REPORT ON THE MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEARS 1914 AND 1915.

May 25, 1916.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller, The City of New York:

Dear Sir—This report has for its main purpose the consideration of the detailed expenses of the Fire Department for operation and maintenance in the years 1914 and 1915. Before, however, taking up the work of analyzing and comparing the financial results of these years, it is proposed to briefly outline the history of fire-fighting in New York from the earliest days of the city until the establishment of the Greater New York in 1898.

1. History of Fire Fighting in New York.

Perhaps no institution of The City of New York appeals with greater force to the average citizen than does the Fire Department, and doubtless the constantly shifting elements of danger always present in a large fire, and the strenuous and spectacular efforts necessary to subdue it will always hold the public attention.

The first "general conflagration" in New York, of which history tells us, occurred in 1627, when there were only about thirty houses in the settlement. Doubtless it was in part invited by the flimsy and inflammable construction of the houses, for at that time they were built entirely of wood, even to the chimneys. Fires of a minor nature seem to have been of frequent occurrence. While water was abundant, the early facilities for transporting it were entirely inadequate.

In 1648, however, Gov. Stuyvesant and his Council appointed four fire wardens. Their duty it was to inspect the various premises to see that chimneys were kept clean, and to penalize those who were derelict in observing the rules laid down. The fines collected were to be used for the purchase of fire-fighting supplies. Despite the necessity for these precautions, it is stated that the fire wardens experienced the greatest difficulty in performing the duty of inspecting the chimneys, the Dutch housewives being especially belligerent and abusive. The court records show that one of these women was mulcted in the sum of two pounds Flemish for calling a fire warden a "chimney sweep."

In 1657 all thatch roofs and wooden chimneys were ordered taken down within four months, subject to a penalty of twenty-five guilders (\$10) for every month's delay.

Probably as a result of this ordinance, bricks and tile were first imported from Holland in 1659. Steps were also taken to secure the manufacture of leather buckets, ladders and hooks. These were distributed at convenient places. A public well was also established in front of the Fort. A rattle watch was also inaugurated. It consisted of eight men, every man being obliged to serve in turn.

In 1686 an ordinance was enacted requiring that every house with two chimneys should be provided with one fire bucket, and every house with more than two chimneys, with two fire buckets. This practice is said to have been continued long after the introduction of fire engines in 1731. The population of the town was then about 8,600, and its houses numbered about 1,200. Few of the houses exceeded one-story in height. In 1732 an overseer or chief engineer was appointed at a salary of twelve pounds a year, and he and the persons employed with him have been referred to as the "first regularly organized fire department."

The voluntary fire department as established by an act of the colonial legislature dates from 1738. The corporation appointed five men from each of the six wards and passed an ordinance for their regulation.

"When a building took fire in the night," says Stone's History of New York City, "notice was immediately given by the watchmen to the members of the Corporation, fire warden and bell-ringers. They also called out 'Fire,' and the inhabitants placed lighted candles in their windows to aid the engines in their passage through the streets. Watchmen neglecting their duties were liable to a fine of \$100. When a chimney took fire, the occupant of the house was fined \$5. The same fine was imposed upon carpenters who did not carefully remove their shavings at the end of their day's work. A person using a lighted lamp or candle in a storehouse, unless secured in a lantern, forfeited \$10."

The great fire of 1776, which destroyed about 1,000 houses, nearly one-fourth of the town, occurred during the British occupation of it. The magnitude of this fire was due largely to the absence from the town of the regular firemen. They had been formed into a military organization and had consequently retired from the City with the other American troops.

After the Revolution, the Fire Department was reorganized. The act of incorporation in 1798 named the firemen "The Fire Department," and continued the organization until 1818. The laws of 1831 continued it, and the laws then affecting it, until 1860.

May, 1811, saw another large fire. This one destroyed between 80 and 100 buildings and for a time threatened the existence of the city. Due probably, in part, to this conflagration, there was passed in 1813, a law fixing certain limits within which thereafter, all buildings erected should be constructed of stone or brick. This law also provided regulations for the handling of inflammable and explosive materials.

The equipment of the department in 1825 consisted of 42 engines, 5 hook-and-ladder trucks, one hose wagon, 10,256 feet of hose, 255 buckets, 28 ladders and 30 hooks. The men belonging to the fire department numbered 1,347.

The fire of 1828 destroyed property valued at over \$600,000. It led to the construction of a well and reservoir at 13th Street and the Bowery, and the necessary steam pumps and pipe lines.

In 1835 occurred New York's greatest fire. It devastated an area of thirteen acres, extending roughly from Wall and William Streets to the East River. The loss was 693 houses and stores valued with their contents at \$18,000,000.

The loss of the city from great fires was not yet at an end. In 1845 another conflagration destroyed 345 buildings, with a loss estimated at from \$6,000,000 to \$10,000,000. Its great spread was due to the explosion of a large quantity of salt-petre stored on New Street.

Composed as it was at first almost exclusively of the most influential and prominent citizens, the voluntary fire department for a long time rendered very satisfactory service. It is said that in the "thirties" one of the chief pleasures of the New Yorker was to "run with the engine." Later, however, as the department increased in numbers, the animosities between the rival companies frequently resulted in street brawls approaching riots, and a change in methods became desirable.

The next step in the progress of fire fighting was the substitution for the voluntary fire department of a permanently engaged paid force. This was made possible by an act of the legislature in 1865, creating the "Metropolitan Fire Department." Although introduced in London in 1832, it was not until about 1860 that steam fire engines were introduced in New York. In 1863, the voluntary department consisted of 4,122 men; in 1871 the paid department consisted of but 599 men. The paid force with the new engines were able to perform even more satisfactory service than that rendered by the volunteer department.

The fire department of the Village of Brooklyn was incorporated in 1823. Its name was changed by law in 1855, to "The Fire Department of the City of Brooklyn." In 1857, an act was passed for the better regulation of firemen, and in 1869, a law was enacted creating in Brooklyn the "Metropolitan Paid Fire Department."

We come now to 1898, the date of the formation of the Greater City. The management of the force in Brooklyn was brought under the supervision of a deputy commissioner of the reorganized fire department, while the volunteer forces of the Borough of Richmond and many parts of Queens were for a time retained. In Brooklyn, subsequent to 1869 and in New York, subsequent to 1870, the fire departments of each of the respective cities had been under the direction of a board of commissioners. The new charter provided, however, for but one commissioner for the whole of the consolidated territory.

The report of the Commissioner of the Department in 1898 sets forth the total personnel of the fire fighting force and its equipment, as follows:

In addition to the fire-fighting force of 5,687 in 1898, there were 241 other employees, engaged as follows, making a total of 5,928:

Headquarters, 36; bureau of Chief of Department, 24; fire alarm telegraph, 54; hospital stables, 14; Superintendent of Buildings, 10; repair shops, 79; Bureau of Inspector of Combustibles, 15; Bureau of Fire Marshal, 9; total, 241.

2. Present Organization, Equipment and Work of the Fire Department.

The principal laws pertaining to the Fire Department will be found in Chapter XV of the Greater New York Charter and in Chapters 10 and 11 of the Code of Ordinances of the City. A good description of the duties of the Fire Department and of its personnel and equipment is given in the Municipal Year Book for 1915. This follows:

"The Fire Department is under the control of a Commissioner, appointed by the Mayor. On May 1, 1915, the fire-fighting force was constituted as follows:

"A fireman receives \$1,000 annually for the first two years of his service. At the beginning of the third year he receives \$1,200, and at the beginning of the fourth year he receives \$1,400, which is the maximum salary paid for the grade of firemen.

"The Department maintains a fire college for the instruction of officers in fire-fighting and has operated an automobile school for chauffeurs for the past three years.

"In March, 1915, a rescue company was organized for use at specially hazardous fires. These men are equipped with smoke helmets and oxygen tanks and can operate under conditions where an unequipped fireman could not live. The company is particularly valuable in coping with fires where the smoke is unusually heavy or where fumes from chemicals render the air dangerous.

"A high pressure water-supply system has been installed by the Department of Water Supply in certain sections of Manhattan and Brooklyn for fire-fighting purposes. This system provides separate mains and hydrants for fire service. There are two pumping stations in Manhattan and three in Brooklyn for high pressure service. As soon as an alarm is sounded for a fire within the high pressure district the electric pumps are turned on and a pressure ranging, according to need, from 75 pounds to 150 pounds is put on the mains. This pressure can be increased to 300 pounds and renders the use of the ordinary fire engine unnecessary.

"The Fire Department occupies nearly 300 buildings. At the end of 1914 the fire-fighting equipment included 160 horse-drawn engines, 195 horse-drawn hose-wagons, and 51 horse-drawn aerial hooks and ladders. The motor equipment then included 2 pumping engines, 33 hose wagons, 33 combination chemical and hose wagons, 5 water towers, 4 aerial hooks and ladders, and 114 tractors.

"In addition to fire-fighting, an important function of the Department is fire prevention. The Bureau of Fire Prevention was established in 1911, under a law which vested in the Fire Commissioner authority to enforce the law and ordinances relating to the prevention of fires. This bureau inspects all buildings in the City of New York for the purpose of correcting conditions likely either to cause fires, to promote the spread of fire or to prevent the escape of occupants in case of fire. The bureau also investigates the causes of fires and presents to the District Attorney evidence of arson. In 1914 the bureau secured compliance with over 18,000 orders eliminating fire hazards and secured 37 convictions for arson. A legal decision rendered during the year established the right of the Fire Commissioner to recover, in behalf of the City, expenses incurred by him in extinguishing fires caused by non-compliance with fire prevention orders."

Since 1911 the department has been modernizing its fire alarm system under the direction of the Bureau of Fire Alarm Telegraph. New central office buildings have been constructed in Manhattan, Bronx and Brooklyn. Overhead wires are being placed underground gradually and in the outlying boroughs alarm wire pole lines are being strengthened and otherwise improved.

Along with the modernizing of the fire alarm system the department is gradually motorizing all its fire apparatus vehicles. It is hoped to have the entire department motorized by 1918 and to obtain large savings by reason of the extended radius of operation of the motor driven fire apparatus.

During 1914 the authority of the department was strengthened by two legal decisions. One of these (212 N. Y. 407) upheld the right of the Fire Department "to require the installation of automatic sprinklers in buildings reasonably requiring such protection, though such buildings may not come within the mandatory provisions as to sprinklers set forth in the Labor Law."

The other decision (164 App. Div. 832) grew out of a suit by the Fire Department against an owner who had failed to comply with an order to install automatic sprinklers for the cost of putting out a fire which would not have spread extensively had the order been obeyed. It was held by the Court that the owner was liable. This decision is said to have led to much quicker compliance with fire prevention orders.

The fire losses decreased from \$9,413,042 in 1907, or \$22.22 per capita, to \$8,217,811 in 1914, or \$14.44 per capita.

7. Cost to the City of the Pension System of the Fire Department.

While not directly provided for in the budget, and while exception might perhaps be taken to its inclusion in the maintenance and operation expenses of the Fire Department, the Relief Fund of this department is a considerable expense to the general taxpayers of the city.

8. Comparative Functional Costs of Operation and Maintenance in 1914 and 1915.

In practically all manufacturing businesses it is possible to obtain functional or unit costs. Even in purely trading enterprises the expenses may be compared by treating them as percentages of the sales. But how are we to measure the efficiency of a department whose chief function is to extinguish fires, when obviously the lesser the number of fires the greater is the satisfaction of the citizens? While, of course, a satisfactory unit cost is unavailable, yet an effort has been made to secure such comparisons as were possible, and these are presented in the following tables:

Statement No. 1, hereinbefore set forth, shows a decrease in the total cost of maintenance and operation in 1915 as compared with 1914 of \$170,015.97. When, however, we consider that the purchases of equipment in 1914 exceeded those in 1915 by \$196,038.27, the decrease in the total expenditures loses much of its weight.

Statement No. 1a, relating to the cost of "Fire Fighting" in Manhattan and The Bronx, shows in 1915 a decreased cost as compared with 1914 of \$280,192.23. Of this saving, \$56,813.07 pertained to "Personal Service," due to the motorization of apparatus in Manhattan and \$218,695.32 to lessened expenditures for supplies and equipment.

Statement 1b, "Fire Fighting, Brooklyn and Queens," shows a net increase of \$102,205.73. This is due principally to additional expenditures for "personal service," aggregating \$96,621.88, owing in large part to the establishment of several new fire companies. Statement No. 6 indicates, however, for 1915 an average net increase of \$802.26 in the cost of maintaining each hook and ladder company, due to increased pay roll charges.

Statement 1c, "Fire Fighting, Richmond," exhibits a net increase of \$3,975.92. Statement No. 6 shows an increase in the cost of Richmond's five hook and ladder companies of \$5,552.11, or an average per company of \$1,110.44. This is partially offset by savings elsewhere.

Statement No. 2 compares by percentages the cost of fire fighting in the various boroughs and compares the statements 1a to 1c.

Statement No. 3 shows the percentages of the cost of each function of the fire department to the entire expenditures in 1914 and 1915. The main decrease in the percentage of the whole is in "Fire Fighting," and the chief increases in the "Fire Extinguishment," the supervision of the "Fire Fighting" forces, and in the Fire Alarm Telegraph Bureau.

Statement No. 4 gives in greater detail the information shown in summary form in Statement No. 1 pertaining to the total cost of the Fire Department in 1915, exclusive of "Fire Fighting." As pointed out in Statement No. 1, this figure, \$1,290,156.20, formed 14.14 per cent of the total expenditures for 1915, while the corresponding figures in 1914, \$1,252,308.34, were but 13.47 per cent of the total expenditures of the Fire Department in that year.

Statement No. 5 shows by boroughs the expenditures in 1915 for personal service, repairs, supplies and equipment in connection with "Fire Fighting." As compared with 1914 there was an increase in the cost of "Personal Service" of \$38,459.55, and decreases in Equipment and Supplies of \$240,131.17, and in Repairs, \$6,192.21; a total net decrease of \$107,863.83.

Statement No. 6 shows the average cost of each fire company in 1914 and 1915. Practically all of the items, except the "Boats," show a substantial decrease in 1915 as compared with 1914. The number of boats was decreased from 11 to 10 and the total cost from \$477,544.67 to \$459,604.20, but the average cost of each boat and its staff increased from \$43,254.84 to \$45,865.57, or \$2,610.73.

Taking the boroughs separately, however, we find the following results:

The increases in the cost of hook and ladder companies have been considered in connection with Statement No. 1.

Statement No. 7 shows a decrease in all the items pertaining to the maintenance of stables in fire houses of \$24,235.75.

Statement No. 8 treats of the cost in 1914 and 1915 of maintaining the hospital and training stables and motorless vehicles other than those used for "Fire Fighting." It shows an increased cost in 1915 over 1914 of \$4,257.03. Sufficient detail is not furnished by the Fire Department, however, to permit the pointing out of the particular activity or activities in which these increases arose.

Statement No. 9 deals with the cost in 1914 and 1915 of maintaining motor-driven vehicles. The increase in 1915 over 1914 is \$17,405.42 or 28.3 per cent. Of the total expenditure of \$78,951.88 in 1915, \$36,115.20 or 46.3 per cent is undistributed by boroughs. It is possible that a more thorough distribution of these costs would develop useful information.

General Remarks.

As a whole the progress of the Fire Department during 1914 and 1915 would seem to be very satisfactory. The report of the Commissioner for the latter year states that the per capita fire loss for 1915, \$1.06, was the lowest in the history of the city. This result he attributes to three factors: "Systematic extension of fire prevention; monthly inspections by firemen; and increase efficiency in the uniformed force, due to the Fire College and School of Industrial Training." He states also that in 1915 buildings and sites worth \$418,000 were turned back to the city and eleven buildings leased at \$10,800 a year. This was made possible by the partial motorization of the apparatus of the department.

With a thorough appreciation of the work done by the Fire Department both in preventing and in fighting fires in 1915, and without in the least desiring to detract in any way from the credit to which the Fire Department appears entitled, yet it must be said that it is too early to attribute the results attained in 1915 entirely to good management or to fire prevention methods, for the figures shown above fluctuate

too greatly to permit of such assumption. If through a period of years such a record can be maintained, then only would it appear fair to assume that the results are the logical outcome of the methods of fire prevention and fire fighting pursued by the Fire Department. Perhaps the plotting of the fire losses in various districts and the extensive application of fire prevention and investigative methods to the districts obviously most in need of them would prove conclusively the value of fire prevention methods.

A comparison on a per capita basis of the fire losses of American cities with the fire losses of foreign cities show a much greater loss on the part of the former. The American Year Book for 1915 gives "a per capita loss for leading cities of 42 cents in Austria, 67 cents in England, 63 cents in France, 17 cents in Germany, 37 cents in Italy, and 7 cents in the Netherlands." A study of the nature of the fire risks there and the methods of preventing and fighting fires, the penalizing of careless or criminal occupants, insurance methods, and the manner of recording, investigating and settling losses might also be beneficial to The City of New York. Fireproof Partitions.—The following construction installed by Albert Oliver & Son, Inc., of New York City, has been added to the list of partitions approved for use in fireproof construction after a satisfactory standard one-hour fire test in accordance with Section 355 of the Building Code.

Clinton Welded Wire Studing consisting of galvanized No. 6 vertical wires spaced 12 inches on centers and crimped No. 6 horizontal wires spaced 16 inches on centers, covered both sides with Clinton Welded Sheathing made of No. 13 gauge wires, 3 by 8 inch welded mesh and perforated tar paper attached to the vertical sup-

ports with No. 16 annealed tie wires at intervals of 6 inches; the sheathing plastered on both exterior surfaces with hard plaster mortar and hard finish to a thickness of ¾ inches. The wire studing to be adequately stiffened with 2 by ¾-inch steel spacing strips and the thickness of the partition to be over all about 4¾ inches with a 3-inch hollow space.

Fire-resisting Partitions.—The following construction has been approved as a fire-resisting partition for use in non-fireproof construction:

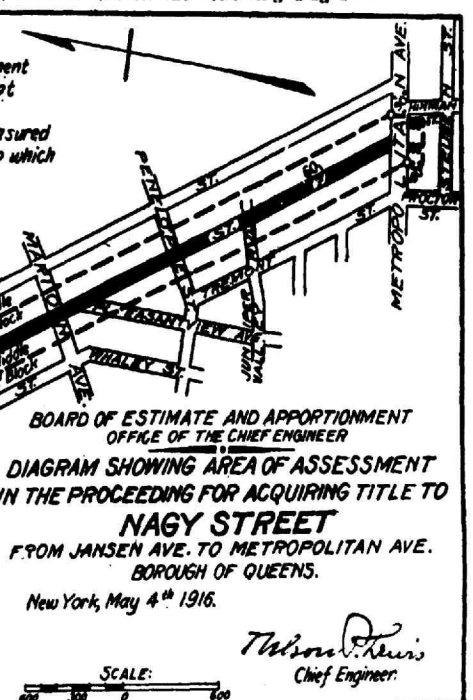

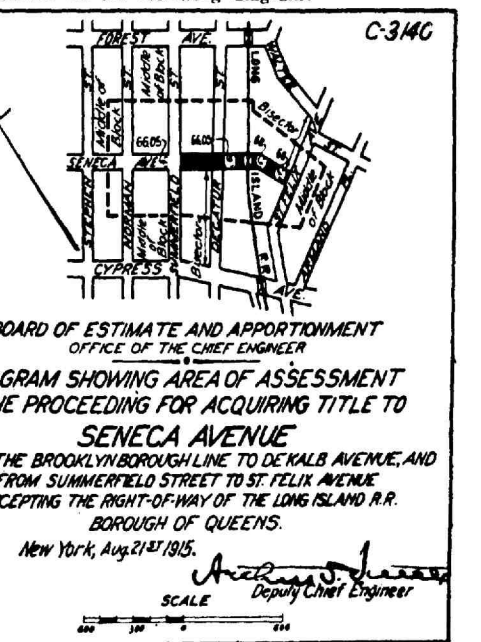

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Amendments to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held May 31, 1916, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Section 144 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended and made to read as follows:

Section 144. *Cooking, eating and drinking utensils to be properly cleaned after being used.* All utensils used in the preparation, service and sale of any food or drink intended for human consumption shall be properly cleaned after being used, and no such utensil shall, under any circumstances, be used a second time unless it shall have been, after the previous use thereof, so cleaned. In such cleansing the use of water which has become insanitary by previous use is prohibited.

The term "properly cleaned" as herein used shall be taken to mean cleansing after each use in a solution of soap powder or soda in hot water and the employment of friction supplied by means of a brush or other suitable implement, followed by rinsing in clean hot water; by sterilization; or by some other equally effective method.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureau or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and it is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank form prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
