SIR—I have the honor to report that during the quarter ending the 30th of September, there has been expended in this Bureau, for work done and materials furnished, and for which bills have been transmitted, as follows:

The natural flow of the Croton river furnished a full supply of water up to the 21st of August. On the 27th of August we commenced drawing from the stored water at Boyd's Corners.

On the 30th of September the gates were closed. Up to that time 1,600,000,000 gallons were drawn from the stored water to make up the deficient supply from the natural flow of the river.

The aqueduct has been kept in thorough repair, and every exertion made to have the property of the city kept neat and in keeping with the adjacent property.

At the Croton dam during the dry weather the retaining wall below the dam was thoroughly repaired.

At the High Bridge the boilers of the Worthen and of the Worthington pumps have been connected, and an iron railing placed around the high-service reservoir similar in construction to that around the reservoir in Central Park.

For the work of removing the aqueduct, between Ninety-third and One Hundred and Thirteenth streets, the pipes have all been laid, and the stone for the gate-houses and the gates are now being put in place. It is anticipated that the new line will be brought into use during the month of November.

The four-foot main for furnishing an increased supply of water on the west side of the city has been completed to Thirty-eighth street, and brought into use, connections having been made at Seventy-fifth, Seventieth, Sixty-third, Fifty-seventh, Forty-eighth, Forty-second, and Thirty-eighth streets. It is being extended across Forty-second street to connect with the present large mains supplying the other parts of the city.

In the new part of the city, north of the Harlem river, in compliance with the law passed by the last legislature, a twelve-inch Croton main is being laid northward from the river, and a wrought-iron pipe is being prepared to lay across Harlem river to furnish this district with Croton water.

SIR—The following report comprises the most important transactions of this Bureau for the months of July, August, and September of this year:

## NEW PAVEMENTS.

Under ordinances of the Common Council, and for which contracts were made by this Department, Belgian or trap-block pavements have been laid in the following localities:

Eleventh street, from one hundred feet east of Avenue D to the East river.

Forty-third street, from Madison avenue to Grand Central Depot.

Forty-eighth street, from Tenth to Eleventh avenue.

Fifty-seventh street, from Second to Lexington avenue.

Seventy-first street, from Eighth avenue to Boulevard.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from Eleventh avenue or Boulevard to Hudson River Railroad.

The foregoing contracts are completed.

The following named paving works under contracts similar to above are in progress:

Paving with Trap-block Pavement—

Eleventh avenue, from Fifty-second to Fifty-ninth street.

Third street, from Goerck street to Pier foot of Third street.

Fifty-second street, from Fourth to Fifth avenue.

Eighty-first street, from Second to Fourth avenue.

Regulating, grading, paving, etc.—

Broadway, from Thirty-second to Fifty-ninth street.

Paving with Granite-block Pavement—

Eighty-fourth street, between Avenue A and Third avenue, and Fourth and Fifth avenues.

Eighty-fifth street, between Avenue A and Fifth avenue.

There is also in progress under act of Legislature, for which a contract was made, the regulating, grading, paving with granite-blocks, repaving, etc., Worth street, between Centre and Chatham streets, and the streets intersecting Worth street, between Centre and Chatham streets.

All the foregoing named contracts for works in progress are expected to be filled before the close of the year.

Contracts for paving made since June 30th to date for works not in progress, will be found in the report of the Contract Clerk.

## REPAIRS TO STREET PAVEMENTS.

The work of repairing the pavements of this city has been prosecuted to the extent that the appropriations will allow with keeping the force of workmen employed until the close of the season.

SIR—In compliance with your request I have the honor to make the following report, viz.:  
There were received at this Bureau, during the months of July, August and September, 1874, 2,421 complaints of obstructions and incumbrances on streets and sidewalks, and dangerous and smooth vault covers, all of which complaints received due and prompt attention.

During the latter part of June, 1874, there were received from the Police Department, 3,428 complaints against smooth vault covers on the sidewalks, in almost every street in the City of New York.

Nearly 6,000 notices to persons to remove smooth vault covers were made out and served upon parties complained of.

From a personal inspection of the sidewalks on various streets of the city, I find that the notices to remove smooth vault covers and substitute rough ones, have been generally complied with.

There was issued during said month, from this Bureau, 280 permits to builders to temporarily place building material on street for erection and repair of buildings.

Twenty-five notices were also issued and served upon parties, directing them to repair broken and dangerous sidewalks.

Seven permits were issued to persons to cut down trees in front of their premises.

No removals of obstructions or incumbrances from the streets or sidewalks was made to the Corporation Yard during said months, on account of the Comptroller failing to provide the incidental expenses therefor, as provided by ordinances.

## HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—The total number of deaths reported in this city during the year 1874, was 28,621. The number that actually occurred in the three hundred and sixty-five days of that year, as footed up to-day, amounts to 28,727. This shows a decrease of 372 deaths from the total for the year 1873, and 3,935 from that of the year 1872. A few more returns are still due from public institutions, and before the end of the present week will be duly registered, and the classified records will then be submitted to the Board.

The full import of the diminished mortality in the City during the past year will be understood by noticing the large share which the excessive fatality of diphtheria had in the year's mortality record, in which it stands charged with 1,665 deaths; also by bearing in mind the population and deaths in the annexed territory comprised in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth wards. From this annexed population of the Westchester wards, 764 deaths were reported, and from diphtheria there were 514 more deaths than 1873. The decrease in mortality which has occurred is in all respects favorable to the deserved repute of this City for the healthfulness of its adult population.

The number of deaths reported in the week that ended on Saturday the 2d instant, was 584. The increase of mortality occurred in persons

over sixty years of age and in chronic invalids. There was a slight decrease in fatal cases in the entire group of contagious and infectious diseases.
