"SIR—In reply to yours of this date, in which you desire to be informed 'what are the requirements in the judgment of the Board of Health for completely filling the new position of Sanitary Engineer,' I am directed to say:

"First—That good education, superior intelligence, correct judgment, industrious and temperate habits, physical ability and absolute integrity are preliminary requirements for the office.

"Second—That ability to inspect tenement-houses and to discover any defects in their light and ventilation, in their plumbing and drainage, or in their sapitary condition generally, which are dangerous to lite or detrimental to the health of the tenants; a bility to recommend the necessary alterations, repairs or new work to correct sanitary defects in tenement-houses; ability to make a concise, intelligent and correct written report in each case of such defects and of the remedies proposed, for the consideration and action of the Board of Health, are all required in a Sanitary Engineer.

"Third—That with the qualifications required for a sanitary engineer in first paragraph, such officer, under the instruction of present sanitary officers of this Board and by experience in its service, would in due time acquire the qualifications required in the second paragraph. Education as a civil engineer, as a physician or as a practical plumber would be of special service to a 'Sanitary Engineer,' provided he possessed the qualifications required in the first paragraph.

The legal points raised by the Commissioners of Accounts in respect to the "Additional Sanitary Inspectors who shall be Sanitary Engineers," are not supported by the terms of the law of 1885, which amends section 588 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

4th. That the "emergency clause" in the Health laws cannot be used, as represented by the Commissioners of Accounts, for any deficiency in the ordinary appropriations for, or expenditures of, the Health Department. The section of the Consolidation Act referred to (No. \$80 requires a public record and declaration of "the presence of great and immunent peril to the public health by reason of impending positione." before the necessary money, "in excess of the annual appropriations," can be obtained and used "for the preservation of the public health," the care of contagious diseases, the maintenance of hospitals, etc. The public alarm necessarily caused by such a record and declaration always seriously endangers the great business interests of the city and should be avoided unless absolutely necessary.

5th. The statement of the Commissioners of Accounts that "hardly fifty per cent. of its (the Board of Health's) primary orders are complied with" is disproved by the following statistics: Number of orders issued by the Board of Health, July 1, 1885, to July 1, 1886, 19,490. Number of said orders complied with, 18,732. The orders not recorded upon the books of this Department, as e-mplied with, include such-orders as have been suspended or rescinded by the Board for good and sufficient reasons, and the cases in which judgments have been taken, and the defendants have been found to be irresponsible or non-resident.

6th. The statement that "the policy now pursued is the reverse of that which obtained in the early history of the Department," in respect to the enforcement of orders, is incorrect, and has no other fou

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 11, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was \$,948.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 375.

During the past week 178 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 31 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 4 miscellaneous permits

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 56 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 419 visits were made, and 45 disinfections and 17 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 9.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,261, of which 438 were primary, and 823 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned, 11,170 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 60, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 22, and the amount of fines imposed was \$250.

The certificates of 617 births, 64 still-births, 203 marriages, and 835 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 11, 1886. This shows a decrease of 30 births and 106 marriages and an increase of 11 still-births and 55 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 7 births, 5 still-births, 3 marriages and 224 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from typhus fever decreased 1; croup, 2; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; pneumonia, 21; aneurism, 3; marsums, takes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; convulsions, 4; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 5; drowning, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 24; scartatina, 1; diphtheria, 5; whooping cough, 1; eryspelas, 4; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fever, 8; puerpetal diseases, 2; diarrhoead diseases, 3; inamition, 1; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 13; bronchitus, 12; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 2. The number of deaths from heart diseases, meningitis and encephalitis, cyanosis and attectasis and premature and preternatural births was the same in the two successive weeks.

Fourth—In excavating for boilers and for boiler flue, two springs were met, which filled the boiler pit and excavation for flue. To properly remove this water permanently, a cast-iron drain is necessary, laid with proper depth from spring to sewer. The trench excavations are in solid rock. This work is worth \$100. I respectfully request that authority be given to the undersigned to have these four items contracted for, for sums not to exceed those mentioned herein.

GENTLEMEN—In reply to the request received from your Honorable Board, under date of the 16th instant, I have the bonor to state that little or no balance will remain unexpended of the appropriation for "New Houses for Engine and Hook and Ladder Companies" for the current year.

The transfer above noted was requested because it became absolutely necessary to promptly secure funds for the removal of the Fire Alarm Telegraph from the old to the new Headquarters, for which removal no provision had been made in the estimate for this year (as was at the time fully explained to your Honorable Board), and because the balance, \$9,054, was insufficient for the building of the house of Engine 54.

The balance of \$2,054, remaining at this date, as above shown, will be required and drawn upon before the close of the year for necessary expenditures chargeable to the appropriation in question.

Permit me to again urge upon your Honorable Board the absolute necessity for the \$100,000 asked for new buildings in the Departmental Estimate for the year 1887.

As has been heretofore stated, there still remain thirty-four of the old apparatus houses which were turned over by the Volunteer Department in 1865 to this Department, many of which should be rebuilt or very extensively altered. The houses of Engine 2, 24, 35 and 54, for which the appropriation for the coming year is wanted, are of this class and are in immediate need of rebuilding, as will appear from the following state

statement:

Engine 2—The house was old and dilapidated in 1865, when turned over by the Volunteer Department. Its walls and beams are light and decayed and the house is worn out. It would be false economy to alter or extensively repair it.

Engine 24—The house was built for the Volunteer Department, and was never suitable for the paid service. It is in bad condition now and is stuated in a very important locality. The walls are cracked, the timbers are light, and it is deemed unwise to expend money for alteration or extensive

cracked, the timbers are light, and it is deemed unwise to expend money for atteration or extensive repairs.

Engine 35—The house is about thirty years old, only two stories high, and only about forty feet deep and entirely too small for our needs. The timbers are rotten and the walls are old and thin. To attempt to alter would be throwing money away.

Engine 54—The house is old (having been received from the Old Department), is too small, has no cellar, insufficient light and ventilation, its walls and timbers are not heavy enough for its present purpose, and its general condition is so poor as to be beyond repair.

The other house for which the appropriation is desired (Engine 14, in East Eighteenth street), is in one of the most important sections of the entire city, where the services of a double company have long been demanded. It is however too small to accommodate the extra apparatus, horse, etc., required for that purpose, and is too old and weak to permit of alteration. It is desired to introduce in it a plan of a lifting apparatus floor, which at slight additional expense, will almost double capacity and usefulness of our present houses, and to which I invited your attention when I appeared before you, some days ago.
