SIR-In compliance with the Charter, the Art Commission begs to submit its report

Sir—In compliance with the Charter, the Art Commission begs to submit its report for the year 1904.

The membership of the Commission, in accordance with the provisions of the Charter, consisted throughout the year of George B. McClellan (Mayor), A. Augustus Healy (President of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences), John Bigelow (President of the New York Public Library), J. Carroll Beckwith (painter), Henry Rutgers Marshall (architect), A. Phimister Proctor (sculptor), John DeWitt Warner (layman), John D. Crimmins (layman) and Loyall Farragut (layman). Mr. Frederick W. Rhinelander (President of the Metropolitan Museum of Art) was a member until his death, September 25. This vacancy has been filled by the election of Mr. J. Pierpont Morgan as President of the Metropolitan Museum of Art. No other change has taken place in the membership of the Commission during the year.

At the first meeting of the Commission, held January 12, 1904, the Commission organized by electing the following officers: John DeWitt Warner, President; J. Carroll Beckwith, Vice-President, and A. Augustus Healy, Secretary.

Powers and Duties of the Commission.

Under the Charter, the Commission has jurisdiction over:

(a) All works of art to be acquired by The City of New York by purchase, gift or otherwise;

(b) The removal, relocation or alteration in any way of all works of art already

(b) The removal, relocation or alteration in any way of all works of art already possessed by the City;

(c) All designs of municipal buildings, bridges, approaches, gates, fences, lamps or other structures erected or to be erected upon land belonging to the City; the lines, grades, plotting of public ways and grounds; arches, bridges, structures and approaches which are the property of any corporation or private individual and which shall extend over or upon any street, park or public place belonging to the City, provided they are referred to the Commission by the Mayor or the Board of Aldermen;

(d) All structures, as mentioned in (c) above, to be erected or contracted for at an expense exceeding \$1,000,000;

(e) The selection of art productions, costing not to exceed \$50,000 in any one year, when such appropriation has been made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Works of art, as above defined, include all paintings, mural decorations, stained glass, statues, bas reliefs or other sculptures, monuments, fountains, arches or other structures of a permanent character, intended for ornament or commemoration.

The Charter further provides that no work of art shall become the property of the City unless such work of art, or a design, together with a statement of the pro-

posed location, shall have been submitted to and approved by the Art Commission. Until so approved, it may not be erected or placed in, upon or over any building, street,

park or public place belonging to the City.

Further, no existing work of art may be removed, relocated or altered in any way unless the plan for such removal, relocation or alteration shall have been submitted to and approved by the Commission.

MATTERS SUBMITTED IN 1904.

The matters submitted to the Commission under these provisions during 1904 have was 90; one other was presented in 1903, but not disposed of before January 1 of this year, making a total of 91 considered during the current year. The total amount of money involved approximated \$29,800,000.

ACTION UPON SUBMISSIONS.

In each one of the eighty-seven submissions acted upon during the past year, from one to thirty plans have been examined and passed upon. In fifty-eight submissions, the designs were approved as submitted, and in twenty-seven instances the Commission disapproved in whole or in part. These twenty-seven submissions dealt with twenty-two different matters, and for fourteen of these, amended plans were prepared and again submitted to the Commission. In four instances these amended plans were disapproved, and in two instances a third set was disapproved. New plans for eight structures are now being perfected. Without exception, the new designs have shown marked improvement, and the Commission feels, therefore, that its work has been successful in securing a higher æsthetic standard for public structures.

The requirements of the Charter, that approval must be secured before structures may be erected, and the knowledge upon the part of the designers that plans would not be approved by the Commission which did not possess artistic merit, have also had an indirect effect, for those intending to submit designs to the Commission have naturally been desirous that their plans should be of such merit as to command approval without

alteration. Consequently, greater care has been taken in the preparation of these designs than otherwise would be or has been the case.

In two instances submissions were temporarily withdrawn, because further consideration and criticism were considered necessary before approval of the Commission

Four submissions remained unacted upon at the close of the year, owing to the fact that sufficient time had not been had within which to examine the plans and make

As a submission is examined and reported upon by a Special Committee before it is considered by the full Commission, it is in committee work, of which no record is kept, that are found the more engrossing duties of Commissioners.

Of the full Commission there have been called 13 meetings, at each of which a quorum has appeared. Action upon no submission has materially been delayed.

*The provision requiring all structures exceeding in cost \$1,000,000 to be approved by the Commission did not become part of the Charter until January 1, 1902.

The work of the Commission has brought it into official relation with nearly every department of the Greater City and the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx. Most helpful co-operation has been had from all, of which we have availed ourselves to the utmost by liberal construction of the law providing:

"In all matters of which such Commission takes cognizance pertaining to work under the special charge of a Commissioner or Department, the Commissioner having such special charge shall act as a member of the Commission."

The result has been appreciation by City officials of how essential were our requirements for submission or approval, insistence by them that these be met by all concerned, and a growing tendency, through request of the Mayor, to require our certificate of approval before closing contracts for public works.

The Charter provides that expenditure of the City's funds without the approval of the Art Commission is illegal in such cases as come within the jurisdiction of the Commission. For instance, if the designs for a public structure costing several millions of dollars should be disapproved by the Art Commission, and the contractor should proceed to carry them out, or if the contractor should omit to submit them to the Art Commission, the payment of any money to the contractor under such circumstances would be illegal, and any City official doing so would be guilty of misappropriating funds. Whether a contractor is carrying out the plans approved by the Art Commission is therefore a very important question, and its determination must depend upon the facts shown by the records of the Commission. These should therefore be complete and accurate, and the certificate issued thereon so drawn as to preclude any misunderstanding.

The most important development in the Commission's work during the past

The most important development in the Commission's work during the past year has been the extent to which precedent has been more definitely established as to cases in which—where the statute leaves it to the Mayor's discretion—designs shall be submitted for the Commission's action. While there is obvious advantage in giving be submitted for the Commission's action. While there is obvious advantage in giving the Mayor somewhat of discretion as to public structures neither works of art nor involving such expenditure as under the law to require their submission, the importance of this class clearly demanded such fixing of precedents, as in ordinary cases should advise in advance all concerned of the extent to which conformity to the Commission's standards must be assumed as required. From informal conference, in which each case was dealt with as occasion suggested, through a routine steadily developing as precedent or experience justified presumption in one or another class of cases, the practice has been settled of regularly noting and reporting for consideration by the Mayor all proposed structures that, judging from experience, the Art Commission might expect to be referred to it. In November last, by the Mayor's action in referring to the Commission every item of those thus reported and not theretofore submitted, precedent was as definitely fixed, and the matter left as little one of arbitrary or casual action as probably is possible under the present law.

The Commission's collection of books, pamphlets, periodicals, photographs and prints on civic art in Europe and America has been considerably added to and extended during the current year. At this date it contains 220 bound volumes, 73 maps separately mounted and catalogued, several hundred unbound pamphlets and between 2,400 and 2,500 photographs and prints, relating to 72 cities—making it one of the best collections upon this subject in the United States. A thorough card catalogue has been prepared, through which it is possible to secure in a moment all of the

has been prepared, through which it is possible to secure in a moment all of the material upon a given subject. The library has been consulted not only by members of the Commission, City officials, architects, contractors and other citizens interested in City improvement, but to a steadily increasing extent by visitors from other cities who have learned of its value and comprehensive scope.

who have learned of its value and comprehensive scope.

Ever since the reorganization of the Commission subsequent to the enactment of the present Charter, the necessity of a complete catalogue of the works of art belonging to the City has been realized. Application was made to the various departments for the needed data, but it soon became evident not only that there was no such catalogue in existence, but that the material from which one could be compiled was widely scattered and in many instances wholly lacking.

A summary inquiry further showed that the number of works of art acquired by the City from time to time, by gift, purchase or otherwise, including paintings, statues, monuments, busts, tablets, and other sculptures intended for ornament or commemoration, was very much larger than had been imagined. Many were unknown to the public, and, scattered through various public buildings, had almost been lost sight of by the City authorities themselves.

The preparation of a comprehensive catalogue was begun during the past year and has been completed for the Borough of Manhattan. A tentative list appears in an appendix to this report, but owing to the absence of accurate records and complete data, it is not expected that this list is complete and accurate in every respect. As rapidly as possible this list will be extended to include the other boroughs of the City.

The widespread interest manifested in the work of the Commission and its methods suggested the advisability of preparing an exhibit for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. From among the many structures which have been approved by the Commission a number were selected representative of the scope and jurisdiction of the Commission. Photographs, drawings and models were prepared, and a pamphlet

describing the powers, organization and methods of the Commission was printed for general distribution. The exhibit was placed in The New York City Building, attracted wide attention, and in recognition of its merit was awarded a gold medal.

Herewith appended are the minutes of the Commission for the year just closed, which show in detail the action taken by the Commission on every matter coming within its jurisdiction.

CATALOGUE OF WORKS OF ART BELONGING TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The following tentative list has been compiled from the records of the various City departments, supplemented by a thorough canvass of the Borough of Manhattan. It is not expected that the list is free from errors and omissions, for in many instances the data secured were not only incomplete but very vague and uncertain. Even the works of art themselves do not in all instances bear the names of the artists or dates of completion. In a number of instances, owing to the changes and alterations that have been made, the name of the artist has partially or wholly been obliterated, and the authorship is consequently open to question. The list is, however, as complete as the material at hand at present will permit, and if those into whose hands it may come shall be able to supply the deficiencies and correct such errors as may unavoidably have crept in, it will be appreciated not only by the Commission but by those who are constantly applying at this office for information regarding the City's art works. works.

works.

In determining whether a painting, sculpture or structure is a work of art, the definition used in the Charter in defining the powers of the Art Commission has liberally been construed. Section 637 provides: "The term 'work of art,' as used in this title, shall apply to and include all paintings, mural decorations, stained glass, statues, bas-reliefs, or other sculptures, monuments, fountains, arches or other structures of a permanent character intended for ornament or commemoration."

All inscriptions have been copied verbatim, without attempting to correct the errors, if any, contained therein. Where it has been possible to decipher the signature of the artist, this has been indicated by the use of quotation marks. The asterisk (*) is used to indicate the fact of official approval by the Art Commission, before acquisition by the City. The items are classified first alphabetically and again geographically to facilitate easy reference.

To provide a correct record of the location of all works of art, maps of the entire City have been prepared, mounted and placed in the office of the Commission. The location of every work of art and structure approved by the Commission has been plotted. A system of notation has also been adopted which shows at a glance whether the designs and location of a work of art or a public structure have been approved in whole or in part, or have not been passed upon by the Commission. A number has been assigned to each structure and a card catalogue prepared which enables one to find in a moment all of the data in the records of the Commission or its files relating to it. The system is capable of indefinite expansion, and as matters are acted upon by the Commission, the records will be extended so that the catalogue and index will be kept up to date from month to month.
