

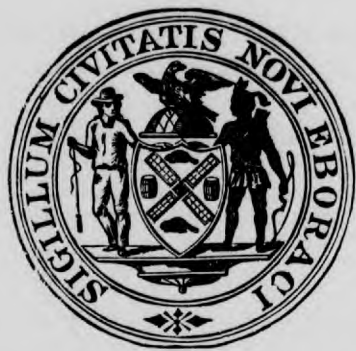

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Referred to Other Departments.

To Department of Public Works—

On street pavements at Stanton street, between Bowery and Chrystie street; in Rivington street, between Orchard and Ludlow streets; in Mott street, between Spring and Prince streets; in Fifty-second street, between Eleventh avenue and North river, and in Eleventh avenue, between Fifty-second and Fifty-third streets.

To Department of Buildings—

On dangerous condition of premises corner Fourth avenue and Twenty-third street; corner Third avenue and Twenty-third street; East Twenty-sixth street near First avenue, and 410 and 412 East Twenty-sixth street.

Departmental Estimate for 1879.

The Departmental Estimate of expenditures required, with the objects thereof, in detail, for the year 1879, was approved and ordered forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That the application of Henry Steeger for relief from order on premises 143 and 145 East Thirty-first street, be and is hereby denied, and the order be enforced.

Resolved, That leave of absence of two weeks, from August 22d, be and is hereby granted to Sanitary Inspector Bryant.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to record the following birth and marriage certificates:

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to make the following correction on the Death Record, of Caroline Groszlaub, who died September 25, 1875, age 23, instead of 32, the same being a clerical error.

Resolved, That a permit to build a tenement-house at No. 8 Downing street, as per plans submitted, be and is hereby granted.

The explanations of J. W. Lyons and W. Washburn, in respect to certain violations of the Sanitary Code, were received and accepted.

Sanitary Bureau.

I have the honor to submit the following report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 24, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,706, as follows: 4 public buildings, 851 tenement-houses, 155 private dwellings, 62 other dwellings, 14 manufactories and workshops, 30 stores and warehouses, 40 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 1 stock yard, 1 brewery, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 2 manure dumps, 4 public sewers, 15 sunken and vacant lots, 67 yards, courts, and areas, 75 cellars and basements, 70 waste pipes and drains, 164 privies and water-closets, 31 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 piers and docks, 3 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 2 piggeries, 23 other nuisances, 68 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports received from the Inspectors was 683.

During the past week 196 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 86 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

117 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-vaults.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 17 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 14 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 104 privies and water-closets, 234 yards, courts, and areas, 305 cellars and basements, 20 garbage boxes, and 128½ miles of street gutters.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending Saturday, August 24, 1878, 519 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city; this is the lowest weekly number of deaths reported for this city since June 22, and is a decrease of 50 compared with the number of deaths reported for the preceding week, and 77 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending August 17, 1878, was 541, which is 109 below the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.92 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,085,197.

The most noticeable decrease in the mortality during the week was among children under 5 years of age and diarrhoeal diseases. The deaths among the former were 71, and the latter 18 less than the number reported for the week previous. The following table will show the progress of the deaths of children, deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, and deaths in tenement-houses during the past 10 weeks:

There was also a decrease during the week compared with the preceding week of 8 deaths from scarlatina, 2 from croup, 3 from typhoid fever, 1 from alcoholism, 5 from cancer, 7 from diseases of the brain and nervous system, 8 from Bright's disease, and 2 by drowning; measles increased 1; diphtheria, 7; phthisis, 2; pneumonia, 10; diseases of the heart, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; and drowning, 1.

The disposition of 519 deaths and still-births, or 92.51 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 8; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 244; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 77; Greenwood (undenominational), 36; Lutheran (undenominational), 79; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 13; Evergreen (undenominational), 22; Woodlawn (undenominational), 13; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 3; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 2; Washington (undenominational), 11.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 89 were in institutions, 287 in tenement-houses, 127 in houses containing 3 families or less, 2 in hotels and boarding houses, 13 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 2 were on the basement floor, 94 on the first, 150 on the second, 97 on the third, 51 on the fourth, and 22 on the fifth. 518 were reported to be residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident; 50 were reported to be single, 121 married, 42 widowed, and the condition of 306 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending August 17 was in the following wards, viz.: First, 8; Second, 2; Third, 6; Fourth, 15; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 8; Seventh, 26; Eighth, 21; Ninth, 24; Tenth, 17; Eleventh, 40; Twelfth, 42; Thirteenth, 13; Fourteenth, 17; Fifteenth, 8; Sixteenth, 15; Seventeenth, 32; Eighteenth, 30; Nineteenth, 92; Twentieth, 30; Twenty-first, 37; Twenty-second, 36; Twenty-third, 10; Twenty-fourth, 7.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 24 was 71.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.769, the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 694, and the amount of rain-fall was .33 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

During the week ending August 24, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 519 burial permits for city deaths, 32 for bodies in transitu, and 42 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 519 deaths, 102 marriages, 581 births, 42 still-births, 32 applications for transit permits, and 53 returns from coroners. There were 28 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 5 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage, and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau.
