CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for annually recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payment should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. No payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution.

BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, November 1, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names:

The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Levey), the Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, the Commissioner of Bridges (Deputy Commissioner York), the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of Queens, the President of the Borough of Richmond and the President of the Board.

The minutes of the meeting of October 25, 1899, were read and approved.

The matter of depressing the tracks of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, which was laid over at the last meeting, was brought up.

The counsel for the railroad company submitted the following protest:

NEW YORK, October 31, 1899.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements, No. 13 Park Row, New York City:

DEAR SIR—Last Wednesday I appeared before your Board, representing the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, as owner, and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, as lessee, of the Port Morris Branch of the Harlem Railroad upon the public hearing that day given, as required by the Railroad Law relative to grade crossings, upon the application to abolish the grade crossing of the Southern Boulevard.

I beg to state that the railroad companies will not oppose the proceedings preliminary to an application to the Railroad Commissioners to abolish all the grade crossings, from Westchester avenue to the Southern Boulevard, inclusive; but that the application as now made will be vigorously opposed because it is impracticable to change the grade of the railroad so as to abolish the grade crossings at the Southern Boulevard alone. I write this letter to you, so that the position of the railroad companies may be correctly presented to the Board of Public Improvements.

There is no desire on the part of the companies to hinder or delay public improvements in that section of the town.

After hearing Mr. Luce in opposition to the lowering of the tracks, and the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and Mr. Gumbleton, representing the North Side Board of Trade, in favor of the same, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The Commissioner of Highways and the Local Board of the Borough of The Bronx have recommended, and property-owners have petitioned that the grade at the crossing of the Southern Boulevard and the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, in the Borough of The Bronx, be depressed so as to conform to the grade established December 8, 1892; and

Whereas, A hearing on such recommendation was this day (November 1, 1899), given by this Board, representative of said railroad company being present;

Resolved, That this Board recommend that application be made to the State Board of Railroad Commissioners that the New York and Harlem Railroad Company be required to depress the grade at the crossing of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad and the Southern Boulevard, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, so as to conform to the grade established December 8, 1892.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested to conduct the necessary proceedings and to represent the city authorities before the said State Board of Railroad Commissioners.

Affirmative—The Comptroller, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Commissioner of Bridges, President of the Borough of The Bronx and President of the Board.

Negative—None.

In the matter of the proposed extension and change of grade and lines of Van Corlear place, from Kingsbridge avenue to Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter has been duly advertised for a hearing as provided by law.

After hearing Mr. Clarence C. Ferris, representing certain property-owners, in opposition to the proposed extension and change, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 11th day of October, 1899, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York, by the extension and changing the grade and lines of Van Corlear place, from Kingsbridge avenue to Broadway, in the Twelfth Ward, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and a change in the grade of Broadway and Terrace View avenue, in connection therewith, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 1st day of November, 1899, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which such proposed extension and changes would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed extension and changes would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 1st day of November, 1899; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 1st day of November, 1899; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed extension and changes who have appeared, and such proposed extension and changes were duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

MY DEAR MR. GROUT—Agreeable to your request to let you know in writing the particulars as to the improving of Newkirk avenue, from East Twenty-sixth street to Flatbush avenue, I would state as follows, viz:

During the first part of this year the residents of Newkirk avenue, between the above-mentioned points, prevailed upon Alderman McInnes to present their petition for the improving of Newkirk avenue by asphalt and curbing; said petition was passed upon favorably by our Local Board, the Board of Public Improvements, and passed upon by the Council as near as I can remember about June 3, and was acted upon by the Board of Aldermen and signed by the Mayor, in connection with a like petition for the improving of Vernon avenue and Grant street. SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring, for report, a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, requesting the Board of Public Improvements to take steps to effect the immediate construction of a bridge on the line of the Southern Boulevard over the tracks of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, I have to state as follows:

The Final Maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, Borough of The Bronx, show that the tracks of the Port Morris Branch Railroad are to be depressed about six feet at this point, and that a bridge is to be constructed to carry the Southern Boulevard over said railroad.

A contract for regulating and grading the Southern Boulevard, on both sides of the Port Morris Branch Railroad, is being carried out, which contract cannot be completed unless the bridge be constructed and the railroad tracks lowered about six feet.

Resolved, That section 4 of the ordinances applicable to the ordinary uses of Central Park, adopted on the 31st day of March, 1873, by the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, and by the Park Board September 15, 1898, be and hereby is amended by adding after the word "carriages," in line two, "drawn by horses," and further, by adding to the section "No horseless carriages or motor wagons shall enter or go upon the drive except by permission of the Department," so as to read as follows:

4. The drive shall be used only by persons in pleasure carriages drawn by horses, on bicycles or on horseback, the ride only by persons on horseback; animals to be used on either shall be well broken and constantly held in such control that they may be easily and quickly turned or stopped; they shall not be allowed to move at a rate of speed which shall be alarming or cause danger, nor under any circumstances at a rate of speed on the drive of more than seven miles nor on the ride of over ten miles an hour; and when any Park Keeper shall deem it necessary to safety, good order or the general convenience that the speed of an animal shall be checked or that it should be stopped, or its course altered and shall so direct, by gesture or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the rider or driver of such animal to follow such direction; and no horse or other beast of burden or draft shall be driven or suffered to stand anywhere, except on the drive or ride. No horseless carriage or motor wagons shall enter or go upon the drive except by permission of the department.

Sec. 134. That the owners, lessees, tenants and managers of every blacksmith or other shop, forge, coal yard, foundry, manufactory and premises where any business is done, or in or upon which an engine or boilers are used, shall cause all ashes, cinders, rubbish, dirt and refuse to be removed to some proper place, so that the same shall not accumulate at any of the above-mentioned premises or in the appurtenances thereof, nor the same become filthy or offensive. Nor shall any owner, lessee, tenant, manager, engineer, fireman or any other person cause or allow any smoke, cinders, dust, gas, steam or offensive odor to escape or be discharged from any such building, place or premises; and every furnace employed in the working of engines by steam, or in any mill, factory, printing house, dye factory, iron foundry, glass house, distillery, brew house, sugar refinery, bake house, gas works or in any other buildings used for the purposes of trade or manufacture shall be so constructed as to consume or burn the smoke arising therefrom.

Section 171. That no new burying-ground, cemetery, tomb or vault for dead human bodies shall be established, nor shall the remains of any dead body be placed in any existing burying ground, vault, tomb or cemetery in The City of New York, nor any of said receptacles be opened, exposed or disturbed, except according to the terms of a permit therefor given by this Department; and every body buried in any such place shall be buried to the depth of six feet below the surface of the ground and four feet below any closely adjacent street, except that in the Borough of Queens a body may be buried to the depth of three feet below the surface of the ground.

No food, beverage or other article for human consumption shall be sold, exposed or offered for sale in any cemetery or burying-ground within The City of New York.
