### Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending October 16, 1886.

No meeting held this week.  
Pay-rolls amounting to \$26,436.59 were approved and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.  
A contract for paving the roadway of East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, between Mott and Walton avenues, was executed with John B. Devlin, contractor; Ransom Parker Jr., and M. J. Dady, sureties.  
An agreement for the modification of the plan for the construction of the Webster avenue sewer, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred Eighty-fourth streets was executed with the contractor and sureties.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 20, 1886.—STATED MEETING.—11 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Beekman (President), Powers and Borden.

The following communications were received:

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting copy of ordinance to pave One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from Third avenue to St. Ann's avenue, with trap-block pavement. Referred to the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

From Mrs. C. R. Appleton, Mrs. Pauline Knight and others, property-owners, petitioning for the construction of a pipe-sewer in Franklin avenue, from the Twenty-third Ward line to Third avenue. Referred to the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards to report upon.

From the New York and Ixion Bicycle Clubs, forwarding petitions for the opening of all the Park drives to bicycles and tricycles. Referred to Commissioner Borden.

From the Captain of Police, forwarding a medal presented to Officer George E. Carter by a lady, in recognition of his services in stopping a runaway team of horses in the Park on 13th ultimo; also, a communication from Officer Carter asking to be allowed to accept the medal. Filed.

The President stated that upon the receipt of the medal he had returned the same to the Captain of Police with instructions to present it to Officer Carter, in the presence of the force, commending the meritorious conduct for which it was given.

From the Property Clerk, submitting inventory of property of the Department, under date of June 30, 1886. Filed.

From the Topographical Engineer:

1st. Reporting upon the works in progress under his charge. Filed.

2d. Substituting a map, or plan, showing that part of the Hunt's Point District, lying between Trinity avenue and Dawson street, and from East One Hundred and Sixty-third to East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and Legget avenue, as altered and amended under chapter 662 of the Laws of 1886.

On motion, said map or plan was ordered placed on exhibition for ten days in the office of the Topographical Engineer, and the Secretary was directed to insert a notice in the CITY RECORD requesting parties interested to call and examine the same.

3d. In relation to the unsettled question as to the authority to alter or change the grades of streets, roads and avenues in the annexed district, in pursuance of section 671 of the New York City Consolidation Act.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation as to whether authority is still vested in this Department to alter or change grades, in pursuance of the law above cited.

From the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards:

1st. Asking that authority be given for the construction of an additional manhole in connection with sewer in One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, between Third and Franklin avenues, with a branch in Fulton avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-ninth and One Hundred and Sixty-eighth streets.

On motion, the construction of a manhole on the One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street sewer, in addition to the number shown on the plan of said sewer, was authorized.

2d. Forwarding a certificate for payment on acceptance of the work of constructing sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Brook and St. Ann's avenues, with the recommendation that the penalty for 1 3/4 day's overtime be charged against the contractor.

On motion, the recommendation of the Engineer was approved.

From the Superintendent of Parks, reporting in relation to a comprehensive renewal of the plantations of Central Park. Filed.

On motion, the report of the Superintendent of Parks relative to the park, plantations, together with a report in relation to the proposed improvement of the bridge paths, also a report relative to treatment of park lawns, were ordered printed as a Board document.

# HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, SANITARY BUREAU, SEVENTH DIVISION—VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY \* for the week ending October 23, 1886, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending October 16, 1886.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register.

SIR—There were 676 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 23, 1886, which is a decrease of 39, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 107 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending October 16, 1886, was 684, which is 97.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.50 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,451,602.

If the successful bidder shall neglect or refuse, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and be retained by the City of New York, as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc. etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve who called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
