DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

IN BOARD OF BUILDINGS, JANUARY 2, 1901.

Present—Commissioners Brady and Guilfoyle. The minutes of the meeting of December 26, 1900, were read and, on motion, approved. Petitions were submitted for approval, as follows: Plan 1304, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow third-story walls to be constructed 16 inches thick, as stated in petition; One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-sixth streets, running through block, 300 feet west of Amsterdam avenue. Petitioner, C. B. J. Snyder. Referred to President with power. Plan 1273, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow mineral wool to be used for filling between joist at windows, in back of cornice and at foot of rafters, in place of brick, also to allow sill to be set one foot above grade of lot at rear, which will make an average grade at side of building 3 1/2 feet below sill, all as stated in petition; west side Briggs avenue, 100 feet north Southern Boulevard. Petitioner, E. R. Will. Denied. Plan 2556, Alterations to Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition for a reconsideration of decision of the Board of Buildings at a meeting held December 26, 1900, so as to allow existing tenement houses to be converted so as to be used for light manufacturing purposes, as stated in petition; Nos. 120 and 122 East Broadway. Petitioner, Nathan Roggen. Denied. A communication was received from M. H. Rosenstein, with drawing and plan of his new triangular system of urinals, which was referred to the President. A communication was received from M. T. Daly, Deputy Comptroller, inclosing lists of claims filed in the Department of Finance, and asking for information in relation thereto, which was referred to Commissioner Guilfoyle. Mrs. C. V. Lack, representing the Renaissance Stone Works, appeared before the Board to discuss the merits of Renaissance stone, and was instructed to make formal application to the Board for a test of the material. The following resolution offered by Commissioner Guilfoyle was adopted, and the Secretary was directed to forward a copy to each Commissioner:

Resolved, That no member of the Uniformed Force or other employee\* of the Department of Buildings shall sell or assign his salary or incur or contract any debts or liabilities he is unable or unwilling to pay, or neglect or refuse to honorably discharge and promptly pay all indebtedness, claims and judgments, and satisfy all executions that may be held or issued against him.

On motion of Mr. Guilfoyle the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That all papers, letters and notices from the Board of Buildings, except those required to be signed by the President, must be signed by the Secretary in person, or by some person designated by the President of the Board.

On motion of Commissioner Guilfoyle, James E. McMahon, Chief Clerk, Board of Buildings, was restored to duty, the same to take effect January 3, 1901, the penalty being a forfeiture of his pay from the date of his suspension (September 21, 1900), up to and including January 2, 1901.

The Secretary was directed to address a communication to Messrs. Horgan & Slattery, notifying them that the clause in their application, "the supply to the water-closets being a separate supply from the main," was disapproved and disallowed by the Board, and that the original notice of approval was incorrect in stating that the same had been approved.

BUREAU OF MUNICIPAL STATISTICS.

BUREAU OF MUNICIPAL STATISTICS, NOS. 13 TO 21 PARK ROW, BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, NEW YORK, JANUARY 9, 1901.

Supervisor of the City Record:

DEAR SIR—A meeting of the Municipal Statistical Commission was held at the office of the Commission, Room 1914, Nos. 13 to 21 Park row, on Tuesday, January 8, 1901, the following members being present:

Antonio Rasines, Thomas Gilleran, Frederick W. Grube and John T. Nagle. The Chief of the Bureau submitted the annual report of the Bureau, together with an abstract accompanying it. The Commissioners authorized him to have them bound and sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval, in order that they may be published.

The Chief of the Bureau (John T. Nagle) submitted the following statement: Department of Highways—The thirty-seven illustrations of the work that has been done by the Department of Highways will show some of the duties that it has performed during the year. In some instances the illustrations show the conditions that existed before and after the work had been performed, which give interesting contrasts.

It will be seen that after the improvements of paving, grading, curbing, building bridges, etc., have been completed, that dwellings have been erected and improvements made that have greatly added to the value of the property, not alone in the streets which have been improved, but in their vicinity. The conditions which existed previous to the improvements that have been made by the City, would make the settlement of these localities almost impossible.

In addition to the illustrations submitted of the work of the Department of Highways, I have been promised illustrations representing the work of the Department of Docks, Street Cleaning, Aqueduct Commission, Museum of Art, and I am making an effort to obtain appropriate illustrations which will show the work of other departments, etc.

Several illustrations of old New York—some of them were taken more than a century ago—are also submitted, showing the conditions that existed at that time compared with those of the present.

An interesting comparative table of crimes committed in a number of American cities, prepared by Joseph M. Duell, President of the Board of City Magistrates, will show the percentage of crimes or offenses committed and some of the principal causes.

In this table, New York makes a better showing than any of the large cities having a population of over 500,000 inhabitants and compares favorably with 63 of the 100 smaller cities.

The figures showing the expenditure of the work on the viaduct and the illustrations showing the character of the work that is being done to connect Riverside avenue and Boulevard Lafayette, will demonstrate the necessity of this undertaking.

This viaduct, when completed, will make one of the most beautiful streets in the world, with scenery unsurpassed.

I believe, however, the beauties of Riverside Park would be enhanced by extending it some distance to the westward into the North river, beyond the tracks of the Hudson River Railroad, so that this beautiful avenue would have an extensive river front.

With the exception of Battery Park and East River Park, both small, and Fort Washington Park, there is no other city park in the Borough of Manhattan, if we exclude High Bridge Park and the Harlem River Driveway or Speedway, that has an actual water-front on a navigable stream.

The Driveway or Speedway, however, faces the Harlem river, which is a very narrow stream. The filling in of the cribwork, the construction of the wall and filling-in to make land for park purposes, could be chiefly obtained from the rock and earth excavated in the construction of the rapid-transit tunnel, and by utilizing this material the work could be done at much less cost than if the material were obtained from other sources.

New York's Speedway is conceded to be a useful and attractive driveway and the money expended for its construction is well invested.

The extension of the Riverside Park westward to the North river might be so constructed as to leave a capacious and lengthy basin with inlets from the river along its length, which could be used for aquatic sports—yachting, boating, etc.—if the tides would permit and if deemed feasible.

The number of persons who visit and utilize the Harlem River Driveway or Speedway attest the wisdom of its construction, and the number of residents of New York who are lovers of aquatic sports and those who take pride in the embellishment of the city and the improvement of its park system, I believe, would be sufficient to attest the popularity of this work.
