### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in  
the Mayor's Reception Room, City Hall, at 11 o'Clock A. M., on Thursday,  
February 15, 1917.

Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Albert E. Hadlock, Deputy and Acting  
Comptroller; Milo R. Maltbie, Chamberlain; Frank L. Dowling, President, Board of  
Aldermen.

Dock Department—Proposed Lease to the Vermont Hygeia Ice Company of  
Certain Land Under Water South of Dyckman St., North River.

This matter was on the calendar of the last meeting, laid over, and the Corporation  
Counsel requested to prepare a form of lease in conformity with the report of the  
Committee, presented at the meeting together with a form of bond conditioned for  
the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the lease. The form of lease  
and bond when so prepared to be transmitted to this Board for its consideration.

The form of lease and bond not being ready action thereon was laid over.

The Chamberlain then offered the following resolution:  
Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel and the Commissioner of Docks be and  
they are hereby requested to report what land east of the railroad tracks near the  
land of the Vermont Hygeia Ice Company south of the foot of Dyckman street,  
North River, is owned by The City of New York, with a map showing dimensions.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Dock Department—Vesting of Title to Property Between W. 43rd and W. 51st  
Sts., North River, Manhattan.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks requesting that  
a resolution be adopted directing the vesting in the City of title to property to be ac-

quired for the improvement of the waterfront between W. 43d and W. 51st Sts.,  
Borough of Manhattan, on the day after the entry of the order of the Supreme Court  
granting of the application to condemn said property.

A public hearing being necessary the following resolution was offered for adop-  
tion:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix 11 o'clock  
in the forenoon on Thursday, March 15, 1917, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of  
Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the request  
of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt  
a resolution directing the vesting in The City of New York of title to the property  
to be acquired for improving the water-front between West 43d and West 51st  
Streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, on the day after the entry of the order of the  
Supreme Court granting the application to condemn said property.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Dock Department—Rescindment of \$164,880.75 of Corporate Stock Authoriza-  
tions.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered  
the following resolution:

January 31, 1917.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—As a result of an examination of various corporate stock funds  
made by the Bureau of Contract Supervision it was disclosed that there remained  
unencumbered balances in many accounts which were no longer required for the  
specific purposes for which they were authorized.

In a communication dated January 29, 1917, the First Deputy Commissioner of  
Docks agreed to a proposal to rescind and reduce corporate stock authorizations to  
his department, as follows:

Investment of \$25,000,000 in General Fund Bonds.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered  
the following resolution:

February 14, 1917.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Chapter 103 of the Laws of 1903, as amended, entitled "An Act to  
amend the Greater New York Charter relative to the Sinking Fund of The City of  
New York for the Redemption of the City Debt, by adding a new section to be  
known as section Two Hundred and Twenty-two, providing for the issue of additional  
bonds of the City of New York, to be called General Fund Bonds, and by amending  
section One Hundred and Sixty-nine of said Charter," provides:

First. "The Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in the year  
1903, and in each year thereafter until all of the bonds and stock which are  
redeemable from the fund known as the 'Sinking Fund of the City of New York  
for the Redemption of the City Debt' shall have matured, shall set apart out of  
the revenues and income of said Sinking Fund, except the income and accumulation  
thereof derived from assets held by said Sinking Fund on January 1, 1903, and  
except also the income and accumulation thereof derived from the amount to be  
thus annually set apart, a sum which, with the accumulation of interest thereon,  
together with the said assets of said Sinking Fund and the earnings and accumula-  
tions thereof, shall be sufficient to redeem at maturity all the bonds and stock  
of the City of New York which are redeemable from said Sinking Fund."

Second. "At least two weeks before the meeting of the Board of Aldermen,  
in each and every year, for the purpose of receiving the Assessment Rolls required  
to be delivered by the Board of Taxes and Assessments to the Board of Aldermen,  
the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may, in its discretion,  
certify to the Board of Aldermen the amount, as estimated by said Board of  
Commissioners, of revenues or income from all sources of 'The Sinking Fund of  
the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt' during the then  
calendar year, and also the amount required by this section to be set apart for  
such calendar year out of such revenues and income for the redemption of bonds  
and stock."

Third. "If in any year the said estimated amount of revenues or income  
of said Sinking Fund, excepting the income and accumulation thereof derived  
from the assets held by said Sinking Fund on January first, nineteen hundred and  
three, and from the amounts annually set apart for the redemption of bonds and  
stock as by this section required shall exceed the amount required to be set apart

in such year as in this section provided the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may, in its discretion, at the time of making said certificates to the Board of Aldermen, determine to invest the whole or any part of the amount of such excess in General Fund Bonds of the City of New York for the amount of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt; but such investments shall not be made in any year until the amount required by this section to be set apart for such year, as provided herein, shall have been so set apart."

Fourth. "The Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall then notify the Board of Aldermen and the Comptroller of the amount it has determined to invest in General Fund Bonds during the current year, and the Comptroller shall include said amount in the certificate of estimated revenues of the General Fund required to be by him made to the Board of Aldermen pursuant to section Nine Hundred of this Act."

As a result of an actuarial examination of the accrued amortization or reserve requirement of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), which was embodied in a report of the Comptroller, dated December 10, 1913, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, said Commission, at a meeting held on December 17, 1913, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That there shall be set aside and retained in the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 1, the sum of \$7,999,066.26, consisting of (1) the amount of the balance held on January 1, 1913, of the accumulation of the assets held by the said Sinking Fund on January 1, 1903, viz.: \$77,894,497.08, and (2) the sum of \$104,569.18 required to be retained out of the revenues of the said Sinking Fund, other than the revenues derived from the investment of the assets held by the said Sinking Fund on January 1, 1903, to provide for the redemption of the obligations of said Sinking Fund outstanding on January 1, 1913, said amount, \$77,999,066.26 so set aside to be invested at a rate of interest not less than 3 per cent. per annum, said sum and its accumulations to the extent of 3 per cent. per annum to be applied solely to the purposes of the redemption at their several maturity dates of said obligations, amounting to \$97,782,459.05, outstanding on January 1, 1913, as provided in Chapter 103 of the Laws of 1903."

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held on January 21, 1914, a supplemental communication from the Comptroller, dated January 13, 1914, with regard to the surplus accumulations of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1) was ordered printed in the minutes. Said communication stated that the reserves at January 1, 1914, necessary, with compound interest at three per cent. (3%) per annum, to retire at maturity the bonds secured by Sinking Fund No. 1, amounted to \$72,797,222.87.

An actuarial computation shows that the interest accruing during 1914 on said \$72,797,222.87 aggregated \$2,163,951.58, giving a total reserve of \$74,959,174.45. On November 1, 1914, \$4,074,394.80 of bonds matured and were redeemed and cancelled by the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 1, thus reducing the actuarial reserve required by the fund as of January 1, 1915, to \$70,886,779.65.

An actuarial computation shows that the interest accruing during 1915 on said \$70,886,779.65 aggregated \$2,102,729.56, giving a total reserve of \$72,989,509.21. On November 1, 1915, \$4,875,686.98 of bonds matured and were redeemed and cancelled by the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 1, thus reducing the actuarial reserve required by the fund as of January 1, 1916, to \$68,113,822.23.

An actuarial computation shows that the interest accruing during 1916 on said \$68,113,822.23 aggregated \$1,985,779.69, giving a total reserve of \$70,099,601.92. On November 1, 1916, \$11,783,714.32 of bonds matured and were redeemed and cancelled by the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 1, thus reducing the actuarial reserve required by the fund as of January 1, 1917, to \$58,315,887.60.

I submit herewith for the information of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the following statement of the estimated amount of receipts on account of the revenues and other income from all sources of the "SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK for the REDEMPTION of the CITY DEBT" (No. 1) for the year 1917, viz.:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 103 of the Laws of 1903, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York hereby determine to invest from time to time during the year 1917, for account of the "Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1)" the sum of twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) in General Fund Bonds of The City of New York, bearing interest at three (3) per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually on May 1 and November 1, the principal maturing November 1, 1930. The investment thus determined in General Fund Bonds is out of the revenues or income of the year 1917 of the said Sinking Fund of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt in excess of the income and accumulation thereof derived from the reserve of fifty-eight million three hundred and fifteen thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and 60-100 dollars (\$58,315,887.60) held by said Sinking Fund on January 1, 1917, and necessary to be set apart to redeem at maturity the bonds secured by this Fund, and be it further.

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby is directed to notify the Board of Aldermen and the Comptroller of the amount that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have determined to invest in General Fund Bonds of The City of New York, pursuant to the foregoing resolution.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

**Proposed Exchange of Property on Inwood Hill for Two Parcels of Land Owned by the City, One at the Northwesterly Corner of Essex St. and Essex Market Pl., and the other at the Northwest Corner of Delancey and Attorney Sts., Manhattan (Appointment of Appraisers).**

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution.

February 15, 1917.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Gentlemen—On March 17, 1916, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment laid as a public park, north of the Dyckman Street, and along the Hudson River and Harlem River Ship Canal, as shown on a map or plan bearing the signature of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated February 10, 1916.

I am in receipt of a communication from the owners of part of the property included in the park, in which they state that they are willing to exchange the same, subject to mortgages aggregating \$40,000, bearing interest at 6 per cent, for two parcels of land owned by the City, one of which is located at the northwesterly corner of Essex Street and Essex Market Place, and the other at the northwesterly corner of Delancey and Attorney Streets, Borough of Manhattan.

This exchange to my mind would be advantageous both to the City and to the owners of the strip to be acquired for park purposes, as it will save the time and expense of condemnation proceedings.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt the attached resolution. Respectfully,

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deem it for the interest of the City to authorize an exchange of the following property owned by The City of New York for the land owned by private owners; therefore, be it

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of section 205A of the Greater New York Charter as amended, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby determine that the land owned by The City of New York, described as follows, is not required for departmental or public purposes:

*Parcel 1.*

All that certain piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, described as follows:

Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of Delancey Street and the westerly line of Attorney Street, and running thence westerly along the northerly line of Delancey Street 25 feet; running thence northerly on a line drawn parallel with the westerly line of Attorney Street 100 feet; running thence easterly on a line drawn parallel with the northerly line of Delancey Street 25 feet to the westerly line of Attorney Street; running thence southerly along the westerly line of Attorney Street 100 feet to the point or place of beginning; said premises being shown on the present tax maps of The City of New York as Lot 70 in Block 348, Section 2, of the Borough of Manhattan; also

*Parcel 2.*

All that certain piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the westerly line of Essex Street, distant 88 feet 3 inches southerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly line of Broome Street and the westerly line of Essex Street; running thence westerly parallel with Broome Street 87 feet 6 inches; thence southerly parallel with Essex Street to the northerly line of Essex Market Place; running thence easterly along the northerly line of Essex Market Place 87 feet 6 inches to the westerly line of Essex Street; running thence northerly along the westerly line of Essex Street to the point or place of beginning.

The hereinbefore mentioned street or highway, to wit: Essex Market Place, has never been legally laid out on the map or plan of The City of New York, and is here used for the purpose of description only.

—they further determine that the lands of the private owners hereinafter described are needed for public purposes:

*Parcel 3.*

All that certain tract, plot or parcel of land with the buildings and improvements thereon, situate, lying and being in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, more particularly bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly line of Lot No. 1143 of Block 2255 of Section 8, as shown on the present Tax Maps of The City of New York, said point being distant 123.61 feet westerly from the point of intersection of the northerly line of said Lot No. 1143 with the easterly boundary line of a proposed park, shown on a map made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and adopted by said Board on March 17, 1916, and approved by the Mayor March 22, 1916, which map is entitled "Laying Out a Public Park north of Dyckman Street and along the Hudson River and the Harlem River Ship Canal"; running thence northerly and along the easterly line of Lot No. 1163 of said Block 2255 above mentioned, 389.75 feet; running thence westerly and parallel with the northerly line of Lot No. 1143, first above mentioned, 405.94 feet to the easterly boundary line of the right-of-way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company; running thence northerly and along the said boundary line of the New York Central Railroad 262.12 feet to the prolongation of the center line of 212th Street; running thence easterly and along the said center line of 212th Street 428.04 feet to the easterly boundary line of the proposed park above mentioned; running thence southerly and along said easterly line of proposed park 368.25 feet to a point of curve in said easterly line of park; running thence still southerly and continuing along the said easterly line of the proposed park 290.49 feet to the northerly line of Lot 1143 above mentioned; running thence westerly along the northerly line of Lot 1143, 123.61 feet to the point or place of beginning; said premises being shown on the present Tax Maps of The City of New York as that portion of Lot 1143, Block 2255, Section 8, Borough of Manhattan, which lies between

the easterly boundary line of the proposed park above described and the easterly boundary line of the right-of-way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad.

Together with the land under water and the riparian rights and privileges appurtenant to the premises above described.

— and be it further Resolved, That, to determine the value of the lands of The City of New York and the value of the lands of private owners to be exchanged therefor, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby appoint Joseph P. Day, Henry Brady and W. H. Archibald, three discreet and disinterested appraisers, residing in the Borough of Manhattan, who are hereby authorized and directed to appraise the value of the lands owned by The City of New York and the lands owned by private owners which it is proposed to exchange, and are both hereinabove described.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

**Dock Department—In the Matter of the Service and Rates Charged at the Various Dumping Boards Throughout the City.**

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a protest entered by the Contractors' Protective Association and the Mason Builders Association against the increased rates which the various operators were charging together with the testimony taken by the Commissioner of Docks in regard to the matter at a public hearing given by him. Which was referred to the Commissioner of Accounts for investigation and report.

Note—At this point His Honor the Mayor withdrew from the meeting to attend a hearing before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. A quorum not being present, no action could be taken on the other matters on the calendar. They will be put on the calendar of the next meeting.

**Dock Department—Vesting Title to Property Between W. 43rd and W. 51st Sts., North River, Manhattan.**

At meeting held Feb. 15, 1917, a resolution was adopted fixing 11 o'clock in the forenoon, on Thursday, March 15, 1917, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the request of the Commissioners of Docks that resolution be adopted directing the vesting in the City of title to property to be acquired for the improvement of the waterfront between W. 43d and W. 51st sts., Borough of Manhattan, on the day after the entry of the order of the Supreme Court granting the application to condemn said property.

It now appearing that it would not be for the interest of the City to vest title to the property, the following resolution was offered for adoption.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held February 15, 1917, fixing 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Thursday, March 15, 1917, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution directing the vesting in The City of New York of title to the property to be acquired for improving the water-front between West 43d and West 51st Streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, on the day after the entry of the order of the Supreme Court granting the application to condemn said property, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.







THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and just give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause

or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any

purpose other than that of their removal nor shall he collect any rents or other revenue

for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either

any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the

faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occu-

pacy of any such building by any tenant free,

rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary

watchmen or the workers engaged in the actual

demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the

property on date of delivery thereof to the pur-

chaser. The City of New York will not be re-

sponsible for any change or loss which may

occur in the condition of the buildings, or their

appurtenances between the time of the sale there-

of and the time of delivering possession to the

purchaser, after being properly vacated of all

tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will

be made as nearly together as the circumstances

of vacating the structures of their tenants will

permit.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

and place of residence of the person making

the same, and names of all persons interested

with him therein, and, if no other person be so

interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that

it is made without any connection with any other

person making an estimate for the same purpose,

and is in all respects fair and without collusion

or fraud, and that no member of the Board of

Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a

bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other

person becomes interested directly or indirectly, as con-

tracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or

otherwise in or in the performance of the contract,

or in the supplies, work or business to

which it relates, or in any portion of the profits

thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by

the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making

the estimate that the several matters stated

therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless

as a condition precedent to the reception or con-

sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by

a certified check upon one of the State or Na-

tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to

the order of the Comptroller, or money cor-

porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of

any nature issued by The City of New York,

which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal

value with the security required in the adver-
