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street and Rodman place to West Farms road; thence along and across West Farms road to and across East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street or Tremont avenue; thence to and across Bronx street to the Bronx river; thence crossing East One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street and Lebanon street, between Bronx Park avenue and Bronx river; thence along and across East One Hundred and Eightieth street and Bronx Park avenue at or near their intersection; thence to and across the northerly branch of West Farms road or Adams street, between Morris Park avenue and the easterly line of Bronx Park;

thence to and across Unionport road, an unnamed street or another branch of Unionport road, Victor street, Washington street or White Plains road, Louise street, Lincoln street, Jefferson street, Madison street and Bear Swamp road or Bronxdale avenue to Williamsbridge road; thence crossing Williamsbridge road, approximately 2,400 feet southeast of Bronx and Pelham parkway, to Bronx and Pelham parkway; thence crossing Bronx and Pelham parkway, approximately 2,100 feet east of its intersection with Williamsbridge road, and running thence northerly between Williamsbridge road and Eastchester road to Saw Mill lane; thence crossing Saw Mill lane near its intersection with Eastchester road; thence crossing Eastchester road or Corsa lane, between Boston Post road and Saw Mill lane;

thence crossing Boston Post road near its intersection with Schieffelin's lane to Schieffelin's lane; thence crossing Schieffelin's lane near its easterly intersection with Boston Post road; thence northerly to the City line.

Branch Line.

Beginning at a point at or near the southeast corner of Bronx Park, in the Borough of The Bronx; thence across or along Bronx Park avenue, East One Hundred and Eightieth street, East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, Lebanon street, Morris Park avenue, at or near its intersection with West Farms road; thence across or along West Farms road, at or near its intersection with Morris Park avenue; thence across the Southern turnpike or Westchester avenue, at or near its intersection with Clason's Point road; thence across Clason's Point road near its intersection with Southern turnpike or Westchester avenue, being the route shown on a map entitled "Map and profile of branch line extending from main line (Bronx Park) to Clason's Point, New York City."

thence to and across Unionport road, between Mianna street and Burchall avenue; thence crossing Oakley street, between Mianna and Sagamore streets; thence crossing White Plains road at or near the intersection of Sagamore street; thence crossing Brown avenue and Sagamore street at or near their intersection; thence crossing Hunt avenue and Bear Swamp road at or near their intersection; thence crossing Lincoln street, Jefferson street, Madison street, Bear Swamp road and Bronxdale avenue, or any extension thereof, and crossing Bronx and Pelham parkway and Williamsbridge road at or near their intersection; thence crossing Saw Mill lane, between Williamsbridge road and Eastchester road; thence crossing Eastchester road near its intersection with Syracuse avenue; thence crossing Cedar street, Oak street and Walnut street, between Kingston avenue and Syracuse avenue; thence crossing Chestnut street at or near its intersection with Kingston avenue; thence crossing Kingston avenue at or near its intersection with Chestnut street; thence crossing Ash street;

thence crossing Boston road and running approximately parallel with Boston road and crossing Schieffelin's lane, Fifth avenue or Dyer avenue, and continuing to a point in the northerly line of The City of New York near Dyer avenue, and between the White Plains road and Fifth avenue.

Branch Line.

Beginning at a point on the main line near Adams street and Morris Park avenue; thence running substantially parallel with Morris Park avenue and crossing Adams street, East One Hundred and Eightieth street, Lebanon street and West Farms road; One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street and Wyatt street, between Berrian avenue and Morris Park avenue; thence crossing One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street near Berrian avenue, crossing Apley avenue, the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad; thence crossing Bronx River avenue at or near its intersection with Craighill avenue; thence substantially parallel with Craighill avenue, and between Craighill avenue and Chanute avenue, as proposed in City layout of streets, crossing Westchester avenue and proposed streets to a point at or near the intersection of Craighill avenue and Lafayette avenue as proposed in City layout of streets; thence crossing proposed streets to a point at the intersection of Leland avenue and O'Brien avenue, as shown on City layout; thence parallel to proposed Leland avenue to proposed Gildersleeve avenue; thence on a curve crossing Clason's Point road and proposed streets to a point near intersection of proposed Gildersleeve avenue and Hudson avenue; thence parallel to said proposed Hudson avenue to Barrett's creek.

That the copy of the said map and profile filed in the County Clerk's office on the 4th day of April, 1907, as aforesaid, showing the amendment of said route, which copy is marked Exhibit A, April 4, 1907, is submitted herewith.

The petitioner respectfully prays that the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to said route as lawfully amended, in conformity with the map and profile filed in the office of the County Clerk in the County of New York on April 4, 1907, may be given to this petitioner, and that the contract of May 31, 1906, heretofore referred to, may be amended so that the same shall include in Section I. thereof, in place of the route therein set forth, the amended route heretofore described, and shall permit your petitioner to construct, maintain and operate its railroad over such route, and in, upon and across the streets, avenues, parkways, highways and public places therein set forth, under and in accordance with and subject to all the terms and provisions of the said contract dated May 31, 1906.

Whereas, The Fort George Street Railway Company has, under date of July 3, 1906, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railroad upon and along St. Nicholas (or Eleventh) avenue, between the Dyckman street station of the Interborough Rapid Transit Railroad and West One Hundred and Ninetieth street, Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, Section 92 of the Railroad Law and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance to such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on July 6, 1906, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as September 28, 1906, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in the "Sun" and the "World," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the CITY RECORD for ten days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Fort George Street Railway Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Fort George Street Railway Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Fort George Street Railway Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

FORT GEORGE STREET RAILWAY COMPANY.

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract made this day of 1907, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Fort George Street Railway Company, incorporated for the purpose of building, maintaining and operating a street surface railroad (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railroad by electrical system, together with the necessary wires and other equipment for the purpose of conveying persons and property in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, upon the following route:

Beginning at a point about seven hundred feet south of the intersection of Dyckman street and Nagle avenue, running thence by double track in a southerly direction through, upon and along St. Nicholas avenue to its intersection with West One Hundred and Ninetieth street, all in the Borough of Manhattan, in the City, County and State of New York.

Said route, together with turnouts, switches, stands and crossovers hereby authorized, are shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed route of the Fort George Street Railway Company, to accompany amended petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Dated October 16, 1906. Original petition dated July 3, 1906," and signed by R. E. Simon, President, and A. E. Kalbach, Consulting Engineer.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the Company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within two months thereafter make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, to determine if said railroad ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine, unless the period shall be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Second—This consent is upon the express condition that the Company within sixty days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor and before anything is done in the exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall enter into a traffic agreement with the Interborough Rapid Transit Company whereby passengers entering the cars of either the Company or the Interborough Rapid Transit Company (subway) shall be entitled to a continuous passage on both of the said lines upon the payment of a single fare of five cents; such agreement shall be for a period of at least twenty-five years.

Third—The said right to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railroad as herein described, shall be held and enjoyed by the Company, its successors or assigns, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege. Such revaluation shall be of the right and privilege to maintain and operate the said railroad by itself, and not to include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the Company, its successors or assigns. The Company shall, however, not have the right to exercise such privilege of renewal until it has entered into a traffic agreement with the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, or its successors, in the operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad (subway), as above, for said renewal period.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than that sum required to be paid during the last year in this original contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders, selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same is renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract, within the streets and highways of the City, shall become the property of the City, without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

At the termination of this grant as above, the City, at the election of the Board, shall have the right to purchase all the property of the Company not within the streets or avenues, at its fair market value, exclusive of any value which such property may have by reason of this contract. Such valuation shall be determined in the same manner as revaluation for a renewal of this contract, as herein provided.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above, the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall upon thirty (30) days' notice in writing from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The Company, its successor or assigns, shall pay to the City for the right to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway on the route herein described, the following sums of money:

1. Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor.

2. During the first five years of this contract an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than five hundred dollars (\$500), and which shall be equal to three per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed a sum of five hundred dollars (\$500).

During the remaining twenty years of this contract an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and which shall be equal to five per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the day on which the contract is signed by the Mayor.

The terms hereafter to be fixed for any renewal term of this contract shall not be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract, and no renewal shall provide for a further renewal.

Such minimum annual sums shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30, next preceding.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid to the said Comptroller on or before November 1, in each year, for the year ending September 30, next preceding. The fiscal year shall end on September 30, next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the matter of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract, shall be strictly complied with. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the Company, its successors or assigns, to the City for the rights and privileges hereby granted, and it shall be construed as providing for the payment by the Company, its successors or assigns, for said right and privilege of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, or of any ordinance of the City.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City, by the Company, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolution of the Board or by any law of the State of New York.

Sixth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the contract hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railroad company providing for payments for railroad rights or franchise at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any part of the route mentioned herein, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Seventh—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving, or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Eighth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets, avenues or highways, and the right to make the requisite and necessary connections with the tracks of the Company, its successors or assigns, which shall be constructed under this contract.

The use of the railroad which shall be constructed and maintained in the streets, avenues and highways under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment used in connection therewith, shall be permitted by the Company, its successors or assigns, to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues or highways, for street railroad purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall not exceed the legal interest on such proportion of the whole cost of the construction of such railroad and of the cost of keeping the tracks and track equipment in repair, as the number of

cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation and the cost of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all the other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract, in connection with the maintenance or the operation of the said railroad so used.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railroad which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railroad which shall be constructed under this contract.

Ninth—The railroad to be constructed under this contract may be operated by overhead electrical power substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the New York City Interborough Railway Company or by the underground electric system now in use by the lines of the New York City Railway Company. Provided, however, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, after five years from the date of this contract, may, upon giving to the grantee, its successor or assigns, six months' notice in writing, require it or them to operate the railroad upon the whole or upon any portion of its route by underground electrical power substantially similar to the system now in use on the lines of the New York City Railway Company in the Borough of Manhattan, above referred to, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets and highways.

When the change shall have been made to the underground system, all wires for the transmission of power or otherwise, shall be placed in conduits underneath or alongside of the railroad. The Company shall provide two conduits, not less than three (3) inches in diameter each for the exclusive use of the City. Such conduits shall be used only by the Company and by the City.

This provision shall in no way be taken as a limitation on the Police powers of the City, as provided in sections 525 et seq. of the Greater New York Charter.

Tenth—The Company shall commence construction of the railroad herein authorized within three months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or upon the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railroad ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction of the same within twelve months from the same date, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided, that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each.

Eleventh—The said railroad shall be constructed, maintained and operated, subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided in the Charter of the City.

Twelfth—The said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railroad and property of the Company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this contract.

The Company shall remove the stub-end terminal at St. Nicholas avenue, north of West One Hundred and Eighty street, hereby authorized, upon six (6) months' notice in writing from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon such railroad shall not exceed five cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railroad, or a line or branch operated by it, its lessees or assigns in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of The City of New York.

Transfers shall be given between the Interborough Rapid Transit Company (subway division) and the Company at the Interborough Rapid Transit Railway station at Dyckman street for a single fare of five cents, as required by traffic agreement between said companies.

The rate for the carrying of property over the said railroad upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, or its successors in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, its successors or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by it.

Fourteenth—The cars of the Company shall be run both day and night as often as the reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board, but at no time shall the headway at any point on the railway be more than twenty minutes between the hours of 5 o'clock p. m. and midnight.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railroad proper fenders and wheel guards in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railroad shall be equipped with both hand and power brakes.

Seventeenth—All cars which are operated on said railroad shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Eighteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which the railroad shall be constructed under this contract, shall cause to be watered the entire roadway of such streets and avenues at least three times in every twenty-four hours, when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, when so required by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Nineteenth—All cars operated on said railroad shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues or highways upon which the said railroad is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twenty-first—The Company shall cause to be paved that portion of the street between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks upon and along the streets, avenues and highways of the route hereby authorized, which are now either unpaved

or paved with macadam. The work of such paving shall be done under the supervision of the Municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters. Such authorities shall designate the character of the pavement to be laid.

As long as the said railroad, or any portion thereof, remains in the street, avenue or highway, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or highway in which said railroad is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And it shall not be necessary, in the event that the portion of the surface of the street, avenue or highway in which said railroad is constructed, shall not be repaired by the Company as hereinbefore provided, for the City to give any notice to the Company of such state of disrepair, but the City may make such repairs and charge the same to the Company, which the said Company agrees to pay, any statute to the contrary notwithstanding. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any such street, avenue or highway, and in that event the Company, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper city officer at its own expense and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewal or altered pavement. The Company agrees to pay to the City any sum or sums that the City may pay, either as a result of a judgment against it or by way of settlement or compromise, for any injuries either to person or property arising from failure of the Company to pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or highway in which said railway is constructed, as hereinbefore provided.

Twenty-second—Any alteration which may be required to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any subsurface structures, pipes, conduits, etc., laid in the streets on account of the construction or operation of the railroad, shall be made at the sole cost of the railroad company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—The Company hereby agrees not to issue stock other than has been heretofore issued until a certificate of authority thereto has been issued by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or until such Board shall further certify in writing as to the amount of stock reasonably required for the purposes of the Company. The stock of the Company shall not be issued in excess of the amount so certified.

The Company shall not increase its capital stock above the \$25,000 now authorized, without the consent in writing of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, stating the amount of the authorized increase. For the purpose of making this determination as to the amount of stocks to be issued, or the amount of the authorized increase of the capital stock of the Company, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may take and hear testimony under oath, and examine the books and papers of the Company, and require verified statements from the officers thereof pertaining to the value of the property and of the franchise owned or operated by the Company. Such determination shall be made within sixty (60) days after the final submission of the papers or of the final hearing on the application for the issue or increase of capital stock.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract. The Company shall on or before November 1 of each year make a verified report to the Comptroller of The City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts from operation of the railway, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-fifth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railroad constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity.

Twenty-sixth—If the Company, its successors or assigns, shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, except for those defaults or defects for which penalties are hereinafter provided, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided.

Twenty-seventh—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railroad authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-eighth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railroad; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the

said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars (\$25) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel guards, in case of the violation of the provision relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its President, to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Sec. 3. This contract is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law, applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the surface railroads operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinafter fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed, and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
