COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND, CITY OF NEW YORK, October 30, 1882.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held this day, the following preamble

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held this day, the following preamble and resolution were adopted, to wit:

Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt in the year 1883 are estimated at \$5,105,000, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York, for which said fund was primarily pledged, will fall due in said year, the redemption of which is not provided for; and

Whereas, The total amount of bonds and stocks falling due in 1883, originally payable from taxation, is \$989,949.48; and

Whereas, The amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks outstanding for which that fund is primarily pledged; therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt in the year 1883 are estimated at \$5,105.000, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York, for which said fund was primarily pledged, will fall due during said year, the redemption of which is not provided for, and that the total amount of bonds and stocks, originally payable from taxation, falling due during said year is \$989,949.48, and that the amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks for which said fund was pledged before the passage of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, the securities held by the said Sinking Fund being about forty millions of dollars, while the amount of bonds and stocks, for which said fund is primarily pledged, now outstanding, is about sixteen millions of dollars.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held October 30, 1882.

Present-Hon. William R. Grace, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Hon. Allan Campbell, Comptroller; and J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller reported that the cash balance in the City Treasury to the credit of "The Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt," on October 30, 1882, is \$565,000. The liabilities payable therefrom, for balance of year 1882, will not exceed \$200,000—surplus, \$365,000; and recommended that \$350,000 be transferred to "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," as provided by law; and submitted the following resolution, viz.:

Resolved, That a warrant be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain, on account of "The Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt," for the sum of three hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000), transferring the amount to "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," as provided by section 2 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878.

On motion, the resolution was adopted.

The Comptroller submitted the following report, viz.:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, October 30, 1882.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—In the next fiscal year, 1883, Stocks and Bonds of the City and County of New York, payable from taxation, under the laws authorizing their issue, become due, amounting to \$989,949.48, as follows:

Bonds for State Sinking Fund Deficiency, issued in pursuance of chapter 147, Laws of 1874, payable November 1, 1883 \$389,949 48 New York County Court-house Stock, issued in pursuance of chapter 167, Laws of 1862, payable November I, 1883 Soldiers' Bounty Fund Bonds, issued in pursuance of chapter 7, Laws of 1864, payable November 1, 1883.....

By sections 6 and 7 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, provision is made for the payment and redemption of stocks and bonds payable from taxation, from the surplus revenues and accumulations of "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt."

The following is an estimate of the revenues of that fund for the fiscal year 1883:

The above Estimate does not include Collections of Assessments for public improvements, which will amount to, say, \$500,000.

The amount, however, from other sources of accumulations in the said fund will be amply sufficient to pay and redeem the Stocks and Bonds payable from taxation in the year 1883, without impairing the preferred claims on said fund, as provided by said act, and therefore it will not be necessary next year to raise the money required for their payment, by taxation.

I submit a resolution certifying the facts to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for such action as may be required under the provisions of section 7 of said chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, in making the Estimates of Appropriations for the year 1883.

Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the revenues of "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," in the year 1883, are estimated at \$5,105,000, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York for which said fund was primarily pledged will fall due in said year, the redemption of which is not provided for; and,

Whereas, The total amount of bonds and stocks falling due in 1883, originally payable from taxation, is \$989,949.48; and,

Whereas, The amount of "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt" is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks outstanding for which that fund is primarily pledged; therefore,

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that the revenues of "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," in the year 1883, are estimated at \$5,105,000, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York for which said fund was primarily pledged will fall due during said year, the redemption of which is not provided for; and that the total amount of bonds and stocks originally payable from taxation, falling due during said year is \$989,940.48, and that the amount of "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt" is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks for which said fund was pledged before the passage of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, the securities held by the said Sinking Fund being about forty millions of dollars, while the amount of bonds and stocks for which said fund is primarily pledged, now outstanding, is about sixteen millions of dollars.

The report was accepted, and, on motion, the resolution was adopted.

The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the p

to the signing of the contract.
