REPORT ON THE DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES.

September 17, 1915.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller, The City of New York:

Dear Sir—Preliminary to a consideration of the finances of the Department of Bridges for 1913 and 1914, it is proposed to set forth the bridges over which the Department of Bridges has jurisdiction, with some statistics relative to the traffic carried by the East River Bridges.

The first commissioner of bridges of the Greater City stated that on January 1, 1898, he found throughout the city four hundred and thirty-nine bridges, crossing streets, avenues, railroad depressions, valleys, streams, creeks and rivers, distributed as follows:

Many of the bridges the Commissioner found were part of the street system, and upon advice of the Corporation Counsel all of the bridges not crossing water were transferred to the Department of Highways. The bridges then remaining under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges numbered 76. These bridges by various eliminations or by transfers to other departments had been reduced by December 31, 1914, to 42. The Municipal Year Book of The City of New York, 1915, states that these bridges represent an investment for land and structures of over \$135,000,000, about \$88,000,000 of which applies to the East River Bridges, the Brooklyn, the Williamsburg, the Queensboro and the Manhattan.

If we multiply the total people crossing these bridges on November 5, 1914, 761,085, as shown above, by 334% (this is treating 52 Sundays and 9 holidays as one-half days), we arrive at a total of 254,582,932, representing the number of people crossing these bridges in the year 1914. It will be noted that there is a decrease in the passenger traffic of the Brooklyn Bridge, as compared with 1912 and 1913, and an increase in the 1914 traffic of the other three bridges as compared with the same years.

A large part of these revenues are, however, in effect, paid out again by the City. Section 46 (now section 48) of chapter 712 of the Laws of 1899, in relation to the taxation of public franchises as real property, contains the following:

"Deduction from special franchise tax for local purposes.—If, when the tax assessed on any special franchise is due and payable under the provisions of law applicable to the city, town or village in which the tangible property is located, it shall appear that the person, co-partnership, association or corporation affected has paid to such city, town or village for its exclusive use within the next preceding year, under any agreement therefor, or under any statute requiring the same, any sum based upon a percentage of gross earnings, or any other income or any license fee, or any sum of money on account of such special franchise, granted to or possessed by such person, co-partnership, association or corporation, which payment was in the nature of a tax, all amounts so paid for the exclusive use of such city, town or village, except money paid or expenses for paving or repairing of pavement of any street, highway or public place, shall be deducted from any tax based on the assessment made by the state board of tax commissioners for city, town or village purposes, but not otherwise; and the remainder shall be the tax on such special franchise payable for city, town or village purposes."

The courts having decided that the tolls or rentals paid by certain companies operating their cars over the Brooklyn and Williamsburg bridges are in the nature of a tax, the City has been obliged to allow their deduction from the special franchise taxes payable by these companies. These deductions for the yearly periods ending April 25, 1913 and 1914, respectively, were as shown below. There are no deductions of this nature in connection with the franchises affecting the use of the Manhattan and the Queensboro bridges, as it was specifically provided in these later franchises that no such deductions would be claimed.

Of the total expenditures of 1914, administrative and general overhead expenses were \$266,919.58 or 20.85 per cent. This sum is \$5,184.25 less than the 1913 expenditures for the same function, which cost \$272,103.83 or 20.46 per cent. of the total cost for that year. It will thus be seen that while there was a saving in 1914 in the functions named as compared with 1913, the percentage of the total 1914 expense for this purpose was slightly over that for 1913.

The expense for direct activities (operation and maintenance of bridges and comfort stations) in 1914 was \$1,013,213.48, or 79.15 per cent. of the entire 1914 expense. This was \$44,776.41 less than the cost of these functions for 1913, which was \$1,057,989.89, or 79.54 per cent. The chief item in the net savings in these functions in 1914 was \$55,183.15 in the cost of maintenance of bridges. The cost of the operation of the bridges increased \$11,786.99.

It will be noted that although the overhead expenditures in 1914 are \$5,184.25 less than those for 1913, the percentage of these expenditures to the total expenditures is four-tenths of one per cent. more in 1914 than in 1913. There is an increase in 1914 in the shop expenses of \$714.87 and in the direct cost of operation of \$11,786.99.

Desirability of Preliminary Estimates of Cost.

The preceding figures do not shed much light upon the efficiency or inefficiency of the management of the department, for the reason that there exist no specific units of measurement of physical performance against which the expenditures can be matched. Now that the construction of new bridges and the reconstruction of the old bridges has substantially ceased, and there remains to be done chiefly the repainting, repaving and repairing of the several bridges, it would appear that, with possibly a few exceptions, notably, the Brooklyn Bridge, which requires constant attention, preliminary estimates might be made of the bulk of the work necessary to be performed to keep the respective bridges in proper physical condition. How little guide are the figures stated in the yearly expense records of the department as to annual maintenance requirements of the several bridges may be seen by comparing the costs of maintaining the Willis Avenue Bridge in 1913 and 1914.

Were an approximate estimate made of the cost of maintaining all the bridges for a period of years (based somewhat upon the life of the painting, etc.), it would be valuable for budget purposes, would give opportunity for advance studying and planning of the work, make possible the fixing of time limits on the various jobs, and with a good follow-up system would probably expedite the executing of the work and lessen its cost.

PERSONAL SERVICE.

The reports for 1913 and 1914 show that much the greater part of the expenditures of the bridge department are for personal service and that the proportion of

the personal service expenditures to the total expenditures is somewhat greater in 1914 than in 1913.

STOREHOUSES.

The total amount of stores disbursed during 1914 was \$121,779.43, and the cost of receiving, storing and distributing them was \$17,879.22, or 14.68 per cent., which appears to be too high. There were on hand December 31, 1914, stores to the value of \$59,199.45.

It will be noted from the above that the cost of each horse boarded, with shoeing and veterinary service, is \$37.87 per month, while the cost of corresponding service performed by the department itself is \$65.18 per horse per month. The total cost of stable service per horse per month is, as stated above, \$60.63, or at the rate of \$727.56 per annum.

General Remarks.

Although further savings in the Department of Bridges appear possible, credit must be given to it for a net decrease in the cost of operation and maintenance in 1914 as compared with 1913 of \$49,960.66. The saving in maintenance costs was \$55,183.15, offset in part by an increase in operation costs of \$11,786.99.

As less than \$200,000 out of a total expenditure of \$1,280,133.06 for the operation and maintenance of the 42 bridges under the jurisdiction of the Bridge Department was spent for other than personal services, it follows that only in this item can any considerable savings be effected.

As previously pointed out in this report, without detailed estimates of the maintenance work to be done, the life of the painting, repaving, etc., and the reduction of the cost of all work to a unit basis, it is difficult to point out by statistics just what reduction, if any, should be made in the personal service. If it is felt by those charged with the duty of providing funds for this department that the annual appropriations for this department should be reduced, there remains always the common business practice of curtailing the positions that seem over numerous. Taking for example only, and not as a recommendation, the 31 engineers appearing on the civil list of June 30, 1915, and allowing 260 full working days to the year, we obtain a total of 8,060 engineering days, or an average of 192 engineering days to each bridge. Other items in the list of positions contained in this report may be similarly treated. The burden of justifying the retention of all of its large staff rests, of course, upon the Bridge Department.

The cost of supervision in the repair shops appears to be high, the cost of handling stores is 14.68 per cent. of the entire supplies and materials disbursed, and the cost of feeding and caring for the horses of the department, other than those boarded, seems excessive.

Of a total direct maintenance expense for all the bridges in 1914 of \$448,040.07, the expenditure upon the Brooklyn Bridge was \$188,374.83, or 42.04 per cent.. Comparing the direct maintenance expenses of the Brooklyn Bridge for 1913 and 1914 with like expenses of the Williamsburg Bridge, the next most expensive bridge to maintain, for the same period, we have:

The Brooklyn Bridge has been in use over 30 years and this, in connection with a strain upon it much heavier than was anticipated at the time of its erection, necessitates constant supervision and the repair and replacement of various parts. If we accept the average annual excess maintenance cost of the Brooklyn Bridge above that of the Williamsburg Bridge (\$69,858.20) as fairly representative of the increased cost due to the exceptional conditions existent on the Brooklyn Bridge, question arises as to whether it would not be advisable to rebuild this bridge in whole or in part rather than continue to pay the very heavy maintenance charges now necessary to insure the Bridge's safe operation. The excess cost, \$69,858.20, is equivalent to 4½ per cent. on a corporate stock issue of \$1,552,271. The cost of the Brooklyn Bridge, as set forth in the Bridge Department Report of 1913, is \$24,972,417, of which \$8,880,837 was for land and \$16,091,580 for construction.

Another item, the annual cost of the maintenance of which the Bridge Department thinks might be lessened, is the planking of the Brooklyn Bridge. The life of this 2½-inch planking varies, it is estimated, from four to eight months. The proposition is to replace this planking with wood block. The original cost will be considerably greater, but there is reason to believe that the increased life of the pavement would much more than compensate for it.

Another matter which must be mentioned in any comprehensive discussion of the financial problems of the Department of Bridges is the effect of section 48 of the special franchise tax law upon the bridge revenues. This law permits the deduction from the special franchise tax of any payment in the nature of a tax made to any city, town or village for its exclusive use in the preceding year, and the courts have held the rentals which would otherwise be received by the City for the privileges granted to certain companies to operate their cars over the Brooklyn and the Williamsburg Bridges to be of such a nature. The amounts deducted from the special franchise taxes of certain companies, as hereinbefore specifically set forth, for the year ending April 25, 1914, aggregated \$259,191.50. Were the companies not permitted to deduct these rentals from their franchise taxes, they would be obliged to treat them as expenses and the values of their franchises would thereby be reduced, so that if the section 48 had been repealed, the net financial benefit to the City for the period stated would have been \$259,191.50, less the decreased taxes on the special franchise, or approximately \$190,000. Under present conditions the companies mentioned have practically free use of two bridges which cost the City over \$48,000,000.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York Held Wednesday, July 28, 1915, at 10.30 o'Clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Commissioner Darwin R. James, Jr. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of Rule XI by changing clause 2 thereof to read as follows:

"2. The person selected shall be duly notified by the appointing officer, and, upon accepting and reporting for duty, shall receive from such officer a certificate of appointment for a probationary period of three months; except for the position of Patrolman, where such period shall be six months. For temporary service in accordance with clause 1 of Rule XII such certificates of appointment shall be issued for a probationary period of fifteen days. For temporary service in accordance with clause 2 of Rule XII, such certificates of appointment shall be issued for a probationary period of one month. If his conduct or capacity on probation be unsatisfactory to the appointing officer the probationer shall be notified in writing that at the end of such period he shall, for that reason, not be retained; his retention in the service otherwise shall be equivalent to permanent appointment. Veterans of the Civil War, honorably discharged from the military or the naval service of the United States, shall not be subject to such probation."

There were no appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed. A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of Rule XII by changing clause 2 thereof to read as follows:

"2. The Commission shall establish and maintain separate eligible lists of persons willing to accept temporary employment as clerk, playground attendant, gymnasium attendant, school farm attendant, gardener, typewriter accountant and attendant, under the conditions of the preceding clause. If the appointing officer shall certify that the services of a person appointed from any such list have been satisfactory the name of such person shall, at the termination of such temporary employment, be placed on a preferred list, from which he shall be eligible for re-employment for any similar service under the conditions of clause 1 of Rule XIII, provided he shall have served for not less than the probationary period as required by the provisions of Rule XI, clause 2."

There were no appearances. A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Police Department," the line "4 Deputy Commissioners" and substituting therefor the following: "5 Deputy Commissioners." E. V. O'Daniels, Esquire, Fourth Deputy Police Commissioner, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There was no opposition and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held July 14 were approved. On motion, it was

Resolved, that clause 2 of Rule XI of the Municipal Civil Service Rules be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

"2. The person selected shall be duly notified by the appointing officer, and, upon accepting and reporting for duty, shall receive from such officer a certificate of appointment for a probationary period of three months; except for the position of Patrolman, where such period shall be six months. For temporary service in accordance with clause 1 of Rule XII such certificates of appointment shall be issued for a probationary period of fifteen days. For temporary service in accordance with clause 2 of Rule XII, such certificates of appointment shall be issued for a probationary period of one month. If the appointing officer shall certify that the services of a person appointed from any such list have been satisfactory, the name of such person shall at the termination of such temporary employment be placed on a preferred list, from which he shall be eligible for re-employment for any similar service under the conditions of clause 1 of Rule XIII, provided he shall have served for not less than the probationary period as required by the provisions of Rule XI, clause 2."

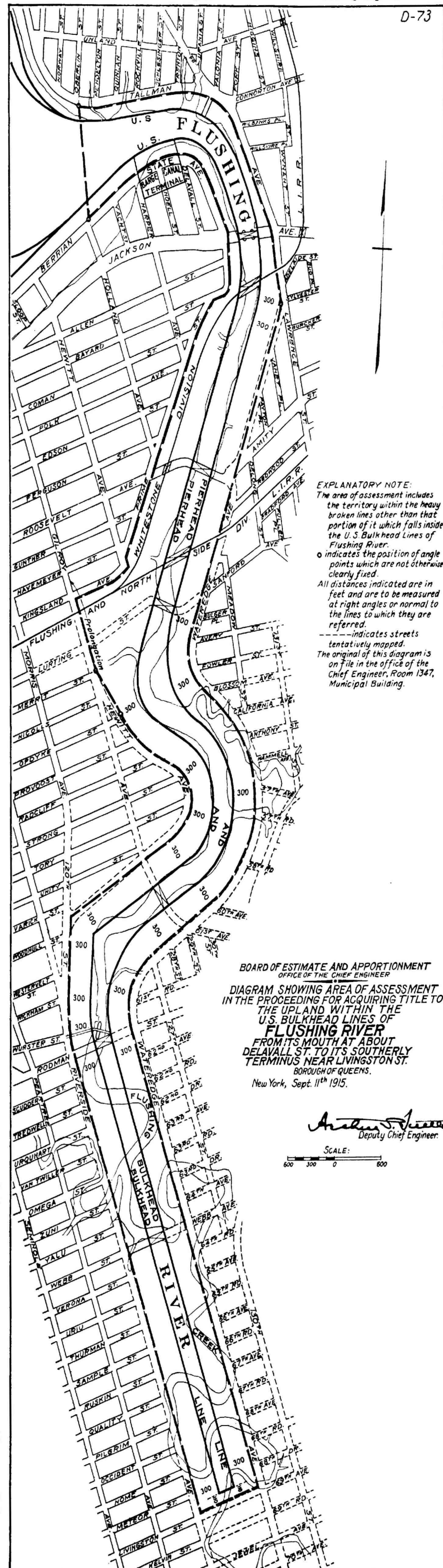

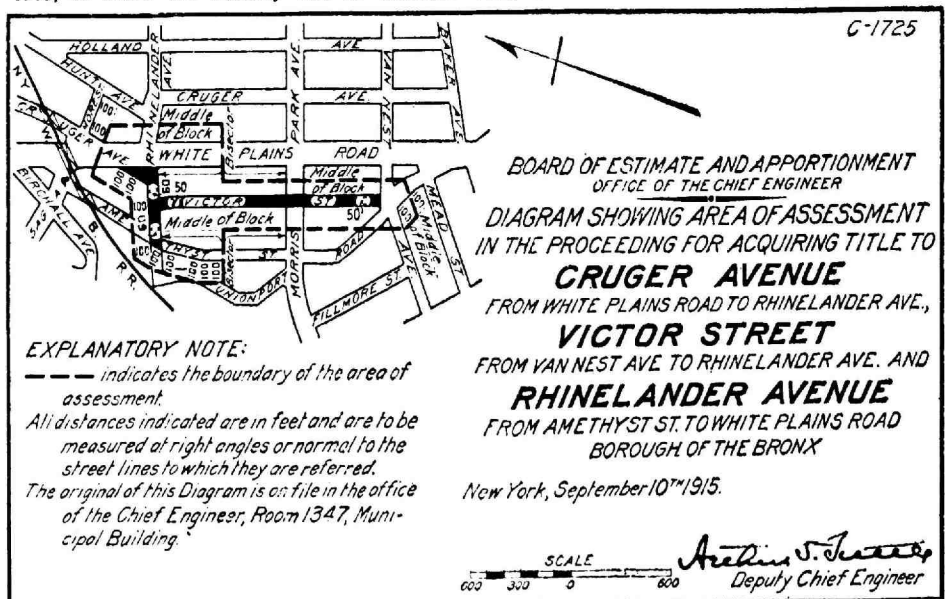

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession for benefit forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
