

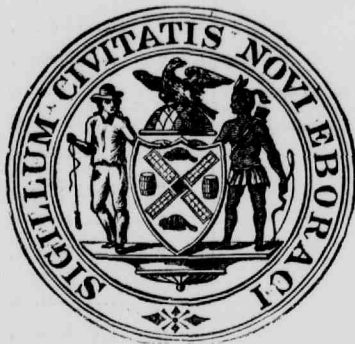

## BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's Office, in the New Court-house, on Thursday, April 28, 1881, at 12 o'clock P. M.

Present—Hon. Allan Campbell, Comptroller; Hon. Wm. C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation; Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held December 4, 1880, were read and approved.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, guttering, and flagging Eleventh avenue, from Fifty-ninth to Seventy-second street, with objections of J. and S. Bernheimer, Cornelius Callahan and others, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated March 21, 1881.

H. A. Shipman, attorney, was heard in behalf of Messrs. Bernheimer, and Cornelius Callahan was sworn and examined in relation to the work of curbing, guttering, and flagging performed by him in front of property of Messrs. Bernheimer, previous to the execution of the work in question.

After hearing the report of the Commissioner of Public Works in reply to the objections filed to the assessment, on motion, the assessment list was laid over and the Chief Clerk directed to notify the contractor and surveyor of the work to be present at the next meeting of this Board in order that they may be examined in said matter.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, guttering, and flagging, One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Boulevard and Hudson river, and record of awards made by the Board of Assessors, for damages by reason of change of grade on the line, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors with a communication dated March 21, 1881.

Truman H. Baldwin, attorney, was heard in behalf of Messrs. A. H. Wellington, Charles R. Maltby, et al., for a reduction of assessment, and Mr. Wellington was sworn and examined in relation to the present condition of the streets and previous to the change of the grades, etc.

After consideration of the objections received in said matter, on motion, they were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for constructing a sewer in Macdougall street, between West Fourth street and West Washington place, from end of present sewer in West Washington place, with objections of Thomas Egleston, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated March 31, 1881.

After hearing Mr. Egleston in support of the objections filed, and after due consideration, on motion, they were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated March 31, 1881, viz.:

No. 1. Thirteenth avenue, paving with granite block pavement, from West Eleventh street to West Sixteenth street.

Weeks, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller; the same having been received from the Board of Assessors with a communication dated March 31, 1881.

After hearing Mr. Weeks, on motion, the said assessment list was laid over for further consideration.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for constructing a sewer in Avenue A, between Tenth and Eleventh streets, and objections of Messrs. Toch Brothers and P. C. Schwartz, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors with communication dated March 31, 1881.

After hearing Mr. Moses Toch, relative to the objection to the assessment upon his property, on motion, the said assessment list was laid over for further consideration.

The assessment list for paving Fifty-eighth street with trap block pavement, between Ninth and Tenth avenues, with objections of the Roosevelt Hospital, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with a communication dated November 9, 1880.

The objections above named having been previously considered and the claim partially allowed by the Board of Assessors, on motion, the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb-stones, and flagging full width, and paving Broadway, from Manhattan street to One Hundred and Thirty-third street, with granite block pavement, and record of awards made by the Board of Assessors, for damages by reason of change of grade, and applications for awards and objections of Morris Littman, Henry Tone, John Webber and others, to the assessment, were presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated March 21, 1881.

After consideration of the matter, on motion, the objections were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

of estimate, as provided in the acts hereby amended, and as hereby amended, and by the report of the commissioners of assessment, as provided by this act, that an award for compensation for the lands taken or to be taken for the purposes of said improvement has been made to the same owners or parties in interest, upon whom and upon whose lands and premises an assessment for benefit has been made in which the award for compensation is greater than the assessment for benefit, said comptroller shall pay to said owners or parties in interest the excess only of such compensation so awarded over the amount assessed upon such owners or parties in interest: and whenever an assessment for benefit, upon the owners or parties in interest, of lands and premises within said area of assessment is made against the same owners or parties in interest to whom compensation is awarded for lands and premises taken or to be taken for said improvement, and such assessment for benefit exceeds such award for compensation, such owners or parties in interest shall be liable to pay only such excess, and upon receipt of the amount of such excess, with interest, as above provided, said comptroller is hereby authorized and required to discharge such assessment and the lien created thereby.

§ 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

## CHAPTER 62.

AN ACT relative to the continuance of compensation to judges and justices of courts in certain cases, after removal pursuant to the provisions of the constitution.

Passed March 29, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Any judge or justice of any court who shall be removed pursuant to section eleven of article six of the constitution, for any cause not involving moral delinquency, shall continue to receive, until the expiration of the term for which he was elected, a sum equal to one-half of the salary of his office as fixed by law at the time of such removal, to be paid to him at the same times and in the same manner as said salary was payable when he was so removed.

Sec. 2. If said sum would exceed three thousand dollars no greater sum shall be annually paid to said judge or justice than three thousand dollars. The payment of any sum pursuant to the provisions of this act shall cease at the death of such judge or justice notwithstanding the term for which he was elected shall not then have expired. No person shall be entitled to the benefit of this act unless the resolution of removal shall state that he is removed for a cause not involving moral delinquency, and shall recommend the continuance of such compensation.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

**RELATING TO THE PAYMENT OF UNPAID** TAXES, ASSESSMENTS, AND CROTON WATER RENTS.

**THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW** York hereby gives notice to owners of real and personal estate in this city, that all unpaid taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents may now be paid with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, as provided by chapter 33 of the Laws of 1881, which is as follows:

#### CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement, for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of such entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the

duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

#### ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

**SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS** of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz.:

First—"The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears."

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "The Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
