(2) Knowledge: Thorough knowledge of the history and development of foreign and domestic public pension funds, their organization, requirements and defects. thorough understanding of the purpose, plan and scope of pension and retirement systems, public and private, with the requisite capacity to frame a sound pension plan and to provide for its proper administration.

Candidates must be at least 25 years of age on the closing date for the receipt of applications.

There is one vacancy in the Commission on Pensions at \$3,600 per annum. An increase in the rate of compensation is contemplated, within the salary limits

The requirement that every application shall bear the certificates of four reputable citizens whose residences or places of business are within the City of New York is waived for applicants for this examination whose previous occupation or employment has been wholly or in part outside the City of New York, and the said certificates will be accepted from persons resident or engaged in business elsewhere.

The subjects and weights of the examination are: Duties, 5; 70% required. Experience, 5: 70% required.

A qualifying physical examination will be given. Candidates failing to pass the physical test will not be summoned for the mental test.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form C. Duties: The duties of a Superintendent of Garage which involve supervision of the entire Municipal Garage system are to render prompt automobile service to city departments, to be responsible for the operation, care and maintenance of the garage and automobiles, to direct the work of the drivers, mechanics and others and to order and properly store all supplies and accessories.

Requirements: Candidates must present evidence of at least three years' experience in an executive position, such as manager or superintendent of garage or of traffic for taxicab or transportation companies or in related work, requiring active supervision over a large force of drivers, mechanics and other subordinates, or the equivalent of such experience. Candidates must have a thorough knowledge of the methods of caring for and maintaining a considerable amount of garage and motor equipment.

Candidates must be not less than 21 nor more than 50 years of age on the closing date for the receipt of applications.

The salary is \$3,000 per annum and there is one vacancy in the Department of Bridges.

The term of the eligibility of the list resulting from this examination is fixed at not less than one year nor more than four years.

Y. Whereas, the said proposed revision of Rule
375 of the Industrial Code was duly submitted to the Industrial Council for their consideration

Whereas, the Industrial Council duly considered the said proposed revision of Rule 375 of the Industrial Code at a regular meeting held at the Capitol, Albany, on May 10, 1916, and duly advised the Industrial Commission with re-

gard thereto;

Be it resolved by the Industrial Commission,
State of New York, that Rule 375 of the Industrial Code, relating to fire alarm signal systems of factory buildings be and the same hereby is amended and adopted as so amended so as to read as follows:

#### Rule 375. General.

All devices and equipment constructed and installed under these specifications shall conform to the requirements of the State Industrial Commission.

The Fire Commissioner in the City of New York and the State Industrial Commission in all other parts of the State are designated by law as the supervising authorities.
Full information as required by the supervising authorities shall be furnished the supervising au-

thorities and approved by them before the installation is begun. All systems to be installed in a workmanlike

manner and in accordance with the requirements of the supervising authority, but not inconsistent with these specifications.

Fire alarm installations heretofore made in

New York City and approved by the Fire De-partment of said city shall be accepted by the State Industrial Commission. Other installations heretofore made may be accepted in the discre-tion of the State Industrial Commission, upon

formal application for such approval.

Systems other than those specified herein may be accepted by the State Industrial Commission when after examination such systems are found reliable and workable in a manner satisfactory to

the State Industrial Commission.

All material shall be rigidly secured in position, and when attached to masonry walls shall be properly fastened by through bolts, metal expensions. be properly fastened by through bolts, metal expansion shields or toggle bolts. Wooden plugs shall not be accepted. When deemed necessary by the supervising authority to mount fire alarm sending alarm apparatus upon a back board, such back board shall be not less than seven-eighths of an inch (%") in thickness, filled with a non-absorptive compound with an air space of at least one. tive compound with an air space of at least one-quarter of an inch (4") behind the back board for the free circulation of air.

There shall be a Board of Approval to consist

of two representatives of the State Industrial Commission, to be designated by it, one of whom shall be a deputy commissioner from the Bureau of Industrial Code; and a representative of the Fire Commissioner of the City of New York, to be designated by him.

The Board of Approval shall pass upon all devices and apparatus for use in approved installations. Such Board of Approval shall submit reports to the State Industrial Commission for consideration and final approval.

Tests. The owner or contractor shall, upon the completion of the fire alarm system, make a satisfactory test of the entire equipment in the pres-

Guarantee. (Recommended.)
It is suggested that the entire system, include ing all alarm boxes, signals, wiring, batteries, bells, whistles, horns and other devices, shall be guaranteed against any defects in material, workmanship or operation for a period of two years from the day of acceptance by the supervising authority; any defects which may develop in the equipment during this period to be remedied by the contractor without expense to the owner. It is recommended that contracts for installation of systems contain a clause stating that the final payment shall be withheld until acceptance by the supervising authority.

Equipment. Approved fire alarm equipment is manufac-Approved fire alarm equipment is manufactured by and can be procured from the leading manufacturers and electrical supply jobbers in the principal cities. Manufacturers must submit to the State Industrial Commission, for general approval, samples of their devices and equipment constructed for use under these requirements. Apparatus so submitted and approved shall again be subject to inspection upon installation and shall be rejected if working unsatisfactorily or if different from the sample submitted for general approval.

Accessories.

Accessories. Automatically operated circuit breakers and engine stops for shutting down machinery in extremely noisy or hazardous premises may be required, connected with and made a part of the fire alarm system, but in no case shall such circuit breakers or engine store be installed in such a manner as to cut off the power for lighting current or for operating elevators.

Approval of Systems.

Systems shall be approved as follows:

Class A—For installation in buildings not exceeding four stories in height, occupied by not more than one factory tenant, in which not more than one hundred persons are employed above

class B—For installation in buildings not exceeding six stories in height, occupied by not more than one factory tenant, in which not more than one hundred and fifty persons are employed

above the ground floor.

Class C—For installation in all buildings not specified under Classes A and B. (Note—Class C system may be installed in any building.)

Where a building is divided by fire walls, each section may, in the discretion of the supervising authority, be deemed a separate building for the numbers of these requirements. purposes of these requirements.

Description of Systems.

Class A—Whistles, bells, gongs or horns, mechanically or electrically, automatically or manually operated from all floors, and sufficient in number and size to be clearly audible to all occupants under conditions which prevail when the factory is in full operation. Where electrically operated the systems must conform to the requirements for Class B and C installations,

Class B—Open circuit electric systems with
gongs or horns and sending stations on all floors,
not necessarily sending coded rounds of signals.

The methods of construction and the materials
used shall be in accordance with the requirements for Class C systems, except as they aprly
to sending stations, gong and supervisory apparatus.

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Class C—Systems employing boxes and signaling devices giving rounds of signals, and operating entirely on closed circuits.

For all closed circuits.—The system shall be so constructed and maintained to make it possible to have a current flow of at least 50 per cent, in excess of the minimum current capable of transmitting a fire alarm signal; a weaker current to constantly supervise each closed eight. current to constantly supervise each closed circuit may be permitted under conditions acceptable to the Board of Arproval.

A milliammeter or other approved current indicator shall be provided in every closed circuit.

With Class C.—When an alarm has been sent in from any one of the alarm boxes, all the signal of the shall be sent to the signal of naling devices on the various floors of the building shall automatically sound the number indi-cating the floor from which the alarm was sent at least four times.

The fire alarm system shall not be used for any other purpose, except that daily exit signals may be given on it if approved by the supervising authorities.

All alarm boxes, relay boxes and alarm box enclosing cases shall be finished in red to distinguish them from other signaling apparatus.

A trouble bell shall be provided in connection with each closed circuit, to ring continuously in case of weak batteries or an opening of the circuit. The bell, which shall be of an approved design of the vibrating type, must be placed in the engine room or other approved central point. At least four cells of open circuit battery of approved make and type shall be provided for the bell. The bell and battery shall connect with the contacts of a relay having its magnet windings in series with each closed circuit.

The armatures of all relays shall primarily depend on gravity for their operation, but opera-tion may be assisted by springs if approved by the Board of Approval. Maintenance.

The system shall be tested every morning immediately after the hour of starting work in the building to insure the system being in an operative condition. Daily dismissal signals, if permitted, shall not

take the place of the test specified above.

Each sending station shall be operated at least once every month to prove that mechanical and electrical equipment is in perfect working order. The use of the system for drill purposes may constitute a test of those parts of the system actually used.

All apparatus requiring winding shall be rewound after each operation and kept in normal condition. A complete record shall be kept of the monthly tests and of all drills, which record will be subject to inspection by the supervising authority, or

kept clear. Sufficient sending stations shall be installed so that no point on any floor shall be more than 100 feet from the nearest sending sta-

tion on that floor. Class A.—Where signal devices are operated mechanically, substantial cabinets of ample size shall enclose the operating mechanism. All operating devices shall be of metal and shall be protected against corrosion and mechanical injury. The "pull" required at any sending station to operate system shall not exceed twenty-five (25) pounds. The operating mechanism shall have a factor of safety of not less than ten (10) hased upon the maximum strain to which any part of the mechanism may be subjected. When pull wires or chains are used they shall be enclosed in rigid conduit. All pulleys, springs, cranks, expansion joints, and other vital parts of the system shall be placed in readily accessible position for inspection.

The conduit system shall be permanently and All current carrying parts shall be insulated from parts of opposite or lower polarities in an approved manner, only approved insulating ma-terials being used. The metal case enclosing the movement shall conform to the requirements for Class C stations, except where inconsistent. Switches when used to transmit signals shall be constructed so as positively to break circuits at one hundred per cent. greater than the normal

operating voltage.

Class C.—Boxes shall be of an approved type and make and may be operated by a lever or by breaking glass. The box should be so designed that when once started the proper transmission of a complete set of signals cannot be interfered with by manipulation of its starting devices. Each box shall be arranged to send a detinite code of signals to indicate the floor or portion of same on which it is located. Not less than three taps or blasts shall be sounded at each revolution of the break wheel.

Whenever fire alarm boxes are made a part of a system in which electro-mechanical gongs are employed, break wheels should be so designed that the signal duration shall be not less than one-half second with silent interval of not less than one-half second between signals, except between numbers consisting of two or more digits and silent period between rounds.

Lever boxes, except succession boxes, shall be designed to automatically wind when lever is pulled from alarm. All parts of the mechanism shall be of the best grade and workmanship. Contact points operated by a break wheel and contact points on testing devices shall be of rlatinum, silver, or other approved material, and shall be of the scraping type. All current carrying parts shall be properly insulated. All contact points shall be secured in a substantial manner to phosphor bronze springs. The contacts shall be so constructed as to positively break a circuit carrying one-tenth ampere at voltage of 250 volts under actual working con ditions. All stations shall be provided with means of testing, comprising arrangements to make such tests without operating the break wheel of the box. Provision shall also be made for a silent test of the box mechanism without operating the signaling devices. The testing device shall be of a design which will prevent any person except those in authority from operating same. Testing devices must be so designed as to prevent the possibility of box being left inoperative.

There shall be a metal case enclosing the move-

ment completely and made dustproof as far as possible for the use of gaskets or other suitable means. The metal case shall be drilled and tapped to receive standard conduit at top and bottom. All pull box cases shall be fitted with a glass panel or a door which can readily be opened, so constructed as to protect the pull lever against accidental injury and on which a handle is rigidly secured. The wording, "In case of fire open door and pull down lever as far as it will go," or equivalent instructions must appear on the door. If used in exposed places the box shall be exclused in a suitable weather roof outer shall be enclosed in a suitable weather roof outer shell. Approved types of break-glass boxes will he acceptable with no additional protection, except where made necessary by weather con-ditions; and all break-glass type fire alarm boxes shal be provided with suitable hammers on chains which shall be attached to or near the boxes so that the glass can readily be broken. All break-glass boxes shall have lettered on the fronts the words, "Fire Alarm—In Case of Fire Break glass." All boxes requiring glass replacements shall be so arranged that replacements cannot be made until the mechanism is reset for another alarm.

#### Signaling Devices. General.

Signaling devices may consist of bells, gongs, whistles, or horns, of approved type, or other devices acceptable to the Board of Approval. For all electrically operated systems. There shall be installed on each floor of the building

one or more alarm devices, sufficient in number and efficiency to be plainly heard throughout the floor, above the noise of the machinery and other sounds. Where floors are divided by fire walls each section may in the discretion of the supervising authority by december 2 for the purposes of these requirements. Systems consisting of several types of sounding apparatus should be avoided. The number of signal devices on a circuit may be limited at the discretion of the supervising authority.

Class A.—Whistles, bells, gongs, and horns shall be of approved type, and shall be placed at accessible points. When placed on exterior of building approval must be secured from super-

vising authority.

The reliability of steam or air supply shall be demonstrated to the satisfaction of the supervis-

ing authority.

For all electrically operated systems. All signaling devices shall be of an approved type and the movement enclosed in a dustproof metal casing insulated from all current-carrying parts. Where conditions require it damp-proof casings shall be installed. Signaling devices shall be placed with their lowest parts about eight feet from floor. Wherever there is danger of mechanical injury, the entire device shall be enclosed in a protecting case made of approved wire net-ting or perforated metal. This casing shall be insulated from all current-carrying parts, but grounded to conduit.

Magnet windings shall be impregnated with an insulating moisture repelling compound or shall be of enameled wire. All internal connections must be properly protected, securely made, and where subject to motion to be of standard flexible wire with substantial insulation. Binding posts shall be of such a character that wire is held between two flat surfaces; posts employing a set screw the end of which is used to pinch or

bind the wire will not be accepted.

Gongs shall be of a high grade of cast bell metal or other approved material.

Adjustments must be of such a character that they can be securely locked in an approved man-

ner.

Contact points shall be ample in area, not only to take care of current used in operation, but to insure long life, and shall be of pure silver, rlatinum, or other approved material.

Wherever necessary hammer rod shall be suitably protected against mechanical injury or de-rangement by the use of a guard or other suit-

Relays.

All relays shall be of an approved type and make. Magnet windings sall be impregnated with an insulating moisture repelling compound or shall be of an enameled wire. All relays shall be enclosed in an approved metal case under lock and key and located where there is

no danger of sparking contacts igniting inflammable gases or flyings.

Relays shall be mounted where they will be least affected by vibration in the building, and in no case shall they be mounted on the same back board with sounding apparatus, or so that they will be affected by the vibration caused by such sounding apparatus, and shall be marked plainly with the maximum and minimum operat-

safely respond. Wiring. The following methods of and materials for the wiring of the system will be approved: All conductors shall be run in approved metallic conduits, except that armored cable may be less than 300 ampere hours' capacity.

In vertical risers no splices will be permitted. All splices shall be made secure, electrically and be soldered without the use of mechanically, and be soldered without the use of an acid flux, and insulated with rubber and fric-tion tape. All splices shall be in junction or terminal boxes.

No conductor of less than fourteen (14) B. & S. gauge nor having a rubber insulation wall of less than 3-64" thick will be approved. Multiple conductor cables not complying with the above requirements shall be subject to special

approval.

Where wires pass from one building to another the enclosed in conduiting the enclosed in the enclosed in conduiting th

where where has been bounding to another underground, they must be euclosed in conduit between buildings, and lead encased.

Wires between buildings when not run in conduit must be at least equivalent in conductivity and tensile strength to No. 12 B. & S. copper for box and signaling circuits. They must be supported at least every Seventy five feet on approved glass insulators and brackets. As far as possible they should be run under rather than over electric light or power wires and be provided with safety devices in accordance with the National Electrical Code rules.

Sources of Electrical Energy. The following sources of energy may b employed:

 Storage Batteries.
 Electric light and power systems (public service or isolated plants), voltage not to exceed 250.

3. Primary batteries.

Duplicate sources of energy shall be provided for all electrically operated systems when required by the supervising authority.

Storage Batteries.
Storage batteries may be employed if under

competent supervision and equipped with reliable charging and controlling devices. The following rules apply to such installations:

A sufficient number of storage cells shall be provided in battery to secure maximum efficiency in operation, the required number in each in stallation to be approved by the supervising au

Complete details of installation may be filed in duplicate for approval before the installation is

Storage batteries shall be of approved make and type. Each set of batteries to be capable of maintaining the system efficiently for three

days without recharging.

Storage batteries shall be installed in an approved manner in properly ventilated protecting cabinets and wherever possible shall be placed in a room separate from that containing othe fire alarm apparatus. If these batteries are placed in a separate room with proper ventilation and where they will not be subject to mechanical injury, protecting cabinets will not be required.

The battery in service shall not be disconnected from the fire alarm system during working

hours in a factory.

A difference of potential of more than one hundred and fifteen (115) volts will not be allowed on working circuits of storage battery systems when the current flow at any time through any part of the system is more than one am-

A full description of the operation of each system, together with instructions for its proper care and maintenance, must be posted in a conspicuous place and in a substantial manner near point where the person in charge of the system

The potential of the charging circuits shall not be over 250 volts and these circuits shall be installed in compliance with the rules of the National Electrical Code.

Charging Boards.

For direct current. A main double pole, National Electrical Code, fused-knife switch of proper capacity arranged for enclosed National Electrical Code fuses, except that fuses of onehalf ampere capacity or less need not be enclosed if properly guarded. These fuses to be approximately 10 per cent. in excess of maximum charging rate of batteries.

Underload circuit breaker of approved type.

Volt meter.

Ammeter, arranged to read charging rate. Milliammeter, arranged to read current flow through closed circuit or circuits.

Double throw switch for changing from onset of batteries to the other, so arranged that the working circuits cannot be opened during the process of shifting.

Double pole, double throw charging switch.
Fixed Resistance—Fixed resistance units approved by the Board of Approval shall be provided, one in each leg of the charging circuit of such a value as the operating conditions may warrant, but in no case shall the charging rate be in excess of two-thirds of the normal charging rate of the storage cells unless a variable charging rate is required. (See Variable Resistance.)
Variable Resistance—One-third of the total

resistance to be used shall be fixed in each leg of the charging circuit, and the balance provided with approved shifting device for varying the charging rate; the medium resistance to be such that the batteries cannot be charged in excess of their normal charging rate. Resistance in any case shall not unduly heat. Each circuit shall be provided with fuses of a capacity 50 per cent. in excess of the combined charging rate.

Motor Generators—Motor generators of suitable capacity and standard decign may be used and

capacity and standard design may be used, and when used shall be installed in accordance with National Electrical Code rules and a proper field regulator provided in addition to regular switchboard equipment referred to above, except that resistance in charging circuit will not be required. For Alterating Current—When only alternating current is available in connection with storage battery installations, approved motor generator or rectifying sets with necessary transformer, National Electrical Code standard, shall be provided, together with approved switchboard equip-ment. Note.—Rectifiers may be installed only where they will be under competent supervision. When electrolytic rectifiers of a type and design bearing the approval of the State Industrial Commission are employed, a reserve set of electrodes and charge of salts shall always be on hand.

Electric Light and Power System.

(Public service or isolated plant.)
Supplemented by a storage battery and private (isolated) plant as preferred source.

Supplemented by public service lines.
Systems of this character are special, and complete details of installation shall be submitted for approval to the State Industrial Commission.

Primary Batteries. The battery on the closed circuit shall be ample in size to satisfactorily operate the system and there shall be provided not less than four cells in reserve, complete but not charged. The battery shall be of approved type and of not

The voltage on any circuit where primary batteries are used shall not exceed 40. (The working voltage of approved closed circuit cells is .65 per ceil.)

All batteries shall be coupled together by means of approved type battery connectors.

All batteries shall be placed in a substantial protecting cabinet, elevated not less than six inches nor more than five feet above the floor, located in a clean, dry and cool place, and where the temperature will not be less than 40 degrees Fahrenheit nor more than 100 degrees Fahrenheit.

Main battery cabinets shall be so constructed that the condition of the elements may be observed without disturbing the cells.

When caustic soda batteries are used, approved

heat resisting jars are preferred, and at least one transparent jar shall be used in each series for the purpose of observing the condition of the elements. Battery Cabinets.

Metal.—Shall be of approved type, constructed of sheet iron or steel, not less than No. 14 gauge, properly reinforced by 1-inch angle iron. Doors shall be of self-closing and provided with approved lock and key.

Cabinet shall be provided with wood shelves

not less than 16-inch thick and properly fastened and secured to prevent sagging.

The interior and the exterior of the cabinet shall be painted with three coats of asphaltum

compound, each coat to be thoroughly dry before the next is applied; or baked enamel will be accepted in lieu thereof.

Wood.—Battery cabinets shall be constructed of the first grade of kiln dried wood not less than 1/2 inch thick. Cabinet shall be provided with two self-closing doors and approved lock. Shelves shall be not less than 1/2 inch thick, properly fastened and secured to prevent sagging.
All parts shall be properly fitted and cabinet shall be of substantial construction.

Cabinet shall be painted on the interior with three coats of asphaltum compound and on the exterior with three coats of lead paint or two coats of varnish.

Cabinet shall be thoroughly ventilated.

For All Other Types of Cells.

All provisions of the specifications for battery cabinets for lead storage cells shall apply for all other types of cells, except that the painting or enameling may be omitted.

Where dry cells are housed in metal battery

cabinets, the supports for same shall be so con-structed that it will be impossible for the cells to come in contact with the metal of the cabinet. In all cases where dry cells are used provision shall be made to prevent their cartons for coming

in contact with each other.

"The three (3) tracks hereby authorized across Farmers avenue shall be constructed and maintained over and above the surface of such avenue in the manner and subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter nam

'(a) The Company shall construct a bridge of sufficient width and capacity to accommodate the three (3) tracks hereby authorized, and also the two (2) main line tracks of the Company now laid and existing across Farmers avenue on the surface thereof, carrying said Farmers avenue under said bridge at the width shown on the tentative plan for this territory, and upon the completion of said bridge, shall remove from the surface of said Farmers avenue, the three (3) unauthorized tracks and the said two (2) main line tracks now constructed thereon, and shall thereafter maintain

Whereas, The Company has stated its willingness and intention to surrender any and all rights acquired by it pursuant to the aforesaid resolution of the Board of Aldermen, except so far as they may include permission to construct, maintain and operate conduits, pipes and appur tenances within the limits of the West Wash ington Market and in such portions only of the streets outside the limits of the market as may be necessary to connect the refrigeration system in the market with the Company's plant. Now, therefore, In consideration of the prem-

ises and of the mutual covenants and agree-

ments herein contained, the parties hereto do covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The permission granted to the Greenwich Refrigerating Company by resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 1, 1890, and approved by the Mayor April 8, 1890, and approved by the Mayor April 8, 1890, and subsequently acquired by the Company, authorizing the construction, maintenance and operation of pipes for refrigeration purposes in the streets and passages intersecting the West Washington Market and certain streets, avenues and high-ways of the City outside the market, as set forth and specified in the aforesaid resolution is hereby surrendered by the Company to take effect on and after the first day of August, 1916, the Company reserving and retaining to itself, how-ever, the right by said resolution granted, to construct, maintain and operate pipes for re-frigeration purposes in the streets and passages intersecting the West Washington Market, bounded by Tenth Avenue and West Street, Thirteenth Avenue, Gansevoort and Bloomfield Streets, and in the streets or portions thereof immediately adjoining the said market, as fol-

Bloomfield Street between the westerly line of Thirteenth Avenue and the easterly line of Tenth Avenue, West Street and that portion of Tenth Avenue between the northerly line of Bloomfield Street and the northerly line Horatio Street, which lies outside of the district described in Section 2 of this contract; Gansevoort Street between the easterly line of West Street and the westerly line of Thirteenth Avenue; Thirteenth Avenue between the southerly line of Gansevoort Street and the northerly line of Bloomfield Street;

northerly line of Bloomneid Street; subject to all the rights and obligations im-posed upon the Company and upon its use of said streets and passages and to all the rights of the City contained in the said resolution of April 1, 1890, and with the reservation above noted. the aforesaid resolution of the Board of Alder-men and the permission contained therein, is herein and hereby agreed and declared to be, and the same shall be null, void and of no effect on and after said first day of August, 1916, and with the said reservation the Company hereby releases and forever quit-claims to the City on and after the said first day of August, 1916, any and all rights and privileges granted by or con tained in the aforesaid resolution.

It is further agreed that nothing in this con-tract contained shall be construed as to effect, impair or lessen the right or obligation of the Company as contained in the aforesaid resolution of the Board of Aldermen and in the aforesaid maintain or operate its pipes in the streets or passages intersecting West Washington Market, bounded as aforesaid, or in the streets or por-tions thereof described in this section immediately adjoining said market.

Section 2. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provi sions hereinafter set forth, the right and privi lege to construct, maintain and operate conduits and pipes with the necessary branches and ex-tensions therefrom leading directly into private property for the sole purpose of supplying rerefrigeration to consumers, provided that such conduits shall not be of greater outside dimensions, including insulation and other covering,

than as follows:
Main line conduits, 35 inches by 20 inches. Branch and Service line conduits, 30 inches by 18 inches.

The conduits and pipes hereby authorized shall be constructed only beneath the surface of the streets and only in, through, along or across such streets, avenues and highways as are included within the following described district in the Borough of Manhattan

ject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said conduits shall be held and en-

joyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from August 1, 1916, with the privi lege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the company shall determine to exercise its

privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the company and the Board shall not reach

such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as

shall be determined by three disinterested per-sons selected in the following manner: One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested person, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of the original term of this contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company each paying one-half there-

Second-The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:
(a) The sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000)

During the second term of five years, an annual sum which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than four hundred dollars

(\$490), During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than six hundred dollars (\$600). The gross receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts of the Company or any subsidiary of the Company or of any purchaser of refrigeration from the Company for purpose of resale from all business of furnishing refrigera-tion to consumers except those located in West Washington Market.

(c) An annual payment for each linear foot of conduit constructed within the limits of the streets under the franchise hereby granted (excepting, however, such conduits as are con-structed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business) as follows:

For conduits of outside dimensions, including insulation and other covering, not exceeding 30 inches by 18 inches-twenty-five cents

For conduits of outside dimensions, including insulation and other covering, exceeding 30 inches by 18 inches—but not exceeding 35 inches by 20 inches—thirty cents (30c).

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for

each manhole constructed within the limits of the streets under the franchise hereby granted. The annual charges shall commence on August

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31, next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between August 1, 1916, and December 31, 1916, shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third-The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this con-tract (whether original or renewal) notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for refrigerating rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof or of any of the streets, avenues or highways in-cluded within the district herein described or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the of the assignee or lessee that the same is sublease shall contain a covenant on the part ject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter and that it will not claim by reason thereof or other-wise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the same streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City included within the district hereinbe-

Fifth-The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes re-lating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents Sixth—Upon the termination of the original term of this contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term or upon the termination or forfeiture of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the conduits, pipes and appurtenances of the company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any pur pose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets, avenues, high-ways and other property of the City shall be restored to their original condition at the sole

cost and expense of the Company.

Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth-All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said conduit lines, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the street in which the Company is hereby author-

ized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage of drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City, re-quired on account of the construction or operation of the conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth-It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction or maintenance of public works in the streets, avenues, highways and other property of the City, wherether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits and appurtenances in the

manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all revenent which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for repairing

of the conduit line and its appurtenances.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall at its own expenses of the company shall at its own expenses.

Thirteenth—The Company shall, at its own ex-rense, remove from beneath the surface of Tenth Avenue the unused conduits, pipes and appur-tenances now existing therein from a point at or near the southerly line of Bloomfield Street to a point at or near the southerly line of 14th Street, as shown by the hatched broken black line on the map hereto attached. The work of removal shall be done whenever the street is being repaved and within such reasonable time as may be fixed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and under his supervision. In case of the Company's failure to comply with the above provision, the Borough President shall remove the conduits, pipes and appurtenances at the Com-

pany's expense.

Fourteenth—The Company shall cause a test fourteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes to be contained within the conduits hereby authorized whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300)

pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fifteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates for refrigeration to be furnished to have properly insulated.

ation to be furnished to boxes properly insulated at a temperature of not lower than 32 degrees

Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet.

Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1.500 cubic feet,

One (1) per cent. per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over.

These rates to apply to boxes located not above the first floor of any building.

During the term of this contract the Board

shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum and minimum rates for all refrigeration, and the Company agrees to abide by such rates provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Sixteenth-The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corpora-tion whose premises are located within the district within which the Company is hereby authorized to operate, shall extend its conduits to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at rates not exceeding those herein prescribed or hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided, on condition that before any such extension shall be made, such person, firm or corporation shall agree, in writing, to accept and pay for such service for a reasonable time not exceeding one (1) year. The Company shall not be required, however, to furnish refrigeration to applicants before October 1, 1916, nor to applicants whose premises are located above the first floor of any biulding.

Seventeenth—A correct map shall be furnished to the Board by the Company on the first day of February, 1917, showing the exact location of all conduit lines and manholes constructed, with reference to the street lines, the curb lines and the street surface, together with a statement of the total length of such conduit, On the same date of each succeeding year, during the term of this contract, a supplementary map shall be furnished the Board showing all con-

duits laid during the preceding year.

Eighteenth—The conduit lines hereby authorized shall be used only by The Manhattan Refrigerating Company, and for no other pur-

pose than supplying refrigeration.

Nineteenth—The Company shall submit a verified report to the Board not later than February 1, in each year, for the year ending December 31, next preceding, and at any other time, upon the request of the Board, which shall state:

the Board Twentieth-The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross re-ceipts from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of The City of New York of the business done by the Company for the the year ending December 31 next preceding, as he may pre-scribe. Such report shall contain the total number of feet of each kind of conduit laid and of manholes constructed, the number of feet of each kind of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business ber of feet of each kind of conduit laid and of manholes constructed, the number of feet of each kind of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the

correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-first—In case of any violation or

breach or failure to comply with any of the pro-visions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the conduits constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity.

Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forth-

Twenty-second-If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at rates not exceed-ing those herein or hereafter fixed, or fail to maintain its conduits and appurtenances as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such conduits or appurtenances which may affect the surface of the street shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided

Twenty-third-The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the conduits authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to ray by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twenty-fourth—This grant is upon the express

condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of Two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at rates not exceeding those herein or hereafter fixed, the removal of unused conduits and pipes, the restoration and repairs of the street pavement and the mainte-nance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Com-pany; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any notice or direction of the Board, or other municipal officials, given or made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, the Company shall (except where other sums are fixed by this contract) pay to the City the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100), for each violation as liquidated damages for such failure, which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the liquidated damages provided for in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be required to pay such liquidated damages in accordance with the foregoing provisions. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of A'dermen, head of a department, clief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surrety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates or in any porton of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
