# Special Guest Commissioner's Corner



**Paul Rush**, DEP's Deputy Commissioner for the Bureau of Water Supply, is a guest commentator this week.

When I meet with elected leaders and watershed residents in the Catskills, some of their most enthusiastic comments about DEP are related to our recreational boating program. When you venture out onto our reservoirs in a kayak or canoe, it's easy to understand why visitors

and outdoor enthusiasts have come to love this program. It offers an absolutely unique experience for those who want to enjoy the scenic beauty of the Catskills.

It's an experience that more and more people are taking advantage of. This week, we announced that our recreational boating program attracted 1,463 visits in 2015, an all-time high for the program that marks the largest year-over-year increase

in participation since it began in 2012. That number topped last year's 1,182 visits, representing an increase of roughly 24 percent.

For those who are hearing about this program for the first time, recreational boating is allowed at our non-terminal reservoirs in the Catskills: Cannonsville. Neversink. Pepacton and Schoharie. The season runs from Memorial Day to Columbus Day each year. Participants can use kayaks, canoes, small sailboats or sculls on these reservoirs, as long as they are steam cleaned beforehand to prevent the spread of invasive species. Regular monitoring by DEP scientists has shown that recreational boating has shown no impact on water quality in our reservoirs.

Participation has grown steadily since we began with fewer than 1,000 visitors in 2012. Recent increases have been driven by the success of a rental program that allows visitors to rent a kayak or canoe from one of six businesses in the Catskills that store pre-cleaned boats alongside the reservoirs. These boats are stored on racks that were purchased by the Catskill Watershed Corporation, which helps administer the rental program and has played a key role in its success. Local businesses rented their boats a total of 683 times in 2015-an increase of 92 percent from the previous year.

We expect the rental program to continue growing because it provides easier access for tourists and local residents who don't own a kayak or canoe. Rental boats also provide easy reservoir access for our DEP colleagues in New York



City who are reading this column and would like to visit the reservoirs next year. Local campgrounds and lodges have said they are including reservoir boating in their marketing plans, and many visitors are renting a boat as part of their Catskills vacations. This is great news for the local businesses who can make some extra money by providing safe access at 10 launch sites around the reservoirs.

The program has attracted visitors from near and far. In 2015, roughly 19 percent of the recreational boating tags issued by DEP went to residents of the five Westof-Hudson watershed counties, including Delaware, Greene. Schoharie, Sullivan, and Ulster. About 11 percent of the tags were issued to residents of New York City or Long Island. Visitors from five states also received tags, including Connecticut, Maryland, Pennsylvania, New and Vermont.

I want to thank all the Bureau of Water Supply employees who administer, oversee and promote the recreational boating program. Its success is due to their hard work. Click here to see more photos.

# Spotlight on Safety

### **Maritime Safety**

DEP employees are responsible for performing a wide array of tasks, some of which involve marine vessels. The Bureau of Wastewater Treatment (BWT) operates sludge boats and other harbor vessels, the Bureau of Water Supply (BWS) uses boats to perform various tasks including reservoir sampling, and the DEP Police often use boats for rescue operations.

A primary cause of workplace injuries aboard vessels are slips, trips and falls, which can be caused by slippery surfaces on board or while boarding or departing a vessel. To prevent falls that can lead to injuries and overboard incidents:

- ensure manholes/hatches are closed
- · wear slip resistant footwear
- paint the perimeter of barges and all tripping hazards with a contrasting color
- when boarding/departing vessels ensure gangways, ramps and ladders are properly secured and hold onto guardrails

All vessels must be equipped with Personal Flotation Devices and all on board should be aware of rescue procedures. Notify emergency personnel and supervisors immediately if a person falls overboard. For more information, read OSHA's Publication on Deck Barge Safety.

At DEP, everyone is responsible for safety. If you or anyone on your team is concerned about your working conditions, it's okay to ask your supervisor or your bureau's EHS liaison how they can help. ## Kudos Corner – Breathe Easy Award



The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency recently recognized DEP with a Breathe Easy Award for the work to implement and enforce Local Law 77, which requires that all diesel-powered non-road equipment 50 horsepower or greater be equipped with a diesel particulate filter or EPA verified Tier IV device. This work included educating the construction industry about the new law and, since 2013, over 150 pieces of equipment, such as backhoes, have been retrofitted at registered construction sites throughout the five boroughs. DEP was also lauded for its aggressive inspection and enforcement policy. Through these efforts, emissions of harmful particulate matter have been reduced by 56 percent on average. Kudos to Gerry Kelpin, Shailendra Koya (Sonny) and Alyssa Preston for their leadership roles in this effort.
