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BOARD OF EDUCATION.

STATED MEETING.

Wednesday, February 24, 1904.

A stated meeting of the Board of Education was held on Wednesday, February 24, 1904, at 4 o'clock p. m., at the Hall of the Board of Education, Park avenue and Fifty-ninth street, Borough of Manhattan.

City Superintendent Maxwell was absent by leave of the Board.

The President, on February 4, 1904, addressed the following letter to the Mayor, transmitting the accompanying report of the Committee on Sites in reference to the school site selected by the Board of Education on East Eighty-ninth street, between Avenues A and B, and the site suggested by the Department of Finance on Avenue A, East Ninetieth and East Ninety-first streets, which was ordered to be printed in the minutes:

February 4, 1904.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 29, action was taken with reference to a school site on East Eighty-ninth street selected by the Board of Education on October 28 last, and the matter was referred back to us with a request that we consider a site recommended by the Comptroller's Appraiser of Real Estate, on Avenue A, Ninetieth and Ninety-first streets, in lieu of the one selected by us. The matter was considered by the Board of Education on the first instant, and was referred to the Committee on Sites, which was empowered to inquire into the facts and report thereon to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The matter has been thoroughly investigated by said Committee, and I have the honor to hand you herewith a copy of the Committee's report. The Committee recommends that no change be made in the site we have selected, and urges that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment proceed immediately with the acquisition of said site. In the Committee's conclusions I fully concur.

I may add that the Comptroller's Appraiser, in his report, states that several of the houses on the site which we have selected are owned by Alderman whatsoever of school conditions to preclude it from any further consideration.

The object in selecting the school site on Eighty-ninth street was to relieve Public School 77, at Eighty-sixth street and First avenue; Public School 30, on Eighty-eighth street, just west of Second avenue; Public School 151, at Ninety-first street and First avenue, which together have a total of 1,766 children on part time.

It was recognized that new Public School 190, on Eighty-second street, west of First avenue, would relieve Public School 77 somewhat from the pressure to the southwest of that school, but there was no possible means of relief on the north and east other than the selection of a site and the erection of a building in the vicinity of Eighty-eighth street and Avenue A. A study of the neighborhood discloses the fact that, owing perhaps to the topography of the region, the population is massed in solidly built-up blocks on the high ground from First avenue to Avenue B and the East River, and extending up to Eighty-ninth street between Avenues A and B, thence showing more and more unbuild sections as the river bends sharp toward the north at Ninetieth street and the levels drop to that of the vast areas of marsh and swamp which were filled in.

A search of all the blocks from Eighty-sixth street north to Ninety-first street, and from First avenue east to the river, does not show any desirable site of the required size which can be had for a reasonable sum, owing to the nature of the improvements thereon.

The map submitted herewith shows clearly the location of the site selected by the Board of Education in Eighty-ninth street, which is on the south side of the block, between Avenues A and B, the latter of which terminates at the intersection of Eighty-ninth street, owing to the fact that the East river makes a short bend to the north at that point, bringing the site selected by the Department of Finance within 225 feet of the river, while that selected by the Department of Education is about 1,000 feet distant from the river. It will be observed also that the East River Park begins at Eighty-ninth street and Avenue B and extends southerly, thus bringing it within a reasonable distance of the Eighty-ninth street school site, but, as there is no exterior street from the intersection of Avenue B and Eighty-ninth street northerly, the Park is not readily accessible from the site submitted by the Department of Finance, while the absence of this exterior street renders the latter site very advantageous for the erection of factories which may desire a waterfront. This would be exceedingly objectionable upon the same block with the school building.

It is true that the proposed Eighty-ninth street site faces on the buildings of the House of the Good Shepherd and St. Ann's Home, as indicated by the maps, but by reference to the photographs accompanying this report it will be observed that these buildings are low, and, at the same time, of such permanent character as to assure an abundance of light and air for the school, exclusive of that to which it would be ordinarily entitled by the width of the street.

The mention made of iron-barred windows is misleading, since the guards are on the first story windows only, similar to those on many of the houses in the City where protection is required.

The nine houses included in said site were erected some time ago and are not in the best of condition, and it would appear to be much more economical to acquire this property, remove the buildings, and have a site with a good foundation upon which to

build, than it would be to take the proposed site which is vacant, and which would cost the difference owing to the difficulty in securing a foundation, to say nothing of the saving which would be effected by having but one exposed front, requiring architectural treatment, instead of three.

After most careful consideration, and in view of the facts as above set forth, we are of the opinion that it would be inadvisable to make any change in reference to the site on Eighty-ninth street, heretofore selected by the Board of Education; and we urge that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be again requested to proceed as promptly as possible to the acquirement of the site, as the school conditions of that district require immediate relief.

Your Committee desires to say that, in the two months of Mr. Jones's incumbency of the said office, marked improvement has been effected in the work of the Bureau of Supplies and the organization of the staff, and greatly increased efficiency shown by the members of the staff under his strong and intelligent control.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Mr. Warburg presented the following:

Report No. 2 of the Special Committee of Five.

To the Board of Education:

The undersigned Committee was appointed by the President of the Board of Education in accordance with the following preamble and resolution adopted by the Board of Education on January 14, 1904 (see Journal, page 101):

"Whereas, The Comptroller of The City of New York has stated that this Board in the administration of its affairs, is extravagant and wasteful with the funds at its disposal, this Board desires to state that it has no knowledge of any waste or extravagance; that it welcomes any investigation the financial officer of the City desires to make, and will co-operate with him in every way to ascertain if any economies can be secured. With that object in view, be it

Resolved, That a Special Committee of Five be appointed to make such investigation; to invite and co-operate with the Comptroller to ascertain where and how economies may be made."

Your Committee understands by this resolution that its duty, was, first, to investigate the charges made by Comptroller Grout that the Board of Education has been extravagant and wasteful with the funds at its disposal; second, to invite and co-operate with the Comptroller to ascertain where and how economies may be made; third, to discover and report any economies which its own investigation may indicate as possible.

In the preliminary report presented to your Committee on February 1, 1904 (see Journal, pages 304-315), the correspondence between Comptroller Grout and the Chairman of the Committee was given. This correspondence showed a reluctance on the part of the Comptroller to present any facts or figures other than those contained in the reports already published in the newspapers and afterwards forwarded to the Board of Education. Further correspondence has only strengthened the feeling on the part of your Committee that no efficient aid could be obtained from the Comptroller in investigating the affairs of the Board of Education.

The reports alluded to above are as follows:

First, a report on the course of study in the elementary schools, the employment of Teachers of special branches, the use of text-books, and other minor matters relating to the purely educational administration; second, a report on the purchase of sites for new school buildings; third, a report on leases; fourth, a report on school libraries; fifth, a report on printing and other matters connected with the bureau of supplies; sixth, a supplementary report on the course of study, together with a discussion of the cost of supervision; and, seventh, a report on instruction in sewing. These reports have been subjected to a careful analysis. The results of this examination are presented in detail in the appendixes to this report: Appendix I, the Comptroller's views as to the educational management of the schools; Appendix II, the Comptroller's report on sites and leases; Appendix III, the Comptroller's report on libraries.

An examination of the Comptroller's reports, we regret to say, does not reveal any economies that are either desirable or practical at the present time. The first report recommends the elimination of the teaching of drawing, singing, hygiene, sewing, cooking, manual training and nature study, to the end that the salaries of the special Teachers employed to aid the regular Teachers in giving instruction in these branches may be saved. Such a proposal is revolutionary in its character and, in the judgment of your Committee, cannot be entertained for a moment. The reasons for this conclusion are fully set forth in Appendix I.

In his report on libraries, the Comptroller recommends that the purchase of books for the class libraries in the schools shall cease and that the money which comes to us from the State for this purpose, together with the equal amount raised by local taxation, shall be turned over to the Special School Fund. In the judgment of your Committee the work of establishing class libraries, upon which your Board systematically entered a year ago, ought not to be interrupted.

In the Comptroller's report on leases, he complains that money has been spent on fitting up hired buildings for school purposes. Your Committee regards it as most unfortunate that it is necessary, owing to the rapid increase in population and the inadequacy of regular school accommodations, to hire any buildings for school purposes that were not designed and constructed for that purpose. Since, however, it has been necessary to hire such buildings, it has also been necessary to put them into habitable and sanitary condition. The law, as well as a decent regard for the health of the children committed to our care, requires this expenditure. No property has been leased that was not first approved by the Building and Health Departments of the City.

In his report on the purchase of sites, the Comptroller complains that the Board of Education has not always improved property as soon after its purchase as he thinks might have been done. In reply to this, it is only necessary to state, in the first place, that the Board of Education has always improved sites purchased as rapidly as the appropriations allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would permit; and, in the second place, that where it was not possible to build on all available sites the Board of Education has caused buildings to be erected on those sites in the neighborhood of which the pressure for school accommodations was greatest. During the last two years, the selection of sites for purchase and the determination of the sites upon which to build have been governed by the following considerations: the number of part-time pupils in the vicinity; the substitution of regular school buildings for rented premises and the replacing of buildings that were dilapidated and unsanitary, by roomy, well-ventilated and well-lighted structures.

The acme of absurdity is reached in the Comptroller's report on printing, in which he declares that too many leads are used in printing the Minutes of the Board of Education. Upon this matter we are not careful to make any recommendation. The Board of Education will doubtless continue in the future, as it has done in the past, to provide that the record of its proceedings shall be printed in reasonably good form and good taste.

Unable to obtain any assistance of value from Comptroller Grout, your Committee proceeded to make a careful investigation of the work of each department under your direction, and offers the following suggestions:

1. The Committee on Care of Buildings should seek to discover ways by which the supply of fuel used in the school buildings will be better regulated than at present. It is suggested that investigations be made by experts to determine from the nature of the heating apparatus and the number of cubic feet of air to be heated in each building how much coal any given building ought to use in a given time. In this way there will be a check upon the janitors in their use of coal. It is possible also that a change of grating in the furnaces would permit the use of pea coal instead of large coal and thus provide a considerable saving.

2. The Committee on Studies and Text-books should, in conjunction with the Board of Superintendents, consider the question as to whether the present text-book list may not be curtailed to advantage.

3. The Committee on Special Schools should, in case vacation schools and playgrounds are maintained next summer, make considerable reduction in the cost of supervision. During the last two years a large amount of supervision was necessary because Teachers were comparatively new to the work. Hereafter, however, it is to be hoped that most, if not all, of the Teachers who did such good work last summer will be continued in service, and that they will require less supervision than formerly.

4. The Committee on Lectures and Libraries should, in the judgment of your Committee, restrict the lecture centres and lectures to the poorer and the outlying sections of the City, where the people do not have ready access to other sources of entertainment and instruction. We would also urge upon this Committee the importance of getting into close touch at as early a date as possible with the department of the New York Public Library that deals with children's reading. This Committee is of the opinion that the present plan of circulating libraries in the classrooms should be continued at least until such time as the New York Public Library is prepared to provide a perfect library service for the public schools.

5. We are confident, after examining the reports of the Comptroller with regard to the purchase of sites and the leasing of buildings, that both of these functions would be much more economically and promptly performed if removed, the one from the Comptroller, the other from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and both placed in the hands of the Board of Education.

6. It is suggested that the Committee on Finance have statements prepared every three months, and have such statements sent to the members of the Board of Education, showing plainly the cost of the Teachers in the different departments and also the per capita cost of the different schools, and calling attention to any school where such per capita cost seems excessive. Such statements would lead to investigations of any cases of extravagance in the schools.

7. The Committee on Buildings should, in our judgment, investigate what steps might be taken to induce builders to estimate on our buildings, as we feel that we should be able to erect our buildings just as speedily as anybody in New York. The Committee should also prepare and keep up to date a list of buildings needing repairs, arranged so as to show in order the buildings most in need of repairs.

8. The Committee on Supplies should make efforts to arrange orders for supplies in such a way that the District Superintendents, in passing upon them, may be able to determine from the blank itself, how many of the articles ordered are already in the schools, and for how many pupils provision is to be made through any given order. This Committee should also provide that all books stored in the schools that are not in use should be collected and placed in the depository, to be exchanged for new books, to be sold, or to be redistributed.

9. The Committee on Sites should prepare a list of sites owned by the Board of Education that will not be needed in the near future, if there are any such, and should take up with the Finance Department of the City the question of selling such sites.

10. It is suggested that, instead of the usual annual apportionment of the amount to be allowed to each school for supplies to be furnished on the requisition of the principal, such apportionment be made semi-annually, and that, at the close of each school term, there shall be reported to the Board and printed in the Journal a statement showing the cost per pupil of books and other supplies furnished to each school on the principal's requisition, and that each principal be required to report at the same time the amount of books and other supplies on hand and the unexpended balance of the amount apportioned to his school.

Your Committee has heard with the most profound regret that the Committee on Supplies has notified the Board of Superintendents that it will be useless to recommend, during the year 1904, the fitting up of kindergarten rooms, of cooking rooms, and of workshops. The total number of shops constructed and equipped is only forty, including three in which the appointments are yet imperfect. The aggregate number of pupils receiving instruction in these shops is 15,000. The number of pupils of suitable age and grade for instructions of this character is 32,500. It thus appears that, while the schools are not yet half equipped in this respect, a halt is to be called in this much-needed improvement in our schools. Although there are 30,000 girls in the grades in which it is feasible to give instruction in the art of cooking and related domestic economy, the whole number of girls actually receiving such instruction does not exceed 15,000, the kitchens already established, 55 in number, being utterly inadequate for the purpose. In the training of girls we regard this instruction as quite as important as instruction in any other subject in the curriculum. It would be a most decidedly retrograde step if the Committee on Supplies should at this time be compelled to call a halt in the development of the kindergarten system. Of more than half a million pupils now on roll in the schools, there are 85,000 in the 1A grade, of whom only 5,000 have had kindergarten training. The number of kindergartens in the City should be as numerous as the classes of 1A grade. There are 1,700 classes of the latter grade, and only a little over 400 of the former. Your Committee is of the opinion, therefore, that, since the appropriation for supplies is inadequate to provide equipment during the year 1904 for any additional cooking rooms, workshops and kindergartens, the City authorities should be asked to provide not less than \$100,000 for these purposes. Neither the Board of Education nor the financial authorities of the City can afford to cease providing proper facilities for teaching children between five and six years of age. Such facilities are afforded under the law only in kindergartens.

Various suggestions were made to your Committee, in addition to those contained in the reports of the Comptroller, looking to economy of administration. One of the most radical of these suggestions was that, in the case of part-time classes, one-half of the Teachers now employed should be transferred to vacancies in other grades and that the remaining Teachers should be required to teach both the pupils who come in the forenoon and those who come in the afternoon. To meet the objection that such a plan would require a Teacher to work continuously for nearly seven hours a day, it was suggested that during the first year of the course, or wherever part-time classes are necessary, the curriculum should be diminished to such an extent that one Teacher would teach what are called "the essentials" to two sets of pupils within five hours. After protracted discussion and mature deliberation on this suggestion, your Committee felt itself unable to recommend it because, in the first place, we do not consider it possible for any one Teacher, teaching all the subjects of the grade, to do justice to two sets of pupils in the same day; and, in the second place, because it would be grossly unfair to deprive any number of pupils in any grade of any part of the instruction which pupils not on part-time are receiving. The plan of conducting these part-time classes

suggested by Principal Ettinger of Public School No. 147, Manhattan, according to which both sets of pupils come for two hours in the morning and for two hours in the afternoon, seems to have worked well, and will, in all probability, be adopted throughout the City. It goes far to eliminate the objection to the present plan of conducting part-time classes, which is that children are not as mentally and physically alert in the afternoon as they are in the morning, and consequently do not derive as much benefit from their school work. The afternoon children at present, even if they are not so alert as those who come in the morning, have at least the advantage of receiving instruction from a Teacher who has not been tired out by a morning's work. The Board of Education would expose itself to just criticism if it should give 90,000 of our children, for whom there are not full accommodations, instruction through fatigued Teachers in the afternoons.

Another suggestion laid before your Committee was that the entire clerical staff in the schools known as additional Teachers should be abolished and that the class Teachers should be expected to help their Principals in the necessary clerical work of the schools. After mature consideration, your Committee does not find it expedient to recommend a proposition so revolutionary. It is believed, however, that a considerable reduction in the expense of the clerical force may be made without detriment to the work of the schools. A fair compromise between the radical proposition referred to and the present conditions would be to eliminate the clerical force in schools of from twelve to eighteen classes and to provide that the additional Teachers who are paid regular schedule rates in schools of eighteen classes or more, should be assigned to teach and their places filled by persons who would receive substitutes' pay.

Mr. Grout, in a more recent report, submitted to the newspapers, suggests that some saving might be effected by doing away with the twenty-six District Superintendents and rearranging the functions of Associate City Superintendents. It is possible to gain from this report the erroneous impression that the number of Associate City and District Superintendents is determined by the Board of Education. In reality, the Charter, Section 1079, prescribes that there shall be eight Associate City Superintendents and twenty-six District Superintendents. The terms employed are so explicit and so mandatory in character that the Board of Education in electing these officers was discharging a function required by law. It must be remembered also that the supervising force has not been increased in these particulars since the new Charter went into effect. As a result, to-day we have thirty-five Superintendents for 13,018 teachers and principals, or one for 372, while before consolidation there were thirty-five superintendents for 10,570 principals and teachers, or one for 302. In short, each superintendent to-day is charged with responsibility for seventy more instructors. It must be remembered, however, that under the new plan, twenty-six of the thirty-five superintendents are relieved from constant duty in the central offices and are assigned to the direct inspection and care of the schools. In this way, economy has been effected by giving the schools the direct advisory services of a number of experts. Under the old plan, eleven of these men in Brooklyn and seventeen of them in Manhattan were compelled to attend to legislative matters and in consequence to spend less time in the schools. Now this work, formerly done by some thirty-four men, is accomplished by a board of nine men. It must be remembered also that the ratio of supervision of this kind in New York is less than in any other city of importance in the country. While the cost for supervision—\$182,500—when expressed in absolute figures seems somewhat large, an analysis of this expenditure shows that for superintendents but 1.199 per centum of the entire salary fund is expended. It is evident from this analysis that the cost of supervisory management in the schools is anything but excessive. It may be of interest to consider the fact that, if the ratio of superintendents allowed by the old Greater New York Charter, which allowed the appointment of an associate borough superintendent for each 350 increase in the teaching staff had been kept up there would have been five or six more supervising officers than are now actually conducting the system with its added requirements due to the necessity for enforcing much more comprehensive compulsory education and child labor laws, functions which have been added directly to the duties of the District Superintendents.

The City Superintendent of Schools has reported that under the directions of the Board of Superintendents about \$25,000 will be saved this year as compared with the corresponding item of last year in the matter of paying bonuses to teachers for teaching mixed classes. It is estimated that \$25,000 more may be saved by the disposition of the clerical force recommended above. We may add that during the years 1902-1903 the sum of \$27,000 was saved by the consolidation of schools where two or three schools were found under the charge of as many principals in one building. As this amount however, was saved before the close of last year, it cannot figure as part of the savings to be made during the current year. It is recommended, however, that the policy of consolidating schools be continued wherever feasible opportunity is presented.

We next come to consider the present financial situation of the Board of Education. The following statement shows the amount asked for the General Fund for the year 1904:

The above estimate is that presented in the report of the Committee of Seven to the Board of Education last December. The researches of your Committee show that it is to all intents and purposes correct, and may be regarded as a close estimate of the cost of the schools during the current year.

The next statement shows the total resources of the General Fund:

If from this sum be subtracted the estimated cost of the day schools, namely, \$16,054,484.21, a balance will be found of \$412,371.28. To this sum should be added \$50,000 which will be saved by the reorganization of the clerical force in the schools and a rearrangement of mixed classes so as to avoid the payment of bonuses wherever possible. The total balance, therefore, is \$462,371.28 available for purposes other than instruction in the day schools. It was estimated in the report of the Committee of Seven that \$100,000 might be saved during the present year by the economies referred to. Close investigation shows that this amount is at least twice too much. If, as has been already provided, \$60,000 should be spent upon free lectures and \$433,715 upon evening schools, high and elementary, it will be seen that there will be a deficit at the end of the year of \$31,343.72.

The following statement shows the amount of money that will be absolutely needed to continue the recreation centres and to maintain the summer schools and playgrounds next summer:

The amount asked for the purchase of scholastic supplies during 1904 was \$1,607,916.89. The amount granted was only \$1,151,491.35, or about \$66,000 more than that required in 1903. When it is considered that the number of new pupils who entered the schools last September was nearly 40,000, and that many new school buildings have been opened since that date, or will be opened during 1904, it is obvious that the amount granted is altogether insufficient for the necessities of this year.

After careful consideration of the needs of the system and possible methods of raising money to meet existing and threatened deficiencies, your Committee is of the opinion that there is but one practicable way of securing funds. This is through an act of the Legislature which permits the reopening of the Budget. For this action there is ample precedent in the year 1902. It has been learned that such a bill has been introduced, at the behest of the City administration, into both houses of the Legislature.

In conclusion your Committee offers for adoption the following resolutions:
Resolved, That the Board of Superintendents be, and it hereby is, instructed to fill available vacancies in schools by transferring all regular Teachers who are employed as additional Teachers to such vacancies and to fill the places of such additional Teachers with persons who will receive the pay of substitutes.

Resolved, That the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation be, and it hereby is, requested to present for adoption an amendment to the By-Laws abolishing the position of additional teacher in all schools of less than eighteen classes.

Resolved, That Senate Bill No. 498, which has for its purpose the granting of power to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to reopen the Educational Budget for the year 1904 in order to provide moneys necessary for the unimpaired maintenance of the public schools, and which has been introduced, be, and it is hereby, approved, and that the City's legal representative be requested to take active steps to further the passage of this measure.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

At a meeting of the Board of Local Improvements of the Washington Heights District held February 2, 1904, the following members were present: Aldermen Meyers, Grifenhagen, Davies and President Ahearn.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

The President submitted for the Board's consideration matter of constructing receiving basin at the southeast corner of One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street and Columbus avenue (estimated cost \$282; assessed value of the property affected \$107,000).

On motion suitable resolution providing for this improvement was adopted.

The President presented for the Board's consideration matter of laying out as a public park the land on the east side of Amsterdam avenue, between West One Hundred and Fifty-first and West One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, running about 128 feet east on West One Hundred and Fifty-second street and about 200 feet on West One Hundred and Fifty-first street, which was referred to this Board by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Engineer of Street Openings reported that this plot "is in the keeping of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and he with the sanction of the Comptroller could lay out the land and otherwise improve and beautify it as has been done with other parts of the aqueduct."

On motion, the subject was referred to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for his consideration.

President submitted for the Board's consideration matter of constructing receiving basin at the intersection of Avenue St. Nicholas and Edgcombe avenue (estimated cost \$370; assessed value of property affected, \$13,000).

On motion, suitable resolution providing for this work was adopted.

President presented for the Board's consideration matter of acquiring title to West Two Hundred and Nineteenth street, between Broadway and Ninth avenue, and a strip of land 20 feet in width and 150 feet in length, between Ninth avenue and the Harlem river. Protest on behalf of the American Real Estate Company to the acquiring of the necessary outlet on a line with Two Hundred and Nineteenth street, and suggesting that the same be taken on a line with Two Hundred and Eighteenth street, was read and ordered on file. The Commissioner of Public Works reported that if the outlet were made through Two Hundred and Eighteenth street a new map would have to be filed and the layout of sewers changed to suit this altering of location.

On motion, the matter was referred to Aldermen Grifenhagen for investigation and report.

President submitted matter of curbing and recurbing, flagging and reflagging, guttering and paving with Telford macadam roadway of Fort Washington avenue, from Broadway at West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street to the northerly side of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street, and the placing of necessary cross walks on same (estimated cost, \$60,014.50, assessed value of the property affected, \$2,160,000).

Mr. F. A. Schermerhorn on behalf of the New York Institution for the Blind appeared before the Board and urged that this improvement be made, but called attention to the fact that he thought a change of grade would be required before this improvement could be accomplished.

Chief Engineer of Highways informed the Board that no such change of grade was contemplated by his Bureau.

On motion the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the "City Record" that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is

Resolved, By the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, pursuant to Titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, that the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To curb and recurb, flag and reflag, gutter and pave with Telford macadam the roadway of Ft. Washington avenue, from Broadway at West One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street to the northerly side of West One Hundred and Eighty-first street and the placing of the necessary cross walks on same; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

President submitted for the Board's consideration petition requesting the laying out "of a triangular strip of land abutting Washington Bridge on the north and lying between new avenue and Fort George Park, so as to include the same within Ft. George Park."

Mr. Jos. A. Flannery, representing petitioners, appeared before the Board and urged that a suitable resolution providing for the initial steps in this proceeding be adopted.

On motion, the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is

Resolved, By the Local Board of the Hudson District, pursuant to Titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, that the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

That the map or plan of The City of New York be altered by laying out on same for use as a public park and as an addition to Highbridge Park all the land bounded by Highbridge Park and the new avenue east of Amsterdam avenue, near Washington Bridge, in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, as follows:

Beginning at a point in the easterly line of the new avenue east of Amsterdam avenue, distant 150.06 feet northerly from the northerly line of the land of the Washington Bridge, opposite West One Hundred and Eighty-first street; thence northerly along said easterly line, distance 280.42 feet; thence in a curved line, deflecting to the left, radius 390.60 feet, distance 62.42 feet; thence southerly along the westerly line of Highbridge Park as now laid out, distance 349.11 feet; thence westerly and along the northerly line of the Highbridge Park and parallel to and distant 150 feet northerly from the land of the Washington Bridge, distance 49.86 feet, to the point or place of beginning—containing 7,791.64 square feet.—and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

President presented for the Board's consideration petition requesting the acquiring of title to an addition to Highbridge Park, as heretofore laid out on the map or plan of The City of New York.

On motion, subject was referred to Alderman Grifenhagen for investigation and report.

President submitted a petition "for the laying out of bridge or viaduct over Spuyten Duyvil creek, from at or about Muscoota street, on Marble Hill, to at or about East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, in the Borough of The Bronx, and for laying out of the approaches thereto, said Bridge to take the place of Farmer's Bridge."

On motion, subject was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to the proper department to undertake this improvement.

Protest from property owners on Marble Hill against the laying out of a new street in that section from Kingsbridge avenue to Broadway was read for the Board's information and ordered on file.

On motion, meeting adjourned.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
