MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York
Held Wednesday, March 20, 1918, at 10:30 A. M.

Present—Morris Cukor and William Drennan, Commissioners. Commissioner Cukor presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of clause 8 of Rule XV by adding thereto a new subdivision to be known as subdivision "f" and to read as follows:

(f) The Commission may extend eligibility for examination for promotion to positions in grade 4 of Part II, Group 5, Court Positions, to persons who shall have served at least three years in positions in Part VI (The Attendance Service), where the Commission shall find that the duties of the positions held by such persons are such as naturally and properly fit them to perform the duties of the position to which they seek promotion as fully as do the duties of persons otherwise eligible under these rules. There were no appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held February 27 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That clause 8 of Rule XV (Promotion) of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following:

"(f) The Commission may extend eligibility for examination for promotion to positions in Grade 4 of Part II, Group 5, Court Positions, to persons who shall have served at least three years in positions in Part VI (The Attendance Service), where the Commission shall find that the duties of the positions held by such persons are such as naturally and properly fit them to perform the duties of the position to which they seek promotion as fully as do the duties of persons otherwise eligible under these rules."

On the recommendation of the Acting Chief Examiner, in a report dated March 22, it was

Resolved, That the competitive eligible list of Junior Draftsman, grade 3, be and the same is hereby promulgated, subject to future investigation.

Reports were presented from the Acting Chief Examiner as follows:

Dated March 14, submitting a statement of examinations held during the month of February, 1918. The report was ordered filed.

Dated March 19, relative to a report dated March 18, from the Application Clerk, recommending that a special examination for Alienist, grade 3, be accorded to Dr. Daniel H. Arthur, who did not receive his notice to appear for examination because, through error, his change of address from 73 Hamilton pl., White Plains, N. Y., to Easton Sanitarium, Easton, Pa., had not been noted. The matter was referred to the Secretary.

Dated March 12, forwarding communication from 19 Dockmasters who had been requested to give their reasons for waiving their rights to enter the examination for promotion to Superintendent of Docks, Department of Docks and Ferries, and recommending that the examination proceed as ordered, it appearing from the communications referred to that the candidates in good faith did not desire to compete.

The recommendations were adopted.

Reports were presented from Assistant Chief Examiner Fuld as follows: (8-372) dated February 4, stating that because George A. Michel, 1128 Findlay ave., Bronx, had placed the wrong index number on his preliminary card, his examination for promotion to Sergeant, Police Department, was credited to Walter S. Sargent, 262 50th st., Bklyn., who had not competed in the examination. The Secretary was instructed to summon both candidates before the Commission at its next regular meeting.

(S-399) dated March 12, relative to the complaint of John F. Kelly, 602 Prospect ave., Bklyn., that he had lost twenty minutes by a delay in the distribution of the question sheets on Administration in the examination for promotion to Sergeant, Police Department. The Secretary was instructed to summon the candidate before the Commission at its next regular meeting.

(Y-176) dated March 20, forwarding the application of John K. Brbakry, Lenox ave., and 36th st., Manhattan, for employment under the provisions of clause 11 of Rule XVIII, as Chef in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals with compensation at the rate of \$720 per annum with maintenance. The report stated that the applicant was an enemy alien. The Secretary was instructed to request the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals to appear before the Commission at its next regular meeting in connection with this matter, and also in connection with his communication under date of March 12, relative to the employment of Mrs. L. J. Hammond to give French lessons to Nurses.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6a of Rule XII of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Morris Adler, 283 Nichols ave., Bklyn., be and he is hereby excepted from examination to furnish information as to conveyances, auction sales, etc., in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, to the Department of Taxes and Assessments from time to time; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed \$750 in any one year.

Dated Jan. 21 from Bellevue and Allied Hospitals requesting approval of the vouchers of Elizabeth Dunn in the amount of \$33; Segrid Ljungren in the amount of \$33; Helen Bunner in the amount of \$42, and Mary Parkson in the amount of \$15, for services as special Nurses. The Secretary was instructed to certify the vouchers under the provisions of clause 8 of Rule XII.

Dated March 11 and 12 from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity submitting vouchers in favor of the Addressograph Company, 740 Broadway, for the services of graphotype operators from Dec. 17, 1917, to Dec. 31, 1917, in the amount of \$26, and from Jan. 1 to Feb. 13, 1918, in the amount of \$74. The Secretary was instructed to certify the vouchers under the provisions of clause 6a of Rule XII.

Dated March 15 from the Office of the President, Borough of Manhattan, requesting the Commission to note on its records the rescission of the resignation on March 31 of Murray D. A communication dated March 14 was presented from the Acting Corporation Counsel in response to the Commission's request, under date of March 14, for an opinion as to whether when a Sergeant in the uniformed force of the Police Department is reduced to the rank of Patrolman and is subsequently restored to the rank of Sergeant by the Police Commission, in accordance with the provisions of section 1543-a of the New York Charter, such member of the uniformed force is entitled to have the whole of his time between such reduction and such restoration counted on his time of service as Sergeant, irrespective of whether the Police Commissioner incorporates a statement to that effect in the order of restoration, or whether he is entitled to have his time counted only if the Police Commissioner specifically so directs in his order of restoration. The opinion stated that "upon a member of the Police Force being restored to the rank from which he was reduced, pursuant to the provisions of said section 1543-a of the Charter, he will not be entitled to count the time while he was serving in the position to which he was reduced, as if served in the higher position, unless the Police Commissioner, in restoring him to the position from which he was reduced orders that such time may be counted."

A communication dated March 16 was presented from the Corporation Counsel in response to the Commission's request under date of Jan. 25 for an opinion in connection with the demand of Robert W. Belcher, under date of Jan. 21, for the difference between his salary as Secretary of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, namely, \$5,000 per annum, and his pay as First Lieutenant, Ordnance R. C., namely, \$2,000 per annum, due him from January 1, 1918, under the provisions of chapter 435 of the Laws of 1917, and the terms of the leave of absence granted him at a meeting of the Commission held Oct. 3, 1917. The opinion of the Corporation Counsel stated that "a person engaged in military service must be treated as if present and performing services, and if he occupies a position from which he may be removed in the pleasure of the appropriate superior officer or board, and such superior officer or board would not ordinarily retain him in the service (not for the reason, however, that he is absent on military duty) his services may be dispensed with. * * * If you dispense with the services of Mr. Belcher you should notify him to that effect and have the proper notations made in the records of your Commission." The President was requested to forward the following communication to Mr. Belcher:

"Referring to your letter of Jan. 21, 1918, I am directed by the Commission to advise you that your services were dispensed with and terminated on Jan. 1, 1918, and your successor was duly elected and qualified on that date."

The Secretary was instructed to note on the records: That Elizabeth Macklin, a Nurse in the Health Department, had changed her name, through marriage, to Elizabeth Byrnes; that Marjorie K.
