Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 215, 130, 128, 29 and 0, against 222, 86, 98, 44 and 1 for the previous week, a total of 502 against 451. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Twentieth, Twenty-second and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth and Nineteenth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Nineteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Seventeenth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Twelfth Ward, and the decrease in the Twenty-fourth Ward. Seventeen of the 29 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street and 3 were below Fourteenth street. No case of small-pox was reported.
