FIRE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING MARCH 31, 1912.

May 23, 1912. Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, City of New York, City Hall, New York: Sir-Pursuant to the provisions of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to transmit herewith report of the operations and action of this Department for the quarter ending March 31, 1912:

Financial. The Budget appropriations made to this Department in the several Boroughs for the year 1912 aggregate \$8,537,365.55. Of this amount there was expended during the first quarter \$1,926,288.07, leaving available for use during the remainder of the year the sum of \$6,611,077.48.

Uniformed Force. On March 31, 1912, the uniformed force in all the Boroughs aggregated 4,407. On said date there were in service 258 apparatus companies. During the quarter resignations numbered 3; dismissals, 4; reinstatements, 2. There were 8 deaths on market order at a cost of \$2,689.25.

the active, 1 on the relieved, and 12 on the retired lists. The cases of illness were 594 and of injury 212, being 806 in all, and the time lost from each cause 7,565 and 3,300 days respectively, a total of 10,865 days.

Civilian Force.

The civilian force on March 31, 1912, numbered 702.

Fire Alarm Telegraph.

At the close of the first quarter the fire alarm telegraph system in the various Boroughs consisted in mileage of cable and conductors in subways and of aerial conductor and circuit mileage—the latter both underground and aerial—as follows:

During the quarter work has been in progress in connection with the extension the underground fire alarm telegraph system in the various Boroughs.

Contracts have been awarded for the construction of 1,700 keyless doors and 250 fire alarm box shells. Of these doors 1,200 are to replace an equal number of key doors at present installed in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, and 500 are for use in connection with new terminal posts.

Plans are in course of preparation for new buildings for fire alarm central offices in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, for which funds are available from the proceeds of corporate stock issues.

Fire Prevention.

The Bureau of Fire Prevention, which was created by chapter 899 of the Laws of 1911, and organized on October 21 of that year, consists of the former Bureaus of Fire Marshal, Combustibles and Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances, now known as divisions, and of the Division of Places of Public Assembly, established March 26, 1912.

In addition to the appropriations made for the Divisions of Fire Marshal and Combustibles for the current year, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment allowed the sum of \$200,000, to pay the salaries of the administrative, clerical and inspection forces of the new Bureau and the necessary charges for rent, contingencies, supplies and materials. The salary schedule approved by the Board provides for a Chief, a Deputy Chief, a Chief Inspector with an inspection force of 77 (including two Electrical Inspectors), a Chief Examiner and five Examiners, an Assistant Electrical Engineer, a Chemist, six additional Assistant Fire Marshals, a Draftsman, 6 Clerks and 19 Stenographers and Typewriters, and a force of two Watchmen and three Laborers to care for the temporary quarters leased for the Bureau in the former Chapin Home building, opposite the present headquarters of the Department, a total of 125.

The inspection and examining forces were appointed provisionally, upon passing a non-competitive examination, their appointments to continue until the establishment of eligible lists as the result of competitive examination by the Municipal Civil

Service Commission.

While a gratifying measure of progress has been achieved by the labors of the force as at present constituted, a largely augmented staff will be required effectively to cope with the conditions which it is the design of the Fire Prevention Law to remedy.

Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances.

During-the quarter 759 original inspections were made of buildings to which the fire prevention law is applicable. Original inspections to the number of 273 were made at the instance of the Bureau of Licenses, Mayor's office, of common show and dance hall premises, and, at the request of the Police Department, to the extent of 80 in the case of theatres and concert halls, to determine whether the requirements of the fire laws pertaining to those places of entertainment and amusement had been complied with thereat.

The total number of orders served to remove violations of various kinds was 1,067, of which 128 had been complied with at the end of the quarter. There were 3,538 daily reinspections of theatres by members of the uniformed force and 2,808 reinspections by the civilian force of the Bureau of Buildings coming under its

jurisdiction.

The number of unsafe conditions remedied was 369. There were installed 6 standpipe and 20 automatic sprinkler systems and alterations to systems already placed were made in 20 instances. Direct means of communicating alarms for fire to Fire Department Headquarters were provided by 85 hotels, hospitals, etc. Iron balcony fire escapes were affixed to 70 buildings and alterations made to this type of fire escape in 48 cases. Portable fire appliances, consisting of fire buckets, axes and liquid chemical extinguishers, totaling 1,944, were supplied in various buildings. Combustibles and Explosives.

The total amount of receipts for licenses, permits and penalties during the first quarter was \$23,599. Special surveys to the number of 11,168 were made to determine the fitness of premises for the storage of combustibles and explosive material. In this total is included the number of complaints investigated.

Special surveys were made of places of amusement in 321 cases; 9,290 original inspections and 1,326 reinspections were made. "No Smoking" signs to the number of 8,714 were distributed. The number of blasting operations supervised was 14,063. There were 36 seizures of explosives and examination was made of 16 bombs and other dangerous contrivances.

Fires and Losses. The total number of fires during the first quarter in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond was 3,077, with a total estimated loss of \$3,034,021, and an average loss per fire of \$986.03. In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, the total number of fires was 1,637, with a total estimated loss of \$1,010,370, and an average loss per fire of \$617.21.

The aggregate number of fires in all boroughs was 4.714, with a total estimated loss of \$4,044,391.

The number of arrests in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond for arson, incendiarism, etc., was 10, which, with 9 pending from the preceding quarter, made 19 cases to be disposed of. The disposition thereof was as follows: Convicted. 7; discharged, 3, leaving 9 pending.

The number of arrests in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens for arson, incendiarism, etc., was 7. The disposition of these cases was as follows: Convicted, 3; discharged, 2, leaving 2 pending.

Apparatus and Hose. During the quarter there were purchased 12 pieces of motor apparatus comprising one auto-propelled pumping engine, one combination auto pumping engine and hose wagon, one 75-foot auto hook and ladder truck, 4 auto hose wagons, one Cadillac auto, two couple-gear tractors and two 3-ton delivery trucks. Fire hose to the amount of 28,710 feet was acquired by contract based upon bids received at public letting.

In consequence of the severe weather conditions obtaining during the months of January and February of the current year, and the large number of fires which occurred during those months, much repair work to department apparatus was necessitated. Notwithstanding the pressure to which the means and facilities at the repair shops were subjected as the result of these strenuous conditions, the shops were at all times prepared for every emergency with which they were confronted and the work of rehabilitation was done so promptly and thoroughly that none of the companies was compelled to remain out of service during this trying period.

Buildings. Since January 1, 1912, work has been begun on nine new buildings for apparatus companies and has progressed so rapidly that initial payments have been made on the 37 Probationary Firemen were appointed and 43 having satisfactorily completed their probationary period of service were appointed 4th grade Firemen. RECORDS AND STATISTICS. Summary of Alarms and Calls.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Tuesday, April 23, 1912, at 10 O'clock a. m.

Present—President James Creelman and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Tenement House Department," the following: "Superintendent, Brooklyn; Superintendent, The Bronx," and substituting therefor the following: "3 Superintendents."

Mr. F. A. Smith, Clerk, representing the Commissioner of the Tenement House Department, addressed the Commission in behalf of the proposed amendment. There

"23. Whenever there are less than three persons eligible for promotion to fill a vacancy in a graded position, an eligible nominated by the appointing officer may, with the consent of the Commission, be promoted to the grade next higher upon a statement of the facts to the Commission, and on passing a non-competitive examination, similar in scope, subjects and preliminary conditions to such examination as would have been prescribed in case of competition."

"24. Any person in the competitive service who shall have obtained his position as the result of an examination either for appointment or promotion covering in its scope a higher grade or compensation than that of the position he holds, provided there is not more than one other person in the same grade, and if not otherwise disqualified, may, with the consent of the Commission, be promoted or advanced to such higher grade or compensation without further examinations under this rule, provided to explain the discrepancy in her statements as to the date of birth in the papers of her

he has actually served at least one year in the bureau or other subdivision of the de-

partment in which the promotion is to be made."

Mr. M. Altmann, representing the President of the Borough of Richmond, and Mr. Stephen Kelly, representing the President of the Borough of Manhattan, appeared in favor of the elimination of paragraph 23. Mr. Hugh Gordon Miller, representing the Civil Employees' Association, opposed the same.

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract made this day of 1912, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Manhattan Bridge Three-Cent Line (hereinafter called the Company). In consideration of the mutual covenants and

agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows: Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the following rights and privileges:

First-To construct, maintain and operate a First—To construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway with the necessary wires and equipment for the purpose of conveying passengers and property in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, in The City of New York, upon the following routes:

(1) Beginning at a point in the marginal way adjacent to the North River at or near the Desbrosses Street Ferry, thence by double track in, upon and across the marginal way and West street to Desbrosses street, thence by double

street to Desbrosses street, thence by double track in and upon Desbrosses street to Washington street, thence by single track in and upon Washington street to Vestry street, thence by single track in and upon Vestry street to Greenwich street, thence by double track in and upon Vestry street to Greenwich street, thence by double track in and upon Vestry street to Greenwich street the Canal street themes by upon Vestry street to Canal street, thence by double track in and upon Canal street to a point easterly from the Bowery and opposite the property acquired by the City for a terminal to the Manhattan Bridge, thence southerly in, upon and across Canal street to a point on the southerly side thereof where a connection can conveniently be made with the tracks to be constructed by the City upon said Manhattan Bridge, its approaches and terminals.

Sec. 2. The grant of the right or privilege to construct, maintain and operate said railway from a point in the marginal way adjacent to the North River at or near Desbrosses Street Ferry to the entrance to the Manhattan Bridge and upon the approach thereto upon the routes hereinbefore described in the Borough of Manhattan, and from the entrance to the Manhattan Bridge to the intersection of Atlantic avenue with 4th avenue, upon the routes hereinbefore described in the Borough of Brooklyn, is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on a street and avenue to the construction.

said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within six (6) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within said six (6) months or within one (1) month thereafter make application to the Appellate Division o the Supreme Court for the appointment of missioners in the manner provided by the Rail-road Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second-Nothing in this contract shall deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any other corporation or to any individual a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the routes hereinbefore described, and the Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall consent to the construction and operation of any stree surface railway by any such other corporation or individual which may receive a franchise therefor from the City, and which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Should the City at any time during the term of this contract grant to any other corporation or to any individual the right or privilege to operate a railway upon the tracks of the Company on the route herein described or any portion thereof, then the City shall within thirty (30) days thereafter give notice to the Company that such right has been granted and of the name of the corporation or individual to which such right has been granted.

At the expiration of ninety (90) days after the giving of such notice such individual or cor-

poration shall have the right to begin the operation of cars upon the tracks of the Company upon the route or any portion thereof over which such corporation or individual may receive a right or privilege, and continue such operation during the term thereof. Such corporation or individual shall pay to the Company for the right to use its tracks, equipment, power and all other property of the Company which shall be necessary in the operation of the railway upon the Company's tracks, such sum or sums as may be agreed upon by such corporation or individual and the Company within said ninety (90) days, or in the event that such agreement cannot be reached within said ninety (90) days, then such sum or sums as shall be determined by arbitrators as hereinsfter avoided. by arbitrators, as hereinafter provided.

If the Company and such corporation or in-dividual cannot, prior to the expiration of said ninety (90) days, agree upon the compensation for the use of such tracks, then such compensa-tion shall be fixed by arbitrators selected in the

following manner:

One fit and impartial person shall be chosen by the Company; one fit and impartial person shall be chosen by such corporation or individual. In default of such selection by either party within thirty (30) days after the expiration of said ninety (90) days, then the person who shall have been so selected by one party shall appoint and associate with himself one fit and impartial person for the purposes aforesaid, and if the persons so chosen shall differ in judgment, they shall appoint a fit and impartial person to be associated with them for the said purpose, if they can agree upon such person, or if they cannot agree, then each of them shall nominate two fit and impartial persons and from the names of the four persons so nominated that of one of them shall be drawn by lot, who shall be associated for the purpose aforesaid with the said two persons previously so respectively chosen or appointed. The decision under oath of any two of the said persons who shall be so selected shall be final and conclusive. The compensation and expenses of the persons so selected shall be borne by the individual or corporation to which such right may be granted.

Within thirty (30) days after an agreement has been reached between said parties or in case said agreement cannot be reached before the time specified herein, then within thirty (30) days after the determination of the arbitrators as herein provided, the said parties shall enter into a written agreement which will specify the sum or sums which such corporation or indi-

sum or sums which such corporation or individual shall pay to the Company for said privilege and the Company shall file the same with the Board. If the Company fails to sign such an agreement within said thirty (30) days and file the same with the Board, then the right herein granted shall cease and determine.

Third—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any Company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order, by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fourth-The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law confirming the determination of the Commissioners appointed thereunder, that such railway ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of filing such con-sents or the date of such order; otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the Court proceedings shall be dili-gently prosecuted by the Company, and provided that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such Court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board, the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Fifth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been ob-

tained from the proper City officials. In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Sixth—The portion of said railway in the Borough of Manhattan and upon the Manhattan Bridge and its terminals shall be operated by underground electric power substantially similar to the system of underground electric power now used by the street surface railways in the Bor-ough of Manhattan, by gas engine power or by electric storage battery power; provided that any other power may be used, except locomotive steam power, horse power or overhead electric power, which may be lawfully used, approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provi-sions of law and by the Public Service Conviproperty owners in accordance with the provisions of law and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York. The portion of said railway in the Borough of Brooklyn, except upon the Manhattan Bridge and its terminals, may be operated by

overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Brooklyn, by gas engine power or by electric storage battery power; provided that any other power may be used, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be lawfully used, approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Seventh-No wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, shall be permitted unless they be placed in conduits underneath or along the side of the railway. When such conduits are constructed, the Company shall provide two (2) conduits not less than three (3) inches in diameter each for the exclusive use of the City. The Company hereby agrees that such conduits shall be used only by the Company and

the City, as above.

Eighth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of

street surface from house line to house line. Ninth-As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is construct ed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may pre-scribe. In case of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs in the Borough of Manhattan after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of Manhattan or to make pavement or repairs in the Borough of Brooklyn, after like notice from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn then the prid President or either of Brooklyn, then the said Presidents or either of them may make such pavement or repairs in their respective Boroughs at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to require hearing contained shall replace. sions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Tenth-Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe. Eleventh—It is agreed that the right hereby

granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials beying jurisdiction was such applied. City officials having jurisdiction over such public

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Sec. 3. The grant of the right or privileg to operate cars upon two (2) tracks on the Manhattan Bridge and the approaches thereto, upon the route hereinbefore described, and to use other equipment owned by the City upon said bridge, is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First-The Company shall use only such tracks as shall be assigned to the Company by the Commissioner of Bridges, and nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, to affect the right of the Commissioner of Bridges to assign the same or other tracks to such individual or other corporation.

Such tracks and all electrical equipment necessary for the operation of cars thereon shall be installed at the expense of the City, and shall remain the property of the City, but the Company shall pay the cost of keeping and maintaining such tracks and electrical equipment in good order and repair, and in such manner as shall be approved and directed by the Commissioner of Bridges, and shall furnish all motive power required by the Commissioner of Bridges, for the operation of its cars, and the Company shall renew any or all tracks and electrical equipment it upon the bridge and its terminals when directed by the Commissioner of Bridges, and in such manner as may be prescribed by him. If deemed necessary by the Commissioner of Bridges, the Company shall install and oper ate a system of signals to insure the safe and efficient operation of cars; such system to be approved by the Commissioner of Bridges. the event of any necessity for changing the layout of tracks, curves, switches, sidings or platforms on the bridge in order to facilitate operation of cars by the Company, said Company must do all the work and furnish all the labor and tools necessary for affecting such changes, which shall all be made under the control and direction of the Commissioner of Bridges, and no such changes or construction connected therewith, or relating thereto, shall be made unless the plan or plans for the same been first submitted to the Commissioner of Bridges and approved by him.

If, however, the tracks and appliances herein mentioned are used by any other individual or corporation, then the Company shall bear only such proportion of the cost of work required by the terms and conditions of this subdivision as the use of such track and appliances by the Company bears to the entire use of such track and appliances.

Second—Before beginning the operation of the cars, the Company shall file with the Com-missioner of Bridges a statement for his approval and assent as to the type of car which proposes to operate and a sketch showing clearance dimensions, weight on axles and wheel spacing, or such other information as may be required by said Commissioner. All cars operated over the bridge by the Company and all equipment and appliances relating to such operation shall be subject at all times to the inspection of the Commissioner of Bridges or his authorized representatives, who shall have power to forbid the entrance to the bridge of cars which may for any reason be unsatisfactory, and who shall have power to direct the removal

of any old or inadequate appliance, and the substitution therefor of appliances of approved character.

Said Commissioner may adopt rules and regu-lations in regard to the number of cars to be operated over the bridge, the rate of speed of said cars, the movement and headway thereof, the type and weight of cars to be used and the condition thereof, the switching of cars and the use of platforms and the control of the electrical current used by the Company, and the said Commissioner may alter and amend any said Commissioner may after and amend any such rules and regulations so as to secure the safety and comfort of persons using the bridge and preserve the purposes for which the bridge was constructed, and, upon serving notice upon the Company that such rules and regulations have been made, amended or altered, the Company shall comply with all the requirements hereof.

hereof. Third—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the Commissioner of Bridges to make any alterations or changes in the construction, operation or management of the bridge or to affect in any way the control of such Commissioner over such bridge, as provided by the Charter of the

City. Sec. 4. The grant of the said right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway from a point in the marginal way adjacent to the North River at or near Desbrosses Street Ferry to the westerly approach to the Manhattan Bridge in the Borough of Manhattan and from the easterly approach to said bridge to the intersection of 4th and Atlantic avenues in the Borough of Brooks and Atlantic avenues in the Borough of Brook-lyn, upon the routes hereinbefore described and the grant of the said right and privilege to operate cars upon the Manhattan Bridge and the approaches thereto are both subject to the following conditions which shall be complied

following conditions which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said rights and privileges shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of ten (10) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of fifteen (15) years upon a fair revaluation of the right and privilege to fair revaluation of the right and privilege to operate over such continuous route and for the right to use the tracks owned by the City upon the Manhattan Bridge and the approaches thereto, and the terminal loop or other terminal facilities which are the property of the City and used by the Company.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this con-tract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding fifteen (15) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall ten agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall oose a third d rested freeholder. three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, with-out the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following

sums of money: (a) The sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) in cash within three (3) months after date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four thousand dollars (\$4,000), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross

annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven thousand dollars (\$7,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000). The gross annual receipts mentioned above

shall be the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City. The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the

Mayor. (c) For the use of the tracks owned by the City upon the Manhattan Bridge and the approaches thereto, the sum of five cents for each round trip or the sum of two and one-half cents for each single trip of each and every car operated upon the bridge.

The number of such cars shall be certified by the Commissioner of Bridges to the Comptroller once each month in such form as shall be designated by the Comptroller.

(d) The Company shall pay to the City four (4) per cent. per annum upon the cost of any terminal loops or other terminal facilities which are the property of the City and used by the Company; provided, however, that if such terminal facilities are used by any other company or companies, then the Company shall only pay such portion of four (4) per cent. per annum

upon the cost thereof as shall be proportionate to the use of such facilities by the Company.

The Commissioner of Bridges shall determine such account due the City and certify the same

such amounts due the City and certify the same to the Comptroller.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

shall be paid on or perore revorement 1 in cause year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsover kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolution of the Board or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding and that the said essignee or lessee wards. assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other

property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein con-tained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiv-ing of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth-Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the

rights hereby granted shall cease and determine. Sixth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed three (3) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than three (3) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof under its control to any other point thereof or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City, and the Company shall at all times have tickets on sale, one of which shall entitle a passenger to a like privilege, and the Company shall sell such tickets at a rate not exceeding five (5) cents for two (2) tickets. Should the Company at any time during the term of this contract be merged or consolidated with any other street surface railway company or companies, whose lines connect with or in-tersect the lines of the Company, the Company shall, by reason of such merger or consolidation, become obligated to receive passengers from and transfer passengers to the lines of such merged or consolidated company or companies, and said passengers shall be given a continuous ride over the lines of the Company and the lines of such merged or consolidated company or companies for a single fare of not exceeding

five (5) cents. In the event of the failure at any time subsequent to such merger or consolidation of the Company or any merged or consolidated company or companies whose lines connect with or inter-sect the lines of the Company or of the successors or assigns of such company or companies for any reason whatsoever to receive and transfer passengers as hereinabove provided, this franchise shall ipso facto become void and forfeited

The Company shall carry free upon the rail way hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are

Seventh-No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or main-tenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway Provided that no cars for the transportation of express matter shall be operated between the hours of six o'clock a. m. and eight o'clock p. m. daily, and that the Board may further limit the operation of such cars as public convenience may require.

The rate for the carrying of property over the said railway upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, and may be fixed by the Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Eighth-The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheelguards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Ninth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter during the term of this contract be enacted or adopted by

Thirteenth-The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross re-ceipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascerticing the contract and may taining the correctness of its report and may

taining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Fourteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Prowithout proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear action may be taken by the Board forthappear, action may be taken by the Board forth-

Fifteenth-If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any de-fault on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the

fund hereinafter provided for.
Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on ac-count of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Seventeenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, espe-cially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice, the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting thereunder, relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheelguards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheelguards, in case of a violation of the provisions relating to these mat-ters, all of which sums may be deducted from said fund.

In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,-000) and in default thereof this contest that 000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Eighteenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided, shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have

been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Nineteenth—The words
and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this
contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, driveways, bridges, viaducts, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an ease-ment" encountered in the routes hereinabove de-scribed, and upon or in which authority is hereby

given to the Company to construct a railway.

Twentieth—If at any time the powers of the
board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 5. The rights hereby granted are for a continuous line, but it is expressly agreed that no forfeiture shall be claimed by the City in the event of the Company being unable to secure the consents of the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan for operation over their tracks, provided through operation is had by the Company over the balance of the route or routes hereby authorized.

Sec. 6. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any manner limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New

Sec. 7. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 5 and other provisions of the Railroad Law, pertinent hereto, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 8. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and con-
