To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my supervision for the quarter ending October 31, 1890:

NORTH RIVER.

West Washington Market Section—Resolution of the Board, February 6, 1889.

DREDGING.

Mud and crib-work were excavated and removed from site of bulkhead-wall under Treasurer's orders therefor.

STONE FILLING.

Rip-rap stone was deposited in line of bulkhead-wall by John A. Bouker under Contract No. 345.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

55 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed and 52 bracing piles were driven and regulated; binding frames were built and sunk to place, and 9 concrete blocks were set on wall foundation.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

150 loads of filling were received and placed in rear of wall.

CLEANING OUT SILT-BASINS.

The silt-basins on new-made land, between Warren and Jay streets, were cleaned out from time to time, under Secretary's Order No. 9780.

Chambers Street Section—Resolution of the Board, November 24, 1877, and November 21, 1878.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

The hole which was washed out at north end of section was leveled up with 25 loads of earth filling.

North Moore Street Section—Resolution of the Board, April 28, 1880.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

New-made land was leveled off between Piers, new 24 and new 25, North river.

Laight Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, July 30 and November 3, 1880, and September 20, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL.

STONE FILLING.

Rip-rap and cobble stone were discharged on line of wall by John A. Bouker under Contract No. 345. Planks were fastened on north end of row of piles to retain cobble filling in place.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

Piles were regulated and cut off; binding frame was keyed to place; 312 lineal feet of longitudinal capping and 36 cross-caps were laid and fastened on the piles; laid deck plank; 86 pieces of granite were set on wall and backed up with 244 batches of concrete.

EARTH FILLING.

17,111 loads of earth filling were received and placed in rear of wall. Total received to date 49,382 loads.

REMOVING OLD WORK.

Old bulkhead and crib-work were removed and planking was laid in front of Piers, new 28 and new 29, North river.

PIER, NEW 29, N. R.

Contract No. 317.

Pier, new 29, North river, has been built, with the exception of the inner 100 feet in length. The contractor, John Gillies, is now waiting for the bulkhead-wall at this point to be built to enable him to complete his work.

A shed is being built over the entire area of Pier, new 29, by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, under resolution of the Board, April 17, 1890.

SILT-BASINS.

Resolution of the Board, June 2, 1886.

The silt-basins on new-made land between Spring and West Tenth streets were cleaned out and mud scraped from around same at various times as required.

West Twenty-third Street Section, South End—Resolution of the Board, November 5, 1880.

BULKHEAD-WALL.

26 pieces of coping were set on wall; backing logs were placed and fastened on top of coping.

EARTH FILLING.

3,995 loads of earth filling were received on tickets and same were placed in rear of wall between West Twenty-sixth and West Twenty-seventh streets.

PIER, NEW 56, N. R.

A pit, 2 feet deep, 8 feet wide and 12 feet long was excavated and a brick furnace was constructed over same, 100 feet north of Pier, new 56, North river, by J. B. and J. M. Cornell, under Secretary's Order No. 10420.

PIER, NEW 57, N. R.

Contract No. 341.

The above pier was repaired by Barth S. Cronin, under his contract, No. 341, with this Department.

West Twenty-third Street Section, South End—Resolution of the Board, June 28, 1882.

STONE FILLING.

Cobble and rip-rap stone were deposited in line of bulkhead-wall by John A. Bouker, under Contract No. 345, and mud was pumped from amongst foundation piles to place cobble filling.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

340 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 28 bracing-piles were driven and regulated; cut off foundation piles, and 120 lineal feet of capping were placed and fastened on piles.

REMOVING OLD WORK.

Old stone house and obstructions to paving at West Thirtieth street were removed.

EARTH FILLING.

A bank of earth and rip-rap stone was dumped in front of cribwork between West Twenty-seventh and West Twenty-eighth streets, North river, 15 feet wide at level of high-water mark.

FILLING AT WEST TWENTY-SEVENTH STREET.

Secretary's Order No. 10398.

Earth filling is being placed to fill up the southerly half of West Twenty-seventh street, from the west side of Eleventh avenue to a point about 70 feet west of the westerly side of Thirteenth avenue, by Stephen A. Walker, attorney for J. B. and J. M. Cornell, under permit of the Board.

FILLING BETWEEN WEST TWENTY-SEVENTH AND WEST TWENTY-EIGHTH STREETS.

Secretary's Order No. 10403.

The northerly half of West Twenty-seventh street and the southerly half of West Twenty-eighth street, North river, are being filled in by Mr. William W. Rossiter, under permit of the Board.

FILLING BETWEEN WEST TWENTY-EIGHTH AND WEST THIRTIETH STREETS.

Secretary's Order No. 9910.

Filling is being placed between West Twenty-eighth and West Thirtieth streets, east of Thirteenth avenue, and streets and avenues are being built by Robert Ray and John A. King, executors of Cornelius Ray, in accordance with resolution of the Board, February 28, 1890.

FILLING AT WEST THIRTIETH STREET.

Secretary's Order No. 10135.

Filling is being received from the Street Cleaning Department and is being placed in rear of the bulkhead-wall south of West Thirtieth street under permit of the Board. Total number of loads received to date, 3,678.

PIER, NEW 58, N. R.

Contract No. 350.

A new Pier near the foot of West Twenty-eighth street is being built by John W. Flaherty under his contract, No. 350, with this Department.

DREDGING.

Mud was excavated and removed from site of Pier, new 58, under Contract No. 346; also from slips at Piers, new 57 and 59, North river.

West Thirty-first Street Section—Resolution of the Board, September 19, 1883.

BULKHEAD-WALL.

MASONRY.

Twenty pieces of coping were set on wall and holes were drilled for backing-logs.

TEMPORARY PAVEMENT BETWEEN WEST THIRTIETH AND WEST THIRTY-THIRD STREETS.

Secretary's Order No. 10326.

A temporary pavement of second-hand Belgian blocks was laid between the north side of West Thirtieth street and the south side of West Thirty-third street, fifty feet in width; also some smaller areas by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under permit from the Board.

BULKHEAD BETWEEN PIERS, NEW 61 AND NEW 63, N. R.

Secretary's Order No. 10209.

A shed is being built on the bulkhead extending from the southerly line of Pier, new 61, to the northerly line of Pier, new 63, North river, by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company under permit of the Board.

West Thirty-second Street Section—Resolution of the Board, October 22, 1885.

BULKHEAD-WALL.

EARTH FILLING.

1,813 loads of filling from the Department of Street Cleaning were received and placed in rear of wall.

West Thirty-third Street Section—Resolution of the Board, February 20, 1890.

BULKHEAD-WALL.

STONE FILLING.

Rip-rap and cobble stone were discharged on wall foundation by John A. Bouker under Contract No. 345.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

Piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; located foundation piles; binding frames were keyed up, 288 lineal feet of longitudinal capping and 32 cross-caps were placed and fastened, etc.

MASONRY.

10 concrete blocks were set on wall foundation; chain holes were filled up with concrete in bags; 70 pieces of granite were set on wall foundation and backed up with 183 batches of concrete.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

25 loads of earth filling were received on tickets, 95 loads from Department of Street Cleaning, and same were placed in rear of wall.

RETAINING STRUCTURES BETWEEN WEST THIRTY-SEVENTH AND WEST THIRTY-EIGHTH STREETS.

Secretary's Order No. 9741.

Retaining structures are being built at the north and south ends of the wall now being built between West Thirty-seventh and West Thirty-eighth streets, North river, to retain earth filling, by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, under permit of the Board.

EARTH FILLING.

Secretary's Order No. 9692.

Earth filling is being placed in rear of bulkhead-wall between West Thirty-seventh and West Thirty-eighth streets, North river, by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, under resolution of the Board, November 14, 1889.

SEWER AT WEST THIRTY-NINTH AND WEST FORTIETH STREETS, N. R.

Secretary's Order No. 9893.

A sewer is being built on a pile foundation along the westerly edge of the platform, between West Thirty-ninth and West Fortieth streets, to connect the sewer at West Thirty-ninth street with the new Pier at West Fortieth street, by the Department of Public Works, under permit of the Board.

PIER AT WEST FORTY-FIFTH STREET.

Contract No. 327.

A new Pier at the foot of West Forty-fifth street was completed during the quarter, by John W. Flaherty, under the above contract.

PIER AT WEST FORTY-NINTH STREET.

A new Pier at the foot of West Forty-ninth street, begun by the contractor, Barth S. Cronin, on July 30, 1890, is in progress.

DREDGING.

Contract No. 343.

Mud was excavated and removed from site of Pier at West Forty-ninth street, under the above contract.

West Fifty-second Street Section, South End—Resolutions of the Board, October 6, 1887, and February 6, 1889.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

249 loads of earth filling were received and distributed between West Fiftieth and West Fifty-first streets, North river.

PIER AT WEST FIFTY-SECOND STREET.

Contract No. 344.

A new Pier at the foot of West Fifty-second street is being built by the contractor, P. Sanford Ross, under the above contract.

DREDGING.

Contract No. 347.

Mud was excavated and removed from site of Pier at West Fifty-second street, under the above contract.

West Fifty-seventh Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, December 20, 1888, and August 1, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

2 transverse caps were placed and fastened on piles.

MASONRY.

Pointed granite; cut and dressed coping; placing backing logs, etc.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

1,905 loads of earth filling were received on tickets and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 90,449 loads.

Pier at West Fifty-sixth Street—Resolution of the Board, September 12, 1889.

BUILDING PIER.

Piles were driven and regulated; caps were put on; deck trimmed and sheathed; put on and fastened rangers, etc., etc.

SEWER.

A sewer is being built underneath the pier.

DREDGING.

Mud was excavated and removed from half-slips of pier, under Treasurer's orders therefor.

Pier at West Fifty-seventh Street—Resolution of the Board, February 6, 1889.

Piles were driven, regulated and staylathed.

Earth Filling between West Fifty-seventh and West Fifty-eighth Streets—Secretary's Order No. 10138.

Earth filling is being placed east of Twelfth avenue between West Fifty-seventh and West Fifty-eighth streets, by Charles E. Appleby, under permit of the Board.

Pier at West Fifty-ninth Street—Secretary's Order No. 10122.

A new pier is being built at the foot of West Fifty-ninth street by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under resolution of the Board, 23d May, 1890.

Grain Elevator at West Sixty-second street.

The grain elevator on the bulkhead between West Sixtieth and West Sixty-second streets is being re-erected and restored.

Pier at West Sixty-third Street.

Stone foundations of Pier foot of West Sixty-third street, North river, are being rebuilt; also a new timber pier is being erected upon same.

Pier at West Sixty-fourth Street—Secretary's Order No. 9624.

A shed is being built upon the pier at the foot of West Sixty-fourth street, North river, and a double row of railroad tracks laid down its centre; also a second story floor is being built in shed.

EAST RIVER.

Foot of East Twentieth Street—Secretary's Order No. 10471.

TEST PILING.

Test piles were driven on site of new pier to get the necessary information for building new pier at the foot of said street.

Foot of East Twenty-second Street—Secretary's Order No. 10148.

TEST PILING.

10 test piles were driven on site of the Pier at foot of East Twenty-second street.

REMOVING OLD WORK.

Secretary's Order No. 10473.

Piles and remains of old dumping-board at the foot of East Twenty-second street were removed.

East Twenty-fourth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL.

STONE FILLING.

765 cubic yards of cobble stone and 495 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and placed on wall foundation. Total to date, 1,518 cubic yards of cobble, and 495 cubic yards of rip-rap.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

330 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed, 2 of which were broken in driving, total to date, 635 driven and 2 broken in driving; 55 bracing piles were driven and regulated, total to date, 70 driven and 1 broken in driving; 4 binding frames were made, sunk and keyed to place; 135 foundation piles and 204 platform piles were sawed off; 192 lineal feet of longitudinal capping and 9 transverse caps were placed; located foundation piles, etc.

MASONRY.

Mattresses were prepared for placing concrete blocks; 5 standard blocks were set in wall and chain holes between blocks were filled with concrete in bags.

PERMANENT SEWER.

37 piles were driven, regulated and staylathed in rear of wall foundation on which to build sewer.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

The sewer piles in rear of wall foundation were capped and decked over to form a temporary platform from which to dump filling when received at this section. 39 piles were driven at south side of street for a crib-bulkhead to retain filling in place.

Pier at East Twenty-fourth Street—Contract No. 332.

The work of repairing outer end and building new inner end of pier at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street, by John Gillies, under above contract, is in progress.

Bellevue Section—Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL.

STONE FILLING.

969 cubic yards of cobble stone and 583 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and placed on wall foundation. Total received to date, 3,615 cubic yards of cobble and 1,111 cubic yards of rip-rap.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

198 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed, total to date, 1,167 driven and 6 broken in driving; 66 bracing piles were driven and regulated, total to date, 181 driven and 1 broken in driving; 4 binding frames were made, sunk and keyed to place; 236 foundation piles and 118 platform piles were sawed off with the saw-cutting machine; 242 lineal feet of longitudinal capping and 24 transverse caps were placed; 1,204 square feet of 4-inch deck planking were placed on caps; located foundation piles, etc.

MASONRY.

Cobble stone were washed from tops of concrete blocks, mattresses were prepared for placing concrete blocks on and 3 concrete blocks were set; 108 pieces of granite were set and blocked up with 307 batches of concrete.

PERMANENT SEWER.

26 piles were driven for sewer in rear of bulkhead-wall and 20 1/4 feet of brick sewer were built by James Brown, under Treasurer's order therefor.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

A temporary approach, to dump earth filling from, was constructed on the sewer piles and connected with the new pier at the foot of East Twenty-eighth street. 3,569 loads of earth filling were received and placed in rear of the new bulkhead-wall by Plunkitt & Smith; 23 piles were driven at the north end of section to retain filling in place.

Pier at East Twenty-eighth Street—Contract No. 312.

The new pier at the foot of East Twenty-eighth street was completed on the 17th day of October, 1890, by Barth S. Cronin, under the above contract.

Foot of East Thirty-fifth Street—Secretary's Order No. 10428.

Test piles were driven in order to obtain the necessary information for making plans and specifications for building a new pier at the foot of the above street.

East Ninety-fourth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

370 square feet of 4-inch deck plank were placed on caps in rear of wall.

MASONRY.

38 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 117 batches of concrete.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

4,431 loads of earth filling on tickets, 953 loads free and 8,488 loads from Department of Street Cleaning were received and placed in rear of the new bulkhead-wall. Total received to date, 4,042 loads free, 4,431 loads on tickets, and 8,488 loads from Department of Street Cleaning.

Pier at East Ninety-fifth Street—Contract No. 333.

The work of building a new pier at the foot of East Ninety-fifth street, was begun on June 23, 1890, by the contractor for said work, G. H. Scribner, Jr. In progress.

East One Hundred and Second Street Section—Resolution of the Board, July 17, 1890.

A fence was put up to keep people from trespassing and the old bulkhead platform at the foot of East One Hundred and Fourth street was removed.

East One Hundred and Tenth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL.

DREDGING.

6,525 cubic yards of mud and 1,449 cubic yards of sand were excavated and removed from site of wall by the Atlantic Dredging Company. Total excavated to date, 15,459 cubic yards of sand, 51 old piles and one sunken wreck.

STONE FILLING.

1,156 cubic yards of cobble stone and 1,251 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and placed on wall foundation by Messrs. Brown & Fleming and Andrew A. Bouker. Total to date, 5,595 cubic yards of cobble and 2,664 cubic yards of rip-rap.

PILING AND WOODWORK.

417 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed, and 3 broken in driving, total to date, 1,985 driven and 28 broken in driving; 68 bracing piles were driven and regulated; 4 binding frames were made, sunk and keyed to place; sawing off piles; locating foundation piles; placing deck planking, etc.

MASONRY.

11 concrete foundation blocks were set in wall, making a total to date of 39 standard blocks and 1 special angle block; 137 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 381 batches of concrete.

PERMANENT SEWER EXTENSION.

7 batches of concrete were made and placed on grillage foundation for building brick sewer.

FILLING IN REAR OF WALL.

Cribwork was built up at south end of section to retain filling.

PIER AND DUMPING-BOARD AT EAST ONE HUNDRED AND TENTH STREET.

Contract No. 339.

The work of building a new wooden pier and dumping-board at the foot of East One Hundred and Tenth street was begun by W. W. Hegeman, contractor, July 18, 1890. In progress.

BULKHEAD WALL.

Mud, sand and gravel were pumped from rock bottom in line of wall; blasting bed-rock; 152 1/2 batches of concrete were made and placed on rock bottom; 20 1/2 batches of concrete were mixed and placed on top of concrete in bags; 9 concrete blocks were set on wall foundation; chain holes between concrete blocks were filled with concrete in bags; 96 pieces of granite were set and 649 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and placed by Andrew A. Bouker.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION NOT UNDER NEW PLAN.

Crib-bulkhead from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fortieth Streets, H. R.

The work of building a crib-bulkhead from East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to north of East One Hundred and Fortieth street, Harlem river, and for dredging thereat, by Messrs. Fogg & Scribner, contractors, under Contract No. 318, was commenced December 23, 1889, and is in progress.

Department Yards.

WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH STREET YARD.

The blacksmith has done iron work as required for the different sections of construction work, for floating property and for the work of general repairs. Concrete moulds and cores were made and set up from time to time as required, for making wall foundation blocks; 15 concrete foundation blocks, containing 488.57 cubic yards, were made; 1,500 barrels of Portland cement were received under Treasurer's orders therefor, and were stored for Department use after tests were made. Cement, sand and broken stone, stored at yard, were issued to the various sections of the work.

The yard has been maintained in good order.

EAST SEVENTEENTH STREET YARD.

Concrete blocks were made, containing 1,123 cubic yards of concrete; 2,906 barrels of Portland cement were received and stored for Department use, and samples sent to West Fifty-seventh Street Yard for testing.

100-TON DERRICK "CITY OF NEW YORK."

This derrick has handled foundation blocks for the various sections of the bulkhead-wall as required. Various repairs have been made by the crew and the same has been kept in good condition.

12-TON DERRICK.

This derrick has been in commission during the quarter and used and employed in setting granite on the various sections of the wall.

10-TON DERRICK.

This derrick has been in commission during the quarter and used and employed in setting granite on the various sections of the wall.

TUG "MANHATTAN."

The tug "Manhattan" has done all the necessary towing for the Department.

The boring machine "Woodcock" has been in commission from time to time and has been kept in order.

Divers' scows "A," "G" and "N" have been in use and kept in good order.

Small divers' scow is laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard and is used for storing lines, etc.

The naphtha engine launch has been in use for examinations of the water-front and for carrying small parcels of materials and tools to the different parts of the work.

The small boats, skiffs, bateaux, etc., have been kept in order and good condition.

Materials and Supplies.

Various materials and supplies for the use of floating property have been received and expended in part, and the remainder has been stored for future use, as required.

Miscellaneous.

Various small pieces of work have been done at the West Fifty-seventh Street Yard for the use of floating property and for other work, such as hanging fenders for scows, straight edges, ladders, danger signs, pike poles, etc. The force of floating property has also been employed in filing saws, spinning oakum, heating pitch, pumping out and caring for scows and in the general care of floating property laid up at the yard.

Surveying Party.

In connection with the construction of the bulkhead or river wall and the new piers at the different sections on the North, East and Harlem rivers, base lines and bench marks have been frequently verified, and from them grades, measurements, etc., have been furnished from time to time, as required, during the progress of the work. Lines, grades, etc., have also been furnished for the work of repairs under contract. Surveys of the water-front on the North, East and Harlem rivers, and the structures thereon, have been made at various places, as required, and the same have been plotted and placed on file, and tracings therefrom have been prepared.

24,410 disk soundings, to ascertain the depth of water, have been taken in 169 slips, 1,878 rod soundings, to ascertain the depth of soft mud, have been taken in 22 slips, by the surveying and sounding parties, of which 17,754 disk soundings in 80 slips, and 990 rod soundings in 12 slips, were on the North river, and 6,656 disk soundings in 70 slips, and 880 rod soundings in 10 slips were on the East and Harlem rivers.

Of the above, 7,454 disk soundings in 39 slips, and 641 rod soundings in 8 slips were for construction, and 16,956 disk soundings in 130 slips and 1,237 rod soundings in 14 slips were for general repairs and examinations; soundings taken before and after dredging.

Of the soundings above reported, 5,846 disk soundings in 54 slips have been taken on the North river, and 3,330 disk soundings in 37 slips have been taken on the East and Harlem rivers, and was done by the regular sounding parties, under resolution of the Board of September 19, 1883. Most of the soundings have been plotted and placed on file. Measurements, testing the dimensions of piers, etc., have been taken.

The dredging done by lessees, alleged owners and others, under permit or order of the Board of Docks, has been attended to.

The measurement of all material dredged by the Department of Docks has been made.

Reports, estimates, etc., of work done, have been prepared and receipts given.

The automatic tide gauges have been attended to.
