Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, July 19, 1916, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. Commissioner James presided.

The minutes of June 28, 29 and July 5 were approved.

There were no appearances for the hearing accorded J. H. Morrison and members of a committee of persons on the preferred list of Inspector of Sewer Construction.

Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Appeals the appeals of John F. Murray, a candidate in the examination for Stationary Engineer (Hoist), and Thomas O'Connor, a candidate in the examination for promotion to Captain, Fire Department, for reratings were granted, it appearing from the reports of the Examining Division that clerical errors had occurred in computing the percentages of the candidates.

The appeal of Adam Busch for a special examination for promotion to the position of Janitor, Department of Education, was granted, it appearing that his failure to receive the notice for the regular examination had been due to his temporary assignment to a school on the outskirts of the Borough of Queens, where the postal delivery was poor.

The Secretary presented a report of work performed during the quarter ending June 30, 1916.

The Secretary was instructed to forward a copy of the report to his Honor the Mayor, in accordance with section 1544 of the Charter.

A memorandum, dated July 18, was presented from the Secretary relative to the complaint of William S. Irving, addressed to the Mayor in regard to certain transfers of Architectural Draughtsman and his complaint that he had not been given an opportunity to accept appointment as Architectural Draughtsman in the Department of Education in December, 1915, from the preferred list of Architectural Draughtsman, Grade C. The Secretary was instructed to inform the Mayor that the complaint of Mr. Irving in regard to the transfers of Architectural Draughtsman was not well founded, and in regard to his complaint that he had not been given an opportunity to accept appointment as Architectural Draughtsman to inform the Mayor that the Secretary of the Department of Education had written the candidate on Jan. 13, 1916, in regard to the appointment, but had received no reply and that upon receipt of notice to that effect from the Department of Education the Commission had approved the appointments made from the preferred list of Architectural Draughtsman, Grade D.

A memorandum, dated July 13, was presented from the Secretary relative to the payroll of Joseph Stoltzenberg for services as Storekeeper in the Board of Inebriety from May 23 to July 11. The Secretary was instructed to note on the records the permanent appointment of Mr. Stoltzenberg, as Storekeeper at \$660 per annum, from the eligible list of Steward, certified May 24, and his resignation therefrom on July 11 and to approve his payroll.

A memorandum dated July 18 was presented from the Secretary, transmitting a communication dated July 7 from William G. Rainsford, relative to his standing on the preferred list of Dockmaster. It appeared that the candidate had been continuously employed by the City since March 1, 1911, but that the Certification Clerk had dated the beginning of his services as Nov. 13, 1911, for the reason that from April 30, 1911, when he resigned from the position of Chief Confidential Inspector (Exempt Class), until November 13, 1911, when he was appointed an Assistant Superintendent of Docks from the eligible list for that position, he had been serving under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII as Assistant Superintendent of Docks. The Secretary stated that this practice did not seem fair and requested instructions in the matter. The Secretary was instructed to take the matter up with the Corporation Counsel.

A report dated July 12 was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, relative to the request of the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, that the Commission arrange an examination for change of title of John H. Barry from Elevator Constructor's Helper to Elevator Constructor. The request was denied, the said employee having served less than three years in the Labor Class, and the action of the Acting Chief Examiner, in directing an Examiner to report in the matter of the classification of the position of Elevator Constructor, was approved.

A physical and practical test will be held. Salary, \$1,080 to \$1,200 per annum.

Institutional Examiner, Male and Female.

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of the State of New York.

The requirement that every application shall bear the certificates of four reputable citizens whose residences or places of business are within the City of New York is waived for applicants for this examination whose previous occupation or employment has been wholly or in part outside the City of New York, and the said certificates will be accepted from persons resident or engaged in business elsewhere.

Inspections will cover every phase of institutional work—equipment, sanitation, care of inmates, instruction, etc.

Requirements: Candidates must have had experience of substantial length in inspecting or investigating institutions of the character mentioned; or experience in other positions tending to give them an intimate knowledge of institutional management. Candidates should be thoroughly familiar with, 1st, current practice in the construction, equipment, sanitation and physical operation of institutions; 2nd, approved educational and recreational methods in child-caring institutions. A ready and exact command of English is also required.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age and not more than 45 years of age on the closing date for the receipt of applications.

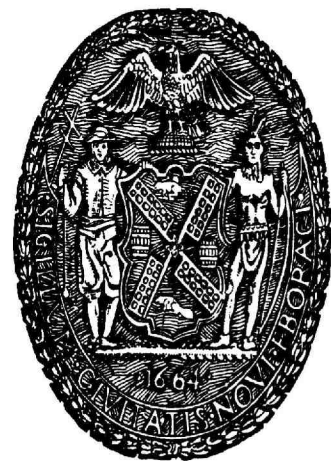

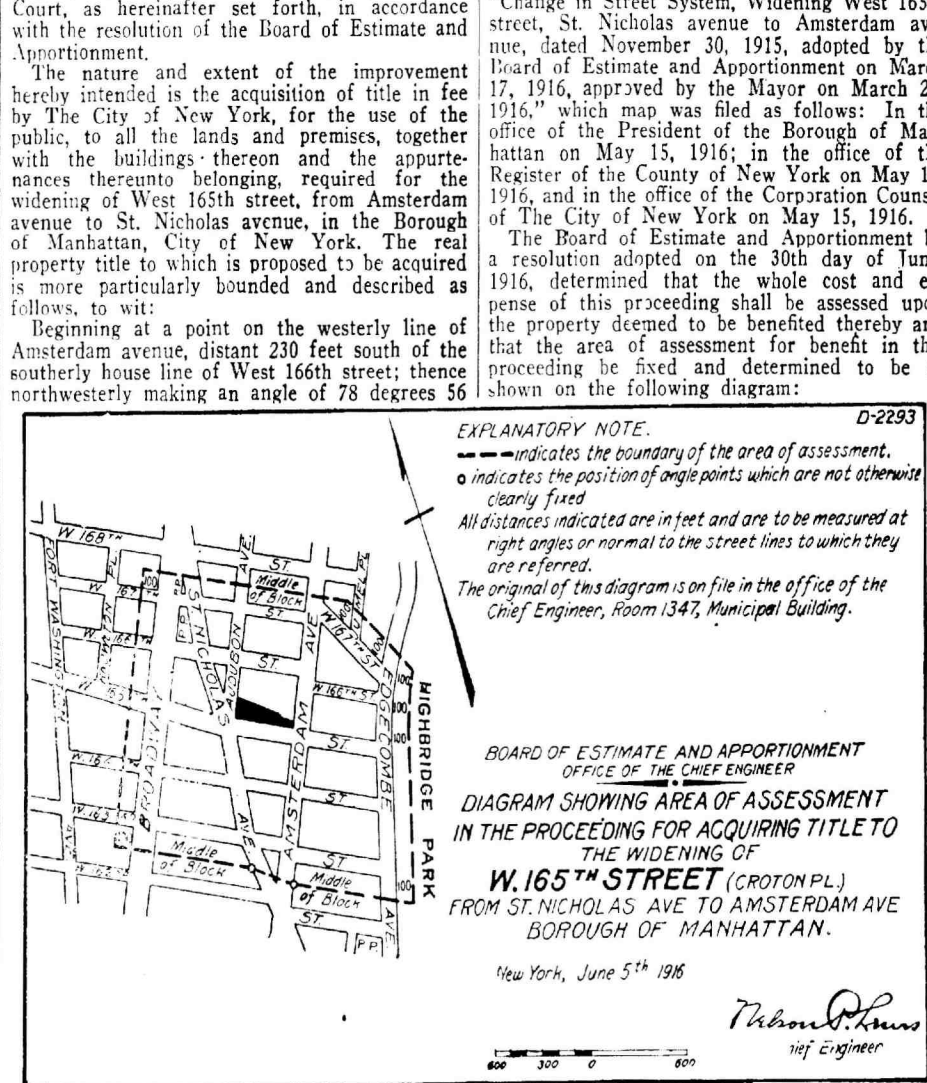

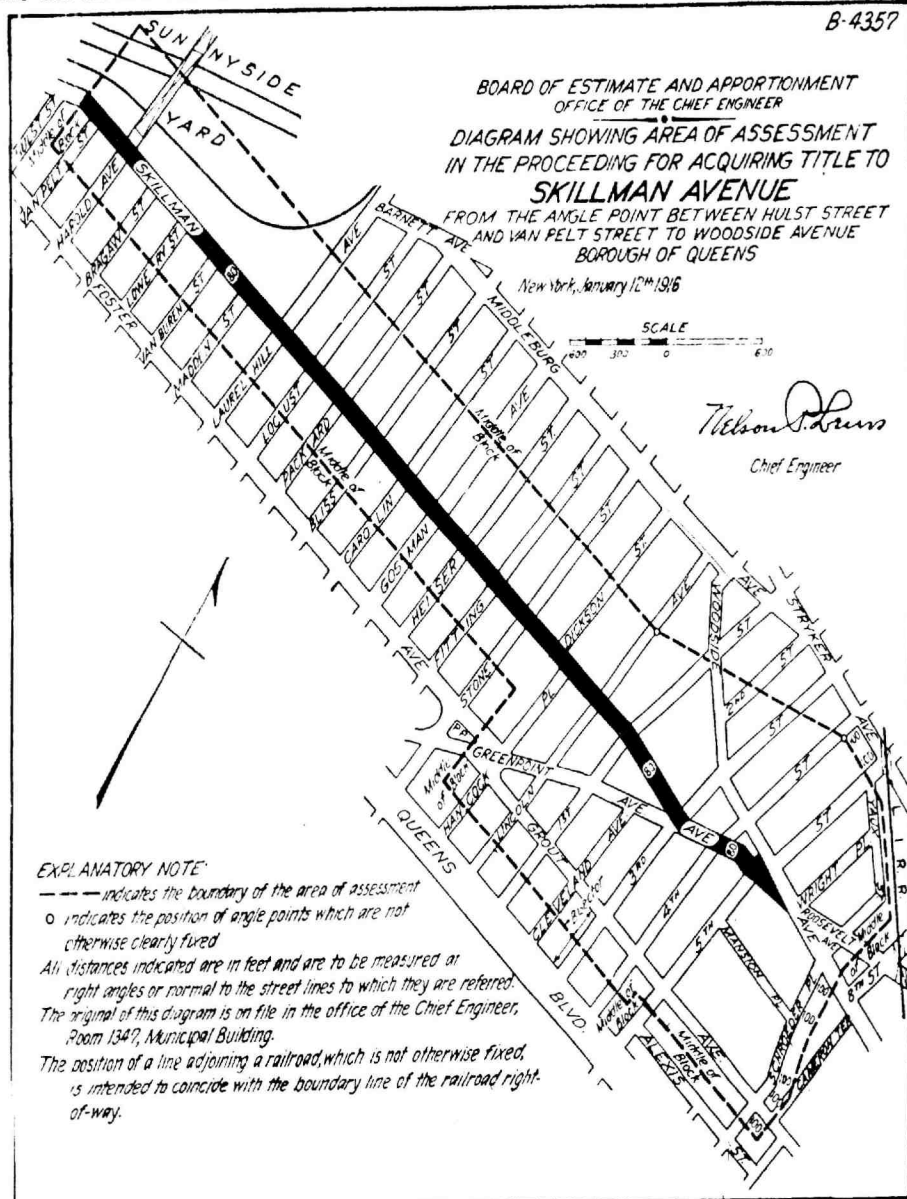

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass pipe in the main water line in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam hoies, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions, shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon be vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and he it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
