Dear Sir—I herewith submit the report of the Secretary for the quarter ending June 30, 1912.

Census.

The average daily census of patients in the hospitals, schools for the feeble minded, asylums, homes for the aged and infirm and other institutions of the Department for this quarter has been 10,118, as against 10,096 for the corresponding period

The average daily census of employees in the Department during the quarter was

2,649, including therein the nurses of the different institutions, their average daily census being 325 during this period.

Payroll Changes.

The following table shows the causes and number of changes among the employees during the quarter: Appointments, 1,358; promotions, 101; resignations, 641; transfers, 41; dismissals, 595; total, 2,736.

This quarter is a notable one for the Kings County Hospital because of the many improvements under way.

New Nurses' Home.

The new Nurses' home was occupied by the training school for the first time on May 30, and before the week was out all were comfortably settled in their new quarters. We believe that this building will be a feature in the Department for some time to come, and, with the facilities now afforded, the work of the training school should be most efficient.

New West Wing.

This magnificent addition of modern construction to the hospital is practically completed. There are a few details which need attention, but to a casual observer the building is complete. With the furnishings under way, and an appropriation requested for additional help to maintain this building, we ought surely to be ready to open its wards for patients in September, as contemplated. This building will afford accommodations for at least 160 more patients, a welcome relief to our overcrowded conditions.

Children's Hospital.

This building is progressing nicely, and bids well to be completed on time. The old annex, which occupied the ground between the new children's hospital and the street, has been removed, except the basement walls of one end. The complete disappearance of this old ramshackle rookery seems now a matter of but a few days.

Staff House.

Work on the new staff house has been begun, and has progressed as far as the digging of the cellar. Reasonably favored, we should see this building up and enclosed before the severe weather.

Addition to Psychopathic Building.

Plans and specifications of this new addition have been approved, and the work is now ready for advertising.

Addition to Bakery.

Here, too, the preliminary work of plans and specifications has been done, and soon this needed addition should be under way.

Addition to Heating and Power Plant.

Work on this improvement has been started in a businesslike way. Already a considerable extension of the tunnel has been built, the new steampipes installed, and the work on the four boilers begun. Trenches for the electric conduits have been dug, and the erection of the tracks for the coal conveyor has progressed materially.

Cement Walks at Nurses' Home.

This work was started with all evidences of a quick job, but, unfortunately, conditions arose which necessitated the stopping of the work. About 200 feet of the walk has been condemned, and for more than a month the work has been delayed, due, I understand, to financial troubles of the contractor.

The mechanical force of the institution has kept busy during the quarter with the usual minor repairs necessary for the general upkeep.

Needs.

One of the most important needs is a new building suitable to the housing of our female employees. Many of these people are compelled to seek quarters outside of the grounds, a condition which lessens their earning capacity, and gives us smaller opportunities in the selection of help for the money we pay.

Another urgent need is a suitable workshop for our mechanics. The lack of such facilities hampers their work by increasing the difficulties with which they have to contend:

To the storehouse, to the stable and to the laundry extensions are needed to relieve crowded and congested conditions, and to enable the plant to keep on a par with its growth.

Fire Alarm System.

As the institution grows, this need becomes a more prominent one. The several minutes' delay in getting out the alarm, a condition which prevails at the present time in spite of the efforts made toward remedying it, might, in the event of a real fire, result in serious consequences.

Repairs to Roofs.

The roofs of the main hospital, the domestic building, Annex No. 1, and the Steward's building are in need of a general overhauling and painting.

Miscellaneous and Major Repairs.

There are about twenty doors and casing in the main hospital, the domestic building, the children's hospital and the nervous ward, which should be fireproofed in the opinion of the Inspector from the fire prevention contractor. There is need of cement walks leading from the main road on the grounds to the new morgue and laboratory. In Annex No. 1 and the Steward's building the plumbing needs a general overhauling and replacement.

There should be an overhead water supply in the autopsy room of the morgue.

The woodwork of the main entrance of the hospital needs overhauling and general repairs.

Our elevators throughout the plant should be provided with safety locks on all elevator doors, thus obviating many chances of accident.

Porte cocheres at the receiving wards for the protection of patients admitted during inclement weather.

Wire screens for the new morgue and pathological laboratory building, and an

Wire screens for the new morgue and pathological laboratory building, and an iron fence surrounding our grounds are all necessary improvements.



All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the sur-rounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and reg-ulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Depart-ment of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate pur-

chasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beamholes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned

below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or con-sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal to the with the security required in the advantage. value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five 1 ir centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
